

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1938.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

1. The King's Fund has developed its activities in several ways in order to assist the hospitals in the efforts they are making to improve their financial position and to increase the efficiency of the voluntary hospital service. Although the income of the hospitals was well maintained during 1937, they have to cope with constantly increasing expenditure, including new and costly treatments and the improvements already made or suggested in the conditions for nurses; and with the effects of current financial conditions upon the increase or maintenance of contributions. The King's Fund has helped the hospitals in these efforts, partly by means of its distribution and the enquiries connected therewith, partly by encouraging the more general adoption of various methods of controlling expenditure; partly by using its position as a central body to promote combined action to secure fresh sources of revenue; and partly, in some cases, by making special grants conditional on the progress made in financial reorganisation at the hospitals concerned. The Fund has also responded to the request of the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London that it should undertake certain administrative services for hospitals, the first of these being the Emergency Bed Service for facilitating the rapid admission of urgent cases, described in a later paragraph of this Report.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF THE YEAR.

2. The total amount distributed was again £302,000, including the ordinary distribution of £300,000 to hospitals and convalescent homes, and the District Nursing distribution of £2,000 in respect of the work done by the Associations in relief of Hospital Out-patient Departments,

- 3. The expenses of the Emergency Bed Service from June 21st, the date of its inauguration, came to £2,035 10s. 10d., including initial expenditure. This sum appears in the accounts under a new heading, "Special Services for Hospitals." The combined total of distribution and special services was thus £304,035 ios. iod.
- 4. The current income available for these purposes, derived from subscriptions, donations, income from investments and general legacies, after allowing for expenses, was £312,672 2s.

- 7. The Distribution Committee were, as always, greatly indebted to the Visitors who inspected the Hospitals during the summer. Numerous extracts from the Reports were forwarded for the observations of the Hospitals concerned.
- 8. The total sum distributed among Hospitals and Convalescent Homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions and special services, is £3,281,403. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £9,386,210 has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

- 9. His Majesty King George VI, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to give an annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty The Queen, and Her Majesty Queen Mary, were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Gloucester, the Duke of Kent, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.
- 10. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland) Ltd., £1,066 13s. 4d. from "M.M.", £1,000 from Baring Brothers and Company, Ltd., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company.

Other contributions included annual subscriptions of £666 13s. 4d. from Mr. Philip Fleming; of £625 from Lloyds Bank, Ltd.; of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company and

from Morgan, Grenfell & Co. Ltd.; and of £344 16s. 7d. from the Central Mining and Investment Corporation Ltd.

Donations included a most generous gift of £6,000 from an anonymous donor who has now given £94,500 in eleven separate donations during the past sixteen years. Other donations included £1,365 3s. 11d. from Baring Brothers and Company, Ltd.; £1,050 from Viscount Wakefield; £1,000 from Marks & Spencer, Ltd.; £500 from Mr. W. A. Posnett; and £300 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust. The Fund also received two anonymous donations of £500 and £300.

- 11. The sum of £7,500 was received in 1938 from the League of Mercy, being the League's 41st contribution to the King's Fund. The League, since it was founded in 1899, has now contributed £581,500 to the Fund.

- 13. The Council are very grateful to the Trustees of the Estate of the late Mrs. Rosa Matilda Richter Starr for a gift of £200 to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers.
- 14. The Council desire to emphasise the fact that the correct title of the Fund is "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London," and that the full title should always be used in bequests intended for the Fund.

EXPENSES.

15. Expenses during the year amounted to £16,228 7s. 1d. This sum includes the cost of statistical and other ordinary services for Hospitals, expenditure on the collection of funds and on propaganda for the King's Fund and the Hospitals, and all the other widespread activities of the Fund except the special services.

Bank of England Distribution and other Special Trusts.

- 16. The amount specially distributed on behalf of the Bank of England amounted to £2,260 10s., the same as in 1937. The list of grants includes substantial donations to four of the building schemes for which Hospitals had made appeals to the Bank.
- 17. The following payments were made out of trust funds earmarked for special purposes, viz., £939 18s. 2d. to the Miller Hospital in reduction of the building debt, out of the income of the special trust gift received in 1930; and £939 14s. 6d. to the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, under the Will of the late Sir John Young, towards the maintenance

of the Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home, bequeathed to the King's Fund and used and managed by the Hospital in accordance with the terms of the Will.

18. A special trust gift of £1,000 was received from an anonymous donor, to be offered to the Bromley and District Hospital on a £ for £ basis on account of new subscriptions and donations received during 1938. The offer was accepted, the grant earned, and the money paid.

DISTRIBUTION IN AID OF DISTRICT NURSING WORK FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS.

19. The third distribution of £2,000, through the Hospitals, towards the cost of District Nursing work in relief of their out-patient departments during 1937 was carried out in March. Grants for this purpose were made to 85 Hospitals in respect of 16,900 patients attended by III District Nursing Associations.

THE VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS EMERGENCY BED SERVICE.

- 20. The Emergency Bed Service, established to facilitate the admission of acute and emergency cases to Voluntary Hospitals, was opened on June 21st, and on October 8th it was extended to cover the night as well as the day. The King's Fund provides the finance and the staff. A Joint Committee of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, with Sir Harold Wernher as Chairman, is responsible for the Service.
- 21. Reports of the number of vacant beds are received from every Hospital by telephone once or twice daily. With the aid of this centralised information arrangements for the admission of an urgent case, often including transport by ambulance, can usually be made within a few minutes of the receipt of an enquiry from the patient's doctor.
- 22. By the end of the year more than 1,200 doctors had used the Service, over 2,800 cases had been dealt with and the numbers were growing daily.* The Service has proved to be of great value both to doctors whose time is saved, and to patients and their friends whose risks and anxieties are curtailed by the avoidance of delay.
- 23. By thus using its executive and financial resources in conjunction with the representative Committee for London, the King's Fund has enabled the Voluntary Hospitals to combine in this administrative Service the advantages of centralisation with those of independence.

24. On June 30th His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent visited the office and inspected the Emergency Bed Service at work.

MECHANICAL RESPIRATORS.

25. The Council are very grateful to Sir Edward Meyerstein for the gift of three mechanical respirators to meet an urgent need which had been revealed in the early days of the Emergency Bed Service.

EMERGENCY DISTRIBUTION DURING THE CRISIS.

26. In September the Fund made an emergency distribution to help the Hospitals to cope with the need of immediate cash to meet the special expenses and temporary loss of income incurred during the crisis. This took the form of a payment of £90,500 on account of the larger grants made at the distribution in December.

RECRUITMENT OF NURSES.

- 27. When giving evidence before the Inter-departmental Committee on the Nursing Services, the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London suggested that a central bureau should be set up to supply information and to establish effective contacts with the educational authorities and with prospective entrants to the nursing profession.
- 28. The Voluntary Hospitals Committee afterwards asked the King's Fund whether it could see its way to establish such a bureau, and the Fund replied that the question was receiving its serious consideration.*

PROVIDENT SCHEME FOR THE MIDDLE CLASSES.

