ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1929.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

- I. Last year's report referred to the fact that the Annual Meeting in June, 1929, at which the Report was adopted, saw the shadow of the King's illness in great measure removed. The Council now have the pleasure to record with deep thankfulness His Majesty's restoration to health and strength. It is fitting, therefore, that the chief event in the history of the King's Fund during the year should have been the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery, which was organised jointly by King Edward's Hospital Fund and the National Radium Fund and by which the King's Fund will have received, besides the initial gift of £105,000 from "Audax" for investment, a total of £115,000 available for immediate distribution in December, 1929, in special grants to hospitals, and £37,000 for the purchase of Radium.
- 2. The year had already seen the establishment of the King's Fund as the principal Radium-holding body for London, £50,000 worth of Radium having been purchased during the year with the gift of Sir Otto Beit, and allocated to hospitals by way of loan.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

- 3. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1929 were £535,435 3s. 8d.
- 4. Of this, £115,000 was received from the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery, besides £15,000 to capital, being the first instalment of the munificent gift of "Audax" payable under a seven-years' agreement; £24,536 16s. 2d. as a special donation in the form of securities from an anonymous donor; £7,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £68,445 13s. 8d. from general legacies; £10,464 4s. 5d. from gifts to capital, other than that of "Audax"; £60,789 10s. 6d. for the purchase of Radium, including £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit and £10,000

from Mr. Roger C. Parr; and £234,198 18s. 11d. from general receipts. These general receipts were made up as follows:—

- 7. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. These reports are of great value to the Distribution Committee, and the Council are very grateful to the visitors for their assistance.
- 8. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,601,624. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £6,488,040 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 9. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, Princess Mary Countess of Harewood, the Duke of Connaught and other members of the Royal Family.
- 10. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from Sir Thomas P. Latham, Bt., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Lloyds Bank, Limited, and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £525 from the Westminster Bank, Limited; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Mr. George Roberts, and from "W.C.W."; and donations of £1,000 from Lord Glendyne; of £500 from Captain Sir Charles L. Cust, Bt., R.N., from "J.R.B.," from Mr. Edwin Radford, and from the Goldsmiths' Company; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D.," and from Captain T. P. Hall; and anonymous donations of £24,536 16s. 2d., of £1,500, of £500 and of £400. The Fund also received munificent gifts of £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit, Bt., and £10,000 from Mr. Roger C. Parr, for the purchase of Radium.
- 11. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £17,000, the same as in the previous year. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation is now £449,000, apart from grants made by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League for this valuable assistance, derived from contributions by a large number of individual donors.
- 12. Legacies received during the year included £29,241 16s. 10d. from the estate of the late Mr. Walter George Nicol, being a share of residue; £20,000 from the estate of the late Rev. Henry Swann, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £45,000 received to date); £7,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £523,013 4s. 6d. received to date); £4,827 16s. 9d from the estate of

the late Mr. William Vigours Reade-Morris, being a bequest of residue; £2,500 from the estate of the late Mr. John Braidwood Gray; £2,369 12s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Adelia Augusta Louisa Walker, further on account of share of residue (making a total sum of £24,594 12s. 7d. received to date); £2,120 from the estate of the late Colonel Henry Doughty, further on account of share of residue (making a total sum of £11,320 received to date); £1,526 14s. 5d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £364,793 4s. 1od. received to date, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); £1,131 19s. 1od. from the estate of the late Mr. Peter Boyd Moodie, being a share of residue; £1,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Sylvia May Gordon Carthew, and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Virginia Schilizzi. The Fund is also very grateful to the Trustees of the estate of the late Mr. J. E. A. Harrison-Smith, and the Trustees of the estate of the late Sir Edwin Evans, and the Executor of the late Miss Eleanor E. Fox, for gifts of £500, £200 and £50, respectively, in the exercise of their discretionary powers.

FAMILY FUNDS.

13. Mr. H. W. Marshall has made a further generous gift of £13,000 Japanese 4% Bonds to the Marshall Fund, which he founded in 1927 by a donation of £10,000 $3\frac{1}{2}$ % Conversion Stock, 1961, and which was augmented in 1928 by a bequest of £3,711 17s. 1d. by the late Miss Elizabeth Augusta Marshall. This "family fund" now amounts to a total of £20,274 7s. 1d.

EXPENSES.

14. During the year expenses amounted to £13,930 12s. od., or about $6\frac{1}{4}$ d. per £1 of the total received.

THE THANK-OFFERING FUND FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.

- 15. The occasion for the opening of the Thank-offering Fund was the King's gracious message to his people on April 22 which marked the end of the long period of public anxiety.
- 16. The decision to open a Thank-offering Fund was the result of a gift of £105,000 sent to Lord Stamfordham on April 24 by an anonymous donor under the name of "Audax," who stated in his covering letter that he would like to help some cause which had in a special degree the King's personal sympathy and interest, and which was of lasting benefit to the community; that the most appropriate object appeared to him to be King Edward's Hospital Fund for London; and that he hoped his gift would form the nucleus of a large Thank-offering fund.
- 17. There was also in preparation a Thank-offering appeal organised by the National Radium Fund and about to be issued by "The Times"; and it was decided by mutual agreement that the two should be combined as one Fund with a Hospital section and a Radium section.

- 18. The amount appealed for by the Radium section was received within a few days. The King's Fund section was thereupon extended to include contributions earmarked for hospitals outside London, and was continued on this basis throughout the summer.
- 19. The total amount received when the closing of the Thank-offering Fund was announced in November amounted to £479,119. Of this, £150,000 was earmarked for the National Radium Fund, and enabled that Fund to secure a Government grant of £100,000 offered on a £ for £ basis; £91,710 was earmarked for individual hospitals; and the amount received by the King's Fund (after including some further sums subsequently received) came to £257,000.
- 20. Of the amount received by the King's Fund, the Council decided that £105,000, the gift of "Audax," should be invested in accordance with his wish; £37,000 consisted of donations earmarked for Radium; and £115,000 was made the subject of a special distribution to hospitals on the books of the King's Fund, in aid of schemes of extension or improvement or towards the reduction of deficits on schemes that had recently been carried out.
- 21. At the December meeting of the Council full reports were presented conveying the thanks of the Fund to "Audax" for his munificent gift, to "The Times" for the way in which it had placed its resources at the disposal not only of the Radium section but of the Thank-offering Fund as a whole, and to all who had helped to make the Fund a success; giving the list of special grants recommended by the Distribution Committee; and expressing the view that it had been a privilege for the King's Fund to be associated with so many others in the movement of gratitude at the termination of the long period of national anxiety.
- 22. The Council also presented an Address, which the King was graciously pleased to accept, enclosing the reports on the origin, history and results of the Thank-offering Fund, referring to the very large sum represented by the grand total of all the Thank-offering Funds throughout the country, and tendering the loyal and heartfelt congratulations of the Council upon His Majesty's happy restoration to health, strength and duty.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

23. Last year's Report recorded the gift by Sir Otto Beit of £50,000 for the purchase of Radium to be lent to hospitals in London. During the first half of 1929 the whole of the 4 grammes purchased with this gift was allocated amongst 20 hospitals. By the end of the year sufficient additional money had become available to justify the Fund in deciding to exercise an option for the purchase of 6 more grammes. This was due to the receipt of £37,000 earmarked for Radium through the Thank-offering Fund, and to a donation of £10,000 for the purpose from Mr. Roger Parr; and there remained a sum to be raised for which specially earmarked donations would be very welcome.

- 24. In allocating the Radium purchased with Sir Otto Beit's gift the Distribution Committee adopted the policy of securing that a few hospitals should have a sufficient quantity to act as "Radium centres," able not only to treat their own patients but also to supply emanations to other hospitals if they so decide, and that a rather larger number should have enough to treat their own patients.
- 25. In all cases the conditions attached to the loans were designed to secure the safe custody of the Radium; the avoidance of danger to the patients and to the operators; the application of the loaned Radium by the staffs of the hospitals in approved containers, and for the maximum number of hours in the year; and the other special object mentioned by Sir Otto Beit, namely, the association of the "cure of disease and the alleviation of suffering" with "a keen interest in the furtherance of knowledge."
- 26. At the end of the year preparations were being made for the allocation of the additional Radium upon the same principles.
- 27. The King's Fund, having thus been charged with the responsibility for so large a quantity of Radium, with its immense possibilities, its still only partly-known dangers, and its novel and ever-developing technique, had special reason to welcome the movement which began with the Report of the Radium Sub-committee of the Civil Research Committee. This movement has led to the formation of the National Radium Fund of £250,000 by means of the Thank-offering Fund and the Government grant, of the National Radium Trust which holds the Radium purchased with this money, and of the National Radium Commission which is responsible for its allocation and use. Already before the end of the year the King's Fund, on the invitation of the National Radium Commission, had taken part in a conference of Radium-holding bodies to consider methods of co-operation in the best interests of all concerned. Interchange of expert information on the technical questions involved has been secured between the Fund and the Commission by the fact that Professor Russ, who had been acting as adviser to the King's Fund during the year, had also been selected as scientific secretary to the Commission.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS AND THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT.

- 28. The special Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee was appointed in November, 1928, to consider what steps should be taken to secure, both during the consideration of the Local Government Bill by Parliament and subsequently, that every endeavour should be made to maintain the existence of the voluntary hospitals as an essential part of the hospital system after the transfer of the Poor Law Hospitals to the County Authorities.
- 29. During the first three months of the year the Committee devoted their energies to securing that the Act itself should recognise the importance of retaining the voluntary element

in the hospital service of the country, and should create machinery for co-operation between the rate-supported hospitals and the voluntary hospitals. This principle was ultimately embodied in Section 13 of the Act, which provides for consultation between the county authorities and the voluntary hospitals serving their areas.

- 30. During the remainder of the year the Committee assisted in working out a scheme of voluntary hospital representation for the County of London for the purposes of consultation with the London County Council. The scheme was actually prepared by a Joint Committee representing the King's Fund Committee, the Teaching Hospitals, and the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, under the chairmanship of Sir Cooper Perry. By the end of the year a draft of the scheme had been circulated to the hospitals for their observations, and had also been submitted to the London County Council.
- 31. The assistance of the special Committee has also been at the disposal, where required, of hospitals in the King's Fund area outside the County of London.
- 32. Immediately after the passing of the Act, the special Committee published a memorandum on the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Bill. This memorandum explained the special features of the voluntary hospital system and their importance to the full efficiency of both branches of the hospital service, and also discussed various questions that might arise in the working out of methods of co-operation. At the end of the year the Committee had in contemplation a memorandum, for the use of hospitals, on the powers and duties of the County authorities under the Act.
- 33. Since many of those subjects affected the whole country, the Committee was frequently working in consultation, not only with the London hospitals, but also, through the British Hospitals Association, with all the extra-Metropolitan hospitals. Some of its members, including its Chairman, the Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, are themselves closely associated with hospitals outside London.
- 34. At the end of the year it was decided to change the name of the Committee to the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee, and to extend its powers to cover the interests of voluntary hospitals in connection with any Bill or Act.

