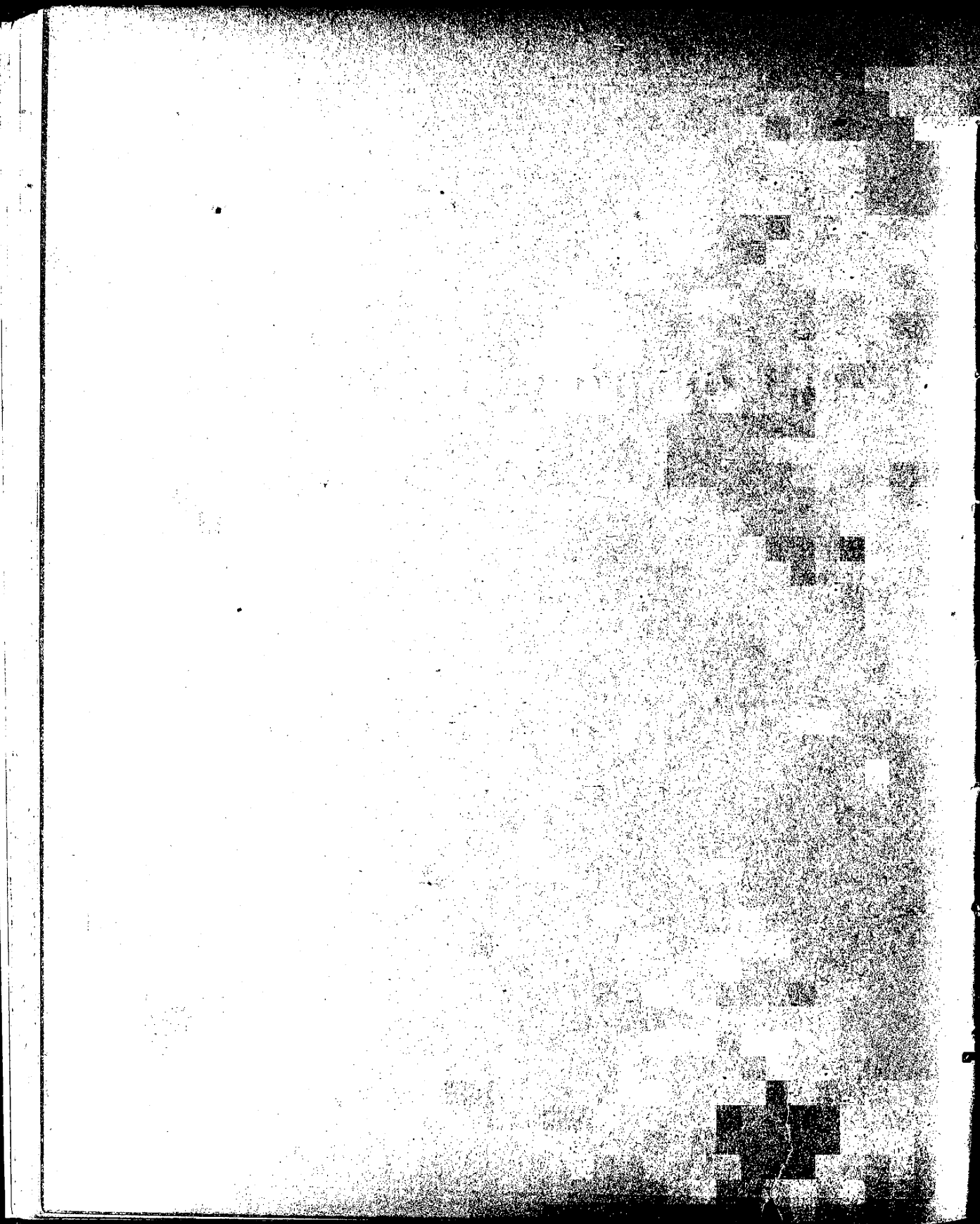

# King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

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## REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL FOR 1922.

1. In 1922 the King's Fund, having reorganised its Committees as described in the last Report, proceeded with the new duties which, by its acceptance of appointment by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee, had been added to its usual work.

### THE HOSPITAL CRISIS.

2. The figures for 1921 published in the King's Fund Statistical Report showed that, although the crisis in hospital finance had not been surmounted, the position was rapidly improving, the net total deficit of the Hospitals of London for the year being £210,000, as against £383,000 for 1920. It still remained necessary to wipe out the accumulated deficits of the past and to endeavour to close the annual gap between income and expenditure.

3. Accordingly, the special duties of the Fund included: first, the work of assisting the hospitals over the immediate financial crisis by organising the Combined Appeal and by advising the Voluntary Hospitals Commission in the distribution of the temporary Government grants; and, second, the promotion of the permanent methods of increasing the income of the hospitals and reducing their expenditure recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

4. Though the first of these duties was the more urgent, the second is of even greater importance. For the King's Fund has always agreed with Lord Cave's Committee that the permanent reorganisation of finances was essential to the solution of the problem; and the prospect of this reorganisation was put in the forefront of the Combined Appeal.

### THE COMBINED APPEAL.

5. The Combined Appeal for £500,000 to meet the immediate needs of the Hospitals, and to assist them to qualify for Government grants on the pound-for-pound basis, was the chief event of the year. It was organised by the King's Fund on the suggestion of the

Voluntary Hospitals Commission and after consultation with the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association. Besides 120 hospitals who accepted the invitation to co-operate, the following Central Agencies took part: the Hospital Saturday Fund, the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, the League of Mercy, the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund.

6. The Appeal was launched in April by the Organising Committee representing all these agencies, and reached its climax during an intensive fortnight in June. The voluntary suspension of independent hospital efforts terminated at the end of July, but the Appeal organisation continued its work on a reduced scale.

7. For the success of the Appeal, which was then already evident, the Fund and the Hospitals are greatly indebted to the personal interest and active support of His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, its President, and other members of the Royal Family.

8. Two interim distributions, authorised by a special meeting of the General Council on August 1, were made by the King's Fund during the year—viz., £150,000 in August and £100,000 in October—on the basis announced at the outset, viz., that each hospital co-operating in the Appeal on the conditions set out in the scheme would receive a share of the proceeds based, *inter alia*, on the number of occupied beds and out-patient attendances, and on the evidence as to general efficiency, financial needs, and efforts made to assist the Appeal.

9. By the end of the year the main Appeal had been closed down, but the Educational Auxiliary and an Advertisement Prize Competition continued, besides a few minor activities, and the final winding up did not take place until the Spring of 1923. The total amount ultimately distributed was £413,214 8s. 9d.

10. The Council are very grateful to the members of the Organising Committee of the Combined Appeal and their Chairman, Sir Alan Anderson, to the Executive Committee and their Chairman, Sir George Lawson Johnston, and to all who assisted in the strenuous work of the Appeal, as described in the special report presented to the Council of the King's Fund on June 4, 1923, and published on pages 44 to 59 below.

#### VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS COMMISSION GRANTS.

11. Further distributions out of the moneys voted by Parliament for the temporary assistance of Hospitals were made by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission in March, July, and November, after reports and recommendations had been submitted by the Distribution Committee of the King's Fund. These distributions amounted to £147,100, making, with £77,900 distributed in emergency grants in 1921, the total of £225,000 allocated by the Commission to London out of the total of £500,000 for the whole of Great Britain. Of the three distributions in 1922, the first two were based by the Commission on deficits for the year 1921, and the third on accumulated deficits of past years.



## PERMANENT REMEDIES.

12. The permanent remedies recommended by Lord Cave's Committee included suggestions for increasing hospital income and reducing hospital expenditure. The first are dealt with by the Revenue Committee of the King's Fund, the second by its Hospital Economy Committee.

13. Lord Cave's Committee laid particular stress on the development of mass contributions—i.e., "moderate and continuous contributions from all classes of the community," including "weekly contributions out of wages" supplemented by the co-operation of employers. The contributory scheme referred to in the last Annual Report as having been drawn up for this purpose at the request of the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association was considered at two meetings of the General Council of the Fund early in 1922. It was finally decided that it should not be set on foot by the King's Fund itself, and it has since been organised separately by an Association composed of representatives of hospitals, contributors, and the general community, under the title "Hospital Saving Association."

14. Lord Cave's Committee recommended that the Government should assist the Hospitals by relief in respect of income tax on employers' contributions, death duties on legacies, and income tax on income from residuary bequests not paid within a year. In March 1922 the Revenue Committee urged all these concessions on the Chancellor of the Exchequer, but so far only the last has been granted.

15. The other suggestions of Lord Cave's Committee for the improvement of income were necessarily deferred until after the Combined Appeal. A table analysing the income of the various Hospitals has been added to the Fund's Statistical Report.

16. Progress with the steps recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reduction of expenditure was also delayed while the King's Fund and the Hospitals were occupied with the Appeal. But the Hospital Economy Committee did a substantial amount of preparatory work on the improvement of accounts and statistics, records of quantities consumed, and the business side of hospital administration generally.

17. One of the conditions attached to the Government grants was the adoption of a standard form of hospital accounts, and, after consultation with the King's Fund, the Voluntary Hospitals Commission decided to recommend the general use of the Revised Uniform System in its full form for large hospitals, and in a simplified form for cottage hospitals and other small institutions. This system, which has been in operation in London for many years, has thus attained recognition as the standard system of Hospital accounts for the whole country.

