

REPORT OF GENERAL COUNCIL FOR 1920.

SPECIAL FEATURES OF THE YEAR.

1. The year 1920, the first complete year of the presidency of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, was in more than one respect the most remarkable year in the history of the Fund.

The distribution of £250,000 on July 23 on behalf of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, in aid of schemes of extension and improvement at London hospitals able and willing to treat ex-Service men, in itself largely increased the normal work of the Fund. In addition to this, an emergency distribution of £250,000 had to be made on July 5 out of invested funds to help the hospitals over their immediate financial difficulties. If the Red Cross distribution be added to the emergency distribution and the ordinary distribution of £200,000 on December 14, the total amount allocated in grants during the year thus came to £700,000.

A further development of the activities of the Fund took place at the Council meeting in December, when it was decided to draw up a statement on the subject of the policy to be recommended to His Majesty's Government for the preservation of the voluntary system of Hospital management and control: a subject rendered more and more urgent as the year went on by the increasing difficulties of the hospitals, which led in the end to the appointment by the Government of the Special Committee of Inquiry presided over by Lord Cave.

- 2. During the absence of the Prince of Wales in Australia from March to October, the powers of President were exercised by the Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England (Sir Brien Cokayne, now Lord Cullen, succeeded by Mr. M. C. Norman), who were appointed by His Royal Highness a Special Committee for this purpose. The Council are greatly indebted to this Committee for their services.
- 3. There were four meetings of the General Council at St. James's Palace instead of the usual two-viz., the Annual Meeting on April 30; a special meeting on June 22, when

it was decided to make the emergency distribution; another special meeting on July 23 to make the awards out of surplus Red Cross funds, and the ordinary distribution meeting in December over which His Royal Highness the President presided. Another special meeting was called in December to consider the question of general policy, but was not actually held until after the end of the year.*

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

4. The total receipts for the year were £480,431 6s. 5d., of which £255,364 19s. 9d. was the sum received from the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John of Jerusalem and the accrued interest on the grants not yet paid; £9,228 16s. 2d. was from contributions to capital; and £215,837 10s. 6d. general receipts.

^{*} The meeting was held on January 26, 1921, and a statement on the whole question of hospital finances and the policy to be recommended for the preservation of the voluntary system was published on January 28. Approximate figures obtained from 113 London Hospitals showed that their income from normal sources (i.e., omitting the King's Fund emergency grants and the grants from the National Relief Fund) had increased from £2,117,000 in 1919 to £2,447,000 in 1920, while their expenditure had increased from £2,348,000 to £2,841,000; the net aggregate deficit in 1919 being thus £231,000, and in 1920 £394,000, or about 14 per cent. of the expenditure. The bank loans on December 31, 1920, were about £544,000. On January 19, 1921, His Royal Highness the President appointed a Special Committee, consisting of Lord Stuart of Wortley (Chairman), Sir Cooper Perry, Viscount Burnham, Lord Somerleyton, Sir Frederick Fry, and Sir Alan Anderson, to work out the details of the policy adopted by the Council.

EMERGENCY DISTRIBUTION AND HOSPITAL FINANCES.

- 7. The £250,000 required for the emergency distribution was taken from reserve funds held in cash or short-dated securities, as also was a further £6,935 7s. 10d. required to maintain the ordinary distribution at £200,000. The effect of this was to reduce the reserves by about one-fourth, and the income from invested funds by about £16,000. The Council made this sacrifice in the hope that, with the assistance of others interested, time might by this means be secured for the reorganisation of hospital finances. But they consider that any repetition of such a drain on the invested funds and on permanent income would be disastrous to the Fund and to the hospitals.
- 8. In the letters accompanying the emergency grants on July 5 the Distribution Committee urged on the hospitals the need for considering methods of improving their finances, including that of payments by patients, a method which has been widely adopted by the hospitals, both before and after that date, and has brought in a considerable addition to their income during 1920.

Information as to the financial effect of the emergency grants, and as to the action taken in these matters, was obtained by the Distribution Committee from each hospital before the ordinary distribution in December.

- 9. Apart from this emergency distribution, the problem of hospital finance was continuously before the Executive Committee of the Fund throughout the year. As soon as the accounts of the hospitals were complete a statement was published giving the actual position at the end of 1919. The Honorary Secretaries also had interviews with representatives of the British Hospitals Association, the Ministry of Health, and the National Relief Fund, with a view to devising a method of meeting the immediate difficulties, and they joined the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, the League of Mercy, and the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds in considering proposals for increasing the permanent income of the hospitals. After the King's Fund had made the emergency distribution, discussions were resumed in the autumn with the hospitals and the British Hospitals Association; and by the end of the year the preparation of evidence for Lord Cave's Committee had been begun by direction of the General Council.
- 10. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the National Relief Fund in making a distribution to hospitals in reduction of war deficits, and allocating £200,000 of this to London hospitals. These grants, made in December 1920, have, like the King's Fund emergency distribution in the previous July, materially helped the hospitals to tide over their immediate difficulties, pending the development of fresh sources of income.

RED CROSS DISTRIBUTION.

11. A full account of the special distribution of Surplus Red Cross Funds on July 23 will be found on pages 27 to 30. The distribution was confined to schemes of extension and improvement at hospitals that could and would treat ex-Service men. Grants were made to 49 hospitals in respect of 54 schemes, the examination of which involved special visits to 40 hospitals.

12. The Report of the Distribution Committee on this special distribution also contains the result of their general survey of all schemes of extension. Out of 3,445 additional beds more or less definitely contemplated, the Fund had by July, 1920, passed 1,489, subject to the hospital committees being satisfied as to the prospect of raising funds for building and maintenance. For the purpose, however, of considering applications for grants, the Distribution Committee gave priority to little more than half the total number passed.

ORDINARY DISTRIBUTION.

- 13. Out of the ordinary distribution of £200,000 by the King's Fund, £190,000 was given to London hospitals, and £10,000 to consumption sanatoria and convalescent homes taking London patients, as against £218,000 and £12,000 respectively in 1919.
- 14. Every eligible hospital and consumption sanatorium which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon as hitherto by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay.
- 15. The £190,000 granted by the Fund to London hospitals was applied as to £153,700 in aid of general maintenance and to the reduction of debts on maintenance account, and £36,300 towards improvements schemes already undertaken or in reduction of liabilities on such schemes or in aid of schemes which are considered by the Fund to be urgent.
- 16. Of the £10,000 distributed by the Convalescent Homes Committee, £6,420 was allocated to consumption sanatoria, and £3,580 to convalescent homes. The grants to sanatoria enabled 44 beds to be reserved for the use of patients in London hospitals, as compared with 66 last year. The Convalescent Homes Committee held a conference of the hospitals to consider how to make the best use of this reduced accommodation, and there was a general agreement that the opportunities of immediate access to these beds were a great advantage to the hospitals.

TOTAL DISTRIBUTION.

17. Including the £250,000 out of Surplus Red Cross Funds in aid of extensions and improvement, and the £250,000 Emergency grants to maintenance, the total of £700,000 was thus allocated as follows:—

18. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years (after including the special distributions, and deducting conditional grants to the extent of £500 that have been allowed to lapse) is £2,301,500. Since the foundation of the Fund a total net amount of £3,588,416 8s. 5d. has been distributed. The average annual distribution during the whole period of 24 years has been £149,517 7s. od.

EXPENSES.

19. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund, including the Red Cross distribution, was £5,484 9s. 4d., or £1 2s. 1od. per £100 of the total received, as compared with £4,085 17s. 9d., or £2 os. 6d. per £100 in the previous year. The average yearly outlay in this respect for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £3,059, the corresponding percentage of the receipts being £1 5s. 3d., or less than $3\frac{1}{4}d$. in every £1 received.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 20. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have also been pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also have their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, Princess Mary, and many other Members of the Royal Family.
- 21. The sum of £250,000, which was entrusted to the Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, under the chairmanship of Sir Arthur Stanley, out of the surplus funds at their disposal, for distribution on their behalf, is the largest single contribution ever received by the Fund, except the gifts made to capital by Lord Mountstephen. The Council find it difficult to express adequately their appreciation of the action of the Joint Committee in devoting this large sum, through the Fund, to the extension and improvement of the accommodation at London hospitals.
- 22. The Fund again received annual subscriptions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £525 from Lloyds Bank, Limited, and of £500 from the Earl of Iveagh, from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; and donations of £5,710 from Miss E. M. Guggenheim, £825 18s. 3d. from "S.D.R.S.D.," £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Mr. C. W. Drabble, from the Goldsmiths' Company, and from Mr. and Mrs. S. Martineau, and £430 5s. 9d. from the Durban-Roodepoort Gold Mining Co., Ltd. (in liquidation), and a gift to capital of £3,400 Liverpool Corporation $3\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. Stock from Mr. H. H. Wills.
- 23. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £16,000, the same amount as in 1918. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £309,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council congratulate the League on the continued success of its efforts, which have brought such valuable assistance to the voluntary hospitals.
- 24. The Council also received with special pleasure the gift of £4,000 from King George's Fund for Sailors, being the amount of the grant made by the King's Fund in December to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital; and the sum of £10,338 10s. 8d.

entrusted to the King's Fund for distribution out of the total of £22,619 13s. 9d. collected by the London Schools Hospital Fund, organised under the auspices of the London County Council by the teachers in the London schools.

