REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL FOR 1923.

THE GENERAL POSITION IN 1923.

1. The year 1923 saw the completion of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal organised by the King's Fund in 1922. The final distribution of the proceeds in June 1923 formed the last of the series of special distributions to tide the hospitals over their immediate difficulties. These distributions have included emergency grants from the King's Fund and from the National Relief Fund in 1920, the temporary Government grants administered by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission in 1921 and 1922, and the Combined Appeal in 1922 and 1923. The future of the hospitals now depends on the success of their efforts, assisted by the King's Fund and the other central organisations, to secure permanent increase of income with efficient control of expenditure.

2. In respect of income and expenditure, omitting the special distributions, the financial position of the hospitals has shown a steady improvement: the net aggregate annual deficit for 113 hospitals in London having been reduced from £383,000 for the year 1920 to £210,000 for the year 1921 and £174,000 for the year 1922.

COMPLETION OF COMBINED APPEAL.

3. The Organising Committee of the Combined Appeal presented their final report at the Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of the King's Fund on June 4. The report and accounts covered the period from the inauguration of the Appeal in March 1922 down to May 14, 1923, and were published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for 1922.

4. These accounts showed a total distribution out of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal of £413,214 8s. 9d., including £390,000 paid over to the King's Fund. Of the latter sum, £365,000 was distributed by the King's Fund in grants to the co-operating hospitals, viz., £250,000 in 1922 and £115,000 in 1923. The complete list of grants appears in the Annual Report for 1922. The balance of £25,000 was retained, in accordance with the wishes of donors to that amount, to assist schemes for the collection of regular contributions from Industry, and of this sum £10,000 was paid during the year to the Hospital Saving Association in accordance with the wishes of the donors. Small outstanding balances, amounting to a net sum of £5,113 1s., have since come in, raising the

total to £418,327 9s. 9d. The expenses incurred by the Combined Appeal Committee, not included in the previous published accounts to May 14, 1923, amounted to £750 16s. 1d.

SUMMARY OF KING'S FUND RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

5. The total receipts for the year were £575,396 12s. 9d., of which £145,113 1s. was received from the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal; £175,000 from the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland; £2,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £48,398 17s. 5d. from other Legacies; £12,767 15s. 8d. from gifts to capital; and £192,116 18s. 8d. from general receipts.

7. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £235,000, an increase of £15,000 over 1922.

8. For the reasons explained in paragraph 24 below, the grants to recovery and convalescent branches attached to hospitals in London were merged with the hospital grants in 1923, instead of being, as heretofore, included in the separate distribution to convalescent homes. The analysis of the 1923 distribution as compared with 1922 is as follows:—

9. Every eligible Hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as hitherto, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. To these Visitors the Council desire to express their sincere thanks for the reports, which are of the greatest assistance to the Distribution Committee.

10. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years (after including the two special distributions in 1920 and the Combined Appeal distributions in 1922 and 1923) is £2,846,438. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £4,636,854 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

11. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also were their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, Prince Henry, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, and other members of the Royal Family.

12. The Fund again received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from Lloyds Bank Limited, and of £500 from the Earl of Iveagh, from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons, and from an anonymous donor; and donations of £750 from the Goldsmiths' Company, £657 5s. 9d. from "S.D.R.S.D.," and £400 from the Westminster Bank Ltd., Lombard Street, Hospital Fund; besides an anonymous donation of £6,500, which greatly helped in the increase of the annual distribution.

13. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £14,500, against £15,000 in 1922. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £353,500, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League for this valuable assistance, resulting from the systematic collection of moderate and continuous contributions, which is one of the methods specially recommended by Lord Cave's Committee.

14. Legacies received during the year included £175,000 from the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £432,692 8s. 0d. received to date). Other legacies received during the year included £11,160 from the estate of the late Mr. Henry Herbert Wills, on account of share of residue left for Endowment purposes; £11,090 6s. 1d. from the estate of the late Mr. Montagu George Jessett, on account of residue; £10,049 19s. 5d. from the estate of the late Mr. Frederick Albert Henry Palmer, on account of residue; £6,750 11s. 3d. from the estate of the late Mr. Charles Ansell, on account of residue; £2,827 11s. 6d. the residue of the estate of the late Miss Theodosia

H. A. Blondel; £2,400 from the estate of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Clarke, further on account of share of residue; £2,192 5s. 0d. from the estate of the late Miss Laura Young; £2,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £492,013 4s. 6d. received to date); £1,528 4s. 10d. from the estate of the late Major-General Samuel Charles Woodcock, further on account of residue; £1,000 from the estate of the late Sir Carl Meyer, Bt., and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Frederick Wolfe, left to capital. The Fund is also grateful to the executors of the late Mr. Charles Albert Bannister for a gift of £5,000, in the exercise of their discretionary powers.

