

THE ETHNIC COMPOSITION OF THE POPULATION OF LONDON

It is difficult to obtain accurate and detailed information about the racial and ethnic composition of London's population. British Censuses have never included questions on ethnicity but have relied instead on information about place of birth and parental birthplace. A question on race or ethnic origin was to be included in the 1981 Census but was abandoned because it was not universally acceptable. Thus the 1981 Census yields information based on place of birth which, although not ideal, gives some idea of the sizes and location of London's minority ethnic populations.

In most boroughs, people of New Commonwealth and Pakistani origin form the largest proportion of those born outside the UK and Irish Republic, as shown in diagram I. For the purpose of the diagram, the 'New Commonwealth and Pakistan' (NCWP) group of countries has been divided into three subgroups: Caribbean and African countries; India, Bangladesh and Pakistan; and a third group which includes Cyprus, Malta, Gibralta, Sri Lanka, Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaysia. An editorial in Population Trends (no.28, 1982) makes the following points about the population of NCWP origin in Britain.

- a) The population of NCWP origin is strongly concentrated in urban areas, indeed in inner cities currently, perhaps 40 per cent live in the GLC area
- b) Whereas at the national level roughly 50 per cent of the NCWP population are Asians from the Indian subcontinent and Africa, 30 per cent from the West Indies and 20 per cent from elsewhere, including persons originating from Africa, the Far East and the Mediterranean, there are considerable variations at the subnational level because of residential clustering of particular ethnic minorities.

The editorial also points out that, from the Census, the best indicator of the size of the NCWP population is the number of persons in households headed by an NCWP-born person. It is estimated that this definition can be expected to cover 90 per cent of the total population of NCWP origin, although it does not give the complete picture. This information for the London boroughs is shown in diagram II, and is likely to give a better estimate of the proportion of people of Caribbean origin, because those born in this country are included.

Both diagrams clearly show that the boroughs of Kensington and Chelsea, Westminster and Camden differ from the usual pattern of the population of NCWP origin constituting the largest proportion of those born abroad. The populations of these boroughs are so cosmopolitan that a large number of countries of birth are represented, most of which are classified in the 'other foreign countries' category.

The information in diagram II can be compared with information based on the 1978 National Dwelling and Housing Survey, which used a different approach to collecting information about ethnicity. People were asked to describe their ethnic origin and the results are shown in diagram III. The pattern is broadly similar to that obtained from Census data.





DIAGRAM II



% of Borough Population giving their ethnic group as other than 'white' in 1978.





The following demographic differences between minority ethnic groups and the majority or white population are listed in 'A social review of Greater London' published by the GLC in 1980.

- (i) Age structure: it is estimated that only 2 per cent of the population of New Commonwealth ethnic origin is over 65, compared with 13 per cent of the whole population of London, and that 34 per cent is under 14 compared with 21 per cent of all London. The New Commonwealth groups are therefore significantly 'younger' than the majority population, reflecting the period when many arrived in the 1960s as young immigrants.
- Birth Rate: The fertility rate among women of Asian, (ii) American, and African New Commonwealth ethnic origin is estimated to be between 40 and 60 per cent higher depending on the area of origin than for the population at large, although the absolute number of such births has been falling at the same rate as for white population. For women of the Mediterranean New Commonwealth the rate is about 10 per cent higher than for the whole population. This circumstance, combined with the high incidence of women of childbearing age in most minority groups explains the fact that 21.4 per cent of all births in London in 1975 were to mothers born in the New Commonwealth and Pakistan.
- (iii) Household sizes: The households of the ethnic minorities in London tend to be larger than average: 30 per cent of West Indian households and 40 per cent of those from India/Pakistan/Bangladesh consist of five or more persons compared with 9 per cent for the white population.
- (iv) Housing circumstances: Different minority groups show different patterns of housing utilization, influenced by cultural factors, by household size, and by their socioeconomic composition. Sharing of dwellings and of amenities within dwellings show a higher incidence among all the minority groups than among the population as a whole, and they tend also to occupy their dwellings more densely. They are also significantly over-represented in the private rented furnished sector, which may in part be explained by their relatively recent arrival.

