ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1927.

THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE KING'S FUND.

- I. The year 1927 was the thirtieth anniversary of the foundation of the King's Fund by His late Majesty King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales. The event was celebrated by a luncheon at the Mansion House very kindly given by the Lord Mayor, Sir Rowland Blades, on October 18, to the members of the King's Fund and the leading workers for the League of Mercy. The Prince of Wales, as President of the Fund and Grand President of the League, was the principal guest. After describing the work of the Fund His Royal Highness thus referred to the progress made during the thirty years of its existence:
 - "Since its foundation there are more hospitals, many more beds, and far more work. A big hospital nowadays needs elaborate apparatus for scientific treatment. There are operations on cases which would have been considered hopeless thirty years back, and there are special departments and all kinds of expensive equipment. The expenditure in hospitals in London in 1897 was £700,000. Now it is £3,000,000. The King's Fund has played no small part in meeting these growing demands. If its work were better known it could do a great deal more. Surely an annual distribution that has risen from £32,000 to £245,000 is a great factor in hospital finance."

SUMMARY OF KING'S FUND RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

- 2. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1927 were £352,340 18s. 9d.
- 3. Of this, £22,000 was from the estate of the late Mrs. John Wells; £1,313 os. 8d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Florence Mary Hames; £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £15,004 15s. 10d. from general legacies; £67,638 4s. 3d. from gifts to capital (including £60,000 from the estate of the late Earl of Iveagh); and £245,382 os. 5d. from general receipts. - 6. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. The Council are very grateful to the Visitors for the reports, which are of the greatest assistance in the distribution.
- 7. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,360,688. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £5,819,104 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 8. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also were their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, the Duke of Connaught and other members of the Royal Family.
- 9. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £1,050 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from the late Earl of Iveagh, from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Lloyds Bank Limited, and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild &

Sons; of £525 from the Westminster Bank Limited; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Messrs. Morgan Grenfell & Co., from Mr. George Roberts, and from "W.C.W."; and donations of £1,000 from Lord Glendyne, £500 from "J.R.B.," and from Messrs. Wallace Bros. & Co., Ltd., and £400 from "S.D.R.S.D."; besides anonymous donations of £8,000, £1,900 and £1,500 and two of £500. The Fund also received a munificent gift of £10,000 $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Conversion Loan Stock from Mr. H. W. Marshall for capital purposes. This gift was associated by Mr. Marshall with the thirtieth anniversary of the Fund, and was announced by the Prince of Wales at the luncheon.

- 10. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £17,000, as against £15,000 in the previous year. This increase was notified to the Fund just in time to enable the annual distribution to be increased by £2,000. The Council are very grateful to the League for this opportune help. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation is now £415,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution.
- II. The British Charities Association again gave to the Fund the sum of £15,000 for distribution amongst the Hospitals in the London area, making a total of £65,000 received since 1924. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in again entrusting to the King's Fund the distribution of that part of their receipts which they have allocated to the London area.
- 12. Legacies received during the year included £22,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. John Wells, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £214,240 received to date from the combined estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells); £60,000 from the estate of the late Earl of Iveagh, left to capital; £5,196 2s. 6d. from the estate of the late Mr. George George from residue; £3,100 from the estate of the late Mr. Frank Ernest Dore, on account of share of residue; £1,643 14s. 11d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Clarke, balance of share of residue (making a total sum of £13,342 5s. 1d. received to date); £1,313 os. 8d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Florence Mary Hames, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £36,671 12s. 8d. received to date); and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £514,513 4s. 6d. received to date). Other legacies during the year included £1,000 from the estate of the late Miss Eliza Anne Tidswell, £1,000 from the estate of Miss Ellen Boyd and £1,000 from the estate of the late Professor Arthur William Scott.

FAMILY FUNDS.

13. In making his very generous donation of £10,000 Conversion Stock, Mr. Marshall expressed the desire that it should be held as a special fund entitled the "Marshall Fund," and that any subsequent gifts or bequests that might be received from members of his family with a request to that effect should be added to it. The Council have gladly adopted this

suggestion, and the Marshall Fund, and any similar Family Funds that donors may desire to create, will appear in the Annual Report of the King's Fund at the end of the permanent list of donors of £100 and upwards.

INCOME TAX AGREEMENTS.

14. Forms of agreement, by which annual subscribers for not less than seven years can save income-tax and super-tax on the amount of their subscriptions, have been utilised by subscribers to the King's Fund for some years. The Council welcomed the decision of the Government, in connection with the Finance Bill of 1927, that these agreements should continue to be recognised by the Income-tax authorities. The King's Fund took part with others in organising a deputation to the Chancellor of the Exchequer on the subject.

EXPENSES.

15. During the year the amount spent on administration was £10,663 18s. 3d., or about $7\frac{1}{4}d$. per £1 of the total received, as compared with £10,440 8s. 2d., or about $8\frac{1}{2}d$. per £1 in the previous year.

Wells Legacies Distribution, Hospital Extensions, and Provision for Accident Cases.

- 16. Before the end of the year the Trustees of the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells were able to say that the combined total of the two legacies, originally estimated at rather more than £200,000, would probably come to about £250,000. Further special grants, amounting to £34,500, were made towards schemes of extension or improvement, including the provision of another 189 additional beds; and £12,000 was set aside towards the expenditure of the hospitals on the pension scheme for nurses and hospital officers. The total allocated during the years 1924 to 1927 is £224,250. The schemes assisted in this way, to the end of 1927, would provide 1,306 additional beds, including 144 reserved for accident cases, these being the two principal objects which the Council had in view when they decided to distribute the Wells legacies in grants for special purposes.
- 17. In connection with the extension schemes of suburban hospitals and the increase of road accidents, the Distribution Committee have during the last two years been considering and discussing with the hospitals concerned the question of medical attendance on cases of emergency. The Report of the Committee on the ordinary distribution contains a statement of their views on the subject of the appointment of resident medical officers, and an account of what they consider to be the best of the various other methods adopted at hospitals which state that they are satisfied that a resident medical officer is not yet required.
- 18. The Fund is also much concerned with another aspect of the accident problem, namely the great burden thrown on hospitals, built and maintained by localities for their own needs, as the result of accident cases arising from outside. At the end of the year the Fund was engaged in inquiries with a view to preparing practicable proposals to lay before a conference of the various parties concerned.

REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

19. The work of the Propaganda Committee during the year is described in a special report from the Revenue Committee. The Council wish to express their appreciation of the great help which has been received from members of the various professions represented on the Committee, who have devoted much time, energy and enthusiasm to making the work of the hospitals and of the Fund more widely known.

STATISTICAL REPORT.

