

### ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1930.

### PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

- 1. The principal events in the progress of the King's Fund during the year 1930 were the increase in the ordinary distribution from £250,000 to £266,000, and an addition to the supply of radium for loan to hospitals, which raised the total from about 4 grammes to about 10 grammes.
- 2. The increase in the ordinary distribution was rendered possible by the receipt of an anonymous donation of £10,000, and by the fact that in 1930 the whole of the available legacies, which again amounted, as in 1928 and 1929, to over £60,000, were received before the time had arrived for fixing the total to be distributed.
- 3. The increase in the Fund's holding of radium was due to the additional receipts mentioned in 1929, namely, the gift of Mr. Roger Parr and the King's Fund share in the earmarked donations to the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery; while the late Sir Otto Beit, besides having given the initial £50,000 in 1928, generously undertook to make up the deficit on the purchase of the further amount.

### SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

- 4. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1930 were £493,950 os. 7d.
- 5. This total included a gift of £20,000 from an anonymous donor, subject to the special trusts described in a later paragraph of this Report; £41,195 10s. added to the fund for the purchase of radium; £90,000, being the bequest of £100,000 (less duty) of the late Lord Revelstoke to capital; £15,000 to capital, being the second instalment of the munificent gift

of "Audax" payable under a seven-years' agreement; £5,000, being the bequest of the late Sir Friedrich G. J. Eckstein, Bt., to capital; further sums of £5,162 18s. 11d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Florence Mary Hames, of £700 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, and of £233 6s. 4d. from the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland; £67,648 8s. 10d. general legacies; and £249,003 5s. general receipts. These general receipts were made up as follows:—

6. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £266,000, an increase of £16,000 over 1929, apart from the special pensions grants which amounted to £16,468, as against £13,734 in 1929.

- 8. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. These reports are most useful to the Fund at the annual distribution, and the Council are under a great obligation to the Visitors who undertake the inspections.
- 9. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,183,592. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £6,770,008 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

### SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 10. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, Princess Mary Countess of Harewood, the Duke of Connaught and other members of the Royal Family.
- II. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,500 from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from Sir Thomas P. Latham, Bt., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £645 3s. 2d. from Mr. Robert Fleming; of £625 from Lloyds Bank Limited, and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £600 from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt.; of £525 from the Westminster Bank Limited; of £516 2s. 6d. from "W.C.W."; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Sir George Roberts, Bt.; and donations of £1,000 from the late Lord Glendyne; of £500 from the late Captain Sir Charles L. Cust, Bt., R.N., from "J.R.B.", from the Goodwin Memorial Fund (Cinema Help Society), and from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D.". The Fund also received an anonymous donation of £10,000, four of £500 each and one of £320; besides the anonymous Special Trust gift of £20,000 already mentioned.
- 12. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £17,000, as in the previous year. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation is now £466,000, apart from grants made by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League and to the large number of individual donors whose combined contributions have produced this valuable addition to the resources of the Fund.
- 13. Legacies received during the year included £90,000 for capital purposes from the estate of the late Lord Revelstoke, being a bequest of £100,000 less legacy duty; £18,132 10s. from the estate of the late Mr. Percy Morris, on account of residue; £17,784 8s. from the estate of the late Reverend Henry Swann, further on account of residue (making a total of £62,784 8s.

received to date); £9,402 15s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mr. William Rolfe, on account of share of residue; £5,162 18s. 11d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Florence Mary Hames, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £41,834 11s. 7d. received to date); £5,000 from the estate of the late Sir Friedrich G. J. Eckstein, Bt., for capital purposes; £4,500 from the estate of the late Dame Edith Jane Durning-Lawrence; £3,000 from the estate of the late Commander Francis William Chaine, on account of residue; £1,601 4s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Jeannette Moses, on account of residue, and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. James John Blundell.

14. The Council are also very grateful to the Trustees of the following estates for gifts made to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers: the late Mr. Alfred Hobson, £5,000; the late Mr. Edward Clark, £4,000; the late Mr. Henry Powell Gough, £250; the late Mr. John William Menzler, £200; and the late Miss Mary Wilkins, £20; and to the Trustees of the late Mr. J. E. A. Harrison-Smith for a further gift of £100, making a total sum of £600 received to date.

### SPECIAL TRUST GIFT OF £20,000.

15. Towards the end of the year the Fund was offered a sum of £20,000 from an anonymous donor, subject to a special trust whereby the capital was to be invested and the income applied to the reduction of the building debt on the recent extension of the Miller Hospital, Greenwich, or, alternatively, in certain conditions mentioned in the deed of trust, to similar purposes at other hospitals in the Metropolitan Boroughs of Deptford, Greenwich, Lewisham or Woolwich. The Management Committee gladly accepted the offer, realising the value, in the interests of the hospital or hospitals concerned, not only of the gift itself, but also of the conditions attached to it. The principal object of the King's Fund, in asking that building schemes should be submitted, is to enable the Fund to encourage extensions which are urgently needed and which are undertaken with due regard to the prospect of the provision of the necessary funds both for building and for subsequent maintenance. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the anonymous donor in selecting the King's Fund as the administrator of a gift so carefully designed to promote this double object.

### EXPENSES.

16. During the year expenses amounted to £13,558 7s. 10d., or about  $6\frac{1}{2}d$ . per £ of the total received.

### KING'S FUND RADIUM.

17. During 1929, as recorded in the last Report, the Fund had bought 4 grammes of radium for loan to hospitals with the gift of £50,000 for that purpose from the late Sir Otto Beit, and had allocated it amongst twenty hospitals. The Fund had also received £37,600 for the same purpose out of the Thank-offering Fund, and £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and had decided to exercise an option for the purchase of 6 more grammes, although the money in

hand was still considerably less than the total that would have to be paid when delivery was complete. The deficit was reduced during the year by a balance of £2,900 which became available from the Thank-offering Fund.

- 18. The additional 6 grammes were allocated amongst seven hospitals. Of these, three had received a share in the first 4 grammes and four had not, so that the total number of participating hospitals was increased to twenty-four.
- 19. At the December meeting of the Council it was announced by the Prince of Wales that it had been one of the last acts of Sir Otto Beit to promise that he would himself make up whatever was required for the balance of the cost of the additional radium; and in a resolution moved by His Royal Highness, expressing their deep regret at the death of Sir Otto, the Council placed on record their gratitude to him and their appreciation of the results of his initiative, his generosity and his practical study of the best methods of meeting one of the most urgent needs of the hospitals for the purposes of medical treatment and research.

### PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

- 20. The grants from the King's Fund towards the expenditure of the hospitals under the pensions scheme amounted to £16,468 as against £13,734 in 1929, and a further sum has been added, out of the legacies received during the year, to the special reserve to assist in providing the grants during the remainder of the seven years for which they were promised.
- 21. By the end of the year the scheme had been adopted by 115 hospitals in London containing, with their branches, more than 13,500 beds or 81 per cent. of the whole, besides 188 hospitals with over 26,500 beds elsewhere, making a total of 303 hospitals with over 40,000 beds. This represented 75 per cent. of the beds at hospitals with 200 beds or more, and 41 per cent. of the beds at smaller hospitals, or 55 per cent. of the beds in the voluntary hospitals of the whole country.

### INCREASED CONVALESCENT HOMES DISTRIBUTION.

22. Part of the larger sum available for distribution was used to increase the total of the grants to Convalescent Homes from £2,000 to £3,000. In allocating the additional amount the Distribution Committee took into special consideration the extent to which the various homes provided medical or nursing treatment or care, thus releasing hospital beds sooner than would otherwise have been possible.