18. Since the revision by the late Mr. John G. Griffiths, in 1906, the system has been brought up to date from time to time, the present edition being that issued in 1914, with supplements in 1918 and 1922. The Hospital Economy Committee have begun the prepara-

tion of a new edition : they have invited suggestions from the Hospitals and others interested ; and they have themselves prepared various concrete proposals for discussion with the Hospitals in 1923.

#### SUMMARY OF KING'S FUND RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

19. The total receipts for the year were £1,351,342 7s. 7d., of which £250,000 was received from the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal on account ; £581,353 11s. 7d. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen ; £257,692 8s. from the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland ; £73,720 1s. 9d. from other Legacies ; £24,567 1s. 5d. from gifts to capital ; and £164,009 4s. 10d. from general receipts.

22. Every eligible Hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as hitherto, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. To these Visitors the Council desire to express their sincere thanks for the reports, to which constant reference is made by the Distribution Committee.

23. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years (after including the two special distributions in 1920 and the Combined Appeal distribution in 1922, and deducting conditional grants to the extent of £500 that have been allowed to lapse) is £2,653,438. Since the foundation of the Fund a total net amount of £4,286,854 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

#### SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

24. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have also been pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also have their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, Prince Henry, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, and other members of the Royal Family.

25. The Fund again received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £525 from Lloyds Bank Limited, and of £500 from the Earl of Iveagh, from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; anonymous donations of £10,000 (per the Combined Appeal, earmarked for the Fund) and £1,000; a donation of £500 from "S.D.R.S.D.," and an anonymous gift to capital of £5,000 Five per Cent. War Stock (1929-1947).

26. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £15,000, as in 1921. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £339,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council congratulate the League on the continued success of its efforts in the systematic collection of moderate and continuous contributions, which is one of the methods specially recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

27. King George's Fund for Sailors again generously assisted by making a contribution towards the grant to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital, their help this year taking the form of a donation of £1,000 to the Combined Appeal, earmarked to the King's Fund for the above purpose.

28. The year under review has been an exceptional one for the receipt of legacies, £581,353 11s. 7d. having been received on account of the residue of the estate of the late Lord MountStephen and £257,692 8s. on account of the residue of the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland. The income from these munificent bequests will greatly assist the Fund in its efforts to secure a permanent improvement in the financial position of the

hospitals. Other legacies received during the year included £23,558 12s. 7d., the residue of the estate of the late Mr. John Goode; £10,312 10s. from the estate of the late Miss Dorothy Nancy Land on account of residue left to capital; £10,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Bernhard Charles Hirsch, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £12,936 4s. 7d. received to date); £9,573 17s. from the estate of the late Mr. Albert E. Watson, further on account of one-fourth share of residue (making a total of £61,980 2s. 2d. received to date); £9,298 10s. 2d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Clarke on account of residue (in addition to a discretionary gift of £105); £8,993 8s. 1d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £358,897 4s. 4d. received to date, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); £6,077 9s. 10d., the residue of the estate of the late Mrs. Ada M. Peyton; £3,132 4s. 9d., the residue of the estate of the late Miss Mary Ann Geddes; 500 Alliance Assurance Co., Ltd., new £1 shares, value £5,625, from the estate of the late Mr. John C. Geiselbrecht; £3,500 from the estate of the late Major-General Samuel Charles Woodcock on account of residue; and £1,007 18s. 8d. from the estate of the late Colonel Francis Haygarth.

#### EXPENSES.

29. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund was £8,607 12s. 10d., or 15s. 8d. per £100 of the total received (apart from the Combined Appeal), as compared with £7,208 13s. 6d., or £2 11s. 8d. per £100 in the previous year. The average yearly outlay in this respect for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £3,432 8s. 0d., the corresponding percentage of the receipts being £1 4s. 11d., or just under 3d. in every £1 received.

#### PERSONNEL.

30. The Prince of Wales, during his absence in India, received, at his special request, monthly reports on the work of the Fund. At the launching of the Combined Appeal His Royal Highness gave it, by cable, his personal backing, and on his return took an active part in promoting its success.

31. On January 1, His Royal Highness reappointed the President's Powers Committee, consisting of the Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England, to whom the Council are greatly indebted for their services during the absence of the President.

32. The Council deeply regret the great loss the Fund has suffered by the death of three of their members: the Hon. Algernon Mills, who was also a member of the Finance Committee; Mr. John G. Griffiths, author of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, and for many years an Honorary Secretary and a member successively of the Executive, Distribution, and Hospital Economy Committees; and Mr. Kenneth Prescott, a member of the Convalescent Homes and Hospital Economy Committees.

33. The Council desire to express their best thanks to the Fund's Solicitors, Messrs. Freshfields, Leese & Munns, for the valuable services rendered by them as Honorary Solicitors from the foundation of the Fund in 1897 down to the end of 1922, when the great increase in the work of the Fund, with all its new duties, led the Management Committee to suggest that this arrangement was no longer fair. The firm continue to act as Solicitors to the Fund.

34. The Minister of Health, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., chartered accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the Honorary Auditors since January 1898, during which period they have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

#### SPECIAL NEEDS.

35. The year 1922 having been largely occupied with the Combined Appeal, organised by the King's Fund to assist the Hospitals to meet their immediate necessities, the chief need of the Hospitals for 1923 is a larger and more stable permanent income to cover the annual cost of working and to keep equipment up to date.

36. The Council are grateful to the Press for the co-operation and help so generously and effectively afforded in past years, and particularly during the Combined Appeal, and look with confidence for a continuance of their support in promoting the permanent welfare of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

## Distribution Meeting of President and General Council.

DECEMBER 13, 1922.

A meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, December 13, 1922, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair. Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) having read the minutes of the last meeting,

Sir ALAN ANDERSON (Honorary Secretary) reported letters of regret from the following:—

The Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London (the Marquess of Crewe), the Bishop of London, the Bishop of Southwark, Cardinal Bourne, the Rev. A. E. Garvie, D.D., the Chief Rabbi (Rev. J. H. Sir Arthur Stanley, Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, Hon. Oswald Partington, the President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor), the Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. Montagu C. Norman), Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Lieut.-General Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir Frederick Green, Sir Basil Mayhew, Mr. Robert Fleming, and Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

On the motion of HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, seconded by Lord STUART OF WORTLEY, it was resolved:—

“That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund desire to express their deep regret at the death of Mr. John G. Griffiths. He was a member of the firm of Honorary Auditors from the beginning of the Fund and had served personally ever since 1902. He was a Visitor from 1902 to 1907, carried out the revision of the Uniform System of Hospital Accounts in 1906, was a member of the General Council from 1907 to 1922, and successively of the Executive, Distribution, and Hospital Economy Committees, and also served as one of the Honorary Secretaries from 1912 to 1920. During all this period he rendered invaluable service to the Fund and to the Hospitals by his great knowledge of accounts and

statistics, combined with his unfailing courtesy and tact and power of expressing technical rules and principles in such a way as to make them understood and accepted. His death is a great loss to the Fund, and a personal loss to all who were associated with him in its work. The Council desire also to express to his family their sincere sympathy with them in their bereavement."

#### STATEMENT BY HONORARY TREASURER.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer), in reporting the amount received for general purposes by the Fund to December 2, after payment of expenses, said that on November 10 the Council decided that the amount to be distributed should be £220,000, the same amount as was distributed last year. The net income for the year was estimated on that day at £215,000, but an unexpected legacy since received had raised the estimated total almost exactly to £220,000. In this estimated total was included an anonymous donation of £10,000 given to the Combined Appeal, but earmarked by the donor for the King's Fund. The balance of the money derived from the Combined Appeal was treated, of course, as being in an entirely separate category. The above figure also included the sum of about £13,000, representing approximately one-fourth of a full year's interest derivable from the legacies of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland. They had not yet received the final figures, but they had every reason to believe that a full year's interest on these bequests would approach £50,000. He trusted that this additional source of income might be regarded as forming the nucleus of a permanent increase in the amount of the annual distribution. It had always been realised that the special distributions of the last few years—the National Relief Fund, the King's Fund Emergency Distribution, the Government grants administered by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, and the Combined Appeal—had only been temporary expedients to tide over a particular crisis and to allow time for the development of permanent increases in annual income. The King's Fund had shaped its distribution policy accordingly. At the height of the crisis it gave largely of its accumulated funds. Now that the time had come for concentrating on permanent remedies, he submitted that it should be their policy, aided as they would be by the increased capitalisation which would be the result of these munificent legacies, to endeavour to increase their annual distribution, and therefore their power to give steady encouragement and assistance to the hospitals in their efforts to develop new sources of income and new methods of controlling expenditure.

#### CONTRIBUTION OF LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that of the ninety-three districts in which the League was working, the reports received from some were that the payments received were less this year than last year, and in other cases more. Some of the districts outside London were sending increased amounts. From recent inquiries he had made, it was practically certain that the League would not give less than the £15,000 which was given last year to the King's Fund. He hoped it would be more. The total which the League of Mercy had contributed to the King's Fund would then amount to £339,000, and, added to £49,065 to extra-Metropolitan hospitals, would make the grand total of £388,065 collected by the League of Mercy since its foundation.

#### GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

Sir COOPER PERRY (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals, and moved the adoption of the recommendations.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards, Sir WILLIAM BENNETT having seconded, the motion was carried unanimously.

Sir COOPER PERRY (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes, and moved the adoption of the recommendations.

Sir ALAN ANDERSON (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards, Professor WINIFRED CULLIS having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir HUMPHRY ROLLESTON), seconded by the Rev. Dr. W. T. A. BARBER, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Tuesday, December 19.

#### HOSPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND UNEMPLOYMENT.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY), seconded by Lord MARSHALL, it was resolved to forward to the Government and to the Voluntary Hospitals Commission a memorandum suggesting that schemes of work on Hospital improvements, repairs, etc., should be considered in the allocation of funds available for the provision of work in relief of unemployment.

#### HOSPITALS OF LONDON COMBINED APPEAL.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Sir ALAN ANDERSON), in making a statement on the present position of the Combined Appeal, said that, in the happy phrase of His Royal Highness the President, they were now in "The Last Hundred Thousand." It was impossible to give any precise figure of results to date, because a good deal of the moneys collected has not yet been paid over, but the Director-General estimated the grand total of the Appeal Fund at £435,000. The two main sources of revenue to which they looked to bring in the balance of the £500,000 were the Advertisement Prize Competition and the Educational Auxiliary, which, under the chairmanship of Viscount Burnham, had done wonderful work. The intention was to close down the general appeal by December 31, and only to leave in activity one or two specific appeals which would not be concluded by then. They were now devoting thought to the permanent methods of increasing the income of hospitals. One of these was the obtaining of increased support from domestic workers, and on Monday next there would be a meeting at Devonshire House in order to start a permanent organisation as a branch of the League of Mercy. The other direction was that of the organisation of contributions from wage-earners generally. Great stress had been laid, in the propaganda of the Combined Appeal, on the fact that Hospitals had a policy and a programme by means of which those who could afford to pay towards the cost of their maintenance would increasingly do so on an organised basis. To that propaganda they unquestionably owed a large part of their success, and he was glad to say that the appeal for permanent support from the classes to whom the hospitals of London meant so much was now ready to follow on and complete the work of the Combined Appeal. In conclusion, he paid tribute to the great personal assistance rendered to the Appeal by H.R.H. the President.

#### THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said :—

"My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen :—It is exactly twenty-five years since the King's Fund made its first distribution. The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund, as it was then called, was founded by King Edward, then Prince of Wales, in February, 1897, to commemorate the Diamond



Jubilee of Queen Victoria, and on December 14, 1897, the Executive Committee met, under the chairmanship of Lord Lister, to settle the first Distribution Report to the Council. The Council may be interested to look back for a moment and see what progress has been made in a quarter of a century. The amount distributed in 1897 was £34,000 from the special efforts of the first year, and £22,000 from the estimated annual income. This year we have already distributed £250,000 from our present special effort, the Combined Appeal, and the amount we distribute to-day out of our ordinary income is £220,000. In the second year the income from investments was £5,000. This year the income from investments is £114,000, and the amount from other sources £106,000. On the other hand, the financial problem facing the hospitals and the Fund has enormously increased. The King's Fund was founded to meet a crisis. The Hospitals of London had then a deficit of £70,000 on a turnover of £700,000. The King's Fund now distributes £220,000 a year, and yet there is a deficit of £210,000. Why is this? Has the income of the Hospitals fallen off? Are voluntary contributions dying out? Quite the contrary. Hospital income is more than three times what it was. Voluntary contributions continue to increase and are 50 per cent. more than they were before the War. The present difficulties are due to the fact that hospital expenditure has increased since 1897 nearly fourfold. There are three causes for this: the increased number of patients, needing more hospitals and bigger hospitals; the wonderful developments of medical and surgical science, all costing money; and then the rise in the price of everything since the War. The result is that, in spite of the great increase in the King's Fund distribution, there is still a deficit of £210,000. The hospital problem is thus a much bigger one than it was twenty-five years ago. But, fortunately, the means of dealing with it have also grown. We have, in the report of Lord Cave's Committee, a programme—and, to a very remarkable extent, an agreed programme. In so far as that programme is based on what has actually been done in the past, it is based largely on two things. One is the success of many of the provincial hospitals in organising workshop contributions. The other is the growth of the King's Fund from a mere collecting and distributing agency into a central administrative body, which, being itself voluntary, respects the independence of the Voluntary Hospitals. This has always been the principle of the King's Fund; and this was the principle adopted by Lord Cave's Committee. The King's Fund has become the Local Committee for London, and Local Voluntary Committees have been set up all over the country to do the same kind of work. Moreover, the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, through their Joint Council, are now assisting in the solution of Voluntary Hospital problems, and in their work Lord Cave's Committee also found valuable suggestions. For the better performance of all the new duties arising out of Lord Cave's Report, the King's Fund reorganised itself a year ago, and we are glad to learn from the report of the Management Committee that the new system of Committees is working well. To the amount of the work I can bear witness myself, for it is my duty as President, under the Act of Incorporation, to read and approve all the minutes of all the Committees. The Finance Committee have the heavy responsibility of our ever-increasing investments. The Revenue Committee, like the hospitals themselves, have been, for this year, engaged mainly with the Combined Appeal. A good deal of the work of the Hospital Economy Committee has had to be postponed during the Combined Appeal, but they have been very far from idle. But to-day we are primarily concerned with the Distribution Committee. The other Committees will report to the Annual Meeting in March or April. The Distribution Committee have again had an exceptionally busy year. Besides their normal monthly meetings and the Fund's ordinary list of grants to hospitals, they have dealt this year with Convalescent Homes, and they have had to make two distributions from the Combined Appeal, and three sets of recom-

mendations for distributions made by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. This meant special distribution meetings in March, July, August, October, and November, and ordinary distribution meetings in November and December. This is no bad record. When I add that Sir Cooper Perry, their Chairman, has also served with the other Chairmen on the Management Committee, and as the Fund's nominee on the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, I am sure you will join with me in tendering our best thanks to him personally, as well as to all the members of the Distribution Committee. The ordinary distribution presents no very special features. The Council in November decided not to make any increase in the total amount this year; in fact, it is only by the help of an anonymous donor of £10,000 that we are able to distribute £220,000 out of income. Next year we shall know how the finances of the different hospitals have been affected by the Combined Appeal and the distribution of Government grants. Our new work as Voluntary Hospitals Committee is reflected in the list of remarks to be sent to the Hospitals privately with the grants. The Statistical Report now contains a table analysing hospital income. This ought to be useful to the Revenue Committee next year. In the meantime, it enables the Distribution Committee to call attention to one or two cases where, for example, the Hospital seems to be relying too much on the central Funds and too little on its own efforts. On the question of cost of working, again, the Hospital Economy Committee have provided the Distribution Committee with new material. Hitherto the Fund has deliberately left it to the Hospital Committees to inquire for themselves into the causes of high cost shown in the accounts. The Fund is now going a step further, by directing attention to particular methods of investigating and controlling expenditure, beginning with the question of adequate records of quantities consumed. The Distribution Committee refer in their Report to the fact that urgent schemes of improvement are still postponed for want of funds, including, in many cases, improvements that have been suggested to the Fund by its Visitors. The Council has suffered severe losses by the deaths of Mr. Algernon Mills, Mr. John G. Griffiths, and Mr. Kenneth Prescott. Mr. Mills was a member of the Finance Committee; Mr. Prescott was on the Hospital Economy Committee and Chairman of an important sub-committee; Mr. Griffiths had been a tower of strength to the Fund ever since 1905, when he carried out the first revision of the Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. He served as an Honorary Secretary for nine years, and always placed his time unsparingly at the service of the Fund whenever his great knowledge of accounts, statistics, or finance was of service. Before coming to the business for 1923, I would like to express my personal thanks to Lord Donoughmore, Lord Finlay, and Mr. Norman, the Governor of the Bank of England, who jointly exercised the powers of President while I was away on my last tour to India and Japan. I gather that during that period there were some long and animated debates at the Council on important questions of policy, and I think that is all to the good. To do the work of the Fund, as it is to-day, we must have a small and strong executive body, capable of rapid action and trusted by the Council. This we have in the Management Committee, which contains the Chairmen of the other Committees. But, for the guidance of the Committees, we want the full and free expression of the views that are represented here at the Council. This necessarily means long agenda papers, such as we have this morning. The Council is only asked to adopt the actual recommendations. But the reports themselves keep the Council informed of the actions and policy of the Committees, and free discussion of them is invited. For the year 1923 I propose to appoint the Council as it is at present, with the addition of Major-General Sir Cecil Lowther, Sir Edward Penton, Mr. Beaumont Pease, and Mr. Stuart de la Rue. I propose to appoint Lord Hambleden to the Revenue Committee. The vacancies on the Hospital Economy Committee will be filled by Sir Cecil Lowther, Mr. George Roberts, and another.

The work of the Honorary Secretaries increases with that of the Fund, and I propose to appoint Sir Cecil Lowther and Major Wernher to assist as Honorary Secretaries. There will then be an Honorary Secretary on each of the Distribution, Revenue, and Hospital Economy Committees. I will now ask Lord Stuart of Wortley to present the Report of the Management Committee on the business for 1923.

#### ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1923.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY), seconded by Sir OWEN PHILIPPS, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees.

On the motion of Lord STUART, seconded by Lord REVELSTOKE, a resolution was approved dealing with the Fund's Banking Accounts.

On the motion of Lord STUART, seconded by Sir CUTHBERT WALLACE, resolutions were approved providing for the custody of the keys of the Corporate Seal.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES then said: Before we break up, I am sure that you will all wish me to express our thanks to Sir Alan Anderson and all who have worked with him, and to congratulate him on the success which has resulted from the time and thought which they have devoted to this great appeal. It would give me the greatest pleasure to see our task completed by the end of the year. No time could be more appropriate for a last effort of generosity than Christmas time. We shall then be able to start the Hospitals in the New Year with their burdens lightened, and with time given them to develop the new sources of income required to supplement their present revenues.

#### VOTE OF THANKS.

The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE, in moving a cordial vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that he thanked His Royal Highness for the very kind expressions he had used with reference to himself and his colleagues representing His Royal Highness during his absence from this country. He realised then that the President of the King's Fund occupied a position which involved a good deal of work. Particularly in regard to the Combined Appeal, he referred to the stimulus which was given to the Appeal as soon as His Royal Highness returned from his journey overseas and was able to give it the backing of his personal presence. He felt sure the public realised the value of His Royal Highness's presence in connection with the King's Fund.

The motion, having been seconded by the EARL OF IVEAGH, was carried unanimously.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE KING.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, read the following message from H.M. the King:—

"The King desires me to express his gratification at learning that King Edward's Hospital Fund is again able to distribute £220,000 this year, and trusts that the Fund, with the assistance of its many efficient workers, will now be in a position to ensure the continuance of the Voluntary Hospital System, for which it has always striven. The King heartily congratulates all concerned upon the success of the Combined Appeal of the Hospitals of London; and His Majesty trusts that this great effort, by giving fresh impetus to all who are interested in the work, will substantially reinforce the numbers of our regular contributors."

The proceedings then terminated.

## Annual Meeting of President and General Council, June 4, 1923.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held in the Lord Chairman's Committee Room, House of Lords, on Monday, June 4, 1923, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

His Royal Highness was received at the Peers' Entrance by Sir Thomas Butler, representing the Lord Great Chamberlain, and by Lord Somerleyton and Sir Alan Anderson, two of the Honorary Secretaries of the King's Fund.

MAJOR HAROLD WERNHER (Honorary Secretary) read the order of appointment by H.R.H. the President of Lord Stanmore and Mr. John W. Samuel to the General Council.

#### ACCOUNTS FOR 1922.

LORD REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1922, said:—May it please your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, the accounts for the year 1922 which I have the honour to present show total receipts on general account, apart from the legacies of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland, of £487,729 6s. 7d., or a net amount, after deducting expenses, of £479,121 13s. 9d. Of this sum, £250,000 represents the first instalments of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal, paid over to the King's Fund by the Organising Committee of the Appeal, and distributed by the Fund in August and October 1922. The balance, amounting to £229,121 13s. 9d., represents ordinary income of the King's Fund. This ordinary income is somewhat in excess of the amount shown in the estimates submitted last November, when the Council decided to distribute £220,000. One or two unexpected legacies were received late in the year, with the result that a surplus was realised of just over £9,000, which was added to the reserve.

Moreover, our invested funds were increased by the two munificent legacies to which I have already referred, and also by a further instalment of the legacy of the late Sir Julius Wernher, as well as by other legacies bequeathed to capital. Our position as regards invested funds is now stronger than it was before we made the emergency distribution of £250,000 out of reserves three years ago, and our income from investments will be substantially increased. This increase will be of especial value to us now that the Combined Appeal is over, as the most urgent need of the hospitals is the development of permanent sources of revenue. The King's Fund will, however, require an increase in its general income, as well as in its income from investments, if it is to be in a position to continue to bear its full share in the work of assisting the hospitals to satisfactorily reorganise their finances.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the VISCOUNT ULLSWATER, was then put, and carried unanimously.

#### ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (LORD STUART OF WORTLEY) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1922. LORD BEARSTED having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put, and carried unanimously.

#### HOSPITALS OF LONDON COMBINED APPEAL.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (SIR ALAN ANDERSON) presented the final Report of the Committee on the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal, containing the Report of the Organising Committee, and recommending that the Report of the Organising Committee be received and be communicated to the Press as part of the Official Report of the meeting of the Council; with the Report of the Revenue Committee attached as an introduction thereto. LADY AMPHILL having seconded the motion, it was resolved accordingly.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the final distribution of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal, with the list of suggested grants. The recommendation that the grants be approved was seconded by SIR WALTER LAWRENCE, and carried unanimously.

#### HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION FOR ACCIDENT CASES.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (LORD STUART OF WORTLEY) presented a Report of the Committee on the subject of Hospital Accommodation for Accident Cases, and stating that H.R.H. the President had appointed the following persons to be members of a Special Committee of Inquiry: Sir William Collins (Chairman), Viscount Hambleden, Lady Amptill, Lord Stanmore, Sir George Makins, Sir John Rose Bradford, and Mr. Leonard L. Cohen, and recommending terms of reference.

The recommendation, having been seconded by LORD MARSHALL, was carried unanimously.

#### VACANT ACCOMMODATION IN POOR-LAW INFIRMARIES.

The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (MR. LEONARD L. COHEN) presented a Report of that Committee on Vacant Accommodation in Poor-Law Infirmaries, stating that the Committee found that the statistics which had been laid before them by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission did not show any large percentage of available accommodation in Poor-Law Infirmaries in London; and recommending that, unless the Council should otherwise decide, the matter should be allowed to stand in abeyance for the present. He added that the general question of the relations between the London Voluntary Hospitals and Poor-Law Infirmaries was part of the standing terms of reference to the Hospital Economy Committee, and would not be lost sight of. The recommendation was seconded by SIR JOHN TWEEDY, and carried unanimously.

#### THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said:

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—The Annual Meeting this year is later than usual. It was postponed until the final Report of the Combined Appeal and the scheme for the distribution of the proceeds were ready, and could be dealt with at the same time. The Combined Appeal was, of course, the principal business of the year 1922, and I think you will all agree, from the Report that is before us to-day, that it was a remarkably successful piece of work. When the King's Fund was called upon to organise the Appeal, and when the sum of £500,000 was set up as a sort of outside figure, I wonder how many people expected that the total actually raised would come to within £20,000 of that sum, and that the hospitals would benefit by £413,000? As the Report points out, the times were not favourable; the Appeal was launched in a period of high taxation and severe trade depression; and, moreover, the results of some of the recent appeals by individual hospitals had not been encouraging. There was plenty of ground for pessimism, and even the optimists talked, in private, more like men ordered on a forlorn hope than like men going out treasure-hunting. Nevertheless, the Appeal succeeded, and I think I can give three good reasons why. First of all, it had a good cause. The voluntary hospitals are a peculiarly English institution; they suit our way of doing things, give scope to our sort of ability, and make an almost universal appeal to our sympathies. Lord Cave's Committee had reported strongly in their favour.

The public, including their own patients and prospective patients, subscribe to them annually far more than they did before the war. The figures before us to-day in the Annual Report of the King's Fund and the Organising Committee's Report show how wide the appeal of the hospitals is. Legacies to the King's Fund of £581,000 and £257,000; donations to the Combined Appeal ranging from £180,000 in sums of £1,000 and over, down to £6,000 in sums of under £5, besides innumerable amounts in "small money"; collections in the London County Council schools, representing hundreds of thousands of small contributions, and reaching a total of more than £50,000; these are only a part of the evidence of the hold the voluntary hospitals have, and deserve to have, on the sympathies of all classes. In the second place, the Appeal had a good organisation. It was based on the co-operation of the hospitals and the Central Agencies in a common effort. This was a voluntary co-operation, organised by the King's Fund only after full consultation with the other Central Funds and with the hospitals, both individually and through the British Hospitals Association. Whether a Combined Appeal would have been possible without a King's Fund, or whether the King's Fund could have raised the money without a Combined Appeal, who can say? The actual fact is, that the King's Fund, founded by King Edward in a former time of crisis, and firmly established in the public confidence under his presidency and that of my father, was there—capable of forming the nucleus of the combined effort. It was asked to do the work; and it was by the King's Fund, jointly with the hospitals and the other agencies, that the work was done. Voluntary co-operation between the hospitals and the Central Agencies, under the leadership of the King's Fund, itself a voluntary body, has thus been tried and has proved its value. Thirdly, this organisation had a good personnel. I cannot mention all their names—their name is Legion. A few are given in the Report of the Organising Committee, with words of appreciation which I most cordially endorse. But there are two names not mentioned in the Report, Sir Alan Anderson, the Chairman of the Organising Committee, and Sir George Lawson Johnston, Chairman of the Executive Committee. They were the chiefs. They not only bore a great burden of detailed work; they took the responsibility; they faced the risk of failure; and they have richly earned the credit of success. To them, to the members of the Organising Committee, representing all the various agencies, to all who assisted in the Appeal, to the public who responded so generously, and to the Distribution Committee who have devoted so much care to the allocation of the proceeds amongst the co-operating hospitals, I offer the best thanks of the Council, and my own. I must not wholly omit to mention the other work of the Fund, as this is our Annual Meeting. The Combined Appeal was all extra. There was also the ordinary work, which has been gradually developing year by year, and, in addition, the new duties arising out of the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee. The Annual Report describes what was done by the Management Committee under the chairmanship of Lord Stuart of Wortley, the Distribution Committee under Sir Cooper Perry, and the Hospital Economy Committee under Mr. Leonard L. Cohen. The Balance Sheet shows how much we are indebted to Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee for their care of our investments. And besides the Committees and their Chairmen, I should like to express our thanks to the Honorary Secretaries, who do so much to maintain, in the current work of the Fund, that voluntary element which is of such value in a body dealing with voluntary hospitals. Last year, while Sir Alan Anderson was so much occupied with the Combined Appeal, an extra share of this work fell upon Lord Somerleyton. And now as to the future. The Combined Appeal, together with the temporary Government grants, has brought to the hospitals substantial, though not complete, relief from the crushing weight of the deficits of the years immediately following the war. But this does

