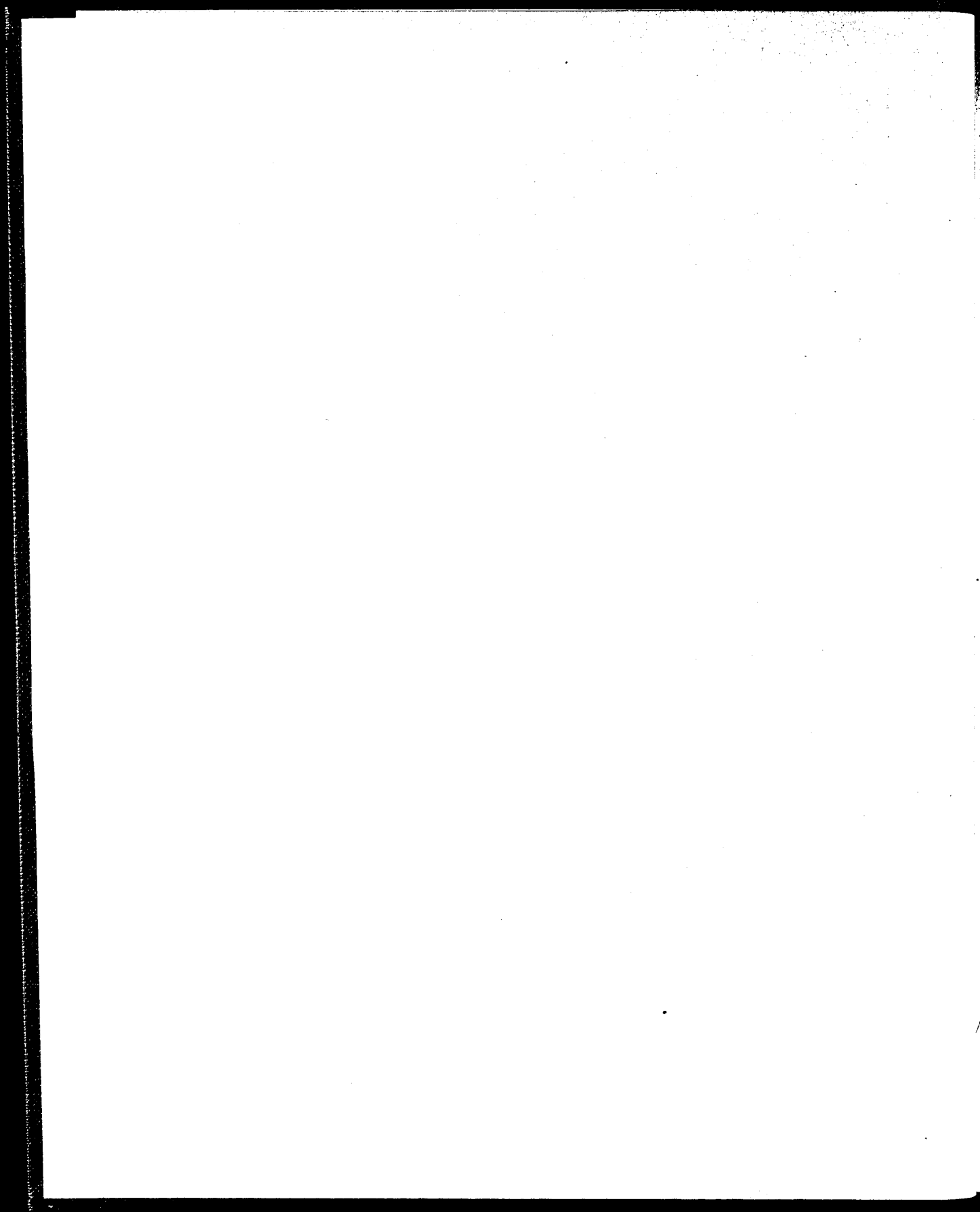

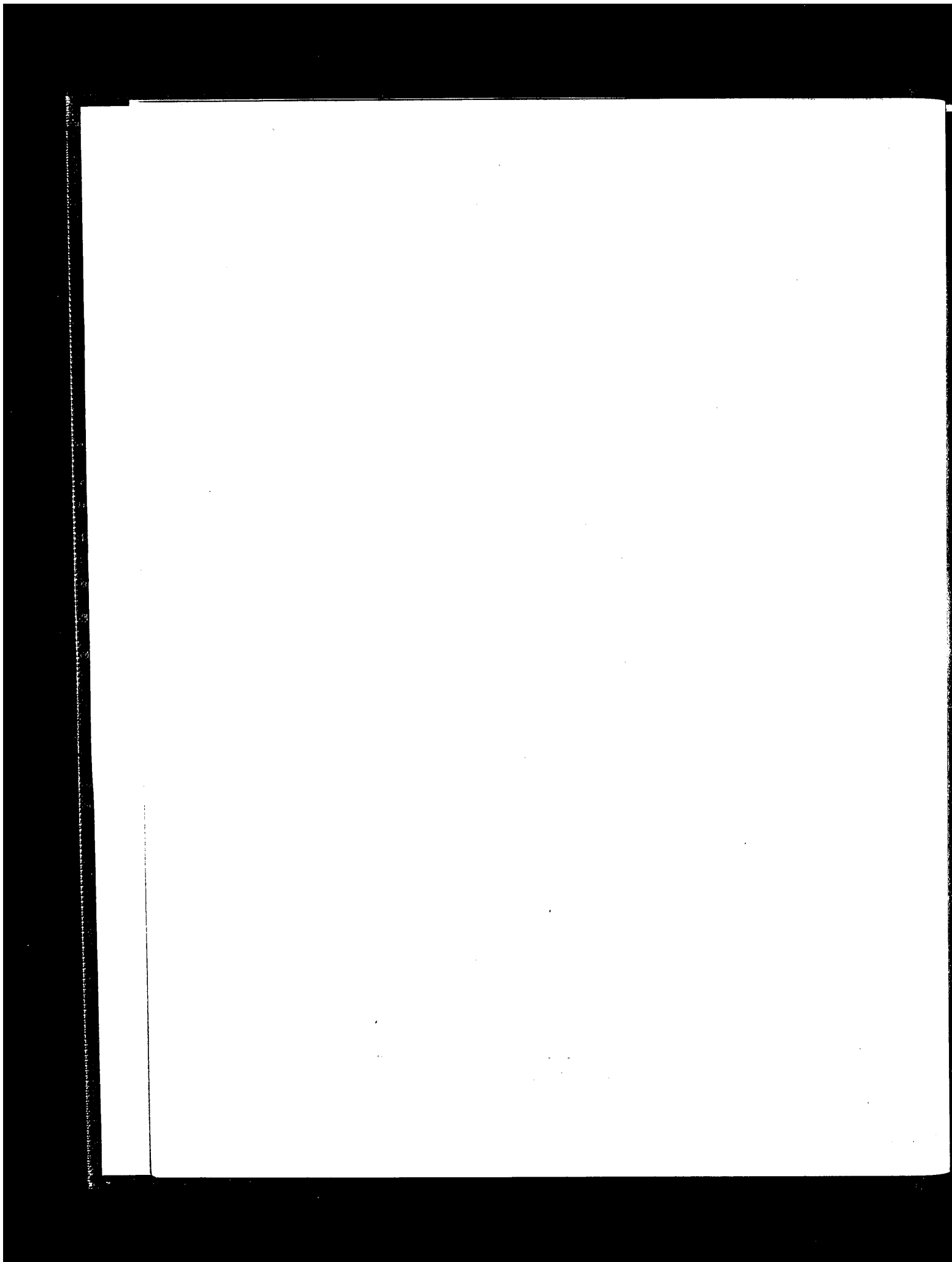

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1937

FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

1. The King's Fund was founded by King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, in 1897. Its fortieth anniversary was celebrated on October 22nd, 1937, by a luncheon given at the Mansion House by the then Lord Mayor, Sir George Broadbridge, to the President, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, the Members of the Council and Committees, and numerous other workers for and friends of the Fund. The Council are very grateful to Sir George Broadbridge for this kindly and generous action.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF THE YEAR.

2. The total amount distributed was again £302,000, including as in 1936 the ordinary distribution of £300,000 to hospitals and convalescent homes, and the District Nursing distribution of £2,000 in respect of the work done by the Associations in relief of Hospital Out-patient Departments.

3. The current income available for the distribution, derived from subscriptions, donations, income from investments and general legacies, again fell a little short of the amount required, the difference in 1937 being £3,700 as against £7,643 in 1936.

4. In addition to general legacies, the first instalments were received in December from the residue of the estate of the late Mr. Percy Johnson, the allocation of which will be considered when more is known of its probable amount.

KING'S FUND RECEIPTS.

5. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1937, including general income, contributions earmarked for capital account and special receipts, amounted to £470,763 *11s. 11d.*

making, with £100,100 15s. from the estate of the late Mr. Percy Johnson and £46 14s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, a total of £415,320 19s. 8d. The receipts earmarked for capital account were £30,826 11s. 5d., being the gifts of anonymous donors of £29,498 and £1,292 18s., and £35 13s. 5d. from the estate of the late Mr. Henry Herbert Wills ; and receipts on account of various special purposes amounted to £24,616 os. 10d.

