

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1921.

1. In 1921, even more than in 1920, the history of King Edward's Hospital Fund is bound up with the history of the crisis in hospital finance and the suggested remedies.

THE KING'S FUND AND THE HOSPITAL CRISIS.

- 2. The crisis is due to the increases in cost of working, which have far outstripped the increases in income. It first became acute in April 1920. In July 1920 the King's Fund made an emergency distribution of £250,000 out of its reserves. In December 1920 the National Relief Fund distributed £200,000 to London hospitals in relief of war deficits. But these special distributions only just equalised the income and expenditure of the London hospitals for the year 1920, leaving unsolved the problems of the accumulated deficits of the past and the annual deficits of the future.
- 3. In January 1921 Lord Cave's Committee of Inquiry into the finances of voluntary hospitals began its sittings. In June 1921 the report of the Committee was published, indicating various methods of permanently increasing income and reducing expenditure, and, in the meantime, recommending a temporary Government grant of £1,000,000 for the hospitals of Great Britain, to be administered by a central Voluntary Hospitals Commission and local Voluntary Hospitals Committees, who were to encourage and assist the adoption of permanent remedies.

THE KING'S FUND AS VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS COMMITTEE FOR LONDON.

4. In July 1921, in accordance with the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee, the Voluntary Hospitals Commission was set up by the Minister of Health, and the King's Fund was constituted the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area. The amount of temporary Government assistance to hospitals was, however, limited to a total of £500,000, and made conditional on the raising of an equal amount of fresh money from other sources.

- 5. From that time onwards the Fund was actively engaged in the two functions of temporary assistance and the continued search for permanent remedies. In July a Mansion House Conference of London hospitals was held to consider the suggestion by Lord Cave's Committee that the permanent solution might be found in some form of mass contributions from the hospital-using classes, and a standing conference of the King's Fund and the other Central Agencies was set up to work out a scheme. In October the Fund presented a report on the financial position of the hospitals to the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, who thereupon made an emergency distribution of £77,900, strictly limited to twenty-four hospitals that were in imminent danger of having to close beds.
- 6. The urgency of the position was immediately reported by the King's Fund to the Conference of Central Agencies, with the result that in November the King's Fund was asked by the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, on which more than 100 hospitals of London are represented, to draw up two schemes, one for a Combined Public Appeal for fresh money to meet present liabilities and qualify for temporary Government assistance on the pound-for-pound basis, and the other for the collection of regular contributions from the hospital-using class on the general lines of one of the alternative methods commended by Lord Cave's Committee to the consideration of the hospitals.

When the year ended the two schemes drawn up in response to this request had been circulated by the London Regional Committee to its constituent hospitals, but it was not until January 1922 that they were received back with a definite invitation to the King's Fund to go forward with both.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

7. The total receipts for the year were £270,666 12s. 6d.* Of this £18,007 6s. 4d. was for capital and £252,659 6s. 2d. general receipts.

10. In view of the financial crisis the Distribution Committee notified the hospitals in October that only in exceptional cases could they recommend grants for extension or improvement, or consider schemes not already notified to the Fund when evidence on this subject was given to Lord Cave's Committee in April. As the result of this policy the amount available for maintenance was increased not only by the £20,000 increase in the total distributed, but also by a decrease of £24,725 in the grants to capital expenditure, or £44,725 in all.

- 11. In distributing the increased amount available for maintenance the Distribution Committee took into account the efforts made by the hospitals to increase income or reduce expenditure since the emergency distribution in July 1920 and the issue of Lord Cave's Report in June 1921.
- 12. Every eligible hospital and consumption sanatorium which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon, as hitherto, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. To these Visitors the Council desire to express their sincere thanks for the very useful reports received.
- 13. The grants to sanatoria enabled forty-four beds again to be reserved for the use of patients in London hospitals. Valuable as this method has proved to be during the twelve years since it was first adopted, the General Council reluctantly came to the conclusion that the greatly increased need for ordinary maintenance grants to London hospitals rendered it necessary for the Fund to discontinue the making of grants to sanatoria after the distribution of 1921.
- 14. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years (after including the two special distributions in 1920, and deducting conditional grants to the extent of £500 that have been allowed to lapse) is £2,340,938. Since the foundation of the Fund a total net amount of £3,816,854 8s. 5d. has been distributed. The average annual distribution during the whole period of twenty-five years has been £152,674 3s. 6d.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

15. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have been also pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also have their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, Princess Mary, and other Members of the Royal Family.

16. The Fund again received annual subscriptions of £5,000 from the late Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £525 from Lloyds Bank, Limited, and of £500 from the Earl of Iveagh, from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; and donations of £17,490 per the executors of the late Mr. Robert Jardine, and of £500 from "S.D.R.S.D." and from Mr. C. W. Drabble; and a gift to capital of £2,000 Five per cent. War Stock (1929-1947) from Mr. John G. Griffiths in lieu of his annual subscription of £100.

17. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £15,000, as against £16,000 in 1920. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £324,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council congratulate the League on the continued success of its efforts in the systematic collection of moderate and continuous contributions, which is one of the me hods specially recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

18. The Council acknowledge with grateful thanks the continued and increased generosity of King George's Fund for Sailors, who have again provided the amount of the grant made by the King's Fund to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital, which this year was £5,000.

19. Legacies received during the year included £52,406 5s. 2d. from the estate of the late Mr. Albert Ernest Watson, on account of one-fourth share of residue; £8,316 11s. 6d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £349,903 16s. 3d. received to date from this bequest, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); £4,541 198. 10d., the residue of the estate of the late Miss Isabella Jeanetta Nicol, left to capital; £3,972 18s. 11d., being a further sum in respect of the residue of the estate of the late Isabella, Countess of Wilton (increasing the total of this legacy to £ 167,175 8s. 3d.); £ 3,126 5s. 8d., the residue of the estate of the late Miss Jane Levick; £3,870 New Zealand $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Stock, value £2,650 198., from the estate of the late Mr. David Martin Currie, left to capital; and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Evans. The Fund also received during the year the sum of £12,218 os. 9d. from the executors of the late Sir Frederick L. Cook, Bart., in the exercise of discretionary powers, and £4,000, given by the executors of the late Mr. Thomas Stephen Whitaker, in the exercise of their discretionary powers, towards the "pound-for-pound" scheme; and a sum of £1,874 11s. 1d. by order of the Court in respect of the residue of the estate of the late Mr. W. A. Guesdon.

EXPENSES.

20. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund was £7,208 13s. 6d., or £2 11s. 8d. per £100 of the total received, as compared with £5,484 9s. 4d., or £1 2s. 10d. per £100, in the previous year. The average yearly outlay in this respect for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £3,225, the corresponding percentage of the receipts being £1 6s. 5d., or less than $3\frac{1}{4}d$. in every £1 received.

THE NEW WORK OF THE FUND.

- 21. The new duties undertaken by the King's Fund as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, in connection with the scheme of Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of voluntary hospital finance, have meant a great increase in its work, and consequently in its expenditure.
- 22. At a special meeting on January 28, 1921, the Council formulated a policy for the preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control, and a King's Fund Policy Committee was appointed to work out this policy and recommend it to Lord Cave's Committee, to the hospitals, and to the public. At the Annual Meeting in April a preliminary report was presented by this Committee, and they were authorised to give further evidence. On July 13 the Council met to consider Lord Cave's Report and the steps the Policy Committee were taking to commend its conclusions to the hospitals.
- 23. It soon became evident that, for the efficient performance of the functions of a Voluntary Hospitals Committee under Lord Cave's Report, the Committees of the Fund needed reorganising, and a further special meeting of the Council on November 9 adopted a scheme which came into force on January 1, 1922, establishing the following Committees:

Finance Committee, which, as before, deals with investments.