not solve the whole problem, though it gives the hospitals time to reorganise their finances, in order to close the annual gap between income and expenditure. In this they are gradually succeeding. If we omit from the income all the special distributions, the net aggregate deficit for the year, which was £383,000 in 1920, and £210,000 in 1921, was further reduced last year to about £174,000. The gap is closing, though there is still much to be done. The hospitals have both to maintain their position and also to improve it. They have to collect their normal income, and for this purpose their ordinary appeals, suspended during the period of the Combined Appeal, must be issued, and are being issued, and will need the normal response from the public. The hospitals must also substantially increase their income, or reduce their expenditure, or both, until this deficit of £174,000 a year is made up. And, besides this, we must remember that the advances in medical science, which are so beneficial both to the patients in the hospitals and to the public outside, all mean additional cost. Lord Cave's Report suggests methods both of increasing income and of reducing expenditure, and it is the duty of the King's Fund, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, to promote these methods and any others that may be devised, consistent with maintaining the voluntary system in its full efficiency. This is the work to which the Fund is now turning its hand. The Revenue Committee are considering what part of the experience of the Combined Appeal can be utilised by the Fund either to assist and encourage the hospitals, or to increase the income of the King's Fund, where this can be done without competing with the hospitals or with the other central agencies. In one way or another the whole field has to be covered. The individual hospitals, the Sunday Fund, the Saturday Fund, the League of Mercy, the Hospital Saving Association, the King's Fund itself, all have their sphere. Reduction of expenditure is one of the functions of the Hospital Economy Committee, and that Committee is busy with schemes for helping the hospitals to carry out this part of Lord Cave's recommendations; in other words, to develop, as our Annual Report puts it, the business side of hospital administration generally. But if the King's Fund is to do its full work of assisting the hospitals in the direction of economy, and helping them to meet their annual deficit of £174,000, its own income must be maintained and increased. The Revenue Committee are maturing their plans, but in the meantime I should like to mention one point. I am delighted to see that practically every member of the Council gave to the Fund last year, and I take this as an excellent omen for the future. The public will, I am sure, recognise gladly that those of us who are members of this Fund are showing their belief in its merits by giving generously to it a measure of their own individual support. We have to thank large and munificent donors for very much of the great success of the Fund in the past. But I have heard on the best authority that the Founder of this Fund, King Edward, never failed to impress on the Honorary Secretaries, during the time when, as Prince of Wales, he was, as I am now, your President, the paramount importance of maintaining and increasing the number of our annual subscribers. The King has always, I know, insisted on this point also, and I now earnestly trust, believing firmly in their wisdom, that you will all do your best to help us in this matter. For we know that every subscriber and everyone who reads our Report and knows how our work is done, and what a small fraction of our subscriptions is spent in maintenance and expenses, will be our friend and supporter, perhaps even our canvasser.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE KING.

His Royal Highness then said: I have a message from the King, our Patron.

The King desires me to convey to the Council of the Fund his sincere congratulations on the success that continues to attend their efforts, and particularly on the result of the Combined Appeal,



on behalf of which the Committee and all concerned have bestowed such generous and unsparing labours. His Majesty earnestly trusts that, aided by your valuable guidance and help, the hospitals may accomplish their all-important work both as regards regulation of expenditure and increase of permanent income.

VOTE OF THANKS.

THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS (the RT. HON. J. H. WHITLEY, M.P.), in moving a vote of thanks to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that it would be wrong if they were to separate without a very warm expression of their thanks to His Royal Highness, first, for his presence there to-day at the Annual Meeting; secondly, for the interesting speech he had delivered; and thirdly, for the continued interest he had always evidenced in the Combined Appeal and in the work that they were doing. Without his Presidency and without the interest he had always so fully shown, the great work could not have been accomplished.

THE CHIEF RABBI (the REV. DR. J. H. HERTZ), in seconding, thanked His Royal Highness for his interest, for his attendance as President that day, and for the stirring address he had given them on the work of the past and the tasks of the future.

The resolution was carried with acclamation.

H.R.H. the PRINCE OF WALES having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

## Report of the Distribution Committee on Distribution to Hospitals.

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(1) The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals at the present distribution is £215,000. The amount distributed last year at the ordinary distribution was £210,000.

(2) The Distribution Committee have been concerned this year, as in the two preceding years, not only with the ordinary distribution, but also with special distributions for the purpose of assisting the hospitals to tide over the period required for the reorganisation of their finances after the War. In 1920 an emergency distribution of £250,000 was made by the King's Fund out of its accumulated funds. In 1921, after a special report by the Distribution Committee on the finances of the hospitals of London, the Voluntary Hospitals Commission made emergency grants amounting to £77,900 out of the moneys placed at their disposal by Parliament.

In March, July, and November of the present year the Distribution Committee made further recommendations to the Commission covering in all a total of £147,100, the balance of the sum of £225,000 provisionally allocated to London out of the total of £500,000 voted by Parliament for the whole of Great Britain.

In August and October of the present year the Distribution Committee carried out two distributions on account of the proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal, £150,000 in August and £100,000 in October.

(3) These distributions were not made on the same basis as the ordinary distributions of the King's Fund. The Voluntary Hospitals Commission grants were made on a basis determined by the Commission, in accordance with the conditions laid down by the Treasury, taking into account partly deficits for the year 1921, and partly accumulated deficits of previous years. The distribution of the Combined Appeal was made on a basis announced to the participating hospitals when they were invited to suspend their own special appeals in order to co-operate.

(4) The number of hospitals applying for grants out of the ordinary distribution is 112, as against 110 in 1921. Applications have been received from All Saints' Hospital, the Baby Clinic Hospital (Kensington), the Jewish Maternity Home, and the Streatham

Babies' Hospital. On the other hand, the Roll of Honour Hospital has been closed and St. Bartholomew's Hospital has withdrawn its application.

(5) In view of the urgent need of maintenance grants, the Distribution Committee have again adopted the principle that grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure should be limited to cases where the work is particularly urgent and is within a reasonable distance of being carried out. The number of schemes which have reached this stage is larger than last year, and consequently the total amount of the grants recommended in aid of schemes of capital expenditure is £26,500, as against £11,575 in 1921 and £36,300 in 1920. The total grants to maintenance out of the ordinary distribution amount to £188,500, as against £198,425 in 1921 and £153,700 in 1920.

(6) In comparing the individual grants to maintenance this year with those of last year it must be borne in mind that the grants made in December 1921 were in some cases affected by the special consideration given at that distribution to the action adopted by hospitals to carry out the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee for re-establishing their financial position.

(7) The Committee have continued to examine all schemes of improvement or extension submitted to them. They have notified the hospitals that, in the present state of Hospital finance, it will only be in exceptional circumstances that they will be prepared to consider new schemes, particularly when the provision of additional beds for in-patients is contemplated.

(8) Several of the schemes to which the Fund has made grants in the past are still deferred owing to financial difficulties, and the Distribution Committee consider that these grants should be renewed. Their recommendations on this point are included in the list of Remarks which they suggest should be forwarded privately to the several hospitals with this year's grants.

(9) The Statistical Report this year contains an analysis of hospital income in 1921, and this has enabled the Distribution Committee to draw attention to cases where the amount collected from the public bears an unusually small relation to the amount contributed by the Central Funds, or where only a comparatively small amount is received from patients.

(10) Cases of exceptionally high cost have also received attention. In this connection the Distribution Committee have derived valuable assistance from the reports, received from the Hospital Economy Committee of the Fund, of visits paid by Mr. R. H. Orde and Mr. Macrae to certain of the hospitals whose cost formed the subject of comments at the last distribution. Following up suggestions made in these reports on a method of checking expenditure first brought before the Fund by Sir Napier Burnett, the Committee are recommending that, in cases where attention is called by the Distribution Committee to high

cost, the hospitals should be asked what records of quantities consumed are kept for the purpose of assisting the Committee of the Hospital to effect reductions in cost.

