

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1926.

THE FINANCIAL PROGRESS OF THE HOSPITALS.

- 1. The continued improvement in the finances of the London voluntary hospitals was thus described by the Prince of Wales in his speech at the Council meeting of the King's Fund in December 1926:
 - "There were in 1925 more surpluses and fewer deficits than in any year since the war. Voluntary gifts came to more, and patients' contributions went up; the amount collected by the hospitals for building schemes increased, and their receipts of all kinds during the year reached a colossal total. The figures are all in the King's Fund Statistical Report: here they are—Voluntary gifts, £98,000 up; patients' contributions, £74,000 up; building receipts increased by £364,000; total receipts of all kinds for the year, £3,887,000."
- 2. His Royal Highness went on to point out that in spite of all this the hospitals wanted from the King's Fund distribution just as much or even more, the reason being that their work was growing quite as fast as their income.

SUMMARY OF KING'S FUND RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

- 3. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1926 were £285,749 4s. 7d.
- 4. Of this, £30,000 was from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells; £1,874 28.11d. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen; £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £4,189 168. 6d. from other legacies; £1,739 148. from gifts to capital (including £1,697 108.11d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt.); and £246,945 118. 2d. from general receipts. - 7. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. The Council are much indebted to the Visitors for the reports, which are of the greatest assistance in the distribution.
- 8. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,269,188. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £5,537,604 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 9. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also were their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, Prince Henry, Prince George, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, the Duke of Connaught and other members of the Royal Family.
- 10. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company; £1,050 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland) Ltd., £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from the Earl of Iveagh, from

Mr. Robert Fleming, from Lloyds Bank Limited, and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £525 from the Westminster Bank Limited; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Mr. George Roberts, and from "W.C.W."; and donations of £10,000 from Mr. Albert W. Searle, of £1,000 from Lord Glendyne, and of £500 from the Goldsmiths' Company, from "S.D.R.S.D.", and from Messrs. Wallace Bros., & Co., Ltd.; besides anonymous donations of £7,000 and £1,500. The munificent gifts of Mr. Albert W. Searle and the anonymous donors were of the utmost importance in contributing to the maintenance of the distribution at the same figure as in 1925.

- II. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £15,000. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £398,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League for this valuable assistance, collected in moderate and continuous amounts from those whom it would otherwise have been difficult to reach.
- 12. The Fund also received the sum of £15,000 from The British Charities Association for distribution amongst the Hospitals in the London area, making a total of £50,000 received since 1924. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in again entrusting to the King's Fund the distribution of that part of their receipts which they have allocated to the London area.
- 13. Legacies received during the year included £30,000 from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £192,240 received to date); £1,874 2s. 11d. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen, further on account of the residue (making a total sum of £668,763 4s. 6d. received to date); £1,697 10s. 11d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £360,594 15s. 3d. received to date, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £513,513 4s. 6d. received to date). Other legacies during the year included £1,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Dora Charlotte Duveen of New York County. The Fund is also grateful to the Trustee of the residuary estate of the late Miss Letitia Gertrude Hunt for the gift of £1,000 in the exercise of his discretionary powers.

EXPENSES.

14. During the year the amount spent on administration was £10,440 8s. 2d. or about $8\frac{1}{2}d$. per £1 of the total received, as compared with £10,420 14s. 7d. or 6d. per £1 in the previous year.

Wells Legacies Distribution and Hospital Extensions.

15. Further special grants, amounting to £39,750, were made towards schemes of extension and improvement, including the provision of accident beds, out of the legacies of

the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, allocated by the General Council in 1924 to special purposes. The schemes aided by the grants in 1926 will provide an additional 420 beds, of which at least 51 will be reserved for accidents.

- 16. The total amount distributed out of the Wells legacies to the end of 1926 was £177,750, and the total number of additional beds to be provided with the aid of the grants was 1,117, including 144 for accidents.
- 17. At the end of the year the Distribution Committee had before them schemes which could easily have absorbed the rest of the £200,000 which was the amount originally expected from the Wells legacies. But as information had just been received that this total would almost certainly be exceeded, the question of a final allocation of the balance was deferred.

REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

18. The special committee under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham has continued to devise and carry out methods of making known to the public the work of the hospitals and of the King's Fund. A Summary of the year's activities will be found in the Report of the Revenue Committee. These have included the preparation of a hospital film, at the first exhibition of which the Prince of Wales as President of the King's Fund was present.

HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS.

- 19. The new edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts was finally settled by the Hospital Economy Committee, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and the Hospital Saturday Fund, after having been first circulated in draft for the observations of the Hospitals, the British Hospitals Association, and the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers. The new system came into force with the accounts of the hospitals for the year 1926.
- 20. While the new edition retains the principal features of the revision carried out by the late Mr. John G. Griffiths between 1905 and 1914, various changes in detail are made to bring the system into line with subsequent developments of hospital work and hospital accounting. The System itself deals only with the published accounts of the hospitals. But appendices have now been added which discuss certain questions of internal control of expenditure to which a great deal of attention has been directed in recent years, viz.: Hospital Budgets, Statistics of Quantities consumed, and the calculation of Departmental Costs.
- 21. The new edition is obligatory on all hospitals receiving grants from the three Central Funds in London. The Voluntary Hospitals Commission, established under the report of Lord Cave's Committee, have recommended all the local Voluntary Hospitals Committees throughout the Country to invite the hospitals in their districts to adopt it, wherever practicable.