29. The Voluntary Hospitals Committee also consulted the King's Fund on the need for a provident scheme on simple lines to enable persons of moderate means to make provision against the time when they might require pay-bed accommodation and treatment at a cost suited to their circumstances. The Fund thereupon appointed a special Committee, with Mr. Bernard Docker as Chairman, to consider the preparation and establishment of a scheme, and to report to the Management Committee.

^{*} In January, 1939, the Inter-departmental Committee commented favourably on the suggestion, and in July a bureau was established under a Committee on which the King's Fund, the Voluntary Hospitals Committee and the College of Nursing are represented; the Fund undertaking the expense, like that of the Emergency Bed Service, as another "Special Service for Hospitals."

REDUCTION OF OUT-PATIENT WAITING.

30. Various ways of reducing out-patient waiting, by making appointments for different times of arrival for different patients or groups of patients, were described in a memorandum issued in 1937 by the Out-patient Arrangements Committee. In July, 1938, the Committee followed this up by circulating a detailed description of the Appointments System in force at the Manchester Jewish Hospital, and asking every hospital for observations on the arrangements in its out-patient department and on the practicability of adopting the Appointments System either wholly or in part.

The replies so far indicate that a number of hospitals either have taken action to secure some or all of the benefits of the Appointments System, or contemplate doing so.

They also give additional evidence of the way in which the various reports issued by the King's Fund on out-patient methods in general, and on the separate items of out-patient procedure, have stimulated interest in the whole question and promoted the adoption of time-saving methods.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

31. The Propaganda Committee have continued to adopt every available means of making the work of the Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals understood and appreciated. Without sufficient knowledge of the value and extent of their work, the public cannot be expected to respond readily to appeals on behalf of the Hospitals. The Miniature Hospital, which has drawn large crowds wherever it has been shown; the new film, "The War Without End"; lectures by expert speakers to school and other audiences; and the distribution of suitable literature have all contributed to this end; and the Committee are constantly devising new methods of bringing home to the public what the hospital service means to them, and why it is vitally necessary that the Voluntary Hospitals should receive adequate support.

PARLIAMENTARY BUSINESS.

32. During the year the Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee of the King's Fund, acting in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association, gave evidence, in the interests of the Hospitals, before the Joint Committee appointed to consider the Charitable Collections (Regulation) Bill. The Fund also supported the Voluntary Hospitals (Relief from Rating) Bill, and, in anticipation of the proposed appointment of the Royal Commission on the Workmen's Compensation Acts, began the preparation of evidence on the subject of the cost incurred by Voluntary Hospitals in the treatment of industrial accidents.

PERSONAL.

33. The King's Fund suffered two severe losses during the year by the deaths of Sir Leonard Cohen in April and Sir Cooper Perry in December.

Sir Leonard Cohen had been connected with the Fund since 1909, and had been Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee for 14 years and an Honorary Secretary for 13 years.

Sir Cooper Perry first became a Visitor for the Fund in 1898, and had been a member of the Distribution Committee since 1904, and Chairman since 1921, besides serving on numerous special Committees.

Resolutions passed at the time by or on behalf of the General Council will be found in the Report of the Annual Meeting on May 27th and after the Report of the Distribution Meeting on December 13th.

- 34. The Council also regret to record the deaths of Mr. Frank Hazell, a member of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee; of Captain W. B. Maxwell, a member of the Propaganda Committee; and of Professor L. S. Dudgeon, one of the representatives of the Voluntary Hospitals Committee on the Emergency Bed Service Committee.
- 35. In February the general secretarial staff of the Fund was reorganised. Mr. Maynard, having reached the age of 65 after 31 years' service as Secretary, became Clerk to the General Council and to the Management Committee; and Mr. Ives, who had been Assistant Secretary since 1929, was appointed Secretary to the Fund.

MESSAGE FROM THE KING.

36. At the Distribution Meeting of the Council on December 13th, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent read the following gracious message from His Majesty The King, Patron of the Fund:—-

"I observe with pleasure that the King's Fund continues to help the Hospitals by all the means in its power. In the present difficult times it is more than ever necessary that the King's Fund should not relax its efforts to assist the Hospitals, not only financially but with the advice and guidance that it is so well fitted to supply.

Annual Meeting of the President and General Council, May 27th, 1938.

The Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Friday, May 27th, 1938, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent being in the Chair.

LORD LUKE (Honorary Secretary) read the following resolution passed by the Management Committee, on behalf of the General Council, on the occasion of the death of Sir Leonard Cohen:—

"That the Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Sir Leonard Cohen, one of the Honorary Secretaries, and their sense of the great loss which the Fund has suffered thereby. He had been associated with the Fund from the year 1909, first as a Visitor, then as a Member of the Distribution Committee from 1911 to 1921 and from 1925; as a Member of the General Council from 1921; as Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee from 1922 to 1935; as a Member of the Management Committee from 1922; and as a Member of the Special Committee appointed to inquire into the Disposal of Ambulance Cases in 1923–24. As an Honorary Secretary from 1925, he took an active part in all the Fund's work, and he will be much missed by his colleagues on the Council and the Committees, who had learnt to appreciate his sagacious judgment combined with tactful good humour, by his fellow Honorary Secretaries, and by the Staff. The Management Committee desire also to tender to members of the family their heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement."

SIR ERNEST POOLEY (Honorary Secretary) reported the following Orders of Appointment signed by His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent as President:—

THE DUKE'S SPEECH.

THE DUKE OF KENT, addressing the Council, said:

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen—Our business at this meeting is concerned both with the past and with the future. On the one hand we have Reports and Accounts for the year 1937, and on the other we have the beginning of a new experiment in co-operation in the voluntary hospital service of London—the establishment, jointly by the hospitals and the King's Fund, of a central office to facilitate the rapid admission of urgent and acute cases.

Anonymous Gifts.

The Annual Report for 1937 covers almost exactly the whole of my first year of office as President. At the December meeting I referred to several of the principal events of the year, and I need not repeat what I said then. The Accounts show a rather better result than was estimated at that time. The amount required from reserves to make up the distribution of £302,000 proved less than in the previous year, instead of more, being only £3,700 in 1937 as against £7,600 in 1936. The increase in our income is very welcome. I hope to see a further increase this year. We have recently received a very generous donation of £6,000 from the same anonymous friend who already many times in the past has helped us to maintain the distribution.

Among the receipts for 1937 I should like specially to express appreciation of the anonymous donor who gave £1,000 in 1935 to commemorate the Silver Jubilee and last year gave £1,000 on the occasion of the Coronation and £1,000 on our fortieth anniversary.

Radium Service.

The Distribution Committee's report on the King's Fund radium describes the progress that has been made during the last two years with the aid of large gifts received for the purpose from another very generous donor. We now have a stock of 17 grammes. Most of it is out on standing loans to individual hospitals. A small quantity is kept in a pool from which it is lent out to certain hospitals

when needed for a patient, and is immediately returned, travelling both ways in our own special car fitted with a leaden box. With the aid of the additional amounts now lent by the King's Fund, several of the hospitals are being enabled to develop the newer forms of treatment where radium is applied in large quantities at a distance from the patient.