(11) The Committee have again found the reports of the Visitors of great use to them in the distribution. In many instances they recommend that extracts from the reports should be forwarded to the Hospital Committees for their observations. In the case, however, of some suggestions made by the Visitors, the Committee have refrained from this course, not because the suggestions are not well founded, but because they would involve a larger expenditure on improvements than should be entertained in the present financial circumstances of the hospitals. Already a considerable number of schemes of improvement have been passed by the Fund but unavoidably postponed from lack of funds, and many of these were recommended to the Fund by the Visitors.

(12) The Committee learned with deep regret of the death of Mr. Griffiths, who as an Honorary Secretary, as a member of the Committee, and as adviser on questions of hospital accounts and statistics, had at different times rendered invaluable assistance to the Committee over a period of many years.

## Report of the Distribution Committee on Distribution to Convalescent Homes.

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1. The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes at £5,000; the amount distributed to Convalescent Homes in 1921 was £3,930, besides £6,070 to Consumption Sanatoria. For the reasons set out in last year's Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee, grants are no longer made to Consumption Sanatoria.

2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 68, as against 59 last year.

3. In distributing the increased amount available for Convalescent Homes the Committee have given the preference to institutions directly connected with London Hospitals.

4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have given special attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

# Final Report of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal.

MARCH 1922 TO MAY 1923.

## I. INTRODUCTORY REPORT BY REVENUE COMMITTEE OF KING EDWARD'S HOSPITAL FUND FOR LONDON.

i. The Revenue Committee beg to submit to the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund the appended Report of the Organising Committee of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal.

### HISTORICAL INTRODUCTION.

ii. The Combined Appeal originated in a suggestion made by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission to the King's Fund as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London. The primary object of the Commission was to ascertain the best method of securing the new revenue from voluntary sources that was required to attract, on the pound for pound basis, the share allocated to London out of the Government grant of £500,000 voted in 1921 for the temporary assistance of the hospitals of Great Britain. But the Appeal as ultimately launched included also the general aim of clearing the hospitals from their immediate difficulties, and giving them time for the reorganisation of their finances in accordance with the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee.

iii. Before coming to any decision, the King's Fund consulted the other central agencies in London, including the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, with the result that the Fund was asked by the Regional Committee to prepare a scheme for a Combined Appeal.

iv. In the course of the discussions it became clear that it was considered essential for the success of the Appeal that the King's Fund and the Hospitals should be in a position to show that they had a definite scheme for the stabilising of hospital finance by means of what Lord Cave's Committee called "mass contributions," including regular and adequate contributions from industrial sources. Schemes were accordingly set on foot for this purpose also, and the propaganda of the Combined Appeal emphasised the fact that steps were being taken for the permanent reorganisation of hospital finance on these lines.

v. The scheme for the Combined Appeal, as finally agreed by the London Regional Committee and approved by the General Council of the King's Fund, provided, *inter alia*, that the

King's Fund should set up an Organising Committee, so constituted as to secure the most effective co-operation of all interests concerned, and that the hospitals in the metropolitan area should be invited to co-operate and, for a definite period, to abstain from special appeals not authorised by the Organising Committee.

vi. The Organising Committee, as ultimately established in March, 1922, represented the King's Fund itself, the Hospital Saturday Fund, the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, the League of Mercy, the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund. Invitations to co-operate were addressed by the Organising Committee to 127 hospitals, of which 120 accepted.

#### FINANCIAL SUMMARY.

vii. The Report of the Organising Committee contains a statement of Receipts and Expenses. This account shows total receipts of £481,639 19s. 9d.

viii. The total distribution amounts to £413,214 8s. 9d. Out of this total, the amount reported to the Distribution Committee as being available for the special distribution by the King's Fund is £365,000. This includes all gifts earmarked to hospitals co-operating in the Appeal. It does not include the sum of £11,267 15s. earmarked to the King's Fund and distributed in its ordinary distribution for 1922. Nor does it include £7,535 14s. 8d. earmarked to other central agencies, to hospitals for an agreed share of special events, and to non-co-operating hospitals; nor £4,410 19s. 1d., the value of equipment handed to hospitals and central societies; nor £25,000 reserved, at the desire of donors to that amount, for assisting the promotion of schemes for raising permanent income for hospitals by means of mass contributions. The whole of these items, taken together, make up the total distribution of £413,214 8s. 9d.

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### II. REPORT OF ORGANISING COMMITTEE.

#### I. ORGANISATION.

(1) The Organising Committee, having been entrusted with the duty of carrying out the Appeal under a General Scheme agreed by the Hospitals and adopted by the General Council of the King's Fund, set up an Executive Committee with full powers to act between meetings of the Organising Committee, and selected Mr. E. S. Shrapnell-Smith, C.B.E., for appointment as Director-General. The Lord Mayor, the Rt. Hon. Sir J. J. Baddeley; the Governor of the Bank of England, Mr. M. C. Norman; the Chairman of the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, Viscount Hambleden; and the Treasurer of the King's Fund, Lord Revelstoke, accepted the invitation of the Committee to act as Treasurers and Trustees.

(2) By the good offices of the British Red Cross Society, accommodation was secured at 19 Berkeley Street, W.

(3) Notification of the above arrangements was given to the Press on the 23rd March, 1922.

#### 2. GENERAL PLAN OF CAMPAIGN.

The Appeal was to be addressed to all classes of the community, and demonstrations and local collections were to be carried out as far as possible by Hospitals and local organisations, assisted and co-ordinated by the Central Organisation. The Campaign was planned to open after Easter, and to reach its height in an Intensive Fortnight at the end of June.

#### 3. OPENING OF BANKING ACCOUNTS.

In order to provide the maximum number of paying-in points, accounts were opened at every branch of every Bank in London, and the Press was informed that this arrangement would be operative as from Tuesday, the 18th April.

#### 4. LOCAL ORGANISATION.

(1) A letter was addressed, on April 6 and 7, to the Mayors and Chairmen of Urban District Councils, inviting them to convene early meetings for the purpose of setting up representative local Committees, and, before doing so, to confer with the Secretaries of the Hospitals in their areas. The general intention was that, while the Hospitals should supply the machinery, the Committees should be municipally appointed, and competition between municipalities should be stimulated.

(2) Meetings were held in the first instance with Secretaries of "Key" Hospitals (all of which, except Charing Cross Hospital, joined in the Appeal), and subsequently with Secretaries of Hospitals generally, chiefly for the purpose of settling a plan of campaign, and it was agreed that Hospitals should be free to continue their individual appeals until May 24 and that for the two months from that date a "close period" should be declared, during which efforts should be concentrated on the Combined Appeal. The Medical Students were organised under



their own captains, directed by a Headquarters Officer, to give assistance in special events, and generally to help with local propaganda.

#### 5. MANSION HOUSE FUND-IN-AID.

On April 27 the Lord Mayor wrote to the London Press, announcing the opening of a "Mansion House Fund-in-Aid." On April 28 he followed this up by addressing a letter to the Chairmen of Lloyd's, the Stock Exchange, the Baltic, and other City Associations, inviting them to open Auxiliary Lists.

#### 6. GENERAL PUBLICITY.

(1) An extensive poster campaign started in April with a "Save Your Hospitals" poster. A prize of 100 guineas was offered for the best poster, and the winning design, chosen from among some 300 entries, was widely displayed from May onwards. The area of display was, roughly, fifteen miles from Charing Cross, with some extension along the main roads leading out of London. Facilities for free posting were most generously granted and very many wholly exceptional sites were secured; the following may be specially mentioned:—

The Railings of the Royal Parks, through the courtesy of the First Commissioner of Works.

The Railings of the L.C.C. Parks and Open Spaces, etc., L.C.C. Tramcars and Schools, through the Chairmen of the respective Committees and the Chairman and Clerk of the Council.

City Bridges, through the Chairman of the City Bridge House Estates Committee.

Open Spaces in the City of Westminster, through the Chairman of the Works Committee.

Municipal Buildings generally, through the Mayors and Chairmen of Urban District Councils.

Banks, through Mr. R. Holland-Martin.

Underground Railways and L.G.O.C. Omnibuses, through Mr. H. E. Blain and Mr. F. Pick; and the Omnibuses of Thomas Tilling, Ltd.

Railway Stations generally.

Hospitals, through Boards of Management.

(2) Cards were displayed freely in hotels, clubs, and home-bound liners, and Doctors and Dentists were invited to place them in their waiting-rooms.

(3) A letter from H.M. the King, Patron of King Edward's Hospital Fund, written in his own hand, under date June 12, was published in facsimile in the Press and displayed on posters. Extensive use was also made of a cable from H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, President of the King's Fund, received from the Far East on April 12, and a letter written by him on his return, dated June 23. Letters were published from the following: H.M. Queen Alexandra (May); the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Robert Horne (May); the Prime Minister, Mr. Lloyd George (June); and the Chief Rabbi.

(4) Articles were written in support of the Appeal by Sir William J. Collins (July), Sir Robert Hudson (August), and "Ian Hay" (November).

#### 7. SPECIAL LETTERS TO BANKS, ETC.

(1) In June and July letters signed by Lord Revelstoke and Mr. M. C. Norman, as Trustees and Treasurers, were dispatched to banks, financial houses, insurance companies, leading brewers

and millers, and picked firms generally; where possible, the letter was addressed to the Chairman personally. A follow-up letter, accompanied by a list of principal donations, was sent by the Director-General in October to those firms which had not yet responded.

