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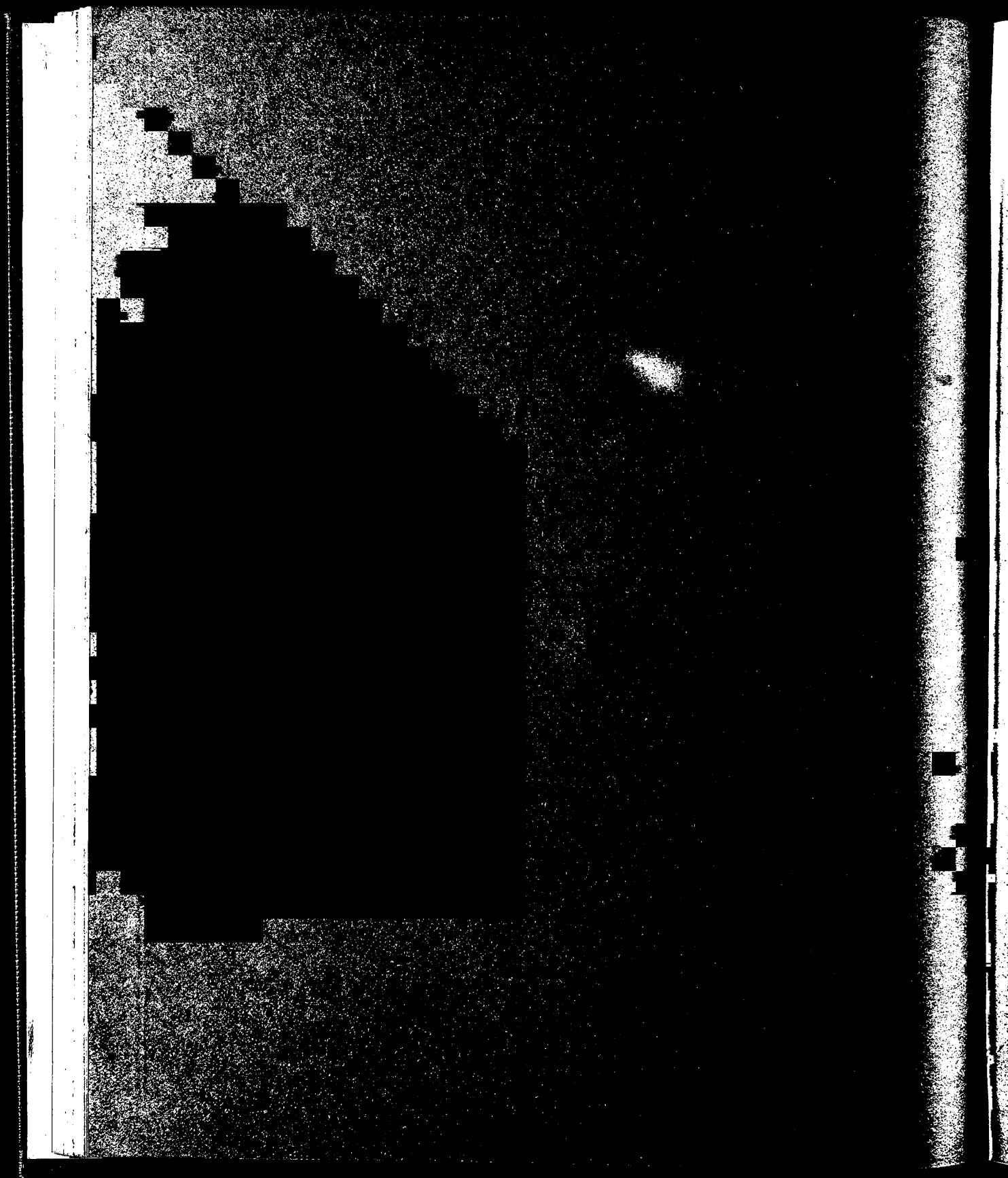

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1934.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF THE YEAR.

1. The ordinary distribution of the King's Fund was again £300,000. It was increased from £275,000 in 1932; and each year the increased total has been wholly provided out of current income.

2. The hospitals, taken as a whole, were again successful in their efforts to obtain enough income to cover their current expenditure, including the maintenance of a slightly increased total number of beds. Some hospitals had deficits, but with the majority the difficulty lay not in a failure to make both ends meet, but in the need for sufficient funds to carry out improvements in buildings and equipment. In these circumstances the King's Fund gave rather more than usual in grants towards schemes of capital expenditure. It has special knowledge of such schemes because of its request that they should be submitted to it for its opinion.

RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

3. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1934 were £319,951 9s. 8d.

4. The general receipts other than legacies were made up as follows:—

while general legacies amounted to £77,235 12s. 1d., making, with £423 18s. 10d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, a total of £318,161 10s. 5d. The total receipts earmarked for capital account were £85 11s. 8d., and receipts on account of income for various special purposes amounted to £1,704 7s. 7d.

5. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £300,000, as in 1933, apart from the pensions grants, which again amounted to £20,000.

7. The Visitors' reports on the hospitals applying for grants were again used by the Distribution Committee at their autumn meetings. The Council are most grateful to the Visitors, both medical and lay, for their continued assistance.

8. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals and convalescent homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,070,417. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £8,021,271 8s. 5d. has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

9. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, the Duke of Kent, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.

10. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,600 from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company, and £1,000 from "M.M." Other contributions included annual subscriptions of £625 from Lloyds Bank Ltd.; of £533 6s. 8d. each from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, and from "W.C.W."; of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; of £350 from the Trustees of the Sir James Reckitt Charity; and of £333 6s. 8d. from Mr. Philip Fleming; and donations of £1,000 "In Memory of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall," and £1,000 from Mr. W. A. Posnett; of £525 from Lord Wakefield; of £500 from "J.R.B."; of £400 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D." The Fund also received an anonymous donation of £1,000, two of £500, and one of £375.

11. The League of Mercy contributed for the third time the sum of £20,000. The Council are indeed grateful to all who have helped to attain this result, which was only made possible by a special effort in a time of exceptional difficulty. The League has now contributed since its foundation in 1899 a total of £544,000.

12. The Fund also received £5,000 from the British Charities Association for distribution among London Hospitals. The total amount received from the Association for this purpose since 1924 is now £100,000. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in thus entrusting the King's Fund with the distribution of the part of their receipts allocated to the London area.

13. The Council are also very grateful to the Trustees of the following estates for gifts made to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers :—Major John Fletcher Church, for a gift of £1,000 ; Mr. Edward Clark, for a further gift of £1,000 (making a total of £6,000) ; and Mrs. Emily Fawcett, for a gift of £1,000.

EXPENSES.

15. Expenses during the year amounted to £14,810 15s. 5d. or about 11d. per £ of the total received.

PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

16. The year 1934 was the last of the seven years for which the Fund promised special grants, not exceeding £20,000, towards the expenditure of the hospitals on the pension scheme. As, however, the distribution is made in the autumn, the grants in the first year related only to nine months' expenditure ; and the grants in respect of the last quarter of 1934, amounting to £5,000, will be made in 1935.

17. Of the £20,000 given in 1934, £17,500 was found from the special reserve set aside for the purpose in previous years, and £2,500 was taken from current income, which thus provided £302,500 out of a total distribution of £320,000.

18. Now that the initial period of seven years has expired, the expenditure on the pension scheme is regarded as having become well established as a permanent part of the ordinary expenditure of the hospitals, to be met from their ordinary sources of income and no longer to be made the subject of special grants.

19. The extent to which the scheme has become recognised as a normal part of the hospital service is shown by the fact that by December 31 last it had been adopted by 121 hospitals in the King's Fund area, representing about 17,500 beds in these hospitals and their branches, and also by a large number of hospitals in other parts of the country.

SPECIAL TRUST GIFTS.

20. In addition to the annual distribution, the following payments were made out of funds received by the King's Fund for special purposes, viz., £939 18s. 2d. to the Miller Hospital in reduction of the building debt, out of the special trust gift received in 1930 ; and £764 3s. 0d.

to the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, under the will of the late Sir John Young, towards the maintenance of the Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home, bequeathed to the King's Fund and used and managed by the Hospital in accordance with the terms of the will.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

21. The 10 grammes of radium belonging to the King's Fund remain on loan with 24 hospitals. Arrangements were made during the year for special visits to all these hospitals by experienced physicists, in order to ensure that the most up-to-date precautions for safeguarding the radium, and protecting the health of the personnel, were fully understood.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

22. The Propaganda Committee have continued their various activities in the interests of the Voluntary Hospitals, with the object of promoting and fostering in the minds of the public a fuller realisation of the service they render, and a desire to take some responsibility for their maintenance and support. Special attention has been given to the rising generation, and lectures to schools and other audiences have, in many cases, been followed by visits to hospitals by parties of elder scholars. These have been much appreciated. Both the Film and the Miniature Hospital have again proved extremely valuable in helping those who see them to visualise the life of a modern hospital and the work it does. The Mock Trials at the London School of Economics again attracted large audiences, and it is hoped they have been instrumental in securing new friends and supporters for the Fund and the hospitals.

THE OUT-PATIENT QUESTION.

23. The Out-patient Arrangements Committee, under the chairmanship of the late Sir John Rose Bradford, continued the consideration of three of the recommendations of Lord Onslow's Committee of 1932, viz., those dealing with out-patient time-tables, with the work of district nurses in relief of out-patient departments, and with time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of out-patient procedure.

24. The general out-patient time-table, first issued in September, 1933, was revised in May and November, 1934, and circulated to all doctors in the King's Fund area and adjacent parts of the Home Counties. Numerous expressions of appreciation have been received, and various suggestions for increasing the usefulness of the tables have been made and are being considered.

25. An inquiry into the work of District Nurses in reducing the number of attendances of minor cases at out-patient departments was undertaken by the Committee at the request of the Management Committee, in the circumstances described in a later section of this Report.