### PATIENTS' WAKING HOURS.

23. The Fund's Visitors who inspected the hospitals were asked to make a special report on the hours at which patients were awakened and washed. Consideration of the replies,

which showed wide differences in the practice of different hospitals, was deferred until after the annual distribution was finished, with a view to the preparation of a report on the subject in 1931.\*

### Provision for Persons of Moderate Means.

- 24. The annual list of pay beds published by the Fund showed that the total number of such beds at the end of 1930 was 1,425 at 99 hospitals, as against 1,055 at 80 hospitals in March, 1928, when the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund were preparing their Report on the whole subject. The charges for these beds ranged from 2 guineas per week to 10 guineas or more, a large number being at 4, 5 or 6 guineas, exclusive of whatever might be payable for medical and surgical fees and extras.
- 25. The insurance scheme for members of the professional and middle classes, submitted to the King's Fund by the British Provident Association in 1929, formed the subject of a report laid by the Management Committee before the General Council at the Annual Meeting in May, 1930, and subsequently published. The scheme provides alternative scales of premiums for making provision against weekly charges for a pay bed in a hospital or for a bed in a nursing home, and, if desired, against medical or surgical fees as well; and also for contributions towards the capital cost of a pay bed, in return for which the subscriber has a prior claim to the use of such bed when approved for admission according to the rules of the hospital. The Management Committee, after communicating with the Distribution Committee and the medical members of the Fund, informed Sir Alan Anderson, the Chairman of the British Provident Association, that they considered the scheme to be consistent with the recommendations of the Pay Beds Committee, and conveyed to him on behalf of the King's Fund an expression of sympathy with the scheme and of hope for its success; and their action was approved by the Council.

### "Hospital Clause" in Road Traffic Act.

26. In December, 1929, Lord Luke had moved an amendment to the Road Traffic Bill with the object of providing that insurance policies under the Act should ensure payment to hospitals, up to a maximum of £25, for the treatment of accident cases covered by such policies. The amendment was vigorously supported by the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee of the King's Fund, in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association. Lord Macmillan, as Vice-Chairman of the Committee during the absence of Mr. Whitley in India, gave his active assistance to the promoters of the draft clause, which was ultimately, with various amendments, included in the Act. The Council were much gratified at the sympathy and support extended to the voluntary hospitals during the debates in both Houses of Parliament.

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1929.

- 27. The scheme of Voluntary Hospital representation for the County of London, for the purpose of consultation with the London County Council under Section 13 of the Local Government Act, was completed early in 1930 by the Joint Committee representing the Parliamentary Committee of the King's Fund, the Conference of Teaching Hospitals and the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and was then submitted to and approved by the London County Council. The representative Central Committee, under the title of the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, was elected in March and held its first meeting in April, by which time a communication from the London County Council was awaiting its consideration. The new representative body having thus been created, the Joint Committee was dissolved, and the Parliamentary Committee of the King's Fund ceased to have any direct responsibility in connection with the Local Government Act. The King's Fund, however, offered to provide the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee with temporary staff assistance and to help with statistical or other information if and when desired, and this form of co-operation continued throughout the year.
- 28. At the December meeting of the General Council of the King's Fund, the Chairman of the London County Council, Sir Robert (then Major) Tasker, spoke of the earnest desire of the County Council that the harmonious co-operation and happy relationship which had always existed between the London County Council and the London Voluntary Hospitals should not only continue but, if possible, be further extended. The Fund is glad to see that Lord Riddell, the Chairman of the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, has also expressed the desire that the relations between the voluntary hospitals and the County Council under Section 13 of the Act should be founded on a basis of mutual co-operation. Consultations between the County Council and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee have been carried on throughout the year with this end in view.
- 29. The necessary machinery has also been set up for consultations under Section 13 of the Act between the County and County Borough Councils and the voluntary hospitals in the areas which include the parts of the King's Fund district outside the County of London.
- 30. In February, the King's Fund published a memorandum which, as the result of a suggestion by the Joint Committee, had been prepared for the Fund by Mr. Malcolm Trustram Eve, on the Powers and Duties of Local Authorities in the Matter of Hospital Accommodation under the Local Government Act. This supplemented the memorandum which had been published in March, 1929, on the subject of Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Bill, and which had laid stress on the importance of maintaining the voluntary element in the hospital service, and on the advantages of mutual co-operation in the interests of both sections of the service.

### REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

- 31. The Propaganda Committee have continued to develop new methods of making the work of the Fund and the hospitals better known to the public. As in previous years, a gratifying result has been that a large number of distinguished people in different spheres of public life have taken an active part in promoting the welfare of the Fund in connection with the functions organised by the Committee and in other ways.\*
- 32. A fourth conference was held in November to discuss with hospital representatives the possibility of finding new ways in which the propaganda organised by the King's Fund could stimulate interest in the work of the hospitals generally. Various proposals made by representatives present were referred to a sub-committee for consideration and report to a later conference.

### BED COMPLEMENT AND BEDS OCCUPIED

33. The Hospital Economy Committee have been considering the differences between one hospital and another in the proportion between the total beds and the average number occupied, since any increases in the percentages occupied would have the same effect as increases in the total beds, and at a minimum cost. In order to assist the hospitals to ascertain whether any such increases were possible, the Committee, after consulting the hospitals, revised the form of statistics so as to show for each hospital the bed complement, the number of beds closed for building, cleaning, or other causes, and the number open for use. They also prepared, circulated and subsequently published a report comparing, for each kind of bed at each hospital and in each group of hospitals, the average number of beds occupied with the beds open.† In so doing they have followed the established practice of the Fund in such matters, which is to collect and tabulate the facts relating to all the hospitals, so as to enable each hospital to compare its own experience with that of the others.

### PERSONNEL.

34. The Council had to regret the loss by death during the year of Sir Francis Champneys, Bt., who had been connected with the Fund since 1902, first as a Visitor and then as a member of the Distribution Committee, and had been a member of the Council since 1916; of Mr. Pett Ridge, who had been a member of the Revenue and Propaganda Committees since 1925 and of the Council since 1928, and had also served as a Visitor; of Mr. F. J. Elliott and Mr. T. P. Legg, two of the Visitors; and of Mr. H. W. Marshall, who had assisted the Fund for many years as a Visitor and as a donor, and was the founder of the "Family Fund" known as the Marshall Fund, now amounting to £20,274 7s. 1d. Reference has already been made in this Report to the lamented death of Sir Otto Beit, the donor of both the original and the final sums for the purchase of the King's Fund stock of Radium, and to the resolution passed by the Council in December.

35. The Council regret the resignation of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, who had been a member since 1917 and presided from 1913 to 1919 over the enquiry held by the Executive Committee into the question of Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, which paved the way for the adoption of the present Federated Scheme.

### SPECIAL NEEDS, 1931.

- 36. Although the maintenance income of the London Voluntary Hospitals had increased during the five years previous to 1930 from £3,169,000 to £3,600,000, and although the total voluntary gifts in 1929, including gifts to building and endowment, came to no less than £2,845,000, the depression which began in 1930 has produced for them, as for all other enterprises requiring continuous financial support, a period of exceptional difficulty.
- 37. The importance, in these circumstances, of a continued increase in the distribution by the King's Fund was emphasised by the Prince of Wales, at the meeting of the President and General Council in December, 1930, in the following words:—
  - "It is very fortunate that we are able to increase the distribution this year from £250,000 to £266,000. It has remained at the quarter million for two years, and we have now taken a good step forward towards the £300,000 mark."

His Royal Highness added that when he said that it was very fortunate, he was thinking of the present needs of the hospitals, since, like most other people the world over, voluntary hospital managers were finding 1930 a difficult year.

38. The Council greatly appreciate the assistance of the Press in keeping before the public the claims of the hospitals.

# Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 12, 1930.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes, for the present year, was held in the Lord Chairman's Committee Room at the House of Lords on Friday, December 12, 1930, at 11.30, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) read the Minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed and signed.

### THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council, was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read a message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund.

"The King has learned with much satisfaction that the income of the Fund has enabled the distribution to be increased from £250,000 to £266,000, and that £116,000 has also been

received on capital account. These gratifying facts themselves testify to the confidence which the Fund has established in the minds of the public, and must be a great encouragement to all its workers and well-wishers.

"His Majesty deeply regrets the death of Sir Otto Beit, to whose munificence the King's Fund is indebted for so large a proportion of the radium which it holds for the use of hospitals in London."

" 12th December, 1930."