HOSPITALS AND ROAD ACCIDENTS.

35. On December 18, 1929, during the Committee stage of the Road Traffic Bill in the House of Lords, Lord Luke, one of the Honorary Secretaries of the King's Fund, moved an amendment providing that a policy of insurance should insure payment for hospital treatment up to a maximum of £25. At the end of the year the question of the final form of the amendment was awaiting the attention of the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee of the Fund.

Pensions for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

- 36. It was reported at the Council meeting in December that the Federated Superannuation scheme had been adopted by hospitals in London containing 13,000 beds, or nearly 75% of the total number; besides hospitals containing 17,000 beds in other parts of Great Britain.
- 37. The grants from the King's Fund in aid of the expenditure of hospitals in London under the scheme amounted to £13,734. This was provided, as in 1928, not at the expense of the ordinary distribution, but out of legacies unexpectedly received after the amount of the distribution was fixed. A further sum from the same source has been placed to a special reserve to assist in providing for the pensions grants in future years.

PAY BEDS IN VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.

- 38. In May the King's Fund published a pamphlet giving particulars of pay beds in the London hospitals at weekly charges suited to the financial circumstances of members of the professional and middle classes unable to pay the usual nursing home fees. The information was taken from the Report of the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund, with the changes necessary to bring it up to date. The number of pay beds had increased during 12 months from 1,055 at 80 hospitals to 1,154 at 88 hospitals, and further hospital extensions including beds of this kind have since been completed and opened.
- 39. The Report of the Pay Beds Committee contained a section dealing with insurance schemes whereby members of the professional and middle classes could provide beforehand for the cost of maintenance and even of treatment in a pay bed in the event of severe illness or operation. A scheme which would include provision for the capital cost of additional pay beds has been prepared by the British Provident Association and submitted to the King's Fund for its opinion, and was being considered by the Management Committee at the end of the year.

RECOVERY HOMES.

40. Ever since 1923, when the Hospital Economy Committee, following up the various suggestions made by Lord Cave's Committee, made a special report on the subject, the King's Fund has encouraged the establishment of recovery branches in the country as being an alternative method of hospital extension offering many advantages from the point of view of the efficient treatment of the patients. The grants made by the Fund in respect of recovery work, for patients who would otherwise be in the parent hospital, are on a larger scale than those given in aid of merely convalescent work, for patients who would otherwise have gone home. In July last a joint sub-committee of the Distribution Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee paid one of its periodical visits to the existing recovery branches, in order to bring up to date the information on which this distinction is based.

FISHER BEQUEST.

- 41. Early in the year, the executors of a Devonshire testatrix, the late Mrs. B. E. Fisher, desiring to allocate part of a discretionary fund to the assistance of hospitals in London, asked the King's Fund for advice. They were specially interested in additions to equipment, particularly scientific equipment. The Fund accordingly asked its Visitors to report any needs of this kind which they might notice on their visits. These reports were sent to the executors, who have made grants amounting to £11,362 15s. amongst 46 hospitals.
- 42. The Council are pleased to have been able thus to make the resources of the Fund available for the assistance of the executors and the hospitals, and are grateful to their Visitors for the extra work they undertook.

BEQUEST OF A CONVALESCENT HOME.

43. An anonymous testator has notified his intention to bequeath to the King's Fund a house for use as a convalescent home, together with a sum of money towards its endowment. The Home is to be used, in the first instance, for the patients of a hospital named by him, but under conditions which will enable the Fund to ensure that his wishes are permanently carried out.

REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

44. Although the Revenue Committee were mainly occupied with the Thank-offering Fund during a great part of the year, the general activities of the Propaganda Committee continued unabated. Its aims were indeed furthered, rather than hindered, by the public attention attracted by the Thank-offering Fund to the work of the hospitals and of the King's Fund. In the absence of Lord Burnham on the business of the Indian Statutory Commission, Lord Luke has been serving as acting Chairman.

PERSONNEL.

45. The Fund suffered a severe and wholly unexpected loss by the sudden death in April, 1929, of Lord Revelstoke. His services to the Fund were recorded in the following resolution passed by the Management Committee and reported to the Annual Meeting of the Council in June:—

"The Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Lord Revelstoke, Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee since 1915. He had been a Member of the Finance Committee since 1906, of the General Council since 1908, and of the Management Committee since its formation in 1922. During the whole period he watched over the financial interests of the Fund and the care of its investments with all the knowledge and skill for which he was distinguished. By his sudden death his colleagues in its administration have been deprived of his valued co-operation in their work, to which he rendered devoted service.

"The Management Committee desire also to tender to the members of his family their sincere condolences in their bereavement."

- 46. The Fund also lost by death the services of Viscount Finlay, a member of the Council since 1921 and of the President's Powers Committee on several occasions; of Viscount Mersey, Chairman of the Committee of Inquiry into the Out-patient Question in 1911–12, and a Member of the Council since 1925; and of Mr. Yvon Eccles, who had been connected with the Fund since 1909, first as a Visitor and subsequently as a Member of the Distribution Committee and of the Council.
- 47. The Council regret the resignations at the end of 1929 of Viscount Ullswater, who had been a Member of the Council since 1908 and was one of the three Governors appointed by His Majesty the King to exercise the powers of President during the nine years 1910 to 1919 and had since served on a President's Power Committee; and of Dr. Barber, who had been on the Council since 1921.
- 48. Mr. E. R. Peacock was appointed by His Royal Highness the President as Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee; Lord Luke, who as Chairman of the Revenue Committee, had the greatest share of the work of the Thank-offering Fund, was appointed an Honorary Secretary; and when Mr. Whitley, Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee, went to India on Government business, Lord Macmillan accepted the post of Vice-Chairman.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1930.

49. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales summed up the present position in his speech at the Council meeting in December, 1929, when he said:

"If we stay at £250,000 for more than these two years, we shall not be able to do our duty to the hospitals. For they do not stand still. They add more beds every year. It is true that their income also increases. It has now reached the huge figure of £3,400,000 a year in London alone. Taken as a whole, it covers their expenditure . . . But next year, if we are to meet the continuing demand that comes from the annual increase in hospital work and expenditure, we simply must increase the ordinary distribution beyond the £250,000."

50. The continued services of the Press in helping to make known the public work of the Fund are greatly appreciated by the Council.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 17, 1929.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, including the Thank-offering Fund distribution, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, December 17, 1929, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

ORDER OF APPOINTMENT.

Mr. Leonard L. Cohen (Honorary Secretary) reported that His Royal Highness had appointed Mr. Eardley Holland, F.R.C.S., F.R.C.P., a member of the Council.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council, was received with acclamation, said :---

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—It is my duty first of all and my honour to read the following gracious message from His Majesty the King, our Patron :—

"Buckingham Palace.

"The King is glad to hear that King Edward's Hospital Fund is again able to distribute \$\omega_{250,000}\$ and that the hospitals will also benefit so greatly by the Thank-offering Fund.

His Majesty wishes the Council every success during the coming year.

(Signed) STAMFORDHAM."

This is our distribution meeting, and, if I take as my text that impressive little table at the end of the Distribution Committee's list of grants, and the different sums of which the total is made up, I shall have covered nearly all the chief activities of the King's Fund during the year. The grand total of grants is given by the Committee as "£378,734, besides the allocation of Radium purchased with Sir Otto Beit's gift of £50,000." Add this in, and the total dealt with by the Committee this year is £428,734. This is, made up of four parts: the ordinary distribution, the special grants towards the Pensions Scheme, the Thank-offering Fund, and the Radium.

The ordinary distribution is again £250,000. Last year, when we first reached the round quarter-million, we spoke of it as a milestone where it might be good policy to rest awhile, lest we should go too fast and perhaps be forced to retreat. But, when we look at the Distribution Committee's Report, we see that, if we stay at £250,000 for more than these two years, we shall not be able to do our duty to the hospitals. For they do not stand still. They add more beds every year. It is true that their income also increases. It has now reached the huge figure of £3,400,000 a year in London alone. Taken as a whole, it covers their expenditure. Several of them, however, are in temporary difficulties, because legacies, which are always uncertain, have shown one of their "downward fluctuations," as the Distribution Committee call it. So, for these two reasons, we have to make larger grants to maintenance. We can meet the exceptional demand this year, because of the Thank-offering Fund. But next year, if we are to meet the continuing demand that comes from the annual increase in hospital work and expenditure, we simply must increase the ordinary distribution beyond the £250,000. Next come the special pension grants. These amount to more than last year. This is because more hospitals have adopted the Scheme, and more nurses and officers have joined. Taking the country as a whole, the Scheme now covers almost exactly 30,000 beds. In London it covers nearly 75 per cent. of the total number of beds. But the growth of the Scheme adds to hospital expenditure, and larger grants are needed from the King's Fund.

I now come to the Thank-offering Fund itself. The Management Committee's Report describes its origin and results. The Distribution Committee deal with the use to be made of the proceeds. The amount available for the King's Fund is £220,000. Of this, £105,000 represents the splendid gift of "Audax" to inaugurate the Thank-offering Fund. This will be invested. It will stand permanently on our books, as a memorial of this great occasion, and of his generosity. The other £115,000 is the subject of the special distribution which is before us to-day, in the form of grants in aid of extensions or improvements, either recently carried out or urgently needed. I am glad to see that the list includes a large grant to the new hospital, in the extreme East of Greater London, to which the King has given his name—King George Hospital. It is by relieving the ordinary distribution of part of the demand for grants towards capital expenditure that the Thank-offering Fund has enabled us to give more this year towards maintenance expenditure. This £220,000 is, as you will have seen from Lord

Donoughmore's statement, only a fraction of the sums subscribed to Thank-offering Funds all over the country. If we include the gifts earmarked for individual institutions, and the amount collected for radium, and the separate Thank-offering Funds, the whole comes to a very large total indeed. I find it difficult to express my own feelings when I contemplate this great movement, so spontaneous, so widespread, and so beneficent, to celebrate an event which touches me so closely. Take the gift of "Audax" alone, and think of what his thank-offering of £105,000 means in the way of loyalty, generosity and public spirit. I am grateful to him for having selected the King's Fund as an appropriate object, not only because of the number and importance of the separate hospitals which it assists, and the good use it makes of its influence, but also because of its close association with the King, who was for nine years its active President. All the same, I think it was right to allow the alternative of earmarking, which gave opportunities to donors outside London who were specially interested in local hospitals. The Radium Section provided, on a national scale, the means for a great advance in medical treatment and research; and thus met an emergency which happened to arise at the same moment as the King's recovery. The co-operation between the King's Fund section and the National Radium Fund section was, I think, unique in the history of such efforts. It was, of course, a unique occasion, and one on which co-operation was peculiarly appropriate, and competition would have been peculiarly inappropriate. We are deeply grateful to those who worked out the methods of co-operation on behalf of the King's Fund, of the National Radium Fund, and of the Managers of "The Times," who had undertaken to collect the money required for Radium, and who freely gave their assistance to the combined effort.