26. The inquiry into time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of procedure was continued by means of visits to selected hospitals by members of the Committee, assisted by one of the staff of the National Institute of Industrial Psychology. The results were summarised in a preliminary memorandum for the consideration of all the hospitals, ready for issue early in the new year.

27. At a Joint Conference of the British Hospitals Association and the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers held in London in June, Lord Onslow was invited to open a discussion on the Out-patient Question. For the convenience of hospital administrators attending the conference, the summary of the Report of the Committee of 1932 was published by the King's Fund as a separate pamphlet.

GRANTS IN AID OF DISTRICT NURSING WORK FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS.

28. The Out-patient Report of 1932 had included District Nurses among the alternative or supplementary agencies to which some of the minor cases attending out-patient departments could be referred, where this could be done without hardship to the patients or detriment to their treatment or to medical education. A letter was subsequently received from the Central Council for District Nursing in London, renewing the application for financial assistance previously made to the Fund.

29. The subject was referred to the Out-patient Arrangements Committee for their observations, and a report by that Committee was laid before the General Council in June and published.

30. In December, the Management Committee reported to the Council that they hoped that a sum of £2,000, over and above the ordinary distribution, would be available in 1935 for the assistance of District Nursing work in relief of out-patient departments. They recommended that this assistance should take the form of grants to the hospitals, to be allocated by the hospitals to District Nursing Associations for out-patients referred by the hospital to the Associations to be attended at home by District Nurses on behalf of the hospital while still under the care of the hospital. The hospitals have accordingly been asked to arrange for records of such cases to be kept.

HOSPITALS AND MOTOR ACCIDENTS.

31. When the Road Traffic Act, 1934, was before Parliament an amendment was introduced, providing for a small payment to a doctor or hospital supplying emergency treatment to a patient injured in a motor accident. The Parliamentary Committee of the King's Fund, in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association, took action in support of this amendment.

PAY BEDS AT VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.

32. The question of general legislation on the subject of pay beds continued to engage the attention of the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association throughout the year.

33. The King's Fund Committee of Inquiry in 1928 had recommended "that an extension of the pay bed system at the Voluntary Hospitals, with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds, would be of advantage to the patients of all classes, to the individual Hospitals, and to the Voluntary Hospital system as a whole." At some hospitals, however, the need for pay beds was not foreseen when the definition of the objects of the hospital was settled.

34. By the end of the year the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association had decided jointly to promote a Bill designed to give the Charity Commissioners powers to sanction the provision of pay beds at such hospitals, with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds.

35. The annual pay beds leaflet published by the King's Fund showed that at December 31, 1934, there were in London 1,871 pay beds at 107 hospitals on the books of the Fund, at weekly charges reported to the Fund as ranging from 2 guineas upwards, more than two-thirds being between 4 guineas and 7 guineas. The total number of beds at the same date was approximately 17,700 at 146 hospitals. Roughly speaking, the proportions in 1934 were : pay beds, 10 per cent. ; ordinary beds, 90 per cent.

PATIENTS' WAKING HOURS.

36. The Distribution Committee reported in December that, as the result of the recommendations made by the King's Fund in 1931, the number of hospitals at which patients were awakened before 6 a.m. had been reduced from 53 per cent. to 21 per cent., the latter figure representing only 15 per cent. of all patients. The Visitors in 1935 will be asked to report on the reasons given by the hospitals which still have an earlier hour.

PERSONAL.

37. The Council regret to have to record the deaths during the year of Lord Revelstoke, who had been a member since 1929 ; of Sir Nigel Playfair, who had served on the Propaganda Committee since 1924 ; and of two Visitors, Mr. W. Emuss Taylor and Colonel the Hon. Arthur Brodrick. The Council also regret the resignation of Dr. Hugh Thursfield, who had been a member of the Hospital Economy Committee since 1932.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1935.

38. At the Council Meeting in December, the Prince of Wales laid special stress on the need for continuous, regular support on the part of the public. He pointed out that the

aggregate surplus for the year under review was only a small margin of income over expenditure, and that there were not many individual hospitals which had a surplus every year. "The expenditure," he continued, "is constantly increasing, because the hospitals are always compelled to enlarge their work and to keep pace with the advances of medical science."

39. The King's Fund has special knowledge of the circumstances of every individual hospital on its books, and all money contributed to the Fund is applied with the utmost care and discrimination, not only where the need is greatest, but also where there is an assurance that it will be used to the best advantage in the interests of those who need hospital care.

PRESS.

40. The Council desire to record once more their indebtedness to the Press for help given in stimulating interest in the hospitals and emphasising their claim to public support.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 11, 1934.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen :—

Message from the King.

I have first the honour of reading a gracious message from His Majesty the King, our Patron :

“BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

“The King is glad to hear that King Edward's Hospital Fund is again this year distributing the sum of £320,000. His Majesty is delighted that the same standard can be kept up, and feels that this is indeed a great tribute to those who support the King's Fund, as well as to those who manage its affairs.

“December 11, 1934.”

Distribution of £320,000.

For the third year in succession we are maintaining our ordinary distribution at £300,000 ; and this, with £20,000 in special grants towards the pensions scheme, makes a total of £320,000. The distribution was increased from £275,000 to £300,000 in 1932, because of the financial crisis in the autumn of that year, and the increased difficulties from which it was anticipated that the hospitals would suffer.

Hospital Finance.

As we all know, the hospitals have, on the whole, been remarkably successful in surmounting those difficulties. But it has been a great effort, on the part both of the hospitals which have collected the money, and of the members of the public who have given it. Among these I include not only the donors, who have subscribed more than £2,000,000 a year, in London alone, in voluntary gifts to maintenance, building and endowment, but also the patients, who themselves contributed last year £1,200,000, of which £365,000 came through the Hospital Saving Association. For, except in the pay wards, these patients' contributions are also voluntary, and those who cannot afford anything are treated free.

Need for Continuous Effort.

I have described this success on the part of the hospitals and of their supporters as being the result of a great effort, which is still being made and must continue to be made if the success is to continue. In this effort the King's Fund has been doing its part, both by keeping the work of the hospitals, and their needs, constantly before the public, and by making that sudden big increase in the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000 in 1932, and providing it, now for the third time, out of the current income of the year. I feel deeply grateful to the contributors whose generosity has made this possible.

When I speak of financial success I do not want to be misunderstood. The fact that the hospitals had an aggregate surplus is no reason for any slackening of the effort to support them. In the first place, the surplus is only a small margin of income over expenditure, and there are not many individual hospitals which have a surplus every year. In the second place, the expenditure is constantly increasing, because the hospitals are always compelled to enlarge their work and to keep pace with the advances of medical science. Any surplus there may be is thus soon swallowed up in extensions and improvements, and the maintenance of additional beds. In the third place, in spite of the aggregate margin on the right side, there are several hospitals with deficits. They have done their work, but, in spite of all their efforts, they have failed to receive from the public sufficient to cover the cost of doing it. Some of these have a very hard struggle. All these reasons for continuous regular support of the hospitals are reflected in the King's Fund distribution. The grand total is retained undiminished, but rather larger grants are made to schemes of extension and improvement, and to the hospitals which have not been able to make both ends meet. This is one of the ways in which a central distributing body like ours can be of special help to the hospitals, from its continual study of their varying circumstances.

Patients' Waking Hours.

I am glad to see, from the Distribution Committee's report, that several more hospitals have adopted the waking hour of 6 o'clock for their patients, as recommended by the Special Committee of the King's Fund. The hospitals which still have an earlier hour represent only 15 per cent. of all the patients in London, including those in some of the special hospitals, where earlier hours may be necessary. The King's Fund report recognised that the question was not as easy as many people thought ; but it is hoped that the difficulties at most of these hospitals may yet be overcome.

Hospitals and Road Accidents.

The problem of road accidents continues to cause serious embarrassment to hospitals in two ways: they occupy beds which are badly needed for other purposes, and they cause heavy expense to hospital funds which are contributed for those other purposes.

On the question of the cost of road accidents, the sympathy of Parliament has been repeatedly shown by the amendments, which have been included in recent Road Traffic Acts, to enable hospitals to recover payment for part of the expense. The latest of these amendments deals with emergency treatment, rendered either by a private doctor or by a hospital. Our Parliamentary Committee, in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association, has taken every opportunity of bringing forward the claims of the hospitals. What they have in mind at present is, first, to see how the partial provision that has been made by Parliament works out in practice, and then to prepare, in the light of that experience, a statement of the arguments for and against the various alternative methods which have been suggested for making more complete provision. In this way they hope to discover how far agreement can be reached on the best form of remedy, since there is already general agreement that a remedy is needed.

On the question of the crowding up of hospitals with accident cases, the King's Fund took action a few years ago. We first held an inquiry into the difficult question of the transfer of patients from one hospital to another when no bed is available at the first. We then helped to reduce the number of such cases by making special grants towards the provision of accident beds, out of the funds which, at that time, we had available from the Wells legacies. But the number of road accidents has increased to such an extent that sometimes, especially in outlying hospitals near the big highways, they may overflow all the accident beds, with the result that, if the hospital is full, urgent local cases, of the kind for which the hospital is intended, may have to be sent elsewhere.

I need hardly say that for both these problems the best remedy of all would be a reduction in the number of accidents. Everyone who is trying either to devise, or to practise, methods of preventing accidents, is doing a service to the hospitals as well as to the users of the roads.

Pay Beds for Middle-class Patients.

In another matter our Parliamentary Committee are co-operating with the British Hospitals Association, with a view to obtaining general agreement. Many of the hospitals, as you know, provide a limited number of pay beds for members of the middle and professional classes, who cannot otherwise obtain the treatment they need. This also is a subject on which the King's Fund recently held a special inquiry. But some hospitals, owing to the wording of their original trusts, find that they cannot legally make such provision, and the question is, how best to give all hospitals the powers now possessed by so many, while yet preserving their original objects; or, as the King's Fund Committee put it, "with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds."