- Distribution Committee, which deals with applications for grants from hospitals and now also from convalescent homes, and with the conditions to be attached to individual grants, and with schemes of extension or improvement put forward by hospitals.
- Hospital Economy Committee, which deals with questions of hospital economy in the widest sense of the word, including accounts, statistics, and the proposals for coordination and reduction of expenditure discussed in Lord Cave's Report.
- Revenue Committee, which deals with questions relating to the raising of money for the King's Fund and the hospitals, including the proposals for increasing income discussed in Lord Cave's Report.
- Management Committee, which consists of its own Chairman and Vice-Chairman, and the Chairmen of the four other Standing Committees, and deals with the general administration of the King's Fund and with questions of policy not referred to any other Committee. This Committee, in the absence of any meeting of the Council, receives reports from the other Committees.

24. The Council record with pleasure the stimulus which the publication of Lord Cave's Report has given to the movement for co-operation between the hospitals and the various Central Agencies. This began with the Mansion House Conference of Hospitals on July 6, and was continued by the Standing Conference of Central Agencies, on which the hospitals were represented by the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association. The programme of the Combined Public Appeal in 1922 aims, for the first time, at the active co-operation of the King's Fund, the Hospital Sunday and Saturday Funds, the League of Mercy, Queen Alexandra's Rose Day Fund, and the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, with the London Regional Committee and the hospitals themselves. It is hoped that this combined effort to meet the present emergency will bring permanent benefit, not only to the common cause, but also to each separate agency.

PERSONNEL.

- 25. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on leaving for India on October 26, 1921, delegated his powers as President of the Fund to a Committee consisting of the Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. M. C. Norman), and the Council are very grateful to them for the share they have taken in the increased work of the Fund. Monthly reports have been, at the special request of His Royal Highness, sent to the President in India.
- 26. At the end of the year Sir Frederick Fry resigned his position as an Honorary Secretary of the Fund, after having acted in this capacity for nearly twelve years. The Council are deeply grateful to him for his services. His tact, energy, and wisdom have been of the greatest value to the Fund. They are glad that he will continue to give the Fund the benefit of his assistance on the General Council and on the Distribution Committee, of which he has been a member since 1898.
- 27. The Council regret to record their loss by the deaths of two members, Lord Sandhurst and Sir Edward Hope, who was a member of the Executive Committee as well as of the Council; and also the deaths of two visitors, Sir Edward Coates and Mr. J. S. Wood.
- 28. At the meeting on December 14 the General Council passed a resolution recording the deep regret with which they had learned of the death of Lord Mountstephen, to whose benefactions the Fund and the sick poor of London owed so much, and whose gifts to the capital of the Fund of £200,000 in 1902, of £200,000 in 1905, and of £100,000 in 1908 were now followed by his munificent bequest of the residue of his estate to the Fund. These gifts gave proof throughout many years of his firm and continued determination to strengthen the financial basis on which rested the power of the Fund to maintain a constantly-increasing distribution, and its value as a steadying influence in hospital finance. The resolution of the General Council acknowledged with gratitude the wise benevolence which led Lord Mountstephen to conceive and carry out on so generous a scale this far-sighted plan for the permanent benefit of the Fund and the hospitals of London.

- 29. The Council also desire to express their deep regret at the death of Mr. Walter Morrison, who was for four years an active member of the General Council, and had been an annual subscriber of £5,000 a year for the last twelve years. The Council owe gratitude to Mr. Morrison, not only for his generous financial assistance, but also for his support and interest in the activities of the Fund, especially in its efforts to promote the economical working of Hospitals.
- 30. The Council desire to express their thanks to Lord Stuart of Wortley, Chairman of the Executive Committee and of the King's Fund Policy Committee, to Lord Revelstoke, Chairman of the Finance Committee, to Sir Cooper Perry, Chairman of the Distribution Committee, and to Sir William Bennett, Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee, and also to the members of those Committees, for all the work they have done. The functions of the Executive, Policy, and Convalescent Homes Committees have been divided amongst the new Committees, on which all the members of the old Committees have been appointed.
- 31. The Minister of Health, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., chartered accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the honorary auditors since January 1898, during which period they have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

- 32. Special efforts are required in 1922 to ensure the success of the appeal which the King's Fund is issuing in combination with the Hospitals and the other Central Agencies. The chief needs of the hospitals for 1922 are twofold:—
 - (a) A large sum of fresh money is needed to tide over the immediate difficulties and to enable the hospitals to qualify for emergency grants from the temporary Government assistance on the pound-for-pound basis;
 - (b) Additional permanent income is required to meet the increased cost of working, including moderate and continuous contributions from all classes, as recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

In these matters the Council look with confidence to the Press for a continuance of the co-operation so generously and effectively exercised in past years for the welfare of the voluntary hospitals.

Special Meetings of the President and General Council to consider Questions arising out of the Hospital Crisis.

I.—JANUARY 26th, 1921.

A Special Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, January 26, 1921, to consider the policy to be recommended to the Government for the preservation of the voluntary system of Hospital management and control.

In the unavoidable absence of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, M.P. (Speaker of the House of Commons), presided.

Lord Stuart of Wortley (the Chairman of the Executive Committee) presented a Report of the Committee on the subject of the policy to be recommended to the Government for the preservation of the voluntary system of Hospital management and control. The specific resolutions contained therein, having been seconded by Lord Burnham, were unanimously adopted (as set out in the Schedule below) and ordered to be forwarded to the Prime Minister, the Minister of Health, and the members of the Government Committee of Enquiry (Lord Cave's Committee).

The Speaker of the House of Commons announced that a special King's Fund Policy Committee had been constituted by H.R.H. the President for the purpose of preparing statements within the limits of the general principles approved by the President and General Council, and that His Royal Highness had appointed the following persons as members thereof; Lord Stuart of Wortley (Chairman), Sir Cooper Perry, The Viscount Burnham, Lord Somerleyton, Sir Frederick Fry, and Sir Alan Anderson.

The Council thereupon delegated the necessary powers to the Special Committee.

SCHEDULE.

RESOLUTIONS passed by the PRESIDENT and GENERAL COUNCIL on JANUARY 26th, 1921, on the subject of the POLICY TO BE RECOMMENDED for the PRESERVATION OF THE VOLUNTARY SYSTEM of HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT AND CONTROL.

RESOLVED, that the President and General Council, without committing themselves on any of the points of comparative detail discussed in the Report of the Executive Committee appended hereto,* do hereby adopt the following Statements numbered i to xiii as an outline of the policy of King Edward's Hospital Fund in the present difficulties of the Hospitals of London:

General.

i. that the voluntary system of hospital management and control should be preserved as being the most efficient method of providing at the least cost the best medical and surgical treatment combined with advance in medical knowledge and practice;

- ii. that a substantial portion at least of the cost of the hospitals should be met by voluntary contributions;
- iii. that the present receipts from voluntary contributions are not adequate to meet the present cost of the London Voluntary Hospitals, to say nothing of the discharge of debts or the provision of necessary extensions;
- iv. that any method of increasing income be such as not to stop voluntary contributions or the provision of necessary extensions;
- v. that any policy or absence of policy which stopped voluntary contributions and did away with voluntary management would bring upon the public funds not only the cost of the hospitals but also additional cost of paid management and of general supervision by some central public department.

Voluntary Sources of Additional Income.

vi. that a better response to appeals for voluntary contributions is likely when the present uncertainties as to the future of voluntary hospitals are removed.

Methods of Supplementing Voluntary Income.