This brings me to the last item in the Distribution Committee's list: the Radium already purchased by the King's Fund with Sir Otto Beit's munificent gift of £50,000. The whole of the four grammes has been allocated amongst 20 hospitals. The conditions on which it is lent are designed to ensure that good use is made of it, both in the actual treatment of patients and in the spread of knowledge by the publication of results. If it is not fully used it can be withdrawn. As a matter of interest for our Radium Fund, we have this morning received another great gift of £10,000 from Mr. Roger C. Parr, and on your and my own behalf I thank him very sincerely for this most generous gift.

You also have before you to-day a report by the Committee which deals with the effect of the Local Government Act on the hospital system. In this connection again, co-operation is the order of the day. The King's Fund, the Teaching Hospitals, and the British Hospitals Association, have co-operated, by means of a Joint Committee, in devising a representative Voluntary Hospital body for the consultations with the London County Council required by the Act. The object of this representative machinery is itself to facilitate co-operation. For the Joint Committee has aimed not merely at the fulfilment of a statutory obligation, but at providing the means for the continuous consultations and co-operation, between the Voluntary Hospitals and the County Council Hospitals, which Mr. Whitley's Committee recommended as being essential, if the maximum of efficient service for the sick and suffering is to be secured throughout the hospital system.

I have now only to express my thanks to those who have helped to carry on our work during the year. First of all to our donors and subscribers, who gave us the £90,000 a year that we need if we are to keep the distribution up even to the bare £250,000. These include the numerous donors of the £17,000 that comes to us through the League of Mercy. The League also gave the Thank-offering Fund £1,000. Then to some large donors to capital: to Mr. H. W. Marshall, who has given £13,000 Japanese 4 per cent. bonds as a further addition to the Marshall "Family Fund," and, yet once again, to "Audax." Then to those who have given so freely of their time and their abilities; and, particularly, at this meeting, to Sir Cooper Perry. He is Chairman of the Distribution Committee, which has again had to do all the work of an extra distribution. He has also acted as Chairman of the

Joint Committee which drew up the scheme for consultations with the County Council. Then to Mr. Eardley Holland, Chairman of the Radium Sub-Committee, and to Professor Russ, their technical adviser. Then to Lord Donoughmore, the Chairman of the Management Committee, who has also been Treasurer of the Thank-offering Fund. Then to Lord Luke, Chairman of the Revenue Committee, who has acted for the King's Fund throughout all the heavy work that it involved. Then to the British Charities Association, which helped by providing offices and an expert staff. And, in connection with a thanksgiving for the King's recovery, how can I omit to mention Lord Dawson? Lord Luke also took charge of the Propaganda Committee during the absence of Lord Burnham in India. The other Honorary Secretaries, Lord Somerleyton, Mr. Cohen and Colonel Wernher, have all taken their part in the extra work of another exceptionally busy year. The Fund's Visitors, in addition to their ordinary inspection of the hospitals, have made a special inquiry to enable the Distribution Committee to supply some Executors with information to assist them in making a special distribution—a new way for the King's Fund to help the hospitals. And this reminds me of something else that is new. A testator, happily still living and vigorous and most emphatically anonymous, tells us that by his will he is making the King's Fund the permanent landlord, so to speak, of a large house and grounds to be used as a Convalescent Home, and is setting aside a trust fund to help with its maintenance. We have to regret the loss through death of two members of the Council-Lord Mersey, Chairman of the Out-patient Inquiry Committee in 1912, and Mr. Yvon Eccles, who was for many years a member of the Distribution Committee; and also of Lord Blythswood and Mr. Openshaw, who were two of our Visitors.

One final word. I shall be very pleased to sign, as your President, the Address which the Management Committee recommend should be presented to His Majesty, on the subject of the Thank-offering Fund, if it is approved by the Council.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Mr. E. R. Peacock (the Honorary Treasurer) said:—

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—The estimates laid before the Council in November justified a distribution of £250,000 for the second year in succession. But they left no margin over and above the £250,000, and threw no light on the question as to how the special pensions grants were to be provided. It is an understanding that these should, if possible, be provided in such a way as not to affect the ordinary grants. Last year their cost was met from unexpected legacies received after the ordinary distribution had been fixed. This year we are fortunate enough to find ourselves in a similar position. A legacy of £29,000 has been received, and as the pensions grants amount to £13,734, there is every reason to anticipate that they can be covered in the same way as last year, should the Council so decide when the accounts for the year are prepared. Our invested funds have been increased by further sums of £7,000 from the estate of Mr. Samuel Lewis and £1,526 from that of Sir Julius Wernher, and by £15,000, the first of the seven yearly instalments of the gift of £105,000 from "Audax" through the Thank-offering Fund. Taking into account the additions made to general fund legacies since the date of the estimates, the receipts from that source amount to £67,000, a figure almost exactly the same as that of last year. Annual subscriptions are slightly larger. But a smaller amount than usual has been received in donations this year. This is not surprising when we consider how much has been received in that form through the medium of the Thank-offering Fund. However, if we are to continue a distribution of £250,000, and still more if we are to increase it, we must use every endeavour to ensure that the receipts from voluntary sources, which now come to £90,000 a year, shall be at least fully maintained.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord Marshall, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that the League proposed to allocate to the King's Fund the same amount as last year, namely, £17,000. This was in addition to the special donation of £1,000 which the League had the privilege of giving last May to the Thank-offering Fund for the Recovery of His Majesty the King. This made the total for the year £18,000. Since its inception thirty years ago, the League of Mercy had distributed among Voluntary Hospitals £450,034 through King Edward's Hospital Fund and £117,329 through grants to Extra-Metropolitan Hospitals, making a grand total of £567,363.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) and moved the recommendation that the grants be approved (see pages 28 to 31).

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the lists of awards to hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) (see pages 32 to 42).

Lord Ebbisham having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the grants be approved (see page 43).

Colonel H. A. Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals (see pages 44 to 46).

The motion, having been seconded by the Rev. Principal Alfred E. Garvie, D.D., was then put and carried unanimously.

THANK-OFFERING FUND FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) in presenting the Report of the Committee on the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery, said that he did so with profound thankfulness, and would like to say how much they had been encouraged all through by His Royal Highness's own great help and assistance at every stage of the work. He would like to emphasise the fact that the costs of collection had been nil. He formally presented the Report and moved the recommendation that an address be presented in the name of H.R.H. the President and the General Council to the King as Patron of the King's Fund, referring to the origin, history, results and distribution of the Thank-offering Fund, and tendering to His Majesty their loyal congratulations on his recovery, and on his return to the full discharge of his high functions in Church and State (see pages 47 to 51).

Lord Luke having seconded the recommendation, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the Report of the Committee on the Special Distribution out of the Thank-offering Fund, and moved the recommendation that the grants be approved (see pages 51 to 53).

Mr. Leonard L. Cohen (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards out of the Thank-offering Fund (see pages 54 to 57).

The recommendations, having been seconded by Mr. George Roberts, were put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of the Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor (Sir William Waterlow), seconded by Mr. V. Warren Low, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Thursday, December 19.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS AND THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT.

In the absence of the Vice-Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee (The Rt. Hon. Hugh P. Macmillan, K.C.), Sir Edward Penton presented a report describing a draft scheme for a body representative of the Voluntary Hospitals of London to confer with the London County Council, under section 13 of the Local Government Act, and moved the recommendation that the action of the Committee be approved.

Professor Winifred Cullis seconded the motion.

The Chairman of the London County Council (Lord Monk Bretton) said that he thought the London County Council would welcome most cordially the co-operation of the Voluntary Hospitals of London in the extremely difficult and onerous duty of making adequate provision for the sick of London, and he was glad to be able to say that the draft Scheme of representation referred to had been approved by the Central Public Health Committee of the Council, subject to one or two minor observations. It would, of course, in its final form be subject to the approval of the Council itself. It was the well-known policy of the Council for the last twenty years to do everything in its power to promote the welfare of the Voluntary Hospitals of London, and to seek their active co-operation in carrying out the various duties of the Council in connection with the treatment of the sick. For example, in connection with the treatment of school children, tuberculous patients and other diseases, the Council paid annually grants-in-aid to the Voluntary Hospitals of London which amounted to over £100,000. It was, he believed, the intention of the Council to continue those services in the future on the same lines as hitherto, and he thought it was probable that, in connection with their large additional responsibilities as a result of the passing of the Local Government Act of 1929, the Council would be glad to avail itself still further of the valuable assistance which the Voluntary Hospitals had always afforded it in the past, in such matters, for example, as electricity, light and radium treatment, for which the London County Council would have to pay additional grants. He was assuming that this would be their common-sense view of the matter. He was, therefore, very glad to be present at the meeting, believing that the County Council desired that the harmonious co-operation and happy relationship which had always existed between it and the Voluntary Hospitals should not only continue, but, if possible, should be still further extended, in the near future.

Sir William Collins, in supporting the motion, said that, as a member of the County Council for 15 years and its past Chairman, he had repeatedly preached the system of municipalisation in such things as gas and electricity and other impersonal services. But when it came to dealing with sick and injured human beings, he preferred a voluntary system to a municipal system. He trusted that the future of the voluntary system would be safeguarded, whatever might be the progress of municipalisation.

Lord Ebbisham referred to the very important Bill before the House of Lords that day on which a proposal had been made which would be very helpful to the Voluntary Hospitals, and he asked His Royal Highness's permission that Lord Luke might make a statement on the subject.

Lord Luke, in response, said that his amendment to the Motor Traffic Bill would provide that, in the event of a patient being carried to a hospital, the hospital should receive recompense for curing that patient. At the present moment, in regard to more than nine-tenths of those who were taken to hospital, the hospital had to pay. If the amendment were added to the Bill, then in future the compulsory insurance would include up to $\pounds 4$ a week for the hospital for the out-of-pocket expenses, up to a maximum of $\pounds 25$. He would think the motorist would feel more comfortable if he held such a policy.

The recommendation was then put and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1930.