The report of the Revenue Committee deals with the income of the King's Fund and of the hospitals, and with the numerous activities of the Propaganda Committee on behalf of both. Three of their enterprises ought to be specially valuable in stimulating interest in hospital work: the new film, the miniature hospital which is now at the Empire Exhibition at Glasgow, and the lectures given in schools.

Improved Hospital Income.

The report shows that the hospitals themselves, taken together, increased their income in 1937 by about £350,000. But expenditure also increased and the result was a very small margin of about £8,000 to the good, on a turnover of over £4,500,000. This was better than in 1936, when there was a small aggregate deficit for the first time since 1926. But it is not nearly enough. For, when we consider the hospitals separately, the number with deficits had increased, and in some cases these deficits represent a real difficulty. Moreover, a good deal of desirable expenditure had to be deferred, and the costs of the hospitals are constantly growing and will undoubtedly continue to grow, often from causes beyond their control. But the facts remain that since 1926 the aggregate income of the London hospitals had increased from a little over £3,000,000 to well over £4,000,000, and that the total receipts for capital and maintenance had grown to £5,000,000, including more than £2,600,000 in voluntary gifts and over £1,000,000 contributed by patients.

This result has not been attained without great personal efforts and sacrifices on the part both of hospital workers and of members of the public; and still greater efforts will be needed in view of the increasing difficulties of the present time. But they are worth while. For there are great advantages in our system of having the two kinds of hospital, the voluntary and the municipal, influencing each other and co-operating to form a complete hospital service: the voluntary hospitals emphasising the values associated with freedom, elasticity and personal initiative, so important in medicine and surgery, and the municipal hospitals the values associated with large-scale work and centralised administration under a public authority.

In order that their essential contribution to this dual hospital service may be effective, the voluntary hospitals are trying to do two things: on the one hand to increase their income, and on the other hand to combine the advantages of organisation with those of freedom, by means of voluntary co-operation.

The King's Fund has from time to time been able to help the hospitals in their efforts to develop new sources of income, and our Revenue Committee are at present in communication with them on the subject.

A New Public Health Service.

The scheme for the establishment of a central office to facilitate the admission of urgent cases is the most important recent improvement of the voluntary hospital service by means of combined action. A doctor with an urgent case will no longer be in danger of having to ring up several hospitals before he can find a vacant bed. He will be able to ring up the central office, to which each co-operating hospital will have notified the number of beds it can spare for such cases, and the central office will be able to put him in touch with the right hospital with the minimum delay.

To achieve this form of co-operation it has been necessary, first, for a large number of hospitals to agree to alter part of their internal arrangements for the admission of patients, and second, for the central office to be established. These two problems have been solved by the co-operation of two central bodies, the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London which represents all the hospitals and through which they have arrived at an agreement, and King Edward's Hospital Fund which has the power of rapid action and can use its income for the benefit of hospitals in other ways besides actual distribution. We are indebted to the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for bringing the scheme to our notice, and for the extensive preliminary work they carried out in connection therewith.

There have been many instances, in recent years, of co-operation between the King's Fund, with its executive powers, and the representative Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, or with the British Hospitals Association for the country as a whole. But this is the most concrete example. The central office will be in the same building as the King's Fund; it will be supervised by our Staff; and the arrangements are being made by a joint committee of the two bodies, including our three Honorary Secretaries.

Hospital Co-operation.

It is a remarkable thing that within these last two years the hospitals have adopted two definite schemes which have involved the sacrifice of a small part of their traditional independence in two matters in which co-operation has sometimes been regarded as specially difficult, the collection of funds and the admission of patients. The combined voluntary hospitals flag-day was an innovation and it has proved a great success. We have every hope that the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service will be equally successful. These are two steps in the direction of meeting the two chief needs of the voluntary hospital service at the present time, increased income and increased co-operation.

Personal.

To come now to personal matters, the illness and death of Sir Leonard Cohen has been a great grief to all who knew him and a great loss to the King's Fund. For 27 years he had brought to its service the administrative ability and public spirit for which he was noted. He had been a member of the Distribution Committee and the Management Committee, Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee, and one of the Honorary Secretaries. His genial presence and his wise counsel will be greatly missed.

Since our meeting in December I have appointed two new members on the Council, Lord Southwood and Mr. Bernard Docker. I have also appointed Mr. Oliver Chadwyck-Healey to the Management Committee. As an active member of the British Hospitals Association his presence on our Parliamentary Committee has long helped to secure the adoption of a common policy by the King's Fund and the hospitals. His presence on the Management Committee will do much to facilitate co-operation with the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London, of which he has been Chairman for nearly four years.

I have also to report that our Secretary, Mr. H. R. Maynard, having reached the age of sixty-five, has intimated that he feels the time has come when he must contemplate a life of rather less strenuous activity than is involved in the constantly increasing work of the Fund. Mr. Maynard was appointed in October, 1906, as its first Secretary. During the whole period from then to now Mr. Maynard

has displayed in the service of the Fund conspicuous ability and untiring industry and perseverance; he has never sought to take credit to himself for any good work the Fund may have done, but has always given the praise to others; he has been, in fact, an ideal Secretary, and I am glad to say that I have been able so to arrange matters that he will continue to give his invaluable services to the Fund in some degree. With that object in view, I have appointed Mr. A. G. L. Ives, who has been for eight years Assistant Secretary, to be Secretary to the Fund, while Mr. Maynard will take the title of Clerk to the General Council and will continue to act as Secretary to the Management Committee and also to the Parliamentary Committee, and, while sparing himself details as far as possible, will continue to assist the Fund on questions of general policy.

Mr. F. B. Elliot is resigning the Secretaryship of the Revenue Committee which he has held since 1921. The first work of that Committee under the Chairmanship of Sir Alan Anderson was the organisation of the Combined Appeal and the foundation of the Hospital Saving Association. This soon became completely separated from the King's Fund. The work of the Association and the King's Fund have both increased so much that Mr. Elliot will now cease his official connection with the Staff of the Revenue Committee; but I propose to appoint him a member of that Committee. The wonderful success of the Hospital Saving Association is the best tribute to his great capacity and to the confidence felt in him by his colleagues and by the members, who now number more than one and three-quarter millions.

I have now only to thank the members of the various Committees, their Chairmen and the other Honorary Officers, for all the work they do. The King's Fund, like the hospitals for whose sake it exists, is under voluntary management; it has always been able to command the services of able and devoted honorary workers; and the increasingly active part which it now takes in dealing with the hospital problems of the present day has greatly added to the work, particularly to that of our Honorary Secretaries, Lord Luke, Sir Harold Wernher and Sir Ernest Pooley. At this meeting I should also like specially to mention our indebtedness to Sir Edward Peacock as Chairman of the Finance Committee which looks after our investments; and to express the hope that Lord Donoughmore will soon have recovered from the indisposition which prevents him from being with us to-day.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock to present the Accounts.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1937.