It is very fortunate that we are able to increase the distribution this year from £250,000 to £266,000. It has remained at the quarter million for two years, and we have now taken a good step forward towards the £300,000 mark. This increase is made possible by three satisfactory features in the receipts for the year. In the first place, we have received a donation of £10,000 from the anonymous friend who has now during the past few years given seven sums, amounting in all to £54,000: a very good sort of friend to have. In the second place, there have been considerable additions to the capital fund, notably £90,000 under the will of the late Lord Revelstoke, who was for many years our Treasurer. The income from this capital is the solid foundation on which the annual distribution is based. In the third place, the legacies not earmarked for capital have now, for the third year in succession, amounted to more than £60,000, and the whole £60,000 was received this year before November, when the estimates were made up. The combined result is that we are able to increase the distribution by £16,000, and also to pay the special grants towards the pensions scheme for nurses and hospital officers, which themselves come to about £16,000, without running any undue risk of not maintaining this progress in the future. The total amount distributed is thus £282,468.

When I say that it is very fortunate that we are able to make this increased distribution, I am thinking of the present needs of the hospitals. Like most other people, the world over, voluntary hospital managers are finding 1930 a difficult year. But before we begin to talk about remedies, let us try and get the diagnosis right. There has been no evidence whatever of any gradual drying up of voluntary contributions during recent years. Look at the figures in the King's Fund Statistical Review down to the end of 1929: the number of beds larger every year; expenditure, therefore, increasing every year, but income more than keeping pace; the aggregate surplus on the year's working increased from £17,000 in 1928 to £50,000 in 1929; surpluses £3,000 more, deficits £30,000 less; total from voluntary gifts for all purposes in 1929, £2,800,000. This is for the hospitals in London alone: I am told that the figures for hospitals outside London are better still. This has been for years the normal general position of the voluntary hospitals: maintained, like all good things, only by constant effort, but nevertheless successfully maintained. There are difficulties at the present time, but they are exceptional. If you take all the hospitals together, during recent years, there has been a steady increase in income year after year.

Let me try once more to express briefly the reason why we regard it as so important that voluntary contributions should be maintained. You can secure efficiency in many different ways. But there are certain special characteristics with which the voluntary system permeates the whole hospital service of this country; and these characteristics have their origin in the close touch between the workers in the hospital, voluntary and paid, and that particular form of sympathy and public spirit which finds expression in voluntary giving.

I should like to mention one kind of voluntary giving which is growing at a great rate. I refer to the voluntary contributions by the patients themselves, and particularly to the contributions

organised by the Hospital Saving Association, under the Chairmanship of Sir Alan Anderson, by means of weekly workshop collections. I attended the annual meeting of group secretaries the other day, and I was very much impressed. I knew about the H.S.A. before. I knew the membership had grown from 62,000 in 1924 to 800,000 in 1930, and the total receipts from £22,000 to £438,000, all collected in threepences. I knew about them as Patron of the Association, and as President of the King's Fund, which helped to found it. But the other night I saw them: a hall packed with 2,000 men and women, all obviously in a state of enthusiasm over their job: that is, over putting up 3d. a week out of their wages; and over giving up their spare time to get others to do the same; in order to be able to contribute their fair share of the cost of hospital treatment for themselves and their families, and to help their mates to pay theirs; and thus to help the hospitals to treat those who cannot afford to pay. If these wage-earners can thus continue, in ever-increasing numbers, voluntarily to contribute their share, in spite of the bad times, surely it is up to all the other members of the community also to contribute their share; and so make sure of keeping the voluntary spirit of mutual helpfulness as a permanent feature of our hospital service, under the new arrangements for co-operation between the County authorities and those responsible for the voluntary hospitals.

Besides the ordinary distribution, we have before us to-day the allocation of the further six grammes of radium. We were able to buy this because of the King's Fund share of the Thank-offering radium money, and the £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr. This is in addition to the four grammes bought in 1928 with the gift of the late Sir Otto Beit, whose death is such a grievous loss to all who knew him, and knew and valued the great work which he achieved by devoting so much of his wealth, and also of his time and thought, to public objects, particularly the advancement of knowledge and the cure of disease. When the Distribution Committee prepared their report, there was a deficit on this additional six grammes in the neighbourhood of 48,000. This deficit no longer exists. For it was one of the last acts of Sir Otto Beit to authorise the Honorary Secretaries to say that he would himself make up whatever was required to pay for the balance. He has thus added to the debt which we owe him for having opened our radium fund by his first gift of £50,000; and before I sit down I shall ask you to send Lady Beit a message, expressing our great appreciation of his generosity and our sympathy with her in her bereavement. The King's Fund now holds ten grammes, and is using it by way of loan to 24 hospitals in the manner originally suggested to the Fund by Sir Otto. This method of concentrating the ownership of radium in the hands of a central body, which places it out on loan, is now well recognised to be one of the best ways of securing its most efficient use both for treatment and for the spread of knowledge. It is, of course, the method that was adopted when the National Radium Commission was set up, and I am pleased to see that the King's Fund and the Commission have been working in friendly co-operation. In a matter in which there is so much to be learnt, and in which knowledge is advancing so rapidly, it is of the utmost importance that the new experience should be pooled, and should be acted on, as quickly as possible.

Speaking of the Thank-offering Fund, it is interesting to know that the generosity of "Audax" in giving £105,000 to start that fund is still bearing fruit. At our last meeting I mentioned a donor who had promised £10,500, as being equal to one-tenth of the original gift. We recently had an anonymous letter from a working man who said that when he heard Mr. Audax broadcast he made up his mind to send a guinea a year to the King's Fund for ten years. After sending 18 months' instalments, he has now sent the whole of the balance. These three sums, £105,000, £10,500 and £10 10s., are samples of the wide basis of support on which the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals rest. Another interesting donation is the grant of £500 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of His Majesty's Navy, in

appreciation of the work done by the London hospitals for naval men and their dependants. We in our turn, on behalf of the hospitals, greatly appreciate this action on the part of the Navy.

I am glad to see that the Distribution Committee, in the Visitors' Report for this year, "starred" a question relating to the important subject of the comfort of patients. This particular question referred to the time at which patients are awakened in the morning. The replies will be considered as soon as the distribution is over, and I look forward to hearing the result.

The Council decided in November to allocate £3,000 to Convalescent Homes instead of £2,000. This has enabled the Distribution Committee to increase the separate grants, and to give more to homes which provide some amount of medical or nursing care. Such homes have a larger claim on a Fund like this, whose primary interest is hospital treatment.

I now have the pleasure of expressing my thanks and yours to the members of the Distribution Committee, amongst whom are included all the Honorary Secretaries; to the Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry; to Mr. Eardley Holland, Chairman of the Radium Sub-Committee; and to the Visitors who inspect the hospitals on behalf of the Fund. I should like also to say how much we are indebted to Lord Luke and Lord Macmillan for their services in connection with the clause in the Road Traffic Act which ensures some payment to hospitals for the treatment of road accidents. The Council has to lament the deaths of two members, Sir Francis Champneys, who was formerly for many years a member of the Distribution Committee, and Mr. Pett Ridge, who had been one of the most active members of the Propaganda Committee since its formation and was also on the Revenue Committee, as well as being a Visitor. We have also to regret the death of Mr. T. P. Legg, another of the Visitors, and of Mr. H. W. Marshall, who was a generous donor, and was the founder of the Family Fund known as the Marshall Fund, which now stands at more than £20,000. We welcome back on the Propaganda Committee Mr. E. W. Morris, whose long years of experience and deep love of hospital work make him a valuable member of the Committee and of the list of lecturers to schools and colleges.

I have now to move the following resolution relating to the death of Sir Otto Beit:-

"That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Sir Otto Beit, to whom the King's Fund owed a great debt of gratitude for his munificent gift of £50,000 in 1928, to be expended in the purchase of radium, and for his recent promise to make up the amount required to pay for a further supply. As a result of his initiative, his generosity and his practical study of the best methods of meeting one of the most urgent needs of the hospitals for the purposes of medical treatment and research, the King's Fund is now the holder of a large supply of radium which it has placed on loan with London hospitals in accordance with the terms of his gift.

"The Council also desire to tender to Lady Beit and to the other members of the family an expression of their sincere sympathy with them in their bereavement."

The resolution was passed in silence, the Council rising in their places.

### TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Mr. E. R. Peacock (the Treasurer) said:—

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-You, Sir, have referred to the fact that the increased distribution has been made possible by satisfactory receipts under the headings of donations, capital account, and legacies. Perhaps I may be allowed to give some brief details under each heading. The anonymous donation of f10,000 was a most important addition to the income of 1930. The maintenance of the distribution has for many years depended on our receiving one or more large donations, and every year one or two have been received, except in 1929, when there were, of course, large receipts through the Thank-offering Fund. The additions to the capital fund during 1930 amount to £116,000. This includes the legacy of £100,000 from the late Lord Revelstoke, which was reduced to foo,000 by taxation. This I regard as one of the worst and least defensible forms of taxation. There were two other legacies of about £5,000 each, one from the estate of the late Sir Frederick Eckstein and one from that of Mrs. Hames—an instalment of a much larger amount. There was also £15,000 from "Audax," being the second year's instalment of his gift of £105,000 to the Thank-offering Fund. It is indeed satisfactory that legacies available for general purposes should, for the third year in succession, have come to more than £60,000. The actual figures for the three years 1928 to 1930 are £68,801, £68,445, £64,762. Although the receipts from legacies this year do not, so far, show an actual increase over 1929, they have helped to increase the distribution. For, in the first place, practically the whole of the £64,000 came in before November, when the estimates have to be made up, whereas in 1928 and 1929 only about half the legacies were received before November, and the other half came quite unexpectedly later in the year, and could not be taken into account. In the second place, when legacies on this scale are received for three years running, they increase the five years' average, which is one of the figures the Management Committee have before them when they are considering what proportion of the legacies can safely be distributed in the year. Taking all these receipts into account, the Fund has been able not only to increase the ordinary distribution by £16,000, but also to meet the cost of the special grants in aid of expenditure on the Pensions Scheme, which came to just over £16,000, and to carry nearly £16,000 to reserve, where it will be available for use in case of future emergency. I venture to think that this is a result on which the Council may fairly be congratulated, especially in times like these. The importance of all three sources of revenue to which I have referred will be understood when I say that, after allowing for the income from investments, the amount we have to raise during the year from voluntary sources, in order to distribute as much as we are distributing this year, is at least £100,000. And, as the hospitals have for some time past added every year approximately 500 to the number of their beds, it is clear that, if we are to keep pace with the needs of the hospitals, there must be a progressive and substantial increase in the amount of our annual distribution.

### THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord Marshall, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that this year the League proposed to allocate to the King's Fund the sum of £17,000 from its collections. The Council of the League was gratified in being able to transfer the same amount as in each of the last three years, in spite of a year so full of difficulties in the way of raising funds for charitable purposes. From the inauguration of the League in 1899 it had transferred to the King's Fund from its collections for Hospitals a total of £467,034, and had made grants to hospitals outside London totalling £129,405, making a grand total of £596,439.

### GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (See pages 27 to 30.)

Sir Leonard Cohen (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches). (See pages 31 to 41.)

The Rev. Owen S. Watkins having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved that the grants be approved. (See page 42.)

Lord Luke (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals. (See pages 43 to 45.)

The motion, having been seconded by Sir James Kingston Fowler, was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Major-General Sir Cecil Lowther, seconded by Mr. H. L. Eason, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 19th.

### SECOND ALLOCATION OF RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented a Report of the Committee on the second allocation of King's Fund Radium to Hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the allocation be approved. (See pages 46 to 48.)

The recommendation was seconded by Lady Ampthill, and carried unanimously.

### ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1931.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said:-

My Lords. Ladies and Gentlemen,—We have now to consider the arrangements for 1931. I am sorry to learn that Mr. W. J. H. Whittall is obliged by ill-health to resign his membership of the Council. As the expert Chairman of the Committee on Pensions he was, more than anyone else, responsible for the Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, for which he deserves the gratitude not only of the beneficiaries, but also of the hospitals and the King's Fund. The Scheme has now been adopted by more than 100 hospitals in London, representing 13,500 beds. If we take the whole country, the figures are 300 institutions, 40,000 beds: a result on which we must congratulate Sir Edward Penton, its Chairman, as well as Mr. Whittall. Sir James Kingston Fowler is unable to accept re-appointment on the Hospital Economy Committee, but will remain on the Council. I propose to appoint two new members of the Council, Mr. Ernest Pooley and Wing-Commander Louis Greig; and to appoint Mr. Samuel, who is already on the Council and the Propaganda Committee, a member of the Revenue Committee. Major Ian Hay Beith is joining the Propaganda Committee in place of Mr. Pett Ridge. Now, when I go abroad in January, it will be necessary for me to delegate my powers as President to a special Committee, and I am pleased to say that the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker of the House of Commons and the Governor of the Bank of England have again consented to act in this capacity. I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move the delegation resolutions.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by Dr. H. Morley Fletcher, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various committees for 1931.

### VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The Chairman of the County Council (Major R. I. TASKER, J.P.), in moving a hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the President, said that he had great pleasure in submitting the motion knowing full well that it would receive unanimous and cordial support from all present. Since the meeting in 1929 which was attended by his predecessor, Lord Monk Bretton, the London County Council, under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1929, had taken over the powers and duties of the London Boards of Guardians and the Metropolitan Asylums Board, and was thus brought into much more intimate contact with all the voluntary hospitals in London. He knew the Council would be glad to avail itself still further of any assistance which the experience and knowledge of those who were responsible for the management of such hospitals could place at its disposal. It was their earnest desire that the harmonious co-operation and happy relationship which had always existed between the County Council and the voluntary hospitals should not only continue but, if possible, be further extended. The Honorary Treasurer referred to contributions and he would desire to make one short reference to a matter of vital importance to the voluntary hospitals. For some years past, as the result of the London County Council's practice with respect to Sunday opening of cinemas, very substantial financial benefits had been derived by London voluntary hospitals, and at the end of November this year, roughly a sum of £150,000 had been contributed by the charges at those cinemas; and it might be assumed that in the near future those contributions would have attained a rate of something like £200,000 a year. But during the last few days a decision had been given in the High Court by three of His Majesty's distinguished judges, and the decision had been against his Council. It would therefore not be proper for him to say any more at the moment but that the Council had decided to appeal to the Court of Appeal and had asked the Home Secretary to receive a deputation. He moved that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded to His Royal Highness their President for his conduct in the Chair that day.

Sir Walter Lawrence, Bart., having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings then terminated.

### DEATH OF LORD STAMFORDHAM.

Sir Leonard Cohen (Hon. Secretary) read the following resolution of condolence passed by the Management Committee, on behalf of the Council, on the occasion of the death of Lord Stamfordham:—

"That the Management Committee, on behalf of the General Council and all the members of the Fund, desire to place on record their profound sorrow at the death of Lord Stamfordham. His connection with the work of the Fund began in 1901 when His present Majesty, then Prince of Wales, became its President, and from the time of the passing of the Act of Incorporation in 1907 he had been a member of the Council. As a result of the direct personal supervision exercised over the Fund by its Royal President, Lord Stamfordham, as his private secretary, was, during the years 1901 to 1910, brought into close and almost daily touch with the details of its work; and from 1910, when the King, on his accession, became its Patron and declared his unabated interest in all that concerned its welfare, Lord Stamfordham continued his association with the Fund in his double capacity as a member of the Council and as the channel of official communication with His Majesty. Throughout the whole of this period of 30 years the Fund had the benefit of his vast experience and his unfailing wisdom, tact and charm in dealing with men and affairs, and his presence and assistance will be very greatly missed.

"The Management Committee desire also to tender to the members of the family their heart-felt sympathy in their bereavement."

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

The King is glad to see that King Edward's Hospital Fund was able in 1930 to provide the increased distribution of £266,000 out of the current income of the year. His Majesty trusts that the public will realise the importance of maintaining the income of the King's Fund and of the Hospitals during these difficult times.