EXPENSES.

15. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund was £8,904 17s. 6d., or £2 1s. 4d. per £100 of the total received (apart from the Combined Appeal), as compared with £8,607 12s. 10d., or 15s. 8d. per £100, in the previous year. The average yearly outlay in this respect for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £3,635 2s., the corresponding percentage of the receipts being £1 5s. 6d., or just over 3d. in every £1 received.

SCHEMES FOR PROMOTING INCREASED INCOME.

16. After the close of the Combined Appeal, which had occupied their energies for more than fifteen months, the Revenue Committee turned their attention to their normal work of considering the best means by which the permanent income of the King's Fund and of the Hospitals could be maintained and increased.

17. So far as the income of individual hospitals is concerned, the King's Fund has adopted the same method as with control of expenditure: namely, for the annual Statistical Report to contain comparative figures by which each hospital can see for itself where it succeeds or fails, and for the Distribution Committee to take into account, as one of the factors in the Fund's distribution, the energy shown by the hospital itself.

18. The tables in the Statistical Report also show in what directions the hospitals, taken as a whole, are developing their revenue. From this point of view the figures show three things: (i) the increase in voluntary contributions in spite of post-war difficulties; (ii) the growing importance of the contributions made by patients themselves either directly or through mass contributions; and (iii) the varying proportion in which the annual aggregate surplus or deficit is divided between different hospitals and even different groups of hospitals.

PROPAGANDA.

19. For its own active work the Revenue Committee have established two sub-committees. One, under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham, is for propaganda in the fields of Education, Art, Science, Literature and Law, in general continuance of the work of the Education Auxiliary of the Combined Appeal; and to organise general propa-

ganda of the work of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals of London. The function of the other, under Major Wernher, is to consider, in the light of the experience gained in the Combined Appeal, and to promote, schemes for raising money for the King's Fund in fields other than those covered by Lord Burnham's Committee, or by Hospitals generally, or by other Central Agencies; and to encourage individual Hospitals, or groups of Hospitals, to increase their income.

20. Lord Burnham's Committee, which includes representatives of the various professions concerned, organised a second Scientific Novelties Exhibition at King's College in December, with the aid of the staff of the College and a large number of other helpers. They have also begun a series of leaflets on hospital questions, the first dealing with the financial position of the hospitals after the close of the Combined Appeal. A number of other activities were in preparation at the end of the year.

SCHEMES FOR PROMOTING CONTROL OF EXPENDITURE.

21. The Hospital Economy Committee are concerned with proposals for the control of expenditure, with a view to the most efficient employment of the resources of the Hospitals.

STATISTICS OF QUANTITIES CONSUMED.

22. In April, 1923, a conference was held on the subject of the use that could be made of comparative statistics of the quantities of various articles consumed in different wards or departments of hospitals, a subject first brought actively before the King's Fund by the late Sir Napier Burnett. The conference was followed by the issue of a circular, in the first instance to the larger hospitals, suggesting practical methods of applying this system, with due regard to the different circumstances of different institutions; and there is every reason to believe that valuable results will follow.

RECOVERY BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS.

23. A sub-committee of the Hospital Economy Committee, under the Chairmanship of Sir George Makins, held an enquiry into the relation between hospitals in London and recovery branches in the country. A report on the subject was presented to the Council in December, the general conclusion being that, in view of the benefit to the patients, the development of recovery branches deserved encouragement; but that this was subject to the proviso that, before a branch was established, those responsible for its finances should realise that the apparent cheapness resulting from the low cost per bed at the branch was largely illusory; that its establishment was a form of hospital extension and must be budgeted for as such; and that no form of extension should be undertaken without particularly careful consideration, both by the hospital and by the King's Fund, until the restoration of voluntary hospital finance had been completed.

24. Recognising the desirability of assisting recovery branches, and at the same time the impossibility of laying down a hard-and-fast line between recovery branches and con-

valescent homes, the Distribution Committee decided to include both kinds of branch in the distribution to hospitals, and to take into account the extent to which the work of each branch approximated to hospital work on the one hand and convalescent work on the other.

VACANT ACCOMMODATION IN POOR LAW INFIRMARIES.