Pensions for Nurses and for Hospital Officers.

- 22. At the end of 1925 the draft Scheme of Pensions, which had been drawn up by a Conference during the year, had been circulated to all the hospitals in London and the Provinces for observations and expressions of opinion. The Conference consisted of representatives of the British Hospitals Association, the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers and the College of Nursing, and of the King's Fund which acted as convener at the request of the other bodies.
- 23. After the observations received from the hospitals had been received and circulated, the King's Fund held discussions first with representatives of a few large hospitals and then with a Mansion House Conference of 89 Hospitals in London that had declared themselves in sympathy with the proposals. The Fund then invited the Hospitals that were prepared to adopt the Scheme, as thus settled, to meet and take definite steps to start it. The Fund also offered financial assistance, of limited amount and for a limited period, towards expenditure incurred by hospitals in London upon the Scheme.
- 24. The meeting to set the Scheme on foot was held on July 5, when a Provisional Council was formed to take the necessary steps to bring it into operation. By the end of the year the Scheme had been adopted by 86 Hospitals in London, representing 11,448 beds out of a total of about 14,500; and the Provisional Council was engaged in settling the details, including the arrangements with Insurance Companies for the policies securing the pensions.
- 25. The matter is thus now in the hands of the Hospitals themselves. The King's Fund is not represented on the Provisional Council, though it retains a warm interest in the scheme, which was originally based on a report prepared by a King's Fund Committee of Enquiry and published by the Fund for the consideration of the parties concerned. It is believed that the Scheme will raise the status and increase the attractiveness of the nursing profession and improve the careers of those who are drawn to Hospital administration, and will thus make for increased efficiency in the Health Service of the Country.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS.

- 26. In June the King's Fund published a memorandum on Fire Precautions at Hospitals. This was based partly on a report on the same subject prepared for the Fund in 1907 by the late Sir Eyre Shaw and by Sir Lionel Wells, and partly on some very full and detailed notes furnished by Mr. A. R. Dyer, the present chief officer of the London Fire Brigade, to whom the Fund is greatly indebted for his assistance.
- 27. The memorandum is intended to assist Hospital Committees in deciding for themselves whether their own fire precautions are adequate, after taking into account the extent to which the detailed suggestions it contains are applicable to the special circumstances of the individual hospital.

PERSONNEL.

- 28. Early in the year the Council had the misfortune to lose by death the services of Lord Stuart of Wortley, who had been an active member of the Fund since its foundation and had retired from the Chairmanship of the Management Committee only at the end of 1925. A resolution passed by the Council at the Annual Meeting in May, with details of Lord Stuart's services to the Fund, was published in the Report for 1925.
- 29. The Council have to regret the retirement at the end of 1926 of Sir William Church, who had been a member of the Council from 1899 and was Chairman of the Distribution Committee, in succession to Lord Lister, from 1903 to 1918.

SPECIAL NEEDS 1927.

- 30. The present special needs of the situation can be best enforced by again quoting from the speech of His Royal Highness the President at the meeting in December last, already referred to:—
 - "More beds have been opened, and more still are being provided. It is quite a mistake to suppose that the voluntary hospital system is incapable of expanding. As the Distribution Committee say, the present schemes will add 1,600 beds to those that were open a year ago. The Fund is, therefore, asked to help, both in maintaining the additional wards that are open, and in building those that are being provided. When these are open, there will again be more to maintain; more building schemes will be undertaken, and the demands on the King's Fund will go on growing."
- 31. In their efforts to help the Hospitals to meet these needs, the Council are again greatly indebted to the Press for its continued assistance in securing publicity for the activities of the King's Fund.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 14, 1926.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, December 14, 1926, at 11.30 a.m., HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES being in the Chair.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) said: May it please your Royal Highness, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen: -It is my duty as Treasurer to explain how the amount which is to be distributed to-day has been provided. At the November meeting the Council decided that the ordinary distribution should be maintained at £245,000, the amount to which it was increased last year. In addition the grants during the year out of the legacies of Mr. and Mrs. Wells amount to a further £39,750. The two distributions together, therefore, represent a total of £284,750. The ordinary distribution of £245,000 is arrived at by taking the whole of the income for the year, estimated at £236,000, and by adding to this amount the undistributed surplus of last year, which amounted to almost exactly £9,000. Taking the two years together the amount distributed will be practically balanced by the total derived from the two sources indicated. It follows, therefore, that the income for 1926 was less than that for 1925 to the extent of about £18,000. This diminution was mainly due to a decrease from £19,549 to £3,590 in the amount received in respect of legacies. Fluctuation in the amount of legacies is a contingency always to be borne in mind, and the prudent action of the Council last year in retaining the sum of £9,000 referred to has resulted in its being possible on the present occasion to maintain the amount available at the same figure as that of last year. The British Charities Association has contributed to the Fund the sum of £15,000 this year, as against £20,000 last year. On the other hand, the Fund has received this year £27,300 by way of donations as against £22,829 in 1925, the increase being mainly attributable to a munificent gift of £10,000 from Mr. Albert Searle, and to one of £7,000 from an anonymous donor who has supported the Fund on more than one previous occasion. This is very satisfactory, I think, this increase in donations. The income of the Fund, apart from legacies, has thus been steadily maintained. The grants of £39,750 made from the Wells legacies increase the total distributed from this source to date to the sum of £177,750. The Fund has received so far £192,240 from this source. I am pleased, however, to be able to announce that information has just reached us to the effect that the total sum to be realised by the two estates, which was originally estimated at rather more than £200,000, will almost certainly be considerably in excess of that figure. Indeed, the Trustees express a hope that a total approximating £240,000 will be ultimately realised, on the assumption—which they have reason to think may be the case—that there will be no further duties payable in connection with these estates.

LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Sir William Collins, in making his annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that some districts showed a falling off, but it was hoped that those showing an increase would counterbalance this. The falling off was attributable in some districts to the coal dispute, and in others to the competition of contributory schemes and to the practice of asking payment from patients. The League had branches in Scotland, the Channel Islands, South Africa and India, as well as throughout a large portion of England and Wales, and wherever it collected it also distributed. This year the British Charities Association had handed it £5,000 to distribute to voluntary hospitals in almost every county in England and in Northern Ireland. After consulting the Honorary Treasurer he was able to recommend that the sum of £15,000 should again be handed over to the King's Fund, making a total of £398,034 contributed by the League to the King's Fund. The grand total of distribution for voluntary hospitals in London and outside by the League in twenty-seven years was £485,368.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Vice-Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir John Rose Bradford) presented the report of the Committee on the distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent branches) (see pages 22–24), and moved the adoption of the recommendations.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent branches) (see pages 25-33).

Lord Marshall having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Vice-Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir John Rose Bradford) then presented the Report of the Committee on the distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals (see page 34), and moved the recommendations.

Major Harold Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals (see pages 35-37).

The motion, having been seconded by Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson, was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of the Governor of the Bank of England (Right Hon. Montagu C. Norman), seconded by the Chairman of the London County Council (Sir George Hume), it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 17.

WELLS LEGACIES DISTRIBUTION.

The Vice-Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir John Rose Bradford) then presented the Report of the Committee on the special distribution to Hospitals out of the Wells Legacies to date, in aid of extensions and improvements (see page 38), and moved the recommendations.

Major Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the schedule containing the list of awards for the year (see pages 39 and 40).

Lady Ampthill having seconded the motion, it was put and carried.

PENSIONS FOR HOSPITAL OFFICERS AND FOR NURSES.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) presented a report of the Committee on the Scheme of Pensions for Hospital Officers and for Nurses. The Report stated that, following on the Mansion House Conference on May 19, the invitation having been accepted by representatives of 89 hospitals in sympathy with the Scheme, the Management Committee had issued a memorandum, "Outlines of Scheme as approved by the King's Fund for the purpose of special grants in aid," with a statement of the conditions and maximum aggregate amount of the grants which the General Council had decided to offer. On July 5 a meeting was held of representatives of 69 hospitals which had decided to adopt the Scheme as thus outlined. Definite steps were then and there taken to start the Scheme, including the formation of a Provisional Council and Provisional Executive Committee, representing the hospitals, the officers and the nurses. Since then this Provisional Council, of which Sir Edward Penton, K.B.E., had been elected chairman, had been responsible for the Scheme. The King's Fund was not represented on the Council or Executive, but members or officers of the Fund had been invited to attend the meetings, and had done so.

At the present moment, 86 hospitals in London had joined the Scheme, representing 11,448 beds out of a total of about 14,500. A circular had just been sent out by the Provisional Council to hospitals outside London.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-

I have first to read the following gracious message from the King:-

The King is glad to learn that the Fund has been able to maintain the same distribution as last year, though he realises that this has only been possible through the timely help of two or three large donations. His Majesty has much at heart the objects and activities of the Fund, which he earnestly trusts may continue to receive the generous support of the public, and thus be enabled to fulfil the demands made upon its resources, due to the ever-increasing work of the London Hospitals.

The financial story of this year's distribution can be told in a very few words. Last year we raised the total from £235,000 to £245,000, and in the end had £9,000 in hand for future contingencies. This year we are £9,000 short. So, by using last year's surplus, we are just able to keep the ordinary distribution at £245,000. If we add the £39,750 special grants out of the Wells estates, the grand total is £284,750. This surplus of £9,000 last year was due to legacies, which are always liable to fluctuations. This year they are very much smaller than usual. In the other items of income the receipts have been well kept up. We are most gratified to hear from Sir William Collins that he hopes the League of Mercy will again contribute £15,000. The British Charities Association have kindly entrusted us with £15,000 for hospitals in London—not quite so much as last year, but equal to 1924. Donations have increased. Lord Revelstoke has given us the figures—£27,000 as against £22,000. They include the very welcome gifts of £10,000 from Mr. Albert Searle, £7,000 from one anonymous donor, and £1,500 from another. I have already thanked these good friends in my own name, and I now do so in yours. Their gifts have saved the situation for us. They have enabled us to maintain the distribution without drawing anything from reserve except the £9,000 which was put by last year. It is the settled policy of the Fund to increase the distribution, as far as it can be increased with a reasonable prospect of not having to reduce it again. And this we have succeeded in doing. I am told that a reduction this year would have placed the Distribution Committee in a serious difficulty; the demands on the Fund were so great. This does not mean that the hospitals were doing badly. Quite the opposite. There were in 1925 more surpluses and fewer deficits than in any year since the war. Voluntary gifts came to more, and patients' contributions went up; the amount collected by the hospitals for building schemes increased, and their receipts of all kinds during the year reached a colossal total. The figures are all in the King's Fund Statistical Report: here they are voluntary gifts, £98,000 up; patients' contributions, £74,000 up; building receipts increased by £364,000; total receipts of all kinds for the year, £3,887,000. Yet, in spite of all this, the hospitals