His Royal Highness continued:—I do not propose to review the events of 1930, because I did that last December. I will only refer to a few points that specially affect the future. In such difficult times as these we may fairly congratulate ourselves on having been able to increase the distribution last year from £250,000 to £266,000. What we need now is to maintain that figure, and, if possible, to make a further increase. We have already received two donations which give us reason to be hopeful. One is the gift of £2,000 from the Nizam of Hyderabad. As was announced at the time, this sum, which came to the King's Fund through Sir Akbar Hydari, the leader of the Hyderabad Delegation at the Round Table Conference last winter, was placed by His Exalted Highness at the disposal of the King for the Hospital Fund, as a token of his gratitude for the personal interest taken by His Majesty in the work of the Conference and in that of the Hyderabad Delegation. I take this opportunity of expressing my own warmest thanks to His Exalted Highness the Nizam for this very generous gift. The other is a contribution of £10,000 from the British Charities Association, representing the share, to be allotted amongst the London hospitals, of the proceeds of the Association's activities in 1930. These two sums have given us a good start for 1931 in our efforts to do at least as well as we did last year.

One thing is quite certain, the hospitals will need the largest distribution we can give them. They found 1930 a difficult year. They are finding 1931 still more difficult, and we are evidently going to have an anxious time. But on the other side we may say this. The voluntary hospital system has survived many periods of depression in the past. During recent years, although a good many hospitals have had deficits, the income, taken as a whole, has grown steadily, and has kept ahead of the growing expenditure. This was the position to the end of 1929, in which year voluntary gifts, large and small, amounted for all hospital purposes, in London alone, to no less than  $\pounds 2,845,000$ .

We now have approximate results for 1930, for the 140 hospitals on our books. The figures are not yet complete, and they have not yet had the careful analysis and study they usually get from the King's Fund. But they are near enough to show almost certainly two things, one favourable and one unfavourable. In the race between total income and total expenditure, income still kept ahead, and in fact slightly increased its lead, and there was, for the fourth time in succession, a net aggregate surplus for the year. Moreover, the approximate figures do not indicate any decrease, down to the end of 1930, in the total of voluntary gifts. On the other hand, in the race between the numbers of the individual surpluses and deficits of the separate hospitals, the surpluses lost their lead. In 1929 there were 18 more surpluses on the year's working than there were deficits: in 1930 the numbers were almost exactly equal.

It is not in my power to forecast the future. All I can do is to try to state fairly the facts about the past, so far as they are available, in order that the difficulties of the present may be seen in their proper perspective. The increase in the number of hospital deficits is a serious fact, and those hospitals are compelled to call the attention of the public to the deficits. But if the public got the idea that voluntary hospital finance was nothing but a series of deficits, they might take too pessimistic a view of the whole situation. To get a true picture you need the facts on both sides. And it is equally a fact that the finances of the voluntary hospitals generally, before the present crisis, were not declining, but were constantly improving. The difficulties the hospitals have now to face are caused by a world-wide depression, not by any weakness in the voluntary system itself.

The function of the King's Fund is to help the hospitals in every way it possibly can, and the report of the Propaganda Committee shows that we try to do this, not only by the annual distribution, but by keeping the public well informed about their work and their needs. The hospitals make their individual appeals. The King's Fund talks about the voluntary hospitals as a whole, as one means of assisting them to increase their income.

The King's Fund also helps the hospitals to make the best use of their income when they get it. The Report of the Hospital Economy Committee illustrates one way in which this is done. The particular problem this time was how to make the fullest possible use of the existing hospital beds, by reducing to a minimum the margin between the number of beds available and the number actually occupied. The King's Fund dealt with this question by its usual method. In consultation with the hospitals it collected and circulated the figures so that each hospital could compare its own results with those of all the others. This has meant a great deal of work, carried out by Mr. Macrae and his department with their accustomed skill and thoroughness.

The Report on Patients' Waking Hours is another example of similar action by a central fund. The subject has been talked about for years, and the difficulties are well known to all hospital people. A few hospitals have been making experiments. The King's Fund has now collected and circulated the facts about all the hospitals. The Report is at once definite and cautious. It recommends that no hospital should start waking patients before 6 o'clock. The method suggested is consultation

with the hospitals where a change seems desirable. There are now only four hospitals which begin waking patients before 5 o'clock; 6 is already the most common hour; and 14 are later than 6. I think we should, and I think the patients should as well, congratulate the hospitals that have made a move. They have certainly brought the question to the front, as is shown by the fact that it was taken up last year, almost simultaneously and quite independently, by three different bodies, each in its own sphere—the British Hospitals Association, the London County Council, and the King's Fund; and the three reports all point more or less to the same conclusion.

I am glad to see that our Annual Report refers appreciatively to the desire, expressed by successive Chairmen of the London County Council at our meetings, for co-operation between the Council and the voluntary hospitals, and to the friendly consultations that have been taking place during the past year with a view to securing the best possible hospital service for the people of London.

There are two items on the Accounts which I should like specially to mention. One is the annual contribution from the League of Mercy, which has now been maintained at £17,000 for four successive years, an achievement for which we are very grateful to the workers for the League, and to the innumerable donors whose gifts make up this large total. The other is an entirely new and unprecedented item, a Special Trust Fund of £20,000, given by an anonymous donor. The income is to be used primarily to assist a hospital to pay off its building debt; on condition that it does not embark on fresh building expenditure without the approval of the King's Fund. In that unlikely event, the Fund is to apply the income to similar purposes in the same neighbourhood. The anonymous donor has not only done a good deed to the hospital service of the district concerned, but has also paid a great compliment to our Distribution Committee by selecting the King's Fund to exercise this discretion. In your name and my own, I take this opportunity of saying publicly how grateful we are. Since the end of the year we have received the legacy of £50,000 from the late Sir Otto Beit. This is his third recent benefaction to the Fund. In 1928 he gave £50,000 for the purchase of 4 grammes of radium. In December last he promised to make up the deficit on the purchase of the further 6 grammes. This deficit has come out at  $f_{0,000}$ , and the promise has been fulfilled by the receipt, during the last few days, of a cheque for that amount from the executors. The King's Fund is thus indebted to Sir Otto's munificence for a total of £106,000.

I have now to express my thanks, and yours, to Mr. Peacock, our Treasurer, to the Chairmen and members of the Committees whose reports are before us to-day, and to the Honorary Secretaries and the staff. The Fund has special reasons for deploring the death of Lord Stamfordham, who was very closely associated with its work at the time when the King was its President, and, as we all know, he retained his interest ever since, both as a member of the Council and as the King's private secretary during all the years that His Majesty has been our Patron. We also regret the loss by death of three Visitors, Lady Plender, Sir Charles Cust, and Mr. Hugh Morrison. I have appointed as a member of the Council, in the place vacated by the lamented death of Lord Stamfordham, Sir Clive Wigram, who succeeded him as the King's Private Secretary. Mr. L. W. G. Malcolm has recently been added to the Propaganda Committee. I am greatly obliged to the members of the special Committee, the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker, and the Governor of the Bank of England, who, during my recent absence from this country, exercised at my request, the powers of President. We much regret the absence to-day of Lord Donoughmore, the Chairman of the Management Committee, and we sincerely hope that he will soon be fully restored to health. I could say a great deal about all the work that Lord Donoughmore does for the Fund, but I will leave that to Lord Somerleyton, who has a report to move later on.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to move the adoption of the Accounts for 1930.