25. In view of statements that there were 20,000 vacant beds in Poor Law Infirmarys in London, the Council asked the Hospital Economy Committee to consider and report on the question how best to connect and utilise the vacant accommodation and service of Poor Law Infirmarys within the area of the Fund for the general purposes of Hospital work. The Committee reported in June that they were informed by the Voluntary Hospitals Commission that these statements were based on statistics for the warmer months of the year, and for the whole of England, and that the actual margin of accommodation in London was very small.

AMBULANCE CASES DISPOSAL COMMITTEE.

26. At the request of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission the King's Fund took into consideration the question of hospital accommodation for ambulance cases, with particular reference to a suggestion that vacant beds should be notified daily to the police and ambulance authorities. His Royal Highness the President appointed a special committee, with Sir William Collins as Chairman, to enquire into the subject. By the end of the year the Committee had finished the taking of evidence, but had not presented their report.

PERSONNEL.

27. The Council deeply regret the loss by death during 1923 of two of their members, Earl Farquhar, who had served since 1907; and the Hon. Nathaniel Charles Rothschild, who was also a member of the Finance Committee.

28. The Minister of Health, in pursuance of his powers under the Act of Incorporation, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., chartered accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the Honorary Auditors since January, 1898, and have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

29. The King's Fund has assisted the Hospitals to tide over their most urgent difficulties by its work in connection with the Combined Appeal and other special distributions of the past few years. An increased regular income to enable the Fund to increase its annual distribution would greatly help in the permanent stabilisation of their finances.

30. The Council are grateful to the Press for the co-operation and help so generously and effectively afforded in past years, and look with confidence for a continuance of their support in promoting the permanent welfare of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Distribution Meeting of President and General Council.

DECEMBER 18, 1923.

A meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held on Tuesday, December 18, 1923, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair. Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer), in reporting the amount received for general purposes by the Fund to December 3, said that this time last year he had expressed the hope that the income to be derived from the munificent legacies of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland would form the nucleus of a permanent increase in the distribution. The Fund had

already received a large part of this increased income. The total income from all investments had reached £145,000 this year, as against £114,400 in 1922. On the other hand, ordinary legacies, inevitably a fluctuating form of income, had decreased, although for the past twelve months they still reached the substantial figure of £47,000. It had, therefore, been necessary to set off this decrease in legacies against the increase in income from investments, with the net result that the Fund was able to distribute £235,000—that is to say, a sum exceeding by £15,000 that distributed a year ago. The ordinary income from subscriptions and donations had been well maintained, owing largely to an anonymous donation of £6,500 received in May. The estimates also included the amount which the Fund hoped to receive from its largest contributor, the League of Mercy, whose activities year by year had more than justified anticipations, by systematically equalling or even surpassing their own records of successful endeavour. Taking all the sources of income into consideration, there was every hope that this large sum of £235,000 would be provided very nearly, if not quite, out of the current income of the year.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said the full account of the League would be laid before His Royal Highness the next day, when he was to preside at the Annual Meeting of the League, as President. Sir William said that so far as they could tell from the subscriptions at present received, a sum of £14,000 would be handed over to the King's Fund before the end of the year. This would make a total sum of £353,000 handed over to the Fund since the foundation of the League. Adding the grants made to hospitals outside London, the total came to £407,682.

The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (Mr. LEONARD L. COHEN) presented the Report of the Committee on Recovery Branches of London Hospitals, and moved the Recommendation.

Dr. H. MORLEY FLETCHER having seconded, the motion was carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the Recommendations.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches).

The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir JOHN BLAND-SUTTON) having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the Recommendations.

Major HAROLD WERNHER (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals.

Professor WINIFRED CULLIS having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of the Right Hon. M. C. NORMAN, seconded by Sir GEORGE MAKINS, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Thursday, December 20.

The Chairman of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee (Sir WILLIAM COLLINS), in making a statement on the present position of the inquiry, said that the Committee had now completed the oral evidence; the draft report was almost ready for consideration. He hoped the Report would be presented to His Royal Highness before the New Year was far advanced.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to read the following message from His Majesty the King:—

"I am highly gratified that the Fund is this year enabled to increase its distribution from £220,000 to £235,000; also that the difficulties facing the Voluntary Hospital System are being steadily overcome by the methods adopted and advocated by the Fund.

"I sincerely trust that continued success will attend the work of the Council and Committees.

"GEORGE R.I."