8. The Distribution Committee, as always, received great assistance from the reports made by the King's Fund Visitors who inspect the Hospitals in June and July. Extracts on which the Committee desire the observations of the Hospitals concerned are now forwarded either at once, or shortly before the distribution meetings in the autumn, or with the grants in December, as seems most appropriate.

9. The total sum distributed among Hospitals and Convalescent Homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,262,430. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £9,077,284 has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

10. His Majesty King George VI, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to give an annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty The Queen, and Her Majesty Queen Mary, were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Gloucester, the Duke of Kent, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.

11. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland) Ltd., £1,000 10s. from "M.M.," £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers and Company, Ltd., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company.

Other contributions included annual subscriptions of £655 14s. 8d. from Mr. Philip Fleming; of £625 from Lloyds Bank, Ltd.; of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; and of £333 6s. 8d. from the Central Mining and Investment Corporation, Ltd.

Donations included £1,726 16s. 8d. from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Co., Ltd.; £1,050 from Viscount Wakefield; £1,000 from Messrs. Marks & Spencer, Ltd.; £500 from "J.R.B."; and £300 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust. The Fund also received three anonymous donations of £1,000 each, two of them being from the same donor, one in commemoration of the Coronation and the other of the Fund's fortieth anniversary. This donor had given £1,000 in 1935 in commemoration of the Silver Jubilee. In addition, the Fund received anonymous gifts of £29,498 and £1,292 18s. 0d. for capital purposes.

12. The Fund also received further gifts amounting to £20,000 for its radium service from a generous donor. With the aid of his donations the Fund's stock of radium has been considerably increased, and various schemes for increasing the usefulness of this method of treatment have been greatly facilitated.

13. The sum of £5,000 was received in 1937 from the League of Mercy, being the League's 40th contribution to the King's Fund. The League, since it was founded in 1899, has now contributed £574,000 to the Fund.

14. 15. The Council are very grateful to the Trustees of the Estate of the late Mr. Edward Clark for a further gift of £500 to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers, making a total of £7,500 received to date from this source.

16. In dealing with legacies, it has been the practice of the Fund since its foundation (i) to include in general income in the published accounts, as being legally available for general purposes, all legacies, of whatever amount, not earmarked by the testator for investment as capital or for some other special purpose ; (ii) to include in the estimates on which the distribution is based all general legacies, *i.e.*, those which are not exceptionally large, any resulting surplus or deficit being added to or taken from reserve ; (iii) to invest exceptionally large legacies, as was done with those of Lord MountStephen, Lady Wilton, Sir Thomas

Sutherland and Mr. Samuel Lewis, amounting in all to £1,980,000 ; though in one instance, that of the legacies of Mr. and Mrs. Wells, amounting together to £255,000, they were used to meet special and urgent hospital needs arising out of the War. The first instalments of the bequest of the late Mr. Percy Johnson indicate that this also will be exceptionally large, but a final decision as to its disposal has been deferred until more is known of the total that will be received.

17. The Council desire to emphasise the fact that the correct title of the Fund is " King Edward's Hospital Fund for London," and that the full title should always be used in bequests intended for the Fund.

EXPENSES.

18. Expenses during the year, covering all the widespread activities of the King's Fund, amounted to £16,873 2s. 6d. Less than a quarter of this sum is expenditure on the collection of funds and on propaganda for the King's Fund and the Hospitals.

BANK OF ENGLAND DISTRIBUTION AND OTHER SPECIAL TRUSTS.

19. The amount specially distributed on behalf of the Bank of England amounted to £2,260 10s. as against £2,310 10s. in 1936. The list of grants includes substantial donations to four of the building schemes for which Hospitals had made appeals to the Bank.

20. The Fund also made the following payments from trust funds for special purposes, viz., £939 18s. 2d. to the Miller Hospital in reduction of the building debt, out of the income of the special trust gift received in 1930 ; and £891 11s. 11d. to the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, under the Will of the late Sir John Young, towards the maintenance of the Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home, bequeathed to the King's Fund and used and managed by the Hospital in accordance with the terms of the Will.

DISTRIBUTION IN AID OF DISTRICT NURSING WORK FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS.

21. The second distribution of £2,000 for the assistance, through the hospitals, of District Nursing Work in relief of their out-patient departments, was carried out in April on the basis of the number of out-patients referred by hospitals to District Nursing Associations in 1936. Grants were thus made to 81 Hospitals in respect of 16,400 patients attended by 105 District Nursing Associations.

REDUCTION OF WAITING IN OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENTS.

22. A pamphlet on time-saving methods in connection with the arrival and registration of out-patients was issued by the Out-patient Arrangements Committee in June. It describes various ways in which very much has been done and can still be done by Hospitals to reduce waiting by shortening the interval between the time when patients arrive and the time when they see the doctor. At some Hospitals the hour for the arrival of the first patients has been deliberately fixed much closer to the hour for the arrival of the doctors than is sometimes thought possible. Other Hospitals have greatly reduced waiting by giving different times of arrival to certain different classes of patients. Others again have applied this principle still more effectively by introducing a system of appointments for groups of patients or even for individuals. The pamphlet urges all Hospitals to adopt these methods wherever practicable.

The Out-patient Arrangements Committee had already issued a similar memorandum dealing with time-saving methods at Hospital dispensaries, where patients get their medicines after seeing the doctor. The present pamphlet includes notes on all the items of procedure before they see the doctor. By thus supplementing the original recommendations of the Out-patient Committee of 1932, the King's Fund has now supplied Hospital Committees with information and suggestions dealing more or less fully with nearly the whole work of an out-patient department, and it is hoped that the great attention which the Hospitals are giving to the subject will lead to further considerable reductions in waiting.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

23. The new Hospital film, entitled "The War Without End," was completed in the Autumn with the aid of Lord Wakefield's gift, and was shown for the first time at the Leicester Square Theatre in the presence of His Royal Highness the President. Enquiries have been received from various parts of the world and it is hoped to secure a wide distribution, including a number of cinema bookings in the London area. The other activities of the Propaganda Committee included a lecture by M. André Maurois, which, by the kind invitation of the Ambassador, was given at the French Embassy; visits to places of historic interest in London for which special facilities were granted to the King's Fund; drawing-room meetings; and a continuation of the series of lectures to schools which have proved successful in awakening interest in the work of voluntary hospitals. The miniature Hospital was shown in various places, and arrangements were made, at the request of the Ministry of Health, for its loan to the Health Section of the Empire Exhibition at Glasgow in 1938.

24. The Council also desire to thank the Press for their co-operation, which has been very helpful to the Committee's various undertakings and to the work of the King's Fund in general.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

25. During 1936 and 1937 a further seven grammes of radium was bought with the aid of gifts received for the purpose from a generous donor. With this radium additional loans have been made to several Hospitals to enable them to develop the method of treatment at a distance, known as teleradium. The radium for this purpose is made up in large units of from 1 gramme to 4 grammes.

26. The Fund's radium now totals 17 grammes, of which about $16\frac{1}{4}$ are on standing loan to 18 Hospitals and the balance in a pool whence it is available, with some other radium lent to the Fund, for temporary loans when required to two of these Hospitals and 15 others.

27. The King's Fund continues to use its influence to secure that all these Hospitals should have adequate follow-up systems and keep records of the subsequent history of patients on the lines already adopted by the National Radium Commission.

CO-OPERATION AMONG VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.

28. The King's Fund encourages co-operation among Voluntary Hospitals, and itself co-operates in various ways with the British Hospitals Association and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London.

29. In February, when certain questions of principle affecting Voluntary Hospital finance arose out of contributory schemes, the Fund issued a circular to the Hospitals on its books urging the importance of co-operation with the Voluntary Hospitals Committee in the adoption of a common policy.

30. The Fund was consulted during the year by the Voluntary Hospitals Committee on a proposal to establish a central organisation which would facilitate the rapid admission of urgent cases to Voluntary Hospitals where beds were returned as available at the moment. By the end of the year a large number of Hospitals had assured the Voluntary Hospitals Committee of their readiness to co-operate; and the Management Committee had indicated their willingness to assist with the scheme and to make a recommendation to the Council on the subject at the Annual Meeting in 1938.*

31. Both the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association have had under their consideration the Collecting Charities (Regulation) Bill, and by the end of the year the

* The scheme, under the title of " Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service ", was approved by the General Council on May 27, 1938, and was put into operation on June 21.

Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee of the Fund, on behalf of both bodies, had agreed upon various suggestions in the hope of securing the objects of the Bill without detriment to the legitimate activities of Voluntary Hospitals.

32. The Council learned with great pleasure of the success of the scheme by which three combined Hospital flag days during the year took the place of the previous 77 separate days, and produced larger aggregate receipts. The representative organising Committee for the scheme had been set up as the result of conferences which the King's Fund was asked by the Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police and by the Hospitals to convene in 1936, and its Chairman, Lord Luke, was nominated by the Fund.

PERSONAL.

33. At the Annual Meeting in June a resolution of congratulation forwarded to Their Majesties The King and Queen on the occasion of their Coronation was read, together with a gracious reply which had been received. These are printed in the report of the proceedings at the Meeting.

34. His Majesty The King has been graciously pleased to present the Fund with a portrait of himself, as has also His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent. The Board Room thus now contains portraits of all the Presidents since the foundation of the Fund.

35. On July 6th, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent visited the Offices of the Fund and took the Chair at the ordinary meeting of the Management Committee. Pictures of the meeting were taken for inclusion in the new Hospital film "The War Without End."