Time-saving Methods in Out-patient Departments.

The Out-patient Arrangements Committee have very nearly finished preparing their memorandum on time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of procedure, when out-patients get their medicine. Before coming to any final conclusions, they propose to issue this memorandum in a preliminary form, for discussion by the hospitals. This is a further step in carrying out the recommendations of Lord Onslow's Out-patient Committee of 1932 for reducing the amount of waiting, wherever this is possible.

Grants for District Nursing Work for Out-patients.

Another of the recommendations of the Out-patient Committee of 1932 is referred to in the Management Committee's report on District Nurses, which is before you to-day. They suggest a method by which the King's Fund would be able, at the same time, to achieve two useful objects: to help financially in the extension of District Nursing work, and to encourage one of the ways of relieving the pressure on the out-patient departments. Some out-patients have to see the hospital doctor only occasionally, while at their other visits they do not need anything except nursing attention, which could often be provided at their homes by District Nurses, if only the District Nursing Associations could afford to increase their work. What the Management Committee recommend is that the King's Fund, as soon as it is in a position to provide an additional £2,000 a year for the purpose, should make extra grants to the hospitals, to enable the hospitals to pay the District Nursing Associations for cases of this kind, attended by District Nurses at home while still out-patients of the hospitals. This will, of course, involve an increase in the ordinary distribution.

Recent Hospital Building Schemes.

The needs of the hospitals, and therefore of the King's Fund, will also be increased in the future in another way. We must all have been struck with the number of big schemes of hospital extension, improvement, or even rebuilding, which have recently been undertaken or proposed. Their appearance in such quick succession is partly the result of arrears which accumulated during the war and the depression that followed. But it is partly a sign of the financial recovery to which I have referred: the effect of the aggregate maintenance surplus is to enable the hospitals to improve and increase their work. These extensions will all mean larger maintenance expenditure, and will require increased income.

Personal Matters.

There are now a few personal matters to which I should like to refer. The losses which the hospital world has recently suffered by death include three members of this Fund. Sir James Kingston Fowler had been a valuable member of the old Convalescent Homes Committee and of the Hospital Economy Committee, as well as of the Council. Sir Nigel Playfair had been on the Propaganda Committee since 1924. Colonel Arthur Brodrick had been a Visitor for seven years. One new member of the Propaganda Committee has been appointed since our last meeting: the Rev. C. L. Cresswell.

I have now only to thank the members of the Council and Committees and the Visitors for all they do for the Fund. We are specially indebted at this meeting to the Distribution Committee, and to Sir Cooper Perry, their Chairman. Their work is particularly heavy, as it involves not only regular meetings but also numerous visits, by sub-committees, to hospitals which have submitted building schemes for an expression of opinion by the Fund. I must not conclude without thanking Lord Onslow, as Lord Chairman of the House of Lords, for lending these rooms for our meeting.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Sir EDWARD PEACOCK (the Honorary Treasurer) said that it now seemed likely that the income for the year would be sufficient to cover the distribution. This was the more satisfactory because it arose from the maintenance of income under all headings. Donations included £1,000 given anonymously in memory of the late Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, a former member of the Council and

Chairman of the King's Fund Committee on Superannuation for Nurses and Hospital Officers, whose report led to the establishment of the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers. Legacies for 1934 amounted to more than £75,000 : in each of the past seven years they had exceeded £58,000. A full year's income came into the accounts from recent generous contributions to capital, notably the reversion of £136,000 under the will of the late Lord MountStephen, and the gift of freehold property known as "The William and Francis Radford Endowment, from a member of the family." This was nearly sufficient to balance any losses caused by reduced dividends or interest.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord MARSHALL, Honorary Treasurer of the League of Mercy, said that circumstances during 1934 had not been favourable to the League so far as certain sources of hitherto substantial income had been concerned, but that as the result of a special effort the League was again allotting £20,000 to the King's Fund. This made a total of £544,034 since 1899, of which £267,000 had been given since His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales became President of the League in 1919. At the same time the League was distributing £6,238 to extra-Metropolitan Hospitals, making a total since the League was founded of £167,998, and a grand total distribution of £712,032.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (See pages 27 to 29.)

Sir LEONARD COHEN (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (See pages 30 to 40.)

The recommendations were seconded by Sir LOUIS GREIG, and carried unanimously.

Sir COOPER PERRY then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (See page 41.)

Sir HAROLD WERNHER (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards (See pages 42 to 44.)

The recommendations were seconded by SOPHY Lady HALL, and carried unanimously.

DATE OF POSTING CHEQUES.

On the motion of the Rev. OWEN S. WATKINS, seconded by Sir GEORGE ROBERTS, BT., it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Tuesday, December 18th.

DISTRICT NURSES AND THEIR WORK IN RELIEF OF HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENTS.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) presented a report of the Committee on the application from the Central Council for District Nursing in London. The report stated that the Committee hoped to be able to recommend in 1935 that the sum of £2,000 over and above the ordinary distribution of £300,000 should be distributed to hospitals, to be allocated by hospitals to District Nursing Associations for out-patients attended by District Nurses in their homes while still patients of the hospitals ; and recommended (a) that the principle of assisting the

work of the District Nursing Associations by this method be approved ; and (b) that the hospitals be asked to keep records, as from January 1st, 1935, of the cases of this kind.

The motion was seconded by Lord DAWSON OF PENN.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, as Chairman of the Central Council for District Nursing, expressed appreciation of the adoption of the principle that the King's Fund should assist financially the work of the District Nursing services. He thought the method suggested might present difficulties in practice, and the Central Council would be delighted to place at the disposal of the King's Fund the experience they had gained during the last twenty years.

The motion was then carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1935.

His ROYAL HIGHNESS then said : My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I now come to the business for 1935. In order somewhat to lighten the arduous work of the Distribution Committee, to which I have already referred, I propose to appoint two additional members, one medical and one lay : Sir Charlton Briscoe and Captain Philip Astley. Dr. Thursfield is unfortunately unable to continue to serve on the Hospital Economy Committee. I propose to appoint the Hon. John Mulholland as a member of the Finance Committee and of the Council and of the Hospital Economy Committee ; and Sir Harold Wernher as Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee. This last appointment will relieve Lord Somerleyton of some of his work, though he will retain his seat on the Committee as one of the Honorary Secretaries. Lord Somerleyton has done fine and strenuous service to the Fund as an Honorary Secretary ever since its foundation in 1897, and I am delighted to think that he is willing to continue in this position. The Honorary Secretaries are now on the Management Distribution and Parliamentary Committees, and I propose to make them *ex-officio* members of all Committees except the Finance Committee. In other respects the membership will remain unchanged.

I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move the delegation resolutions.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of DONOUGHMORE), seconded by Sir FREDERICK M. FRY, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1935.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The Viscount HAILSHAM, in moving a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that this was no mere empty and formal tribute. The wonderful way in which during the last few difficult years they had been able to maintain and increase the distribution, though largely due, of course, to the public recognition of the importance of the work and the efficiency of the administration, owed a great deal to public appreciation of the active interest which His Royal Highness had always shown in its affairs. His presence in the Chair that morning was only the latest example of his interest and sympathy.

The Viscount WAKEFIELD, in seconding, said that they were deeply indebted to His Royal Highness for placing his valuable time and his inspiring influence at their disposal.

His ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, May 28th, 1935.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace, on Tuesday, May 28th, 1935, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

SIR LEONARD COHEN (Honorary Secretary) read the following resolutions of condolence passed by the Management Committee, on behalf of the Council, on the occasion of the deaths of three Honorary Officers of the Fund: The Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee; Lord Somerleyton, senior Honorary Secretary and Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee; and Sir John Rose Bradford, Chairman of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee:—

“ That the Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London on behalf of the General Council desire to express their deep regret at the death of the Right Honourable J. H. Whitley, who had served as a Member of the General Council from 1921, as a Member of the President's Powers Committee in 1928, and as Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee from 1929. His great knowledge of Parliamentary and other public affairs, his reputation for impartiality and fair dealing, his skill and tact in stating his arguments, and the great weight which his opinion carried in all quarters, made him a tower of strength to the King's Fund and to the hospitals. The Management Committee desire also to tender to Mrs. Whitley and the family their sincere condolences in their bereavement.”

“ That the Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, desire to express their deep sorrow at the death of Lord Somerleyton, and their sense of the great loss which the Fund has suffered thereby. As an Honorary Secretary of the Fund since its foundation in 1897, and also Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee since 1922, he had taken an active share in all its work for nearly 38 years; and a very large part of its success has been due to his devoted and untiring efforts, to the great ability, experience, and knowledge of men and affairs which he brought to its service, and to his deep interest in the welfare of the hospitals. He will be much missed by his colleagues on the Council and the Committees, by his fellow Honorary Secretaries, and by all the staff. The Management Committee desire also to tender to Lady Somerleyton and to the other members of the family their heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.”

“ That the Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, record their deep sorrow at the death of Sir John Rose Bradford. He had been associated with the King's Fund since 1908, first as a Visitor, and subsequently as a Member successively of the Executive Committee and the Distribution Committee, and Vice-Chairman of the latter; as a Member of the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee; as Chairman of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee since its formation in 1933; and as a Member of three special Committees of Inquiry:—the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee, the Pay Beds Committee and the Out-patient Committee of 1932. His great knowledge, ability and authority, and his readiness to give time and thought to the work, made him a source of strength to the Fund, and all who were associated with him mourn his loss. The Management Committee also tender to Lady Bradford and to the other members of the family their heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.”

SIR HAROLD WERNHER (Honorary Secretary) reported Orders of Appointment, signed by His Royal Highness the President, of certain Members of the General Council and Members of Committees.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, addressing the Council, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—

Address of Congratulation to the King, and Reply from His Majesty.