These differences clearly have implications for the health of minority ethnic groups and for their use of health services.

LIST OF LOCAL PROJECTS AND INITIATIVES

BARKING

BARNET

- 2.1 Stop rickets campaign. Co-ordinator: Liz Merrick, Health Education Unit (346 9371). The campaign has provided a focus for other issues.
- 2.2 Health education staff are also working with postnatal support groups.

BEXLEY

- 3.1 Bexley CRE employs a worker, Miss Kam Cheema, to look into the health needs of, and provision for, the Asian community. Roy Tindle works with the Vietnamese community and is also involved in health matters.
- 3.2 Bexley CHC works closely with the CRE.

BRENT

- 4.1 Brent CHC published the report 'Black People and the Health Service'. 1
- 4.2 There is a sickle cell information, screening and counselling centre at Willesden General Hospital (459 1292 ext. 235).
- 4.3 The Sickle Cell Society is based in Brent (451 3293) see page 28.
- 4.4 Social workers for the West Indian community have produced posters and leaflets on mental illness in the black community and are setting up groups. Social Services Department, 16 High Street, London NW10 (965 9021).
- 4.5 Harlesden Asian Women's Group takes an interest in health issues and has established an Asian women's refuge (765 2916).
- 4.6 Robyn Green at the Age Concern Brent, 379 Willesden High Road, NW10 (451 3426) has a special remit to look into the health needs of elderly people from minority ethnic groups.

- 4.7 Ann Casey at Brent and Harrow Health Education Dept. (459 2251 ext. 47) and Frances Weinreich of Islington Adult Education Institute have developed a project entitled 'Beating the Language Barrier' to help health workers to communicate with patients who do not speak English. A pilot study was undertaken in Brent, involving health visitors and other staff, and a manual for use by NHS staff is being compiled.
- 4.8 Brent Irish Advisory Service, 9 Brondesbury Road, NW6, has produced a directory 'Irish in Britain', price £1.00, which gives details of a wide range of services for Irish people in Britain. It covers social and community associations, arts and culture, commercial enterprises and sources of information and advice on legal matters, health, housing, education and employment.

BROMLEY

CAMDEN

- 6.1 University College Hospital provides a screening service for thalassaemia.
- 6.2 Hampstead CHC has set up a woking party to look at ethnic minority issues.
- 6.3 South Camden CHC (now incorporated in Bloomsbury CHC) reviewed current services and Area policy in 'Profile of Health Services in South Camden'.²
- 6.4 Bengali interpreters are employed by Bloomsbury DHA to work in two family health clinics (Somers Town and Province of Natal) and at University College Obstetric Hospital.
- 6.5 The Bloomsbury, Hampstead, Islington Health Education Service, 159-167 Upper Street, N1 (226 4488) has taken some initiatives to increase staff awareness about the needs of ethnic groups. They have also produced a variety of material in Bengali on feeding babies; leaflets on bottle and breast feeding in Turkish and Italian; and leaflets in Chinese on dental health. Reports of seminars are also available.
- 6.6 The work of West Hampstead Asian Women's group, 12 Graymead, Abbey Road, NW8 (328 4015) is reported in 'Good Practices in Mental Health in Camden', 3 available from Hampstead CHC.
- 6.7 Camden Community Law Centre (485 6672) is organising the 'No Pass Laws to Health' campaign. The campaign has produced leaflets in several languages explaining changes in the rules about 'non-residents' eligibility for free NHS treatment.
- 6.8 Camden CCR employs a Bengali-speaking health worker. She interprets in clinics and gives basic health advice as well as accompanying women to hospital.

6.9 The CCR initiated discussions with officers of Camden and Islington Area Health Authority on the needs of ethnic minority groups. This has been followed up by representations from the CCRs in Camden and Westminster to Bloomsbury DHA requesting discussion on equal opportunities policy and the needs of the Bengali, Chinese and Afro-Caribbean communities.