- 20. Following upon the issue of the new edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, a new series of the annual Statistical Reports on the work, income and expenditure of the London hospitals was begun with the figures for the year 1926. A summary of the improvements in the Report, which is now illustrated by charts and diagrams, is given in a report by the Hospital Economy Committee.
- 21. The present issue of the Statistical Report has been prepared in two forms. The full Report contains the analysed figures of all the separate hospitals. A more popular edition contains only the Prefatory Note on the work and position of the hospitals generally, with the coloured charts and specimen tables for the groups taken as a whole. This popular edition was prepared on the suggestion and at the expense of Mr. George Roberts, who is a member both of the Hospital Economy Committee and of the Revenue Committee. The latter Committee have made wide use of it as a means of diffusing information about the work of the hospitals and of the King's Fund.

Pensions for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

22. By the end of the year all the details of the Pensions Scheme, under the title "Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers (Contributory)," had been settled by the Provisional Council of the Scheme, and the date of commencement had been fixed from January 1, 1928. The scheme had by that time been adopted by 89 hospitals in London, representing 12,176 beds out of about 14,700. The suggestions made in 1919 by the King's Fund Committee of Inquiry, under the chairmanship of Mr. Whittall, have thus borne fruit, as the result of a combined effort by the Fund, the College of Nursing, the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers, the British Hospitals Association, and the individual hospitals themselves.

PAY BEDS INQUIRY.

23. A Special Committee called the "Pay Beds Committee" was constituted in May to inquire into the provision of hospital accommodation for persons prepared to pay more than ordinary voluntary hospital patients. The following were appointed by His Royal Highness the President as members of the Committee: Viscount Hambleden, Chairman, Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Bernard Mallet, Mr. V. Warren Low, and Professor Winifred Cullis. The Committee held many meetings for the receipt of evidence, and their Report will be an important part of the business of the year 1928.

PERSONNEL.

- 24. The Council have to lament the loss by death of the Marquess of Cambridge, who had been one of the three Governors who exercised the powers of President from 1910 to 1919; and of the Earl of Iveagh, who had been a member since the foundation of the Fund, and was also one of the Governors. The Council has also lost by death Viscount Bearsted, a member of the Council; Sir Frederick Green, who was also on the Distribution Committee and was for many years Treasurer of the League of Mercy; and Mr. J. Danvers Power, who was an Honorary Secretary of the Fund from 1904 to 1907.
- 25. The Fund was represented at the centenary celebrations of the birth of Lord Lister, who in 1897 was appointed by King Edward VII as first Chairman of the Distribution Committee.
- 26. The Council desire to express their gratitude to Sir Rowland Blades for his generosity in giving the luncheon at the Mansion House, and thus providing the means of celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of the foundation of the King's Fund and the work of the League of Mercy.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

- 27. At the date when the amount to be distributed was fixed, the estimated receipts for the year, including the additional $\pounds 2,000$ from the League of Mercy, were only sufficient to admit of a distribution of $\pounds 247,000$. It so happened that by the end of the year further sums had been received. It is the settled policy of the Fund, however, not to increase the distribution beyond the total which there is a reasonable certainty of maintaining without risk of subsequent reduction. With regard to the ordinary distribution, the most urgent need is therefore a permanent increase in the annual income of the Fund. With regard to extensions and other special purposes, the applications from hospitals for grants out of the Wells legacies far exceed the total available for these purposes.
- 28. The Council are again greatly indebted to the Press for its assistance in making known the work of the King's Fund and of the hospitals.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 13, 1927.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, December 13, 1927, at 11.30 a.m., HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council, was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read a gracious message from His Majesty the King:—

"The King is very glad to hear that King Edward's Hospital Fund is increasing its distribution from £245,000 to £247,000 with the help of the League of Mercy, who are contributing £17,000 instead of £15,000. His Majesty offers his congratulations to all concerned and earnestly trusts that the Fund will continue to make the same steady progress in the years to come.

For the last two years the ordinary distribution has remained at £245,000. This year we are increasing it to £247,000. We are approaching the quarter of a million, though we cannot quite reach it yet without risk of having to fall back again; a thing we always try to avoid. We are able to advance another £2,000 this year because the League of Mercy are giving us £2,000 more. As Lord Marshall told the Council in November, the League will be contributing £17,000 this year, as against £15,000 last year. Sir William Collins will doubtless give us some more details this morning. It is indeed gratifying that the League of Mercy, which has always been the Fund's largest regular contributor, has made this forward step. We are deeply grateful to all the workers to whose efforts it is due. Without this extra £2,000 we should just have maintained a distribution of £245,000. That in itself is good evidence of stability. The British Charities Association are again giving us £15,000, for which I offer them our best thanks. We have had only one large donation to the general fund—£8,000 from an anonymous friend—whereas last year we had two. But legacies show an increase of £10,000, and income from investments, the special charge of Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee, has risen by £3,000. Our capital fund continues to grow. The largest donation added to our Investments this year was Mr. H. W. Marshall's gift of £10,000 Conversion Stock. The legacy of £60,000 bequeathed to capital by the late Lord Iveagh has, of course, not yet been received. The total distribution for 1927 is, however, not £247,000, but £281,500. For we are also making grants of £34,500 out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, which we are using for special purposes, particularly schemes of extension and improvement. The distribution of these legacies is not yet quite finished; but they have already helped to provide more than 1,300 additional beds, including 144 beds for accident cases, which are becoming a problem for all hospital people.

The report of the Distribution Committee deals with another aspect of this problem: the best way of providing immediate medical attendance on accidents and other emergencies at the outlying hospitals, many of which are developing out of cottage hospitals into general hospitals. Some of these have resident medical officers, some have not. The Distribution Committee have acted as the King's Fund usually acts. They have studied the Visitors' Reports: they have had a conference with the principal hospitals concerned: they have formed their own views on the subject: they have circulated them to the hospitals; and they now recommend that the Council should publish them. But they have laid down no rules; they will, for the present at all events, content themselves in most cases with asking each hospital each year if it is satisfied that its own methods are

adequate. They thus combine the influence of a voluntary central body with the freedom and responsibility of the separate voluntary hospitals.

The same kind of procedure has been followed for many years in promoting hospital economy. The Fund collects information about cost, tabulates it in the Statistical Report, and circulates it to the hospitals to help them in controlling their own expenditure. The Statistical Report now appears in a new and improved form, based on the new edition of the revised system of accounts, on which the hospitals and the other parties concerned were all consulted beforehand, and in which the Hospital Sunday and Saturday Funds co-operated. But the Hospital Economy Committee will doubtless be giving us the details at our Annual Meeting, and I must not anticipate. So far as results go, the figures in the Report show that hospital expenditure continues to grow with the increase in the number of beds. Hospital income decreased a little during 1926, which was, of course, a year of exceptional difficulty. The hospitals, therefore, had a deficit, for the first time since 1922. It was not large—only a little more than I per cent. of their expenditure. It was chiefly due to a falling off in legacies, which have gone back to the level of five years ago. One thing strikes me as very encouraging. In spite of all the industrial depression, the patients' contributions continue to grow. I see by the report of the recent annual meeting of the Hospital Saving Association that they have another 100,000 members, making 370,000 already; and that the contributions of threepence a week are now coming in at the rate of £220,000 a year. Besides this, there is the considerable amount collected by the Hospital Saturday Fund. The working men and women—and much credit is due to them—are coming forward splendidly to do their share; and if everybody else does the same. the finances of the hospitals with deficits will soon be put right. There is no need to be afraid of surpluses; the hospitals are adding more beds as fast as the money comes in.