I will begin by reading a resolution of congratulation which, as your President, I forwarded to His Majesty the King on the occasion of his Silver Jubilee :—

“ May it please Your Majesty,

“ The President and General Council and all connected with King Edward's Hospital Fund for London with their most obedient humble duty to Your Majesty beg leave to tender their loyal congratulations on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee of Your Majesty's accession to the Throne.

“ They share the feelings with which the occasion has been universally welcomed. They have also special reasons for gratitude when they recall the never-failing interest shown by Your Majesty in all that concerns the welfare of the hospitals and the work of the King's Fund. The knowledge of Your Majesty's sympathy has been the greatest encouragement to all who are engaged in hospital work.

“ The President and General Council tender also an expression of heartfelt wishes that Your Majesty and Her Majesty the Queen may long be preserved in health and happiness to continue the labours which have earned for the Throne a loyalty and affection never before attained in the hearts of all classes of your subjects.

(Signed) “ EDWARD P., *President.*”

I have now the honour to read the following gracious reply from His Majesty :—

“ BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

“ His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, President, King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

“ I much appreciate the loyal congratulations on my Silver Jubilee which you have addressed to me on behalf of the General Council and all connected with King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

“ I take a deep personal interest in this Fund, founded by my father to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria, and for nine years, as President, I was intimately associated with all its various activities. Year by year I have watched with pride its steady growth, until to-day the Fund has become an essential part of the voluntary hospital system of London, and I am happy to know the extent of its influence and the high esteem in which it is held.

“ On behalf of The Queen and myself I desire to express to the Council our warm gratitude for the good wishes conveyed in their address.”

Proposed Silver Jubilee Distribution.

For reasons which you all know, it was the King's wish that the Silver Jubilee should not be celebrated by any general appeal on behalf of hospitals, but by the foundation of a new trust fund for a new purpose. But this does not mean that the interest which either the King or I myself, who in a way was the public initiator of the trust, take in the cause of the hospitals and of the King's Fund,

is in any way diminished. The King hopes, as I do, that the hospitals will not suffer, either in their present regular income or in the appeals for special purposes which were already in hand, or which may be made in future years.

When, therefore, a method was suggested whereby King Edward's Hospital Fund could, without making any appeal, celebrate the Silver Jubilee by an additional distribution in aid of building schemes at London hospitals, it was with pleasure that His Majesty expressed his approval.

It is indeed natural that this Council should wish to mark the occasion in some exceptional way. The King's Fund was founded to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1897; it was augmented by the Coronation gift to King Edward the Seventh in 1902; and its last special appeal was for the Thank-offering Fund for the recovery of King George in 1929. The King was its President for nine years, and since his accession has taken an active interest as its Patron.

Briefly, the proposal is this. During the twenty-five years of the King's reign the ordinary distribution has been increased from £150,000 a year to £300,000. In other words, it has been exactly doubled. But every year a small margin of the annual income has been kept in hand: a kind of estimated budget surplus. This policy has been successful, and the small margins have accumulated. During the post-war financial crisis a great inroad was made into the reserves by the emergency distribution of £250,000 in 1920, itself a striking illustration of the value of a central fund. But since 1920 the small annual margins have again been accumulating, and they have now reached a total of about £109,000.

There is also another sum of money available, more closely associated with the Jubilee. It arises from the sale of the seats which were offered to the King's Fund by His Majesty's Office of Works for the processions of May 6th and May 9th, and with the personal approval of the King. This comes to about another £11,000, and raises the available total to approximately £120,000.

This additional distribution will have a special object. The hospitals themselves have, in spite of the financial depression, gone on extending their work and also increasing their income. The result has been that the hospitals, like the King's Fund, have, taken as a whole, just balanced their budgets, with a small margin on the right side, in spite of deficits at some hospitals where the circumstances are exceptional. The figures for 1934 tell the same tale. It has been the result of a great and most creditable effort on the part of the hospitals and their subscribers, among whom I wish particularly to mention their own patients.

But this is not enough. It is true that hospital income has just kept pace with the increased expenditure, and there have been some very successful appeals for reconstruction and extension. But a good deal of urgent work in the way of improvements to buildings and equipment has fallen into arrears.

The money we have available will be enough to enable us to help with some of this work, though not with all of it.

The proposal, therefore, is that the sum of £120,000, representing the unspent income balances of the last twenty-five years and the profits from the Jubilee seats, together with any other sums which may be received in connection with the Jubilee and which the General Council may allocate for the purpose, should be made the subject of a special Silver Jubilee Distribution in the autumn among the hospitals of London, in aid of programmes of capital expenditure already notified to the Distribution Committee.

In connection with the sale of Jubilee seats I should like to express our thanks to the First Commissioner of His Majesty's Works, and to the Secretary of that Government Department, Sir Patrick Duff, and the other officers of the Department, who did everything in their power to facilitate the arrangements. We are also greatly indebted to the British Charities Association, to their Chairman, Lord Luke, and their Secretary, Mr. Hugh Macrae, who is also head of the Hospital Economy Department of the King's Fund, for organising the sale of the tickets and the other necessary work.

King's Fund Income in 1934.

Apart from sanctioning this special distribution, our chief business to-day consists of the annual report and accounts for 1934. The accounts show that the income for the year just covered the distribution, for almost the whole of the small surpluses which we propose to distribute were accumulated before the crisis of 1931, when the annual grants were increased at one bound from £275,000 to £300,000. Since we made that effort the margin of income over distribution has been very narrow. Last year it was only £426. Sir Edward Peacock will be giving you the details in a few minutes.

Of the work recorded in the annual report, some items were completed during the year, and these I have already mentioned at our meeting last December. With others further progress has been made in 1935.

Reduction of Waiting in Out-patient Departments.

The Out-patient Arrangements Committee have issued another report, dealing this time with time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of procedure, when the patients get their medicine. In order to reduce out-patient waiting to a minimum, it is very useful for each hospital to know what methods are being tried or suggested at other hospitals. This is where the King's Fund can help. Our Committee have collected information from all the hospitals and have visited several of them. There are naturally differences of opinion over some of the methods described or suggested, and they have therefore circulated the report for the observations of the hospitals.

This is the usual method by which the King's Fund performs many of the functions of a central body, acting on behalf of a large number of voluntary hospitals, each of which owes much of its value to its own independence and freedom of initiative.

The hospitals' own representative bodies, the British Hospitals Association and the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers, made the out-patient question one of the subjects of their last joint conference, and invited Lord Onslow, the Chairman of the King's Fund Out-patient Inquiry Committee of 1932, to open the discussion.

Parliamentary Action.

Two examples of co-operation between the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association are mentioned in our annual report—first in supporting an amendment to the Road Traffic Act of 1934, which would provide payment to hospitals for the emergency treatment of motor accident cases ; and also in preparing the Voluntary Hospitals (Paying Patients) Bill, which is at present before Parliament.

The Propaganda Committee.

The report on the Propaganda Committee shows that they have again been very active. The Miniature Hospital, the lectures in schools, and the film, are all valuable means of stimulating an intelligent interest in hospital work ; and such popular functions as the Mock Trials and the Conducted Tours are used indirectly for the same good purpose.

Bank of England : Annual Sum to be Administered by the King's Fund.

I have now some gratifying news. You already know that of recent years various donors have entrusted the King's Fund with the administration of sums of money for special purposes connected with hospitals. Another example of this has just occurred.

The Bank of England have asked King Edward's Hospital Fund to deal on their behalf with appeals which they may receive from London hospitals. With this object the Bank have set aside and paid to the Fund a sum for distribution, this being the first of seven annual payments which they have undertaken to make to the Fund for this purpose. The sum includes the Bank's usual annual subscription to the King's Fund, and certain annual subscriptions which the Bank has previously made direct to certain London hospitals. The balance is to be distributed by the Fund in response to such appeals from London hospitals as the Bank may receive and forward to the Fund for consideration. The hospitals to be assisted under the latter head, and the allocation among such hospitals, will be determined by the Fund at its discretion.

It is satisfactory to know that the amount thus entrusted to the King's Fund represents an increase upon the average annual total sum hitherto dispensed by the Bank in direct donations.

These grants will be decided in the autumn, just before our ordinary distribution. They will be quite distinct from the ordinary grants, and will reach the selected hospitals as donations from the Bank of England, per King Edward's Hospital Fund.

I should like, in your name and in mine, to express our appreciation of the action of the Bank of England, and the pleasure it will give us to use on their behalf all our knowledge of the circumstances of the various hospitals.

Personal.

The King's Fund has lost by death two valued members in Cardinal Bourne and Lord Doverdale ; two Chairmen of Committees, Mr. J. H. Whitley and Sir John Rose Bradford ; and, an especially great loss, our senior Honorary Secretary, Lord Somerleyton, who, from my personal point of view, had been of the greatest possible help ever since I had the privilege of being President of the Fund. Quite apart from myself, I think I should be voicing everybody's views and feelings if I said that he was our oldest friend. He took an active part in the work of the Fund from its foundation in 1897 almost to the day of his death. His enthusiasm, his knowledge of hospitals, and his wisdom in dealing with men and affairs, contributed in large measure to its success. We shall miss him greatly. Mr. Whitley, as Chairman of our Parliamentary Committee, was a tower of strength to the Fund and to the cause of the voluntary hospitals. Sir John Rose Bradford was one of the leaders of his profession, and placed his time and his abilities freely at the service of the Fund for many years. The loss of three such men in a few months makes a great gap in our front line.

We have also lost by death the services of two Visitors, Dr. James Collier and Dr. Theodore Thompson.

I have made the following appointments since January : Mr. Philip Fleming and Dr. H. Letheby Tidy as Members of the Council ; Mr. Hugh Lett as a member of the Hospital Economy Committee ; Lord Macmillan as Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee in succession to Mr. Whitley ; and Dr. Morley Fletcher as Chairman of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee in place of Sir John Rose Bradford.