CITY OF LONDON

7.1 The Social Services Department (606 3030) has established a day care scheme for under-fives and linked to this discussions are being held with parents on topics including health care.

CROYDON

- 8.1 Croydon CRC has set up a subcommittee to consider health and welfare needs and how well these are being met by services.
- 8.2 Croydon Race and Community Unit organises 'Helpline' (688 0515), a contact point run by West Indians. A health panel advises on health matters.

EALING

- 9.1 Services in Ealing are organised to meet a number of special needs, in particular those of the Asian community. Maternity and child health services offer appropriate screening tests and paediatric specialists. A new clinic has recently opened in Southall (843 9999) where Urdu and Punjabi-speaking interpreters assist health visitors and district nurses.
- 9.2 The Health Education Unit (570 7715) has developed a range of materials for minority ethnic groups.
- 9.3 The Social Services Department runs a day centre for elderly Asians which has strict religious rules. The joint health care planning team for the elderly incudes representatives of minority ethnic groups.
- 9.4 Ealing CRC has a health and welfare committee which meets every month and takes up matters of concern with appropriate professionals.
- 9.5 The National Association of Asian Youth (574 1325) is involved in the rickets campaign and wider health issues.
- 9.6 At Southall Rights (571 4920) Anita Sharda gives advice to women. There is a black health workers and patients group concerned with mental health and other issues (see page 25).

9.7 The Sisters of the Resurrection, 85 Gordon Road, W5 (998 8954) visit elderly Polish people and others who speak only Polish.

ENFIELD

- 10.1 Enfield and Haringey Health Education Department (803 1444) mounted a Vitamin D campaign which involved working with local groups. A resource pack for health professionals has also been produced.
- 10.2 A subcommittee of Enfield CRC is looking at screening and counselling services for sickle cell disease and thalassaemia.

GREENWICH

- 11.1 Greenwich Social Services Department employs four social workers for minority ethnic communities: 3 Asian and one West Indian. Ms Sadish Kanwar, senior social worker, (854 8888) takes a special interest in mental health.
- 11.2 The India Centre, 6 Thomas Street, SE18 (855 4415), is an advice and welfare centre run by Mr and Mrs Flora. A women's group is based at the Centre.

HACKNEY

- 12.1 Three women workers, two Asian, one Turkish, are employed to act as advocates/health educators/advisers for women using maternity services at the Mothers' Hospital. This is a joint CRE/CHC project, described in the article 'Advising Asian Mothers'.4
- 12.2 Ms Cora Woolcock has been employed by City and Hackney Health Authority to develop and run a sickle cell centre in conjunction with Dr A Stephens, Consultant Haematologist, at St Leonard's Hospital (739 8484 ext. 369).
- 12.3 A multi-ethnic steering group meets six-weekly and brings together representatives from the health service, CHC and community to discuss and stimulate action on problems connected with race and religion in the district.
- 12.4 Halal food is available in local hospitals.
- 12.5 An antenatal support group for Turkish women meets every Wednesday morning at the Mothers' Hospital. A postnatal support and general women's health group meets every Wednesday afternoon at Barton House Clinic, Albion Road, N16, and every Monday afternoon at Somerford Grove Health Centre, N16. The groups are organised by Iffet Renda and Hafize Ece (985 6661, bleep), who are associated with the Turkish Education Group, which is also active in Haringey and Islington (see pages 12, 13 and 29).