25. Legacies received during the year included £18,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue; £8,503 from the estate of the late Miss Maria Strachan; £3,754 from the estate of the late Brigade-Surgeon John Law, further account of residue; £3,500 from the estate of the late Mrs. Charlotte Anne Gifford on account of residue; and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Henry Reid Kinnear.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

- 26. In view of the temporary reductions made during the war in the scope of the Fund's annual Statistical Report on Hospital Expenditure, and having regard to various recent developments in hospital work, His Royal Highness the President has appointed a special Committee consisting of Sir Arthur Stanley (Chairman), Sir Cooper Perry, Mr. Griffiths, and Mr. Leonard Cohen, to consider what changes, if any, are desirable in the Report. The amount of work involved in the two special distributions and in the preparation of evidence for Lord Cave's Committee has delayed the progress of this inquiry; and it may well be that this postponement will enable some further developments of hospital work or hospital statistics to be taken into consideration.
- 27. The Council are greatly obliged to a Sub-Committee of the Executive Committee, consisting of Lord Stuart of Wortley (Chairman), Sir William Collins, and the late Sir Edward Hope, for drawing up a new series of standing orders for the procedure of meetings of the President and General Council.
- 28. In view of the allowance made for charitable contributions in respect of Excess Profits Duty, the Executive Committee decided to consider the desirability of applying for a similar concession in respect of income tax. A Sub-Committee has been appointed, consisting of Sir Walter Trower, Sir Basil Mayhew, Mr. Griffiths, and Mr. Hopkinson, to consider the question. Their inquiry, the result of which will now form part of the Fund's evidence for Lord Cave's Committee, had not been completed by the end of the year.

PERSONNEL.

29. The Fund suffered a severe loss by the sudden death of Lord Bessborough, the Chairman of the Executive Committee. The following resolution was passed at the meeting of the President and General Council on December 14:—

The President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of the Earl of Bessborough. He had done conspicuously able service to the Fund for many years as a member of the Council, Chairman of the Organising Committee of the Coronation Gift to His late Majesty King Edward, and member and Chairman of the Executive Committee, and the President and General Council greatly deplore his loss.

- 30. The Fund also regrets to record the death of Sir Henry Burdett, who had been conspicuously active in the service of the Fund in its foundation and during his life, and of two other members of the Council, Lord Murray of Elibank and Sir T. Vezey Strong; also of three visitors, Mr. Heathcote Long, Mr. Howard Morley, and Lord Glenconner.
- 31. By the retirement of Sir John Tweedy the Distribution Committee have been deprived of not only an able Chairman, but also one of their oldest and most capable members. The Council trust that he may long be able to retain his seat on the Council and to give the Fund the benefit of his knowledge and experience.
- 32. The Council desire to express their most grateful thanks to Mr. John G. Griffiths, who has resigned the position of Honorary Secretary after giving invaluable services to the Fund in this capacity for nine years. They are glad to know that his great ability and experience, and his unrivalled knowledge of hospital accounts and statistics, will continue to be at the service of the Council, the Executive Committee, and the Statistical Report Committee.
- 33. His Royal Highness the President has appointed Lord Stuart of Wortley Chairman of the Executive Committee, Sir Cooper Perry Chairman of the Distribution Committee, and Sir Alan Anderson an Honorary Secretary.
- 34. The Council regret the retirement of three of their members. The Marquis of Cambridge, to whom the Fund is greatly indebted for his services as one of the three Governors of the Fund during the minority of the Prince of Wales, resigned his seat on leaving London. The Rev. W. L. Watkinson and Mr. Will Crooks have been compelled to retire through ill-health.
- 35. The President of the Local Government Board, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., Chartered Accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the honorary auditors since January, 1898, during which period they have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

36. All who believe in the voluntary system must make a special effort to support the hospitals during the present crisis, and to ensure that voluntary contributions form at least a substantial part of their income in the future. The Fund has helped to meet the first need by the emergency distribution of £250,000. If liberally supported by the public it can help greatly with the second, especially in the case of hospitals which are most in need. The Council are greatly indebted to the Newspaper Press for the assistance they have rendered in the past, and continue to rely upon their kindly co-operation in obtaining for the Fund wider publicity and support.

Special (Emergency Distribution) Meeting of President and General Council.

JUNE 22nd, 1920.

A Special Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, June 22, 1920, at 12.15 P.M., THE EARL OF DONOUGHMORE, K.P. (Member of the President's Powers Committee), being in the Chair.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed.

THE RESOLUTION.

Lord Donoughmore said: My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,—I rise to move the resolution that has really brought us here to-day: "That an emergency distribution of £250,000 be made out of the available general funds to assist the London Hospitals, having regard to their pressing needs." I do not think I need address you at any great length. I ventured to remind you at the

last meeting of the Council that this Fund was originally established by His late Majesty King Edward VII. to deal with a Hospital crisis which was then very much in existence. Since our last meeting the Executive Officers of the Fund have been actively exploring the present position and considering the various alternatives, both independently and also in consultation with others concerned in the question of rendering help to those responsible for our voluntary hospitals. It soon became quite evident that it was a problem which must be divided into two different parts. There is the problem of the present debt of the Hospitals and there is the problem of their future maintenance. Both problems arise from the same cause. They arise partly from the difficulties which the Hospitals got into during the war, and partly from the loss they have suffered since the war in the subscribing power of their friends and the difficulties of those anxious and willing to help them by continuing or increasing their subscriptions. The problem of the organisation necessary to obtain fresh additions of income will take time. But the problem of the present debt will not wait: it has got to be dealt with, and, if it is not dealt with, the double burden that the Hospitals are under may prove to be too great to be borne. It is a problem that requires the co-operation of all the agencies concerned; and, as I said, our principal Executive Officers here have been taking part in general discussions, exploring the ground. They have received valuable information from the newly formed London Committee of the British Hospitals Association. The ideal, of course, is to secure the advantages of co-operation with those who are interested in the work, without, at the same time, losing the established connections and organisation of the existing institutions, and their individual initiative and originality. I need not say that we especially welcome the action of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of Saint John of Jerusalem, who are now applying the great organising power which they had developed before the war, and developed especially during the war, to the assistance of the Voluntary Hospitals. It must be remembered that the Voluntary Hospital problem is one for the whole country; it is not merely for London. We are concerned, like the Metropolitan Sunday Fund and the Saturday Fund, with the London Hospitals alone; but we naturally are very much indebted and grateful for the efforts that are made outside London by the Joint Committee and those who work with them. The concern of the King's Fund being, however, with the London Hospitals, we now propose this emergency distribution of a quarter of a million out of the available general funds to assist the London Hospitals in their pressing needs. On this, I should like to mention two things. Of course, the money will be taken from our Capital Funds, and its distribution will, for the moment, lose us a very substantial amount of income, which has hitherto been available for our annual distributions. That will be a serious thing, but it is a problem we have to face, and we are optimistic enough to believe that we shall be able to face it and make good what I hope really will only be a temporary loss. The actual distribution of course will be a matter for the Distribution Committee. They have got a new problem to deal with. Hitherto they have always proceeded, as you know, on the basis of the audited accounts of the previous year. This, not being an annual distribution, but a distribution at a date when we cannot fall in with our ordinary formulæ, will no doubt require special handling, but we are quite satisfied that our Distribution Committee will be able to provide it, their knowledge and experience now being unrivalled in dealing with these problems. Finally, I want to say this; this distribution is not going to be anything like a complete solution of the problem of the Hospitals. In fact we cannot, we are not expected to, finance the London Hospitals or even wipe out their existing debts off our own bat, so to speak; we can only

supplement, firstly, the efforts made by the Hospitals, secondly, the efforts made by kindred organisations, and thirdly, and much more, the future efforts of the public to support these institutions which are of untold value to the public. We hope that our example will be followed. We hope that the fact that the King Edward's Fund feels it necessary to make this very special effort will help to bring home to the public the fact that further special efforts are essential for the good of the country—not merely for the good of the Hospitals themselves; and I need not say that I feel certain that everyone in this room will help us, or, rather, help the Hospitals in bringing this cardinal fact home to the public; for after all it is with the public only that the future prosperity of our Hospitals really rests. I do not think I need say anything further in moving the resolution. If it is carried we shall have made, I feel, a fine initial effort, and it remains for others to follow our example.