SIR EDWARD PEACOCK, the Honorary Treasurer, in moving the adoption of the Accounts, said that the income of the King's Fund was slightly larger in 1937 than in either of the two previous years. He was hopeful that the total income of the present year would exceed that of last year. Already the Fund had received an anonymous donation of f6,000. The hospitals were increasingly recognising the need for combined action in dealing with many of their problems. The Fund must encourage this in every possible way, for it was essential that there should be closer co-operation between the voluntary hospitals and also between the voluntary hospitals and those of the London County Council. The Fund could and did place its experience and accumulated knowledge at their disposal, but additional funds would enable the Fund to be very much more helpful.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Dr. H. Morley Fletcher, was then put and carried unanimously. (See page 56 of Forty-first Annual Report.)

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1937.

The Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee (SIR HAROLD WERNHER) in the absence of the Earl of Donoughmore, moved the adoption of the Annual Report for 1937.

LORD EBBISHAM having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted. (See page 5 of Forty-first Annual Report.)

DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION, 1938.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY) presented a Report on the District Nursing Distribution in respect of 1937, and moved the recommendations. (See page 46.) The recommendations were seconded by Professor Winifred Cullis and carried.

REPORT OF REVENUE AND PROPAGANDA COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (LORD LUKE) presented a Report of the Committee on the income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moved that it be published.

WING-COMMANDER SIR LOUIS GREIG seconded the resolution which was unanimously carried. (See page 51 of Forty-first Annual Report.)

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS EMERGENCY BED SERVICE.

The Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee (SIR HAROLD WERNHER), in presenting a Report on the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service and moving the recommendations, said that in the first place he would like to mention that this scheme, which was to deal with emergency and acute cases only, was brought to the notice of the Voluntary Hospitals Committee by Mr. Gardham, who should have the credit for it. The Fund examined the scheme and thought it was one which they might well support; the cost would be in the neighbourhood of £3,000 a year. One hundred hospitals were already co-operating, and those not doing so were in most cases certain special hospitals to whom the scheme was not applicable. It would mean sending a letter to 8,000 doctors in the London area explaining how to use the Service. The Service would come into operation on June 21st, and would be open for 14 hours a day to begin with, whilst experience was being gained. The Service would be open 365 days a year. He anticipated about 100 enquiries a day from doctors, to deal with which about 500 telephone calls would have to be made in the course of a day's work. A staff of 12 had been engaged who were to have a preliminary training in various hospitals before they started work. Thanks to the good offices of Professor Dudgeon and Sir Frederick Menzies of the London County Council, it had been possible to arrange that an ambulance could be booked by the doctor through this Service if necessary. He would like to pay a tribute to the valuable co-operation which the hospitals had given and the spirit of helpfulness which they had shown.

In seconding the recommendations Viscount Dawson of Penn said he thought the plan worthy of support, not only on account of its individual excellence, but because it represented a step towards a larger co-operation of the hospitals of London.

SIR WILLIAM COLLINS also warmly supported the recommendations, which were carried unanimously. (See page 52.)

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY) presented a Report of the Committee on King's Fund Radium, and moved the recommendation.

The recommendation was seconded by Sir Charlton Briscoe, Bt., and carried. (See page 46 of Forty-first Annual Report.)

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

VISCOUNT HAILSHAM, in moving a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for presiding, said that since its inception the King's Fund owed a great deal to the invaluable interest which the Royal Family had taken in its welfare. The Duke of Kent was worthily following in the footsteps of his predecessors in the Chair.

SIR FREDERICK FRY, in seconding the motion, said he remembered the Presidencies of His Royal Highness's predecessors and he thought the Fund was greatly to be congratulated on the fact that His Royal Highness was obviously determined to live up to the traditions which they had established.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 13th, 1938.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace, on Tuesday, December 13th, 1938, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent being in the Chair.

THE DUKE'S SPEECH.

THE DUKE OF KENT, addressing the Council, said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen.—I have received a gracious message from His Majesty The King, which I propose to read. This is what The King says:—

"I observe with pleasure that the King's Fund continues to help the Hospitals by all the means in its power. In the present difficult times it is more than ever necessary that the King's Fund should not relax its efforts to assist the Hospitals, not only financially, but with the advice and guidance that it is so well fitted to supply.

"GEORGE, R.I.

"Buckingham Palace,
"13th December, 1938."

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then continued: -

We are here this morning primarily to set our seal upon the work of the Distribution Committee in allocating grants to hospitals. The distribution remains at the same figure—some £300,000—as in recent years. The needs of the hospitals are greater than ever, and we should have liked to increase the distribution; but, as Sir Edward Peacock will explain, the Management Committee feel that the time has not yet come when they can prudently recommend an increase. We have, however, given the Distribution Committee power to make certain additional emergency grants if found necessary. The Distribution Committee have done their best to make the amount at their disposal go as far as possible, and while taking all the circumstances into account to give most generously where help is most needed. Their work is, as we all know, by no means confined to the allocation of the grants, and I should like on behalf of the Council to thank them once again through their Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry—whose absence to-day through illness we all regret—for giving so generously of their time and energy. Especially I should like to thank Mr. Hugh Lett and Mr. David Eccles for the very exacting and most valuable work which they as a Sub-committee have undertaken in connection with investigating financial difficulties of individual hospitals.

Emergency Crisis Distribution.

Whilst I am speaking of the distribution, I ought to tell you that during the crisis in September the Management Committee authorised a payment on account of the larger grants amounting in all to £90,500. This payment was made without prejudice to consideration by the Distribution Committee of the total amount of the grant to each hospital as recommended to-day. We felt that in this way we could best help hospitals. As you all know, the voluntary hospitals were called upon by the Government to prepare themselves in varying degrees to receive casualties if the need had arisen. The hospitals feel that they have a claim on the Government for actual expenditure incurred on its behalf, but I hope the public will not forget that much interruption was caused to their routine activities, and that this has caused diminution of revenue.

The loss comes at a time when costs are still rising through no mismanagement on the part of hospitals. We do not yet know exactly how much costs have increased this year but we do know that the rise has been considerable, and that new sources of revenue will have to be found if the work

of the voluntary hospitals is not to be curtailed. It is unthinkable that this should happen. There never was a time when the country was so conscious as it is to-day of the need for the spirit of voluntary service which is the pride of our voluntary hospitals. It is their tradition, and their function in public life, to maintain a spirit and an atmosphere in which kindliness is blended with all that is most modern and scientific. All through the gradual, and as yet incomplete, development of the organisation of the public health services of which they are the very core, the voluntary hospitals have maintained that spirit.

Emergency Bed Service.