- vii. that voluntary contributions will need to be supplemented, at all events temporarily, by some other sources of revenue;
- viii. that amongst possible methods, as to which experience is being accumulated, and of which the exploration should be encouraged, are included—
 - (A) various forms of contributions from patients in consideration of treatment received;
 - (B) various forms of regular contributions from prospective patients as a kind of quasi-insurance or partial patients' payment in advance; and
 - (c) payment by Government or other public authorities in respect of the treatment of any classes of patients for whom those authorities have taken responsibility;
- ix. that, while direct grants from the State in consideration of their general work might endanger voluntary contributions and voluntary management, some form of assistance based on the amount received for the benefit of hospitals from voluntary sources, or some concession by way of abatement of income tax or death duties, proportioned to gifts, might prove practicable, and might serve to elicit a larger revenue than is now thus obtained;

Control and Direction of Expenditure.

x. That while it is necessary to increase the income of the hospitals, attention should continue to be paid to the possibility of further economies in expenditure by strengthening the internal financial control in each hospital; by encouraging co-operation among hospitals wherever this is likely to prove advantageous; and by securing that the best possible use is made of all the various forms of voluntary hospital accommodation and equipment, present and future.

Central Body.

xi. that the necessity for some central organisation, distinct alike from the hospitals and from the public authorities, will be greater in the future even than in the past; that King Edward's Hospital Fund, the Council of which already includes, amongst others, persons holding representative positions in connection with national and metropolitan government, with the City of London, with religious bodies, and with the medical profession, has in the course of its work as a collecting and distributing agency gradually developed some of the functions of a central administrative body; that it keeps in close touch with the individual hospitals, while retaining its independence; and that it has the confidence of the subscribing public;

xii. that King Edward's Hospital Fund is thus fitted to become a central administrative body for the metropolitan area, with provision for co-operation, in matters of general policy, with a separate central administrative body for extra-metropolitan hospitals; the functions of the King's Fund to include for London the investigation of hospital administration, together with the receipt and distribution of voluntary contributions, and also, if required, of public grants made in accordance with a scheme consistent with the voluntary system.

Management of Individual Hospitals.

xiii. that, in determining the powers of the central body and the question of the possible representation, on hospital committees, of public and other bodies making payments to hospitals, the principle of the management of the individual hospitals by voluntary committees, themselves possessing wide powers of independence and initiative, should be safeguarded.

II.—APRIL 12th, 1921.

At the Annual Meeting on April 12, 1921, a special Interim Report was presented by the King's Fund Policy Committee, who were authorised to give evidence to Lord Cave's Committee on the lines of the Report.*

III.—JULY 13th, 1921.

A Special Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held on Wednesday, July 13, 1921. The Earl of Donoughmore, K.P., presided.

Lord Somerleyton (Hon. Sec.) read the following letter from H.R.H. the Prince of Wales:

"St. James's Palace, S.W.,
"July 12, 1921.

" Dear Lord Somerleyton,

"It is a matter of great regret to me that I cannot be present at the meeting of the General Council to consider the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee. The meeting had to be held this week as a matter of urgency, and I am unfortunately unable to attend.

"I am glad to see that Lord Cave's Committee reported so strongly in favour of the Voluntary Hospital System, and expressed their belief that the Hospitals, if only they could be tided over the next two years by emergency grants from the Government, would be able to recover from the effects of the war and to re-establish their finances.

"If the Government cannot do as much as Lord Cave's Committee think will be required, a still greater effort is required of the Hospitals and the Central Funds, backed, I hope, by the public, to carry out the suggestions in Lord Cave's report; and thus to avert the injury to the welfare of the sick and the enormous expense to the State which the Report rightly says would follow if the Voluntary Hospital System fell to the ground.

"Believe me, yours very truly,
"EDWARD P."

Lord Donoughmore said he was sure they all greatly regretted His Royal Highness' absence and sincerely hoped it would be only a short time before he was able to return to his normal work, which was very great.

The Chairman of the King's Fund Policy Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY) presented a Preliminary Report of that Committee on the Final Report of Lord Cave's Committee.

Lord Stuart of Wortley pointed out that in this preliminary report the King's Fund Policy Committee directed the attention of the Council to the steps to be taken and the urgency which prevailed in consequence of the limited amount of time at the disposal of everybody concerned; urged that experience, acquired by experiment, would alone solve the problems which had to be solved; and proposed that the acceptance of the principles laid down by Lord Cave's Committee must be the basis of all action—in fact, that the time had now passed by for considering alternative methods. They also described the steps already taken by the King's Fund. Lord Cave's Committee said that a million pounds was wanted to give the Hospitals time to re-organise their finances, and in view of the proved deficits in the London area, the £500,000 suggested by the Government was clearly, upon the face of it, not enough. Urgency and prompt action were, therefore, all the more required.

Resolutions were then adopted (a) thanking Lord Cave's Committee for its sympathetic and clear-sighted survey of the problem and urging the importance of prompt action to carry out the recommendations of the Committee in order to avoid immediate disaster to the hospitals and the sick poor, and the enormous expense to the Exchequer which would follow if the Voluntary System were to collapse and hospitals had to be provided by public funds; (B) notifying the Hospitals that the Fund would, at the ordinary distribution for the current year, take into account the action adopted by the various Hospitals to carry out the recommendation of Lord Cave's Committee that they should take all steps that are open to them to re-establish their financial position within the next two years.

IV.—NOVEMBER 9th, 1921.

A Special Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, November 9, 1921, the Earl of Donoughmore, K.P., Member of the President's Powers Committee, being in the Chair.

Lord Somerleyton (Hon. Sec.) read the order of appointment, signed by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, delegating his powers as President, during his absence abroad, to a Committee consisting of the Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England.

Lord Donoughmore said that he had the honour of reading the following letter from H.R.H. the President:

"St. James's Palace, S.W.

"To the President's Powers Committee,

"King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

"Gentlemen,

"It is a matter of great regret to me that I am leaving England at a time when so many changes must necessarily take place in the constitution of the Fund founded by my grandfather, King Edward VII.

"Now that, under the Hospitals Commission, we have been constituted the Central authority for London, it is obvious that many fresh responsibilities and a great deal more work will be thrown upon our shoulders, and that our duties will be considerably enlarged.

"I have gone through the proposed reconstitution of the Committees, and the suggested changes, and am, generally speaking, in favour of them, but these are matters which in my absence you will have to decide.

"As regards all details and the complicated situations that will of necessity arise, I once again leave my Powers as President to you in these and in all matters with the utmost confidence.

"I have no doubt that the approval of His Majesty, as Patron, will be obtained by you to any proposed changes at the proper time.

"Yours very truly,
"EDWARD P."

The Chairman of the King's Fund Policy Committee (Lord Stuart of Wortley) in presenting a Report of that Committee on the question of the reorganisation of the King's Fund, said that the post-war crisis in hospital finance had added much to the work of this Fund. The old work had increased in quantity, and work of new kinds had been added to the old. Hence the reorganisation proposals that were before them to-day. They involved no change in the Fund's Act of Incorporation, and therefore no application to Parliament. Accordingly there was not any change proposed in the powers exercised or the procedure observed either by President or Council, or by both acting together. The new framework proposed was submitted as a businesslike apportionment of the field to be surveyed. The new Management Committee, consisting of all the Chairmen of the other Committees, would be able to meet often and deal quickly with emergency matters, and would do so with knowledge, accessible through the Committee Chairmen present, of what was going on in all departments of the Fund. He moved that the general principles of the scheme be approved, and the King's Fund Policy Committee be authorised to work out the details.

The scheme of Committees (as set out in paragraph 23 of the Annual Report on page 9 above) was unanimously adopted.

The Chairman of the Executive Committee (Lord Stuart of Wortley) presented a Report of that Committee on the Conditions attached to Government Grants to Voluntary Hospitals, recommending that the Council should pass the following resolution:—

That the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London have considered the conditions attached by the Treasury to the temporary assistance voted by Parliament to Voluntary Hospitals requiring that fresh money shall be raised pound for pound with the Government grants, and are of opinion that the application of this condition, which was not recommended in the Report of Lord Cave's Committee, nor separately considered (much less expressly enjoined) by Parliament, will lead to great difficulties and probably to great injustices as between different hospitals in the distribution of the grants; and they trust, therefore, that the condition will not be pressed.