36. The Council regret the loss by death of Mr. H. C. King, who had done good work on the Propaganda Committee since its establishment and had just been appointed a member of the Revenue Committee.

37. At the Distribution Meeting in December the President announced that Sir Leonard Cohen had been compelled by ill-health to resign from the Distribution Committee after 27 years of very valuable service, but would continue as an Honorary Secretary and a member of the Management Committee. It was with the deepest regret that the Council learned of his death while this Report was in preparation.

38. They have also to express their regret at the resignation of Dr. Garvie, who had been a member of the Council for 20 years.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1938.

39. Several causes combine at present to make it necessary for the hospitals to obtain still further increases in income : the rise in prices, the constant need for improved buildings and equipment to keep pace with modern developments, and the cost of administrative changes, of which the provision of better conditions for nurses is one example. It is therefore important that the distribution should be maintained, and as soon as possible increased, so that the knowledge which the Distribution Committee possess of the relative needs of the different hospitals, and the power of the King's Fund to give special assistance in cases of urgency, may be used to the best advantage.

MESSAGE FROM HIS MAJESTY THE KING

read by HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF KENT at the luncheon at the Mansion House to commemorate the 40th Anniversary.

" I wish to congratulate the King's Fund most warmly upon the successful completion of its forty years of progress.

" The annual distribution has grown steadily, beginning at £30,000 in the early years until now it has reached ten times that amount. The Fund thus fulfils its object of providing a stable source of income for the hospitals, but I am told that without increased support this level cannot be maintained to-day, and that the income does not suffice to maintain this figure without drawing upon reserves.

" The Fund has always been in a very special sense the concern of my family. It was founded on the initiative of my grandfather, King Edward VII, and I know very well the keen interest which my father always displayed in it. He used to recall the magnificent support given to it by King Edward's contemporaries as well as his own, and to express the hope that their successors would follow this fine example. As a representative of a younger generation, I earnestly trust that this hope will be generously fulfilled.

THE DUKE'S SPEECH.

THE DUKE OF KENT, addressing the Council, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read a gracious message from His Majesty The King :—

"Buckingham Palace.

"I would like to assure the Council of my constant interest in the work of the King's Fund for the Hospitals of London, and of my gratitude to those who, by their devoted services, contribute so much to its welfare.

"I send my best wishes for the future of the Fund and of the Hospitals which it helps to support.

A year ago His Majesty, then Duke of York, took the Chair at a Council Meeting of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for the first time, as its new President. In December last he appointed me as his successor, and I, in my turn, have to introduce myself to you as your new President.

At that meeting His Majesty referred to the Office of President as a great privilege and a great responsibility.

It was a privilege, he said, because of what the previous Royal Presidents had done for the King's Fund since its foundation by King Edward VII. He spoke of the Fund as being both a symbol and a practical expression of the interest of the whole of the Royal Family in hospital work, and their sympathy with hospital patients.

It was a responsibility, he said, because of the exceptional powers and duties of the President under the Act of Incorporation. The President appoints the Council, Committees and Officers, and, in many matters, they cannot do anything without his personal co-operation.

Like him, I accepted this post of President, knowing the King's Fund partly from its close connection with my family for three generations, and partly from the reputation it has gained. But I have since had the advantage of six months first-hand acquaintance with its affairs. It has been

one of my duties since January to approve the Minutes of all the Committee meetings. And I now have, in the Annual Report and Accounts which are on our Agenda to-day, the story of its work during the year 1936.

King George V's gift.

First of all I wish specially to mention the new heading on the Balance Sheet, "Gift of King George V, £20,000," the income of which is to form part of the annual distribution. This, as you will all remember, was announced by His present Majesty at your Meeting last June, and he added: "Every year the accounts of the Fund will thus contain a record of His late Majesty's constant interest in its welfare, and every year his gift will bring benefit to the Hospitals of London."

The gift itself is, I believe, unique; and it is indeed fitting that it should be permanently recorded in this way.

King's Fund Income and Expenditure.

I shall be asking Sir Edward Peacock to deal with other details of the Accounts. But I see that we received last year, in subscriptions, donations and legacies, about £98,000, besides the income from investments, and that this left a deficit on the year's working. I hope that 1937, my first year of office, will see this deficit wiped out, and the Fund once more in its usual proud position of paying its way out of current revenue.

The Annual Report, which Lord Donoughmore will present, shows what the King's Fund does for the Hospitals with the money it receives.

First of all there is the annual distribution of £300,000. To this has now been added the District Nursing distribution of £2,000. The total is therefore £302,000. The grants are made in December. But the preparations go on all the year round. For example, each hospital is inspected, and I have just appointed the Visitors for this purpose.

The Distribution Committee also examines all building proposals submitted by hospitals applying for grants. I already had first-hand knowledge of some of these at hospitals with which I am connected. But I had not realised how many schemes of extension and improvement there are, when you take the whole of London, as the King's Fund has to do. The total might surprise people who do not know how very much alive the voluntary hospital system is.

The special District Nursing distribution is based on the number of patients sent by hospitals to the District Nursing Associations, to receive nursing attention at home instead of at the out-patient departments. It is thus part of what the King's Fund is doing to promote the reduction of out-patient waiting. The second distribution has just been made and will be reported to you to-day by Sir Cooper Perry.

Besides our own distributions there are a few special funds which have been entrusted to us by donors who appreciate the work of our Distribution Committee. Last year, for example, we again allocated on behalf of the Bank of England, among hospitals which apply to them for donations, the increased amount which the Bank now sets aside each year for distribution in this way.

But the King's Fund, as a central body, has acquired many functions besides the collection and distribution of money.

Radium.

There is, for example, the administration of the stock of radium which the King's Fund lends to hospitals, and which I see has been increased to 17 grammes. This is the result of some further large donations from a very generous friend. Like your previous Presidents, I have had the pleasure of expressing to him, on your behalf as well as my own, my personal thanks. The King's Fund is thus being enabled to help forward the recent rapid developments in radium treatment at hospitals.

Special Reports.

Four special Reports have been prepared and published for the assistance of hospitals.

The first was an explanatory memorandum on the Voluntary Hospitals (Paying Patients) Act, which was passed in May, 1936. The Act was promoted by the King's Fund in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association in 1935, to facilitate the provision of pay beds in addition to ordinary beds.

The second was a new Memorandum on Fire Precautions at hospitals. This was prepared by the Management Committee, in consultation with three Hospital Secretaries and with the help of Major Morris, the Chief Officer of the London Fire Brigade, to whom I should like to express my thanks. It thus embodies the latest experience both of the voluntary hospitals and of the London County Council hospitals. Its value is illustrated by the fact that the Ministry of Health have commended it to the attention of local authorities throughout the country, and that copies have been sold to South Africa, India and Hong Kong.

The third was a special report by the Hospital Economy Committee on the progress of the hospitals during the past fifteen years. It is a supplement to their two annual reports. One of these deals with the work, income and cost of each separate hospital, and the other with the hospitals as a whole. The new report shows how greatly the voluntary hospitals of London have increased their work, their expenditure, and also, I am glad to say, their income during these last 15 years, in spite of the financial difficulties of that period. In addition to the constantly increasing cost due to the advances of medical science, the hospitals have now to face the rise in prices.

The fourth is the new Memorandum, published this week, on the reduction of waiting in Out-patient Departments. In their last report the Out-patient Arrangements Committee dealt with the out-patient dispensary, where patients get their medicine just before leaving. The present one discusses ways of saving time at the other end: when the patients arrive and before they see the doctor.

I am sure the Council will wish to congratulate the Out-patient Arrangements Committee and their Chairman, Dr. H. Morley Fletcher, on a very useful piece of work. I know it is not easy for Committees to deal with details which may seem unimportant in themselves, and may yet have such important effects when taken as a whole, and I trust the Hospitals will give the report the close attention it deserves.

The King's Fund also took a leading part in the conferences which led to the numerous Hospital Flag-days being combined. It was asked to do so both by the Commissioner of Police and by the Hospitals.

These are only some of the activities of the King's Fund as a central body, but they are enough to show that it has many functions beyond the collection of money.

You have also before you, in the Report presented by Lord Luke, an account of what the Propaganda Committee have been doing to increase public interest in the work of the Hospitals and of the King's Fund. We are greatly indebted to Lord Wakefield for his generous gift which has enabled the Committee to undertake the preparation of a new Hospital Film.

An Anonymous Gift.

I have much pleasure in announcing that during the present month an anonymous donor, who has given £1,000 each year during the past few years, has transferred to the Fund about £30,000 in securities, which should bring in that income permanently. I have already expressed my thanks to him privately, and I now do so publicly in your name as well as my own.

Personal.

I have now some personal matters to mention. By the death of Mr. H. C. King the Propaganda Committee has lost one of its oldest and most useful members, whom I had just appointed a member of the Revenue Committee. The death of Sir Ernest Morris is lamented by all who knew him: he resigned from the Out-patient Arrangements Committee as recently as December last.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock, as Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee which looks after our investments, to present the Accounts.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1936.

SIR EDWARD PEACOCK, the Honorary Treasurer, in moving the adoption of the Accounts, said that it was very desirable that there should be no reduction in the distribution of £302,000, but there must be a substantial increase in income if this was to be avoided.

Up to and including 1934 the current receipts provided the amount required. In 1935, however, there was a shortage of nearly £7,000 and in 1936 a shortage of over £7,000.