Lord Revelstoke (Hon. Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee) said that it was obvious that they would not be able to provide £250,000 without parting with some of their capital assets. It was equally evident that, although they would be able to provide this money by the sale of British Government Securities, having but a short term to run, the sale of even those securities would result in an appreciable loss, and would, of course, further result in a diminution of income which, unless they could look forward to an increased public subscription, might lead the Council to modify the amount they might find themselves able to distribute at the end of the current year. He was, however, personally convinced that the need of the Hospitals was indeed urgent, and he had therefore much pleasure in seconding the resolution.

The Speaker of the House of Commons said that before he could be sure that the assistance given by the Fund would be permanently effective in meeting the present emergency he would like to know what steps the Hospitals themselves were prepared to take to stabilise their position. Especially, there should be brought home to the working classes of London their duty to support institutions from which they benefited so largely.

Lord Burnham also referred to the necessity of adequate support being given by the working people of London. Their present contributions towards the maintenance of their Hospitals amounted to only 10 per cent., as against 75 per cent. contributed by their fellows in some of the provincial towns to similar local institutions.

LORD STAMFORDHAM said that he had the honour to read the following message from His Majesty:—

"The King, Patron of the Fund, cordially approves the resolution passed by the Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund to make an emergency distribution of £250,000 as an earnest of their desire to do their immediate share in relieving the London Hospitals of their difficulties. His Majesty trusts that other societies and public bodies on whom the obligation in part rests, as well as private individuals, will join in this effort to meet the pressing needs of the London Hospitals, and thus ensure the continuance of the Voluntary System."

The resolution, having been also supported by the Earl of Bessborough (Chairman of the Executive Committee) and the Hon. Sir Arthur Stanley, was then put and carried unanimously.

The proceedings then terminated.

Special (Red Cross Distribution) Meeting of President and General Council

JULY 23rd, 1920,

to distribute the sum entrusted to the Fund by the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

A Special Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Friday, July 23, 1920, at 11.30 A.M., to distribute the sum of £250,000 entrusted to the Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for distribution on their behalf in aid of schemes of extension or improvement at London Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers.

The Viscount Finlay (Member of the President's Powers Committee) presided.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir John Tweedy) presented the Report of the Committee.

Sir Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary) presented the list of awards.

Viscount Finlay, in moving the adoption of the Report and Awards, said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read the following message from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund:—

- "I am very sorry to miss the special meeting of the Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund to distribute the £250,000 entrusted to the Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in aid of schemes of extension or improvement at London Hospitals treating ex-sailors or ex-soldiers.
- "Please convey my personal thanks to the Joint Committee for this magnificent gift, and to the Distribution Committee for all the extra work it has involved during the past few months.
- "I am delighted that the Fund of which I am President should be associated with this scheme for the benefit of ex-Service men, to whom we all owe so much and of whom we are all so proud.
- "I hope that this great gift of £250,000 towards urgent improvements will, with the £250,000 just given by the Fund to relieve the most pressing maintenance needs, and other schemes still under discussion, be well backed up by the public and thus go far to assure the safety of our Hospital system.

 "EDWARD P."

This is the second special distribution of £250,000 made through the agency of the Fund this year. On June 22 the Council met and decided to make an emergency distribution of £250,000 out of the capital assets of the Fund to assist the Hospitals in their pressing need of funds for current maintenance. The distribution of that sum amongst more than 100 Hospitals was carried out with the rapidity appropriate to an emergency, and the cheques were posted by the evening of July 5, less than a fortnight after the original decision was taken; and we are much indebted to the Distribution Committee for the promptness of their action. The Council meets again now, on July 23, to carry out another distribution similar in amount but entirely different in its origin, in its objects, and in the length of time which it has been necessary for the Distribution Committee to spend on it. This second £250,000 does not come from our ordinary assets: it is the gift of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem out of the surplus funds at their disposal at the end of the war, and we are distributing it on their behalf. The objects and conditions are as nearly as possible the same as those of the similar distribution made by the Joint Committee itself amongst provincial hospitals. None of it is to go to maintenance—it is to be used to assist definite schemes of extension or improvement. The distribution is confined on the one hand to hospitals which can and will treat ex-sailors or exsoldiers; while on the other hand it is extended, at the express wish of the Joint Committee, to some hospitals which come within this condition, but which are not eligible under the rules attaching to grants made out of our general funds. In considering the awards the Distribution Committee have been able to make a thorough examination of the schemes for which applications have been received, and they have devoted many months to this work. This munificent gift of the Joint Committee could not have come at a time when it was more needed or when the Distribution Committee were in a better position to undertake its distribution. Many schemes

of extension and improvement had been deferred during the war and had become urgent. Some of these had been submitted to the Fund before the war, and had been examined and reported on by the Distribution Committee after the hospital concerned had been specially visited by a subcommittee. A much larger number were being prepared after the war. A great many of these included the provision of additional beds for In-patients, and the Distribution Committee had announced their intention of making a general survey of all such schemes from the point of view of urgency, geographical position, and prospect of funds not only for the capital expenditure, but also for future maintenance. They were already engaged on this survey when the invitation from the Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John was received. The special distribution has therefore meant, not that they have taken up anything new, but that they have had to concentrate into the last few months the consideration of a great many schemes which would otherwise have come before them at intervals spread over a much longer period. I mention this because it would be a pity if the impression were created that grants were being recommended to schemes which were put forward unnecessarily, and only because it had been announced that this large sum of money was available. The Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John themselves put an initial check on anything of this sort by the requirement that, when a grant is made, an equal sum must be raised by the hospital. And the Distribution Committee, having a very long experience in the examination of schemes of extension of improvement, were able to judge as to their necessity and urgency. The results are summarised in the Report now before us. The Distribution Committee drew a distinction between schemes for the provision of additional beds, and schemes which would not involve any proportionate increase in future maintenance expenditure. In the case of the former, they required full statements as to the reasons for the additional beds. and the prospect of funds for maintenance, and only passed the proposals subject to the proviso that the Hospital Committees were satisfied that they could raise the money both for providing the beds and for keeping them open. You will notice that, out of 3,445 additional beds definitely contemplated, the Fund has so far passed 1,489, postponed 429, and referred back 1,188. These figures include beds at hospitals for women or children as well as at those treating ex-Service men. Taking only the hospitals eligible for Red Cross grants the number of additional beds passed is 1,176. But it did not follow that all of these beds could safely be put in hand in the near future. The Committee, therefore, decided that only a small proportion of the £250,000 should go to bed extensions; and in the end the number of additional beds actually taken into account at the special distribution was only 649. By thus sifting the schemes according to relative urgency, the Distribution Committee have guarded against the danger that the Red Cross money might unduly encourage the Hospitals to make themselves liable for increased maintenance expenditure. The bulk of the £250,000 has thus been allocated to improvements that will not involve any considerable increase in maintenance expenditure. These include enlarged out-patient departments, new operating theatres, improved nurses' quarters, and the equipment of special departments of which so many have been developed in recent years, and are proving so valuable in the treatment of disabled men. The plans and estimates for these schemes, where they are of any size, have also been thoroughly examined and the Hospitals visited. But while we are very grateful to the Distribution Committee for the way in which they have carried out the heavy work involved, we must not for a moment forget that it is to the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John that we, and the hospitals, are indebted for the

money. It is part of that great fund raised during the war for our sailors and soldiers by the magnificent efforts of the two societies, and by the splendid public response to those efforts. By giving these large sums, out of the surplus left in hand after the war, to the improvement of hospital provision for the treatment of ex-Service men, the Joint Committee both recalled the objects for which the money was subscribed during the war, and foreshadowed that interest in the voluntary civil hospitals in time of peace which has now taken shape in the Hospital Service Department of the Joint Council of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, and from which all concerned in hospital work are hoping such great things. You will have an opportunity of formally tendering your thanks to the Joint Committee in the resolution which comes later in the agenda. In the meantime, I would express, on behalf of myself and my colleagues on the President's Powers Committee, our appreciation of their generosity to the London hospitals in giving this large sum of £250,000, and of their action in entrusting this Fund with the distribution. I now beg to move the adoption of the Report.

The LORD MAYOR (Sir EDWARD COOPER) having seconded the motion, the adoption of the Report and Awards was put, and carried unanimously.