The past few months have seen the establishment of the Emergency Bed Service in the offices of the King's Fund in Old Jewry. It was set up, as you will remember, as a result of an approach to the Fund by the Voluntary Hospitals Committee, and is controlled by a Joint Committee of the two bodies under the Chairmanship of Sir Harold Wernher. It is being used increasingly by the doctors of London to obtain admission of urgent cases to hospital with the minimum of delay, and it is no longer necessary for a doctor to spend his time telephoning to several hospitals in succession only to be told that there is no bed available. Since October the Service has been extended to cover the whole of the 24 hours. It has, of course, only been running for a few months, but I think I need have no hesitation in saying that it has already fully justified its existence. I have myself seen it in operation and would like to invite any member of the Council who has not already done so to spend a few minutes in the office and satisfy himself of its obvious efficiency. The whole of the cost is being borne by the Fund but we are satisfied that the comparatively small expenditure is paying a high dividend in terms of service to the hospitals, the doctors and the patients alike.

The Fund had become aware, through the Emergency Bed Service, of the acute necessity for a number of "iron lungs" to be available on loan at some central spot for hospitals generally. In order to meet this necessity a friend of the hospitals, Sir Edward Meyerstein, stepped forward and presented us with three respirators of the type which has subsequently been taken up so generously by Lord Nuffield for mass production. Sir Edward's offer was made some time before Lord Nuffield's intentions were known, and as the apparatus have now been delivered to hospitals they will meet a long-felt want until those offered by Lord Nuffield are available.

Provident Scheme for the Middle Classes.

The King's Fund has decided, too, that more should be done to provide the middle classes above the income limits of the Hospital Saving Association with a simple system of insurance against hospital expenses and the medical and surgical fees involved. We were approached upon this matter by the Voluntary Hospitals Committee who had been giving prolonged consideration to the various questions arising. After conferring with Lord Lloyd, the Chairman of the British Provident Association, we decided to appoint a small Committee which could proceed to work out a scheme on the lines suggested, and we were fortunate in securing the consent of Mr. Bernard Docker to act as Chairman of the Committee. We have also received valuable assistance from the British Medical Association. The Committee has made good progress with its work, and we hope within the next few months to be in a position to put forward a scheme. The new venture will necessarily be something of an experiment, but we feel confident that it will meet a real need.

A wider Hospital Service.

In the past the voluntary hospitals have thought and acted as independent units. We are beginning nowadays to think in wider terms of the hospital service of London. We in London are proud not only of the voluntary hospitals, but of the hospital service of the County Councils with which we work side by side. We are conscious of the great advances made in recent years, and I am sure that I speak for the voluntary hospitals when I say that we look forward to greater collaboration in the future.

Parliamentary Work.

Our Parliamentary Committee is actively co-operating with the British Hospitals Association in the promotion of a Bill to exempt voluntary hospitals from the incidence of rates: a reform which I am told is felt by hospitals all over the country to be long overdue. The Bill is down for a Second Reading in February. The Parliamentary Committee has also been greatly interested in the Bill to regulate house to house collections, and evidence was given before a Joint Committee of both Houses of Parliament by Lord Luke on our behalf. This Bill is being reintroduced into the House of Commons under the new title of "Charitable Collections (Regulation) Bill."

In all these questions it is a great advantage that the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee can in many ways speak and act for the voluntary hospitals of London as a whole.

These things to which I have referred by no means exhaust our present activities, but I have chosen them because I feel that they are significant developments.

I should just like to add how glad we all are to see Mr. Maynard back among us to-day after his serious illness.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

SIR EDWARD PEACOCK (the Honorary Treasurer) said that the total distribution this year, including District Nursing and Emergency Bed Service, was £305,000, and on the present estimates there would be a surplus of about £2,500 after meeting the whole of the proposed distribution out of the year's income. In each of the previous three years there had been a deficiency of several thousand pounds. The better results were due to a substantial increase in legacies; subscriptions had remained steady; donations had increased by £4,000, mainly because of the generous gift of £6,000 from an anonymous friend who in the course of the last 15 years had given £94,500. Legacies had already reached £104,000, including £56,000 from the Estate of the late Mr. J. R. Barber. This was much above the average, which had remained pretty constant between £60,000 and £70,000 per year.

The needs of the hospitals were greater than ever, and the Fund would have liked to raise the amount distributed, but an increase could not prudently be recommended. As he had already stated, this was the first time in four years that the distribution had been covered out of the income for the year.

In that connection he would like to mention that two quite large sums arising from legacies were in prospect. In one case £100,000 had already been received which was held in suspense, and in both cases the sum seemed likely to be substantial. In these difficult times one's first instinct would be to distribute as much of this as possible, but the building up of capital funds was the surest way of maintaining the level which had been held for some years, and indeed unless this could be done there would be a prospective deficit of some £30,000 per year.

Taking the voluntary hospitals of the London area, it was amazing that contributions continued to go up, despite the difficult times, but the demands of science and expenses arising from social betterment moved faster still, so that hospitals had a constant struggle to keep their equipment up to the standards demanded by medical science and to provide for the comfort and welfare of their staff and patients on a modern basis. The Fund did what it could to help, but he felt strongly that some more comprehensive solution was called for soon if ground was not to be lost. The solution lay in more effective co-operation between the voluntary hospitals and those of the public authority. The possibilities of this were being explored, and if they were not obscured by political or personal considerations he believed that there could be an early and happy result.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

SIR FREDERICK FRY, in the absence of SIR COOPER PERRY, presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals and Convalescent Homes, and moved the recommendation that the lists of grants and remarks be approved. (See pages 30 to 32.)

SIR ERNEST POOLEY (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards to Hospitals. (See pages 33 to 42.)

LORD LUKE (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards to Convalescent Homes. (See pages 43 to 45.)

The recommendations were seconded by Mr. H. L. EASON and carried unanimously.

EMERGENCY BED SERVICE REPORT.

The Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service Joint Committee (SIR HAROLD WERNHER), in presenting an Interim Report on the working of the Service and moving the recommendation that it be published, said that the Service had received 2,800 calls since its inception, and mentioned several instances in which the Service had been instrumental in saving the life of the patient. He also referred to the active co-operation which the Service had received from the hospitals.

The recommendation was seconded by the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Dr. Robert Hutchison) and carried unanimously. (See page 53.)

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1939.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by Sir Godfrey Thomas, Bt., resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1939.

VOTE OF THANKS.

VISCOUNT DAWSON OF PENN, in moving a Vote of Thanks to the Duke of Kent for presiding, said that His Royal Highness had given a clear account of the yearly doings and accomplishments of the King's Fund, which were greater every year in their importance, and it was a gratification to all present to learn that the powers for maintaining that useful work remained unabated. His Royal Highness had not confined his attentions to the accomplishments, great as they were, of the present, but he had taken stock of the altered and altering conditions of our daily life, and he had envisaged the public advantage of bringing into closer co-operation the voluntary and municipal hospitals in the hope that one day they might be brought into a closer working unit.

No one thought little of the voluntary hospitals and especially those with teaching schools. It was true to say that for generations past those hospitals had gathered around them the teachers and workers in the science and art of medicine, and as such they had become models of scientific work and service and had become a precious possession of the British people. Though the medical schools no doubt were in law separate from those hospitals, they all knew that they could be separated neither in fact nor in wise comprehension.