want from the King's Fund distribution just as much, or even more. The reason is that their work is growing quite as fast as their income. More beds have been opened, and more still are being provided. It is quite a mistake to suppose that the voluntary hospital system is incapable of expanding. As the Distribution Committee say, the present schemes will add 1,600 beds to those that were open a year ago. The Fund is, therefore, asked to help, both in maintaining the additional wards that are open, and in building those that are being provided. When these are open, there will again be more to maintain; more building schemes will be undertaken, and the demands on the King's Fund will go on growing. In helping with these extension schemes, the Distribution Committee have once more been able to make good use of the Wells legacies, which the Council allocated in 1924 for special purposes. As Lord Revelstoke has told you, the two legacies, taken together, will now come to considerably over £200,000. The names of the testators, Mr. and Mrs. Wells, are already household words throughout the hospitals of London. They have helped to add 1,000 beds; to increase substantially the provision for dealing with accidents; and to meet the needs of newly populated areas in Outer London. For some of these areas it is not a case of extending an existing hospital, but of building a hospital where now there is none at all. To meet these fresh needs, the King's Fund has extended its boundaries, and relaxed its rules about new hospitals, and is thus able to assist these districts both with money, and, if they so desire, with advice. As a further sign of progress in hospital finance, I welcome the announcement that the income of the Hospital Saving Association has already reached £150,000 a year, and I congratulate all concerned—Lord Cave's Committee who in 1921 recommended a contributory scheme; the King's Fund who at once urged the hospitals to take it up; the donors to the Combined Appeal who, in 1922, put up money for the initial expenses; the hospitals who co-operated to organise it; and the working men who have responded so splendidly, and who pay in their contributions week by week. The Association is quite independent of the King's Fund, though the Fund helped to start it. Its Secretary, Mr. Elliot, was then, and still is, Secretary of our Revenue Committee. And his services to the King's Fund are all the more valuable because he brings with him an ever-increasing knowledge of the hospital problem, from the point of view of the working-men patients. Another piece of work which the King's Fund has helped to get started, but which the hospitals have now taken over, is the pensions scheme for nurses and hospital officers. The time has not come for me to add much to what I said about this at the last meeting; but I am glad to see that already eighty-six hospitals in London have adopted the scheme, representing 11,500 beds out of 14,500. The new edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts came into force this year. It has been generally adopted in London, as a condition of grants from the King's Fund, the Sunday Fund, and the Saturday Fund. In the provinces it has the backing of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission and of the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society. It can, therefore, claim to be recognised as the standard of good hospital account-keeping, until the time comes for a further advance towards that elusive goal, perfection. In June last the King's Fund issued a fresh memorandum on fire precautions at hospitals. The one prepared in 1907 by Sir Eyre Shaw and Sir Lionel Wells has for some time been out of print. The present one is based partly on this and partly on notes kindly supplied by Mr. A. R. Dyer, the present chief officer of the London Fire Brigade, to whom I should like to express my best thanks and those of the Council. The Propaganda Committee are now thoroughly established as a valuable auxiliary to the Revenue Committee. They are making the work of the King's Fund more and more widely known, and the work of the hospitals also. Only the other day, I went to the New Gallery to see the hospitals film

which they have produced, and I am glad to hear that it is going to be shown at a number of cinemas in different parts of London. Already more than 200 exhibitors, I am told, have applied for it. Before I come to the arrangements for 1927, I wish to express my thanks to the members of the Committees, and especially to the Distribution Committee, and to Sir John Rose Bradford, who, during the absence abroad of Sir Cooper Perry, has acted as Vice-Chairman all through the distribution period. He now occupies a seat on the Council, to our great advantage, not only as a member of the Distribution Committee, but also as President of the Royal College of Physicians. I should also like to thank the Sub-Committee of the Hospital Economy Committee, who, with Sir Basil Mayhew as their Chairman, and Mr. Macrae, the head of our Economy department, as their secretary, carried through the very heavy work of revising the Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. To the visitors and other honorary officers I offer my best thanks, and I would particularly mention the Honorary Secretaries. I am sorry that one of the four, my friend Sir Cecil Lowther, is going abroad and desires to be relieved for the immediate present from these duties; but he will remain on the Council and Committee, and I hope will, later on, return to this work also. His place will not be filled up. There have been several changes in the personnel of the Propaganda Committee. Mr. Grierson, Professor Rothenstein, Mr. George Smith, and Mr. F. J. Whitbread have resigned; and also Mr. E. W. Morris, of the London Hospital, who has been one of the lecturers to schools, and has served on the Committee itself for a few months, but can now no longer spare the time. following have been added to the Committee: Sir George Fowler, Miss M. Blofeld, Mr. A. E. Johnson, Mr. J. K. King, and Mr. Laurence Tanner. I will now ask one of the Honorary Secretaries to read the list of the members of the Council and Committees as I propose to appoint them for next year.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1927.