The Governor of the Bank of England (Member of the President's Powers Committee) said that after the observations of Lord Finlay, with which they would all cordially agree (especially the last sentences in regard to the generosity of the gift which they were here to distribute), he would content himself with formally moving the following resolution:—

"That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund tender their best thanks to the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for having set aside the sum of £250,000 out of the surplus funds at their disposal in aid of schemes of extension and improvement at London hospitals treating exsailors and ex-soldiers and for entrusting King Edward's Hospital Fund with its distribution."

The resolution, having been seconded by Lord STUART of WORTLEY, was then put and carried unanimously.

The Earl of Iveagh moved a cordial vote of thanks to Viscount Finlay for his kindness in presiding.

The resolution was seconded by the Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. HERTZ, D.D.) and carried unanimously.

Viscount Finlay having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Distribution Meeting of President and General Council.

(Ordinary Distribution.)

DECEMBER 14th, 1920.

A meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria for the present year, was held on Tuesday, December 14, 1920, at St. James's Palace, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

His Royal Highness THE PRINCE OF WALES moved the following Resolution:-

"The President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of the Earl of Bessborough. He had done conspicuously able service to the Fund for many years as a Member of the Council, Chairman of the Organising Committee of the Coronation Gift to His late Majesty King Edward, and Member and Chairman of the Executive Committee, and the President and General Council greatly deplore his loss."

The Resolution was put from the Chair, the Council rising in their places, and carried unanimously.

Lord Revelstoke (the Hon. Treasurer) said that the amount received for General Purposes for the period from the 1st January to the 4th December, after deducting expenses, amounted to

£156,880 5s. 5d. The original estimate for the whole year was £183,283. Since the date on which this estimate was framed, they had received the very generous offer of King George's Fund for Sailors to contribute an amount equal to the grant made to the "Dreadnought" Hospital, viz., £4,000. This last item would, therefore, have the effect of increasing the total of net estimated receipts to £187,283. This latter figure did not include a further £3,794 from the Wernher legacy, left to capital; or a further sum of £18,000 from the Lewis estate, sums received from which had always been treated as capital. He had just received the following very gratifying communication from Mr. Guggenheim, of New York:—

"Dear Lord Revelstoke,—It gives me great pleasure to enclose my cheque made to the order of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, in your name as Treasurer, for £5,710. This gift is made at the request of Miss Eleanor May Guggenheim, and the amount is part of an engagement present which I made to her upon the announcement of her engagement to Viscount Stuart.—Yours very sincerely, S. R. Guggenheim."

This would increase the total to almost exactly £193,000. In order to make the distribution of £200,000 they were still compelled to deplete the reserves to the extent of another £7,000. Including the £46,000, withdrawn in December last, mainly in order to assist to deal with deferred renewals and repairs, and more especially, of course, the £250,000 paid as an emergency distribution in July last, there had been a reduction in the reserves of £303,000, resulting in a decrease of nearly £,20,000 in the annual income of the Fund. The Finance Committee recognised that these sacrifices had been rendered necessary by the urgent needs of the Hospitals at the present time, but it was well that the Council should have a full appreciation of the consequent loss of income entailed by these special efforts. These capital distributions were a reversal—he hoped only a temporary reversal-of the policy by which the financial strength of the Fund had been established, and by which it had been enabled steadily to increase its distribution from year to year. It was necessary, in his opinion, to take the action endorsed at the Council Meeting in June last, in order to tide over a crisis; but it was very evident that they could not continue to deplete the reserves and, at the same time, to maintain the annual distribution at its recent level. The object of the emergency distribution in July was to give an opportunity to establish some scheme and to agree on some policy which might lead to a solution of the many difficulties by which all the Voluntary Hospitals were so seriously confronted; and he was glad, therefore, to be given to understand that a Committee was about to be appointed by the Government to examine a question which was of so vital importance to the well-being of the entire community.

Sir William Collins, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that this had been a very difficult year, largely owing to the uncertainty prevailing as to the future relations between the State and the Voluntary Hospitals. He was, however, authorised to say that the League would be in a position to hand over £16,000 to King Edward's Fund this year. That would make a total, during the last twenty-one years, of £309,000 which the League of Mercy had handed over to the Fund. They had also made grants to the extra-Metropolitan Hospitals to the amount of £37,393, making a grand total distributed by the League during the twenty-one years of £346,393.

Sir JOHN TWEEDY (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the Report of that Committee, and Sir Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary) presented the list of awards

Sir William H. Bennett (the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee) presented the Report of that Committee, and Mr. John G. Griffiths (Hon. Secretary) presented the list of awards.

The Prince of Wales, in moving the adoption of the Report and Awards, said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have the honour to read the following letter from His Majesty the King:—

"14th December, 1920.

"Please assure the Members of the Council of my unabated interest in the work of the Fund and of my appreciation of what it has done in helping to the best of its powers the London Hospitals in this year of difficulty. The distribution of £450,000 out of our resources, in addition to the £250,000 given by the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem through us, has been a great achievement. I am specially pleased to see that the collection organised by the teachers amongst the children of the London Schools has been so conspicuously successful—over £22,000 has been raised, of which £10,000 is to be distributed by the Fund. This is indeed a substantial proof of the sympathetic interest of the rising generation and of their instructors in the work of our hospitals. As Patron of King George's Fund for Sailors, I am gratified to know of its generous undertaking to provide this year's grant to the Seamen's 'Dreadnought' Hospital. It is my earnest hope that the annual subscriptions to the Fund which bears my father's name will be maintained. While we have to regret the loss of many old friends and supporters it must be our endeavour to find fresh sources of help.

"I especially deplore the loss of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Earl of Bessborough, one of our most zealous and capable workers. The retirement of Mr. Griffiths, as Honorary Secretary, and Sir John Tweedy, as Member and Chairman of the Distribution Committee, though well earned by long and valuable services, will be a serious loss to the Fund. I hope that both will retain their connection with the Council, and that the Executive Committee may still enjoy the benefit of Mr. Griffiths' vast knowledge and experience.

It is now a whole year since I last presided at one of these meetings, and I am very pleased to be back again. There is one question of policy in regard to my position as President on which I should like to make a statement. It has been a great pleasure to me to be associated with several individual London Hospitals; but I must own that, now I have succeeded my father and grandfather in the office of President of the Fund, I feel that my first duty is to promote its interests and that this is the best way in which I can help the Voluntary Hospitals of London. It will, therefore, be my aim to devote myself as far as lies in my power to the carrying out of the objects for which the Fund was founded, and in so doing I am sure that I can rely on your aid. The total amount distributed by the King's Fund this year is £700,000; the largest amount in any previous year being £230,000 in 1919 Of the £700,000, £250,000 was entrusted to the Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, for distribution on their behalf in aid of schemes of extension or improvement at Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-Service men. This was distributed on July 23rd. Another £250,000, out of our own funds

was distributed on July 5th in emergency grants to assist the maintenance of the Hospitals in their pressing needs. The ordinary distribution made to-day is £200,000. The total amount given to maintenance this year is £414,000, as against £186,000 in 1919. The exceptional difficulties of the Hospitals required this special effort. The King's Fund was founded to help to maintain the London Voluntary Hospitals. It is not responsible for their maintenance, but can only assist. I need hardly say that the emergency distribution in July did not itself provide a cure. It was intended to give time for remedies to be devised. As you are aware, the Ministry of Health has announced that a Special Committee is about to be appointed to inquire into the position of the Voluntary Hospitals. The information in the possession of the Fund will be at the disposal of that Committee, and it is specially valuable as being independent evidence. Executive Committee have been considering all suggestions that seemed likely to be at once useful, consistent with the maintenance of the voluntary system, and acceptable to the Hospitals. When sending out the emergency grants in July, the Fund asked all the Hospitals to consider certain methods already adopted by some Hospitals; for example, payment by patients able to pay, and systematic collections from employers and employed. The Executive Committee is now commending to the Hospitals, through the British Hospitals Association, the suggestion that public authorities should pay the full cost of the Hospital treatment of patients for whom those authorities have accepted responsibility. They have also appointed a sub-committee to consider the suggestion that contributions by donors might, subject to all necessary precautions and limitations, be exempted from income tax. Some people think this would be easy: others think it impossible. I feel sure that, from a sub-committee with Sir Walter Trower as its Chairman, the question will receive the thorough examination it deserves. The Fund welcomes the decision of the National Relief Fund to distribute £700,000 amongst the Hospitals to relieve deficits caused by the war. gency distribution of the King's Fund was given for current maintenance and not to pay off war deficits. The National Relief Fund, like the Red Cross Society, takes into account Hospitals outside London: and though the King's Fund in its active efforts is confined to London, we sympathise with the extra-Metropolitan Hospitals in the difficulties which are common to all. The receipts for the year include the £250,000 from the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for distribution on their behalf: the largest contribution ever received in the history of the Fund except the donations of Lord Mountstephen and the legacies bequeathed by the late Mr. Samuel Lewis and the late Sir Julius Wernher. H.M. the King continues to honour the Fund with an annual subscription of £1,000. We were very glad to hear from Sir William Collins that the League of Mercy is likely to be able to contribute £16,000. I should like specially to mention the London Schools Hospital Fund, organised by the London County Council. More than £22,000 was collected by school teachers and children in the schools of London, of which about £12,000 was earmarked for particular Hospitals and £10,338 handed to the King's Fund for distribution. This is indeed a noble sum, and I am very grateful for this splendid effort. We have received annual subscriptions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. King George's Fund for Sailors is very generously giving us £4,000, the amount of the ordinary grant to the "Dreadnought" Hospital this year. I am very grateful indeed to Miss Guggenheim for the generous contribution of £5,710 which Lord Revelstoke has just announced. The income from investments, though diminished by the loss of part of the interest on the emer-