The Pay Beds Committee which, under Lord Hambleden, is inquiring into the question of hospital accommodation for people who are above the ordinary income limits, has been steadily at work, and expects to present its report to our annual meeting, which is usually held in April or May. The Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, which is the direct result of another inquiry by the Fund, is now all but complete; and will, we are told, begin on January 1st with 89 London hospitals, representing more than 12,000 beds. We have every hope that it will remove the existing disadvantages from which hospitals, nurses, and officers all suffer. Great credit for the progress made is due to Mr. Whittall, who conducted the original inquiry and laid down the principles, and to Sir Edward Penton, who, as Chairman of the Provisional Council of the Scheme, has given an immense amount of time to working out the practical details.

I cannot end this review of the year without again expressing our indebtedness to Sir Rowland. Blades for the Mansion House luncheon in October, at which he invited the principal workers for the King's Fund and the League of Mercy to meet together, in celebration of the Fund's thirtieth anniversary. It was a very happy thought on his part, and an event which will long remain in our memories. This is the second time we have enjoyed the hospitality of the Mansion House, for in 1919 Lord Marshall, the then Lord Mayor, gave a dinner to the members of the Fund when I first became President.

To come now to some personal matters, we have to lament the loss by death of several old friends of the Fund. The Marquess of Cambridge was one of the three Governors who exercised the powers of President during the interval from 1910 to 1919. So was Lord Iveagh, who remained a member of the Council till his death. Mr. Danvers Power was a very active Honorary Secretary some years

ago; he started the Statistical Report and other forms of administration work which have been continued ever since. Mr. Ward Cook was one of our oldest Visitors. Sir Robert Hudson was Treasurer of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, which entrusted £250,000 out of their surplus war funds to the King's Fund for distribution. There have been a few changes in the Propaganda Committee. Sir Richard Terry, Dr. Ernest Barker, and Mr. C. D. Stelling have resigned. Sir Landon Ronald, Mr. Aylmer Buesst, and Mr. C. M. Power have been appointed. It now remains for me to express my thanks and yours to the Visitors who make the annual inspection of the hospitals, and particularly to the Distribution Committee and their Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry, for all the work they have put into the reports and recommendations that come before us to-day, and into their numerous visits to hospitals and their other administrative duties throughout the year. It is because of their work, and the experience they have accumulated over so many years, that we are able to make the claim that people who wish to give to hospitals in London, but are not specially interested in any particular hospital, can safely entrust their money to the King's Fund for inclusion in the annual distribution.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Lord Revelstoke (the Honorary Treasurer) said: May it please Your Royal Highness, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen: -It will only be necessary for me to supplement with a few details the account which Your Royal Highness has been so good as to give of the financial position. This is the fourth year in succession in which we have made two distributions; that is to say, the ordinary distribution, and that represented by grants derived from the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. The former of these distributions amounts this year to £247,000, and the latter to £34,500, making a combined total for 1927 of £281,500. With reference to the ordinary distribution, may I remind the Council that last year, when we distributed £245,000, we anticipated that we should find it necessary to make use of the whole of the £9,000 which we had added to our reserves in 1925. But, owing to the receipt before the end of the year of some unexpected contributions, we found ourselves enabled to limit the withdrawals to about half of this amount. At our November meeting this year, the estimates showed that, with the aid of this unemployed balance, it would be possible for us to maintain the distribution at £245,000. At that meeting Lord Marshall announced that the League of Mercy held a further £2,000 at our disposal, as Your Royal Highness has told us, and we were thus enabled to increase the total to £247,000. With regard to the Wells legacies, we have so far received £214,240 on account, which amount covers the grants already made to hospitals and those recommended to-day by the Distribution Committee. It was estimated a year ago that the total to be derived from the two Wells legacies would amount to about £240,000; we have since been informed by the Trustees that there is reason to anticipate that this figure will be exceeded. Lord Iveagh, who was a very good friend to the Fund, has left £60,000 to be applied to Capital account. This generous bequest, together with Mr. H. W. Marshall's gift of £10,000 3½ per cent. Conversion Stock, will substantially increase our Capital fund, and will benefit the income derived therefrom, a factor which is of so great importance in maintaining the annual distribution.

LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Sir William Collins, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that the bulk of the receipts of the League were derived from collections which had to be gathered fresh every year. The amount was therefore apt to vary. This year, they were able to make the King's Fund a grant of £17,000, £2,000 above the amount handed over last year. They were

distributing £13,283 to extra-metropolitan hospitals, including £5,000 given by the British Charities Association for that particular purpose. From 1899, when it was established, until now, the League had given to the King's Fund £415,034, and to the extra-metropolitan hospitals £100,697; making a grand total, which the League had received and distributed to Voluntary Hospitals, of £515,731.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the report of the Committee on the distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent branches) (see pages 23 to 25) and moved the recommendations.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent branches) (see pages 26 to 34).

Lady HALL having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) then presented the report of the Committee on the distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals (see page 35) and moved the recommendations.

Mr. Leonard Cohen (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals (see pages 36 to 38).

The motion, having been seconded by Sir Cuthbert Wallace, was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Lord MILDMAY, seconded by Mr. George Roberts, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 16th.

Wells Legacies Distribution.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) then presented the report of the Committee on the special distribution to Hospitals in aid of extensions and improvements, out of the Wells legacies to date (see page 39), and moved the recommendations.

Col. H. A. Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals in aid of extensions and improvements, out of the Wells legacies for the year (see pages 40 and 41).

Sir William H. Bennett having seconded, the motion was put and carried.

SCHEME OF PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

In the absence of Lord Donoughmore (Chairman of the Management Committee), the Vice-Chairman of the Committee (Lord Somerleyton) presented a Report of the Committee on the Scheme of Pensions for Nurses and Hospital Officers. The Report stated that arrangements were being made to bring the scheme into operation on January 1 under the title of "Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers (Contributory)"; that the scheme had so far been adopted by 89 hospitals in London, representing 12,176 beds out of a total of about 14,700; that a large number of hospitals throughout the country were known to be awaiting particulars of the Insurance Companies' quotations, which were on the point of being issued by the Provisional Council. The details of the scheme in its present form differed only very slightly from those of the

draft scheme as adopted by the hospitals represented at the Mansion House Conference in 1926; and the small changes that had been made had all been approved by the King's Fund under the powers given to the Management Committee by the resolution of the General Council on the subject of the conditions attaching to grants in aid from the Fund.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1928.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—We now come to the arrangements for 1928. There will be very few changes of personnel. I propose to appoint all the present members of the Council and Committees, and to add to the Council Sir Rowland Blades, Mr. H. L. Eason, and Mr. Pett Ridge. Two of our Chairmen, Lord Donoughmore, Chairman of the Management Committee, and Lord Burnham, Chairman of the Propaganda Committee, will be engaged for a while on important National business in the East, but Lord Somerleyton and Sir George Lawson Johnston will act for them in their absence.