(2) Personal appeals were written by members of the Committee to selected individuals.

(3) In July, time having been allowed for the Mayors and Chairmen of Urban District Councils to issue their local appeals, a letter was addressed to residents of the principal streets and squares, enclosing a facsimile copy of the letter from H.M. the King.

(4) Later in the year a personal letter was sent by the Director-General to selected private individuals, enclosing a copy of the list of principal donations.

(5) His Excellency the Spanish Ambassador kindly addressed a letter to all the Embassies and Legations in London, inviting their support; and the Lord Mayor sent a similar invitation to British communities in foreign countries.

#### 8. EDUCATIONAL AUXILIARY.

An influential Committee, representing Schools of all classes in London and Greater London, was constituted, under the chairmanship of Viscount Burnham, which secured from the first the whole-hearted co-operation of the Education Committee of the London County Council and the Local Education Authorities of many of the outside areas, the independent Schools, and notably of the University bodies.

The London Schools Hospital Fund, under the chairmanship of Mr. J. W. Samuel, organised the appeal to Schools maintained or aided by the London County Council, in which entertainments and other activities of all kinds were arranged. The principal central events were:—

The Inter-Schools Cricket Match at Lord's (July).

The London Schools Open-Air Festival at Chelsea Football Ground (October), attended by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales.

Children's Choral Festival at Albert Hall (November), attended by H.R.H. the Princess Royal.

Sale of Christmas Dainties at Devonshire House (December 8 and 9), opened on the first day by H.R.H. Princess Helena Victoria, and on the second day by Viscountess Burnham.

Evening Institutes' Grand Concert at the Albert Hall (December 15).

Two Schools' Flag Days.

Display of Physical Exercises at the Albert Hall (January 25), attended by H.R.H. the Duke of York.

On March 16 H.R.H. the Prince of Wales attended at the County Council Hall to receive a cheque for 50,000 guineas on account of the larger sum collected by the London Schools Hospital Fund.

Many of the Education Authorities outside the County of London, and many Independent Schools (including some of the Public Schools), organised entertainments and collections. The University of London organised the Scientific Novelties Exhibition during the Christmas holidays, the Delegacy of King's College kindly placing the whole of the resources of the College at the disposal of the Committee. Entertainments were arranged by University College, King's College, Colleges of Music, Law Society Students, Inns of Court, etc. The Art Students of London organised an exhibition of pictures at Devonshire House. A series of lectures and counter-lectures was given

by eminent authors and other well-known public men at the London School of Economics, by kind permission of the Governing Body, who also gave valuable assistance in other ways.

#### 9. THEATRICAL, MUSIC HALL AND CINEMA COMMITTEE.

A Theatrical, Music Hall and Cinema Committee was formed under the chairmanship of Sir Gerald du Maurier, with Mr. George Grossmith and Sir Oswald Stoll as Chairmen respectively of the Theatrical and Music Hall Sub-Committees. The main events were :—

Gala Performance, "Review of Revues," at the Hippodrome (June 26), attended by Their Majesties the King and Queen and H.R.H. the Prince of Wales.

Lady Tree's Matinée (June 27), attended by H.R.H. Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone.

Special Evening Performance (June 29) of "Sally" and "At Home," attended by H.R.H. Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, and the Earl of Athlone.

Miss Gladys Cooper's special Matinée, "The Second Mrs. Tanqueray" (July 26).

Film, "When Knighthood was in Flower," attended by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales (October 2), the first week's proceeds being handed over to the Appeal, as were also the proceeds of a performance of "Dear Brutus" and of "Tons of Money."

Special collections were kindly permitted in all theatres on July 8.

The Amateur Players' Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Arthur Chapman, organised a variety of amateur dramatic and operatic entertainments.

#### 10. SPORTS AND FÊTES BRANCH.

This branch was formed in order to approach sporting associations. Tennis Clubs were invited to organise tournaments, Golf Clubs to organise handicap competitions, and the Wrestling Association to give exhibitions. The principal events were :—

Collections on Derby Day, by permission of the Racecourse authorities, when 1,500 medical students went down to Epsom;

The Inter-Hospital Sports (June 10), attended by H.H. Princess Marie Louise;

The Motor Boat Review, organised by the British Motor Boat Club; and

River Collections during week-ends at Staines, Maidenhead, and Richmond.

#### 11. SMALL MONEYS BRANCH.

This Branch undertook the placing and distribution of thousands of special collecting-boxes among shops, railways, underground stations, clubs, hotels, public-houses, theatres and restaurants. A variety of special boxes were made in the form of telephones, scales, hats, etc., "shakos" for the Army, "Nelson" hats for the Navy, and Masonic collecting-boxes for individual Masonic Lodges. Clubs were invited to give 10 per cent. of their Derby Sweepstakes, and efforts were made through the Press to get householders to organise domestic collections. A prize was offered for the best suggestion for the collection of small moneys, but, though a very large number of suggestions were received, none of them was found to be worth adopting.

#### 12. CENTRAL EVENTS-IN-AID.

The main events organised centrally were as follows :—

Empire Flag Day (May 14), organised by the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society.

Albert Hall Ball (June 28), with H.R.H. Princess Mary, Viscountess Lascelles, as President, attended by H.M. the Queen, H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, and other members of the Royal Family.

Garden Party at the Botanical Gardens (June 30), organised by the League of Mercy, attended by H.R.H. the Duchess of Albany, H.R.H. Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, and other members of the Royal Family.

Guildhall Dinner (July 10), attended by H.R.H. the Duke of York.

"Our Day and the Prince's Day" (October 6), organised by the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society.

### 13. LOCAL EVENTS.

Local events which had the support of the Headquarters Organisation were organised in various Boroughs, e.g. :—

Camberwell Intensive Fortnight.

Tufnell Park Fête.

Islington Carnival.

Southwark Carnival.

Lambeth Pageant and Carnival, and Vauxhall Gardens Fête.

St. Pancras Intensive Week.

Ealing Intensive Week.

Metropolitan Hospital Carnival (Hackney, Stoke Newington, Bethnal Green, Finsbury, and Shoreditch).

Many entertainments were organised from outside for the benefit of the Appeal, including Concerts, Bridge and Whist Drives, Dances, Allotment Holders' Produce Display, etc.

### 14. DEVONSHIRE HOUSE.

Through the courtesy of Messrs. Holland & Hannen and Cubitts, Ltd., Devonshire House was loaned for a period of some months, commencing at the beginning of November. The ground floor and the second floor were used as offices for the Advertisement Prize Competition; the rest of the house was thrown open to the inspection of the public, and Wireless Concerts were provided. Dances were also held at Devonshire House during November and December.

### 15. GIFTS.

Gifts in kind were invited through the Press to be sold for the benefit of the Appeal and included Sir John Lavery's painting of the "First Wounded," presented by the artist. H.M. the King sent twenty-four brace of pheasants shot by himself.

### 16. PRIZE COMPETITION.

The public were invited to place in order of merit sixteen out of twenty posters, paying 5s. for an entry coupon. Prizes, amounting to £11,000, were given by ten firms whose posters formed the subject of the Competition; the balance of the prize fund (£4,000) and expenses up to £10,000 were guaranteed by Schweppes, Ltd.

## 17. RESULTS.

It is not possible to allocate strictly the results obtained from each of the above activities. A statement of receipts and expenses is appended; but some further detail may be of interest.

The value of a personal approach was very obvious in the City; the greater part of the donations given by companies and firms came in reply to the letter sent out by Lord Revelstoke and Mr. Norman. The sums directly traceable to this source amount to £62,734. A small proportion only of City Associations responded to the invitation to open auxiliaries, and in each case where substantial sums were raised personal influence was brought to bear by Lord Revelstoke and others; the principal auxiliary lists were: Lloyd's, per Mr. A. L. Sturge, £13,516; Stock Exchange, per the Hon. Assheton E. Harbord, £10,056; London Master Builders' and Allied Industries Association, per Mr. Ernest T. Brown, £2,047; Wool Sale Room, per Mr. R. B. Jacomb, £1,327. Similarly, it was by the personal help of Mr. Holland-Martin and others that donations were obtained from some of the City Companies.

(4) Of all the L.C.C. Schools only three failed to respond, the contributions ranging from 5s. from a poor school in a struggling neighbourhood up to £650 from a large secondary school. Two school Flag Days produced £7,000; the sale of Christmas dainties £2,200; the Choral Festival at the Albert Hall more than £800. The Schoolkeepers' and Women Cleaners' Association collected £220.

The schools under extra Metropolitan Education Authorities raised £3,200 (including £768 paid through Civic Lists), Willesden Teachers' Association contributing £870, Wimbledon, Twickenham, and Teddington Teachers' Associations £670, Wood Green schools £475, and Tottenham Teachers' Association £385.

Public schools, professional and commercial schools, colleges, etc., contributed £1,325: other private and independent schools raised £2,854, the highest contribution being South Hampstead High School, £234.

More than 3,000,000 stamps, bearing the arms and badges of twenty-five hospitals, were sold in L.C.C. and other schools, producing approximately £15,000.

The takings at the Scientific Novelties Exhibition amounted to £1,923.