Mr. S. R. C. Plimsoll and Miss M. Horsley have joined the Propaganda Committee.

I now wish to express my thanks to all the members of the Committees and the Honorary Secretaries for their day-to-day work for the Fund ; and also to you, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, the members of the Council. I have the pleasure of meeting you twice a year. But I have not the same opportunities of seeing the other workers for the Fund, including the members of Committees who are not on the Council, and the Visitors. It was with great pleasure that I found myself able to invite all these to a tea party in this Palace of St. James's last February, and to have a word with each of them.

I will now call on Sir Edward Peacock, our Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee which looks after our investments so successfully, to present the Accounts for 1934.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1934.

Sir EDWARD PEACOCK (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Accounts, said that at the distribution in December there was still a small deficit, but this was covered before the end of the year, though with a margin of only £426. The total amount distributed was again £320,000.

Annual subscriptions were £200 more than in 1933 and donations £1,600 more.

Legacies amounted to £77,000. During the past seven years the lowest figure for legacies had been £58,000, and the average had been £70,000. There was no doubt that the King's Fund, with its annual grants to 200 hospitals and convalescent homes, made a strong appeal to testators who wished to leave legacies or residues to charity, but had no particular institution in their minds.

But they would be glad to see a larger proportion of the increased distribution provided for by annual subscriptions. He would like to refer to the advantages, both to subscribers and to the Fund, from the use of seven-year agreements, which enabled income tax and surtax to be saved. Last year the Fund received 67 annual subscriptions under agreements of that kind, ranging from £1 is. to £4,000, and amounting almost exactly to £14,000, the total received to date being £128,000.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Sir BASIL MAYHEW, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1934.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) moved the adoption of the Annual Report for 1934 (*see* pages 5 to 12). Sir ALAN ANDERSON having seconded the resolution, the report was unanimously adopted.

REPORT OF REVENUE AND PROPAGANDA COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord LUKE) presented a report of the Committee on the income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moved that it be published (*see* pages 45 to 49).

Sir CUTHBERT WALLACE having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

PROPOSED SILVER JUBILEE DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) then presented a Report of the Committee on the proposed Silver Jubilee Distribution, and moved the recommendation that the sum of £120,000, representing the unspent income balances of the last twenty-five years and the profits from the Jubilee seats, together with any other sums which might be received in connection with the Jubilee and which the General Council might allocate for the purpose, be made the subject of

a special Silver Jubilee Distribution in the autumn among the hospitals of London, in aid of programmes of capital expenditure already notified to the Distribution Committee by May 28th, the date of the Council Meeting.

The recommendation was seconded by Sir ERNEST POOLEY and carried.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The BISHOP OF LONDON, in moving a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that it was a matter of absolute wonder to him how His Royal Highness managed to get through the work he did. He therefore proposed a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness not only for his regular attendances but also for the very inspiring speech which he always gave them.

Professor WINIFRED CULLIS, in seconding the motion, said that it was a delightful privilege to have an opportunity for once of expressing to their President their deepest gratitude for the work he did, for the stimulation he gave, and for the great encouragement that his interest was, not only to the members of the Council but to people outside.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS)

1. The amount of the ordinary distribution is again £300,000, making, with £20,000 assigned to special Pension grants, a total of £320,000. Out of the £300,000 for ordinary distribution, £3,000 is allocated to convalescent homes not attached to particular hospitals. The distribution of the balance amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches forms the subject of this report.

2. The number of hospitals applying for grants this year is 146, no application having been received from the Weir Hospital.

3. Although the grants are made in respect of the work of the hospitals during the current year, the accounts before the Committee are necessarily those for the preceding year. In 1933 the number of hospitals with deficits on the year's working was smaller than in any other year since the war, there being 98 surpluses and 47 deficits, as against 85 and 60 for 1932. The net aggregate surplus, moreover, was exceptionally large, amounting to £242,000 as against £104,000 in 1932. In these circumstances the Distribution Committee considered it desirable to allocate rather more than usual in grants towards schemes of extension or improvement, and rather less in grants to ordinary maintenance. They were also able to make increased grants towards the reduction of debt, whether due to deficits on completed building schemes, or to excesses of maintenance expenditure over income at hospitals which have had exceptional difficulty in obtaining adequate support.

4. The grants recommended to maintenance or to the reduction of maintenance debt amount to £254,375, as compared with £263,830 in 1932, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure, or to deficits on past schemes, being £42,625, as against £33,170 last year.

5. The number of grants towards schemes of capital expenditure is 82 as compared with 70 in 1933.

6. The special grants in aid of expenditure on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, amounting to an annual maximum of £20,000, were promised by

the Fund for the first seven years of the scheme. As special grants for this purpose were first made in 1928, the present distribution is the seventh in which they have been included. They do not, however, cover as yet the full period of seven years, which began in January, 1928, the grants in that year being based only on the expenditure from January to September inclusive. The distribution of 1935 will therefore include a final £5,000 in respect of the expenditure for the last quarter of 1934.

7. When distributing in 1920-21 the sum of £250,000 out of Surplus Red Cross Funds on behalf of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, the King's Fund made a grant in aid of a scheme of extension at the French Hospital. Owing to changed circumstances the full scheme has never been carried out. Part of the money has been spent on improvements, and the balance, amounting with interest to £2,038 2s. 10d., has now been returned to the King's Fund. The Distribution Committee are recommending that this sum should be re-allocated as a grant towards the deficit on the recent extension of the out-patient department at St. Thomas's Hospital, in view of the fact that a scheme with the same object, which was being prepared at the time of the Red Cross distribution, was not then ripe for a grant.

8. In considering the applications for grants, the Committee have, as always, found the Visitors' Reports to be of the greatest service ; and they are recommending that extracts from the Reports should be forwarded with the grants for the observations of the Committees of the Hospitals concerned. Wherever a Report contains a comment which might require specially urgent attention, as, for instance, in connection with fire risks, the extract is forwarded to the hospital as soon as the Report is received ; and the private remark sent with the grant consists of a reference to what has taken place.

9. The Distribution Committee are also indebted to the Revenue Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee for suggestions on the subject of private remarks to hospitals arising out of the tables in the King's Fund Statistical Summary which contain comparative figures of income or of cost of working.

10. The Committee have made a further inquiry into the action taken as the result of the recommendation made in 1931 that, unless there was some exceptional and adequate reason to the contrary, the most suitable hour for the waking of patients was 6 o'clock. At the time of the inquiry the hour of waking was earlier than 6 o'clock at 53% of the hospitals. By 1932 the number had fallen to 31 per cent. and it has now been further reduced to 21 per cent. Calculated as a percentage of the number of patients the results are still more satisfactory, only 15 per cent. of the total number being awakened at an earlier hour than 6. All the hospitals which continue to have an earlier hour give some special reason for it ; and the Visitors will be asked to report on these reasons at the next annual inspection.

11. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £400 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependents.

12. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule :—

Bolingbroke Hospital, £1,000 to rebuilding of old block.

Hospital for Epilepsy, £900 to extension.

London Hospital, £750 to massage department.

National Hospital Queen Square, £250 to extension.

Queen's Hospital for Children, a balance of £250 out of the grant in 1928 and an unapplied grant of £500 in 1932 to out-patient extension.

St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, £150 to provision of lift in new block.

West London Hospital, £1,000 to extension.

The Committee are recommending that the grant of £150 to St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, to provision of lift in new block, should be renewed and transferred to the theatre unit which will include a lift ; and that the other grants should be renewed.

1. The President and General Council have again fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £3,000, being the same as last year.

2. The number of applications eligible for consideration was again 56, being the same number as last year.

3. The Committee have continued to take into account the extent to which medical or nursing care or treatment is provided for the patients.

4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution implies dissatisfaction.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1934.

1. The Revenue Committee beg to present the following Report :—

2. The total receipts of the Fund for the year 1934 amounted to £319,951 9s. 8d. Included in this are general legacies amounting to £77,235 12s. 1d. Since 1928 the Fund has in no year received less from legacies than £59,000, and it is greatly to be hoped that receipts from this source will continue to maintain the high level of recent years. The total receipts for 1933 were exceptional, in that they included the receipt of £135,924 from Lord MountStephen's estate.

3. The figures of the income of the Voluntary Hospitals of London for 1934 are not yet finally tabulated, but it is already clear that, taken as a whole, they will again show a net aggregate balance of income over expenditure for the year. The total ordinary income of the London hospitals rose in 1933 to the highest figure recorded—£3,494,000, an increase of £16,000 over 1932. Legacies increased by £152,000, but legacies are necessarily a fluctuating item.

4. The Committee review annually the revenue position of the hospitals to which the Fund makes grants, in the light of the figures prepared by the Hospital Economy Committee of the Fund and published in the Statistical Summary on the work and finance of the London Voluntary Hospitals. They pay special attention to the position of those hospitals whose ordinary income in the previous year has amounted to less than 80 per cent. of their total general fund expenditure. It is gratifying to note a steady decline in the number of hospitals which come into this category.

5. The number of hospitals with surpluses was in 1933 the highest recorded. The figures of surpluses and deficits for the past four years have been as follows :—

6. The general conclusion drawn by the Statistical Review from which these figures are taken is that while deficits at particular hospitals form a serious problem for these hospitals they are not typical of the general tendency of hospital finances, but are due to more or less exceptional circumstances. The net aggregate surplus of £242,000 was the largest for ten years. It must

not, of course, be forgotten that hospitals do not, and should not, stand still, and that in addition to income to cover maintenance they require money for renewing and extending the equipment required to give their patients the full benefits of the constant progress of medical science.