Now that the care of illness and health was becoming increasingly institutional these great monuments of benevolence were no longer adequate to cover the ground. The hospitals were part of the social fabric; they required to be wisely distributed according to the needs of the area, and isolated institutions, however distinguished, could not alone carry on the work. There needed to be an ordered plan to bring them together so that they might serve in a large sense the needs of their districts. The voluntary and municipal hospitals, though both of them were necessary for the needs of modern life, both needed to maintain their individual life to develop along their own lines with complete freedom, but with an ever increasing co-operation so that they might produce between them a united and ordered policy.

MAJOR THE HON. J. J. ASTOR, M.P., in seconding the motion expressed appreciation of the unfailing interest which His Royal Highness always took in the affairs of the Fund.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

At the formal meeting of the General Council on January 10th, 1939, the following message from His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, President of the Fund, was read:—

"My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

"I have signed the Order appointing the Members of the General Council, Members of Committees, and Honorary Officers of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for the year 1939.

"Since the Meeting of the Council in December, we have suffered a very severe loss through the death of Sir Cooper Perry. He had held the important and responsible post of Chairman of the Distribution Committee during the past 18 years, and this carried with it a seat on the Management Committee. But he had been a member of the King's Fund in various capacities ever since 1898, the year after it was founded. For 40 years, therefore, the Fund had the benefit of his exceptional ability, wisdom and experience of all sides of hospital work, and he will be very greatly missed.

"I have appointed Sir Ernest Pooley as the new Chairman of the Distribution Committee.

"GEORGE,

The following resolution was passed:-

"The General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to express their deep regret at the death of Sir Cooper Perry, Chairman of the Distribution Committee, and their sense of the great loss which the King's Fund has suffered thereby. Sir Cooper had been connected with the Fund since 1898, when he first acted as a Hospital Visitor. He had been a member of the Distribution Committee since 1904 and Chairman since 1921; of the General Council since 1910; of the King's Fund Policy Committee in 1921; of the Management Committee since 1922; and of the Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee since 1929. He also served as a member of the Conference which drew up the main lines of the scheme of Pensions for Nurses and Hospital Officers, and as Chairman of the Joint Committee for Preliminary Consultations with the London County Council which set up the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee under the Local Government Act of 1929. In all these capacities he gave unreservedly to the King's Fund the benefit of the experience acquired during his long period of actual hospital work, both medical and administrative, and during his active association with movements for the promotion of medical education, of the welfare of the nursing profession, and of other kindred objects. The outstanding thoroughness and ability which he showed in everything he undertook was of the utmost value to the King's Fund, and his loss will be severely felt by all his colleagues.

"The Council desire also to extend to members of the family their heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement."

- 2. The grants are made by the Distribution Committee after taking into account all the circumstances known to them on the basis of the last audited accounts of the hospitals, viz., the accounts for the year 1937. In certain cases, however, the Distribution Committee have also had before them the figures showing the approximate financial position of the hospitals as at September 30, 1938. The circumstances of the hospitals vary from year to year, and it should not be assumed that a reduction in a grant as compared with the previous year implies dissatisfaction.
- 3. The following grants made in previous years in aid of schemes have not been applied for and come up for consideration:

Albany Deptford Babies' Hospital, £50 to open-air shelter,

Belgrave Hospital for Children, £500 to out-patient department and nurses' accommodation,

Bexley Cottage Hospital, £250 to new ward and X-ray,

Connaught Hospital, £1,100 (£600 ordinary and £500 Silver Jubilee) to domestic accommodation and provision of waiting room,

Jewish Maternity Hospital, £1,000 (£250 ordinary and £750 Silver Jubilee) to site of new hospital,

Metropolitan Hospital, £3,750 (£1,250 ordinary and £2,500 Silver Jubilee) to pay beds and rebuilding of theatre and casualty department,

Royal Eye Hospital, £3,000 (£500 ordinary and £2,500 Silver Jubilee) to stage I of rebuilding and extension,

Royal National Orthopædic Hospital, £1,000 to pay block at Stanmore,

Royal Northern Hospital, £1,250 (Silver Jubilee) to provision of new boilers,

St. George's Hospital, £3,750 (£750 ordinary and £3,000 Silver Jubilee) to reconstruction,

Tavistock Clinic (Institute of Medical Psychology), £400 to new hostel,

Wembley Hospital, £600 (balance) to nurses' home and mortuary,

Western Ophthalmic Hospital, £200 to completion of hospital,

Willesden General Hospital, £2,500 (£500 ordinary and £2,000 Silver Jubilee) to extension,

REPORT ON DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION, 1938.

For Work done by District Nursing Associations for Hospital Out-patients in 1937.

- 1. The General Council have again allocated £2,000 for distribution towards the cost of the work done by District Nursing Associations for patients referred by Hospitals to the Associations for attendance at home instead of at out-patient departments.
- 2. The distribution takes the form of grants to Hospitals to enable each Hospital to contribute towards the cost of the work done by District Nursing Associations for patients referred by the Hospital to the Associations for attendance at home instead of at the out-patient department. To simplify the procedure, however, the payments are made direct by the King's Fund to the Associations as from the Hospitals.
- 3. The number of Hospitals to which grants have been made for this purpose in respect of 1937 is 85. The number of District Nursing Associations to which payments have been made is III.
- 4. The amounts paid in respect of the patients of individual Hospitals have ranged from £399 7s. 3d. down to less than £1. The number of patients referred in 1937 was 16,910. The payments were made to the Associations on March 10th, 1938.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1938.

- 1. The Revenue Committee beg to present the following Report on the Income and Expenditure of the King's Fund and the Hospitals, and the work of the Propaganda Committee for the year 1938.
- 2. The total income of the King's Fund for 1938 available for distribution amounted to £328,900*—including general legacies amounting to £104,732. After providing for the ordinary distribution of £300,000, the District Nursing Distribution of £2,000, the allocation for expenses of the Emergency Bed Service of £2,036, and the expenses of the Fund of £16,228, including salaries, pensions, rent, law costs, stationery, printing, etc., as well as statistical and other ordinary services for Hospitals, a sum of £8,636 was carried to general reserve.
- 3. A preliminary estimate of the finance of the London Hospitals in 1938 has been made. This gives the approximate income as £4,685,000, and expenditure as £4,833,000, showing a net aggregate deficit estimated at £148,000. This is the second aggregate deficit since 1926, and the third since 1921.
 - 4.—The number of Hospitals with surpluses and deficits was as follows:—

5. The ordinary income of the Hospitals shows an increase of about £110,000, and legacies an increase of £14,000, making an increase in total income of about £124,000. There was a rise in expenditure estimated at £280,000. The rise in income was thus £156,000 less than the rise in expenditure, resulting in a deficit of £148,000 against a surplus of £8,000 in 1937. Legacies totalled about £589,000, the highest figure recorded since the figures were separately tabulated in 1921. It is perhaps noteworthy that in four of the last six years legacies have totalled over £500,000, and that the average annual receipts from this source since 1930 have been £140,000 more than the average for the ten years 1921–1930.