Major Wernher having read the list, resolutions were approved, on the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by the Chief Rabbi (Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), delegating powers to the various Committees for 1927.

VOTE OF THANKS.

Lord Stanmore moved a resolution expressing the most grateful thanks of the Council to His Royal Highness for again presiding at their Meeting.

The Lord Mayor (Sir Rowland Blades, M.P.) said that he had very great pleasure in seconding the resolution, and in putting it to the Meeting.

The resolution was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of the President and General Council, May 13, 1927.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace, on Friday, May 13, 1927, HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES being in the Chair. THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,-I propose on this occasion to address you at the beginning of the meeting instead of the end. I do not propose to introduce the separate items of business. That will be done, as usual, by the Honorary Officers and the Chairmen of the respective Committees. Nor do I intend to review the events of the past year. I did that at our meeting in December. I will only make a few general remarks on some of the subjects that are coming before us to-day. But first I have the honour to read the following message from His Majesty the King, our Patron:—

"The King is very glad to know of the prosperity of the Fund and its work for 1926, and is especially pleased to hear of the great results achieved by the use of the Wells legacies, which will help to provide 1,200 additional beds, including 144 beds for accidents, although the whole sum has not yet borne fruit. His Majesty considers that these bequests have been very carefully and wisely expended and that, when the results of the money now still in process of distribution are announced, the total will be still more satisfactory.

(Signed) "STAMFORDHAM."

"Buckingham Palace, "May 13, 1927."

The business on our agenda to-day illustrates very well the position of a great Central Fund like this—the sort of things it can do to help the hospitals and the public, and the ways in which it can use the money entrusted to it. Take first the ordinary distribution. This has been growing steadily during the thirty years since the Fund was founded by King Edward. In 1926, as in 1925, it was £245,000—not yet quite a quarter of a million, but getting near it. This is a very substantial factor in the finances of the hospitals on our books, which are now increased to about 140. It is most important that we should keep up the distribution, and if possible move upwards, never downwards. To do so we need at least £27,000 in donations alone. Of this we received last year £17,000 in two gifts of £10,000 and £7,000. This year one of these donors, who for the fifth time prefers to be anonymous, has given us £8,000 towards the £27,000. Then consider what we have been able to do with the Wells legacies. They have come to a good deal more than £200,000. We have now distributed very nearly the whole, and you will be asked to-day to authorise the Distribution Committee to deal with the small remaining balance. The Wells legacies have helped with fifty schemes, providing about 1,200 additional beds, of which 144 are beds for accidents. This is the second time the King's Fund has had a large sum of money at its disposal for helping the hospitals with schemes of extension and improvement. In 1920 we had the £250,000 entrusted to us, for this purpose, by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, out of their surplus war funds. Then in 1924 we received these munificent legacies from Mr. and Mrs. Wells, which may come to about the same amount. The need for hospital extensions was so great that the Red Cross money had been spent, and numbers of fresh schemes had come forward. Now, after another three years, the Wells legacies are practically exhausted, and still fresh schemes come on. So there is no doubt that, just as the Red Cross distribution was followed by the Wells legacies distribution, so also we could with great advantage follow up the Wells legacies distribution with yet another special distribution, if anyone were to entrust us with the wherewithal. It is my urgent desire and hope that other generous donors, when they see the enormous good done by the use of the Wells gifts, will pe forthcoming to enable us to meet the new needs that are already in sight. It is really astonishing what a lot of money is subscribed under the voluntary system for hospital building schemes. The total in 1925 was no less than £691,000. Part of this is made up of large numbers of comparatively small sums. Part of it is given in large sums by public-spirited individuals who become personally interested in the schemes of particular hospitals. Part of it comes from gifts entrusted to the King's Fund to be distributed according to the knowledge which the Central Fund possesses of the relative claims of the different hospitals, after examining their separate schemes. All these kinds of gifts are an essential part of the maintenance and extension of the voluntary system as we know it to-day.