The resolution having been seconded by Sir Arthur Stanley and supported by Mr. Hopkinson, was put and carried.

Lord Somerleyton read a letter received from King George's Fund for Sailors, and on the motion of Lord Donoughmore, seconded by the Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. M. C. Norman), the following vote of thanks was carried unanimously—

"The Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to convey to H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, Chairman, and the General Council of King George's Fund for Sailors, the sincere and grateful thanks of all connected with King Edward's Fund for the Grant again generously made this year earmarked for the Dreadnought (Seamen's) Hospital, which Grant will relieve the Fund to this considerable extent during the present financial year."

Distribution Meeting of President and General Council. DECEMBER 14th, 1921.

A meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, December 14, 1921, at 10.30, Viscount Finlay (Member of the President's Powers Committee) being in the Chair. Those present were:—

Cohen, Mr. Yvon R. Eccles, Mr. Henry L. Hopkinson, Mr. Kenneth Prescott, Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed.

Sir Alan Anderson (Honorary Secretary) reported letters of regret from the following: The Earl of Donoughmore (member of the President's Powers Committee), the Lord Lieutenant of the County of London (the Marquess of Crewe), the Speaker of the House of Commons (the Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, M.P.), Cardinal Bourne, the Rev. A. E. Garvie, D.D., the Rev. W. T. A. Barber, D.D., the Chief Rabbi (the Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), Viscount Hambleden, Viscount Mersey, Viscount Farquhar, Viscountess Northcliffe, Viscount Ullswater, Lord Stamfordham, Lord Marshall, Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, Hon. Algernon H. Mills, Hon. Oswald Partington, the Minister of Health (the Rt. Hon. Sir Alfred Mond, Bt., M.P.), the President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor), Sir Godfrey Thomas, Bt., Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Lieut.-General Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir Owen Philipps, M.P., Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Frederick Green, Mr. John G. Griffiths, Dr. H. Morley Fletcher.

Lord Revelstoke (the Honorary Treasurer) said:—My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to announce that the amount received for general purposes to December 3, 1921, was £221,326. This exceeds the total indicated in the estimate laid before the Council in November, the increase being due to the generous action of King George's Fund for Sailors in again providing the amount of the grant of £5,000 to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital. Last year we were compelled to draw on our reserves to complete the amount required for the ordinary distribution. This year I am glad to say that we are in a more fortunate position. For instance, the legacies

received during the last eleven months amount to £74,000, as against £18,000 in 1920. The Council have decided to distribute a portion of these additional receipts, and to keep a portion in reserve, thus effecting a reasonable compromise between our endeavour to afford every possible assistance to the Hospitals during this year and our equal desire to maintain a regular distribution as a stabilising influence and element in their finance.

I have now to ask your leave to make an announcement to the Fund and the Council which they will receive with particular interest. I have received the following communication from Lady

Mount Stephen:---

"I have been allowed to tell you by the executors that my husband has left the residue of his fortune to King Edward's Hospital Fund. It is, I believe, practically nearly the whole of his fortune, for the legacies, etc., in proportion do not amount to anything of importance. Would you, as Treasurer of the King's Fund, make this known to the Council?"

This is a communication, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, which reaches us at a moment when our finances are in urgent need of help, and our capital account has been depleted by the extraordinary calls made upon it during the past eighteen months. It is a communication which is all the more gratifying in that it represents a bequest to the Fund from a quarter which was originally responsible for the growth and development of our capital account. Several of us in this room to-day are mourning the loss of a very dear personal friend; and every member of the Council, and indeed every member of the community who may be interested in hospital matters, will deplore the loss of a benefactor who, imposing in his modesty and reserve, was really remarkable for an almost unique breadth and generosity of character; and who, throughout a long series of years, had given abundant proof of his good-will towards this Fund, and more especially towards its capital account, by a series of munificent donations which, apart from the bequest which I am privileged to announce to-day, already amount to over £500,000. It is possible, My Lord, that you may think fit later, from the Chair, to suggest to the Council that a Resolution should be passed expressing the sorrow of the Council at the death of so munificent a benefactor, and that such Resolution should be communicated, with a message of thanks, of sympathy, and of condolence, to Lady Mount Stephen.

Viscount FINLAY moved the following resolution:--

"The General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London record the deep regret with which they have learned of the death of Lord Mount Stephen, to whose benefactions the Fund and the sick poor of London owe so much. His gifts to the capital of the Fund of £200,000 in 1902, of £200,000 in 1905, and of £100,000 in 1908, are now followed by his munificent bequest of the residue of his estate to the Fund, and give proof throughout many years of his firm and continued determination to strengthen the financial basis on which rests its power to maintain a constantly increasing distribution and its value as a steadying influence in hospital finance.

"The General Council acknowledge with gratitude the wise benevolence which led Lord Mount Stephen to conceive and carry out on so generous a scale this far-sighted plan for

the permanent benefit of the Fund and the hospitals of London.

"The Council ask the Honorary Secretaries to convey this Resolution to Lady Mount Stephen, with the sincere condolences of all the members of the Council and Committees of the Fund in her bereavement."

The Resolution was seconded by the Governor of the Bank of England, who referred to the special importance of the bequest as strengthening the financial basis on which the usefulness of the Fund rested.

The Resolution was put from the chair, and carried unanimously.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that the meeting of the Council of the League would not be held till to-morrow, and many receipts had not yet come in. So far as he could say, the League would certainly be in a position to make a contribution of £14,000, possibly more, making a total from its foundation of £323,034 to the Voluntary Hospitals of London through the King Edward's Fund, and, including extra-Metropolitan Hospitals, £360,429. The new scheme, originally suggested by Lady Hall, for collections from people in domestic service, had already brought in £200 or £300 during the current year, and they hoped great things of it.

Sir Cooper Perry (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the Report of that

Committee (see p. 29), and moved the recommendations in paragraphs 10 and 15.

Sir Frederick Fry (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedules containing the list of awards.

Mr. WHITTALL having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

Sir William H. Bennett (the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee) presented the Report of that Committee (see p. 39), and moved the recommendations in paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 9.

Sir Alan Anderson (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedules containing the list of

awards.

Sir JAMES KINGSTON FOWLER having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Lady Ampthill, seconded by Sir William Church, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Monday, December 19, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds at Consumption Sanatoria during 1922, the cheques for which should be posted on January 2.

The Chairman of the King's Fund Policy Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY) presented a Report of that Committee (see p. 16) on the action taken by the King's Fund as Voluntary

Hospitals Committee for London.

Lord Stuart of Wortley then read a letter from Lord Hambleden, stating that while the hospital representatives at the Regional Committee could not bind their separate Hospitals, the Committee had passed resolutions recommending in principle the schemes mentioned in the last two paragraphs of the Report.

The Viscount Finlay, in rising to address the Council, said:—My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to read the following letter from His Majesty the King:—

"Buckingham Palace, December 12, 1921.

"Dear Sir,—I am commanded to assure you of the close interest with which the King is following the steps taken by King Edward's Hospital Fund, in co-operation with the Hospitals Commission and the Hospitals themselves, for the re-establishment of voluntary hospital finance along the lines recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

"His Majesty approves of the increase in the amount distributed this December, and of the principle of encouraging the Hospitals that are most active. He much appreciates

the generous action of King George's Fund for Sailors in again providing the amount of the

grant to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital.

"The Fund has lost one of its earliest and greatest benefactors by the lamented death of Lord Mount Stephen, who by his gifts, amounting to £500,000, many years ago laid the foundation of its endowment and has bequeathed to it the residue of his estate.

"His Majesty desires to record his most grateful appreciation of the noble generosity ever displayed towards the Fund and to the Hospital World generally by his old and valued

friend.