On the motion of the Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee (Lord Somerleyton), seconded by Lord Stanmore, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1928.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The Lord Mayor (Sir Charles Batho) said he had the great honour to propose a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for presiding, and also to express their sincere gratitude for the great interest he took in the hospitals and their work.

The BISHOP OF LONDON having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of the President and General Council, May 15, 1928.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, May 15, 1928, HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES being in the Chair.

Lord Somerleyton (Hon. Secretary) read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed. Mr. Leonard L. Cohen (Hon. Colonel H. A. Wernher (Hon. Secretary) read the order of appointment by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales of Lord Iveagh to the General Council.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-

I have first the honour to read the following gracious message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund:—

Buckingham Palace.

The King is glad to hear of the results achieved by the special distribution of the sum of £255,000 received from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells, which has helped the

hospitals of London to provide 1,600 additional beds and to meet other urgent requirements. His Majesty regards this as a striking proof of what can be done by a Central Fund, when it is in a position to make grants to hospitals which especially need financial assistance, and where the utmost use will be made of the help thus given.

(Signed) STAMFORDHAM.

May 15, 1928.

There is more business at this Annual Meeting than there usually is. We have the Annual Report and Accounts, and the report of the Propaganda Committee, which come every year. But we have also three special reports. The Hospital Economy Committee complete the story of 1927 by describing the new form of Statistical Report. The Management Committee tell us when we may expect the report of the Pay Beds Committee, which is a matter of the near future. The Distribution Committee present us with a most important piece of work to be carried out here and now at this meeting: the final list of grants of the Wells legacies distribution.

The accounts show, not for the first time, a better result than was anticipated in November. We had one pleasant surprise at that meeting, when the League of Mercy announced that it could give us $f_{17,000}$ instead of $f_{15,000}$, so that the ordinary distribution could be increased from $f_{245,000}$ to £247,000. Between then and the end of the year we received contributions from unexpected sources, with the aid of which we could have gone to £250,000 for that year only. But we never do jump forward for one year only, especially when the figure ahead of us is a sort of landmark like the quarter million. For this, we want first to feel reasonably sure that we shall get an increase of income that will be permanent. To maintain even our present total we always need two or three large donations, and this year I am pleased to say we have already received one gift of £10,000 for general purposes from an anonymous donor. We have also received donations of £1,000 from Lord Rothermere and from Lord Glendyne. As regards the Balance Sheet, which shows our capital funds, this is in the very capable hands of Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee, to whom we again tender our best thanks. Since the end of the year our capital has been increased by a very generous donation of f10,000 from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, with a request that it should be invested. When Mr. H. W. Marshall gave us f10,000 Conversion Stock last year, in connection with the thirtieth anniversary, he asked that it should form a separate fund to be called the Marshall Fund, to which members of his family might, if they so desired, add further sums. We have recently been notified of a bequest by a member of Mr. Marshall's family which is to be added to the Family Fund thus created.

The Statistical Report on the Hospitals of London has now come out with coloured illustrations. They are not exactly pictures of hospital work. It is true there is a medicine bottle on one page. But it is not the sort of medicine the hospitals give to the public; it is the sort the public give to them. For it consists of different kinds of income, and the top layer is the £850,000 which they collect every year in subscriptions and donations to maintenance alone; to say nothing of legacies, and receipts for building schemes and for endowment, which bring the total voluntary contributions of the 140 hospitals up to something like £1,800,000 a year. Then there is a sort of temperature chart on another page, except that it doesn't mean a high fever, but the rate at which the hospitals are providing additional beds. In fact, all the charts show that the voluntary system is in a very vigorous state of health. There are ups and downs, of course: but, if you look back along the curves for two or three years, the "ups" always have it. These are only some of the things the Statistical Report now shows, besides its original and still most important function, that of helping

the hospitals to control their expenditure by providing them with comparative figures of cost. For this purpose the Report now gives quantities consumed as well as money spent.

The Propaganda Committee, whose Chairman, Lord Burnham, we welcome with us to-day after his absence in India, continue to distribute information about the hospitals and the King's Fund; partly direct, by lectures and pamphlets and their hospital film; and partly indirect, on the backs of programmes, and from the platforms of entertainments which usually have something new and original about them. It was the Propaganda Committee that invented "Lectures and Counter-Lectures." They are starting to-day a series of talks entitled "Biographical Duets." Lady Blades and Mr. Guedalla have recently joined the Committee.

The inquiry by the Pay Beds Committee into the question of hospital accommodation for the middle and professional classes is nearly finished; and the report is being prepared. The conclusions whatever they may be, will be based on a study of pay beds as they now exist at a number of hospitals in London. The Statistical Report shows that in 1926 there were nearly 900 pay beds at seventy-three hospitals. Any suggestions the Pay Beds Committee make for the future will thus be based on the experiments, if I may so call them, of the past and the present. We all very much regret the illness of Lord Hambleden, their Chairman. He presided throughout the taking of evidence, and he has recently been reading the first drafts for the Report. We all wish him a speedy recovery and resumption of his fine work for us.

The final list of grants out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells is the end of a most useful piece of work which began in 1924. That was just when the hospitals had got over the financial crisis and had begun seriously to tackle the question of adding more beds. It was at this very time that the Wells legacies came to us. We could do what we liked with them, and we decided to use them to make special grants towards extension schemes and other urgent objects. The last instalment of the two legacies has just been received, and the combined total has come to £255,000. For four years the Distribution Committee have been able to take each urgent scheme as it has come along, at any time of year, and give it a Wells grant. They have usually attached conditions that would make the grant act as a stimulus to help the hospital to begin the scheme, or to finish it, or to clear it of debt, or to reach some definite stage or other sooner than it would otherwise have done. In these ways the Wells legacies will have helped the hospitals to provide more than 1,600 additional beds, including 179 beds for accident cases. Three new hospitals have been built, and four have been rebuilt on new sites; and there have been numerous other additions and improvements. We should have liked to give larger grants to several of the schemes, and there are fresh ones always coming along. If any one who has a large sum for disposal would care to provide the means for another special distribution of the same kind, we could make very good use of it indeed. I think we ought to offer our thanks to Sir Cooper Perry, and the Distribution Committee, for what has been a considerable addition to their ordinary work. They have done four special distributions in the last eight years; the emergency one during the financial crisis, the surplus Red Cross funds, the Combined Appeal, and now the Wells legacies; and they would be quite ready to undertake a fifth.