The Pensions Scheme is an example of another function of a Central Fund like ours. We were asked to take up the question years ago. We did so, and published a report. We were asked two years ago to convene a conference to take action on that report. We did so, and again published a report, drawn up by the Conference in the form of a draft scheme. We have offered assistance to the hospitals in London that have decided to adopt the scheme. The King's Fund will not itself take part in the administration, but gives the scheme its blessing and its help, believing it to be in the interests of the efficiency of the hospitals and the nursing service of the country. All must sympathise with nurses, who have a very real difficulty in providing for their old age, and richly deserve the assistance of a general scheme of pensions. The proposed inquiry into the question of Pay Beds is yet another example of what a Central Fund can do. Just as the Government sets up a Royal Commission or a Departmental Committee to inquire into a matter of State policy, so the King's Fund, as a central voluntary hospital body, sometimes sets up special Committees to inquire into matters of voluntary hospital policy. For example, there was the Medical Schools Inquiry under the late Sir Edward Fry, the Out-patient Inquiry under Lord Mersey, the Pensions Committee under Mr. Whittall, and the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee four years ago under Sir William Collins, which, with the aid of the Wells legacies, has led to the increase of beds for accidents, so badly needed under the conditions of modern traffic. Just now the question of the provision of hospital accommodation for paying patients has come very much to the front. The standing Committees of the Fund have been discussing it. The Management Committee reported on this to me, and I have appointed a Committee of Inquiry to go into the subject. For Chairman I have been fortunate enough to secure the services of Lord Hambleden. Lord Hambleden is a busy man, and yet is always ready to undertake useful work for the voluntary hospitals, and is certain, when he does undertake it, to put his back into it, at whatever cost to himself—so much so, that really I hardly liked to ask him. But he has accepted, and I am very grateful to him. His colleagues will be two medical members, Sir John Rose Bradford and Mr. Warren Low, and two lay members, Sir Bernard Mallet and Professor Winifred Cullis. That seems to me a very strong Committee. But though, under our Act of Parliament, I, as President, appoint Committees, they can do nothing unless and until you, as the Council, delegate powers to them. You will, therefore, be asked by the Management Committee to do so. They are very simple powers: merely to inquire and to report any conclusions the Committee may arrive at. The Committee can then get to work and begin to take evidence. I have now only to refer to a few personal questions. We have lost a much-valued member of the Council and the Distribution Committee by the death of Sir Frederick Green, in whose stead on that Committee I have appointed Sir Leonard Lyle. Lord Bearsted also had been a member of the Council and a good friend to hospitals. One of our oldest members has retired—Sir William Church, who joined the Fund in 1899. We shall miss him at our meetings after so many years. From 1903 to 1918 he was Chairman of the Distribution Committee, where he succeeded Lord Lister, that very great man whose centenary has just been celebrated. Lord Lister was the first Chairman, and had held the office for six years. The King's Fund was represented at the celebration by Lord Somerleyton, who joined the Council, as did Lord Lister, at its foundation in 1897. Finally, at this Annual Meeting, when the accounts are presented, you will wish me to express your thanks, with mine, to the Finance Committee, to whose expert care we are indebted for the favourable position of our invested funds. I am deeply grateful for the constant personal attention which Lord Revelstoke, their Chairman and our Treasurer, gives to this very important subject. It gives us confidence, as it has, I believe, given confidence to some of the most munificent donors to our capital fund. I will now call on Lord Revelstoke to present the accounts.

· ACCOUNTS FOR 1926.

Lord Revelstoke (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1926, said :- May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, the accounts which I have the honour of presenting to-day show that the results of the year's working were rather better than was anticipated at the time of the meeting in December last. According to the estimates which I then submitted. it appeared that the distribution could be maintained at £245,000 if there were drawn from the reserve account of General Funds the £9,000 which was allocated to that account in the preceding year. As the definitive figures for the year now show that the net receipts exceeded the estimates by nearly £5,000, the amount which it was found necessary to withdraw from reserve account was only £4,300. Otherwise expressed, the receipts less expenses amounted to just over £240,000, while the amount of the ordinary distribution was £245,000. Further, the Fund distributed an additional £30,750 on account of the Wells legacies, in the form of grants to schemes of extension and to other special objects. The total amount distributed was therefore £284,750. It may be interesting to recall that it is now almost exactly thirty years since the King's Fund was founded in 1897, the year of the Diamond Jubilee. During these thirty years the Fund has distributed in all a total of somewhat over £5,500,000. Turning to the Balance Sheet, I think we may claim that the position of the invested funds is satisfactory. There have been realised appreciations during the year amounting to £10,844. The market value of the investments on December 31 last, £3,369,242, as stated in the Balance Sheet, is now 3.4 per cent. below their book value—a result which may be considered very satisfactory in view of the fact that a proportion of the securities was acquired more than twenty years ago, when the rates of interest ruling were extremely low.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Mr. LIONEL DE ROTHSCHILD, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1926 (see pages 5-10).

The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir Berkeley Moynihan, Bt.) having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put and carried unanimously.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Sir George Lawson Johnston) presented the report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee (see pages 41 and 42), and moved the recommendation that it be published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for the year 1926.

The motion, having been seconded by Sir Walter Lawrence, was then put and carried.

Pensions for Nurses and for Hospital Officers.

• The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) presented a report of the Committee on the Scheme of Pensions for Nurses and for Hospital Officers, stating that the Scheme had so far been adopted by eighty-nine hospitals in London, representing 11,639 beds out of a total of about 14,500; that the latest details of the Scheme had also been circulated to hospitals outside London, where a great deal of interest was being shown; and that it was possible that a

large number of hospitals were postponing their decision until the Provisional Council was in a position to circulate particulars of the quotations from the Insurance Companies showing the exact amounts of the benefits offered under the Scheme.