His Royal Highness then said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen—We now come to the arrangements for 1930. Viscount Ullswater finds his hands too full to continue his service on the Council. He first became a member as Speaker of the House of Commons in 1908. From 1910 to 1919 he was one of the three Governors appointed by the King to exercise the powers of President, and in 1919 he served at my request on a President's Powers Committee during my visit overseas. We shall greatly miss his wise advice. Dr. Barber has left London and is unable to continue his membership. I am inviting the Rev. Owen Spencer Watkins to serve in his place. I propose to reappoint all the other members of Council and Committees. There will be a change in the title of the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee. It is now to be called the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee, so that it can consider any other Bills that may affect hospitals. You will be invited to give the Committee those wider powers. Mr. Whitley will remain its Chairman, with Mr. Hugh Macmillan acting as Vice-Chairman. You will remember that I appointed Mr. Macmillan a member of the Council just before your November meeting, and also Dr. Orme, who is already known to many of us as the Chairman of the Distribution Committee of the League of Mercy. During my forthcoming absence in South Africa, I propose to delegate my powers as President to a Committee consisting of the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker of the House of Commons, and the Governor of the Bank of England. I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move the delegation resolutions.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by Mr. John W. Samuel, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1930. These were in the same form as before, except that the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee was to be known in future as the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee and to receive the following extended powers, viz., to consider what steps should be taken to secure that, during the consideration by Parliament of any Bills affecting the Hospital system, every endeavour should be made to maintain the existence of the Voluntary Hospitals as an essential part of that system, and generally to advance the interests of Voluntary Hospitals.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The Marquess of Reading said that he wished to express the thanks of the Council to His Royal Highness for presiding and for the interest that he took in the Fund. Perhaps His Royal Highness did not realise what an encouragement this was to the whole country and to those who were interested in hospitals. Being interested in much smaller ways in the distribution of funds to the hospitals in connection with various charities and charitable funds, he had found it of the greatest use to be able to turn to the distribution which was made with so much care and attention by those who devoted their time and thought to the work of the King's Fund. He had recently advised a friend to leave

his money to King Edward's Hospital Fund because he would find a number of gentlemen there, presided over by His Royal Highness, who devoted all the attention they could, and who were in the best position to judge how to make the best use of the money. He had very great pleasure in proposing the vote of thanks to His Royal Highness.

The BISHOP OF SOUTHWARK having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

His ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings then terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, May 27th, 1930.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, 27 May, 1930, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read the following gracious message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund:—

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

The King watches the progress of King Edward's Hospital Fund with unabated interest.

His Majesty is glad to see that, as the result of the Thank-offering Fund and of the gifts received from Sir Otto Beit and Mr. Roger Parr, the King's Fund has a large supply of radium for loan to hospitals within its area, thus enabling a wider distribution to be made of the radium at the disposal of the National Radium Commission.

The King trusts that the annual income of the King's Fund will continue to grow, so that the financial support given to London hospitals may be increased.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS continued:—This is our Annual Meeting to receive the Accounts and Report for 1929. When we met in December I referred to all the important events of last year. I have always tried to follow the example of the King, my father, when he was the President of the Fund, and make my additional remarks at this meeting very short. But I have always been defeated by the fact that the Fund keeps on taking up fresh work, or having fresh work entrusted to it. The result is that our Agenda contains a number of items of current business which, as President, I have to introduce.

Taking the strictly Annual Meeting business first, you have before you the Accounts for 1929. You will see that they carry out the suggestion made in December by our Treasurer, Mr. Peacock. An exceptional legacy came in late in the year, and we were able, not only to maintain the ordinary distribution at $\pounds 250,000$, but also to provide a considerable sum towards the cost of the special grants, promised for seven years, to hospitals that have joined the pension scheme for nurses and hospital officers. We regard that scheme as very important in the interests of the hospital service and of the whole nursing profession. There is one other item in the Accounts that I should like to mention: an anonymous donation of $\pounds 24,500$ in the form of securities. I have already had my thanks conveyed to the donor privately. I take this opportunity of expressing them publicly. Since the end of the year the capital account has also been augmented by the legacy of $\pounds 90,000$ from the late Lord Revelstoke, our former Treasurer, who devoted so much of his time and ability during his life to the care of our finances.

The Annual Report picks out the two great events of the Fund's year; the Thank-offering Fund for the King's recovery, and the purchase of radium for loan to hospitals. The amount received by the King's Fund from the Thank-offering Fund when it was closed in November was £257,000. This included the magnificent gift of £105,000 from "Audax" to open the Fund. As an instance of the lasting effect of so fine an example, I may mention that an anonymous donor recently called at the King's Fund office, and said he wanted to sign a seven-year agreement, on the same lines as "Audax," for one-tenth of the amount, namely, £10,500. To this donor also I have conveyed my thanks. In connection with radium, the Annual Report contains an important piece of news. You will remember that on the very morning of our December Meeting, we received a donation of f10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr for the purchase of radium. There was £37,000 to come to us for the same purpose through the Thank-offering Fund. We already had the radium bought with Sir Otto Beit's gift of £50,000. Those additional sums brought us unexpectedly within a few thousand pounds of the amount needed to enable the Fund to take advantage of an option to buy a larger quantity at a reduced price. The option would expire on December 19th. The Management Committee decided to take the risk, and the King's Fund is now the owner of 10 grammes of radium. Anyone who feels inclined to contribute towards the amount still required to pay for it will have the satisfaction of having helped the Fund to carry out a really economical and business-like transaction. The radium bought with Sir Otto Beit's gift has all been lent to hospitals, and full records are being kept of the hours of use, the way it is being employed, and the results obtained. As regards the allocation of the fresh supply, the Distribution Committee will report at our next meeting. I need hardly remind you of the great advance that has been made during the past eighteen months in the provision of radium for hospitals all over the country. In addition to the supply owned by individual hospitals, upwards of £350,000 worth is now, or soon will be, controlled by two great central bodies, 10 grammes by the King's Fund, and a still larger quantity by the National Radium Commission. An understanding has been arrived at by which the King's Fund will lend radium in London, and the Commission outside London; and the two bodies will work in consultation whenever desirable. For example, it has already been agreed that the scientific records will be in the same form.

Other instances of co-operation are described in the reports on current business that come before you to-day. Our Parliamentary Committee has been helping the hospitals to devise a representative body for the purpose of the Local Government Act. The new body is called the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee. Its function is to co-operate with the London County Council in ensuring that the hospital service of London, composed partly of the voluntary hospitals and partly of what used to be called the Poor Law infirmaries, shall be the best that can be achieved. A really good hospital service must combine, in due proportion, the qualities of efficiency and flexibility, of organisation and freedom. Hospital work requires all these qualities. It is from one point of view a part of public health administration. At the same time, from another point of view, its essence consists of a number of individual doctors treating a number of individual patients; one of the most intimate personal and human relationships that exist outside family life. It must also provide for the advance of medical science; and allow scope both for the individual genius and for the organised team work which together produce that advance. Yet again, it is a form of mutual aid, in which all members of the community can take a direct personal share, on behalf of their fellow-members who are disabled by sickness. This is why our people value the voluntary hospitals to the tune of £2,700,000 a year in voluntary gifts in London alone, besides £850,000 a year from the patients themselves. And this is why it is so important that the spirit of the voluntary hospitals, in which all our medical men have been trained, should be preserved, and should continue to permeate the whole medical service, to whatever extent,

and in whatever way, hospital work has to be developed on the organisation side. And, talking of organisation, I sometimes wonder whether the public sufficiently realise how much the King's Fund has done, within the voluntary system itself, to encourage that side of hospital work amongst the 140 hospitals of London, for which it serves as a kind of central administrative body, itself composed of voluntary people, supported by voluntary funds, and valuing the freedom of the separate hospitals as well as their efficiency. The new representative Committee will, of course, be responsible for working out the methods of co-operation with the London County Council. But I am sure you will endorse the action of your Committees in lending them staff assistance during the initial stages, and in expressing the willingness of the King's Fund to help in any way that may be considered desirable.

We have also before us a report on the subject of the claim of the hospitals all over the country to some payment for road accident cases, which they so often have to treat at the expense of the work for which they were established. In this connection, also, the King's Fund is working closely with the British Hospitals Association. Lord Luke, who took the initiative in this matter, is to be congratulated on the sympathetic response which the claim of the hospitals has received.

We have also before us to-day the new insurance scheme for pay-bed patients. The King's Fund is not responsible for this scheme, though it has been worked out by Sir Alan Anderson, who is a member of the Council, and who devised the Hospital Saving Association, which has proved so successful in enabling wage-earners to make provision for hospital treatment. I see that I am myself quoted by the Management Committee as having already given Sir Alan my blessing on his new enterprise. I am quite willing to be quoted in so good a cause. And I say again that I wish the insurance scheme for the professional and middle classes every possible success. I think it will be a good thing both for those who join it and for the hospitals.

The Revenue Committee present a most encouraging report of the work of the Propaganda Committee during the past year, which reflects great credit on its very tactful and energetic Secretary, Mr. Jay. There is one item in their programme for 1930 which is particularly interesting. Messrs. Kodak are about to arrange exhibitions, in aid of the King's Fund and the hospitals, of photographs taken by members of the Royal Family. It is very gratifying that these photographs, which have given so much private pleasure, will also be used publicly for the benefit of the hospitals.

I have one or two personal matters to mention. Mr. F. J. Elliott, who has recently died, had been a Visitor for the Fund for four years. We certainly cannot pass over the Report of our Parliamentary Committee without a special word of thanks to Lord Macmillan for his immensely valuable services as Vice-Chairman during Mr. Whitley's absence. We have also to thank the Finance Committee and their Chairman, Mr. Peacock, who have charge of our investments.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to present the Accounts.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1929.

Mr. E. R. Peacock (the Hon. Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1929 (see pp. 72-75), said:—May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—At the December meeting I pointed out that the estimates in November had barely justified the maintenance of the distribution

of £250,000, leaving nothing over for the special pensions grants, but that a legacy of £29,000 had since been received. This would enable the pensions grants to be paid without affecting the ordinary distribution, and would also enable a further sum to be set aside towards meeting the additional liabilities which the Fund had undertaken when it promised the special grants for seven years. The maximum liability for any one year is £20,000. The actual amount last year was £13,734. The Management Committee thought it advisable that a further sum of £12,907 should be set aside, so as to increase the special pension reserve to £45,000. This is accordingly shown in the accounts which I am now asking the Council to approve. The accounts show the receipts from the Thank-offering Fund to December 31st, including the £115,000 which was made the subject of the special distribution in aid of extension schemes either recently carried out or about to be carried out in the near future, and the first of the seven annual instalments of the gift of £105,000 from "Audax" which Your Royal Highness has appropriately described as "magnificent." This has been invested in accordance with the donor's wishes. The accounts also show the gifts of £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit and £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr for the purchase of radium, and the expenditure on radium during the year. There is also the special donation of £24,536 to which Your Royal Highness has referred. There is just one thing I should like to say about our income. The £250,000 distributed last year was made up partly from dividends and partly from voluntary gifts. These included annual subscriptions of £25,000; donations (apart altogether from the Thank-offering Fund) £11,000, besides £17,000 received through the League of Mercy; and legacies £68,000. As I have said, it was these receipts from legacies that enabled us to maintain the distribution and to provide out of current income for all our immediate commitments. Legacies, though notoriously a fluctuating source of income, have always been and still are a very important source. The amounts received in legacies by the hospitals in London during the last two years have been approximately £253,000 and £388,000 respectively. We ourselves have received £68,000 in each of the two years; in amounts ranging from £4 to £29,000. But no one can forecast the future, and it is most important that the public should realise that the more the King's Fund receives in subscriptions and donations, the more it can distribute, and the greater will be its influence as a central body for the hospitals of London. I have now the honour to move the adoption of the accounts.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Lord Marshall, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1929.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore), moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1929 (see p. 5).