"The King approves of the proposals for rearranging the Committees of the Fund: and is grateful to the Members of the present Committees and the Honorary Secretaries for the way in which they have faced every task arising out of the present crisis. His Majesty wishes to express his special thanks to Sir Frederick Fry. For twenty-three years Sir Frederick has given his valuable service to the Fund; and he has now for two exceptionally strenuous years taken his full part in the very heavy additional labour imposed upon the Honorary Secretaries by the Red Cross Distribution and by the development of all the new work of the Fund.—Yours very truly, Stamfordham."

"To the Presiding Member of the President's Powers Committee."

I have also received a message from the Prince of Wales, which I shall now have the honour of reading.

"To the President's Powers Committee.

"Please convey my best wishes to the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund

at the distribution meeting on December 14.

"Although I cannot be present this winter I have arranged to receive periodical reports of what is being done. I am glad to hear of the plan of a great combined effort by the Fund and the Hospitals, and wish it every success. These are times when we must all pull together if we are going to pull through. Please also give my best thanks to the Council, Committees and Officers, especially to Sir Frederick Fry for all the splendid work he has done for so many years as Honorary Secretary.

"I hope we shall have on the new Committees the benefit of the services of all the

members of the old Committees.—EDWARD r."

The work of the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund has for two years now been continually increasing in amount and importance. There have been no less than six special meetings, and at most of the ordinary meetings there have been special reports from Committees. This time we have before us three subjects, the ordinary distribution for the year, a report on the Fund's new work as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London under Lord Cave's scheme, and the resolutions providing for the future reorganisation of the Fund. The total amount distributed is £220,000, which is an increase of £20,000 over last December. This increase was rendered possible by the fact that we received £74,000 from legacies as against only £17,600 in 1920. This £74,000 includes £52,000 on account of the Fund's share of the residue of the estate of the lafe Mr. A. E. Watson, and £12,218 given by the executors of the late Sir Frederick L. Cook out of a discretionary bequest. The Council decided to distribute a larger proportion than usual of these exceptional legacies, but not the whole. I should add that these figures refer to general fund legacies only, and do not include the sum of £5,616 this year, and £6,944 last year, from the share of the residue of the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, left to the capital account of

the Fund. This has amounted, during the past eight years, to a total of over £347,000. I need not emphasise the extreme value which this most munificent legacy, following as it did on the very large gifts of Lord Mount Stephen and others, has been to the Fund in helping to maintain the income from investments, which is the foundation of our annual distribution. The contributions which, if I may continue the same metaphor, go to make the superstructure resting on that foundation, include annual subscriptions of £1,000 from His Majesty, the Patron of the Fund, £100 from His Royal Highness our President, £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, and £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, and the very generous gift from King George's Fund for Sailors, who, in order to help us during this present crisis, have again contributed the amount of the grant to the Seamen's (Dreadnought) Hospital, which this year is £5,000. We are also greatly indebted to the League of Mercy for their contribution which Sir William Collins has just announced. The work of the League in the collection of a large number of small contributions is of the greatest value to the Fund, and it is work of the very kind which Lord Cave's Committee recommended, namely, "systematic canvassing" as contrasted with "desperate efforts." In August last we received a welcome example of a large contribution in the form of a generous donation of stock to the value of £17,490 per the executors of the will of the late Mr. Robert Jardine.

The grants to the maintenance of Hospitals come to £,198,425. This exceeds the total this time last year by £44,725, of which £20,000 is derived from the increase in the distribution and £24,725 from a reduction in the capital grants to schemes of extension or improvement. In the present financial crisis, it is clearly necessary for most of these schemes to be further postponed. The Convalescent Homes Committee is distributing £10,000, the same amount as last year. Of this, £5,370 goes in grants to Consumption Sanatoria in consideration of the reservation of beds for the use of patients in London Hospitals. In view of the increased difficulty which the Hospitals have in keeping open their own beds, and in view also of the extent to which the treatment of tuberculosis is provided for out of public funds, it has been reluctantly decided that it is impossible to continue these grants after the present distribution. The General Council announced in July last that, in accordance with one of the principles of Lord Cave's Report, the Fund would take into account, at this distribution, the action adopted by the various Hospitals to improve their finances. The increased total available for maintenance made it possible for the Distribution Committee to do this without reducing on this account the amount which any Hospital would have received on the normal basis. When I say "normal basis," I do not mean that normally the grants are fixed in amount. They fluctuate, for example, with the varying fortunes of the different Hospitals; and the power of the Fund to use its distribution, partly as an equalising factor, and partly as an encouragement to special efforts, may become very important in the near future, as new financial methods develop.

The general programme for the improvement of Hospital finance has been ably sketched in advance by Lord Cave's Committee. For the progress made in the preparation of plans for the immediate future, we must turn to the report of the King's Fund Policy Committee. The first thing to be done is the organisation of a permanent system of contributions from industrial sources, whereby those who use the Hospitals, and can afford either to pay or to make provision in advance by weekly contributions, would do so, and free treatment would be reserved for those who are the proper objects of charity. The London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association has asked the Fund to prepare a scheme of provident contributions on these lines. It is hoped to obtain the co-operation of all the Hospitals and also of the Hospital Saturday Fund, which has had so many years' experience of collecting wage-earners' contributions in London. The second thing


to be done is to raise from the general public the large amount of fresh money which is required, on the pound-for-pound principle, to meet the condition attached by the Treasury to grants out of the sum voted by Parliament for the temporary assistance of the Hospitals. For this purpose, again, the Hospitals have asked the King's Fund to prepare a general scheme for a combined

appeal.

Before I deal with the reorganisation of the Fund itself for the better performance of its new tasks, I must not omit to express our thanks to the Distribution Committee for the great amount of work which they have carried out in the distribution and in connection with the emergency grants made by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. We owe a special debt of gratitude to Sir Cooper Perry, who has not only presided over their numerous meetings and served on the King's Fund Policy Committee, but is also a member of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission itself-the body which has the difficult task of applying Lord Cave's scheme, as altered by the Treasury conditions, over the whole of Great Britain. We would also thank the Convalescent Homes Committee for the care bestowed on the distribution to Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria. There have not been many changes in the personnel of the Fund this year. The death of Lord Sandhurst has removed an old friend of the Hospitals, as well as a member of the General Council. We have also to regret the deaths of Sir Edward Hope, a member of the Council and the Executive Committee, and previously a visitor; and of two other visitors, Sir Edward Coates and Mr. J. S. Wood. We have been obliged to permit Sir Frederick Fry to resign at the end of this year his post as one of the Honorary Secretaries of the Fund. He filled this office for the four years 1908 to 1911. He refurned to it as a matter of urgency in 1914, and has remained ever since. This makes a total of 12 years as Honorary Secretary. It would be impossible to exaggerate the debt which the Fund owes to the untiring industry and the quiet wisdom which he puts into all his work. Happily, he will still retain the membership of the Council and of the Distribution Committee which he has now held for 21 years and 23 years respectively. Under the new scheme of organisation, the numerous functions of the Fund will be allocated to Committees, and the Chairmen of the different Committees will meet frequently as Members of the Management Committee. It is hoped that, by this revision of machinery, the work devolving upon the remaining Honorary Secretaries, Lord Somerleyton and Sir Alan Anderson, will be reduced both in volume and in complexity.

Before calling on Lord Stuart of Wortley to move the draft delegation resolutions, I will announce the constitution of the new Committees and the appointment of Members of the Council and Members of Committees which the President's Powers Committee propose to make for 1922. We shall retain the Finance Committee and the Distribution Committee, the latter taking over the work of the Convalescent Homes Committee in addition to its present functions. In place of the Executive Committee there will be three new Committees—the Revenue Committee for matters connected with the collection of funds; the Hospital Economy Committee for all matters connected with economy, in the widest sense of the term, including accounts, statistics, and the control and efficient direction of expenditure; and the Management Committee, which will include the Chairman of the other Committees, to deal with general administration, and also with the questions of general policy, not requiring special meetings of the Council, which have been in the charge of the King's Fund Policy Committee. I must not proceed to deal further with the future without first tendering the best thanks of the Council to the Policy Committee, the Executive Committee, and the Convalescent Homes Committee, and to their Chairmen, Lord Stuart of Wortley and Sir William

Bennett, for all the work they have done in the past.