7. The year 1933 was a notable landmark in the long history of the London Hospitals. For the first time their total income reached and passed the figure of £4,000,000. Since 1929 there has been an increase of £219,000 in the total ordinary income of the hospitals. A small decrease in Voluntary Gifts has been more than offset by an increase in Receipts for Services. In 1933 the Receipts from Patients amounted to no less than £1,203,000, including about £365,000 from the Hospital Saving Association. This Association, which the Fund was instrumental in founding, when Sir Alan Anderson, the present Chairman of the Association, was one of the Honorary Secretaries of the Fund, has since 1923 distributed over £3,000,000, derived from the weekly threepences of wage-earners, in payment for hospital services.

8. The finances of the Voluntary Hospitals are broadly based on the contributions of all classes of the community. To maintain and extend this widespread support by bringing before the public the work and claims of the London Hospitals, and of the Fund which exists to serve them, is the main function of the Propaganda Committee, and the following report which the Revenue Committee has pleasure in submitting gives some account of the activities of another successful year.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1934.

9. The Propaganda Committee, in continuing their various activities, have kept in view the purpose recently emphasised by H.R.H. The Prince of Wales, namely, that the King's Fund should operate as a force for spreading wider knowledge and appreciation of the work done by the London Voluntary Hospitals, and of the spirit with which it is inspired.

10. We have to thank the proprietors of the "Daily Mail" for the grant of free space at the Ideal Home Exhibition for a King's Fund stand, which enabled various activities of the London Voluntary Hospitals to be effectively shown to the public. A number of hospitals sent exhibits, and students from the Middlesex Hospital conducted demonstrations almost daily. One of the most interesting features was a demonstration arranged by the Blood Transfusion Service under the supervision of Mr. P. L. Oliver. Large crowds were attracted to the stand throughout the period of the Exhibition, and suitable literature was distributed.

11. We were again able to present, in May and June, at the London School of Economics, an attractive programme of Mock Trials, in which politicians, authors, leading actresses, film stars, sportsmen, and racing motorists appeared in answer to various charges of a humorous character, the prosecution being in the hands of persons whose names are well known to the public, while the part of judge was taken on each occasion by some prominent member of the Bar. Mr. Philip Guedalla again acted as chairman of the Organising Committee, and our thanks are largely due to him for the success of the undertaking.

12. The lectures to school and other suitable audiences were continued by the Educational Sub-Committee, under the chairmanship of Dr. Lazarus-Barlow. The total number of lectures given was 60, as compared with 54 in the previous year and 46 in 1932. There was also a considerable increase in the number of requests for parties of elder scholars to be allowed to visit a hospital, to see for themselves the work that is being done. While some of the lecturers have been compelled to discontinue their services owing to increasing pressure of work, several new speakers—doctors, nurses, and hospital administrators—have most kindly stepped into the breach. The letters we have received leave no doubt of the interest aroused by these lectures and visits, or of the impression made on the minds of the audiences. In several cases unsolicited donations were sent to the Fund with a covering letter expressing appreciation. It is calculated that altogether the lectures were heard by nearly 6,000 persons. Special thanks are due to the Editor of the "L.C.C. Gazette," who was good enough to insert an announcement of the lectures for the information of schools in the London County Council area.

13. We have to express our indebtedness to the Postmaster-General for including the King's Fund Film, with necessary adaptation, in the G.P.O. Film Library. It will be listed in the catalogue for 1935, and we have been promised periodical statements regarding its circulation. Two 16-mm. copies of the original film have also been printed, and these have already been used on several occasions in conjunction with lantern-slides. It is hoped to make increasing use of the film as the number of schools possessing projectors continues to grow.

14. During the first six months of the year the Miniature Hospital was on tour in Scotland and the North of England, the proceeds being divided between the King's Fund and the exhibiting hospital in each case. It proved one of the chief attractions of the Arts and Crafts Exhibition at Edinburgh, where it was inspected by 15,969 people. At the opening of the Memorial Hospital Exhibition at Liverpool, the Secretary of the Merseyside Hospitals Council said his Council had reason to be grateful for the interest aroused by the "wonderful model," which had enabled them to secure a number of new friends. From September to December the Model was exhibited at various representative stores in the London suburbs, and during the Christmas holidays at Messrs. Whiteley's, Bayswater, where it was again visited by H.M. The Queen. A revised edition of the descriptive brochure was issued in July, and copies are being sold at exhibitions at threepence each.

15. Through the courtesy of the Masters and Wardens we were able to arrange a series of conducted tours of the Halls of the Mercers', Merchant Taylors', and Drapers' Companies, in aid of the King's Fund, the visitors being received on each occasion by the Master, Warden, or other representative of the Company, and entertained to tea. These visits were much appreciated, and it is hoped that they have been the means of securing new friends for the Fund. Mr. Walter Bell also conducted three parties over the Tower of London, including

the King's House, by special permission of the Resident Governor. The demand for these visits was greater than on any previous occasion.

16. Many assurances having been received from the Press as to the usefulness of the printed list of hospital representatives supplied to them in 1932, the Publicity Sub-Committee undertook to revise the list and bring it up to date. In response to a request received from the Press and passed on to the hospitals, a number of hospitals supplied the name of a representative willing to answer inquiries outside office hours. In return, the Press Association authorised us to supply hospitals with the name of a member of the staff specialising in hospital matters, and with whom the hospitals might find it advantageous to communicate should they have information they desired to give to the Press. The pamphlet, "Why a Modern Hospital Costs So Much," was also revised for distribution at exhibitions and on other appropriate occasions.

17. The Committee have to record with deep regret the death of Sir Nigel Playfair, who had been a member since the Committee was first constituted, and had taken a leading part in organising the entertainments at the London School of Economics in aid of the Fund for several years in succession. He was, in fact, the originator of the Mock Trials, which have proved so great an attraction.

18. Death also deprived us during the year of other valued friends and supporters: Sir Ernest Wild, K.C., and Mr. Joy, K.C., both of whom had acted as judges in the Mock Trials on more than one occasion; Miss Mercier, Principal of Whitelands Training College, who had served on the Educational Sub-Committee and had been particularly active in arranging lectures for her students in connexion with our scheme; and Mr. John Cooke, who gave much of his time to the Fund as a voluntary worker, and was of the greatest assistance in the distribution of programmes and literature relating to the various functions. Since his death, Mrs. Cooke has very generously sent a cheque for £25 as a donation to the Fund in memory of her husband.

19. The Rev. C. L. Cresswell, Chaplain of the Chapel Royal, Savoy, and President of the Paddington and St. Marylebone Rotary Club, has joined the Committee. Mr. Cresswell was formerly Chaplain of St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, and is now on its Board of Management. His knowledge of hospital affairs, as well as his varied experience, should be of great value to the Committee.

20. We are confident that the only way to ensure adequate and systematic support for the work of the Voluntary Hospitals is by spreading knowledge and arousing interest in what they are doing. The mere statement that money is required is a very poor plea in itself, and no doubt many appeals have fallen on deaf ears because, without adequate knowledge, there can be no enthusiasm and no real sense of obligation. We have ample evidence of the good effect produced by the Miniature Hospital, the King's Fund Film, and the illustrated lectures we

have been able to arrange. As a result, there can be no doubt that more and more people are beginning to grasp what the hospitals mean to them, and to realise their individual responsibility for taking some share in the cost.