### ACCOUNTS FOR 1930.

Mr. E. R. Peacock (the Hon. Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1930, said:—May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I explained at the December meeting that the decision to increase the distribution from £250,000 to £266,000 was rendered possible by the receipt of an anonymous donation of £10,000 and of general fund legacies amounting to more than £60,000. As you will see from the accounts, the income of the year proved to be sufficient to cover the increased distribution of £266,000, and the special grants of £16,468 towards the expenditure of the hospitals on the Pensions Scheme, and to enable the Fund to carry a further £15,000 to the reserve for the Pensions grants in future years, while still leaving a carry-forward of £5,600. A sum of £116,000 was also added to the Capital Account as the result of special gifts and legacies, including the receipt of £90,000 under the will of the late Lord Revelstoke. I think we may regard this as a very satisfactory result of the year's working. The accounts also show the sum of £20,000 to which His Royal Highness has referred. It is described as "Special Trust Gift by an anonymous donor, interest to be applied to the reduction of capital charges on Hospitals in the (Metropolitan) Boroughs of Deptford, Greenwich, Lewisham and Woolwich." This was received just before Christmas. The income is to be applied to the reduction of the building debt at the Miller Hospital, but the King's Fund has discretion, if expenditure is incurred by the Miller Hospital, which, in the opinion of the Council of the Fund, is not justified, to give the income to any other hospital in the district, subject to similar conditions. We were told that the donor, of whose identity we are wholly ignorant, wished to find some permanent body that could exercise such discretion. The Management Committee decided that it was a trust which the King's Fund could undertake, and which would not affect in any way its control over its own distribution. They therefore gladly accepted the gift. The Finance Committee have invested it, and the Distribution Committee will deal with the income in accordance with the donor's wishes. The capital and the income will, of course, be kept distinct from the general funds of the Corporation. The entries relating to the Radium Fund show the expenditure on the purchase of additional radium, so far as it was delivered before December 31st, and the further receipts for this purpose during the year. The two sides of this account for the purchase of radium will ultimately balance, thanks to the receipt, on Saturday last, of a cheque for £6,000 from the executors of the late Sir Otto Beit, who, besides giving the initial sum of £50,000 to start the fund, had very generously promised to make up the deficit. The munificent bequest of £50,000 which Sir Otto Beit also left to the King's Fund has been received since the end of the year, and it therefore does not affect the accounts which we have before us to-day. His Royal Highess has already referred to these receipts, and to the generous gift by which His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad has honoured the Fund, and which also belongs to 1931, not to 1930.

His Royal Highness has briefly reviewed the financial position of the hospitals in 1930. We are passing through a period of acute depression, the end of which it is impossible to foresee. Exceptional difficulties call for exceptional efforts. The steady growth of voluntary contributions during recent years has been very striking and satisfactory. What is now needed is that, whatever the present difficulties, people should realise that the work of the hospitals must go on and must be paid for. As His Royal Highness has shown, the voluntary hospital system is very far from being a bankrupt system, and we must all strive to ensure that the growing needs of the hospitals may meet with an increasing measure of help from the King's Fund.

I now move the adoption of the account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Lord MILDMAY, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1930.

Lord Somerleyton, Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee, in the absence of the Earl OF DONOUGHMORE, the Chairman, moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for He drew attention to the important contribution of £10,000 mentioned in the year 1930 (see p. 5). the Report, which came from an anonymous donor whose gifts now amounted in all to £54,000. One reason why they welcomed the Special Trust Gift of £20,000 was that it would help to pay for additional hospital accommodation in South London. This had long been the policy of the Fund, and they had encouraged King's College Hospital when it decided, years ago, to take the risks involved in uprooting itself and moving to South London. He also referred to the satisfactory figures of the spread of the Pensions Scheme, and to the increase to last December in the number of pay beds for persons of moderate means. Since then, 86 more pay beds had been opened, bringing the total to over 1,500. In connection with the Hospital Clause in the Road Traffic Act, they were greatly indebted to Lord Luke for his initiative, and to Lord Macmillan for his expert assistance. The Report also expressed their thanks to the Press, who were always such good friends to good causes and had given the Fund such valuable assistance. He added that they would all hope that Lord Donoughmore, who was acknowledged to be the ideal chairman, might very soon be quite recovered and might resume his duties as Chairman of the Management Committee.

The President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (The Rt. Hon. The Lord MAYOR) having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted.

### PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord Luke) presented a Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee (see p. 49) and moved the recommendation that it be published with the Annual Report. He also referred to the Committee's further successful functions this year, including a social gathering which took place at the Wellcome Medical Museum in March to bring together persons associated with the voluntary hospitals and representatives of the London County Council, when speeches were made by Lord Burnham and Lord Macmillan for the Hospitals, and by Sir George Hume for the County Council.

The motion, having been seconded by Lord Revelstoke, was then put and carried.

## RELATION BETWEEN TOTAL BEDS AND BEDS OCCUPIED.

The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (Sir Leonard Cohen) presented a Report of the Committee on the Relation between Total Beds and Beds Occupied in the various hospitals (see p. 52) and moved the recommendation that it be published with the Annual Report.

Professor Winifred Cullis having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

### VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

Viscount Hailsham said that it was his privilege now to move a very hearty vote of thanks to their President for his presence, and for his conduct of their proceedings. It was a perpetual wonder to a great many of them, when they read the records of His Royal Highness's multifarious activities, how he found it possible to discharge so many public services; and that fact made them appreciate all the more his presence there that morning, and the constant interest which he took in the proceedings of the Fund. The presence of His Royal Highness in the Chair, and the address which he had delivered, would be a real encouragement to all of them to do all in their power for the Fund to enable it to maintain its activities, and to fulfil its purpose of assisting and supporting the voluntary hospitals.

The BISHOP OF SOUTHWARK having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings then terminated.

## DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

# REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- 1. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £263,000 as against £248,000 last year.
- 2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 141, as against 143 in 1929. The Ross Institute and Hospital for Tropical Diseases has withdrawn its application, and the Middlesex Hospital now applies in respect of the main hospital and the Cancer wing as a single institution.
- 3. When making their preliminary general estimate of the needs of the hospitals this year, the Committee took into account the following considerations:—
  - (a) That in 1929 the hospitals, taken as a whole, had had a good year. The net aggregate excess of surpluses over deficits for the year came to £50,000, as against £17,000 for 1928; the surpluses were larger by £3,000, and the deficits were smaller by £30,000.
  - (b) That during 1930 there had, as usual, been an increase in the number of beds, with a corresponding increase in maintenance expenditure.
  - (c) That in 1929, although the total amount of the ordinary distribution was the same as in 1928, the special distribution of £115,000 from the Thank-offering Fund, in aid of schemes of capital expenditure, had enabled the ordinary grants towards those schemes to be reduced by about £9,000, and the grants to maintenance to be increased by the same amount. If, therefore, the ordinary distribution remained this year at £248,000, either the maintenance grants would fall short of the total reached in 1929 or the capital grants would fall short of the total reached in 1928.

- (d) That it was known that during 1930 some, at least, of the hospitals had been suffering from the results of the prevailing financial depression, although it would be impossible for the King's Fund to depart from its settled practice, which is that the annual distribution (apart from known changes in the numbers of beds) must be based on the audited accounts of the hospitals for the last complete year—in other words, that the distribution for 1930 must be based substantially on the returns for 1929.
- 4. As the General Council have, in these circumstances, increased the total to £263,000, the Committee have been provided with an additional £9,000, corresponding to the amount added to the maintenance grants last year, and an additional £6,000 to meet increased needs. They have thus been enabled to avoid any reduction in the general scale of grants previously attained and also to strengthen the position of hospitals which were in exceptional difficulties at the end of 1929, or which were known to be faced with increased expenditure during 1930 or 1931 because of additional beds recently opened, or of schemes of capital expenditure already in hand or incapable of being postponed.
- 5. The result is that the grants recommended in aid of maintenance amount to £232,100, as compared with £226,065 in 1929 and £216,775 in 1928; and that the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure amount to £30,900, as against £21,935 out of the ordinary distribution last year and £31,225 in 1928.
- 6. The special grants towards expenditure on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers come to £16,468, as against £13,734 in 1929. By October, 1930, 97 hospitals had joined the scheme, as against 94 a year earlier; and more nurses and officers had joined. The grants are limited to 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the scheme, or £20,000 a year, whichever may be the smaller, for the period of seven years 1928 to 1934; and also include, within this limit and subject to certain conditions, expenditure on, or in providing for, supplementary pensions for back service of existing officers, and also expenditure on pensions to retired officers. It must not be assumed that the King's Fund will be able to continue the grants in respect of each of the separate headings of expenditure at the same percentages as during the first three years.
- 7. The total of the present distribution, taking into account ordinary maintenance grants, grants towards capital expenditure, and special pensions grants, is thus £279,468. This is in addition to the allocation of approximately £60,000 worth of radium, as described in a separate report.
- 8. The Committee have, as usual, examined carefully all schemes of capital expenditure submitted to the Fund, in accordance with the well-known request of the Council that schemes should be so submitted before definite action is taken. Every such scheme is reported on by a sub-committee consisting of two members of the Distribution Committee, one medical and one lay, usually after a visit to the hospital. The Committee have included in their standing annual

circulars on the subject a reminder that the issue of an appeal for funds for a scheme is regarded as definite action, to be preceded by the submission of the scheme.