gency distribution of £250,000, is still about £110,000, thanks to the care exercised by Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee. This leaves £90,000 to be raised in order to distribute £200,000. I have appointed a Committee, with Sir Arthur Stanley as Chairman, to consider in what way the Statistical Report, which had been reduced in size during the war, could best be enlarged, having regard to recent developments in Hospital work. I have already alluded to the sad death of Lord Bessborough. We have also to regret the deaths of Lord Murray of Elibank, Sir Henry Burdett, and Sir T. Vezey Strong, Members of the Council, and of three Visitors: Mr. Heathcote Long, Mr. Howard Morley, and Lord Glenconner. Sir John Tweedy, the Chairman of the Distribution Committee, is retiring from the Committee, but he is kind enough to say that he will remain a Member of Council. No words of mine can sufficiently express the gratitude of the Council for all the splendid work that Sir John Tweedy has done. The same, I am sure, applies to the retirement of Mr. John G. Griffiths, who has been an Honorary Secretary since 1912. He also carried through the revision of the Uniform System of Hospital Accounts and Statistics in 1906, and has placed his great skill and knowledge unreservedly at the disposal of the Fund. He will remain a Member of the General Council and Executive Committee, and will, it is hoped, consent to serve on the Statistical Report Committee. The Rev. W. L. Watkinson has been obliged through ill-health to resign his seat on the Council. I am pleased to be able to announce that I propose to make the following new appointments to fill the three vacancies in the list of officers: Chairman of Executive Committee, Lord Stuart of Wortley; Chairman of Distribution Committee, Sir Cooper Perry; Honorary Secretary, Sir Alan Anderson. I should like, as President, to express my grateful thanks to all the Committees and the Officers, who have had a terribly hard year while I have been away. I am much obliged to Lord Donoughmore, Lord Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England, who exercised the powers of President during my absence. I now move the adoption of the Reports of the Distribution Committee and Convalescent Homes Committee.

The Earl of IVEAGH having seconded the motion, the adoption of the Reports was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Lady Ampthill, seconded by Sir George Makins, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Monday, December 20th, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds at Consumption Sanatoria during 1921, the cheques for which should be posted on January 1st.

On the motion of Lord Stuart of Wortley, seconded by Viscount Mersey, a Report of the Executive Committee on the subject of Rules and Regulations for the Procedure of Meetings of the President and General Council was adopted.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1921.

His Royal Highness then announced that he intended to appoint as Members of Council, Members of Committees and Officers for 1921 the same persons as in 1920, except for the changes already mentioned, and the following new appointments, viz.: To the Council: The Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Finlay, Hon. Oswald Partington, Sir Godfrey Thomas, Bart., Sir Edward Hope, Sir J. Rose Bradford, Sir J. Kingston Fowler, Sir Alan Anderson, Sir Frederick Green, Sir Basil Mayhew, Sir Walter Trower, the Rev. Dr. Barber, Mr. Leonard L. Cohen, Professor Winifred Cullis, Dr. H. Morley Fletcher, Mr. Henry L. Hopkinson, Mr. Kenneth Prescott. To

the Executive Committee: Col. the Rt. Hon. Frank Mildmay, M.P., and to the Distribution Committee: Sir Cuthbert Wallace.

There was moved by Lady Northcliffe, seconded by Sir John Craggs, and approved, a Resolution delegating powers to the Finance Committee, Distribution Committee, and Convalescent Homes Committee.

On the motion of the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir Anthony Bowlby), seconded by Sir Alfred Keogh, a Resolution was approved delegating further powers to the Finance Committee.

On the motion of Viscount Burnham, seconded by Sir George Lawson Johnston, a Resolution was approved delegating powers to the Statistical Report Committee.

On the motion of Sir Horace Marshall, seconded by the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir Norman Moore, Bt.), a Resolution was approved delegating powers to the Executive Committee.

On the motion of Viscount Burnham, seconded by the Bishop of London, and supported by Lord Stamfordham and Lord Somerleyton, it was resolved: "That it be an instruction to the Executive Committee to consider and report to the General Council what principles of policy should be recommended to His Majesty's Government for the preservation of the voluntary system of hospital management and control and that a Special Meeting of the General Council be held to consider such report on the earliest day possible."

The Speaker of the House of Commons, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that, whilst they felt that they owed a great debt to His Royal Highness for all the Empire work he had been carrying out abroad, they were rather jealous and rather anxious to see something of him at home. They were very gratified at the interest shown by His Royal Highness in the Fund which was started by his grandfather. There were indeed very great problems facing all Hospitals at the present moment, and they felt confident that the Council would be much fortified and strengthened by the interest His Royal Highness was taking, and that their work in support of the Voluntary Hospitals of London would be vastly benefited by his assistance.

The BISHOP OF LONDON seconded the Resolution, which was carried with acclamation.

The Prince of Wales, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said he was very glad to be back home in England, where he would have the opportunity of attending the meetings of the Council more often than he had been able to do before.

The proceedings then terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council.

APRIL 12th, 1921.

The Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and the Report for the year 1920, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, April 12, 1921, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the chair.

Lord Somerleyton (Hon. Secretary) read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed, and reported letters of regret from the following:—The Bishop of London, The Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), Viscount Mersey, Viscount Farquhar, Viscountess Harcourt, Viscount Finlay, Lord Marshall, Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, Hon. Algernon H. Mills, The Postmaster General, The President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (The Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor), The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir Anthony A. Bowlby), Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Lt.-Gen. Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir George Makins, Sir J. Kingston Fowler, Sir William J. Collins, Sir Frederick Green, Sir John Craggs, Mr. John G. Griffiths, Dr. Winifred Cullis, Mr. Henry L. Hopkinson.

Lord Revelstoke (Hon. Treasurer) in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ending December 31, 1920, said: "The Accounts are more voluminous than usual, owing to the inclusion of items relating to the distribution of Surplus Red Cross Funds on July 23, and to the Emergency Distribution on July 5, as well as the ordinary receipts for the year and the ordinary distribution. A full statement as to the general receipts was made at the meeting in December last, and to the particulars then given there is but little to add. Special references were made at that meeting to the contribution of £16,000 from the League of Mercy, to the sum of £10,338, part of the proceeds of the collection made in the London Schools under the auspices of the London County Council, and to the generous gift by King George's Fund for Sailors of the sum of £4,000, this being the amount of our grant to the Dreadnought Hospital.