The Chairman of the King's Fund Policy Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY) presented a further Report of that Committee on the question of the reorganisation of the King's Fund, and moved the recommendations contained therein.

The recommendation that grants to Consumption Sanatoria which are not branches of London hospitals be discontinued was seconded by Sir George Makins and carried unanimously.

The recommendation, that the draft resolutions delegating powers to the various Committees for 1922 and governing the use of the corporate seal be approved, was seconded by Sir Basil Mayhew and carried unanimously.

Sir Arthur Stanley moved a cordial vote of thanks to Viscount Finlay for presiding so ably over their deliberations.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. LEONARD L. COHEN and carried unanimously.

Viscount Finlay having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council.

The Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and Report for the year 1921, was held at the House of Lords on Tuesday, March 28, 1922, the Earl of Donoughmore, K.P. (Member of the President's Powers

Committee), being in the chair.

Those present were: The Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. M. C. Norman) (Member of the President's Powers Committee), Cardinal Bourne, The Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. Lord Somerleyton said that before making a statement on the steps already taken to promote the combined public appeal he would remind the Council of the message previously received from His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, President of the King's Fund:—

"Although I cannot be present this winter, I have arranged to receive periodical reports of what is being done. I am glad to hear of the plan of a great combined effort by the Fund and the Hospitals, and wish it every success. These are times when we must all pull together if we are going to pull through."

The following cable had been received on March 12:-

"Somerleyton 7 Walbrook London.

"Prince of Wales approves of his name as President being used in connection with " Private Secretary." scheme and appeal passed by King's Fund Council.

Since the Council last met on March 8, the Organising Committee, of which Sir Alan Anderson is Chairman, had been constituted and included the Revenue Committee of the King's Fund and representatives of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, the League of Mercy, and the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association. The Trustees and Treasurers of the Appeal Fund were the Lord Mayor of London, the Governor of the Bank of England, the Chairman of the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and the Treasurer of the King's Fund. The Organising Committee had appointed an Executive Committee under the Chairmanship of Sir George Lawson Johnston, and had appointed as Director-General of the Appeal Campaign Mr. E. S. Shrapnell-Smith, and Captain E. J. C. Chapman as his Deputy. The Appeal would be launched after Easter and would reach its climax by June. Each Hospital on the list of the King's Fund as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London had been invited to co-operate, and from all quarters the Organising Committee had received the most cordial assurances of support. The Combined Appeal aimed at raising at least £500,000 needed to pay off the floating debt of London Hospitals. Its second object was to secure for Hospitals the new subscribers and the additional permanent income to meet the increased cost of working, including moderate and continuous contributions from all classes as recommended by Lord Cave's Committee. The Council would appreciate from this short statement that the Appeal was not being made by the King's Fund alone, but mobilised the influence of the principal organisations which were working on behalf of the Hospitals, and, above all, of the Hospitals themselves.

On the motion of Lord STUART OF WORTLEY (Chairman of the Management Committee), seconded by Sir Walter Trower, a Report of that Committee was adopted on the subject of expenses for 1921, which, in spite of the increased work, still averaged less than 614. in every

pound received.

Lord Revelstoke (The Honorary Treasurer), in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1921, said: My Lord Chairman, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-I have the honour to inform the Council that the total general receipts in the year 1921 amounted to £252,659 6s. 2d. Owing to the receipt of several exceptional legacies, these figures show a considerable increase as compared with those of 1920. During the past year we have distributed £220,000—that is to say, an amount exceeding by £20,000 that distributed in 1920; and we have added £25,486 14s. 4d. to the reserves. The Council will have in mind that in 1920 the reserves were depleted by an emergency distribution, which we thought it our duty to make, of £250,000. We regarded that special distribution as an entirely exceptional effort, and in this opinion Lord Cave's Committee concurred. recognised that the hospital problem has a two-fold character: that we were bound to make every effort to tide over the present crisis; and that we must also strive to ensure not only the maintenance, but the increase of permanent income. It is evident that, if the King's Fund is to be instrumental in ensuring the financial well-being of the hospitals, it must maintain and increase its own permanent Lord Mountstephen had this object in view in his munificent gifts to capital during his lifetime, lately supplemented, as the Council are aware, by the bequest of the residue of his

estate. It is an object which is to-day of particular and indeed of paramount importance to us at a moment when, by distributing the above-mentioned extra £250,000 out of our reserves, we have already sacrificed a considerable amount of permanent income, and when we have to note and to regret the loss of our largest annual subscriber, the late Mr. Walter Morrison, who for a long period of years had contributed a yearly sum of £5,000 to our funds. In view of this unavoidable loss of income, it is satisfactory to be able to report the announcement of another important bequest to the Fund. The Council may have noticed the publication of the provisions of the will of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland, who has appointed the King's Fund as residuary legatee to his estate. Even after the payment of the Death Duties, for which the Fund will be responsible, this bequest should form the nucleus of a valuable addition to our income, and will be gratefully received as a welcome proof of the goodwill and consideration of yet another eminent benefactor. The King's Fund now proposes to contribute to the solution of the problem entailed by the present crisis, not by making another distribution at the expense of its future income, but by the organisation, at the request of the hospitals and with the aid of the other central agencies, of a great combined public appeal. It is with the utmost gratification that we have received the cable from the Prince of Wales, as President of the King's Fund, authorising the use of his name in connection with the issue of the appeal, and we deeply appreciate the gracious action of His Royal Highness. Those of the Council who have been so long connected with this Fund are well aware of the degree to which its prosperity is due to the direct personal activities of its Founder, King Edward, and of His present Majesty, during their terms of office as President. We are confident that the devotion which the Prince, our present President, is now showing to the cause of the hospitals will evoke a public response which will guarantee the success of the appeal. I have the honour to move the adoption of the Accounts.

The resolution, having been seconded by Sir Frederick Green, was put and carried unanimously. The CHAIRMAN OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE (Lord Stuart of Wortley) moved the adoption of the Report of the Council for the year 1921.

The Viscountess Northcliffe seconded the resolution.

Lord Donoughmore, in putting the motion, expressed appreciation of the way in which the extra work thrown upon the Fund had been carried out by the Chairmen of Committees, the Honorary Secretaries, and the whole of the staff. Thanks were especially due to Mr. Maynard, whose unsparing labour and wise judgment had been of the utmost value.

The adoption of the Report was then put, and carried unanimously.