- 9. The form of Visitors' Report has been revised by a joint sub-committee of the Distribution Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee. In substance the general lines of the form have been retained, but the details have been re-arranged and amplified in such a way as to render the form more convenient in use, and more helpful to Visitors who have not had previous experience of the inspection of hospitals. Among the points to which the attention of all Visitors is now explicitly directed is a series of questions grouped under the general heading "Comfort of Patients." One of these questions deals with the hour at which patients are awakened in the morning, and was "starred" by the Distribution Committee for special report by the Visitors this year. The replies will require a thorough study by the Committee, and probably consultation with some of the hospitals, and this will be undertaken after the distribution is finished.
- 10. The Committee again recommend that extracts from the Visitors' reports should in some cases be sent privately with the grants, for the observations of the Committees of the hospitals concerned. The reports contain, however, somewhat fewer criticisms calling for action of this kind than they have in past years. The Committee believe that this is largely due to the fact that the various Hospital Committees, in their continuous efforts to increase the efficiency of their own institutions, have now for many years been assisted by receiving, through the King's Fund, the comments of medical and lay Visitors with very wide and varied experience, including experience gained in the administration and inspection of other hospitals.
- II. In a few instances, where the Visitors' remarks seemed to require immediate consideration, extracts from the reports were sent to the Committees of Management at once. These extracts dealt with such matters as the ventilation of an X-ray room, and the comfort of nurses. The Committee are glad to report that the hospitals, recognising the value of the Visitors' comments, took immediate action.
- 12. In their report last December the Committee referred to the Executors of the estate of the late Mrs. B. E. Fisher, who were proposing to distribute a sum of money to hospitals for the purchase of improved equipment, and for whom the Committee had asked the Visitors to collect information. The King's Fund had great pleasure in thus assisting the Executors, who ultimately distributed no less than £11,362 15s. od. amongst 46 hospitals in grants for this purpose.
- 13. In the time-table issued annually to the hospitals, the King's Fund asks that Accounts may be received not later than March 31 and Annual Reports by April 30. Where the Annual Reports have been late for several years the Committee recommend that a remark should be attached to the grant. As the work of the Fund and of its Visitors is seriously affected when Annual Reports are late, the Committee consider that this is a matter which may in future have to be taken into account as affecting the amounts of the grants to be recommended to the Council.

- 14. Early in the year the Naval Benevolent Trust made a contribution of £500 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, and asked that the Fund would explain that the grant had been made as a small token of appreciation for the work which it was known that the London hospitals, as a whole, did for naval men and their dependants. The Distribution Committee are accordingly drawing the attention of all the hospitals to this paragraph in their Report.
- 15. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule:—

City of London Maternity Hospital, £500 to new nurses' accommodation.

Deptford and Greenwich Babies' Hospital, £250 to rebuilding and extension on a new site. Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, £750 to extension of in-patient department.

Infants' Hospital, £1,000 to extension.

Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, £500 to extension of out-patient department, and £50 to enlargement of verandah.

London Fever Hospital, £500 to new isolation block.

Mothers' Hospital of the Salvation Army, £1,000 to extension.

Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £250 out of £1,000 to additional beds and nurses' accommodation.

Royal Hospital (Richmond), £50 to additional nurses' accommodation.

Royal Northern Hospital, £500 to additional heating apparatus.

St. Thomas's Hospital, £1,000 to first stages of new out-patient department.

Samaritan Free Hospital for Women, £500 to extension.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed, except the grant to the extension of the out-patient department at the Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, as the Hospital Committee find themselves unable to proceed with the scheme.

# DISTRIBUTION TO CONVALESCENT HOMES NOT ATTACHED TO PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

- I. The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £3,000, being an increase of £1,000 over the amount of the annual distribution in recent years.
- 2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 57, as compared with 53 last year.
- 3. The larger sum placed at the disposal of the Committee has been used, first, to increase the general scale of the grants, and, second, to enable the Committee, in deciding upon the amount by which each grant should be increased, to take into account the extent to which medical or nursing care or treatment is provided for the patients. Special inquiries on this subject have been addressed to the Homes applying for grants, and the replies have been considered by a joint sub-committee of the Distribution Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee.
- 4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.
  - 5. The list of grants is appended.

# REPORT ON SECOND ALLOCATION OF RADIUM TO HOSPITALS.

- I. The position, as last reported to the Council at the Annual Meeting in May, 1930, was that the Fund had acquired 10 grammes of radium for loan to hospitals. Of this total, 4 grammes were the gift of Sir Otto Beit, and 6 grammes had been purchased and partly paid for through special donations and through money received from the National Thank-offering Fund earmarked for radium, leaving a balance to be raised towards which specially earmarked donations were invited and would still be welcome.\*
- 2. The original 4 grammes bought with Sir Otto Beit's gift were all distributed on loan among 20 hospitals during 1929, as reported in May of that year, and are now in use at the hospitals. With the additional amount of radium at its disposal the Fund found itself able to provide the means of testing a method that has recently attracted attention. This is known as "radium at distance" treatment, and involves the use of a large quantity of radium contained in an apparatus fixed at some distance from the patient, in place of the insertion of small quantities of radium in the patient.
- 3. The National Radium Trust had acquired such an apparatus in the form of a "bomb," and they had placed this on loan with the Westminster Hospital. As the result of friendly conferences as to the best methods of co-operation, it was agreed that the King's Fund should acquire this "bomb" from the National Radium Trust in exchange for an equal amount of radium (4 grammes) which came out of the additional 6 grammes purchased by the Fund.

4. The 6 grammes have been allocated among 7 hospitals as follows:-

Moreover, as Sir Otto has since made himself responsible for the deficit on the further purchase, his total gift will ultimately cover nearly half of the 10 grammes held by the King's Fund.

- 5. Three of these hospitals had participated in the first distribution to 20 hospitals and four had not. Of these allocations 950 milligrammes, in addition to the "bomb," have already been delivered to the hospitals concerned, while specifications have been received for nearly the whole of the balance.
- 6. Summarised briefly, the position is that 10 grammes have been allocated among 24 hospitals, and that 9 grammes have been delivered and are in use at 23 hospitals.

It will of course be understood that the total amount of radium available at the Voluntary Hospitals in London is in excess of the above figure given for the 24 hospitals which have shared in the distribution of radium by the Fund.

- 8. In the whole of the allocation the Distribution Committee have proceeded on the lines laid down by Sir Otto Beit, including the principle that regard was to be had to the competence of the staffing and equipment of the hospitals, and that preference was to be given to those in which the cure of disease was associated with keen interest in the furtherance of knowledge. The conditions laid down by the Fund to secure the fullest results, and the detailed regulations made to ensure the safety of the patients, the staff and the radium, were briefly described in the Report on the first allocation. In the first distribution of 4 grammes, as many as practicable of the hospitals satisfying the requirements envisaged by Sir Otto Beit were included. Reasonable provision having thus been made for general and urgent needs, the Fund has been enabled, in the second distribution of 6 grammes, to give more weight to the policy of concentration at Radium Centres.
- 9. It is a source of keen gratification that, through the generosity of Sir Otto Beit, Mr. Roger Parr and other donors, both direct and through the Thank-offering Fund, the King's Fund should have been associated in the privilege of providing the voluntary hospitals of London with a therapeutic agency of great potency and one which still requires wide experience and further research in the best methods of application.