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—

The King's Fund is to-day taking another stride forward. The distribution is being increased by £15,000. For the last two years it has been £220,000; this year it is £235,000. We are glad to hear from Lord Revelstoke that nearly the whole of this is provided from income received during the year, in spite of the fact that legacies are considerably less than in 1922. The increase in income, which has more than balanced the fall in legacies, is chiefly due to the dividends from the bequests of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland. But we have also been greatly helped by an anonymous donation of £6,500. I am afraid that I cannot give the donor's name. Large donations of this kind have more than once arrived just when some assistance was most wanted. Gifts to the King's Fund benefit nearly 150 institutions in proportion to their respective claims, as judged by a Distribution Committee which has acquired a great amount of knowledge and experience. Probably this appeals to the large donor. That the work of the King's Fund also appeals to the small donor is shown by the continued success of the League of Mercy, whose splendid contribution has just been announced by Sir William Collins. The novel feature in the Report of the Distribution Committee is the new method of dealing with the Recovery and Convalescent Branches of Hospitals. These came under the Distribution Committee for the first time last year, when the Committees of the Fund were reorganised. The former Convalescent Homes Committee always gave preference to Homes that were connected with Hospitals. The Distribution Committee have now gone a step further, and have amalgamated the grants to the branches with the Hospital grants. This is the method adopted by the Committee for solving a rather difficult problem. On the one hand, the Recovery Branches claimed that their recovery work was really Hospital work. On the other hand, the Fund found it impossible to lay down any hard-and-fast rules for distinguishing between recovery work and convalescent work. There may be endless gradations between the two. The Distribution Committee have hit upon a method whereby they believe they can give credit for all the different kinds of work without laying down any rules. The question of Recovery Branches came up for decision this year because of the inquiry by the Hospital Economy Committee, whose Report is also before the Council to-day. This Report is an example of the way in which the King's Fund, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, is steadily working through that admirable text-book on Voluntary Hospital Finance, the Report of Lord Cave's Committee. On this particular question of Recovery Branches, the Hospital Economy Committee have made a thorough inquiry, and now present their conclusions. They consider that Recovery Branches are good for the patients, but that the Hospitals and also the King's Fund must first count the cost, as they would in the case of any other form of Hospital extension. Moreover, the counting is not quite as simple as it looks, because the figures of Recovery Branches, if taken by themselves, show an apparent cheapness, which the Committee consider may be illusory. It is on these general conclusions that the Distribution Committee have acted. They give more to recovery work than to convalescent work,

but before recommending a grant they ask that schemes for the establishment of Recovery Branches should be submitted to the Fund like any other extension schemes. Other forms of co-operation between the different Committees of the King's Fund are also illustrated in the Distribution Committee's Report. The Hospital Economy Committee examines the figures of cost in the Fund's Statistical Report and makes suggestions to the Distribution Committee, after having first issued a general invitation to the Hospitals to send in their observations on the figures. Similarly, the Revenue Committee has before it the new tables in the Statistical Report analysing income; and these tables, like the figures of cost, provide material for use at the distribution. On matters that do not directly affect the Distribution Committee the other Committees will report to the Council at the Annual Meeting in the spring. But there has been an interesting development of the work of the Revenue Committee which I should like to mention. Two Sub-Committees have been appointed. One, under the Chairmanship of Lord Burnham, is to assist, partly by general propaganda in aid of the work of the King's Fund and the Hospitals; partly by enlisting the help of members of the professions of science, art, literature, law, etc.; and partly by continuing from time to time some of the activities of the Educational Auxiliary which did such good work for the Combined Appeal. The other, under Major Wernher, is to assist both the King's Fund and the Hospitals to increase their revenue in any other ways not already covered by some existing agency. Besides a nucleus drawn from the Revenue Committee, Lord Burnham's Committee, so far, contains the following members, most of whom are not otherwise officially connected with the King's Fund, but who have shown, through the Combined Appeal or in other ways, their desire to give personal assistance in connection with their respective professions:—Art: Professor Rothenstein. Drama: Mr. Dennis Eadie. Education: Sir William Beveridge and Dr. Ernest Barker (from the University of London); Mr. George Smith and Miss M. D. Brock (from Secondary Schools); Mr. J. W. Samuel and Miss C. M. A. Coombs (from Elementary Schools). Law: Sir Reginald Acland, K.C. Literature: Mr. W. Pett Ridge and Mr. C. David Stelling. Music: Mr. A. J. Hadrill. Science: Professor W. T. Gordon. Amongst other things, this Committee is at present organising another Scientific Novelties Exhibition at King's College after Christmas, and another set of Lectures and Counter-Lectures at the London School of Economics in the spring. On the side of definite propaganda it has already issued a leaflet, with a foreword by Mr. Pett Ridge, answering questions about the present financial position of the Hospitals of London, and it is also ready to arrange for lectures in schools and elsewhere. One of the general objects of this propaganda is to bring the Hospitals before people, not only or even chiefly as institutions appealing for subscriptions, but as a very important factor in our social organisation, doing essential work both for the sick poor and for the health of the whole community, and to inculcate in the mind of the public generally a greater sense of responsibility for the regular and systematic support of the Hospitals on these grounds. I feel very grateful to these busy men and women whose work for the Combined Appeal has only made them want to come and do more. These movements have already had considerable success in interesting in the work of the Fund not only individuals, but also learned societies and other bodies who are aiding the various activities I have mentioned. I am particularly pleased that there has been, amongst the members of the Council of the Fund, such a generous response to the suggestions I threw out at the Annual Meeting in June. I am sure it helps when people see that the members of the Fund show their confidence in it by being themselves subscribers. In these efforts our object, as always, is to assist the Hospitals and the other Central Agencies, not to compete with them. The Central Agencies now include the new Hospital Saving Association for organised contributions from