Had there not been some exceptional income from investments during the year the shortage would have been very much larger. Receipts from the League of Mercy and the British Charities Association were less in 1936 than in 1934 by £15,000. On the other hand, large donations had been kept up mainly owing to anonymous gifts of £15,000 and £10,000 in the last two years from a very generous friend whose donations in the past fourteen years now totalled £88,500 in amount. For eight years legacies had remained very steady at between £60,000 and £70,000 a year, but in 1936 they had amounted to only £44,000. It was hoped that this large decrease would be only temporary.

The anticipated permanent decrease in income from investments owing to the Silver Jubilee Distribution and to the fall in the value of money had so far been balanced by an increase in certain dividends, which they hoped might continue, and the income from the capital gift of £20,000 from His late Majesty King George V, which now appeared permanently on the balance sheet. He cherished the hope that in one way or another they might hope to be able also to create a special fund for assisting Hospitals to carry out some specially important schemes or to overcome unusual financial difficulties.

The needs of the Hospitals did not grow less. The advance in medical service and the rise in prices combined to increase the expenditure. The King's Fund was more ready than ever, with its forty years of accumulated experience, to perform the function for which it was founded by King Edward VII. All those who recognised the claims of the London Hospitals but had no special knowledge or attachment to guide them in choosing a particular Hospital, would find in the King's Fund the ideal agent for carrying out their wishes in the most effective way.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the CHIEF RABBI (the Very Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), was then put and carried unanimously. (See page 54 of Fortieth Annual Report.)

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1936.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (THE EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) moved the adoption of the Annual Report for 1936, and, Mr. H. L. EASON having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted. (See page 5 of Fortieth Annual Report.)

DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION, 1937.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY) presented a Report on the District Nursing Distribution in respect of 1936 and moved the recommendations. (See page 45.)

SIR WILLIAM COLLINS said that, as Chairman of the Central Council for District Nursing in London, he had been particularly asked by the Associations to mention to the Council their gratitude not only for the financial aid given, but for the recognition of their work.

The recommendations were seconded by SIR BASIL MAYHEW and carried unanimously.

REPORT OF REVENUE AND PROPAGANDA COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (LORD LUKE) presented a Report of the Committee on the income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moved that it be published.

THE MARQUESS OF CREWE (Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London), in seconding the motion, said that he wished to express the satisfaction which all who were concerned with the administration of the County of London felt in the work of King Edward's Hospital Fund, connected as it was with the name of the illustrious Sovereign whose memory remained so fresh in the minds of the older generation, and would be carried on in perpetuity by the work of the Fund.

The motion was then unanimously carried. (See page 48 of Fortieth Annual Report.)

REDUCTION OF WAITING IN OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENTS.

In a statement by the Chairman of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee (DR. H. MORLEY FLETCHER), which was read by SIR HAROLD WERNHER, it was reported that another memorandum had been issued by that Committee on methods of reducing the waiting time in out-patient departments. The report dealt with the possibilities of saving the patient's time before he saw the doctor. Although a good deal of waiting was inevitable when large numbers of patients were being

dealt with, the Committee's enquiries had shown that very much was being done by hospitals to reduce this waiting. The report described many interesting experiments of this kind which the Committee had seen in progress, and it was hoped that it would assist all hospitals to ascertain whether their own waiting time was capable of reduction and, if so, how to reduce it. (*See page 94.*)

The Committee had made some suggestions towards a model scheme of out-patient records, which were founded on the present practice of certain hospitals, and from which it was hoped that all hospitals would be able to benefit. The Committee were anxious that members of Hospital Committees, as well as Hospital Secretaries, should take a lively interest in their out-patient departments.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS said that this was a very interesting statement, and he was sure they were greatly indebted to the Chairman and members of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

VISCOUNT WAKEFIELD, in moving a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for presiding, said that they were grateful to him for his able service in the Chair and were sure that His Royal Highness's tradition of service and his radiant personality would be a great asset to the Fund.

THE DOWAGER LADY AMPHILL, in seconding the motion, said that it was a privilege for the members of the Council to serve under His Royal Highness. They all knew his interest in hospital work and social service, and they looked forward to making progress with the Fund during his continuation in the Presidency.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings then terminated.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 14th, 1937.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, December 14th, 1937, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent being in the Chair.

THE DUKE'S SPEECH.

THE DUKE OF KENT, addressing the Council, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read a gracious message from His Majesty The King, Patron of the Fund. This is what The King says :—

“ I am glad to hear that the Council have decided to maintain the distribution to the hospitals at £300,000, and I trust that it will not be long before, by additional donations, the income will again reach this figure.

“ The enterprise shown by the hospitals at this time certainly deserves every support. Many of them are undertaking the reconstruction of buildings which are out of date. I am pleased to see that in this they are receiving the help and encouragement of the King's Fund.

Grants to Hospitals.

This the first annual distribution in which I have had the pleasure of taking part as your President.

The total amount of the grants to hospitals and convalescent homes is £300,000, the same as in recent years, besides £2,000 already paid over to District Nursing Associations. I should like to have seen an increase. But this is at present impossible. The reason is a very simple one. During the past few years the hospitals have been surmounting exceptional difficulties, and the King's Fund has been giving them exceptional help. It increased its annual distribution suddenly in 1932 from £275,000 to £300,000, and in 1935 it used part of its reserves to make a special Silver Jubilee distribution in aid of building schemes. Its income has not, as yet, grown rapidly enough to make up for the effects of this drain on its resources. There were deficits of about £7,000 in 1935 and 1936, and this year, unless more comes in before December 31st, we have to take about £8,500 from our reserves.

We are quite deliberately keeping the distribution at the high figure of £302,000 in spite of these deficits. We think that this is a time when the King's Fund should do what it can to help the hospitals with their immediate requirements, rather than adopt a policy of safety first. I trust that the importance of this will be recognised by the public, and that the deficit will soon be met by an increase in our income.

Legacies.

Meantime the capacity of the King's Fund to help the hospitals in the future is being increased by the receipt of the first instalments of the legacy of the late Mr. Percy Johnson. People often discuss the question whether legacies ought to be invested or treated as available income. In normal times the King's Fund has adopted a middle course. It has brought the smaller legacies into the ordinary annual distribution, and has invested the very large ones. On one occasion, however, two large legacies, those of Mr. and Mrs. Wells, were made the subject of a separate distribution to meet various special needs of the hospitals. Towards the end of November we received about £100,000 on account of Mr. Johnson's legacy. We have decided to keep these first receipts in suspense until we are better able to judge what the total amount of the bequest will be, and how it can be dealt with to the best advantage for the benefit of the hospitals.

Of the total amount distributed to the hospitals this year, about £30,000 goes to schemes of capital expenditure, and about £270,000 to maintenance.

Out of the £30,000 we are able to assist with a number of those schemes of extension, improvement or reconstruction which are such a notable feature of the voluntary hospital service at the present time. One of the very latest acts of the Distribution Committee which I, as President, have just approved, is the passing of the plans of the new Westminster Hospital. And this is very far from being the only important scheme.

Income of Hospitals.

As a rule the income of the hospitals, taken as a whole, just keeps slightly ahead of their growing expenditure. Last year, for the first time since 1926, it fell slightly behind. This was due not to any decrease in income, but to an increase in expenditure, caused partly by the growth of their work and partly by the rise in prices. The hospitals will thus need increased support to meet ever-changing conditions.

This makes the recent success of the combined flag-days all the more welcome. That the reduction of the hospital flag-days from 77 in 1935 to three in 1937 should have increased the aggregate receipts by £7,000 is a result on which we may congratulate all concerned: the Commissioner of Police who suggested it; the King's Fund which called the hospitals together; the representative hospitals' committee over which Lord Luke presided so ably; the hospitals which co-operated; and especially the public, in whose interests the change was made and who saw to it that the hospitals did not suffer.

One of the ways in which the King's Fund helps the hospitals to increase their income is by spreading a knowledge of their work. Through the generosity of Lord Wakefield, the Propaganda Committee have been able to prepare a new film, entitled "The War Without End," which shows a number of the most up-to-date scientific methods employed by hospitals in the fight against disease. I was very glad to have been able to attend the premiere of this film last week, and I can commend it in every way as being both instructional and interesting.

The Miniature Hospital is still proving to be an attraction. We were very pleased when the Ministry of Health asked us to lend it to the Health Section of the Empire Exhibition at Glasgow next summer.

Co-operation.

I am glad to see from the Annual Report of the Hospital Saving Association that the income from the contributors now exceeds £1,000,000. The Association was founded 14 years ago by the hospitals of London at the instance of the King's Fund. Its success is a wonderful example of what, in a district like Greater London, containing more than 140 voluntary hospitals, can be done by co-operation but cannot be done in any other way.

Co-operation is indeed becoming more and more necessary, not only among the voluntary hospitals themselves, but between the voluntary and the municipal hospitals, and the other health services. I was pleased to see the reference made by the Prime Minister and the Minister of Health to the work of both kinds of hospitals, when inaugurating the campaign for the fuller use of the public health services of the country. This should greatly promote the general recognition of the importance of co-operation.

To take only one instance, both branches of the hospital service are concerned in the subject-matter of the forthcoming Inquiry set up by the Minister of Health into the conditions of employment

of nurses, and both stand to gain in efficiency by a practicable solution of the far-reaching problems involved.