I cannot conclude without referring to one or two personal matters. I should like first to thank the Speaker for having, on his own initiative, addressed a letter to all the solicitors of London, mentioning the value of a central fund like this to testators who may desire, by one single bequest, whether large or small, to benefit 140 hospitals, in proportion to their relative claims. The Fund has recently lost by death some very good friends and workers. The services of Lord Cave to the voluntary hospitals would be hard to over-estimate. The report of his Committee in 1921 showed them

the way to financial recovery, and he himself, on this Council and elsewhere, took an active part in the work. Sir William Church was a member of the Council for twenty-seven years, and Chairman of the Distribution Committee for sixteen years; the second in the succession of eminent medical men who have held that position. Sir John Craggs had been on the Council for twenty-eight years, and on the Finance Committee since 1906; and, as one of the Honorary Secretaries during the first nine years of the Fund, had a great deal to do with its early organisation. There has been one change in the membership of the Distribution Committee since December. Sir Francis Champneys has retired after seventeen years of good service, and I have appointed Mr. Eardley Holland in his place. I have appointed Lord Iveagh a member of the Council.

I will now ask Lord Revelstoke to move the adoption of the accounts.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1927.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Hon. Treasurer) in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1927, said: May it please your Royal Highness, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, as your Royal Highness has been so good as to inform the Council, the accounts for the year 1927 contain more than one feature of a satisfactory nature. When we met in November last to consider the amount to be distributed, the estimates indicated that it would be possible to anticipate with confidence the receipt of a net income of £242,000. It was our intention, therefore, to maintain the ordinary distribution at £245,000. The representatives of the League of Mercy at that meeting promised an additional £2,000, the total being thus increased to £247,000. You will note from the accounts which I have the honour to submit to-day, that the actual net receipts exceeded the estimate, and that, so far from being under the necessity of having to draw £3,000 from reserve to make up this total, as had been anticipated, it was possible to carry forward the sum of £2,700 as a balance to next year's account. May I echo the hope expressed by your Royal Highness that we shall not only maintain our present income, but also receive such a permanent increase as may enable us to raise the distribution to £250,000 in the near future. In connection with the Wells legacies account, the Council distributed during 1927 a further £34,500. The final instalments of the two legacies—apart from two reversions—have since been received, and the further grants of £30,750 which the Council are asked to make to-day will complete the distribution of the whole £255,000 received from these munificent legacies. It may be interesting to recall their origin. Mr. John Wells began life as a choir boy at St. Albans' Abbey, and subsequently engaged in business as a silversmith in a small way in that city. He afterwards became an assistant to a silversmith in London, to whose business he eventually succeeded, and later on established a large business in the United States, where he made his fortune. He bequeathed the residue of his estate to the King's Fund, subject to the life interest of his widow. This lady died shortly after his decease, and in her turn left to the Fund the residue of her estate. Of the total of £255,000, to which I have referred, the legacy of Mr. Wells realised an amount slightly in excess of £133,000, and that of Mrs. Wells very nearly £122,000. The King's Fund and the hospitals have good reason to be grateful to these two benefactors, whose munificent legacies have afforded the Council the opportunity of distributing so large an amount in the shape of grants for extensions and for other special purposes. Our capital account was increased during the year to the extent of £67,638, this sum including the legacy of £60,000 from the late Lord Iveagh, and Mr. Marshall's gift of £10,000 of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Conversion Loan. It is a satisfaction to me to have the opportunity of calling your attention to the fact that the Balance Sheet indicates that the market value of the securities in December last exceeded

their book value, a position which the Finance Committee hope may not only be satisfactory to the Council, but which may also tend to confirm in the minds of the generous public the confidence which we trust they already have in the administration of the financial affairs of the Fund. I have the honour to move the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the Governor of the Bank of England (the Rt. Hon. M. C. NORMAN), was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1927 (see pages 5 to 10), and the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir Berkeley Moynihan, Bt.) having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put and carried unanimously.

WELLS LEGACIES DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the final Report on the Wells Legacies Distribution (see pages 47 to 51) and moved the recommendations which, having been seconded by Lord MILDMAY OF FLETE, were carried unanimously.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

In the absence abroad of Sir George Lawson Johnston (Chairman of the Revenue Committee), Viscount Burnham presented the Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee.

He referred specially to the goodwill and co-operation of the exhibitors of the picture theatres in the screening of the film "One Hundred Years of Progress," which was a very important point in their propaganda, and to the educative work of the Committee in regard to the hospitals and the advancement of medical science by means of lectures in schools. He moved that the report be published (see pages 42 to 44).

The motion, having been seconded by Sir Frederick M. Fry, was then put and carried.

STATISTICAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (Mr. Leonard L. Cohen) presented a Report of the Committee on the New Edition of the Statistical Report, and moved the recommendation that it be published (see pages 45 and 46.)

Professor Winifred Cullis having seconded the recommendation, the motion was put and carried.

PAY BEDS ENQUIRY.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) then presented a report of the Committee on the present position of the Enquiry by the Pay Beds Committee, and moved the recommendation giving the Management Committee authority to publish the Report when ready.

This, having been seconded by Mr. F. W. J. Jackson, was carried unanimously.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The Chairman of the London County Council (Col. Cecil B. Levita) moved a cordial vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales both for presiding on that occasion and for his continued interest in the Fund. Of all the activities that His Royal Highness showed to the people of London, there was none that brought greater comfort to the poor, or did more to advance the cause of medical and surgical science; and he was sure that not only those present, but also the people of London as a whole, owed a deep debt of gratitude to His Royal Highness.

Lord Marshall, in seconding the vote of thanks, said that as Chairman and Treasurer of the League of Mercy, he would like to add his personal testimonial to the deep interest which His Royal Highness always took not only in the King's Fund, but in all the subsidiary agencies such as the League.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- I. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £245,000, as against £243,000 last year.
- 2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 141, as against 136 in 1926, new applications having been received from the Bermondsey Medical Mission, Croydon General Hospital, Harrow Hospital, Invalid Children's Aid Association Heart Hospital at West Wickham, and St. Thomas's Cornwall Babies' Hostel.
- 3. The accounts of all the participating hospitals taken together for the year 1926 showed that, while the total aggregate expenditure continued to increase, income showed a slight diminution, and there was, for the first time since 1922, a small aggregate deficit. The demands on the Committee have therefore continued to grow, and they were glad to have an increase, although a small one, in the amount available for distribution.
- 4. The total grants recommended in aid of maintenance come to £211,450, as compared with £207,525 last year. The grants towards schemes of capital expenditure amount to £33,550 out of the ordinary distribution, as against £35,475 last year. The Committee are also recommending grants amounting to £34,500 out of the special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. The total distribution to hospitals for the year is thus £279,500, besides £2,000 to non-hospital convalescent homes.
- 5. As indicated in previous reports, the Distribution Committee have been giving special attention not only to the provision of additional beds for accidents, but also to the question of the best method of securing prompt and efficient medical attendance, in cases of emergency, at hospitals which have no resident medical officer.
- 6. This question has come before the Fund with increased importance for three reasons: first, the enlargement of the Fund's area, which has brought in several more small suburban hospitals; second, the tendency of such hospitals to grow in size, to take more serious operation cases, and to develop from cottage hospitals into general hospitals; and third, the increasing number of road accidents.
- 7. The King's Fund Statistical Report shows that, of the general or cottage hospitals with less than 70 available beds, 13 hospitals, ranging from 62 beds to 19, have resident medical officers. But 7 with from 40 to 55 beds are without a resident, as also are 14 with

less than 37 beds. To some of these the Committee, while leaving the decision to the hospital, have expressed the view that the time has come for the appointment of a resident. From all of them they have asked for an assurance that the Hospital Committee are satisfied that their methods do secure prompt and efficient medical attention in emergencies. They propose to repeat this question annually.