#### 18. GENERAL COMMENTS.

(1) The poster campaign gave very wide publicity at comparatively small expense, owing to the great amount of free facilities obtained for posting.

(2) Except during the Intensive Fortnight, little was spent on the Press, apart from the publication of lists of donations (and the advertisements of the Competition), but several papers were most generous in the amount of free publicity given.

(3) The experience of the Appeal suggests that it is wise to limit Events-in-Aid and to concentrate on a few important fixtures. The main central events—Empire Flag Day, the Albert Hall Ball, the Garden Party at the Botanical Gardens, and the Guildhall Dinner—strongly supported by Royalty and widely noticed in the Press, were valuable for publicity purposes, as well as for the amount of cash brought in. The events organised by the Educational Auxiliary were attractive on their own merits, and raised very considerable sums. But some other events, both central and local, did not repay adequately the effort which they dissipated in many directions, making demands, not only on the staff, but on our publicity department and on individuals and firms who were pressed to take tickets or give supplies or services.

(4) The value of a personal approach has already been noted; another potent influence was the force of example. Firms inquired of the banks what others were giving; a cheque for £1,000 raised by personal influence to £2,000 set the standard for the contributions of similar companies; the publication of the first list of donations in June noticeably stimulated the flow of receipts.

(5) Perhaps the most striking feature of the Appeal was the large sum raised in the schools of London and Greater London by the enthusiasm of teachers and pupils. The great success of the Scientific Novelties Exhibition, and of the activities of the Educational Auxiliary generally, suggests

that in Education, Science, Literature, Art and Law, there is a field open to a central organisation which is not open to individual Hospitals; influence has been enlisted and interest aroused which should not be lost; and, apart from the money which may be raised in this field, valuable service can be done for the Hospitals by spreading therein the knowledge of their work and needs.

(6) The Appeal has done more than raise a large sum for the Hospitals; its propaganda has no doubt reached a multitude of new potential subscribers. Not only has the general question of the Voluntary Hospitals been brought prominently before the public, but each district has been placarded and circularised with pictures of its principal Hospitals, with the object of impressing on local residents that these are "*your*" Hospitals, which rely on the voluntary contributions of the locality. It is anticipated that this publicity will prove helpful to Hospitals. Further, assistance has been given to two new movements, started to enlarge the permanent income of the London Hospitals. The Hospital Saving Association, under the chairmanship of Viscount Hambleden, has begun the organisation of regular contributions from wage-earners, and has already enrolled many thousand contributors of 3d. per week. The Domestic Workers' Auxiliary, under the ægis of the League of Mercy, had a good send-off at a meeting at Devonshire House in December, and has made a hopeful start in enlisting the interest of domestic workers from centres formed in Kensington, Paddington, Fulham, St. Pancras, Westminster, and Hampstead, as well as in Epsom, Kingston, and Uxbridge.

(7) The Appeal was launched, not at a chosen moment, but at a time of severe trade depression and high taxation, and was interrupted by the General Election. Under all the circumstances the Committee regard the result of the Appeal as satisfactory. A net sum of £416,000 has been raised, and, in addition, the full amount of the Government Grant available for the Hospitals of London, namely, £225,000, has been earned.

The success of the Appeal was mainly due—

- to the exceptional measure of support given by H.M. the King and many members of the Royal Family;
- to the personal association of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales with the Appeal;
- to the influence exerted by the Treasurers and Trustees;
- to Viscount Burnham, Chairman, and Professor Winifred Cullis, Vice-Chairman of the Educational Auxiliary, and Mr. J. W. Samuel, Chairman of the London Schools Hospital Fund, and their co-workers;
- to Mr. F. B. Elliot, Secretary, and Mr. Macrae, Accountant, who had the delicate task of watching expenditure without damping down enthusiasm;
- and to Mr. E. S. Shrapnell-Smith, who brought to the direction of the campaign an unflinching fund of energy and resource.

To these and to the Mayors and Chairmen of Urban District Councils, to the Chairman, Sir Gerald du Maurier, and the members of the Theatrical and Music-Hall Committee, and to all those who in many spheres and many districts of London gave whole-hearted service to the Appeal, the Committee desire to tender their most grateful thanks.

## Final Report of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal—*continued*.

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### III. REPORT BY DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE OF KING EDWARD'S HOSPITAL FUND FOR LONDON, WITH LIST OF GRANTS APPROVED BY THE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL COUNCIL.

1. The total sum reported to the Distribution Committee as being available for the special distribution by the King's Fund of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal, including all gifts earmarked to Hospitals co-operating in the Appeal, is £365,000, making, with £48,214 8s. 9d. distributed in other ways, a total distribution of £413,214 8s. 9d.

2. Of the £365,000 covered by the recommendations of the Distribution Committee, £250,000 has already been paid out in the form of cheques on account, namely, £150,000 on August 3, 1922, and £100,000 on October 30, 1922. The amount now payable to the Hospitals is, therefore, £115,000.

3. The list of grants recommended, as set out in the Schedule to this Report, shows the allocation of the total sum of £365,000. If this list is approved, the cheque sent to each Hospital will be the amount of the total grant, less the cheques already paid in advance. The Hospitals were informed, at the time, that the payments on account did not necessarily represent the judgment of the Council as to the proportions in which the ultimate total proceeds of the Appeal should finally be allocated.

4. In arriving at the amounts of the grants recommended, the Distribution Committee have adhered to the basis laid down in the original circular, issued in March 1922, inviting Hospitals to co-operate in the Appeal, viz. :—

“Each Hospital co-operating in the Appeal, on the conditions set out in the scheme, will receive a share of the proceeds based, *inter alia*, on the number of occupied beds and out-patient attendances, and on the evidence as to general efficiency, financial needs, and efforts made to assist the Appeal.”

5. The Hospitals to which grants are recommended are those which accepted the invitation of the Organising Committee to co-operate in the Appeal. This invitation was issued to all the Hospitals on the list of the King's Fund as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, whether on the King's Fund ordinary distribution list or not. Out of 127 invited to co-operate, 120 accepted, and appear on the list of grants.

6. It will be seen from these facts that, as regards both the list of Hospitals and the relative amounts of the different grants, the special distribution of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal differs from the ordinary distribution of the King's Fund, the money having been collected by a special organisation, in special ways, and subject to special understandings with the Hospitals that suspended their separate efforts in order to join in the Appeal.

# King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C. 4.

## TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the five standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 and 2.

Since July 1921 the Fund, by the invitation of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, has acted as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance, and is actively engaged in promoting schemes for this purpose.

## RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes

or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 89).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

#### METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-six years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £4,286,854 to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1922 being £220,000, in addition to £250,000 on account of the proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 4s. 11d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just under 3d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £339,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-four years, the contribution in 1922 being £15,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different hospitals (see below). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are being encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed. An enquiry is at present (July, 1923) being held into Hospital accommodation for Ambulance Cases.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Pensions for Hospital Officers; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

## SOME EXTRACTS FROM THE FINAL REPORT OF LORD CAVE'S COMMITTEE, June, 1921.

(Parliamentary Paper Cmd. 1335.)

"Is the voluntary system worth saving? We are convinced that it is. If that system falls to the ground, Hospitals must be provided by the public, and the expense of so providing them would be enormous. . . . But the money loss to the State would be a small matter compared with the injury which would be done to the welfare of the sick for whom the Hospitals are provided, the training of the medical profession, and the progress of medical research." (Par. 15.)

"We think it clear that in order to save the Hospitals from immediate disaster some assistance must be forthwith given from public funds; but we are also firmly of opinion, . . . that the assistance should be temporary only. . . ." (Par. 16.)

"**King Edward's Hospital Fund for London** has already performed admirable work in the organisation of the London Hospital system." (Par. 19.)

"The uniform system of accounts inaugurated and enforced by the **King's Fund** in London is of great value in enabling comparisons of cost to be made, and so in suggesting opportunities for economy." (Par. 25.)

"If the Voluntary Hospital is to continue and prosper, it must rely not only on the large subscriptions and gifts, but also, and to an increasing extent, on moderate and continuous contributions from all classes of the community. During recent years appeals to those engaged in industry to make a weekly contribution out of their wages have become more frequent, and the ready and generous response made to the appeals is perhaps the most encouraging feature which has come under our notice." (Par. 29.)

"The practice of asking patients treated at a Hospital, other than the necessitous poor, to contribute to the Hospital Fund is comparatively new, and is a product of the financial stringency. . . . There appears to be no reason why this practice should not be generally followed, provided that great care is taken not to exclude the very poor from benefits which are primarily intended for them." (Par. 38.)

"We have every confidence that if the (temporary) assistance recommended is given by the Exchequer, it will be within the power of those having control of our Hospitals, by means of economy in management and energy in interesting the public in their work, to maintain that voluntary system of which we are justly proud." (Par. 57.)

### SPECIAL NEEDS—1923.

The year 1922 having been largely occupied with the "Combined Appeal," organised by the King's Fund to assist the Hospitals to meet their immediate necessities, the chief need of the Hospitals for 1923 is a larger and more stable permanent income to cover the annual cost of working and to keep their equipment up to date.

There is still a gap of £174,000 between the Annual Income and the Annual Expenditure of the Hospitals of London and every supporter will appreciate the appeal to close this gap by increasing the regular annual income.