In London there is already a growing amount of co-operation both among the voluntary hospitals and between them and the public authority. The Voluntary Hospitals Committee, of which Mr. Chadwyck-Healey is Chairman, is the representative body for the discussion of all matters affecting the London voluntary hospitals as a whole, and it also consults on their behalf with the London County Council. The King's Fund helped to found it; it keeps in close touch with the Fund; and we supply its honorary officers with an administrative staff. I hear that high opinions are expressed of the work which our Assistant Secretary, Mr. Ives, does for that Committee.

Thanks to Supporters.

The King's Fund frequently receives offers of help which could not be given to a large number of hospitals separately. I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the French Ambassador who lent the Embassy for the lecture which M. André Maurois so kindly gave yesterday for the benefit of the King's Fund and therefore of the hospitals of London generally.

I should like also once more to thank Sir George Broadbridge who, as Lord Mayor, gave the luncheon at the Mansion House in October to the members of the King's Fund to celebrate the 40th anniversary of its foundation by King Edward VII.

I now come to some personal matters affecting the year 1938. Sir Leonard Cohen, after 27 years of very valuable service on the Distribution Committee, will cease to be an active member of that hard-working body, though I am glad to say that he will continue as an Honorary Secretary and member of the Management Committee. Dr. Garvie feels that the time has come when he should retire from the Council. Mr. H. L. Eason has resigned from the Hospital Economy Committee, after 12 years, on becoming Principal of London University, though he will remain on the Council. I propose to appoint to the Council the Earl of Dudley, Mr. Hugh Lett, Mr. J. A. Lowther and Dr. Berry; to the Distribution Committee Mr. James Paterson; and to the Hospital Economy Committee Dr. A. M. H. Gray. I appointed Major Astor to the Council in July last. Mrs. Christie and Mr. J. K. King have resigned from the Propaganda Committee; the Hon. Ian Lawson Johnston, Sir Edward Penton, and Mr. L. W. Taylor have joined it.

I am sure you will wish me to express your thanks and mine to the Distribution Committee, and to their Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry, for the reports which are before us to-day; and also to the Visitors for the annual inspection of the hospitals which receive grants.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

SIR EDWARD PEACOCK (the Honorary Treasurer) said that for the last three years the total net income had remained remarkably steady at a figure from seven to eight thousand pounds below the amount required for the distribution, but while the total income had remained almost stationary there had been considerable fluctuations in the details.

In 1936, including a single large gift of £10,000, donations had exceeded those of this year by £9,000. The League of Mercy was expected to contribute £5,000 less this year than last. Income from investments no longer included certain exceptional and non-recurring items received in 1936, and was £22,000 down. On the other hand, legacies had increased by £37,000. For a number of years legacies were steady at between £60,000 and £70,000 a year. In 1936 they dropped to £44,000. This year the Fund had received £81,500.

The deficit of £8,500 anticipated this year was less than 3 per cent. of the sum distributed, and it was considered most important to maintain the distribution, even at the cost of some call on reserves. But that could not go on indefinitely, and it was very much to be hoped that there would soon be an increase in the income sufficient to provide for the distribution out of current receipts.

His Royal Highness had referred to legacies and how they were treated. A large part of the funds distributed had always come from legacies, and this year that item amounted to £81,000 from 34 separate estates. Six times during the Fund's history very large bequests had been received, those of Lord MountStephen, Lady Wilton, Sir Thomas Sutherland, Mr. Samuel Lewis and Mr. and Mrs. Wells. The first four of these had been invested and the income only had been used for the annual distribution. The last two were used in exceptional circumstances for special grants, chiefly in aid of hospital building schemes. Within the last two or three weeks the first instalments had been received of what might prove to be another very large legacy, that of the late Mr. Percy Johnson, already mentioned by His Royal Highness. There had not been time to consider fully what should be done with this bequest, and it was therefore proposed to keep the amount so far received in suspense in the accounts for 1937. It was hoped that before the end of 1938 more would be known as to the total amount of the legacy, and it might be, by that time, more possible to judge whether the drain on the hospitals caused by changing circumstances would be likely to call for any exceptional action on the part of the King's Fund in the near future.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (*See pages 27 to 30.*)

SIR ERNEST POOLEY (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (*See pages 31 to 40.*)

The recommendations were seconded by the President of the Royal College of Surgeons, SIR CUTHBERT S. WALLACE, Bt., and carried unanimously.

SIR COOPER PERRY then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (*See page 41.*)

SIR LEONARD COHEN (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (*See pages 42 to 44.*)

The recommendations were seconded by the Chief Rabbi, THE VERY REV. J. H. HERTZ, D.D., and carried unanimously.

DATE OF POSTING CHEQUES.

On the motion of SIR WALTER LAWRENCE, Bt., seconded by MAJOR THE HON. J. J. ASTOR, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 17th.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1938.

On the motion of the Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee (SIR HAROLD WERNHER), in the absence of the EARL OF DONOUGHMORE, seconded by DR. GILBERT ORME, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1938.

VOTE OF THANKS.

THE EARL OF ONSLOW said that he had much pleasure in moving a very hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for taking the Chair that morning. He was sure that every one connected with King Edward's Hospital Fund rejoiced at His Royal Highness's undertaking the onerous task of the Presidency of the Fund. They welcomed his connection with the Fund not only for his own sake but also because it marked the continued interest which the Royal Family took in the charitable work of this country. The whole of the charitable work of this country might be said to revolve round the Royal Family. The success of the Fund had been a great deal enhanced by the continued interest which its Royal Presidents had shown in it, and which His Royal Highness had been graciously pleased to evince.

SOPHY LADY HALL, in seconding the motion, said that she was very grateful to have the opportunity of seconding the vote of thanks to His Royal Highness. It gave her the opportunity of saying how much she had enjoyed his speech on another recent occasion, and how extremely fortunate the King's Fund was to have him as President.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. The amount of the ordinary Distribution is again £300,000, making, with the District Nursing Distribution of £2,000 in April last, a total of £302,000.

2. The present Distribution of £300,000 includes £3,000 to convalescent homes not attached to particular hospitals. This is described in a separate report. The distribution of the other £297,000 among hospitals and their branches forms the subject of this report.

3. The grants recommended this year in aid of maintenance amount to £266,675 as compared with £265,950 in 1936, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure being £30,325 as compared with £31,050 last year.

4. As the result of increased expenditure, due largely to the rise in prices, the accounts of the hospitals for the year 1936, taken as a whole, showed increased maintenance needs. For the first time since 1926, the year of the general strike, there was a net aggregate deficit, this result being largely due to deficits at some of the twelve teaching hospitals. The Distribution Committee, in allocating the amount available for maintenance, have given special consideration to the needs of these hospitals, in view of their outstanding importance in the hospital service of the community.

5. All maintenance grants are made in respect of work done during the current year, and take into account any substantial changes in the numbers of beds. But in other respects the financial information which comes before the Committee is necessarily based on the last audited accounts, namely, those to the previous December. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different hospitals vary from year to year, the grants made by the Fund may also vary. It must not be assumed that a reduction in a grant implies dissatisfaction, since it is impossible for the Fund to give larger grants when and where there have been

exceptional deficits from causes outside the control of the hospital concerned, unless it also gives smaller grants when and where there have been exceptional surpluses.

6. The following grants made in previous years in aid of schemes have not been applied for and come up for consideration under the two years' rule :

 London Jewish Hospital, £2,000 (£500 ordinary and £1,500 Silver Jubilee) to extension,
 Metropolitan Hospital, £3,000 (£500 ordinary and £2,500 Silver Jubilee) to provision of pay beds and rebuilding of theatre and casualty department,
 Miller General Hospital, £4,000 (£1,500 ordinary and £2,500 Silver Jubilee) to new out-patient department.
 National Temperance Hospital, £2,500 (£500 ordinary and £2,000 Silver Jubilee) to new maternity wing,
 Royal Eye Hospital, £3,000 (£500 ordinary and £2,500 Silver Jubilee) to rebuilding and extension,
 Royal National Orthopædic Hospital, £1,000 to provision of pay block,
 Royal Northern Hospital, £1,250 (Silver Jubilee) to provision of new boilers,
 St. George's Hospital, £3,000 (Silver Jubilee) to reconstruction,
 St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, £1,400 (£900 ordinary and £500 Silver Jubilee) to theatre unit and nurses' home,
 Wembley Hospital, £950 (£200 ordinary and £750 Silver Jubilee) to new nurses' home and mortuary,
 Willesden General Hospital, £3,000 (Silver Jubilee) to extension,
 Woolwich and District War Memorial Hospital, £5,000 (£1,500 ordinary and £3,500 Silver Jubilee) to first part of second stage of extension.

The Committee are recommending that the £1,000 to the extension scheme at Jewish Maternity Hospital should be transferred to purchase of site ; that the £2,500 to new

maternity wing at National Temperance Hospital should be transferred on certain conditions to purchase of site ; and that the £3,000 to rebuilding and extension at Royal Eye Hospital should be transferred to first stage of rebuilding. The Committee are also recommending that all the grants in the list should be renewed.