6. The Committee noted that in 1937 there was an increase in the four years since 1933 of £477,000 in ordinary income. The receipts from voluntary gifts increased by £78,000, and from invested funds by £42,000. The receipts from services rose in the four years by £357,000. The Hospital Saving Association was an important factor in this increase. "Receipts from Services" in 1937 included the sum of £500,000 from this Association. It should be realised that, while the Association makes its distribution on the basis of services rendered to contributors and their families, the money is derived from voluntary contributions collected by voluntary workers.

- 8. A letter was circulated on April 4th to all the Hospitals in the King's Fund area, inviting suggestions for means whereby the King's Fund could assist in permanently increasing Hospital income to meet increased expenditure—proposals already under consideration being payment for workmen's compensation cases, better terms in respect of patients who were members of Approved Societies, and grants for training, other than medical education, e.g., the training of nurses, masseuses, etc. The replies to the circular were carefully considered, and many of the suggestions have been receiving the attention of the different committees within whose sphere they fall. Some of the replies to the circular indicated methods by which individual Hospitals could increase their own income, and these also have received attention.
- 9. It is the object of the Propaganda Committee to keep before the public the work and the needs of the Voluntary Hospitals of London, and the part which the King's Fund plays in helping them. The Revenue Committee has much pleasure in submitting the following report of their activities during 1938.

Work of the Propaganda Committee in 1938.

i. The Propaganda Committee have again been active in their efforts to make the work of the King's Fund known and appreciated They have continued to stress the claims of the London Voluntary Hospitals on all who benefit from their work, and the need for adequate support.

- ii. We have appointed three new sub-committees, with power to co-opt. These will deal respectively with "Special Functions," "Literature and Publications," and "Privileged Visits." On each of these members of the Committee with special knowledge and experience have consented to serve.
- iii. The demand for the film, "The War Without End," continues to increase. Direct bookings, mainly by schools and public health authorities, amounted to 44, and many appreciative comments have been received. In several instances, we were able to arrange for an expert speaker to accompany the film and to answer questions afterwards. Copies are also being circulated by the Empire Film Library, the British Film Institute, the London County Council, the National Association of Co-operative Education Committees, as well as by the National Bureau of Educational and Social Research of South Africa, the National Film Society of Canada, etc. In addition, two copies have been purchased by the Hospital Saving Association. A special 15-minute version was prepared for the use of Odeon Theatres, Ltd., and was shown at a number of their theatres in and around London during the year, and was well received.
- iv. The Miniature Hospital was exhibited in the Health Section of the United Kingdom Pavilion at the Glasgow Exhibition. The model occupied a conspicuous position and attracted large crowds. It was specially noticed by the King and Queen on the opening day, Her Majesty inquiring about the miniature bedspreads which she had graciously presented to the King's Fund, when Duchess of York, to be used in one of the wards. The following is an extract from the March number of *The Times* "Trade and Engineering Supplement": "Probably the exhibit that will make the most potent appeal to the ordinary individual in this section will be the model of a modern hospital, complete in every detail . . . originally constructed for King Edward's Hospital Fund for London . . . It will undoubtedly prove a source, not only of delight, but of instruction to both adults and children."
- v. Further visits to places of historic interest in London were arranged during the summer months, and we desire especially to thank those shipping companies who were good enough to place our programmes on board their incoming ships at various ports of call. No less than 10,000 copies were distributed in this way for the benefit of visitors from overseas. Our thanks are also due to Sir George Hume for arranging a second tour of the Houses of Parliament specially for young people during the Christmas holidays.
- vi. An interesting series of talks on "Problems of the Nations" was arranged. These were given in October and November by well-known speakers with special knowledge of their respective subjects, in Halls of the City Livery Companies. We have to record our indebtedness to the Master and Wardens of the Drapers', Goldsmiths', Vintners',

and Clothworkers' Companies for placing their Halls at our disposal for the series, for their hospitality, and for the opportunity also given to the visitors of seeing over the premises and inspecting the interesting collections of historical relics that were on view.

vii. The Educational Sub-Committee continued to organise lectures to schools and other appropriate audiences on the work of the voluntary hospitals. H.R.H. the Duke of Kent, as President of the Fund, was good enough to sign letters to some of the principal public schools emphasising the importance of informing the rising generation of the role the voluntary hospitals have played in our national life. Several eminent members of the medical profession generously undertook to give lectures. Applications were received from Eton, Charterhouse, Marlborough, Shrewsbury, and other famous public schools, and lectures arranged accordingly. The following is an extract from a letter from a headmaster expressing his appreciation:—

"I should like . . . to report what you must have known would be the case, that he (the speaker) gave an extraordinarily interesting lecture. I hope this is not the last lecture under the King Edward's Hospital Fund scheme that we may have."

viii. Through the kindness of Lady Luke, two drawing-room meetings were held at 29 Portman Square, in aid of the Fund. At the first, Sir Chartres Biron gave an amusing talk on "Criminals I have known"; and at the second the attraction was a lively discussion between Miss Thelma Cazalet, M.P., and Miss Megan Lloyd George, M.P., on "What we think of the House of Commons." On both occasions there was a large attendance. A collection was taken, King's Fund literature was distributed, and Lord Luke spoke from the Chair on the aims and activities of the Fund and its claims on all who value the work of the voluntary hospitals without having any special preference.

ix. The King's Fund pamphlet, "The Hospitals in the Last Five Years," was revised and brought up to date. The annual calendar designed for the use of solicitors was again issued, but in an amended form, to about 7,000 solicitors in Greater London. We also prepared, for the use of speakers and others interested in voluntary hospital problems, a new pamphlet, "The Voluntary Hospitals and the Future," stressing the importance of retaining the voluntary hospitals as an integral part of the hospital service of the nation, and the desirability of securing close and effective co-operation between them and the municipal hospitals.

x. The papers read by M. André Maurois at the French Embassy in December, 1937, were subsequently published in book form by Messrs. Chatto & Windus. At our request,

the publishers made special mention of the fact that the papers were first read at the French Embassy in aid of King Edward's Hospital Fund.

- xi. We have to record with deep regret the deaths of :-
- (a) Capt. W. B. Maxwell, who had been a member of the Committee for twelve years, and was Chairman of the Lectures and Counter-Lectures Sub-Committee in 1929;
- (b) Mrs. Rome, who joined the Educational Sub-Committee nearly fifteen years ago, as Miss Sheriff-MacGregor, and who had also lectured, from time to time, to school audiences on the Committee's behalf. Mrs. Rome had only recently been elected President of the College of Nursing.
- xii. The Gramophone Company kindly continue to distribute to the hospitals the records supplied by the B.B.C. under the arrangement arrived at with the King's Fund in 1933. Each hospital receives with the records a letter from the B.B.C. pointing out that "These records are distributed to hospitals by the courtesy of the manufacturers, and it is a condition that they shall not be sold at any time." Letters of appreciation are being received from the hospitals and forwarded by the B.B.C. for the information of the Committee. For this valuable service our thanks are due to both the B.B.C. and the Gramophone Company.
- xiii. We are conscious that whatever success we have been able to attain in connection with our various schemes is due to the ready response we have received from the Press and from others who have been kind enough to give us their co-operation.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS EMERGENCY BED SERVICE.