If, following the usual practice, general legacies be included in the total "General Receipts," but not the amount received from the Lewis Estate and carried specially to capital, the total "General Receipts" for the year ended 31 December last enabled the fund to provide nearly £193,000 out of the Ordinary Distribution of £200,000—a very gratifying result when it is borne in mind that this Distribution exceeds by £42,000 the amount distributed in the year immediately preceding the War. The £250,000 allocated by the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, for distribution to London Hospitals, was especially entrusted to the Fund for that purpose by the Joint Committee of the two bodies. On reference to the Accounts, it will be seen that this donation, together with the interest accrued to December 31, figures among the receipts, while the distribution and its attendant expenses are included among the payments. The Emergency Distribution of £250,000 made in July 1920, was provided from the Reserve Funds of the Corporation. The credit side of the Accounts shows that £256,935 in all was drawn from the Reserve in 1920, the extra £6,935 being the sum required to complete the amount of the Ordinary Distribution. The Securities which we were under the necessity of realising were short-dated British Government Securities, of a capital value of £200,000. The Balance Sheet shows that this realisation entailed a loss of £8,627, or about 4\frac{1}{3} per cent. of the book cost, notwithstanding the character and the short term of the Securities sold. The effect of the Emergency Distribution has been to reduce our available funds by about one-fourth, with a consequent loss in income of about £16,000 per annum. The Finance Committee are well aware that this Emergency Distribution was a special measure of an urgent nature, imposed on the Fund by the necessity of affording time in which it might be possible to arrange for the reorganisation of Hospital finances in general. They feel it their duty to beg the Council to note that such a step cannot be repeated without serious detriment both to the Fund and, consequently, to the best interests of the Hospitals. It is hoped that the Council will share the views of the Finance Committee in this respect. The immediate difficulties of the Hospitals were further relieved by the grants made later in the year by the National Relief Fund, in reduction of war deficits; and a great step towards a permanent solution of the problem has been taken by the appointment of Lord Cave's Committee for the purpose of making recommendations as to what measures could be taken with the object of assisting the voluntary hospitals. I understand that those who have appeared before the Committee have formed the highest hopes of its success in what must of necessity be a very difficult task, hopes which have been strengthened by the appearance of the very practical proposals contained in the Committee's interim report. It is particularly encouraging to realise that the evidence taken by the Committee has tended to convince them of the importance of every effort being made to continue and to preserve the Voluntary System. I beg to move the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet."

The resolution, having been seconded by VISCOUNT SANDHURST, was then put, and carried unanimously.

THE CHAIRMAN OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE (Lord Stuart of Wortley), moved the adoption of

the Report of the Council for the year 1920.

Lord STUART said that the Report was a long one, but neither controversial nor, he thought, otherwise disputable; for it was in the main historical and narrative. As such, it recounted the events of a most critical period in the history of the Fund. The first three paragraphs recalled the exceptional events of the year: the absence of the President from the country for nearly two-thirds of the year on a mission which had become part of the history of the Empire; the crisis in the

finances of the Hospitals of the London area, the great contribution of £250,000 by the British Red Cross and the Order of St. John; the Fund's own emergency distribution of £250,000 from reserve; the consequent total allocation, including the ordinary distribution of £200,000, of no less than £700,000 in the year; the adoption of the policy of advocating such measures of relief only as should least tend to supersede or impair the voluntary system of Hospital management; the appointment of Lord Cave's Committee; and all the consequent activities, still going on, which found their inception in the year to which the Report related. Paragraphs 4 to 6 gave particulars and summary of the Receipts and Distribution. Then came three further paragraphs about the emergency distribution and the first efforts to devise relief for the urgent necessities of the London Hospitals. At paragraph 10, mention was made of the gift by the National Relief Fund of a sum in reduction of War Deficits of the hospitals of the whole country, including £200,000 to the London Hospitals. Paragraph 12 showed how the schemes of hospital extension were being dealt with. Paragraphs 13 to 16 showed how the Fund's ordinary distribution of £200,000 was allocated. Paragraph 18 reviewed the distributions of the Fund during the last ten years, and during the 24 years of its existence. Its modest administrative expenses were dealt with in paragraph 19. Paragraphs 20 to 25 made special mention of the largest individual contributors, as well as of gifts from some great corporations and firms; also of the contributions of the League of Mercy and King George's Fund for Sailors; and, finally, of the legacies received during the year. Paragraphs 26 to 28 mentioned the services rendered by Sub-Committees and Special Committees on Expenditure Statistics, on Procedure Rules for Council Meetings, and on the Exemption of Hospital Contributions from Income Tax. Deaths and other causes of change in personnel were dealt with in the paragraphs from 29 to 35; and then the Report came to an end with a well-deserved acknowledgment of the assistance received by the Fund from the Newspaper Press.

Lady HALL having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of LORD STUART OF WORTLEY, seconded by the Rev. Dr. W. T. A. BARBER, a resolution was passed delegating further powers to the King's Fund Policy Committee.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was warmly received, said:

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first to read a message from H.M. The King:—

The King is glad to have the opportunity of to-morrow's meeting of King Edward's Hospital Fund to say how, in following its proceedings, he realises what exceptionally heavy demands have lately been made upon the Executive, Distribution, and Policy Committees. His Majesty is sure that all well-wishers of the Fund share his feelings of gratitude to the members of these Committees for the time and labour which they have given in dealing with the many important questions submitted to them during the past few months.

When the King was President of the Fund, he treated the Distribution Meeting in December each year as the most important, and generally did not say very much at this meeting. I propose to do the same. The two Reports which Lord Stuart has submitted to-day cover the ground very well. The Annual Report of the Council deals with the past year; it was an extremely busy year, too, with three distributions instead of one, and then there were the discussions about the financial difficulties of the Hospitals. I am afraid I was not able to follow these discussions as closely as I should have liked, because for the greater part of the year I was, as you know, kept very busy elsewhere. The Report of the King's Fund Policy Committee deals with the future; with

the way in which the financial difficulties of the Hospitals are to be solved. I do not think I can express any opinion on that subject. The question is in the very capable hands of Lord Cave's Committee. The business of the Council is to assist that Committee in every way possible and this is being done through the King's Fund Policy Committee. There are just two special points that I should like to mention this morning. The first is with regard to the past. I was very sorry indeed to miss the distribution of £250,000 out of the surplus Red Cross Funds for the improvement and extension of Hospitals for the treatment of disabled and all ex-service men. They are the men we naturally want to help most of all at the present moment. We are very grateful indeed to Sir Arthur Stanley and the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for asking this Fund to assist them in the splendid work they are doing. They contributed the funds, the Council contributed the knowledge and experience of the London Hospitals possessed particularly by our Distribution Committee. Then, as regards the future, I think we are all very glad that Lord Cave's Committee have reported so decidedly in favour of the voluntary system of Hospital management. (Hear, hear.) It was for the maintenance of that system that King Edward founded the Fund, and that it still exists. I think that everybody here is convinced that it is the best system both for the patients and for the public. I am very glad that the evidence has already brought Lord Cave's Committee unanimously to the same opinion. Before I sit down I should like to add that of late more work than ever has been done by the Chairman and Members of the Executive and the Distribution Committees, and by all the officials and the staff; and I should like to express on my own behalf as President, and I know also on your behalf as members of the Council, our most sincere thanks for the splendid way they have given their services. More especially our thanks are due to Lord Stuart of Wortley for the splendid hard work he has been doing, and to the Hon. Secretaries and their staff.

Lord Donoughmore, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales, said they all appreciated the amount of work His Royal Highness had done and the efforts he made to keep in

touch with the Hospitals.

The Marquess of Crewe, in seconding the resolution, said these were anxious days for everybody, and anxious days also for King Edward's Hospital Fund, and it added great strength and comfort to all connected with the Fund to know that His Royal Highness was President and took the interest in it which he had shown. He felt also that, among the countless activities of His Royal Highness in all the fields of national life there could be none which would appeal to him more closely than this work in which His Majesty preceded him and with which was also connected the name of his illustrious grandfather.

The Resolution was then put and carried by acclamation.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said it was very kind of Lord Donoughmore to say what he had said, because he did try to keep in touch with the Hospitals, and whenever he got the opportunity he went round to see as many of them as he could.

The proceedings then terminated.

Distribution of Surplus Red Cross Funds

REPORT OF DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE. JULY, 1920.

- (1) In July, 1919, the Joint Finance Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem invited the King's Fund to undertake on their behalf the distribution of £250,000 out of the surplus funds at the disposal of the Joint Committee, amongst hospitals in the area of the Fund, upon conditions similar to those on which the Joint Committee had already made a distribution of surplus funds amongst hospitals outside London. The Joint Committee wished the distribution to be kept distinct from the ordinary distribution which is made in December. A preliminary notice was accordingly issued by the Distribution Committee in the autumn of 1919, stating that applications would not be actually invited until the early part of 1920.
 - (2) The conditions provided, inter alia;
 - (a) that the distribution should be confined to hospitals in the London area that could and would treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers, but that, amongst such hospitals, the distribution should not necessarily be subject to the whole of the conditions ordinarily attaching to grants made by the King's Fund out of its general funds;
 - (b) that the distribution should take the form of capital grants in aid of definite schemes of extension or improvement that would directly or indirectly increase the facilities for the treatment of ex-service men, no part of it being available for maintenance or for the payment of debts;
 - (c) that before any grant was actually paid over the scheme must be mature. This did not mean that building must have begun, but that the scheme must be finally settled in the form in which it would be carried out; the plans, for example, having been passed by the Hospital Committee, the King's Fund, and any public or other authorities to whom the scheme required to be submitted;
 - (d) that before any grant was paid over the Hospital Committee should have received, in the form of contributions to the actual scheme, a sum equal to the grant or to the balance of the cost, whichever might be the smaller;
 - (e) that there should be a time limit for the fulfilment of these last two conditions the aim being that all the grants should be paid over by March 31, 1921.