7. Out of the amount entrusted this year by the Bank of England to the King's Fund for distribution the donations recommended make, with the annual subscriptions, a total of £2,260 10s., allocated as follows :—

8. The Visitors reports on the hospitals applying for grants have again been of the greatest assistance. The Committee have adopted this year a new method of dealing with the Reports. Extracts on which the Fund desires to have the observations of the Committees of the hospitals concerned have been divided into three classes. Those relating to matters which might prove urgent, such as fire precautions, have been, as usual, forwarded to the hospitals at once. Those relating to minor matters have this year been forwarded to the hospitals, and the replies received and considered, in advance of the distribution. The

original practice of forwarding extracts with the grants has thus now been applied only where it seems to the Distribution Committee to be more appropriate than either of the other methods.

9. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £300 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependants.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO CONVALESCENT HOMES NOT ATTACHED TO PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

1. The President and General Council have again fixed the sum available for distribution among Convalescent Homes which take London patients but are not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £3,000, being the same as last year.
2. The number of applications eligible for consideration was 58 as compared with 56 last year.
3. These Convalescent Homes contain 3,546 beds. The number of convalescent patients in 1936 was 32,181, of whom 26,356 came from London.
4. The Committee have continued to take into account the extent to which medical or nursing care or treatment is provided for the London patients.
5. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution implies dissatisfaction.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

REPORT ON DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION, 1937.

FOR WORK DONE BY DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATIONS FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS IN 1936.

1. The General Council have again allocated £2,000 for distribution in aid of the work of District Nursing Associations in relief of out-patient departments.

2. The distribution takes the form of grants to Hospitals to enable each Hospital to contribute towards the cost of the work done by District Nursing Associations for patients referred by the Hospital to the Associations for attendance at home instead of at the out-patient department. To simplify the procedure, however, the payments are made direct by the King's Fund to the Associations as from the Hospitals.

3. The first distribution was made in 1936 in respect of work done in 1935, and was based on the numbers of visits. In order to simplify the procedure still more, the present distribution, which is in respect of work done in 1936, is based on the numbers of patients.

4. The number of District Nursing Associations to which payments have been made is 106. The number of Hospitals referring patients to these Associations during 1936 was 81.

5. The amounts paid in respect of the patients of individual Hospitals have ranged from £350 1s. 6d. down to less than £1. The variations are due partly to differences in the numbers of out-patients treated by the respective Hospitals annually, partly to differences in the kinds of cases dealt with in the respective out-patient departments, and partly to differences in the extent to which Hospitals have as yet realised the value of the work which District Nursing Associations can do in relief of out-patient departments. Even among the larger general Hospitals with more than 100,000 out-patient attendances the grants range from £350 1s. 6d. to £7 4s. 2d.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON KING'S FUND RADIUM.

1. This Report continues the radium history of the King's Fund narrated in the earlier Reports, from the inception of the Radium Fund by Sir Otto Beit with a gift of £50,000 in November, 1928.

2. The following are the main stages in the development of the Fund's radium services :—

1929-1930.—Four grammes of radium purchased and distributed on loan among 20 Hospitals.

1930-1931.—With further sums received from the Thank-offering Fund and other sources an additional 6 grammes purchased. This made a total of 10 grammes distributed on loan among 24 Hospitals, of which 4 grammes was at one Hospital in the form of a 4-gramme unit for teleradium.

1931-1932.—The 4-gramme unit at Westminster Hospital, divided into four 1-gramme units, loaned to Westminster, Middlesex, Royal Cancer and University College Hospitals.

1935. Fund's radium withdrawn from seven Hospitals, and a Radium Pool established at the Middlesex Hospital for the use of these seven Hospitals, other Hospitals being admitted later.

1936-1937.—Purchase of a further 7 grammes of radium allocated to large units for the development of teleradium. The Fund's radium now totals 17 grammes (5 grammes in the form of small containers and 12 grammes in units of 1 to 4 grammes) available to 33 Hospitals, either by direct holdings or through the Fund's Radium Pool.

3. Since the last General Report on the Fund's radium made in May, 1936, the principal matters that have engaged the attention of the Radium Sub-Committee have been :—

- A. Purchase of further supplies of radium and its allocation in large units.
- B. Enlargement of the Fund's Radium Pool.
- C. Follow-up of patients.

A. PURCHASE AND ALLOCATION OF RADIUM.

4. The gifts received from a generous donor in 1935, 1936 and 1937 enabled the Fund to purchase an additional seven grammes of radium. This radium has been allocated to several Hospitals already holding the Fund's radium to enable them to develop teleradium, a method of Radium Therapy favoured by the present trend of medical opinion.

5. The seven grammes were allocated to the following Hospitals :—

By combining the above allocations with the units already on loan from the Fund, Middlesex Hospital has installed a unit of four grammes and University College Hospital a unit of two grammes. Westminster Hospital, which already had a four-gramme unit, partly made up of the Fund's radium, has made use of their allocation to make up a two-gramme unit.

6. The Fund supplied the special apparatus necessary to use the new units at Middlesex and University College Hospitals, and these Hospitals transferred the Fund's apparatus for the one-gramme units previously used by them to Marie Curie and Royal Free Hospitals. Westminster Hospital were able to adapt for their new two-gramme unit an apparatus they already possessed and the Fund met the cost of this renovation. The new units came into operation during the latter half of 1937.

In addition to supplying these new units with apparatus, the Fund has also supplied a new apparatus of an improved type for the existing one-gramme unit at the Royal Cancer Hospital.

B. DEVELOPMENT OF THE FUND'S RADIUM POOL.

7. The Radium Pool has been considerably enlarged since its establishment in September, 1935, by the admission of more Hospitals and also by additions to its stock of radium. Ten other Hospitals have been admitted, making a total of seventeen participating

Hospitals. Of these additional Hospitals two hold for their exclusive use some of the Fund's radium, but from time to time they have need of more radium or of radium in a different type of container than their holding; the other eight Hospitals have not previously had the use of the Fund's radium.

On the suggestion of the Fund, made to obtain the fullest possible use of the radium available, four of the new Hospitals agreed to lend to the Pool small quantities of radium owned by them. At the same time St. George's Hospital, one of the original participants in the Pool, transferred to the Pool on loan a quantity of their own radium. These loans increased the stock of radium in the Pool by 350 mgms.; in addition, the Fund allocated a further 200 mgms., bringing the total quantity of radium in the Pool up to just over 1 gramme.

8. Towards the end of 1937, the Fund was informed that the increasing activities of the Pool would render it necessary to provide greater protection for the Pool personnel against the action of radium during conveyance to the participating Hospitals.

The Fund decided that the journeys should be made by a car specially equipped to carry radium; a small car was accordingly purchased and, after being fitted with a heavy lead box in which to store the radium during conveyance, it was brought into use in January of this year.

9. Professor Russ, who directs the Radium Pool on behalf of the Fund, has reported that the participating Hospitals are making good use of the Pool facilities, and that the purchase of the car has not only provided the personnel with the protection required, but has also ensured more punctual deliveries of the radium.

C. FOLLOW-UP OF PATIENTS.

10. In the last Report it was stated that the follow-up cards of some Hospitals were deficient in the data they recorded, indicating an inadequate follow-up system, and that the Fund had taken steps to secure greater attention to this very important matter. A gradual improvement has been taking place, but the Fund is continuing to impress on the Hospitals the great importance of this subject.

D. PRESENT DISTRIBUTION OF THE FUND'S RADIUM.

11. In 1936, St. Bartholomew's Hospital, finding that their own radium was sufficient to meet their needs, returned the Fund's loan of 450 mgms. With this radium the Fund

made allocations to two Hospitals not holding the Fund's radium, namely, 250 mgms. to King's College Hospital and 65 mgms. to Croydon Hospital; 100 mgms. was added to the Radium Pool.

12. As a result of the foregoing redistribution and of the purchases mentioned above, 33 Hospitals have the use of the Fund's radium, 18 having separate holdings for their exclusive use and 15 having the use only of the Pool radium.

13. The Fund's radium was held on the 31st December, 1937, as follows :—

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1937.

1. The Revenue Committee beg to present the following Report.

2. The income of the Fund for the year 1937 available for distribution came to £315,173, including general legacies amounting to £81,754, but not including receipts for capital and special funds. In addition, the Fund received on account of the bequest of the residue of the estate of the late Mr. Percy Johnson cash and securities to the value of £100,100. As the legacy of Mr. Johnson has been reserved, pending a decision as to its ultimate use, it has again been necessary to draw upon general reserve to the extent of £3,700, in order to maintain the ordinary distribution of £300,000 and also provide for the District Nursing distribution of £2,000.

3. A preliminary estimate of the finance of the London Hospitals in 1937 has been made. This gives the approximate income as £4,571,000, and expenditure as £4,563,000, showing a net aggregate surplus estimated at £8,000.

4. The ordinary income of the Hospitals shows an increase of about £180,000 and legacies an increase of £177,000, making an increase in total income of about £357,000. There was a rise in expenditure estimated at £285,000. The rise in income was thus £72,000 more than the rise in expenditure, resulting in a surplus of £8,000 against a deficit of £64,000 in 1936. Legacies totalled about £575,000, the highest figure recorded since the figures were separately tabulated in 1921.

5. In spite of this improvement in total income, the number of Hospitals with surpluses shows a reduction. The figures are:—

As usual, many of the Hospitals with deficits one year had surpluses the next, and *vice versa*.

6. The Revenue Committee made a careful study of the figures of hospital incomes in 1936, prepared by the Hospital Economy Committee of the Fund and published in the Statistical Summary of the Work and Finance of the London Voluntary Hospitals.