employers and employees. Between us all we ought to be able to cover the whole ground. At any rate, it is part of the function of the King's Fund, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, to see so far as we can that the whole ground does get covered, and that all possible sources of new revenue are tapped. If this is done by the efforts of the individual Hospitals and the Central Funds, each in its own sphere, we ought to be able to realise the forecast of Lord Cave's Committee when they said, at the very height of the crisis, when things were much worse than they are now, that it should be "within the power of those having control of our Hospitals to maintain that voluntary system of which we are so justly proud." Another new piece of work has been undertaken by the Fund this year at the request of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. I mean the inquiry by a special Committee, with Sir William Collins as Chairman, into the question of hospital accommodation for accident cases. There was not time enough between the end of the Combined Appeal and the beginning of the ordinary distribution for this inquiry to be finished, but good progress has been made, and we look forward to their report. I should now like to express to the Chairman and members of the Distribution Committee my best thanks, and yours, for all that they have done this year, both in the Combined Appeal Distribution and in the ordinary distribution. I should also wish to thank the Visitors, whose reports provide the Fund with such valuable information. I am sure that we all greatly regret that illness prevents our Secretary, Mr. Maynard, from attending to-day. His invaluable services can ill be spared, and I know you will all unite with me in wishing him a speedy recovery. I now come to the arrangements for 1924. There will not be very many changes of personnel. We have lost by death Earl Farquhar, a member of the Council since the foundation of the Fund in 1897; and Mr. Nathaniel Charles Rothschild, who joined the Finance Committee in 1915, on the death of his father, our first Treasurer. I am pleased to say that we shall not lose the name of Rothschild from our list, as Mr. Lionel de Rothschild has accepted the appointment on the Finance Committee. I regret that Mr. Hopkinson is no longer able to serve on the Hospital Economy Committee, and that Sir Cuthbert Wallace's numerous and important engagements do not permit him to give the time required for the work of the Distribution Committee—and a great amount of time it is to busy members of the medical staffs of great hospitals. They will both, I hope, remain on the Council. I will ask one of the Honorary Secretaries to read the complete list of the Council and the Committees as proposed by me for 1924.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1924.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) presented the complete list of the Council and Committees for 1924.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY), seconded by Lord STANMORE, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1924.

Viscount ULLSWATER, in moving a hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for presiding, alluded to the great care which His Royal Highness took to inform himself upon all the business of the Fund.

Lady AMPHILL, in seconding the vote, said that everyone must realise what His Royal Highness' presence at the Council meant to the Fund.

The motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, April 1, 1924.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and Report for the year 1923, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, April 1, at 11.30. In the unavoidable absence of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales (President of the Fund) the Earl of Donoughmore was in the Chair.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1923.

LORD REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1923, said he had the

honour to present the Accounts for the year 1923. These would be found to give particulars of entries which could be classified under two headings: they specified the amounts received from the Combined Appeal for distribution through the King's Fund, and also the ordinary receipts and distribution of the King's Fund itself. The conspicuous success of the Combined Appeal, which was opened in April 1922, resulted in a total distribution of just over £418,000. The special distribution to hospitals through the King's Fund amounted to £365,000, of which £115,000 was distributed in 1923. The income of the King's Fund itself had benefited by the receipt of a considerable sum in dividends on the bequests of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland. There was also, he was glad to report, an increase in Annual Subscriptions. The invested funds had been increased by a further £175,000 received from the estate of the late Sir Thomas Sutherland, £11,000 from the estate of Mr. H. H. Wills, and £2,000 in smaller sums. Other legacies amounted to £48,000, an amount rather smaller than that received in 1922. Nevertheless, they had been enabled to distribute £235,000, an increase of £15,000 over 1922, the whole of which sum had been provided out of receipts for the year. He felt sure that the Council would agree that that result was very satisfactory, for a steady increase in the annual distribution of the King's Fund would be of the greatest value in the re-establishment of Voluntary Hospital finance. He begged to move the adoption of the Accounts.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts having been seconded by LORD MILDMAY, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (LORD STUART OF WORTLEY) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1923.