HAMMERSMITH

- 13.1 North Hammersmith CHC (now part of Hammersmith & Fulham CHC) has campaigned generally on welfare rights and the uptake of benefits, such as attendance allowance.
- 13.2 A women's group on welfare rights and health was established by the health education officer in South Hammersmith for women used as interpreters and others. Joint meetings were held with community health staff to exchange views. Although the group is not meeting at present, HEO Maggie Jee (385 1047) is hoping to reestablish it.
- 13.3 Jan Cornish, Senior Health Education Officer for Hammersmith Special Health District (992 2277 ext. 48) has set up a number of in-service training courses for receptionists and other hospital and community staff using training packages prepared by Alix Henley on Asian names in records and Asian foods and diets.
- 13.4 The Health Education Unit works with a number of local community groups, such as the Asia group and the Ebony and Livingstone groups on the White City Estate.
- 13.5 The Health Education Unit holds numerous resources for work with minority ethnic groups.
- 13.6 A health visitor has been specially appointed to work with minority ethnic clients at Westway Clinic (743 1738).
- 13.7 At Hammersmith and Fulham CRE, Mr Siddiqi, Asian Liaison Officer, is involved in a joint project with the Health Education Unit focussing on work with Asian mothers and children.
- 13.8 The CRE also provides an interpreting service. This is free for individuals who need help or advice about health, housing, social services, etc. The interpreters' co-ordinator is Malika Tuzani (736 8133).

HARINGEY

- 14.1 Haringey CRC and CHC have jointly discussed health policy for ethnic minorities in the borough. The CHC's report 'Inequalities and Health: A district action programme' makes a number of proposals.
- 14.2 In 1980 the CHC and CRC set up a Joint Working Party on Vitamin D Deficiency with wide representation. The report has been circulated and one of the recommendations, a health education campaign, was taken up the the Area Health Authority. The campaign is coordinated by the Health Education Department (803 1444).

- 14.3 Haringey CHC also published 'The Rickets Report: why do British Asians get rickets?'6
- 14.4 The CHC has published a (free) report on 'Hospital Food for Ethnic Minority Patients' and is continuing work in this area.
- 14.5 Haringey Greek Cypriot Women's Health Group has been established by liaison workers from the CRC (Dina Kleanthous) and Social Services Department (Praxoulla Charalambous) at the Cypriot Community Centre, Earlham Grove, N22. One of the aims is to produce more suitable health education material for Greek Cypriot women.
- 14.6 A support group for Turkish parents of handicapped children has been established as a joint project of the CRC and the Turkish Education Group. The Turkish community worker at the CRC is Ayshe Behjet. She is also involved in a Turkish Education Group Project with Iffet Renda, setting up antenatal and postnatal support groups at a local clinic. The Turkish Education Group is also active in Hackney and Islington (see pages 10, 13 and 29).
- 14.7 The Organisation for Sickle Cell Anaemia Research (OSCAR) is based in the borough at 200a High Road, N22 (880 3300) (see page 28).
- 14.8 The Thalassaemia Society is based in the borough at 107 Nightingale Lane, N8 (348 0437) and provides information, counselling and support for affected families (see page 29).

HARROW

- 15.1 Harrow CHC established links with English as a second language classes and provided speakers on health issues.
- 15.2 Ann Casey at Brent and Harrow Health Education Dept. (459 2251 ext. 47) and Frances Weinreich of Islington Adult Education Institute have developed a project called 'Beating the Language Barrier' to help health workers communicate with patients who do not speak English. A pilot study was undertaken in Harrow and a manual for use by NHS staff is being compiled.

HAVERING

HILLINGDON

17.1 Hillingdon CHC has looked into the treatment of immigrants passing through the Health Control Unit at Heathrow Airport and has published 'Heathrow Health Control Unit: A report on screening procedures'.8

- 17.2 The Bangladeshi women's group takes an interest in health issues and has invited health visitors to speak. Further information from David Wilson at Hillingdon CRC.
- 17.3 Asian food has been the subject of local initiatives: Halal food has been introduced into hospitals and staff training schemes have been launched.

HOUNSLOW

- 18.1 The Health Education Service (570 7715) has launched a number of campaigns, including a campaign against rickets and has a variety of materials available.
- 18.2 Hounslow CRC (570 1168) has taken up a number of issues including food in hospitals and has run multidisciplinary courses on working with Asian patients.
- 18.3 The CRC is also establishing an interpreting service, with a co-ordinator for a team of trained volunteers.
- 18.4 The Social Services Department (570 7728) has obtained Section II funds to employ a social worker in a hospital team.