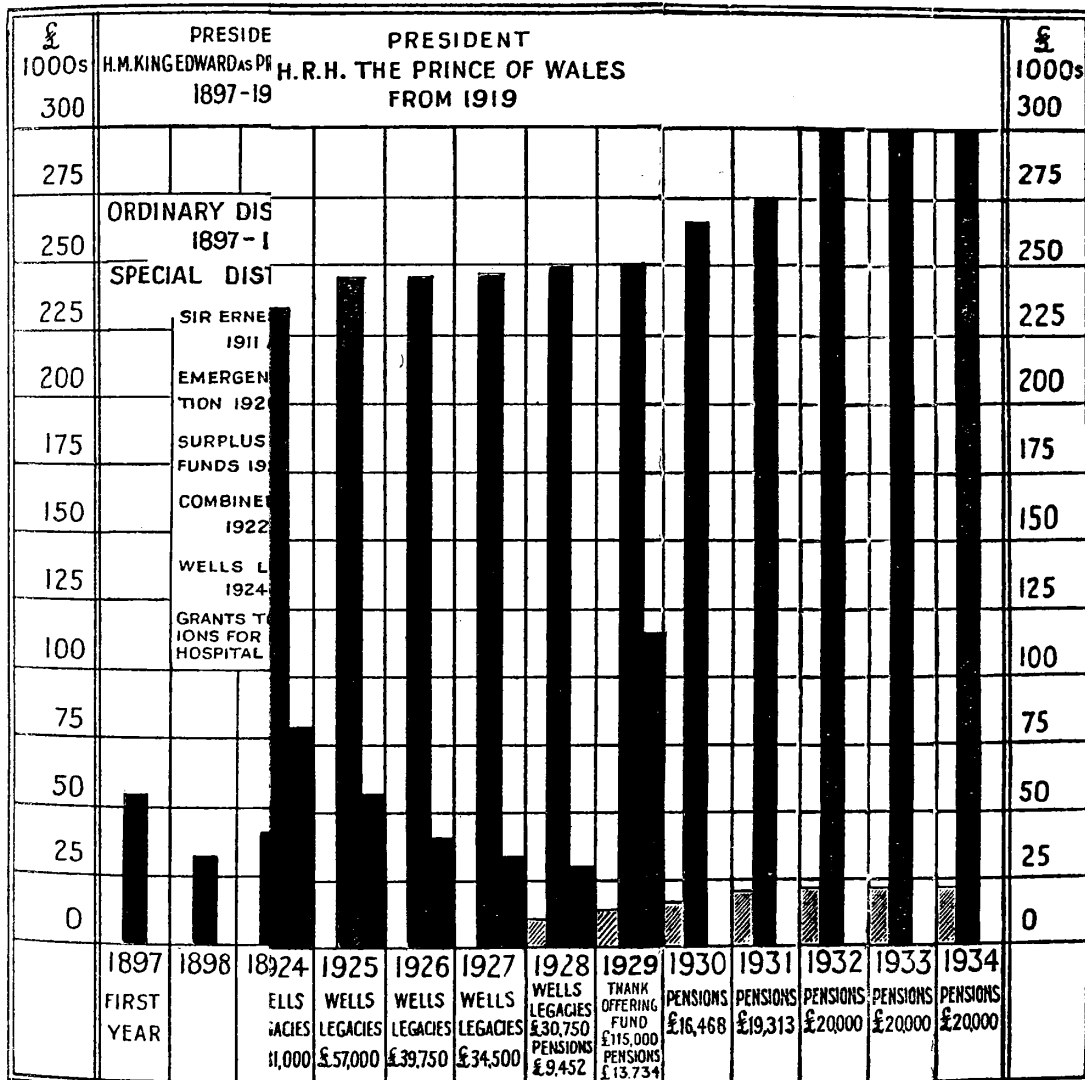

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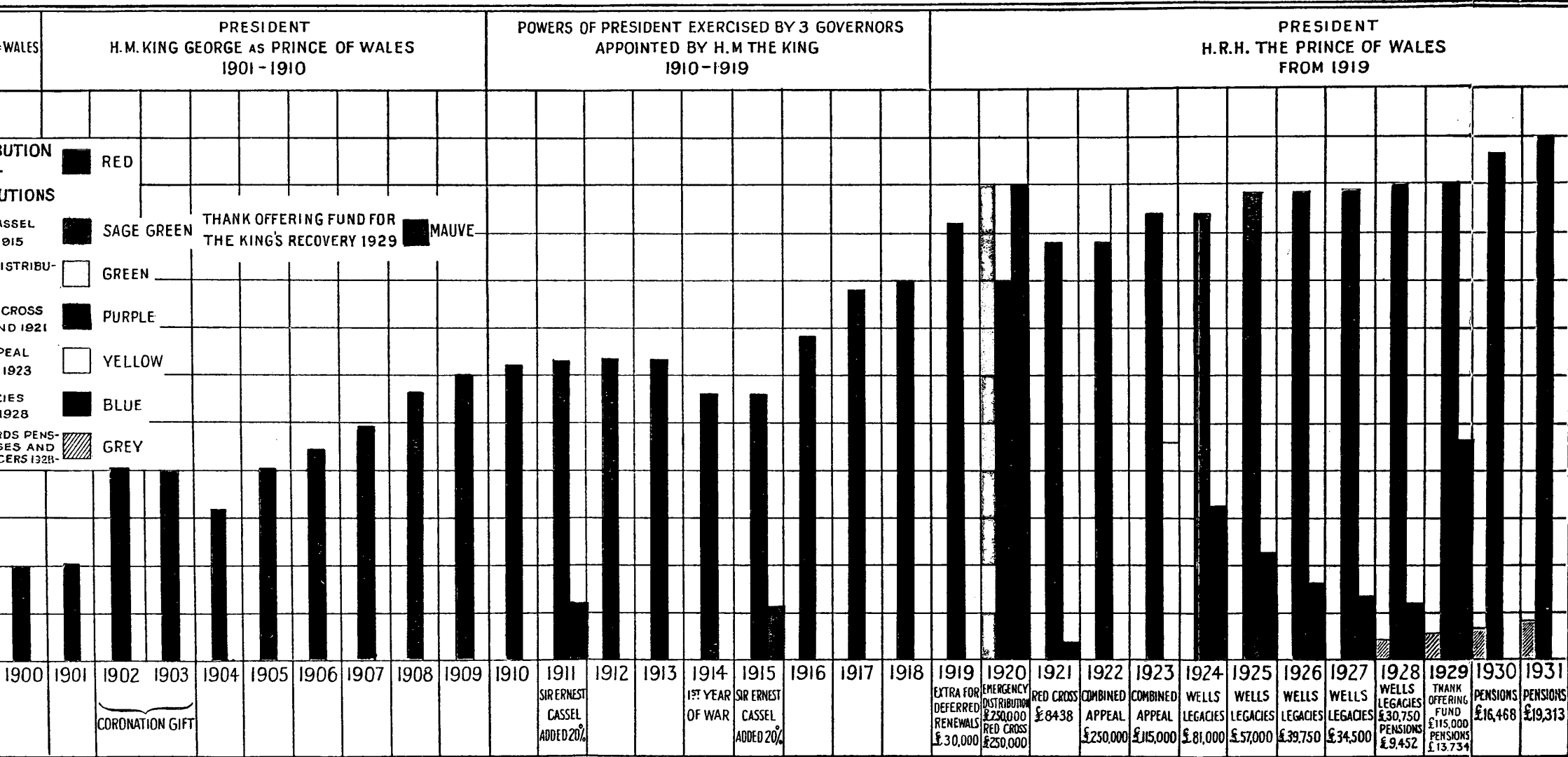
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TOTAL ANNUAL GRANTS

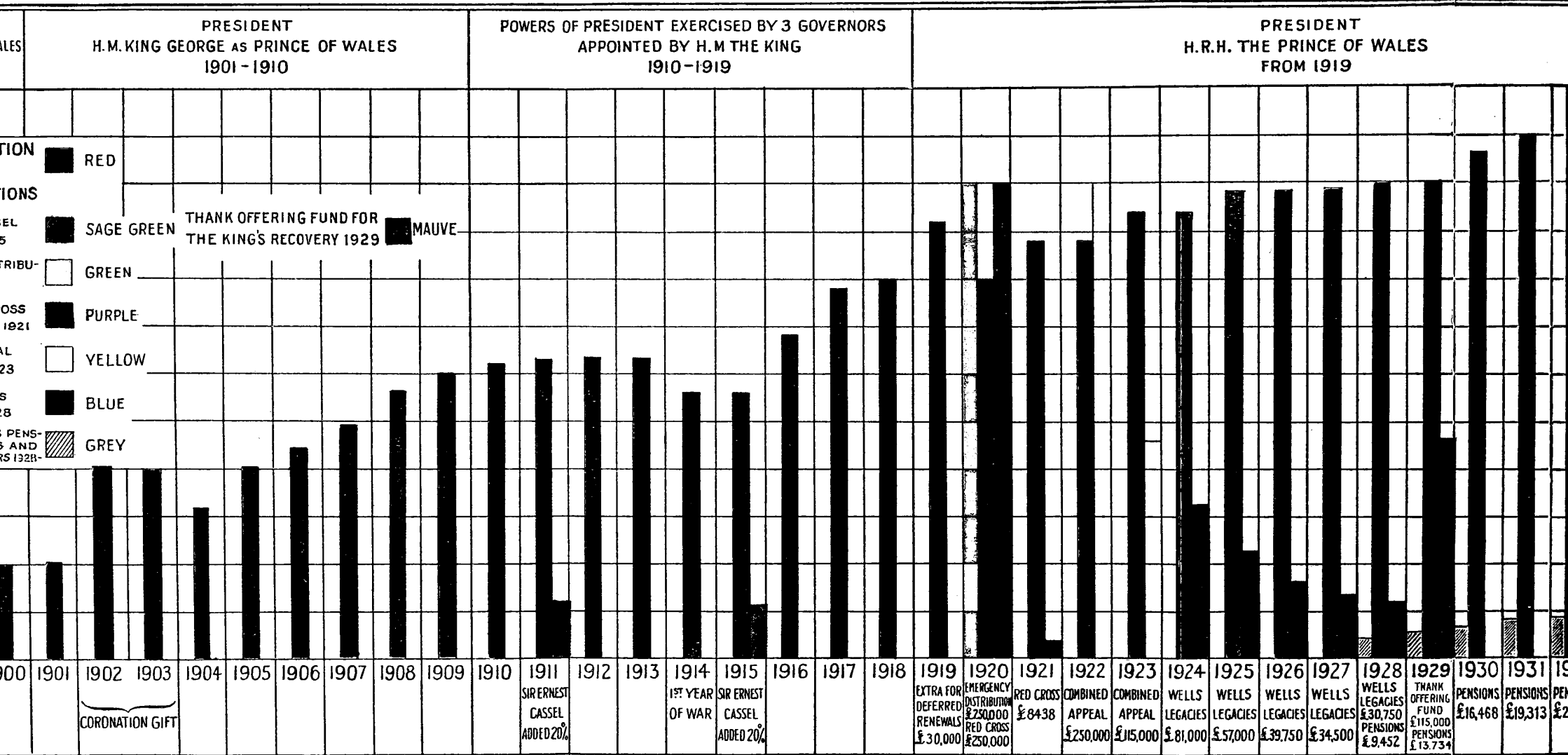

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January, 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on page 88).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London (G.P.O. Box 465A), 10 Old Jewry, E.C. 2.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-eight years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £8,021,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1934 being £300,000, besides £20,000 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £544,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-six years, the contribution in 1934 being £20,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

A Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, is prescribed, thus facilitating comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary", which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these Annual Reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications on page 88.)

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours, Out-patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting. An Out-patient Arrangements Committee has been appointed to assist in carrying out the recommendations in the last mentioned Report (see page 89).