Wells Legacies Distribution.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) then presented a report of the Committee on the Wells Legacies Distribution, recommending that a proposal to reserve a sum not exceeding £12,000, to be used, if required, for the assistance of hospitals in the initial expenditure on the Pensions Scheme, out of the increased total amount available from the Wells legacies, be approved; and that the Distribution Committee be given power to allocate any balance that might remain after they had dealt with the schemes that were at present before them.

The recommendations, having been seconded by Sir Frederick Fry, were carried unanimously.

Provision of Pay Beds.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) further presented a report of the Committee on the question of hospital accommodation in London for persons prepared to pay more than ordinary voluntary hospital patients, stating that His Royal Highness the President, having considered a resolution of the Management Committee on the subject, had constituted a Special Committee of Inquiry, to be called the "Pay Beds Committee," and had appointed the following to be members thereof:—Viscount Hambleden (Chairman), Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Bernard Mallet, Mr. V. Warren Low, and Professor Winifred Cullis. He moved a recommendation delegating powers to the Special Committee. Lady Hall having seconded, the motion was put and carried.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The Viscount Burnham said he had the honour to propose a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for having taken the Chair that day. They all knew that but for the existence of the King's Fund the voluntary hospitals of London would long ago have had to rely upon Exchequer grants and pass to a great extent under State control. The fact that they had survived under the conditions which they desired to continue was very largely, if not entirely, due to the fact that they were under the patronage of His Majesty and that they had as their leader and President His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. In recognition of that, he asked them very warmly to show their appreciation of His Royal Highness's services.

Dr. H. MORLEY FLETCHER said he had much pleasure in seconding the vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales for presiding over the Council, and for the very clear and interesting address that His Royal Highness had given them.

The vote was carried by acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS in responding said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—Thank you very much for this vote of thanks. I should like, in my turn, to express my thanks, and in fact everybody's, to Sir George Lawson Johnston and Lord Burnham and all those who have worked so hard on the Propaganda Committee. Propaganda is a very important thing nowadays, and is doing really good work to help the Fund. We must also not forget Mr. Jay, the secretary of this Committee.

The proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- I. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £243,000, the same amount as last year.
- 2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 136, as against 133 in 1925, new applications having been received from the Hostel of St. Luke, the Ormond Maternity Home, and St. Paul's Hospital for Skin.
- 3. Further progress was made during 1925 by the hospitals, taken as a whole, towards the re-establishment of their financial position. The number of hospitals showing deficits for the year was again reduced, and, though the aggregate surplus was smaller than for the year 1924, this surplus was due less to legacies and more to the results of successful special appeals for voluntary contributions. At the same time, the number of available beds has been increased and numerous fresh extension schemes have been undertaken.
- 4. These facts were reflected in the accounts that were before the Distribution Committee when making their awards, and in the applications for grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure. The combined result has been that the total grants towards extensions and improvements amount to £35,475, as against £28,925 in 1925, and that £207,525 is distributed in grants to maintenance, as compared with £214,075 in 1925. These figures are in addition to £39,750 in grants to schemes of capital expenditure out of the special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, which form the subject of a separate report.* This brings the total for the year to £282,750.
- 5. When all the extension schemes which are now being actively promoted by the hospitals in London have been completed, the number of available beds will be 1,632 more than it was on December 31, 1925. The schemes that have come before the King's Fund also

include the provision of improved out-patient departments, additional nurses' accommodation, and other structural work that does not add to the number of beds available for patients.

- 6. The extensions just enumerated often include special casualty or accident beds, and the additions to the general beds increase the capacity of the hospitals to take in accident cases, a matter which has been engaging the attention of the King's Fund for some years.
- 7. It has long been the practice of the King's Fund not to assist in the establishment of new hospitals or to entertain applications for grants from hospitals that have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years. The Distribution Committee suggest that this practice should not apply to new hospitals required for areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund.
- 8. The following grants made in previous years have not yet been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years rule:—

Brentford Cottage Hospital, £500 to rebuilding and extension on new site.

Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, £750 to new out-patient department and permanent wards.

French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £4,000 to rebuilding.

Grosvenor Hospital for Women, £500 to accommodation for R.M.O. and for nurses.

Kensington, Fulham and Chelsea General Hospital, £1,000 to rebuilding and extension.

Royal Northern Hospital, £100 to X-ray improvements.

St. Bartholomew's Hospital, £1,000 to new operating theatres.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed, and are recommending the Council accordingly.

- 9. The Revenue Committee and Hospital Economy Committee have, as usual, made an exhaustive study of the tables in the King's Fund Statistical Report analysing the income and the expenditure respectively of the separate hospitals, and have furnished reports and recommendations on which the Distribution Committee have based private remarks which they suggest should be attached to the grants.
- 10. The Distribution Committee are again greatly indebted to the Visitors, whose reports do so much to supply the Committee with information about the hospitals from year to year. In several instances extracts from the reports are appended to the grants for the observations of the Committee of Management of the Hospital concerned.