SIR FREDERICK FRY having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put and carried unanimously.

AMBULANCE CASES DISPOSAL COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee (SIR WILLIAM COLLINS), in presenting the Report of the Committee, said that the Committee was appointed by the President in June of last year with a reference prescribed by the Council at the instance of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. He hoped and thought the Committee had fully discharged the relatively limited reference which was remitted to it. It was not asked to report on the whole ambulance service of London nor to deal with the question of relations between Poor Law Institutions and Voluntary Hospitals, nor the extension of services inside London to the adjacent districts. The reference was limited to the method of ascertaining where bed accommodation was available for accident cases requiring admission as in-patients, and the suggestion that daily reports of vacant beds should be supplied to the police and ambulance authorities. He was glad to say the Report was a unanimous one, and no one could have presided over a more harmonious committee.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (LORD STUART OF WORTLEY) presented a Report of the Committee on the Report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee, recommending—

- i. That copies of the Report be forwarded to the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, to the Minister of Health, to the Police and Ambulance Authorities, and to the Voluntary Hospitals and Infirmarys concerned;

- ii. That the Report be published to enable the parties concerned to consider the report and recommendations of the Committee;
- iii. That the best thanks of the Council be tendered to Sir William Collins and to the other members of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee for their work in connection with the inquiry and the report.

The recommendation, having been seconded by PROFESSOR WINIFRED CULLIS, was carried unanimously.

MESSAGE FROM THE KING.

The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE then said:—My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—My duty is to read two messages. The first is a gracious message from His Majesty the King, signed by His Majesty's own hand.

“Buckingham Palace.

“I congratulate the Council on the steady increase in the resources and annual grants of the Fund. These results have, I know, been attained by efficient management and zealous effort on the part of all our workers. It is a matter of great satisfaction that to-day we are able to see a general improvement in the position of the hospitals. May this progress continue.

“GEORGE R.I.

I think I may say we all appreciate that very gracious message with great gratitude.

LETTER FROM THE PRINCE OF WALES.

The following letter is addressed to myself, and signed by His Royal Highness, our President:—

“St. James's Palace, S.W.

“March 31, 1924.

“DEAR LORD DONOUGHMORE,—I greatly regret that, owing to the doctor's advice, I am precluded from attending to-morrow. May I, therefore, put what I have to say in your hands, as Chairman of the Meeting? I dealt with most of the events of 1923 at the Distribution Meeting in December, and they are all covered by the Annual Report which is before the Council. I will confine myself to three or four new points. First, I am glad to see that we paid our way in 1923, although we distributed £235,000, or £15,000 more than in 1922. This is a little better than our estimates, and means real progress. We are all very grateful to Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee for their care of our investments, the income from which is so important to the annual distribution. Since the end of the year another large legacy has been notified, under the wills of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. This makes a further addition to the list of testators who have entrusted their charitable gifts to the King's Fund, thus assisting more than 150 hospitals and convalescent homes. Besides this, a few days ago we received an anonymous donation of £5,000, and yesterday another of £7,000, both from donors who have helped the Fund in the same way in the past. My best thanks, and yours, are due for both these munificent gifts so unexpectedly received. Then I have some good news about the progress of the hospitals themselves. The gap between income and expenditure, taking all the London hospitals