By means of a standing Parliamentary Committee the Fund assists to secure the interests of the voluntary hospitals during the consideration by Parliament of any bills affecting the hospital system.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1934, being 1,871 at 107 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit in 1929-30, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr in 1929 and another £10,000 in 1935, and £37,000 received in 1929 through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

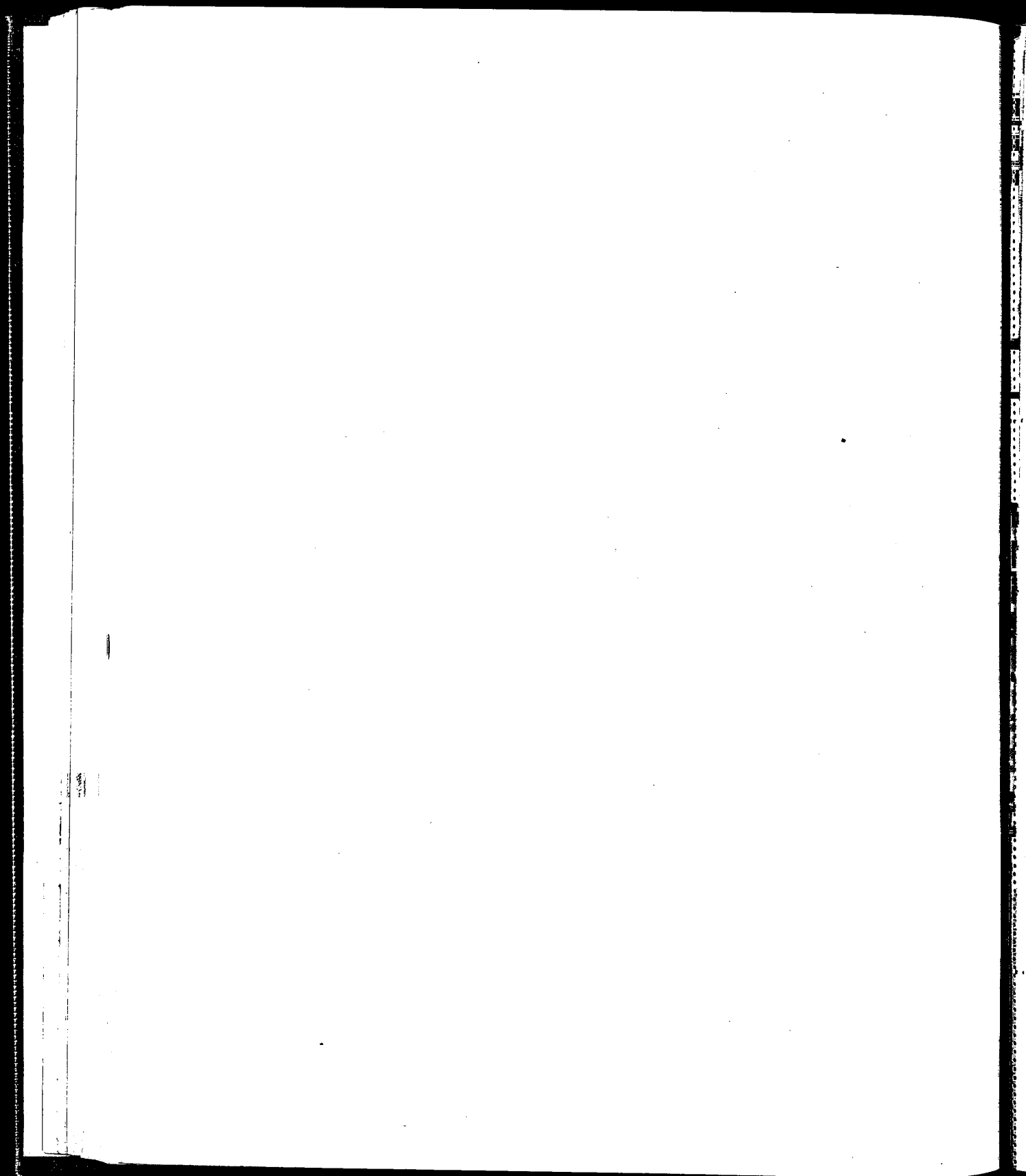

INCOME TAX AND SUR-TAX ON ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

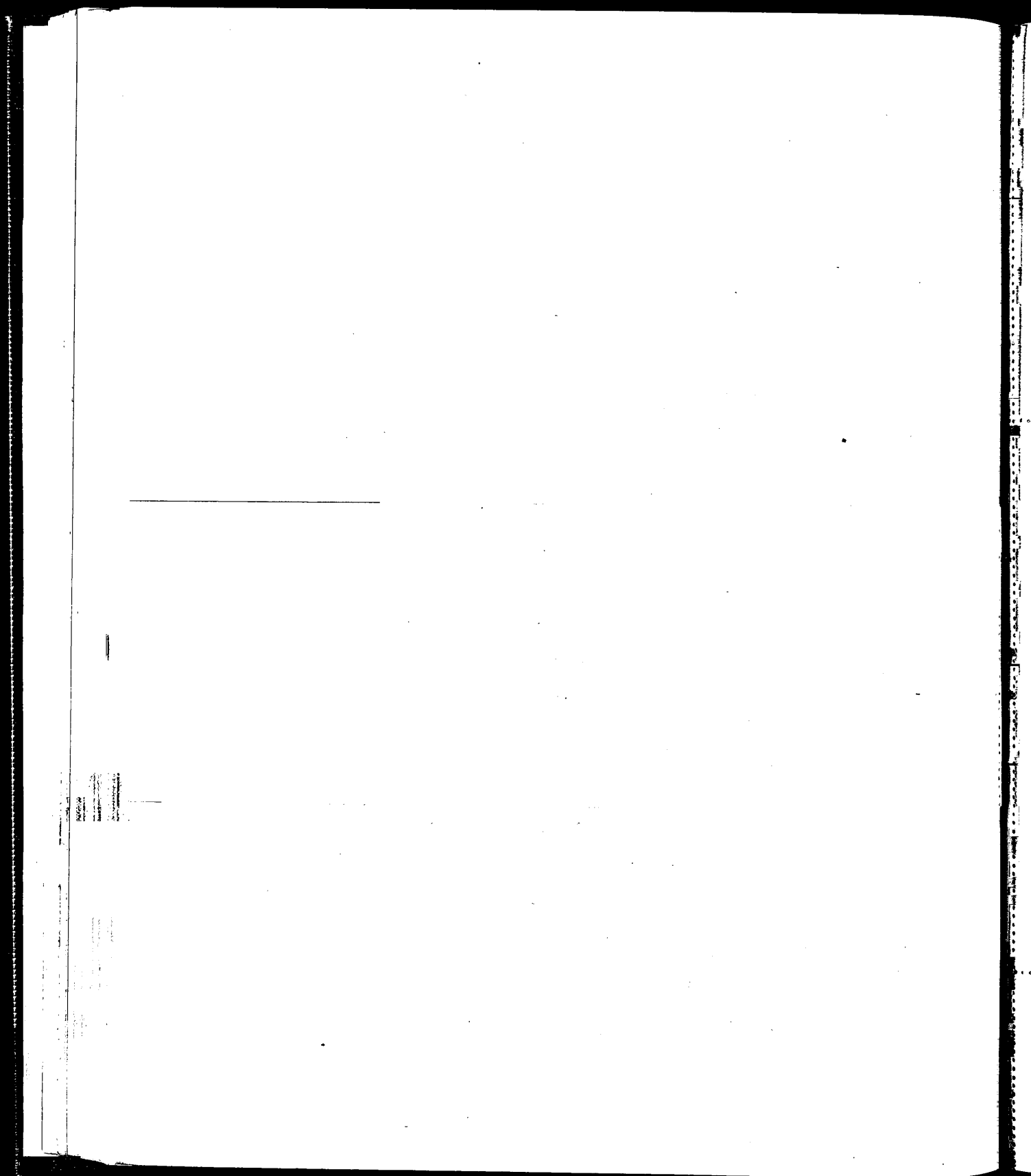

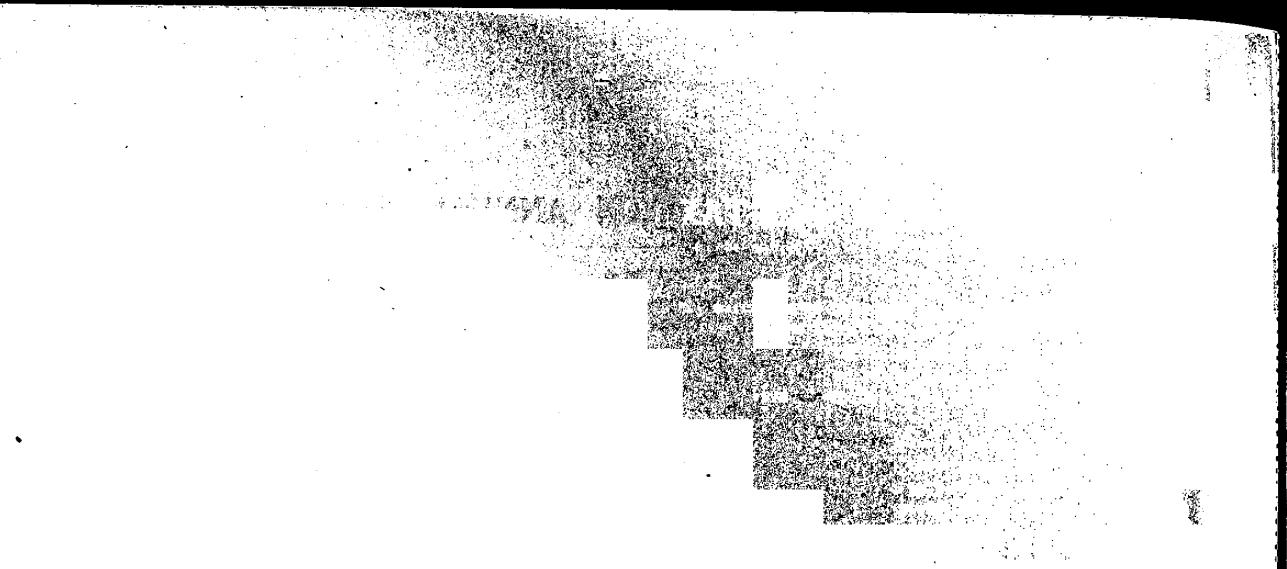