Lord Dawson of Penn having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord Luke) presented the Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee (see p. 63), and moved the recommendation that it be published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for the year 1929.

The motion, having been seconded by Lady Hall, was then put and carried.

REPORT OF THE PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE.

The Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee, in presenting an interim Report of the Committee (see p. 69), said he did so with the greatest pleasure because, for the larger part of the time, the work had been done by his excellent Vice-Chairman, Lord Macmillan, not by himself; and he was sure they were all very greatly indebted to him for the capable work that he had contributed. The outstanding feature of the year had been the establishment of the Representative Committee of the voluntary hospitals, and he hoped that the piece of work would not only bring the voluntary hospitals into continuous co-operation with the London County Council, but would also be a piece of machinery which would be useful for other purposes when any of the interests of the voluntary hospitals were affected. The Report also referred to the question of hospitals and motor accidents. He moved that the action of the Committee be approved.

The motion, having been seconded by Sir George Makins, was carried unanimously.

PAY BEDS INSURANCE SCHEME FOR THE PROFESSIONAL AND MIDDLE CLASSES.

The Earl of Donoughmore, Chairman of the Management Committee, in presenting a report of the Committee on a Pay Bed Insurance Scheme for the Professional and Middle Classes (see p. 66), said the Council would remember that, when referring to the Pay Beds Report at the Annual Meeting of the Council in 1929, His Royal Highness said: "The Committee also recommended an Insurance Scheme for meeting the cost of a pay bed and of surgical fees. Sir Alan Anderson, who was one of the Honorary Secretaries of the King's Fund when it helped to start the Hospital Saving Association to enable wage-earners to make provision for their hospital payments, has been working for some time at a similar scheme for the middle classes, and I hope he will achieve a similar success." The present Report told how Sir Alan Anderson's scheme had developed, and how the Management Committee, on behalf of the Fund, had conveyed to him an expression of sympathy with the scheme and hope for its success, and he asked for the Management Committee that their action be approved.

The recommendation, having been seconded by the Chief Rabbi (The Very Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), was carried unanimously.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The Viscount Burnham, in moving a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for presiding, said it would be impertinence on his part to say anything in praise of the beneficent activities of His Royal Highness in regard to the Fund, because they were common knowledge; but he would permit him to say how rejoiced they were to see him back from his courageous and adventurous journey, looking, if possible, better and fitter than ever.

Lord Doverdale having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- I. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £248,000, being the same amount as last year.
- 2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 143, as against 141 in 1928, the Metropolitan Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital having dropped out of the list, and applications having been received from the Catholic Nursing Institute, the Marie Curie Hospital, and the Ross Institute and Hospital for Tropical Diseases.
- 3. The maintenance needs of the hospitals proved to be greater than in 1928. The figures in the King's Fund Statistical Review showed that, although there was again an aggregate surplus for the year 1928, it was much smaller than the surplus for 1927. This was due partly to an increase in expenditure, but mainly to a downward fluctuation in legacies. The other sources of income, including voluntary gifts and patients' contributions, especially through the Hospital Saving Association, all showed an increase. When the Distribution Committee were considering the financial position of each separate hospital, this decreased aggregate surplus came before them as a decrease in the number and amounts of individual surpluses, and an increase in the number and amounts of individual deficits. This meant in many cases a need for larger grants.
- 4. The continual increase in the number of beds also produces a demand for larger maintenance grants. During the year 1928 extension schemes were completed and came into operation which increased the number of beds by 600. The cost of maintaining these beds was a principal cause of the increased expenditure shown in the Statistical Review, and had been largely anticipated by the Distribution Committee when making their grants in 1928. This year the Committee have had to take into account the addition of another 250 beds, resulting from extensions completed during 1929.
- 5. These increased maintenance needs would have put the Distribution Committee in a serious difficulty had it not been for the special distribution of £115,000 from the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery. The whole of this special distribution, which is

described in a separate Report, is in the form of capital grants towards extensions and improvements either authorised, begun or recently completed. But this enabled the Committee, without any hardship to the hospitals concerned, to make a reduction in the total of capital grants out of the ordinary distribution, and a corresponding increase in the total allocated to maintenance. In this way the benefits of the Thank-offering Fund have been shared by all the hospitals, and are not confined to those that happen to be in immediate need of assistance for schemes of capital expenditure.

- 6. The increase which the Committee are thus able to make in the grants recommended in aid of maintenance amounts to £9,290, the total out of the ordinary distribution being £226,065, as compared with £216,775 in 1928. The grants towards schemes of capital expenditure amount to £21,935 out of the ordinary distribution, as against £31,225 last year.
- 7. The special grants towards expenditure on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers come to £13,734, as against £9,452 in 1928. The increase is due to the facts that by October, 1929, 94 hospitals had joined the Scheme, as against 89 a year earlier; that more nurses and officers have joined; and that the grants this year cover twelve months instead of nine. The grants are limited to 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the Scheme, or £20,000 a year, whichever may be the smaller, for a period of seven years; and also include, within this limit and subject to certain conditions, expenditure on, or in providing for, supplementary pensions for back service of existing officers, and also expenditure on pensions to retired officers. It must not be assumed that the King's Fund will be able to continue the grants in respect of each of the separate headings of expenditure at the same percentages as during these first two years.
- 8. The total of the present distribution, taking into account ordinary maintenance grants, grants towards capital expenditure, and special pensions grants, is thus £261,734. When the distribution out of the Thank-offering Fund is added, the grand total distributed to hospitals in 1929 is £376,734, besides £2,000 to convalescent homes. Of this, £239,799 represents grants to maintenance, including pensions, and £136,935 grants to schemes of capital expenditure.
- 9. This year's distribution includes for the first time a grant to the building fund of King George Hospital. The proposal for the provision of a single large hospital on the Ilford site is the result of the amalgamation of several schemes for providing for the needs of the increasing population of the eastern part of Greater London. It was drawn up at a series of conferences for which the King's Fund acted as convener, and in which representatives of the London County Council, the Ilford Hospital, and the local hospital funds of Barking and Becontree took part. The King's Fund made a grant of f10,000 out of the Wells legacies distribution, and the London County Council have contributed a similar sum. Grants of f2,000 set aside by the King's Fund for the extension of the Ilford Hospital have also been transferred to the building fund of King George Hospital. The Distribution

Committee are now recommending a capital grant of £2,000 out of the ordinary distribution, with an additional £10,000 out of the Thank-offering Fund. The total contributed by the King's Fund to date is therefore £24,000.

- To. At the annual meeting in June the Distribution Committee reported to the General Council the allocation of the four grammes of radium purchased out of the gift made to the Fund by Sir Otto Beit. All the hospitals concerned have now agreed with the Fund upon the exact specification of the way in which the radium lent to them is to be put up and the rules and regulations which are to govern its use. Up to the present time 2,300 milligrammes have been actually delivered to fifteen out of the twenty hospitals, and the delivery of the remainder is being proceeded with as quickly as is found possible by the makers of the containers and needles.
- II. Early in the year the King's Fund was consulted by some Executors who had a large sum of money to distribute at their discretion. They desired to use part of it for assisting the hospitals in London to improve their equipment, especially scientific equipment. The Distribution Committee accordingly asked the Fund's Visitors, in the course of their annual inspections, to make a note of any special needs of this kind. The replies received from the Visitors have been forwarded to the Executors for their assistance in making their distribution.
- 12. The reports of the Visitors on their ordinary inspection of the hospitals have, as usual, proved to be of great use to the Committee in making the distribution. The form of Report supplied to the Visitors has a preface containing a long list of detailed questions headed "Points, some of which should receive notice in the Reports." It is not expected that all the points should be enquired into by all the Visitors at all the hospitals every year. Occasionally the Distribution Committee stars a particular point, and asks every Visitor to report on it, so that the Fund may obtain a complete survey of the condition of the hospitals in that particular matter. Since information on the equipment of the hospitals, and more particularly their scientific equipment, was required this year for the purposes of the enquiry mentioned in the last paragraph, the Distribution Committee took the opportunity of starring the questions, "Are the conditions and adjuncts of the Operation Theatres satisfactory?" and "Is the Surgical Equipment, especially as regards instruments and appliances, adequate and satisfactory?"
- 13. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule:—

City of London Maternity Hospital, £500 to new nurses' accommodation. Deptford and Greenwich Babies' Hospital, £250 to rebuilding and extension on a new site, French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £5,000 to new nurses' home,

Harrow Hospital, £500 to extension.

Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, £750 to extension of in-patient department.

Ilford Emergency Hospital, £1,000 to extension as King George Hospital.

Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, £500 to extension of out-patient department.

London Lock Hospital (Male), £2,000 to extension of out-patient department.

Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.

Nelson Hospital, £500 to provision of maternity block.

Royal Free Hospital, £1,500 to extension.

Royal Hospital (Richmond), £50 to additional nurses' accommodation.

Royal Northern Hospital, £500 to additional heating apparatus.

St. Thomas's Hospital, £1,000 to first stages of new out-patient department.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed.

- I. The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at $f_{2,000}$, being the same amount as last year.
- 2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 53, as compared with 49 last year.
- 3. In dealing with the applications the Committee have given special attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

THANK-OFFERING FUND FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.

(A). REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

I. The following account of the origin, history, and results of the Thank-offering Fund has been received from Lord Donoughmore, its Treasurer, and has been published by him.

"THANK-OFFERING FUND FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.
"CLOSING OF FUND.

- "(i) The time has come when the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery, organised by King Edward's Hospital Fund and the National Radium Fund, can be definitely closed and a statement made of the total amount received and of the uses to which it will be put.
- "(ii) The Thank-offering Fund was opened on April 29 immediately after the King's gracious message to his people. The Hospital section arose out of the munificent gift of £105,000 by 'Audax' to the King's Fund to be the nucleus of a thank-offering for the King's recovery. The object of the Radium section was first to obtain the amount required for the National Radium Fund to which the Government had promised £100,000 on a £ for £ basis, and if possible to obtain further monies for the purchase of Radium.
- "(iii) The Radium section attained its original object in a few days. The Hospital section was then extended to include donations from outside London earmarked for local hospitals. On the occasion of the Thanksgiving Day on July 7 earmarking for individual hospitals in London was also included. From that time onwards no further general effort was made to solicit contributions, so that the field might be clear for various pending hospital appeals. But the flow of spontaneous contributions has never quite stopped.
- "(iv) Subsequently many other thank-offering funds were organised in different parts of the country and for different objects, and the amounts collected for some of these have been published in *The Times* lists.