ISLINGTON

- 19.1 Islington CHC has a working party on ethnic minorities' health which was established in 1979. It includes representatives of minority ethnic groups in the borough.
- 19.2 A walk-in sickle cell counselling and screening service, run by health visitors, is available at Goodinge Health Centre every Wednesday morning. Further details from Barbara Sisley (278 2323 ext. 249).
- 19.3 The Health Education Unit (226 4488) has been involved in a number of initiatives and has a variety of material available (see page 8, CAMDEN).
- 19.4 The Turkish Education Group works closely with the CHC and has been involved in translating leaflets. (Ertanch Hidayettin, Turkish Community Worker, London Borough of Islington, 359 2173).
 - Enise Yaylali (254 3654) has established support groups for isolated Turkish women.
 - The Turkish Education Group is also active in Hackney and Haringey (see pages 10, 12 and 29).
- 19.6 Community Education Trust, North Islington Welfare Centre, Manor Gardens, N7 (Administrator: Margaret Billet, 272 4231) takes an interest in health and is involved with a number of local projects, including a day centre for elderly people.

- 19.7 A Bengali women's group meets twice a week at the Thornhill Neighbourhood Project (Bilquis Islam, 278 9500).
- 19.8 Islington Adult Education Institute has initiated a number of schemes involving language teaching. (Language organiser: Helen Bishop, 272 6081).

Frances Weinreich, Home Tutor Organiser, visits the maternity wards at the Whittington Hospital and the City of London Maternity Hospital to encourage women and their families who do not speak English to take advantage of local English classes. She also gives lessons to women who are in hospital for any length of time. It is hoped to extend this initiative to other wards at the Whittington.

The Institute has also established a link with an antenatal class at the Whittington Hospital at which English is taught by an ESL teacher.

The Institute offers a course in Bengali for health workers and others.

KENSINGTON & CHELSEA

- 20.1 A student, Lynne Griffiths, was attached to Paddington and North Kensington Community Health Council for eight months in 1982. She has investigated communication between women whose first language is not English and the antenatal services, and a report on her work will be available from the CHC in the autumn of 1982. The CHC Annual Report has parts translated into Spanish, Portugese and Moroccan Arabic. The CHC hopes to compile a comprehensive guide to health care facilities in Paddington and North Kensington during 1982-3 which will be translated into languages spoken in the District.
- 20.2 Officers of Victoria DHA have established a working group to consider the needs of the ethnic groups in the district and service provison.
- 20.3 The Kensington, Chelsea and Westminster Health Education Department (229 9001) has produced reports on migrant workers and on the North Kensington Moroccan project. 10
- 20.4 Victoria CHC carried out a survey of antenatal care and found problems for women from minority ethnic groups, which are described in the report 'Maybe I didn't ask'. I
- 20.5 Earl's Court Migrant Workers Group (351 3210) have made representations on the issue of eligibility of overseas visitors for NHS treatment.
- 20.6 Victoria CHC, with Kensington and Chelsea Mental Health Association, has published 'Good Practices in Mental Health in Kensington and Chelsea 12 which includes a study of bereavement in the West Indian community.

KINGSTON

LAMBETH

- 22.1 Lambeth Sickle Cell Information and Counselling Centre has been funded by the Inner City Partnership and will be based at 2 Stockwell Road, SW9 from January 1983. Further details Marian McTair (274 6222 ext. 747).
- 22.2 Lambeth CCR employs two family workers, one Asian and one Afro-Caribbean, who take an interest in health issues.
- 22.3 Stockwell Health Project c/o 460 Wandsworth Road, SW8 (622 9455) is taking a number of initiatives on health care antenatal services and translation of leaflets. See the report of the project's work: Stockwell Health Project After Two Years' 13
- 22.4 The Asian Community Action Group, 15 Bedford, SW4 (733 7494/5) employs a worker, Mrs Nirveen Din, who takes a special interest in women's health issues. She works with groups of women and has produced a series of leaflets on antenatal care in the five main Asian languages.
- 22.5 The group also produced the report 'Asians' Sheltered Residential Accommodation' 14 and have developed, in conjuction with Solon Housing Association, the ASRA project which assists elderly and handicapped members of the Asian community by the provision of sheltered accommodation.