The Viscount Cave, in moving a vote of thanks to the Earl of Donoughmore, said: My Lord Chairman, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-May I say I appear before this Council with some hesitation, because I feel that I am in part responsible for throwing a good deal of additional work upon the Council, because the Committee over which I had the honour to preside did recommend that the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for this great London area should be the Council of the King's Fund. I need hardly say that when that recommendation was made the need for new departures in hospital work was very great. The whole of my Committee, while they deeply regard the splendid work which has been done for hospitals throughout the country by governors and medical staffs, and everyone concerned, also felt that a crisis in hospital finance had arrived, and that there was need for fresh effort. The Report was, I think, very kindly received by the Government, because in many respects they acted upon our recommendations, although they did not go, as we should have wished them, the whole way. As regards the Death Duties,

may I suggest to the Members of the House of Commons who may be on this Council that it is open to them to see whether the relief from Death Duties, which we thought it right to recommend, could not, at all events in some measure, be obtained. There was also the reduction in the grant which we recommended for the relief of the hospitals from their present difficulties, due, I believe, entirely to the late war. There, again, the Government were not able to go the whole way, and therefore it is that the duty has fallen upon the King's Fund to make the combined public appeal which Lord Somerleyton has referred to. May I say I think everyone is delighted with the way in which the King's Fund has undertaken the new work thrown upon it, and is throwing its energies into making that new work a success. It is necessary, I believe, not only that a considerable sum should be raised from the public throughout the country to meet the immediate necessities of the case, but that at the same time provision should be made that the like necessity shall not soon recur; and, therefore, I am glad to think that, while the great public appeal is made, the Fund is also taking steps to bring about, if possible, some systematic and permanent method by which the income of the hospitals may be increased. It is obvious that both these objects need to be looked into and supported, and I am very glad indeed that this great body, the King's Fund, is taking a leading part, along with other organisations, to bring that about. In conclusion, may I just add one word. It was, I think, a special pleasure to me to see the note in the Report in paragraph 24, which says that some stimulus was given by our Report to the movement for co-operation between the hospitals and the various central agencies. These agencies have all of them done splendid work, and I know that some of them, like the League of Mercy, have long co-operated with the King's Fund. I believe in pulling together; and I think if there is combined effort towards co-operation, not only among the great London funds, but among the hospitals throughout the country, great benefit may ensue to the hospitals. I have pleasure in moving a cordial vote of thanks to Lord Donoughmore, not only for his conduct in the chair, but also for his kindness in allowing the use of his room, and also for the many services he has rendered to the cause of the hospitals.

The resolution was seconded by the Viscount Hambleden and carried unanimously.

The Earl of Donoughmore having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

REPORT OF THE DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

- (1) The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals at the present distribution is £210,000. The amount distributed last year at the ordinary distribution was £190,000, apart from the emergency distribution of £250,000 made by the Fund in July 1920 out of its accumulated funds, and the special distribution of £250,000, which was generously entrusted to the Fund by the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem for distribution on their behalf in aid of schemes of extension or improvement at Hospitals able and willing to treat ex-Service men.
- (2) The number of Hospitals applying is 110, as against 108 in 1920. The Alexandra Hospital has moved out of the London area, the Royal Chest Hospital is amalgamated with the Royal Northern Hospital (late Great Northern Central Hospital), and applications have been received from the Evelina Hospital, the Metropolitan Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital, the Roll of Honour Hospital, and St. Bartholomew's Hospital.
- (3) The King's Fund made it clear from the first that the emergency grants out of accumulated funds could not be repeated. This decision was endorsed by Lord Cave's Committee, who recommended that the Government should provide temporary assistance to give the hospitals time to reorganise their finances; the Government grants to be administered by a Hospitals Commission with the aid of reports from local Voluntary Hospitals Committees.
- (4) After the issue of the Report of Lord Cave's Committee and the appointment of the Fund as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, the Distribution Committee was charged by the General Council with the duty of preparing recommendations to the Voluntary Hospitals Commission on the allocation amongst the separate hospitals in the London area of grants out of the money voted by Parliament. In response to enquiries from the Commission, the Committee held a series of special meetings in August to prepare a report on the subject of beds closed for want of funds; and again in October to prepare a report to the Commission on the financial position of the London Hospitals generally, with recommendations on the subject of emergency grants. This latter report was based on estimates of income and expenditure for the year 1921 and figures of assets and liabilities at August 31, 1921, prepared at considerable labour by the hospitals, and carefully checked by the Fund's Auditors, Messrs. Deloitte's. The returns also included statements as to steps taken or proposed to be taken to increase income and reduce expenditure.

After considering these reports the Voluntary Hospitals Commission in November made emergency grants, on a basis decided on by the Commission, to twenty-four hospitals which had exhausted their realisable assets and were in imminent danger of having to close beds.

- (5) One of the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee was that no grant out of Government money should be made to any hospital which was not taking all steps open to it for re-establishing its financial position. In July the General Council of the Fund informed the hospitals that at the ordinary distribution the King's Fund would itself take into account the action adopted by hospitals to carry out the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee in this direction. The instructions of the General Council to this effect have been duly observed by the Distribution Committee.
- (6) As regards the rest of the distribution, the Committee, after carefully considering the possible alternatives, decided to determine the grants to maintenance on the usual basis—i.e. to examine the relative financial positions of the different hospitals chiefly in the light of the last audited accounts, namely those for the year 1920, rather than on estimates for the current year, which may prove to be fallacious. By this practice the Fund's grants are continuously adjusted, though always a year afterwards, to the fluctuations in the relative needs of the hospitals. There does not appear to the Distribution Committee to be at present sufficient reason for making any change which would break the continuity of this process and impair the value of the Fund's annual distribution as a stabilising element in hospital finance.
- (7) In comparing the grants to maintenance this year with those of last year it must, however, be borne in mind that grants made in December 1920 were in some cases affected by the amount of the emergency grants made in July 1920.
- (8) In view of the urgent need of maintenance grants, the Distribution Committee notified the Hospitals in October that grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure would have to be severely limited, or even entirely suspended. In the end the Distribution Committee decided to entertain applications in a few exceptional cases where the scheme was particularly urgent, and was within a reasonable distance of being carried out. The result is that the total amount of the grants recommended in aid of schemes of capital expenditure is reduced from £36,300 last year to £11,575 this year. The total grants to maintenance amount to £198,425, an increase of £44,725 over the corresponding total at the ordinary distribution last year.
- (9) The Committee have continued to examine all schemes of improvement or extension submitted to them. In May last they prepared a statement of evidence to Lord Cave's Committee on the financial position of the various proposals which they had passed as urgently needed, and it will be remembered that Lord Cave's Committee, in their Report,

recommended Government assistance in this direction. The Distribution Committee have notified the hospitals that it will only be in exceptional circumstances that they will be prepared to consider schemes that were not already before the Fund when this evidence was submitted.

(10) The Committee recommend that the following grants, made in past years in aid of schemes of building expenditure, should be renewed under the two years' rule:—

City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, £500 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £3,000 to rebuilding on new site.

Great Northern Central Hospital, £2,500 to new nurses' home.

London Lock Hospital, £4,500 to reconstruction of the Harrow Road Hospital, of which £3,000 to be available for out-patient department.

Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital, £3,100 to new out-patient department and other improvements.

Queen Mary's Hospital for the East End, £1,625 to improvements.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £2,538 12s. 11d. to improved ouf-patient accommodation.

- St. Mary's Hospital for Women and Children, Plaistow, £5,500 to new nurses' home and out-patient department.
- St. Monica's Hospital, £100 to improvements.
- St. Peter's Hospital for Stone, £200 to improvements.
- St. Thomas's Hospital, £2,500 to extension of nurses' dining-room.

Victoria Hospital, £450 to new heating apparatus, transferred to extension of outpatient department and resident medical officers' quarters.

West London Hospital, £400 to improvements.

Woolwich and District War Memorial Hospital Building Fund, £5,300 to new general hospital.

(11) The Statistical Report shows that the increase in cost of working still continues, the expenditure of the London hospitals in 1920 being 135 per cent. more than in 1913, whereas their income has increased by only about 66 per cent. It is interesting to note from Lord Cave's Report that the aggregate increases in expenditure in London, where comparative statistics of cost of working are circulated by the King's Fund, are considerably smaller than the aggregate increases at the provincial hospitals.

The Distribution Committee, in making their recommendations, have continued to take into account the figures of comparative cost and any explanations supplied by the hospitals. Where necessary they call attention privately to high cost, and in a few cases they suggest that, if a reduction to a figure nearer the average is not effected, they may

feel compelled to recommend a public remark next year. The special importance of a reduction in expenditure at the present time is emphasised by Lord Cave's Committee.