"(v) The combined aggregate total that has appeared is £689,597, made up as follows:—

- "(vi) It will be seen that, out of this total, about one-third was received in the form of contributions for King Edward's Hospital Fund.
- "(vii) Out of the Radium money a first instalment of £100,000 has been handed to the National Radium Trustees, to enable them to claim the Government grant of the same amount, and a further £50,000, to complete the total of £150,000 appealed for by the National Radium Fund, is held for their account. The balance of £37,000 will, in accordance with the arrangements made at the issue of the joint appeal, be placed at the disposal of the King's Fund for the purchase of Radium to be lent to hospitals in London, subject to the same general conditions as those governing the allocation of the Radium purchased with the gift of Sir Otto Beit.
- "(viii) The donations received before August I earmarked for individual hospitals have been paid over, and the balance of earmarked donations will now be distributed. The number of separate institutions has amounted to nearly 500.
 - "(ix) The sum of £105,000 given by 'Audax' to King Edward's Hospital Fund will, in accordance with what are known to be the donor's desires, be invested and the income used to increase the annual distribution, which benefits more than 140 hospitals in London.

- "(x) The rest of the money available for the King's Fund will, in accordance with a decision by the President and General Council, be made the subject of a special distribution towards schemes of extension or improvement at hospitals on the ordinary distribution list of the King's Fund for 1929, or towards the reduction of deficits on schemes which have recently been carried out. The list of grants will be settled at the meeting of the Council of the King's Fund on December 17. The preparations made for the ordinary distribution have provided the Distribution Committee with all the necessary information for their consideration in connection with the special distribution.
- "(xi) It only remains for me, as Treasurer of the Combined Fund, to thank in the name of the ultimate beneficiaries all the donors who chose this method of expressing their gratitude for the King's recovery, and in the first instance Audax' for his initial gift to the King's Fund. I am specially grateful to the Press in London and all over the country for their help in making the Thankoffering Fund a success—and I particularly desire to express the obligation of all concerned to The Times, which had undertaken to raise, and did raise, the sum required for the Radium section, and which all along has placed its resources at the disposal of the Thank-offering Fund as a whole. The ultimate beneficiaries for whom I speak include all the sufferers who will receive treatment by means of the radium; all the far larger number who will benefit by the advances in knowledge that will result from the acquisition of so large a quantity and its concentration in expert hands; and all the patients in the numerous hospitals, both in London and elsewhere, which will be enabled, by means of the Thankoffering Fund, to provide or to complete urgent improvements, and in other ways to carry on or extend their work of healing.

- 2. The Management Committee feel sure that the General Council, and all connected with the King's Fund, will desire to associate themselves with these expressions of thanks to those who have helped to make the Thank-offering Fund a success; and particularly to "Audax," to whose initiative it is due that the hospitals of London will benefit, not only by the annual income from his own munificent donation of £105,000, but also by the distribution of the further amounts contributed by others to the King's Fund section of the appeal.
- 3. It will be seen that, during the whole course of the Thank-offering Fund, the King's Fund was acting in co-operation with many other workers in a national movement. The Management Committee realised from the first moment when the generous intention of

- "Audax" was communicated to them, that King Edward's Hospital Fund for London by itself could not put forward a claim to be regarded as the sole channel for an expression of the feelings of the whole country. It is true that the Hospitals of London are national institutions in the sense that they treat patients from all parts and form the largest centre of medical education and research. To this extent, and also because of its peculiar relation to its Royal Presidents, the King's Fund may be regarded as a national institution. But, for the purposes of a Thank-offering Fund, it was felt that the public outside London would desire to have also the opportunity of selecting local charities.
- 4. At the same time it was not an occasion on which a great organisation could be designed and set up for inviting and receiving, as part of one central fund or federation of funds, the contributions of different parts of the country for different objects. The Thank-offering movement arose spontaneously everywhere as soon as the King's convalescence was definitely announced, and it grew and spread with the minimum of organisation.
- 5. Nevertheless the Thank-offering Fund which was inaugurated by the gift of "Audax" had a directly national character through the association of the King's Fund, which is for London, and the National Radium Fund, which was for the whole country. As soon as the amount appealed for by the National Radium Fund was secured, a means of continuing the connection with the movement outside London was provided by the earmarking of contributions for local hospitals as an alternative to the opening of local funds. At later stages the Thank-offering Fund entered into co-operation with the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund in connection with Hospital Sunday on June 2, with the clergy of all denominations who held special collections in London on the Thanksgiving Day on Sunday, July 7, and with various other thank-offering movements that had come into existence. It was felt that, even if the King's Fund would not itself benefit directly by such co-operation, it was better that the thank-offering organisation which it had helped to set up should be used, wherever possible, to assist the general movement and not to compete with other sections of it.
- 6. The Committee are pleased to report that, in accordance with the usual practice of the King's Fund in such matters, the expenses in connection with the appeal were kept low. The amounts received from donors have, in fact, been paid over in full without any deduction for expenses.
- 7. Lord Luke, as Chairman of the Revenue Committee, was responsible for all the detailed work connected with the King's Fund section of the Thank-offering Fund.
- 8. The Management Committee feel sure that the Council will share their view that it has been a privilege for the King's Fund to be thus associated with so many others in the expression of gratitude for the termination of the period of anxiety which began a year ago, and lasted for so many months,

9. The Management Committee recommend:-

That an address be presented in the name of H.R.H. the President and the General Council to the King as Patron of the King's Fund, referring to the origin, history, results and distribution of the Thank-offering Fund, and tendering to His Majesty their loyal congratulations on his recovery, and on his return to the full discharge of his high functions in Church and State.

(B). REPORT OF THE DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION.

- I. In November last the General Council decided :-
 - (a) That the gift of "Audax," amounting to £105,000 receivable in seven yearly instalments, should be invested in accordance with what was known to be the desire of the donor, and
 - (b) That the available balance out of the Thank-offering Fund should be made the subject of a special distribution towards schemes of extension or improvement at Hospitals on the ordinary distribution list of the King's Fund for 1929, or towards the reduction of deficits on schemes which had recently been carried out; and that the Distribution Committee should be asked to submit recommendations at the December Meeting of the General Council.
- 2. The amount reported to the Distribution Committee as being available for distribution in accordance with this decision is £115,000.
- 3. In determining the principle on which the grants should be allocated the Distribution Committee had before them the following alternatives.
- 4. On the one hand they could have aimed at the complete removal of the exceptional difficulties from which certain hospitals were suffering in connection with capital expenditure: in some cases by wiping out the whole of the deficit on a past scheme, and in others by giving very substantial assistance towards the carrying out of an urgent scheme for which an appeal was either in progress or was about to be issued. This would have meant the distribution of the whole sum in the form of a comparatively small number of large grants.
- 5. On the other hand they could have recommended the distribution of the available amount amongst as many hospitals as possible, even though by adopting this alternative the grants would not have been as large as would seem to be demanded by the scale or the urgency of the schemes, or by some special claims which certain hospitals might appear to have in connection with this particular distribution,

- 6. After carefully considering the effect of adopting one alternative to the exclusion of the other, and taking into account all the information which they had before them with respect to the schemes of the various hospitals for improvements and extensions, the Committee decided to adopt a middle course, recommending large grants where the circumstances demanded substantial assistance, but yet not so large as to exhaust the whole sum available and thus unduly to limit the number of hospitals participating in the distribution.
- 7. The list of grants which has been drawn up on this principle contains the names of 71 hospitals. The grants range from £14,000 down to £100, viz.:—

- 8. Quite outside the sum of £115,000 which forms the subject of this special distribution, donations were also received at the offices of the Thank-offering Fund earmarked for individual hospitals in London. The earmarked gifts of £25 or over to hospitals on the books of the King's Fund amounted in all to £18,646 amongst 48 hospitals. Of these hospitals 35 appear in the subjoined list of special grants, though in none of these cases were the circumstances and magnitude of the earmarked donations such as to affect the amount of the special grant recommended. The other 13 hospitals do not appear in the list. If these hospitals are added to the 71 as having benefited by the existence of the Thank-offering Fund and by the activities of its organisers, the number of hospitals receiving a direct share is increased to 84.
- 9. This does not, however, exhaust the benefits which the hospitals have received from the Thank-offering Fund. As is pointed out in the Committee's Report on the ordinary distribution, the special distribution has enabled them, without hardship to the hospitals, to reduce the capital grants out of the ordinary distribution to a lower figure than in 1928, and thus to devote a larger amount to grants in aid of maintenance. As the maintenance needs of the hospitals were greater this year, the fact that an increased amount could be devoted to maintenance was of the utmost value. The amount rendered available for this purpose was £9,290. Every hospital which is receiving, out of this sum, a larger grant to maintenance than it would otherwise have received, may thus be regarded as sharing in the benefits of the Thank-offering Fund.

- 10. Moreover, every hospital will benefit by the gift of "Audax," which will produce during the next seven years a steadily growing income, amounting in the end to a permanent increase of about £5,000 a year in the annual distribution.
- II. The grants out of the special distribution may be summarised as follows, according to the nature of the schemes:—

- 12. If sub-divided between the two headings of grants to schemes in hand or pending, and grants towards deficits on schemes recently completed, it will be found that 47 grants amounting to £67,600 have been allocated to the former, and 24 grants amounting to £47,400 to the latter purpose.
- 13. In every case where a substantial grant is recommended, the scheme has been submitted to the Fund for an expression of opinion, in accordance with the well-known request of the General Council to that effect, and has been specially reported on by two members of the Distribution Committee itself, usually after a visit to the Hospital. These reports, though they deal mainly with the merits of a scheme and its financial practicability, and not with its claim to a grant as compared with the claims of other schemes at other hospitals, are of the greatest value to the Committee when deciding on the amount of grant to be awarded. In cases where a grant is recommended in reduction of the deficit on a past scheme, the Committee have also given special consideration to the efforts which the hospital has itself made to clear off the debt.
 - 14. The list of grants is appended.

(C). ADDRESS TO HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

May it please Your Majesty,

The President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London have the honour to present with their most obedient humble duty to Your Majesty, the Patron and Past President of the King's Fund, the enclosed Reports, laid before the General Council on December 17, 1929, on the origin, history and results of the Thank-offering Fund organised by King Edward's Hospital Fund in commemoration of Your Majesty's restoration to health.

The gift of £105,000 from "Audax" by which this Thank-offering Fund was inaugurated will be invested, and the hospitals of London will benefit annually by the resulting increase in the permanent income of the King's Fund.

The available balance, now amounting to £115,000, is being made the subject of a special distribution towards schemes of extension or improvement, some of which have recently been carried out, while others are in progress or will shortly be put in hand.

The King's Fund will also receive, for the benefit of Hospitals in London, £37,000 out of the total of £187,000 subscribed for the purchase of Radium, being the amount over and above the sum of £150,000 collected by *The Times* for the National Radium Fund, with which the King's Fund was acting in co-operation throughout.

The total amount received by King Edward's Hospital Fund from the Thank-offering Fund will thus be $f_{257,000}$.

Hospitals and other Charities have also received upwards of £91,000 in gifts to the Thank-offering Fund, earmarked for individual institutions.

This Thank-offering Fund was only the first of many funds, large or small, which sprang up all over the country. The grand total is not known, but enough is known to show that the amount received by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London does not represent more than a fraction of what must be a very large sum.