- 8. From their study of the different methods in practice at hospitals without residents, the Distribution Committee have come to the conclusion that the most efficient system at such hospitals is one which includes:—
 - (a) the establishment of a rota securing the certain and most speedy attendance of one or more of the medical staff;
 - (b) the appointment of one (or more) of the medical staff (either permanently or for a definite period) to pay daily visits to the hospital and make himself acquainted with the necessary facts concerning all the cases;
 - (c) an arrangement whereby, in connection with the rota, the member on duty undertakes to be available, or if unavoidably prevented, ensures that another member on the rota shall be available, and notifies the hospital to that effect. The hospital authorities thus always know beforehand who is the available member, and can communicate with him at once.

The Distribution Committee also consider that great importance attaches to the question of providing:—

(d) adequate facilities for taking notes on cases, whether medical or surgical, before deciding on a course of treatment.

These conclusions have been notified to the hospitals without residents. Point (d) is even more important at these hospitals than at others, because the doctor who sees a patient under (a), (b), or (c) may not be the doctor under whose care he was originally admitted.

9. The following grants made in previous years have not yet been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule:—

Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, £750 to new out-patient department and permanent wards.

French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £4,000 to new nurses' home.

Grosvenor Hospital for Women, £1,000 to accommodation for R.M.O. and for nurses.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON THE

SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OUT OF THE LEGACIES OF THE LATE MR. AND MRS. WELLS, JANUARY 1 TO DECEMBER 31, 1927.

- I. The Distribution Committee present their fourth list of grants recommended out of the special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells.
- 2. The total this year is £34,500 distributed to hospitals, besides £12,000 set aside, with the approval of the Council in May last, for grants in aid of the Pensions scheme for nurses and hospital officers. The amount allocated in the four years 1924 to 1927 is £224,250. The total amount of the legacies is not yet definitely known, but it is estimated that the balance as yet unallocated will amount to rather more than £20,000. The Committee hope to be in a position to submit a final list at the Annual Meeting of the Council in the Spring.
- 3. The Council decided in 1924 to devote these legacies to meeting special needs of hospitals, and particularly the need for extensions and improvements and increased provision for accident cases. The Council gave the Distribution Committee power to act in the intervals between Council Meetings. The Council also adopted the policy of attaching to the grants, in suitable cases, conditions designed to assist the hospital concerned in expediting the scheme or in raising the balance of the cost, or to secure the reservation of beds for accidents.
- 4. The grants during 1927 will assist in the provision of more than 180 additional beds, besides facilitating other forms of structural extensions and improvements. The total number of additional beds provided by the schemes to which Wells grants have been made during the four years is 1,306. These include 144 beds reserved for accident cases.

HOSPITAL FOR EPILEPSY AND PARALYSIS.—£500 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 82 to 102; payable when the work is begun.

INVALID CHILDREN'S AID ASSOCIATION HEART HOSPITAL, WEST WICKHAM.—£500 towards erection of open-air wards at new hospital, increasing the number of cots from 30 to 80.

MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL.—£10,000 as a third grant to reconstruction scheme; making, with £10,000 in July 1925, and £10,000 in December 1925, a total of £30,000.

PRINCESS LOUISE KENSINGTON HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN.—£1,000 towards second stage of new hospital, increasing the number of cots from 15 to 55, payable when the work is begun.

ROYAL FREE HOSPITAL.—£5,000 towards the scheme for the development of the hospital in celebration of its centenary; £2,500 payable when the work is begun, and £2,500 to be the last £2,500 required to complete the first £100,000 raised by the appeal.

ROYAL WESTMINSTER OPHTHALMIC HOSPITAL.—£2,000 towards rebuilding on new site, increasing the number of beds from 42 to 85; £1,000 payable at once, and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 required to render the new hospital free of debt.

St. Bartholomew's Hospital.—£7,500 towards new surgical block, payable when the work is begun.

St. Mary's Hospital, Plaistow.—£2,000 towards first stage of new out-patient department; £1,000 payable when the work is begun, and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 to render the first stage free of debt.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1927.

- 1. The Propaganda Committee has again been active in devising new methods of bringing the work of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals before a wider public, partly by direct propaganda and partly by functions which have a money-raising aspect as well.
 - 2. The principal activities of the Committee in 1927 were :-
 - (a) Seven-a-side Rugby Football Competition, organised by the Middlesex Rugby Football Union, in connexion with which the Press were invited to a special luncheon at the Savoy Hotel. Lord Donoughmore presided, and the President of the Rugby Football Union was present;
 - (b) Series of Drawing-Room Meetings at 29 Portman Square, by kind invitation of Lady Lawson Johnston, when "reminiscent talks" were given by Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, Lord Ullswater, Mr. Pett Ridge, and Mr. P. F. Warner;
 - (c) Fifth series of "Lectures and Counter-Lectures" at the London School of Economics during May and June. These included two debates which had been cancelled the previous year, owing to the General Strike;
 - (d) Visits to St. James's Palace, Kensington Palace, Hampton Court, the Palace of Westminster, and other historic buildings, during July and August, by special arrangement and under the guidance of expert conductors;
 - (e) Continuation of lectures in secondary schools, training colleges, etc., on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals, by doctors and others experienced in hospital administration. Special sanction obtained from the London County Council for use of the school organisation for similar lectures in the Council's central schools;
 - (f) Screening of the film, "A Hundred Years of Progress," in over 100 cinema theatres in the King's Fund area, several of the Borough Councils co-operating. It was also lent to certain individual hospitals for use in connexion with special appeals. The inclusion of a portrait of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, during the year added to the popular appeal of the film.

- (g) Lantern lecture by the President of the Royal Astronomical Society (Rev. T. E. R. Phillips), in anticipation of the Total Eclipse of the Sun on June 29, the demand for tickets being so great that Mr. Phillips kindly repeated the lecture.
- (h) Issue of new leaflet on the work of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals, entitled, "Some Notable Sayings," for distribution with other literature at functions, etc.