as a whole, is still closing year by year. For the year 1920, the very worst year of all, the gap, omitting all special distributions, was £383,000; for 1922 it was £174,000; for 1923, it is too early as yet to give the exact figures; but it is already clear that the hospitals, taken as a whole, have done better still. With the aid of exceptionally large legacies at two or three big hospitals, there is actually a net aggregate surplus, but, even without these legacies, the gap, for the year 1923, would be very nearly closed. It is this steady progress, going on now for three years without a break, that is so hopeful. Of course, this does not mean that the hospitals and the public can go to sleep in the belief that everything will come right of itself. The hospitals will still have to keep up their income at a figure nearly two and a-half times what it was before the war, and they also have to be constantly adopting the latest improvements, and extending their work, in order to keep pace with the needs of the patients and the developments of medical science. These necessary changes are often very expensive. Then, again, the figures I have referred to are aggregate figures, and, while there is this steady general improvement, there are a good many individual hospitals that still have deficits, and at some of these the financial position continues to give rise to serious anxiety. Since the close of the Combined Appeal, the King's Fund has been trying various new methods of helping the hospitals. I mentioned in December the Committee for Propaganda, which the Revenue Committee had set up under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham. This Committee has been very active in several ways, designed partly to bring in money, partly to enlist the help of new friends, and partly to keep before the public the facts about the King's Fund and the hospitals, and thus to gain for them intelligent, and therefore permanent, support. The following new members have recently been added to Lord Burnham's Committee: Canon Westlake, Sir Landon Ronald, and Mr. Nigel Playfair. The Hospital Economy Committee have issued a circular on Quantity Statistics, a system which helps the hospitals to ensure that their expenditure is directed to getting the best results. This is part of the movement for developing the business side of hospital administration; always remembering that, with a hospital, the business side, though very necessary, is only one side. The King's Fund, being itself part of the voluntary hospital system, is not likely to forget this. Another important subject before the Council to-morrow is the report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee. Put very briefly, this deals with the best method of finding a vacant bed for an accident case that needs to be taken into a hospital or infirmary for treatment as an in-patient. This is a question the King's Fund took up, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, on a request from the Minister of Health through the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. As you will see from the Report, it is a matter that concerns various public bodies and institutions, besides the voluntary hospitals. The Council are not asked to come to any decision to-morrow, but only to send the Report to the Minister of Health and the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, and to publish it for the consideration of the parties concerned. The Committee have gone into the question very thoroughly, and their Report deserves, and will need, careful study. I should like to express my personal thanks to the Committee for their work, and particularly to Sir William Collins, their Chairman, who has had a great deal of experience, extending over many years, in questions relating to the ambulance service of London. The death of Sir John Tweedy in January last is a serious loss to the Fund. He had been a member of the Council for many years, and was at one time Chairman of the Distribution Committee. We have also to regret the death of Sir Reginald

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO CONVALESCENT HOMES NOT ATTACHED TO PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

1. The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £2,000; the amount distributed to such Convalescent Homes in 1922 was £1,615. For the reasons set out in the Report on the Distribution to Hospitals, grants to the Recovery and Convalescent branches of Hospitals (which amounted to £3,385 in 1922) are now combined with the grants to the parent Hospitals.

2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 40, as against 41 last year.

3. In dealing with the applications the Committee have given special attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

Acland, who had only recently become an active member of Lord Burnham's Committee for Propaganda. As you know, I shall be away from England again for part of the summer. Under the Act of Incorporation, the Council and Committees of the King's Fund cannot legally carry on without the constant co-operation of the President, any more than the President can do the work without a Council or Committees. The Act gets round this difficulty by allowing me to delegate my powers, and I propose to appoint a committee for the purpose, consisting of yourself, Lord Cave, and the Governor of the Bank of England. I shall leave the powers of the President in the hands of this committee with entire confidence, as I have been able to do with similar committees in the past.

The BISHOP OF LONDON, in moving a vote of thanks to the Earl of Donoughmore for presiding, said he was very sorry the Prince of Wales was unable to attend, but his letter showed what a deep interest His Royal Highness took in every detail of the work. He was sure everyone would be very much struck by that.

The President of the Royal College of Physicians (SIR HUMPHRY ROLLESTON) having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said he was sure his colleagues would join with him in thanking His Royal Highness for the honour he had done them, in delegating to them his powers as President during his absence abroad.

The proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. A new principle has been adopted this year in drawing the distinction between the distribution to Hospitals and the distribution to Convalescent Homes. The grants to Convalescent or Recovery Institutions which are attached to particular Hospitals of London are now included with the grants to the parent Hospitals, and the separate distribution to Convalescent Homes is confined to institutions which are not branches of a Hospital.

2. The new procedure arose out of an inquiry by the Hospital Economy Committee into the relation between Hospitals, Homes of Recovery, and Convalescent Homes. Lord Cave's Committee had suggested that the provision of auxiliary Hospitals on the outskirts of cities for cases no longer requiring constant medical or surgical supervision might prove an economical method of increasing hospital accommodation, and the Hospitals which had already established recovery branches were anxious that the King's Fund should recognise the difference between these branches and ordinary convalescent homes.