7. The Committee noted that in 1936 there had been an increase in the four years since 1932 of £318,000 in ordinary income. The receipts from voluntary gifts and from invested funds had fluctuated within a narrow range. But the receipts from services had risen in the four years by £331,000. The Hospital Saving Association had been an important factor in this increase. "Receipts from Services" in 1936 included the sum of fully £470,000 from this Association. It should be realised that, while the Association makes its distribution on the basis of services rendered to contributors and their families, the money is derived from voluntary contributions collected by voluntary workers.

8. In 1936 the total Hospital Receipts were :—

This total includes £2,619,000 from voluntary gifts.

9. It is the object of the Propaganda Committee to keep before the public the work and the needs of the Voluntary Hospitals of London, and the part which the King's Fund plays in helping them. The Revenue Committee has much pleasure in submitting the following Report of their activities during 1937.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1937.

10. The Propaganda Committee have persevered in their efforts to promote and maintain public interest in the London Voluntary Hospitals, and to widen the circle of those who know and appreciate the work of the King's Fund.

11. The principal event of the year was the production of the new film, "The War Without End," made possible by Lord Wakefield's generous gift, as mentioned in our last Report, and its première, attended by His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, as President of the Fund, at the Leicester Square Theatre, on December 7th. This is a documentary film with spoken commentary and music, and illustrates some of the most up-to-date methods of hospital treatment. The earlier film, "A Century of Hospital Progress," still continues to be circulated by the Empire Film Library, who reported 94 bookings in 1937, of which 20 were in London, the aggregate audience amounting to 20,000.

12. The Committee desire to express their great indebtedness to the French Ambassador, M. Corbin, for placing the ballroom of the Embassy at their disposal on

December 13th, when M. André Maurois gave an address, in aid of the King's Fund, entitled "Conseils à un jeune Français et à une jeune Française partant pour l'Angleterre," and for his hospitality to the visitors after the address. There was a large and distinguished audience, and we owe it to the Ladies' Committee, under the Chairmanship of the Dowager Lady Amptill, that the sale of tickets realised £268. The Committee wish also to tender their best thanks to M. Maurois. The Chair was taken by the Marquess of Crewe, and the Earl of Athlone, who was accompanied by Her Royal Highness Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, moved a vote of thanks to the Ambassador and M. Maurois. This is said to be the first occasion on which the French Embassy has been thrown open to any outside body.

13. Two further drawing-room meetings were held, at 29 Portman Square, on February 24th and June 18th, when Miss Julia Neilson and the Hon. Harold Nicolson gave their reminiscences. On each occasion there was a large attendance, and Lord Luke used the opportunity to speak of the aims and activities of the Fund and the claim it has on all who believe in maintaining the voluntary system, but are not specially interested in any one Hospital.

14. In view of the Coronation, visits to places of historic interest were made a special item in this year's programme. Three series were arranged, under the title, "Coronation Tours." As an exceptional privilege, a party under the auspices of the Fund was permitted to visit Buckingham Palace in April. The demand for tickets far exceeded the maximum number authorised, and many who had to be disappointed generously asked that their cheques should be retained as donations to the Fund. The total proceeds from the tours amounted to £550.

15. Sir Edward Penton was elected Chairman of the Educational Sub-Committee, in place of the late Mr. H. C. King. The Sub-Committee were able to arrange between 40 and 50 lectures to schools and other suitable audiences, besides several visits to Hospitals by parties of elder scholars. At the suggestion of Mr. Ragg (Joint Managing Director of George Routledge & Sons, Ltd.), and encouraged by his experience as a lecturer, Dr. J. A. Hayward, who has proved one of our most popular speakers, undertook to write a book for young people on "The Romance of Medicine." This was published by Messrs. Routledge in October, and was very favourably reviewed. The book is dedicated to the King's Fund. In his Introduction Dr. Hayward says: "I was astonished to find how eager young audiences were to hear about Hospital work."

16. At the suggestion of Mr. Saxe Wyndham, it was decided to issue a decorative Envelope which should serve to commemorate the Coronation Year and also the Fortieth Anniversary of the King's Fund. We were fortunate in securing the co-operation of Mr. Russell Flint, R.A., and we are greatly indebted to him for preparing an appropriate and beautiful design. The

envelope was reproduced from Mr. Russell Flint's drawing, and was distributed partly through trade channels, and partly through our own organisation. It was on sale at several of the large London stores during the summer. His Majesty The King graciously accepted a specially designed box containing a hundred envelopes, presented to him by the Duke of Kent as President of the Fund.

17. We have to record, with deep regret, the death of Mr. H. C. King, who was one of the original members of the Committee, and also one of the most regular in attendance. He had previously served on the Educational Auxiliary Committee of the Hospitals Combined Appeal, in 1923, and had only just been elected Chairman of the Educational Sub-Committee, where his association with the personnel of both public and preparatory schools had proved especially helpful. We were also very sorry to lose the services of Mr. J. K. King, who was obliged to resign for reasons of health. As Headmaster of George Green's School, Poplar, he had been able to give much useful advice to the Educational Sub-Committee, on which he had served for several years. The Committee were glad to welcome as new members Mr. John Hassall, the Hon. Ian Lawson Johnston, Sir Edward Penton, and Mr. L. W. Taylor.

18. The Committee received a request from the Ministry of Health for the loan of the Miniature Hospital, to be placed in the Health Section of the United Kingdom Pavilion at the Empire Exhibition in 1938. To this request we were very glad to accede, on being assured that full acknowledgment would be made in the official programme. Through the good offices of Mr. D. A. Thomson, Messrs. Humphreys, Ltd., generously undertook to have the model thoroughly overhauled and renovated, free of charge, in time for the Exhibition. It was lent during the year for exhibitions at Croydon, Romford, Woolwich, and Northampton, for the benefit of local Hospitals.

19. Dr. Russell Reynolds, who has recently perfected a process for the taking of moving X-ray pictures of the interior of the human body, gave a demonstration-lecture, entitled "X-Rays and Cineradiography," in aid of the Fund, at Birkbeck College, on January 14th. Our best thanks are due both to Dr. Reynolds and to the authorities of Birkbeck College, who lent their theatre, free of charge, for the occasion.

20. The printed list of Hospital officers to whom all Press communications should be addressed was brought up to date, and the revised edition circulated to agencies and news editors of the London Daily Press. We are assured that the particulars thus supplied have proved helpful in preventing such misunderstandings as are liable to occur through the making of inquiries in the wrong quarter. The Hospitals, on their side, have been provided with useful information designed to facilitate the communication of news stories to the Press, as occasion arises.

21. A letter was received from the British Broadcasting Corporation expressing their regret that altered circumstances compelled them to discontinue distributing gramophone records to the Hospitals, but stating that the records were still available if the King's Fund could find some other means of circulating them. In order to overcome this difficulty, the Gramophone Company undertook to handle the distribution, and through their generous co-operation the Hospitals continue to receive the records as in the past.

22. In submitting the fifteenth annual report of our work, we realise that there is still much ground to be covered. Propaganda has been described as "a kind of special method of putting our case so that it may be understood by the people we want to influence." The word may, perhaps, have acquired a dubious reputation in some quarters, but, if the cause be a good one and the methods above reproach, no stigma can possibly attach to it. Moreover, this is the only effective way of making known to the public the work done by the Voluntary Hospitals. Convinced of this, and encouraged by the acquisition of several new members who will bring added strength to our efforts, we hope to continue the work with undiminished energy and to find means for enlarging its scope.