- 4. Early in the year the Committee discussed the question of having some special celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of the King's Fund, and they welcomed, as a great assistance to their propaganda work, the luncheon so kindly given by Sir Rowland Blades, the Lord Mayor, at the Mansion House on October 18 for this purpose. The Committee have always maintained the ideal expressed by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, when, speaking on that occasion, he said:—"In this age of publicity hospitals and those interested in them, like other people, are learning the value of not merely rattling cash-boxes, but also of telling the public the work they really are doing."
- 5. The Committee prepared a memorandum dealing with the question of hospital accommodation for paying patients, which came before the Management Committee at their meeting on March 8; and on May 13 H.R.H. the Prince of Wales appointed a special committee to take evidence and report. The Propaganda Committee assisted by collecting information as to the systems prevailing in foreign countries, and a memorandum with appendices was drawn up for the use of the Pay Beds Committee.
- 6. The appointment of Lord Burnham as a member of the Indian Statutory Commission has deprived the Committee temporarily of his valuable services in the Chair. Lord Burnham,

however, very kindly consented not to resign the chairmanship, and Sir George Lawson Johnston, as Chairman of the Revenue Committee, agreed to act on his behalf during the period of the Commission.

7. In all their activities the Committee have made it their principal aim to bring home to the public the vital importance, for all classes of the community, of the work which the hospitals are doing, and the necessity for every citizen to pull his or her weight in contributing to their support, in order that the hospitals may be maintained in a state of efficiency, and may be able to keep pace with the constant advance in medical science and practice.

HOSPITAL ECONOMY COMMITTEE.

NEW EDITION OF THE KING'S FUND STATISTICAL REPORT.

- 1. The King's Fund Statistical Report published in 1927 on the work and finances of the Hospitals of London for the year 1926 is the first of a new series and several improvements have been introduced.
- 2. The accounts of the Hospitals are based for the first time on the regulations of the new edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. The original revision of the Uniform System of Accounts was the direct result of discussions arising out of the first issue of the Report, and each successive edition of the Revised Uniform System has been followed, as now, by a new series of the Statistical Report.
- 3. The number of Hospitals included in the Report has been increased, mainly as the result of the enlargement of the King's Fund area in 1925 from 9 miles round Charing Cross to 11 miles round St. Paul's. The new series begins with 134 Hospitals, and with the inpatient departments of 5 Infant Welfare Centres, making 139 institutions in all.
- 4. The scope of the Report has been again extended. The primary object of the original series was to provide the hospitals and the public with comparative figures of cost of working. This was supplemented later on by a general survey of hospital progress during the year and still later by an analysis of hospital income. The new series contains fresh developments on these lines.
 - 5. The new features of the present issue include the following:-
 - (a) The general survey of the work and finance of the Hospitals is illustrated by coloured graphs and diagrams. These show the steady increase in the number of beds and the total expenditure; the fluctuations in the different sources of income; the relative numbers in each year of hospital surpluses and deficits; the proportions of hospital expenditure covered by income from investments and receipts for services rendered, and the amount raised yearly from Voluntary Gifts.

- (b) The income and the expenditure of each hospital, of each group of hospitals, and of all the hospitals together, are analysed and compared more clearly and completely. The income from each source is expressed as a percentage of the total expenditure, a far more valuable percentage for purposes of comparison than is the percentage of total income.
- (c) The tables of comparative cost of working have been amplified. They contain, as before, the figure known as Statistical Cost, used for comparing the cost of the more controllable items at any one hospital with the average cost for its group. They now also contain Total Cost, which is useful for various other purposes.
- (d) The quantities of meat, fish, milk, eggs and certain other articles consumed at Hospitals are given in an Appendix. These are the first published results of the system of quantity statistics which the King's Fund has helped to introduce to the hospitals as a useful aid in controlling expenditure
- 6. The Appendix on Quantity Statistics is not necessarily a permanent feature, but it is hoped to have similar sections from time to time dealing with some particular subject of statistical interest.
- 7. The Hospital Economy Committee trust that these changes in the Statistical Report which reflect great credit on Mr. Hugh Macrae, C.A., the head of the Hospital Economy Department, will increase the usefulness of the Report to the hospitals, to the Committees of the King's Fund, and to the public. The issue of the first two series was followed by a substantial reduction in Hospital expenditure. Continuous general reductions are more difficult in present circumstances, with prices at a high level, and expensive medical appliances and treatments growing more numerous every year. But these difficulties make it all the more important that the hospitals should be provided with every available aid in controlling their expenditure and increasing their revenue.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

COMPLETION OF SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OUT OF THE LEGACIES OF THE LATE MR. AND MRS. WELLS.

(Report presented at the Annual Meeting of the President and General Council, May 15, 1928.)

- r. The total amount of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells is now known to be almost exactly £255,000. The Distribution Committee accordingly submit a fifth and final list of grants towards schemes of extension and improvement and other urgent special purposes, bringing the total up to that amount and thus completing the special distribution.
- 2. It may be useful to recall the circumstances in which the General Council, in the year 1924, had to decide what use to make of the Wells legacies.
 - (a) The voluntary hospitals had surmounted the financial crisis of 1920-1, but the question had been raised whether, besides solving the maintenance problem, they were capable of expansion to meet the increasing demands. The Voluntary Hospitals Commission had begun an enquiry into the need for additional accommodation and had asked the King's Fund to take part as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London;
 - (b) The hospitals had numerous extension schemes in hand or projected, many of which had been deferred during the financial crisis;
 - (c) The Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee of the King's Fund had reported in March, 1924, that the only parts of London from which evidence had been received of hardship resulting from the transfer of accident cases from hospitals to other institutions for want of vacant beds were the districts in which there was the greatest shortage of hospital accommodation due to the postponement of the provision of additional beds;
 - (d) Between 1922 and 1924 two large legacies, those of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland, had been invested, the income from which would substantially increase the ordinary distribution;
 - (e) The King's Fund had just been notified of the residues, then estimated at over £200,000, left unconditionally to the Fund by the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells.

- 3. The King's Fund had thus before it at the same moment the urgent need for expediting the extension schemes of the hospitals; an increased income which would assist in maintaining additional beds; and the immediate prospect of a large sum from the Wells legacies which the Council could dispose of at its discretion. In these circumstances His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales called a special meeting of the Council in July, 1924, at which it was decided to make the Wells legacies the subject of an extraordinary distribution to meet special needs of the hospitals, and particularly the need for extensions and improvements and increased provision for accident cases.
- 4. It was also decided that in suitable cases definite conditions should be attached to the grants, designed to expedite the actual building, or the raising of the necessary funds. The Council gave the Distribution Committee power to act in cases of urgency.
- 5. The distribution of the £255,000 has been made on these lines during the four years 1924-8, and the following are some of the results.
- 6. Grants have been made to 72 schemes at 63 different hospitals. Of these 72 schemes, 40 have been for the extension of existing hospitals; 4 for complete rebuilding on a larger scale on new sites; 3 for the provision of new hospitals in newly populated areas or in districts inadequately served; 7 for new or enlarged out-patient departments; 11 for nurses' accommodation; 3 for the acquisition of adjoining sites or buildings; 2 to enable the hospitals to open beds which had been already provided but had never been brought into regular use; and 2 for other special purposes. The extension schemes themselves were not confined to the provision of additional beds: they often included additions or improvements to out-patient departments, operating theatres, nurses' quarters, special departments, and other essential parts of modern hospital buildings or equipment.
- 7. The total number of additional beds included in all the schemes taken together will exceed 1,600, there being one or two cases where the final number is not yet decided. The number of these additional beds which are to be reserved for accident cases is at least 179.
- 8. In addition to maintenance grants amounting to £16,500 for the opening of beds, a sum of £12,000 has been allocated towards assisting the hospitals with their expenditure on the initial stages of the new contributory pensions scheme for nurses and hospital officers, which was one of the special needs pending in 1924. The total grants to maintenance will thus amount to £28,500, the other £226,500 being absorbed by the grants in aid of capital expenditure.
- 9. The special distribution has been used, by means of the conditions attached to the grants, partly to expedite the carrying out of schemes and partly as a lever to assist the hospitals to raise from other sources sums larger than the grants themselves, which were necessarily only a small proportion of the total cost. As evidence of the magnitude of the