I.—REPORT BY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE TO GENERAL COUNCIL,

MAY, 1938.

- I. In the autumn of 1937 the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London laid before the Management Committee proposals for the provision in London of a central office which would facilitate the admission to Hospitals of urgent cases. It was widely recognised that a great deal of delay and inconvenience is caused by the fact that a doctor has often to ring up several Hospitals in succession before he can succeed in finding a bed, and that this confusion might be eliminated by the provision of a central office in possession of returns from Hospitals indicating the beds available for the admission of such cases.
- 2. The Voluntary Hospitals Committee had been impressed by the importance of working out a practicable solution of the difficulty, and had recognised that in many Hospitals, owing to the system of admission, substantial internal reorganisation would be required if a scheme were to succeed. The Committee had therefore given prolonged consideration to the preparation of a scheme originally put forward by University College Hospital. The scheme had been submitted to all the Hospitals within the County of London likely to be affected. The replies showed that the Committee could count upon the active support of the great majority of the Hospitals.
- 3. The Voluntary Hospitals Committee were, however, faced with the difficulty of financing the projected central office, and asked whether the Fund could see its way to give substantial financial assistance.
- 4. The Management Committee were impressed by the importance of ensuring that a scheme which might have the effect of materially improving the services given by the Voluntary Hospitals as a whole should not be jeopardised for lack of the comparatively small

annual sum needed in order to give the experiment a trial, and felt themselves justified in offering a grant towards the expenses up to £3,000 per annum for three years, and in making available supervisory staff and office facilities. Their offer was warmly welcomed by the Voluntary Hospitals Committee, and the establishment of the Service was entrusted to a Joint Committee, consisting of representatives of the Voluntary Hospitals Committee (Mr. O. N. Chadwyck-Healey, Dr. A. M. H. Gray, Professor Leonard S. Dudgeon and Dr. Geoffrey Evans) and the Honorary Secretaries of the Fund (Lord Luke, Sir Harold Wernher and Sir Ernest Pooley).

- 5. The Joint Committee first met on March 18th, and Sir Harold Wernher was appointed Chairman. It was resolved that the Service should be known as the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service, and a circular was issued to all Hospitals within the King's Fund area, but outside the County of London, inviting them to participate.
- 6. Arrangements are now well in hand, and a large number of Hospitals have been visited in order to ensure that the arrangements at the Hospitals themselves are such as to secure effective co-operation. Members of the Staff have visited Stockholm where a similar Service, but on a much smaller scale, has been successfully in operation for some years.

II.—REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE SERVICE TO DECEMBER, 1938.

I. At the Council Meeting on May 27th, 1938, it was resolved that the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service should be established to facilitate the admission of acute and emergency cases to Voluntary Hospitals. The King's Fund undertook to provide the necessary finance and supervisory staff. The Joint Committee of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee responsible for the Service consists of Sir Harold Wernher (Chairman), Lord Luke, Sir Ernest Pooley, Mr. O. N. Chadwyck-Healey, Dr. A. M. H. Gray, Dr. Geoffrey Evans and Mr. A. J. Gardham.

- 2. A staff of twelve operators was appointed and given a preliminary training with the help of the Hospitals. The Service was opened on June 21st. Initially the Service was open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. only whilst the Staff gained experience and confidence in their duties. A full 24-hour service was brought into operation on October 8th.
- 3. On June 30th His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent visited the Service and inspected the system on which it is worked. Visits have also been received from a number of other distinguished visitors.
- 4. The Service was given a warm welcome in the press, both lay and medical, and the inauguration of the 24-hour service was the occasion of a special broadcast. The assistance which the Service has thus received has been most welcome and has materially helped towards its success.
- 5. The Service telephones every Hospital once or twice a day according to a special schedule and receives a report of the number of beds vacant. This report is sub-divided into some 40 categories according to the sex and medical category attaching to each bed.
- 6. The number of cases presented by doctors has grown steadily and is still growing week by week. The total number of cases dealt with to date is over 2,800. On no occasion has the Service been unable to find a bed for a genuine emergency, and only in exceptionally difficult cases has it taken more than ten minutes to arrange admission. During this time the necessary data have to be given by the doctor, and he has to decide to which Hospital where there is a bed available he would like to send his patient. The Hospital has to be telephoned and the bed booked, often an ambulance called, and finally the doctor is telephoned to confirm that all is in order.
- 7. It is estimated that some 25,000 telephone calls in all have been made, the majority of which are concerned with keeping the record of beds up-to-date.
- 8. Over 1,200 doctors have used the Service already and this number grows daily. Many doctors have written either to the Service or the medical papers expressing their appreciation, and in some cases stating that the life of the patient has been saved by the rapidity of the admission to Hospital.

- 9. The Service has been asked to arrange ambulances for about one-third of the cases it has handled. The procedure has worked smoothly and gratitude is due to the London Ambulance Service of the London County Council and the Home Ambulance Service of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem and the British Red Cross Society for their co-operation.
- 10. During the crisis in September provisional arrangements were made for moving the Service to safer quarters in the basement of a large house in the Suburbs, but the move did not actually take place. Since then negotiations have been in progress to arrange for these premises always to be available for the Service should evacuation ever become necessary.



TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January, 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1).

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His late Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1910 to 1936.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

His Majesty King Edward VIII was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1919 to 1936.

His present Majesty King George VI was President, as Duke of York, from May 15, 1936, to December 10, 1936, and is now Patron.

On December 31, 1936, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent was appointed President of the Fund.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :—

- (a) Hospitals situated within II miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

Special grants are made to hospitals to assist them to contribute towards the cost of District Nursing work in relief of their out-patient departments. But the Fund does not make grants direct to District Nursing Associations.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on page 92).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 4).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the forty-two years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £9,386,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922–3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1938 being £300,000, besides a distribution of £2,000 for work done by District Nursing Associations for Hospital Out-patients in 1937, and £2,035 expended on the Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £581,500 to the Fund during the last forty years, the contribution in 1938 being £7,500.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the

various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

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The regulation prescribing the observance of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts facilitates comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary," which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these annual reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications on page 92.)

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals. (See list of publications on pages 92 to 94.)

By means of a standing Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee the Fund assists to secure the interests of the voluntary hospitals during the consideration by Parliament of any bills affecting the hospital system.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1938, being 2,318 at 111 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit in 1929–30, £50,000 from another generous donor, and £37,000 received in 1929 through the Thank-offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Under the title of Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service a central office for the admission to Hospitals of urgent cases has been established jointly by the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London.

A central bureau for the Recruitment of Nurses is being set up in co-operation with the Voluntary Hospitals Committee and the College of Nursing. (See paragraphs 27 and 28 on page 13.)