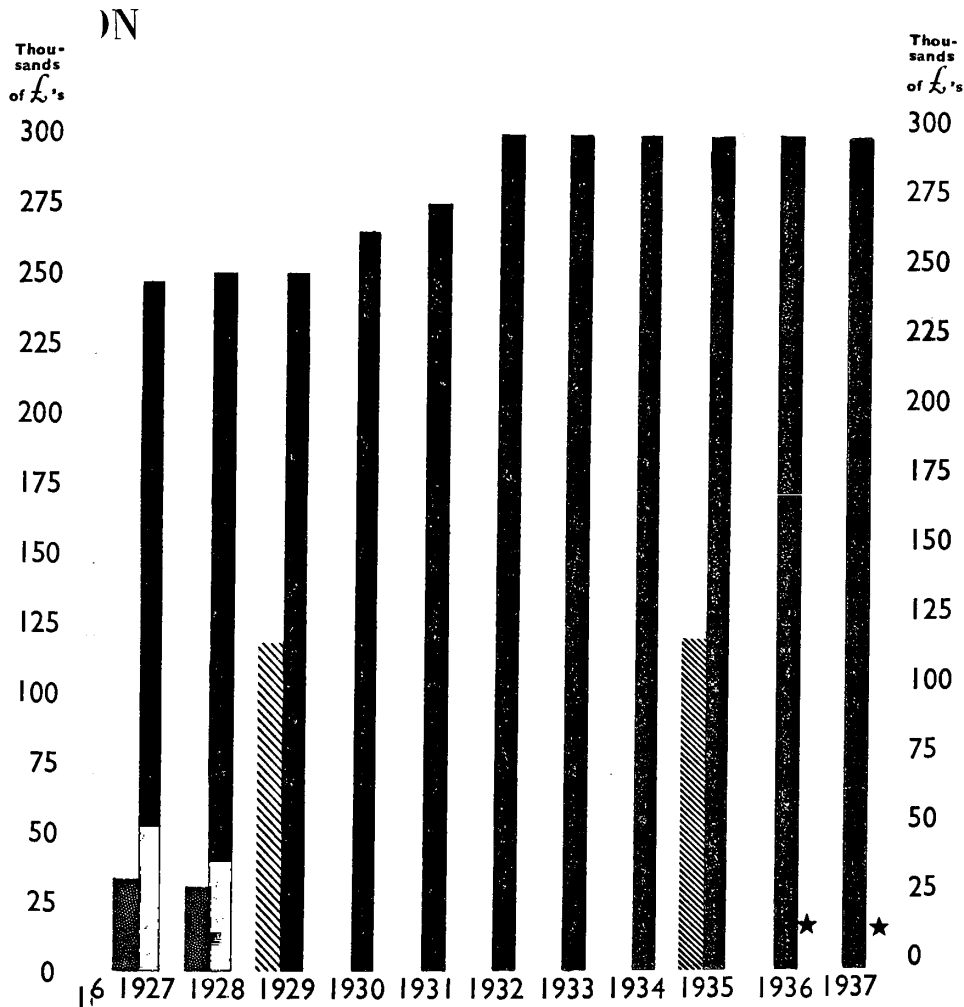

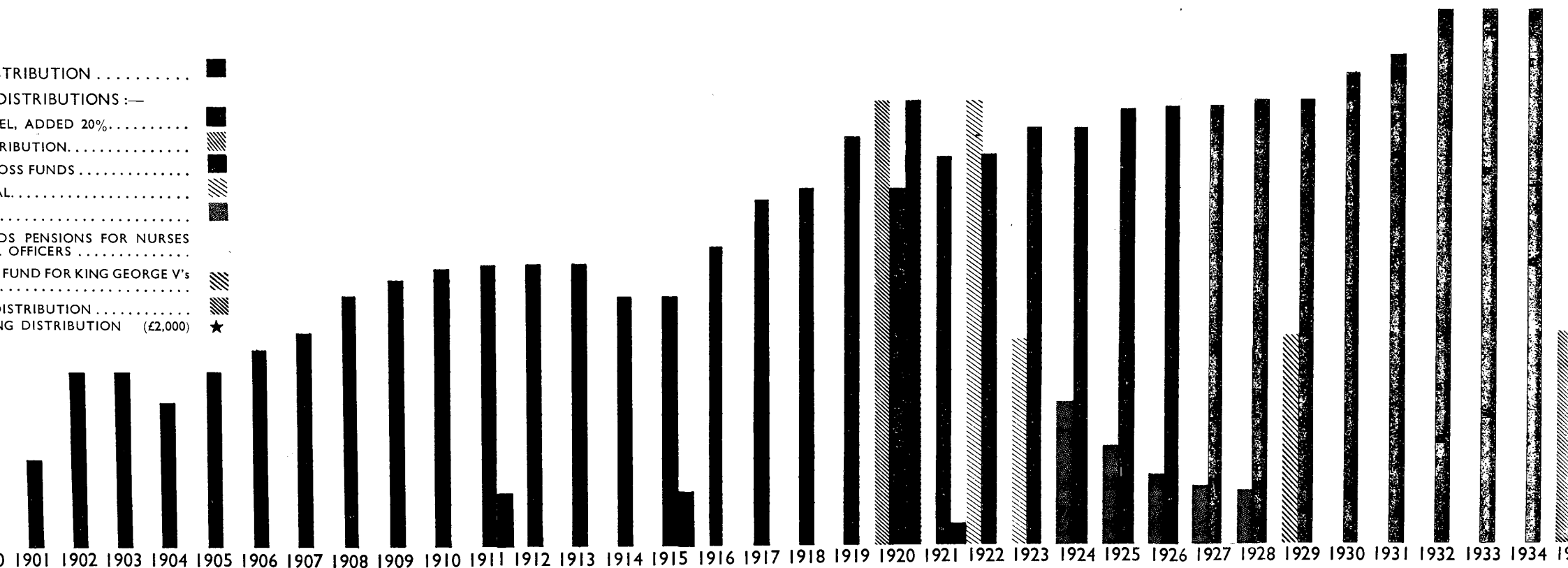

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January, 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1).

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His late Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1910 to 1936.

His Majesty King Edward VIII was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1919 to 1936.

His present Majesty King George VI was President, as Duke of York, from May 15, 1936, to December 10, 1936, and is now Patron.

On December 31, 1936, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :—

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

Special grants are made to hospitals to assist them to contribute towards the cost of District Nursing work in relief of their out-patient departments. But the Fund does not make grants direct to District Nursing Associations.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on page 93).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London (G.P.O. Box 465A), 10 Old Jewry, E.C.2.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the forty-one years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £9,077,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1937 being £300,000, besides a distribution of £2,000 for work done by District Nursing Associations for Hospital Out-patients in 1936.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £574,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-nine years, the contribution in 1937 being £5,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the

various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims ; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

The regulation prescribing the observance of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts facilitates comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary," which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these annual reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications on page 93.)

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, Pensions for Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours, Out-patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting. An Out-patient Arrangements Committee has been appointed to assist in carrying out the recommendations in the last mentioned Report (see page 94).

By means of a standing Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee the Fund assists to secure the interests of the voluntary hospitals during the consideration by Parliament of any bills affecting the hospital system.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1937, being 2,312 at 110 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit in 1929-30, £50,000 from another generous donor, and £37,000 received in 1929 through the Thank-offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

A central office for the admission to Hospitals of urgent cases has been established jointly by the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the County of London, under the title of Voluntary Hospitals Emergency Bed Service. (See paragraph 30 on page 11.)

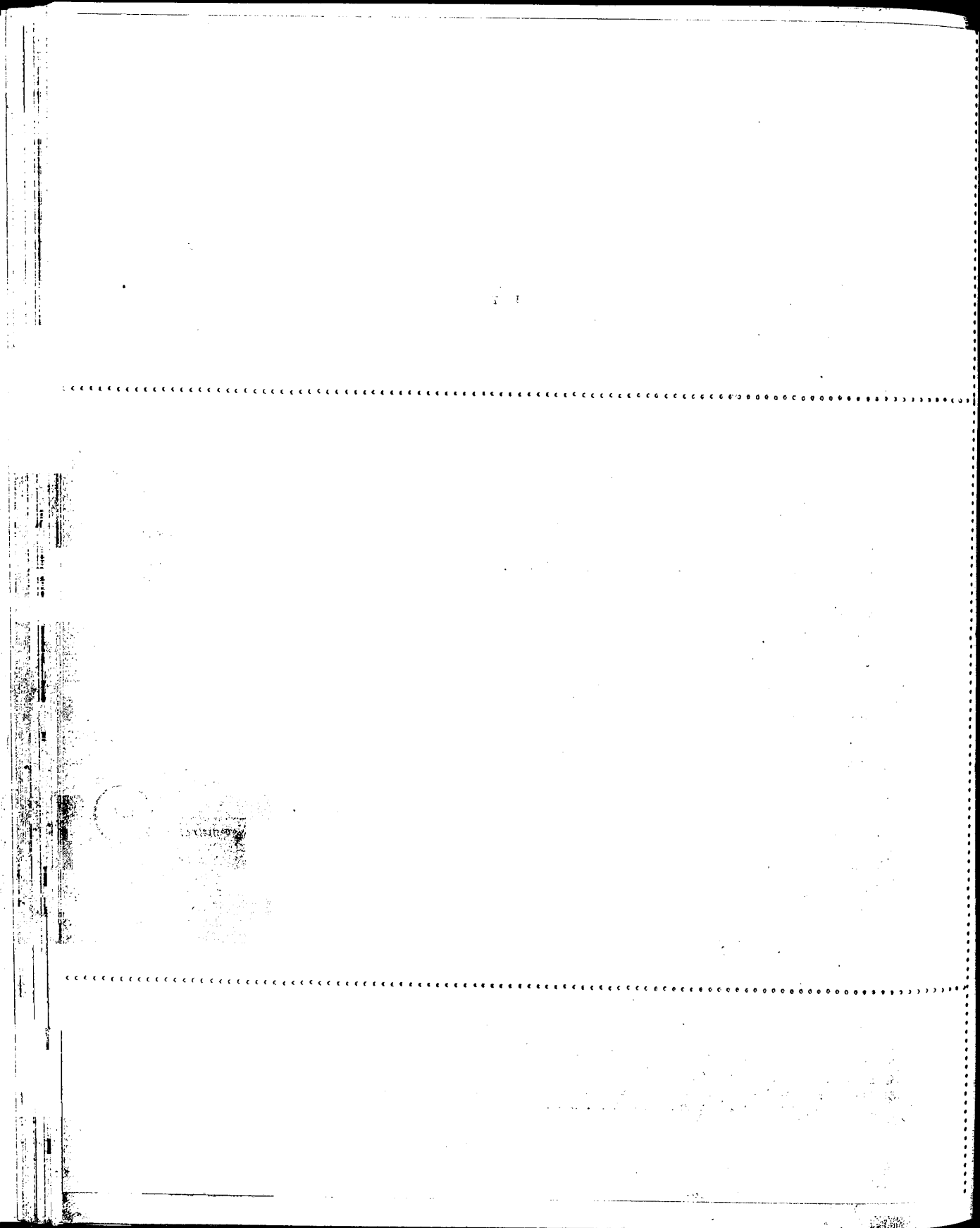