enterprises which the voluntary hospitals of London have undertaken and largely carried through in the last few years it may be mentioned that the total cost of the schemes assisted by these grants will be more than $f_{3,000,000}$. These are, of course, not yet all paid for: in fact, the balance still to be raised is estimated at a little over $f_{1,000,000}$. The capacity of the hospitals to collect this sum may be judged from the fact that the amount raised for building purposes during the four years 1923–6 varied from $f_{346,000}$ to $f_{735,000}$ and averaged $f_{500,000}$ a year. This included all the grants paid over by the King's Fund both from the ordinary distribution and in 1924–6 from the Wells legacies, and it included also the amounts raised by the hospitals with the aid of the stimulus given by the conditions attached to the Wells grants.

- 10. The Distribution Committee consider that the general result reflects great credit on the hospitals. It gives a further illustration of the strength of the voluntary system in London, which can raise £500,000 a year for building, in addition to £850,000 a year for maintenance from subscriptions and donations alone, and an average of £240,000 a year for endowment. It also shows what valuable assistance the King's Fund, as a central distributing body, can render to the hospitals when a large sum of money, like the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, is placed in its hands with power to make grants for special purposes just when and where there are special needs.
- II. The final list of grants is appended. These cover all the schemes which, in the opinion of the Distribution Committee, are sufficiently mature to enable them to recommend the amount and conditions of a grant. There are numerous other schemes that have not yet reached that stage, and, as has been shown, there are large amounts still to be raised to complete the cost of schemes to which Wells grants have already been made.

COMPLETION OF SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OUT OF THE LEGACIES OF THE LATE MR. AND MRS. WELLS (continued).

LIST OF GRANTS FROM JANUARY 1 TO MAY 15, 1928.

ACTON HOSPITAL.—£1,000 towards revised scheme of extension, increasing the number of beds from 50 to 60; £500 payable when the work is begun, and £500 to be the last £500 required to render the scheme free of debt.

British Hospital for Mothers and Babies.—£500 towards second stage of new hospital; making, with £2,000 granted in 1927, a total of £2,500.

CENTRAL LONDON THROAT, NOSE AND EAR HOSPITAL.—£750 towards new out-patient department; on condition that a further £5,000 is raised and the work begun by July 31, 1928.

CHARING CROSS HOSPITAL.—£2,000 towards reconstruction and equipment of the building acquired from the Royal Westminster Ophthalmic Hospital, increasing the beds by approximately 50; on the understanding that 6 additional beds, making 10 in all, will be reserved for accident cases.

ELIZABETH GARRETT ANDERSON HOSPITAL.—£500 towards extension; making, with £2,000 granted in 1926, a total of £2,500.

Forest Hospital.—£250 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 28 to 37; payable when the work is begun.

GENERAL LYING-IN HOSPITAL.—£500 towards rebuilding of adjoining house as nurses' home and ante-natal and post-natal departments; making, with £1,000 granted in 1927, a total of £1,500.

Guy's Hospital.—fi,000 towards provision of site for out-patient department extension.

Hampstead Hospital.—£600 towards new operating theatre and casualty department and provision of 6 accident beds.

Hornsey Central Hospital.—£500 towards new nurses' home; payable when the work is begun.

Hospital for Sick Children.—£500 towards provision of isolation block for convalescent patients at the country branch at Tadworth, on the understanding that the block will ultimately be used as part of the provision for recovery patients.

KING GEORGE HOSPITAL.—£10,000 towards the building fund of King George Hospital, subject to conditions to be agreed.

MOTHERS' HOSPITAL OF THE SALVATION ARMY.—£1,000 to extension, increasing the number of beds from 90 to 150, payable when the work is begun.

PRINCE OF WALES'S HOSPITAL.—£3,000 towards extension of out-patient department; £1,500 payable when work is begun, and £1,500 to be the last £1,500 required to open the extension free of debt.

PRINCESS LOUISE KENSINGTON HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN.—£500 towards second stage of new hospital; making, with £500 granted towards first stage in 1925, and £1,000 towards second stage in 1927, a total of £2,000.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S MATERNITY HOSPITAL.—£3,000 towards first stage of extension scheme increasing the number of beds; payable when a further £15,000 has been raised and the work begun.

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN.—£1,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 134 to 155, and providing additional nurses' accommodation; to be the last £1,000 required to enable all three parts of the scheme to be opened free of debt.

ROYAL LONDON OPHTHALMIC HOSPITAL.—£500 towards additional nurses' accommodation; making, with £500 granted in 1926, a total of £1,000.

ROYAL NATIONAL ORTHOPÆDIC HOSPITAL.—£1,500, of which £500 towards acquisition of adjoining site at country branch at Stanmore; and £1,000 towards building of additional ward block at Stanmore, increasing the number of beds to 273; payable when the work is begun.

ROYAL WATERLOO HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN AND WOMEN.—£250 towards final stage of extension scheme; making, with £3,000 granted in 1925, a total of £3,250.

St. Mary's Hospital.—£1,000 towards extension; to be the last £1,000 required to render the extension free of debt; making, with £4,000 granted in 1926, a total of £5,000.

SOUTH LONDON HOSPITAL FOR WOMEN.—£500 towards the provision of block containing new out-patient department and nurses' quarters; making, with £2,000 granted in 1926, a total of £2,500.

Westminster Hospital.—£100 towards provision of accident ward, increasing the number of beds in the Hospital from 234 to 242, of which 10 will be reserved for accident cases.

WOODFORD JUBILEE HOSPITAL.—£300 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 23 to 31; payable when the work is begun.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council. (Page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 to 3.

Since July 1921 the Fund, by the invitation of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, has acted as the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within II miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund), or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes

or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to King Edward's Hospital Fund (G.P.O. Box. 465A), 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-one years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £5,800,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1927 being £247,000, besides £34,500, in aid of hospital extensions and improvements, out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 9s. 7d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over $3\frac{1}{2}d$. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £415,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-nine years, the contribution in 1927 being £17,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following page). The issue of these Reports has

enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are being encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control; Hospital Accommodation for Ambulance Cases; Quantity Statistics; Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses; Beds for Paying Patients.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