As a result of the consideration of the whole question by the Hospital Economy, Distribution, and Management Committees, and after visits to the existing recovery branches, it was decided to adopt the above-mentioned principle of amalgamating the maintenance grants to the recovery and convalescent branches with the maintenance grants to the parent Hospitals, and, in determining the amount of the combined grant, to have regard to the extent to which the work at the branch approximated to hospital work on the one hand, or to purely convalescent work on the other hand. Hence the new procedure described in the preceding paragraph.

3. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst Hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £233,000. The amount distributed last year at the ordinary distribution was £215,000 to Hospitals and £3,385 in separate grants to recovery and convalescent branches.

4. For the fourth year in succession the Distribution Committee have been concerned not only with the ordinary distribution but with the distribution of special funds in connection with the Hospital crisis. In June last the King's Fund made a final distribution of £115,000 out of the proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal, £150,000 having already been distributed in August 1922 and £100,000 in October 1922. The

Distribution Committee's report on the whole of this special distribution of £365,000 was published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for 1922. A sum of £5,000 which has since been received from the Combined Appeal is included in the present ordinary distribution.

5. The number of Hospitals applying for grants out of the ordinary distribution is 116, as against 112 in 1922, applications having been received from the Medical Mission of the Good Shepherd (Babies' Ward), Hoxton; Mount Vernon Hospital, Fitzroy Square and Northwood; North Islington Infant Welfare Wards; and St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

6. The need of maintenance grants continues to be the first consideration, and the Distribution Committee have therefore again limited the grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure to cases where the work is particularly urgent, and is within a reasonable distance of being carried out. The total amount of such grants recommended this year is £30,100, as against £26,500 in 1922. The total grants to maintenance out of the ordinary distribution amount to £202,900, as against £188,500 in 1922 to Hospitals and £3,385 to their branches.

7. The Committee have again notified the Hospitals that, in the present state of Hospital finance, it will only be in exceptional circumstances that they will be prepared to consider new schemes of improvement or extension, particularly when the provision of additional beds for in-patients is contemplated. The Committee have also notified the Hospitals that the Fund, like Lord Cave's Committee, regards the establishment of a recovery branch as a form of extension.

8. Several of the schemes to which the Fund has made grants in the past are still deferred owing to financial difficulties, and the Distribution Committee recommend that the following grants be renewed:—

City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Heart and Lungs, £1,000 to improvements.

East Ham Hospital, £500 to rebuilding.

French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £4,000 to rebuilding.

Hornsey Cottage Hospital, £500 to extension.

London Lock Hospital, £3,500 balance of grants to reconstruction of the Harrow Road Hospital.

Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital, £3,100 to new out-patient department and other improvements.

Royal National Orthopaedic Hospital, £1,000 to extension of out-patient department.

St. Monica's Hospital, £60 to improvements.

St. Thomas's Hospital, £3,750 to extension of nurses' dining-room, and £1,000 to improvements.

9. The Distribution Committee have again made use of the analysis of hospital income in the Statistical Report, and have received from the Revenue Committee useful reports in certain cases where the amount collected from the public bore an unusually small proportion to the amount contributed by the Central Funds.

10. In dealing with cases of exceptionally high cost the Distribution Committee have been greatly indebted to the Hospital Economy Committee, who examined all the replies to the remarks on this subject attached to last year's grants, and the observations received from Hospitals, in response to the annual invitation of the Fund, on the figures in this year's Statistical Report. They also supplied the Distribution Committee with a large number of suggestions for remarks to be attached to the grants this year. The remarks deal in many cases with the advantage to be derived from the use of records of quantities consumed, as described in a memorandum recently issued by the Fund.

11. The reports of the Visitors have again been of great value to the Committee. In many instances the Committee recommend that extracts from the reports should be forwarded to the Hospital Committees for their observations. In several cases improvements reported to the Fund by the Visitors as desirable have been made the subject of special grants.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C. 4.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the six standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 to 3.

Since July 1921 the Fund, by the invitation of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, has acted as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance, and is actively engaged in promoting schemes for this purpose.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes

or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 72).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-seven years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £4,636,854, including £365,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3, to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1923 being £235,000, in addition to £115,000 on account of the proceeds of the Combined Appeal.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 5s. 6d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over 3d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £353,500 to the Fund during the last twenty-five years, the contribution in 1923 being £14,500.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on p. 72). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable

savings. The Hospitals are being encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Pensions for Hospital Officers; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control; Hospital Accommodation for Ambulance Cases.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