- (12) The Committee desire to express their gratitude to King George's Fund for Sailors for generously providing, for a second year, the amount of the grant awarded to the Seamen's Dreadnought Hospital.
- (13) The Committee are again greatly indebted to the Visitors for their reports on the various hospitals, and have recommended that in some cases extracts from these reports should be forwarded to the Hospital Committees for their observations.
- (14) At their first meeting this year the Distribution Committee learned with great regret of the retirement of Sir John Tweedy, who had been a member of the Committee since 1904 and Chairman for two years. They greatly miss the benefit of his ability and his long experience both of the work of the Fund and of hospital affairs generally. They trust he may long continue his connection with the General Council.
 - (15) The Committee recommend:
 - (a) that the grants set out in Schedule I. to this Report be made to Hospitals, with the conditions and remarks attached;
 - (b) that the remarks set out in Schedule II. be forwarded to the several Hospitals privately, with a request for the observations of the respective Committees of Management;
 - (c) that this Report, with Schedule I., be published;
 - (d) that copies of this Report be forwarded to the Hospitals which have applied for grants, for the information of the Committees of these institutions.

REPORT OF THE CONVALESCENT HOMES COMMITTEE.

- (1) The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria at £10,000, the same amount as in 1920.
- (2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 59 from Convalescent Homes and 10 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 51 and 11 respectively last year.
- (3) In view of the small amount available for distribution, the Committee have taken into consideration, even more than usual, the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31st last. In the case of Consumption Sanatoria they have also taken note of the proportion of the total work of each institution which is covered by the receipts from public authorities. As these and other circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.
- (4) The Committee have decided again to recommend that part of the amount available should be distributed in the form of grants to Consumption Sanatoria in consideration of the reservation of beds for the use of patients in London Hospitals, viz., 44 beds at six Sanatoria (being the same as in 1920 for 1921), situated as follows:—
 - 10 beds for children at the Children's Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
 - 2 beds at the Daneswood Sanatorium (Jewish), Woburn Sands, Beds.
 - 8 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
 - 4 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
 - 12 beds at the Sanatorium of the National Association for the Establishment and Maintenance of Sanatoria for Workers, Benenden, Kent.
 - 8 beds at the Northamptonshire Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.

(5) The Committee recommend that the beds thus reserved be allocated amongst London Hospitals as follows:—

Chest Hospitals:-

- 8 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 4 beds to the Royal Chest Hospital branch of the Great Northern Central Hospital.

General Hospitals:-

- 2 beds to Charing Cross Hospital.
- 5 beds to Guy's Hospital.
- 2 beds to King's College Hospital.
- 7 beds to the London Hospital.
- 3 beds to the Middlesex Hospital.
- 2 beds to the Royal Free Hospital.
- 2 beds to St. George's Hospital.
- 1 bed to St. Mary's Hospital.
- 5 beds to St. Thomas's Hospital.
- 2 beds to University College Hospital.
- 1 bed to Westminster Hospital.
- (6) For several years past, however, the Committee have recognised that the treatment of tuberculosis has been more and more regarded as coming within the scope of the public health authorities, either directly or as part of the National Insurance Scheme; and the Committee have anticipated that a time would come when the Council might no longer feel justified in devoting part of its annual distribution to the provision of accommodation for London patients out of voluntary funds. Reference was made to this possibility in the report of the Committee last year. The greatly increased needs of the London hospitals for maintenance grants have brought this question to a head rather earlier than the Committee would have desired, but they feel that they have no option but to recommend that the practice of making grants to Consumption Sanatoria in consideration of the reservation of beds for patients in London Hospitals should be discontinued after the present distribution.
- (7) On the subject of continuing to make grants to the maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria apart from the reservation of beds, the Committee make no general recommendation, but they suggest that the question whether such grants should be continued should be considered by the General Council when delegating powers for 1922.

- (8) The Committee are greatly indebted to the Visitors who so kindly volunteered for the inspection of Consumption Sanatoria, often at a considerable distance from London.
 - (9) The Committee recommend:—
 - (a) that the grants set out in Schedule I. to this Report be made to Consumption Sanatoria, with the conditions and remarks attached;
 - (b) that the grants set out in Schedule II. be made to Convalescent Homes, with the conditions and remarks attached;
 - (c) that the remarks set out in Schedule III. be forwarded to the several institutions privately, with a request for the observations of the respective Committees of Management;
 - (d) that this Report, with Schedules I. and II., be published.
 - (e) that copies of this Report be forwarded to the Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes which have applied for grants, and to the London Hospitals to which Sanatorium beds are allocated, for the information of the Committees of these institutions.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was re-named "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the five standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 and 2.

In July 1921 the Fund was invited by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission to act as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area in accordance with the recommendations of Lord Cave's Committee, and undertook to do so.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly

constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes, or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 85).

Every eligible Hospital and Sanatorium applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendations of the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-four years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £3,808,416 to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1921 being £220,000.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 6s. 5d. per cent. of the receipts, which is equal to less than $3\frac{1}{4}d$. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £324,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-three years; the contribution in 1921 being £15,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made. A special examination was made of extension schemes in connection with the Red Cross Distribution in July, 1920.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different hospitals (see below). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Pensions for Hospital Officers; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

PUBLICATIONS OF THE FUND.

The King's Fund has been appointed "Voluntary Hospitals Committee" for London under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance, and is actively engaged in promoting schemes for this purpose.

The Fund also from time to time collects, and places at the disposal of the hospitals and the public, information on points of interest, and appoints special Committees to enquire into and report upon questions of difficulty affecting hospitals.

SOME EXTRACTS FROM THE FINAL REPORT OF LORD CAVE'S COMMITTEE, June, 1921.

(Parliamentary Paper Cmd. 1335.)

"Is the voluntary system worth saving? We are convinced that it is. If that system falls to the ground, Hospitals must be provided by the public, and the expense of so providing them would be enormous. . . . But the money loss to the State would be a small matter compared with the injury which would be done to the welfare of the sick for whom the Hospitals are provided, the training of the medical profession, and the progress of medical research."

"We think it clear that in order to save the Hospitals from immediate disaster some assistance must be forthwith given from public funds; but we are also firmly of opinion, . . . that the assistance (Par. 16.) should be temporary only...."

"King Edward's Hospital Fund for London has already performed admirable work in (Par. 19.) the organisation of the London Hospital system."

"The uniform system of accounts inaugurated and enforced by the King's Fund in London is of great value in enabling comparisons of cost to be made, and so in suggesting opportunities for economy."

"If the Voluntary Hospital is to continue and prosper, it must rely not only on the large subscriptions and gifts, but also, and to an increasing extent, on moderate and continuous contributions from all classes of the community. During recent years appeals to those engaged in industry to make a weekly contribution out of their wages have become more frequent, and the ready and generous response made to the appeals is perhaps the most encouraging feature which has come under our notice."

"The practice of asking patients treated at a Hospital, other than the necessitous poor, to contribute to the Hospital Fund is comparatively new, and is a product of the financial stringency. . . . There appears to be no reason why this practice should not be generally followed, provided that great care is taken not to exclude the very poor from benefits which are primarily intended for them." (Par. 38.)

"We have every confidence that if the (temporary) assistance recommended is given by the Exchequer, it will be within the power of those having control of our Hospitals, by means of economy in management and energy in interesting the public in their work, to maintain that voluntary system of which we are justly proud."

SPECIAL NEEDS-1922.

The chief needs of the Hospitals for 1922 are twofold:-

(a) A large sum of fresh money is needed to tide over the immediate difficulties and to enable the Hospitals to qualify for grants from the temporary Government assistance on the £ for £ basis.

For this purpose the King's Fund, at the invitation of the Hospitals, is organising a Combined Public Appeal, with the aid of the Hospital Saturday Fund, the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society, the League of Mercy, the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund; and the co-operation of more than 100 Hospitals.

(b) Additional permanent income is required to meet the increased cost of working, including moderate and continuous contributions from all classes as recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.