LEWISHAM

- 23.1 Lewisham CHC has established a community health project in Catford. This is described in the report 'Closer to the people'. 15 As part of this project a community survey is being undertaken to discover what people think about health and illness and their views on a variety of health issues.
- 23.2 There is a local OSCAR group (see page 28).
- 23.3 Voluntary Action Lewisham (690 4343) has taken some initiatives on racism awareness training.
- 23.4 Tony McBride, community worker with the Albany Health Project, The Albany, Douglas Way, SE8 (629 0231) is involved in many local health issues and activities.

MERTON

24.1 Merton, Sutton and Wandsworth Health Education Service (673 7799) has taken a number of initiatives on ethnic minorities' health; keeps information on voluntary and statutory services in Asian languages and a comprehensive list of Asian language teaching material.

24.2 Wandsworth and East Merton Health District set up a working party on the provision of services to ethnic minority groups in the district. The report is entitled 'Ethnic minorities and the health service'. 16

NEWHAM

- 25.1 A child health booklet is given to all Newham mothers to record their child's progress. A leaflet to go with this has been produced in Urdu, Hindi, Gujerati and Punjabi.
- 25.2 The borough employs a community liaison officer, Diana Hill (472 1430), who takes an interest in health issues.
- 25.3 Newham Age Concern (555 9049) takes a strong interest in ethnic minority issues.
- 25.4 The Senior Citizen's Welfare Association has established a day centre for elderly Asian people. Further details Maureen Aves (534 4545 ext. 219).
- 25.5 A community dietitian, Mrs Shukla, is based at Lord Lister Health Centre (555 5331), where she works with Asian patients. Mrs Shukla also gives talks to community groups and clubs.
- 25.6 Pushpa Lata at Newham Mental Health Association (555 9049) is a mental health worker with special responsibility for ethnic minorities.
- 25.7 Carolyn Sikorski (534 4545) is a community worker with minority ethnic groups and is involved with health issues.
- 25.8 The North and East London branch of the Sickle Cell Society is based in the borough, c/o Newham Voluntary Council, Durning Hall, Earlham Grove, Forest Gate, E7 (Marva Rollins 478 5351). (Also see page 28).

REDBRIDGE

26.1 The Health Education Service (553 0813) has developed an Asian Health Project, co-ordinator: Lee Adams. Meetings have been held with Asian organisations and health workers to establish priorities for health education activities. As part of the project so far, seminars on nutrition and the Asian community have been held and these are continuing; health eduction material has been produced; workshops have been held for NHS staff on the language barrier in health education; and an information booklet for NHS staff and an Urdu phrase book are being prepared. There is also a proposal to train Asian people to undertake health education with their own community.

- 26.2 Redbridge CRC holds meetings with the District Management Team to discuss issues concerning health care for minority ethnic groups. They have discussed interpreting services; recruitment of nurses with language skills; hospital food (halal and vegetarian food is available on request and patients are to be informed about this); and the need for training of NHS staff.
- 26.3 Redbridge CHC has looked at toilet facilities in local hospitals and is pressing for provision of bidets in the same place as toilets. The CHC is also looking at ways of increasing in-service training about the needs of minority ethnic groups.

RICHMOND

SOUTHWARK

SUTTON

29.1 Merton, Sutton and Wandsworth Health Education Service (673 7799) has taken a number of initiatives on ethnic minorities' health; keeps information on voluntary and statutory services in Asian languages and a comprehensive list of Asian language teaching material.