#### REVENUE COMMITTEE.

#### WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1930.

- I. The Committee were very glad to welcome Lord Burnham at their June meeting, after his two years' absence on the work of the India Statutory Commission. Since that date Lord Burnham has presided regularly at their monthly meetings, and has found it possible to devote more time and attention to the work of the Committee than in any previous year. This has been a great encouragement to all concerned.
- 2. The Committee have to record with deep regret the death of Mr. Pett Ridge, who, in spite of failing health, had taken the Chair on many occasions during Lord Burnham's absence, and whose services from the time when the Committee was first constituted had been of inestimable value. His judgment, human sympathy and unfailing humour will be greatly missed by his fellow members.
- 3. The Committee have been particularly fortunate in obtaining the services of Major Ian Hay Beith, who has kindly accepted an invitation to serve on the Committee in Mr. Pett Ridge's place.
- 4. Owing to increasing pressure of work, Professor Winifred Cullis has to the general regret found it necessary to tender her resignation. She has, however, intimated her willingness to continue to help the Committee so far as she is able with some of their functions.
- 5. The year 1930 has seen the coming into operation of the Local Government Act, and the Committee have made it one of their main objects to endeavour to promote an atmosphere favourable to successful co-operation between the voluntary hospitals and the London County Council, and at the same time to impress upon all who care for the preservation of the voluntary system the importance of continuing their support, bearing in mind the principle laid down by Mr. Whitley's Committee that "it is most important that there should be co-operation and not competition or overlapping, between the rate-supported hospitals and the voluntary hospitals, both for the sake of the efficiency of the rate-supported hospitals and for the sake of the maintenance of the voluntary hospitals, which are, in this country, an essential factor in the efficiency of the hospital service generally."
- 6. With a view to bringing the Committee into closer relation with hospitals associated with the Fund, a fourth conference with hospital secretaries was held on November 12, to

discuss possible methods by which the Committee could be of further use to them. In pursuance of a resolution passed by hospital representatives present at the conference, a special Publicity Sub-Committee was appointed to consider various proposals for combined publicity and to report to another conference to be held in 1931.

- 7. Additional contributions were received during the year from Messrs. Raphael Tuck, arising out of the sale of "The King's Message to the Nation," amounting to £625, and from Kodak, Ltd., in respect of Exhibitions of Royal Snapshots, amounting to £235 2s. 11d. In both cases it was intimated that further sums might be expected. £500 was also received from the Goodwin Memorial Fund (Cinema Help Society).
- 8. The following are some of the principal activities of the Committee during the year, undertaken mainly as methods of propaganda for the King's Fund and the hospitals:—
  - (a) Broadçast appeal on February 2, by Lord Donoughmore, in connection with the "Week's Good Cause," which brought in contributions amounting to £298. The total would no doubt have been larger had not the appeal followed so soon after the closing of the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery. Of particular interest was a contribution sent by a little girl, II years of age, which she had herself collected in farthings;
  - (b) Continuation of illustrated lectures to schools and other audiences, including a series given in the Cinema Theatre of the Imperial Institute, the total number being 50, as compared with 43 in 1929, 30 in 1928, and 24 in 1927;
  - (c) Specially conducted tours of "Westminster and Whitehall" in February and March;
  - (d) Series of Mock Trials, or "Cross Examinations," held at the London School of Economics, by special permission of the Governing Body, in April, May and June, the takings amounting to £467;
  - (e) Steamer excursion to the new Port at Tilbury, and inspection of S.S. "Orontes," with the kind co-operation of the Port of London Authority and the Orient Company; and visit to the London Air Park, Hanworth, when the visitors were taken for short flights and a display was given by Flight-Lieut. H. M. Schofield;
  - (f) Reminiscent Talk on "My Country" by the Austrian Minister, Baron Frankenstein, at Lord Luke's house, 29, Portman Square, on February 27;
  - (g) Popular Science Demonstrations at the Portland Hall, Regent Street Polytechnic, in November and December, organised in co-operation with leading industries;

- (h) Issue of new pamphlet, with chart in colours, under title "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London: Its Foundation, Growth and Present Activities," for distribution as opportunity arises;
- (j) Revision of Hospital Film, "A hundred years of Progress," including the addition of scenes intended to enhance its human appeal. The film continues to be in demand by the Hospital Saving Association and by individual hospitals. A sub-committee has been appointed to consider the possibility of extending propaganda by means of the cinema.
- 9. Another interesting fixture arranged was a cricket match between a representative XI of boys from South London central schools and a team, captained by Mr. J. C. Squire, known as "The Invalids." The match had, unfortunately, to be abandoned at the last moment, owing to rain, but notwithstanding this a cheque, representing the proceeds of sale of match-cards and other contributions, was subsequently forwarded to the Fund by the South London Central Schools Sports Association. The match had been widely advertised, and great interest had been taken in it by the teachers.
- 10. The Hospital Model Sub-Committee, appointed to explore the possibility of constructing a model of an up-to-date hospital to be used for propaganda purposes, has been actively at work, and has received valuable assistance from Mr. Pearson, of Messrs. Adams, Holden & Pearson, who has prepared preliminary plans.
- II. The Committee were able to supply helpful information to the authors of an interesting book on the history of the voluntary hospitals, entitled, "The Romance of the British Voluntary Hospital Movement," published during the year. The book contains an appreciative reference to the work of the King's Fund, and the authors express their gratitude for the assistance received from the Committee.
- 12. The Committee wish again to record their thanks for the willing co-operation they have received in so many quarters.\* This has been a great encouragement, and leads them to hope that the activities of the King's Fund are every year becoming more widely known and understood.

### HOSPITAL ECONOMY COMMITTEE.

### RELATION BETWEEN TOTAL BEDS AND BEDS OCCUPIED.

- I. In 1928 the Hospital Economy Committee decided to enquire into the causes giving rise to unoccupied beds in Hospitals, as the Fund's Statistical Report showed a very wide range in the percentages of occupation, with a general average of about 17 beds unoccupied daily out of every 100 beds.
- 2. The object of the enquiry was to ascertain what factors were at work and to what extent they were unavoidable, and finally, by making the information obtained available, to assist Hospital Administrators in their work of ensuring that the maximum use was being made of the beds at the Hospital for which they were responsible.
- 3. A preliminary enquiry was made into the figures of 1927, and the information obtained from the Hospitals was embodied in a special report circulated privately to the Hospitals concerned. This enquiry revealed that there were considerable differences in practice in the method of counting beds, and also that at some Hospitals the internal records were not sufficiently comprehensive to yield readily all the information that should be before those responsible for the administration of a Hospital. The Fund, therefore, circulated recommendations to the Hospitals with a view to the improvement of the daily records. The figures from the first enquiry having thus proved rather inconclusive, the Hospital Economy Committee issued a questionnaire to cover the figures for 1929.
- 4. The results of this enquiry have been embodied in a Report on Unoccupied Beds which was circulated to the Hospitals in August, 1930. The body of the Report consists of an analysis of the information obtained, set out in three sets of Tables. Section A shows how many of the beds at each Hospital were unoccupied because the beds in question were temporarily closed, and analyses the various reasons for closure, which may include building operations, repairs, cleaning, infection or other causes. Section B shows the extent to which the use of open beds was lost between the discharge and admission of patients, and analyses this information under various categories of beds, such as Medical, Surgical, Gynæcological, etc. Section C carries the analysis in Section B a little further by showing the comparative incidence of vacancy in beds reserved for Men, Women and Children, respectively, in the Medical and Surgical Wards. The Report contains a Prefatory Note by the Hospital Economy Committee which summarises some of the principal figures and makes some general remarks bearing upon the subject as a whole.

- 5. Copies of the Report were sent to the Chairman of each Hospital and to the Chairman of its Medical Committee, with an explanatory memorandum in which it was pointed out that it was most important at the present time that those responsible for the administration of the voluntary hospitals should satisfy themselves that the most efficient and economical use was being made of the available resources.
- 6. In view of the importance of the subject to the hospital world generally, the Report has been published and placed on sale.

# King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C. 4.

#### TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1807 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

### RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated within II miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

#### METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-four years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £6,770,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922–3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1930 being £266,000, besides £16,468 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged  $f_{13}$ .  $f_{2d}$  per cent. of the receipts, which is just over  $f_{2d}$  in every  $f_{2d}$  received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £466,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-two years, the contribution in 1930 being £17,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of Annual Statistics showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following pages). The issue of these Reports has assisted the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, the Out-patient Question, the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Quantity Statistics, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours.

A pamphlet has been published containing a list of 1,425 pay beds at 99 London Hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and £37,000 received through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