- (3) As the result of the first of these conditions, this special distribution excludes certain hospitals (e.g., hospitals for women and children only) which are eligible for the Fund's ordinary distribution and includes some hospitals which are ineligible under the ordinary rules. Inclusion or exclusion at this special distribution is, therefore, no indication of the attitude of the Distribution Committee at the ordinary distribution.
- (4) Applications, not *prima facie* ineligible for consideration, were received from 64 hospitals in respect of 81 schemes. Grants are recommended to 49 hospitals in respect of 54 schemes.
- (5) It must not be assumed that the absence of a grant implies dissatisfaction. In some cases, for instance, the scheme was too small to need a special grant, in others there was no prospect of fulfilling the condition as to maturity or as to the raising of funds, while at some hospitals a grant is recommended to only one scheme out of several submitted.
- (6) Wherever a grant is recommended in aid of any scheme involving substantial structural additions or improvements, the hospital has been visited by a medical member of the Distribution Committee and either a lay member or one of the Honorary Secretaries, and the proposals, with sketch plans and estimates, have been discussed with the Hospital representatives after an inspection of the existing accommodation and of the site. Wherever a scheme has been passed by the Distribution Committee, the decision has been subject to the proviso that the Hospital Committee are satisfied as to the prospect of the provision of funds, both for the capital expenditure involved and for the subsequent cost of maintenance.

Where the proposals are not yet sufficiently mature to be passed in detail by the Committee, the grant will be subject to the further particulars of the scheme being submitted when ready.

(7) In making this distribution in aid of schemes of capital expenditure, the Committee have taken into account the financial position of each hospital, and they have particularly borne in mind the importance of not unduly encouraging the provision of additional beds. They announced at the outset that in the case of schemes of bed extension they would require specially full and detailed replies to their usual enquiries as to the reasons for the proposal and as to the prospect of funds for future maintenance. After discussion with representatives of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, it was ultimately decided that much the larger proportion of the £250,000 should be devoted to improvements which would involve only comparatively small additional expenditure on maintenance.

(8) In order to determine the distribution even of the smaller sum allocated to the provision of additional beds, it became necessary to devote considerable attention to the general survey of extension schemes to which reference has been made in the last two annual reports of the Distribution Committee. The figures given in the report of last December showed 2,927 additional beds "definitely contemplated," and 1,144 "indefinite or future." The totals now amount to 3,445 and 2,081 respectively. These figures include hospitals ineligible for consideration under the conditions of this special distribution, as well as those eligible. As the result of the progress already made with the general survey, the schemes can now be subdivided as follows:

⁽¹⁰⁾ Of the bed extensions thus passed by the Fund, 1,176 were at hospitals which come within the scope of the Red Cross distribution; but, in view of the decision to allocate to this purpose only a small proportion of the total sum, the number of additional beds taken into account in determining the grants was only 649.

- (II) The amount devoted to schemes other than bed extensions has been used to assist numerous improvements which are no less important from the point of view of the treatment of ex-Service men, and are often of greater urgency. At some hospitals these other improvements are combined with bed extensions; at some hospitals they are the only schemes put forward. They include the enlargement of out-patient accommodation, the improvement or equipment of massage, electrical, and X-ray departments, new operating theatres, and the provision of better accommodation for nurses. In view of the extent to which the success of medical and surgical treatment depends on nursing, and the importance of housing nurses properly if they are to do their work efficiently, the Distribution Committee had no hesitation in regarding nurses' homes as improvements within the scope of the special distribution.
- (12) The Distribution Committee would desire to record their sense of the great benefit which the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem have conferred on the London Hospitals by placing this large sum at the disposal of the Fund for these purposes. The thorough examination which the Committee have had to make of the schemes submitted has convinced them that, in spite of the present financial difficulties in providing for ordinary maintenance, there are numerous improvements which, having been long deferred through the war, now urgently require attention; and this munificent gift of £250,000 will greatly assist the hospitals in their efforts to remedy the most pressing defects in their accommodation and equipment.
- (13) The Committee cannot close their report without placing on record their appreciation of the painstaking and efficient manner in which the heavy work devolving on Mr. Maynard in connection with this special distribution has been carried out.

Report of the Distribution Committee.

(On Emergency and Ordinary Distributions)

Presented to the President and General Council on DECEMBER 14th, 1920.

- (1) This is the third distribution made by the Fund this year. On June 22 the President and General Council decided to make an emergency distribution of £250,000 out of the accumulated funds in order to assist the London Hospitals, having regard to their pressing maintenance needs; and the allocation of this sum amongst the Hospitals was referred to the Distribution Committee with power to act. On July 23 the General Council, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, distributed another sum of £250,000, which had been generously entrusted to the Fund by the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for distribution on their behalf in aid of schemes of extension or improvement at Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-Service men.
- (2) The emergency distribution ordered by the Council on June 22 was completed by the Distribution Committee on July 5, when the grants set out in column 2 of the list appended to this Report were forwarded to the various Hospitals. In the covering letters which accompanied the cheques it was stated that the object of these emergency grants was to assist the Hospitals to carry on their work, and that they were not intended for the payment of debts already incurred, except where it appeared to the Hospital Committees that the circumstances were such that the reduction of debt was the best means of enabling the work to be carried on. The Hospitals were also informed that the emergency grants would be taken into account at the ordinary distribution, and they were asked to consider in the meantime whether their finances could, without detriment, be improved by various methods—e.g., patients' payments, organised contributions from employers and employees, the postponement of bed extensions, or, where the cost was high, greater economy in management.
- (3) The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals at the present ordinary distribution is £190,000. The amount distributed last year was £218,000, which was an increase of £28,000 on the previous year, and included an exceptional sum specially added to assist the Hospitals to carry out renewals and repairs deferred on account of the war. The total grants from the Fund, therefore, apart from the Red Cross grants, amount this year to £440,000, as against £218,000 in 1919 and £190,000 in 1918.
 - (4) The number of Hospitals applying is 108.
- (5) The distribution this year of over twice as much as last year is more than justified by the peculiar difficulties with which the Hospitals are now faced. In 1919, for the first time for many years, the expenditure of the 108 Hospitals on the books of the Fund, taken together, exceeded their income. The combined income, including legacies, amounted to £1,966,000, and the combined expenditure to £2,192,000, an aggregate excess of expenditure over income of £226,000. If the institutions whose income for the year exceeded

their expenditure for the year are excluded, the aggregate excess of expenditure over income in 1919 was £341,000. This sudden change in the financial position of the London Voluntary Hospitals was due in the main to the great and unavoidable increase in the cost of every item of hospital expenditure; but this has unfortunately coincided with a serious falling-off in the subscribing power of their regular supporters. All the available evidence goes to show that these difficulties have rapidly increased since the end of 1919. The most urgent need in the present year has therefore been for substantial assistance to tide the Hospitals over the immediate crisis and to give them time to organise fresh sources of revenue. It was for this purpose that on July 5 the King's Fund made the emergency distribution of £250,000 out of its accumulated funds, in spite of the serious diminution in its annual income which would result therefrom.

- (6) As foreshadowed by the Distribution Committee at the time, these emergency grants have been taken into account at the present ordinary distribution. It follows that, in comparing the grant to one Hospital with that to another, or the grant in 1920 with the grant in 1919, the figure to be considered is the joint total of the ordinary grant and the emergency grant taken together.
- (7) Since, however, the object of the emergency distribution was to assist the Hospitals to tide over an immediate crisis, it was necessary for the Distribution Committee, in determining the amount of each grant, to give more weight than usual to the urgency of the pressing needs of each Hospital, and less weight than usual to other considerations which are normally held to affect their relative claims on the Fund. The Committee felt obliged to apply this principle even to factors which, in some cases, might themselves be partially the cause of the comparative urgency of need, such as differences in economy of working, in the energy or skill devoted to raising funds for maintenance, or in the policy adopted on questions of hospital extensions and other forms of capital expenditure. As far as circumstances permitted, the Committee returned to their usual practice at the ordinary distribution.
- (8) In view of the urgent need of maintenance grants, the Distribution Committee have kept the grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure as low as was reasonably possible, having regard to the fact that numerous proposals for improvement or extension had already been deferred owing to the war, and were now long overdue. Many schemes of this kind, therefore, receive grants which on their merits alone would have been larger. In dealing with schemes which are necessary and urgent, the Distribution Committee have been greatly assisted by the generosity of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in entrusting the King's Fund with the distribution on their behalf, on July 23 last, of £250,000 surplus funds for this purpose amongst Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-Service men. In addition to the schemes at these Hospitals, the Distribution Committee have had before them several equally urgent schemes at Hospitals which were not eligible for Red Cross grants, such as Hospitals for women or children. The total amount of the grants now recommended out of the ordinary distribution in aid of

schemes of capital expenditure this year is £36,300, as against £43,375 in 1919. The total amount distributed by the Fund this year to Hospitals may thus be sub-divided as follows:—