The President and General Council humbly submit to Your Majesty an expression of the relief and thankfulness with which, in common with all your loyal subjects, they welcome the happy termination of the dark period of anxiety during Your Majesty's prolonged illness, and tender their loyal and heartfelt congratulations upon Your Majesty's happy restoration to health, strength and duty.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON ALLOCATION OF SIR OTTO BEIT'S GIFT OF RADIUM.

- 1. On November 27, 1928, Sir Otto Beit, Bt., F.R.S., offered the King's Fund £50,000 for the purchase of radium to be utilised by way of loan to hospitals in London. In allocating the gift, the King's Fund was to have regard to the competence of the staffing and equipment of the hospitals, and to give preference to those in which the cure of disease was associated with keen interest in the furtherance of knowledge. The offer was gratefully accepted, and the Management and Distribution Committees immediately began to make arrangements for the purchase of radium and its use in the manner indicated by Sir Otto.
 - 2. The following procedure was adopted:
 - (a) to enquire into the sources of supply and prices of radium, and to place an order for four grammes;
 - (b) to select a list of hospitals prima facie eligible;
 - (c) to enquire into the existing stocks of radium at each of these hospitals, the specific purposes for which additional radium was needed, and the ability of the hospital to satisfy the conditions of the gift;
 - (d) to decide which hospitals should be definitely offered a loan of radium and how much should be offered to each;
 - (e) to ascertain in what forms of container the radium for each hospital should be put up, and to approve the specifications submitted;
 - (f) to secure from each hospital the acceptance of the conditions of the loan, including the requirement that detailed regulations for the care and use of the radium should be made by the hospital and approved by the Fund;
 - (g) to place orders for the putting up of the radium in the requisite form, and to arrange for the testing of the radium content of each container.
- 3. In considering the list of hospitals and the amounts to be offered to each, the Distribution Committee decided that the best policy would be one which, after taking into account existing supplies, provided, first, that a certain very limited number of hospitals should have at least the minimum quantity of radium sufficient to enable them to function as "Radium Centres," i.e. not only to treat their own patients but to be available for a supply of radium emanation to other hospitals; and, second, so far as the amount of radium at the

disposal of the King's Fund permitted, to secure for hospitals coming within the description indicated by Sir Otto Beit such a supply of radium as would enable them to treat a number of their patients requiring radium treatment.

- 4. The question of the forms of container in which, for the purpose of treatment, the radium has to be put up, is one of considerable importance. The containers, which may be of various sizes and shapes, are usually needles or tubes made of platinum, and the expense involved forms a large item in the total cost of the radium. Moreover, the particular forms of container desired sometimes give rise to difficulty and extra expense in manufacture.
- 5. The conditions laid down by the Fund are of even greater importance, especially in view of the dangerous properties of radium and its high commercial value, with the consequent necessity of observing stringent rules to safeguard alike the patient and the staff concerned in handling the radium, and to avoid loss or waste.
- 6. The Committee accordingly drew up a comprehensive list of the points that ought to be covered by definite regulations issued by the hospitals to all concerned in a Radium Service. Each hospital receiving a loan is required to set up a Standing Advisory Committee to supervise the Radium Service of the hospital. The rules for the use and care of the radium are to be submitted by the individual hospital to the King's Fund, and the Fund is to receive periodical reports from the hospital showing all its stocks of radium, the milligramme-hours of use and the number of patients treated. The results obtained are to be published by the hospital or made available for publication by some other body.
- 7. The King's Fund radium is to be available for all hospital patients, both ordinary and pay-bed, but it is not to be removed beyond the hospital premises without the written authority of the King's Fund.
- 8. The radium will in the first instance be on loan to the individual hospital for a period of one year, and will be subject thereafter to withdrawal on due notice.
- 9. The present position is that specifications have been received for nearly the whole of the radium available. Specifications covering 3.405 grammes have been approved, while others amounting to 595 grammes are still under consideration.*
- 10. Orders for the execution of the specifications are being passed by the Management Committee as they are approved by the Distribution Committee. It will, however, be some little time yet before any of the radium is actually in use at the hospitals,* as the verification of the radium content of each container is a delicate and lengthy process. A considerable period

must, therefore, always elapse after the placing of an order before the radium in its container is available for use.

- II. In view of the facts that radium therapy is still, broadly speaking, in an experimental and therefore developing stage, that a knowledge of its technique is confined to a comparatively small circle, and that the difficulties involved in manufacturing the containers are not as a rule well understood by those actually engaged in radium treatment, the Committee do not think that there has been any unreasonable delay on the part of the hospitals in furnishing specifications in a form which the Fund could approve.
- 12. The detailed work in connection with the allocation has been carried out by a Sub-Committee of the Distribution Committee, consisting of Dr. Eardley Holland, Chairman, Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Cooper Perry, and Mr. Leonard Cohen. As it was felt desirable that the Sub-Committee should have the benefit of the experience of a physicist with clinical knowledge of the use of radium, Professor Sidney Russ, of Middlesex Hospital, was invited to serve as a co-opted member, and the Distribution Committee are greatly indebted to him for the services which he has rendered and is still rendering.*
- 13. The enquiries made by the Distribution Committee in the course of this work have brought home to them the great need which exists for an increase in the supply of radium available for use in hospitals, and the advantages to be derived from the concentration of a large proportion of any additional supply in the hands of a central agency which can place it out on loan under conditions designed to secure its effective use, with due safeguards based on the most recent knowledge of the subject. The Committee, therefore, welcome the formation of the National Radium Fund to be administered on these lines. They consider that Sir Otto Beit is to be warmly congratulated on the characteristic foresight which led him to adopt this method in dealing with his own generous gift. They consider also that the King's Fund is fortunate in having been selected by him as the body to administer the radium which he thus rendered available for use in the hospitals of London.
- 14. The following is the list of hospitals to which loans of radium have been allocated by the Distribution Committee. The omission of certain important hospitals is accounted for by the fact that they were found already to have radium available or in prospect up to the limited amount referred to in paragraph 3 of this Report.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1929.

- I. During part of the year 1929 the Thank-Offering Fund for the King's Recovery had itself the effect of bringing the name of the King's Fund continually before the public, and thus of indirectly assisting the work for which the Propaganda Committee was established.
- 2. Notwithstanding the somewhat abnormal conditions which prevailed, the Committee continued to develop their work energetically on the lines found to be most effective.
- 3. As in previous years, they have met with good will on every side, and with much willing co-operation in regard to the various schemes they have undertaken.
 - 4. The principal activities of the Committee in 1929 were:—
 - (a) Illustrated Talks on "Historic London," in January and February, in the Great Hall of Westminster School;
 - (b) Specially conducted tours to famous London buildings during the spring and summer months (including the Foreign Office, India Office, Admiralty, Westminster Abbey, the Tower of London, and Somerset House);
 - (c) Sixth series of public debates ("Lectures and Counter-Lectures") held at the London School of Economics in May and June;
 - (d) Visit to the Air Port of London in September, when the party were received by the Under-Secretary of State for Air, Mr. F. Montagu, special arrangements being made for members of the party to take short flights during the afternoon;
 - (e) "Tales of Travel and Adventure by Land, Sea, and Air," in November;
 - (f) King's Fund Exhibit at the Spring Horse Show held at the Royal Agricultural Hall, including X-Ray apparatus and X-Ray photographs, and specimens of anthrax and tetanus germs under the microscope, etc., illustrating recent discoveries in medicine and surgery;
 - (g) Continuation of illustrated lectures to an increased number of schools and colleges, and to other special audiences, such as the League of Remembrance. Numerous appreciative letters were subsequently received by the Committee;

- (h) Further co-operation with the London County Council, whose catalogue of lantern slides (Supplement No. 6) was issued in January, containing particulars of a set of hospital slides with the heading, "Supplied through the agency of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London." Printed notes for the benefit of teachers making use of the slides were supplied by Mr. Muirhead Little, F.R.C.S., who devoted much time and labour to the work and declined to take any fee;
- (j) Article by Mr. Pett Ridge in the London Teacher inviting teachers to requisition for the slides;
- (k) Conversazione at the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum in February, by kind invitation of Dr. Wellcome, when Sir John Rose Bradford spoke on the use to be made of Sir Otto Beit's gift of £50,000 for the purchase of radium;
- (m) Issue of pamphlet giving particulars of "pay-bed" accommodation in hospitals within the King's Fund area;
- (n) Issue of special King's Fund poster for display at functions organised by the Committee.
- 5. The receipts during the year amounted to £1,087 8s. 3d. This includes a sum of £625 from the sale of postcard photographs of the King taken during his convalescence. For this valuable contribution the Committee have to thank Messrs. Kodak.
- 6. Perhaps the most fruitful work of the year was the display of the King's Fund Film in connection with the Hospital Saving Association's "Green Voucher" Week campaign. A letter was received from the General Secretary, saying "The Film was a most effective part of our propaganda, which has added something like 100,000 regular contributors to our numbers, and has laid the foundations for still further extension."
- 7. Over 22,000 copies of the leaflet, "Our Voluntary Hospitals: Their Value to the Nation," were supplied to individual hospitals in response to applications received.
- 8. An offer was accepted from Messrs. Raphael Tuck to publish, in decorative form, for the benefit of the King's Fund, the King's Message to the Nation dated April 22, 1929. Messrs. Raphael Tuck have not yet informed the Committee of the financial result, but it is hoped that a substantial sum will have been realised for the Fund.
- 9. At the suggestion of Mr. A. E. Johnson, the Committee approached Lady Desborough, who kindly gave her consent for her picture, "Viscountess Melbourne and Family," by George Stubbs, to be reproduced in mezzotint, and copies sold for the benefit of the King's Fund. The etching is to be undertaken by Mr. Macbeth-Raeburn, A.R.A., and arrangements have been made for its publication during 1930.

- 10. A Sub-Committee was appointed in November, of which Sir Nigel Playfair was elected Chairman, to consider a new programme at the London School of Economics in 1930. At the suggestion of the Chairman it was decided to organise a series of entertainments in the nature of "Mock Trials," and to adopt Mr. A. P. Herbert's recommendation that they should be called "Cross Examinations."
- II. The Committee also had under consideration, at the end of the year, the possibility of constructing a Model of an up-to-date Hospital to be shown at public exhibitions as propaganda on behalf of the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals.
- 12. The Committee would like once more to express their appreciation of the generous help they have received from the Press in connection with their various undertakings. Thanks are also due to London Electric Railways, Ltd., for displaying posters in their stations free of charge, and to the several shipping companies, hotels, West-End firms, and other agencies who have assisted by bringing the Committee's programmes to the notice of any who might be interested.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

A PAY BEDS INSURANCE SCHEME FOR THE PROFESSIONAL AND MIDDLE CLASSES.

Recommendation of Pay Beds Committee.