TOWER HAMLETS

- 30.1 A Bengali Health Advisory Service is provided at Toynbee Hall (547 3633). This is described in 'Health Advisory Services and the Immigrant'. 17
- 30.2 Interpreters for the London Hospital (Mile End) are temporary employees of the Medical Records Department. this scheme is described in the paper 'Breaking the language barrier'. 18
- 30.3 The Maternity Services Liaison Scheme (377 8725) was established by a committee of local people and a team of five women workers are employed: three Bengali, one Somali and an administrator (Liz Smart). Their work involves befriending, escorting and supporting women throughout their pregnancy and during the first six weeks after birth.
- 30.4 The Bethnal Green Community Health Network is based at Oxford House (739 9093). The community worker, Christine Smith, is involved in a number of local health activities.
- 30.5 The Health Education Department (981 0041) and the City of London Polytechnic have obtained funds to employ a Bengali-speaking health educator.

WALTHAM FOREST

- 31.1 'Asian Mothers Project', an antenatal health education project undertaken by health visitors is described in a report of the same title. 19
- 31.2 The Health Education Service (553 0813) has developed an Asian Health Project, co-ordinator: Lee Adams. This project has included research into the nutritional beliefs and practices of the Moslem community (report available soon); development of health education material in Asian languages; workshops for health service staff; preparation of a booklet for health service staff. There is also a proposal to train Asian people to undertake health education with their own community. A comprehensive list of health education materials in Asian languages is available form Lee Adams.
- 31.3 The Health Education Service is also developing appropriate materials for multi-cultural health education in local schools.
- 31.4 The CHC and CRC had a joint working group on the health needs of ethnic minorities. Both organisations are campaigning for well-women clinics. This and other issues are discussed in the CHC report 'Information paper for the Waltham Forest District Health Authority'. 20

WANDSWORTH

- 32.1 Wandsworth and East Merton health district set up a working party on the provision of services to ethnic minority groups in the district. The report is entitled 'Ethnic minorities and the health service'. 16
- 32.2 There are two jointly financed posts in the district an Asian community health worker and an Asian dietitian.
- 32.3 Merton, Sutton and Wandsworth Health Education Service (673 7799) has taken a number of initiatives, including running a Radio London phone-in counselling service for six months in 1979. This is described in 'Report of the ethnic health project 1979/80'. The Health Education Service also keeps information on voluntary and statutory services in Asian languages; has a comprehensive list of Asian language teaching materials and supplies of these materials.
- 32.4 Wandsworth CRC published the report 'Asians and the Health Service'. 22 The CRC has an Asian project which is directed by Ms Indu Sharma.
- 32.5 Afro-Caribbean Voluntary Help is a recently formed group concerned with mental health. Mrs Shirley Obereki (673 7003) hopes to set up a visiting and counselling service.

WESTMINSTER


- 33.1 Victoria CHC carried out a survey of women having babies at Westminster Hospital. The results are described in 'Maybe I didn't ask'. 11
- 33.2 Soho and Marylebone CHC (now incorporated into Bloomsbury CHC) looked at the needs of the Chinese community in 1975/6 and a report of this work is available from Bloomsbury CHC.
- 33.3 Advice sessions are given by a group of Chinese students at Fitzrovia Neighbourhood Centre, 39 Tottenham Street, W1 (580 4576).
- 33.4 Camden CCR's health worker runs a group for Bangladeshi women at a clinic in Cleveland Street, W1 (see page 8).
- 33.5 Camden and Westminster CRCs have opened discussions with Bloomsbury DHA on equal opportunities policy and special provision of services to meet the needs of the Bengali, Chinese and Afro-Caribbean communities.

Subjects covered include obtaining NHS treatment, benefits and so on. They are in the following languages: Urdu, Hindi, Gujerati, Punjabi, Bengali, Arabic, Chinese, Italian, Greek, Turkish, Portugese and Spanish.