- (9) No substantial capital grants have been made, either out of the Red Cross surplus funds or out of the ordinary distribution, except to schemes examined by the Distribution Committee after a detailed investigation by two of its members. Fifty-four schemes have been considered in this way during the current year, of which forty involved visits to the Hospitals or to the sites. The Committee have continued to make a specially thorough examination of all schemes involving additional beds for in-patients. The number of beds proposed to be added has not materially changed since the Committee made a full report on the subject in connection with the Red Cross distribution on July 23.
- (10) Twice this year the Distribution Committee have issued circulars calling attention to the standing request that schemes of capital expenditure might be submitted to the Fund before definite action was taken by the issue of an appeal or otherwise. In certain cases this has not been done, and capital grants which would otherwise have been made to the Hospitals concerned have, in consequence, been reduced.
- (11) The following grants in aid of schemes of building expenditure are recommended for renewal under the two years' rule:—

General Lying-in Hospital, £1,000 in 1917 and £1,000 in 1918, to rebuilding on new site.

Great Northern Central Hospital, £1,000 in 1918 to new nurses' home.

London Lock Hospital, £1,500 in 1918 to reconstruction of the Harrow Road Hospital.

Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital, £1,000 in 1913, £650 in 1917, and £750 in 1918, to new out-patient department.

Queen Mary's Hospital for the East End, £625 (balance of £1,000) in 1918, to improvements.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £288 128. 11d. (balance of £1,000) in 1917, and £1,250 in 1918, to improved out-patient accommodation.

St. Mary's Hospital for Women and Children, Plaistow, £1,500 in 1913, £1,000 in 1917, and £1,000 in 1918, to new nurses' home and out-patient department.

Victoria Hospital, £200 in 1916, to new heating apparatus. West London Hospital, £1,500 in 1918, to improvements.

Woolwich and District War Memorial Hospital Building Fund, £300 (balance of £5,000) in 1918.

- (12) The Committee desire to record their appreciation of the generous help and ready assistance rendered by King George's Fund for Sailors in offering to provide the amount of the grant awarded to the Seamen's Dreadnought Hospital this year.
- (13) The Statistical Report on the expenditure of the Hospitals for the year 1919 shows a continued general rise in the cost of working. It also shows, at several Hospitals, very large increases in cost per bed due to decreases in the number of occupied beds consequent on the permanent closing of temporary beds for naval or military patients, or the temporary closing of permanent beds during the change over from military to civil use. Now that the war is over it has become necessary to consider whether the items omitted from the Report during the past few years should be restored, and what changes are desirable and practicable in order to increase its usefulness in view of recent developments in the work of Hospitals. The Distribution Committee welcome the appointment, by His Royal Highness the President, of the special Statistical Report Committee to advise on these questions.
- (14) The Committee record with deep regret the death of Sir Henry Burdett, who had been closely associated with the Fund since its inception, and had been an active member of the Distribution Committee throughout. His wide knowledge of Hospitals and deep interest in their work and in all that concerned the welfare of the sick poor were of the utmost value to the Committee, and he will be greatly missed.
- (15) The Committee desire to express their thanks to Sir George Makins, who, in addition to his work as a member of the Executive Committee, very kindly consented to serve this year on the Distribution Committee in order to assist the medical members of the Committee with the examination of the numerous schemes submitted in connection with the Red Cross distribution. They also wish to thank the two Honorary Secretaries who are not on the Committee for similar help to the lay members.
- (16) The Committee are again greatly indebted to the Visitors for their reports on the various Hospitals, and have recommended that in some cases extracts from these reports should be forwarded to the Hospital Committees for their observations. Special inquiries have been made this year into the amount and condition of the accommodation provided for the domestic staff, on the same lines as the inquiry made a few years ago into the question of nurses' quarters.
- (17) The list of grants is appended. The grant recommended out of the present ordinary distribution is set out in column 3. The grant made on July 5 out of the emergency distribution, and taken into account at the present distribution, is set out in column 2. The total amount granted this year (apart from any grant out of surplus Red Cross funds) is the sum-total of the figures in columns 2 and 3 taken together.

Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

- (1) The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria at £10,000, as against £12,000 in 1919.
- (2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 51 from Convalescent Homes and 11 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 49 and 9 respectively last year.
- (3) In view of the decreased amount available for distribution, the Committee have taken into consideration, even more than usual, the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31st last. In the case of Consumption Sanatoria they have also taken note of the proportion of the total work of each institution which is covered by the receipts from public authorities. As these and other circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.
- (4) The Convalescent Homes which were reopened after the war during the course of 1919 have now been doing their normal work for a whole year, and the amount allotted to Convalescent Homes has therefore had to be further increased.
- (5) This fact, combined with the diminution in the total placed at the disposal of the Committee, has reduced the amount available for distribution to Consumption Sanatoria in consideration of the reservation of beds for the use of patients in London Hospitals, and as the cost of maintaining beds has continued to increase, the Committee have been reluctantly compelled to make a substantial reduction in the number of beds so reserved. The accommodation secured this year amounts to 44 beds at six Sanatoria, situated as follows:—
 - 10 beds for children at the Children's Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
 - 2 beds at the Daneswood Sanatorium (Jewish), Woburn Sands, Beds.
 - 8 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
 - 4 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
 - 12 beds at the Sanatorium of the National Association for the Establishment and Maintenance of Sanatoria for Workers, Benenden, Kent.
 - 8 beds at the Northamptonshire Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.

(6) The Committee recommend that the beds thus reserved be allocated amongst London Hospitals as follows:—

Chest Hospitals:-

- 8 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 4 beds to the Royal Chest Hospital.

General Hospitals:-

November 25, 1920.

- 2 beds to Charing Cross Hospital.
- 5 beds to Guy's Hospital.
- 2 beds to King's College Hospital.
- 7 beds to the London Hospital.
- 3 beds to the Middlesex Hospital.
- 2 beds to the Royal Free Hospital.
- 2 beds to St. George's Hospital.
- I bed to St. Mary's Hospital.
- 5 beds to St. Thomas's Hospital.
- 2 beds to University College Hospital.
- 1 bed to Westminster Hospital.
- (7) In view of the necessity of reducing the number of beds, the Committee held a conference of representatives of the Hospitals concerned in order to discuss the best method of using the beds that would be available. There was general agreement that, while most of the patients were theoretically eligible for treatment by the public authorities, it was a great advantage to the Hospitals to have immediate access for suitable cases to the beds reserved by the Fund. Although the Committee recognise that a time may come when the funds at their disposal can be more usefully applied in some other direction, they have no hesitation in recommending that the reservation of beds should be continued for the present.
- (8) The Committee are greatly indebted to the Visitors who so kindly volunteered for the inspection of Consumption Sanatoria, often at a considerable distance from London.
 - (9) The grants recommended to the various institutions are appended.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was re-named "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the four standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 and 2. The rule is that no individual serves on more than one Committee.

In July 1921 the Fund was invited by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission to act as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area in accordance with the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee, and undertook to do so.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.
- (c) Consumption Sanatoria which take patients from London, or which are prepared to place beds at the disposal of the Fund for the use of patients from London Hospitals.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes, or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 87).

Every eligible Hospital and Sanatorium applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 2).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendations of the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-four years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £3,588,416 to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1920 being £700,000, made up as follows:—

£250,000 Emergency Distribution on July 5, to assist the hospitals in their pressing needs;

£250,000 Red Cross Distribution on July 23, entrusted to the Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, out of their surplus funds, in aid of schemes of improvement or extension at London Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers; and

£200,000 Ordinary Distribution, on December 14.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 5s. 3d. per cent. of the receipts, which is equal to less than $3\frac{1}{4}d$ in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £309,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-two years; the contribution in 1920 being £16,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its

grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made. A special examination was made of extension schemes in connection with the Red Cross Distribution in July, 1920.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different hospitals (see below). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Pensions for Hospital Officers.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

PUBLICATIONS OF THE FUND.

The Fund also from time to time collects, and places at the disposal of the hospitals and the public, information on points of interest, and appoints special Committees to enquire into and report upon questions of difficulty affecting hospitals.