- 1. The Report of the Pay Beds Committee of the King's Fund, published in July, 1928, contained the following conclusions (par. 172 on page 35 of that Report):
 - (viii) That it is desirable that as many prospective pay bed patients as possible should be enabled to place themselves in a position in which they can pay the full cost of maintenance in a pay ward and a medical fee as well:
 - (ix) That, to secure this, an effective mutual insurance scheme should be organised for assisting prospective pay bed patients to make provision in advance, as has been done for ordinary Hospital patients by contributory schemes like the Hospital Saving Association, and for middle class patients, on a small scale as yet, by schemes such as those of the British Provident Association and the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital;
 - (x) That it is desirable that, so far as London is concerned, an insurance scheme of this kind should, like the Hospital Saving Association, be organised by a central body working in co-operation with the individual Hospitals with pay beds;
 - (xi) That full consideration should be given to the suggestion that a scheme of subscription to the capital cost of providing pay bed accommodation might be associated with an insurance scheme covering maintenance charges.
- 2. The Committee also expressed the view that a material extension of the existing pay bed provision was urgently required to meet the existing demand.
- 3. The General Council of the Fund, on December 14, 1928, expressed its general approval of these conclusions.
- 4. A scheme of the kind referred to in conclusion (xi) has been submitted to the King's Fund by Sir Alan Anderson as Vice-Chairman of the British Provident Association.

5. The scheme has been prepared jointly by the Association and the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, which has an extension scheme which, when completed, will include the provision of a pay bed block.

Scheme of the British Provident Association.

- 6. Under the existing scheme of the British Provident Association, ordinary members pay an annual premium of $\pounds I$ is. to $\pounds 2$ 2s. a year, according to size of family, in return for which the Association pays the cost of maintenance in a pay bed at a hospital or in a nursing home up to a maximum of $\pounds 5$ a week for 3 weeks. Members can also, by paying an additional premium according to a prescribed scale, insure for the cost of medical and surgical fees up to varying amounts.*
- 7. Under the proposed scheme there will also be given an opportunity to contribute £10 towards the capital cost of a pay bed. The capital sums so received by the Association will be devoted to the provision of pay beds, and the contributor of £10 will have a prior claim on the use of such pay beds, when approved for admission according to the rules of the hospital, at a weekly rate based on the maintenance cost.
- 8. By the arrangement with the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital the Association will have the option of paying the hospital £20,000, in return for which the hospital will give to members of the Association the prior claim to use 20 beds as stated in paragraph 7 above.
- 9. It is hoped by the promoters that this may form an experimental beginning of a large scheme of the kind referred to in conclusion (xi) of the Pay Beds Committee quoted above.

Attitude of the King's Fund.

- to. The Management Committee, before expressing any opinion, arranged for an interview between representatives of the British Provident Association, representatives of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, the members of the Distribution Committee, and the Medical members of the King's Fund, at which the whole scheme was fully discussed.
- II. In the course of the discussion it was pointed out that the pay beds section of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital had not yet been carried out, and that the beds immediately available would be provided by the conversion of an existing ward, which the hospital, owing to temporary difficulties following the first part of the extension, could not at present keep open without exceptional financial assistance such as would be provided under the scheme. The King's Fund has received assurances from the Hospital that it will take active steps to proceed with the pay bed section of its extension as soon as possible, and from the British Provident Association that it is its policy to provide the capital cost of additional beds. It was also agreed at the interview that there should be no organic connection between the Association and the King's Fund.
 - * Further details can be obtained from the British Provident Association, 30, Lancaster Gate, W. 2.

- 12. In these circumstances the Management Committee, after communicating with the Distribution Committee and the medical members of the Fund, have informed Sir Alan Anderson that they consider the scheme to be consistent with the recommendations of the Pay Beds Committee of which the General Council have expressed general approval, and they have conveyed to him on behalf of the King's Fund an expression of sympathy with the scheme and of hope for its success.
- 13. It will be remembered that, when referring to the Pay Beds Report at the Annual Meeting of the Council in 1929, His Royal Highness the President said: "The Committee also recommended an Insurance Scheme for meeting the cost of a pay bed and of surgical fees. Sir Alan Anderson, who was one of the Honorary Secretaries of the King's Fund when it helped to start the Hospital Saving Association to enable wage-earners to make provision for their Hospital payments, has been working for some time at a similar scheme for the middle classes, and I hope he will achieve a similar success."

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS (PARLIAMENTARY) COMMITTEE.

REPORT TO GENERAL COUNCIL.

JANUARY TO MAY, 1930.

I. The principal items that have come before the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee of the King's Fund during 1930 have been the formation of a representative voluntary hospital committee for the County of London under Section 13 of the Local Government Act, 1929, and the Clause in the Road Traffic Bill providing for payment to hospitals for the treatment of accident cases covered by the compulsory insurance sections of the Bill.

A.—Voluntary Hospital Representation in Connection with the Local Government Act.

The London Voluntary Hospitals Committee.

- 2. The Scheme of Voluntary Hospital Representation for the County of London was finally settled, accepted by the London County Council, and circulated to the hospitals by March 5. The Scheme had been drafted by the Joint Committee, composed of representatives of the King's Fund Committee, the Conference of Teaching Hospitals, and the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, under the Chairmanship of Sir Cooper Perry. It had been submitted in draft to the London County Council and to the hospitals, and all the observations and suggestions received from them were taken into account in settling the final form.
- 3. The Scheme provided for the formation of a Central Committee and six subordinate Committees, namely, an Area Committee for each of the five Areas referred to in the Administrative Scheme of the London County Council, and a Committee for the Special Hospitals whose work is not localised in regard to any particular Area. The methods of election were such as to secure the representation of teaching hospitals, of non-teaching general hospitals and cottage hospitals, and of the localised special hospitals as well as the non-localised, and also to provide for representation both of the governing bodies of the hospitals and of their medical and surgical staffs.
- 4. The Area Committees and the Non-localised Special Hospitals Committee were elected by electoral bodies on which every hospital was represented, and they themselves formed jointly an electoral body for the election of the Central Committee. These electoral bodies might also, should occasion arise, be used by the Central Committee as a means of ascertaining, by conference or otherwise, the views of the constituent hospitals.

- 5. The elections were all completed by April 2, and the Central Committee held its first meeting on April 9. Lord Riddell was elected Chairman, and Dr. Geoffrey Evans, Honorary Secretary.
- 6. This new organisation, the official title of which is to be the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, will be entirely independent of the King's Fund. But the Fund is keenly interested in its work, and will be ready to assist in any way which may be considered desirable. It has already taken an active part in helping the hospitals to create the representative machinery. It is also, for the present, providing temporary clerical assistance, in view of the fact that the new Committee cannot as yet estimate the amount of work its duties will involve, or the staff which will be needed. And the Fund will, whenever invited, be willing to continue to assist the Committee with statistical and other information.

Consultations with the London County Council.

- 7. The function of the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee is to act as the representative body to be consulted by the London County Council when making provision for hospital accommodation, in accordance with Section 13 of the Local Government Act, as to the accommodation to be provided and as to the purposes for which it is to be used. This Section was introduced into the Act as the result of the action taken by the Special Committee of the King's Fund. The object of the Special Committee was to ensure "that, in the changes that would result from the transfer of the Poor Law infirmaries to the County Councils and County Borough Councils, the hospital service should not lose the special features which, in this country, are contributed by the voluntary hospitals and which depend on the maintenance at those hospitals of voluntary management and voluntary finance." The action which resulted in the inclusion of Section 13 was designed to secure that the Act itself should recognise this principle and make permanent provision for co-operation between the Council hospitals and the voluntary hospitals in a hospital service which should, by means of this co-operation, attain to a maximum of efficiency.
- 8. It is gratifying to note the accumulating evidence that this co-operation is welcomed both by the London County Council and by the voluntary hospitals. This has been shown not only in words, by the various statements that have been made in the Press and at King's Fund Council Meetings by members of the County Council and by voluntary hospital workers, but also in deeds, by the fact that consultations have already begun, the newly-formed Committee having received at each of its first two meetings communications from the County Council desiring its opinion on matters of high importance.

Voluntary Hospital Representation Outside the County of London.

9. The King's Fund is also concerned with the hospitals outside the County of London, but within II miles of St. Paul's. These hospitals have to be represented on Voluntary Hospital bodies for the Counties or County Boroughs in which they are situated. They will generally

be associated for this purpose with hospitals which lie outside the King's Fund area, but within the area of one or other of the Regional Committees of the British Hospitals Association. It was, therefore, thought best that the King's Fund, while expressing its willingness to assist if desired, should leave the initiative to the hospitals and to the Association. The Fund is glad to learn from the Association that, in these Areas also, the machinery for consultation has been created, and has been recognised by the County Authorities concerned.

in the London area, treat large numbers of patients residing in other Counties. The Act contemplates that, for the purposes of consultation, the work of hospitals providing services for the County should be taken into account, and not only that of those situated in the County. The Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee were consulted as to the exact method of arranging for this, but decided to await the formation of the voluntary hospital bodies for the respective counties concerned, as it might possibly be found convenient for these bodies to discuss it with each other.

Statements Published by the King's Fund.

- Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Bill," a Memorandum discussing the special features of the voluntary hospital system, the importance of maintaining them, and the possible methods of co-operation by which they could best be maintained in the interests of the efficiency of both branches of the hospital service. They have now followed this by publishing a further Memorandum, prepared for the King's Fund by Mr. Malcolm Trustram Eve, on the "Powers and Duties of Local Authorities in the Matter of Hospital Accommodation under the Local Government Act." The first memorandum described the ideal which the Committee wished to recommend. The second describes the legal framework which conditions its realisation. The two, taken together, give an account of the situation as it appears to the Committee at the present moment, when the hospitals and the County Councils are just beginning to work out the methods of co-operation in actual practice.
- B.—Hospital Clause in the Road Traffic Bill.

 12. The Committee have given a good deal of time this year, in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association, to the consideration of the Clause in the Road Traffic Bill which provides that, in cases where a payment is made to an injured third party under the compulsory insurance part of the Bill, a hospital treating the injured person shall receive payment, up to £25, for the expenses of such treatment.
- 13. The Clause originated in an amendment moved by Lord Luke in Committee in the House of Lords on December 18, 1929. A revised form of clause, prepared in consultation with the King's Fund Committee, was adopted by the House of Lords on January 23, 1930; and with some drafting amendments was passed by the House of Commons on April 10.





King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C.4.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to King Edward's Hospital Fund (G.P.O. Box 465A), 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-three years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £6,488,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922–3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1929 being £250,000, besides £115,000, in aid of hospital extensions and improvements, out of the Thank-Offering Fund for the King's Recovery, and £13,734 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 12s. 4d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over $3\frac{3}{4}d$. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £449,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-one years, the contribution in 1929 being £17,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of Annual Statistics showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following pages). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, the Out-patient Question, the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Quantity Statistics, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act.

A pamphlet has been published containing a list of 1,344 pay beds at 95 London Hospitals.

As the result of gifts of £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and £37,000 received through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and

economically employed.