- 11. In view of the absence from England of Sir Cooper Perry, Chairman of the Committee, during the distribution period, His Royal Highness the President appointed Sir John Rose Bradford to the office of Vice-Chairman for the remainder of the year.
 - 12. The list of grants is appended.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON THE

SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OUT OF THE LEGACIES OF THE LATE MR. AND MRS. WELLS, JANUARY 1 TO DECEMBER 31, 1926.

- 1. The Distribution Committee have continued throughout the year to consider applications for grants out of the distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. The Council decided in 1924 to devote these legacies to meeting special needs of hospitals, and particularly the need for extensions and improvements and increased provision for accident cases. The Council gave the Distribution Committee power to act in the intervals between Council Meetings.
- 2. The Council also adopted the policy of attaching to the grants, in suitable cases, conditions designed to assist the hospital concerned in expediting the scheme or in raising the balance of the cost, or to secure the reservation of beds for accidents.
- 3. The Committee are now recommending a further list of grants as the result of an examination of all the schemes which came before them at the ordinary distribution.
- 4. The schemes assisted by these grants for the year 1926 will provide approximately 420 additional beds, of which 51 will be reserved for accident cases, besides any that may be so reserved at Charing Cross. As 93 accident beds were included in the schemes assisted out of the Wells legacies distributions in 1924 and 1925, and 32 in schemes provided by hospitals with funds from other sources, the total increase in accident accommodation since the publication of the Report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee of the King's Fund will be at least 176.
- 5. The amount to be received from the two legacies was originally estimated at about £200,000, but it is now practically certain that this will be considerably exceeded. The grants for the current year amount to £39,750, and the total distributed to date is £177,750. The list of grants for 1926 is appended.

Charing Cross Hospital.—£5,000 towards scheme of extension by the acquisition of the building of the Royal Westminster Ophthalmic Hospital, payable when a further £19,000 has been raised from the public; on the understanding that the extension will provide an enlarged casualty department and additional accident beds. (The additional beds of all kinds are now estimated at approximately 80).

East Ham Hospital.—£5,000 towards rebuilding as a general hospital providing 80 beds instead of the present 25, on condition that a further £5,000 is raised, and the work begun, by June 30.

ELIZABETH GARRETT ANDERSON HOSPITAL.—£2,000 towards first stage of extension, increasing the number of beds from 75 to 100; £1,000 to be payable when the work is begun, and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 to enable the first stage to be opened free of debt, on the understanding that the balance is raised by the hospital without drawing on General Fund cash or investments.

FINCHLEY MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.—£500 towards new casualty wards of 8 beds, increasing the number of beds from 47 to 55, to be the last £500 to render the extension free of debt; on the understanding that the 8 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

ILFORD EMERGENCY HOSPITAL.—£2,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 62 to 100; £1,000 of the grant to be payable when a further £5,000 has been raised, and £1,000 when another £5,000 has been raised and the work begun; on the understanding that the scheme will include a casualty department with 2 accident beds.

Kensington, Fulham and Chelsea General Hospital.—£1,500 towards the first stage of the rebuilding scheme, providing 44 beds instead of the present 19.

MILDMAY MISSION HOSPITAL.—£500 towards additional nurses' accommodation, new X-ray department and operating theatre.

PADDINGTON GREEN CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL.—£2,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 46 to 92, of which £1,000 to start the appeal and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 to enable the extension to be opened free of debt.

QUEEN MARY'S HOSPITAL FOR THE EAST END.—£5,000 towards new casualty block, increasing the number of beds at the hospital from 160 to 184; on condition that by September 30, 1926, a further £10,000 has been raised and the scheme begun; and on the understanding that, when the scheme is finished, 24 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

ROYAL LONDON OPHTHALMIC HOSPITAL.—£500 towards additional nurses' accommodation enabling the number of available beds to be increased from 120 to 150.

St. Mark's Hospital.—£500 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 54 to 65.

St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington.—£4,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 290 to 340, on condition that at least a further £20,000 is raised from the public, and the work begun, by January 1, 1927; and on the understanding that, when the extension is opened, at least 13 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

South London Hospital for Women.—£2,000 towards the provision of block containing new out-patient department and nurses' quarters; of which £1,000 to start the appeal and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 required to enable the block to be opened free of debt.

University College Hospital.—£250 towards provision of 4 casualty beds.

VICTORIA HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN.—£500 towards extension of light treatment department; to be the last £500 to render the extension free of debt, on the understanding that the balance is raised by the hospital.

Walthamstow, Wanstead and Leyton Children's and General Hospital.—£1,000 towards extension, to be the last £1,000 required to render the extension free of debt, making, with £2,000 granted in 1924, a total of £3,000.

Wembley Hospital.—£2,000 towards erection of a general hospital of 24 beds, with casualty department; £1,000 to be payable when the amount raised from other sources amounts to £12,000 and the work is begun, and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 required to open the hospital free of debt.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1926.

- 1. The Propaganda Committee, appointed in 1923, under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham, as a sub-committee of the Revenue Committee, has had another busy year of work, and has inaugurated various new money-raising schemes, as well as carrying out general propaganda on behalf of the King's Fund and the hospitals.
 - 2. The principal activities during 1926 were:
 - (a) Series of illustrated lectures on "Historic London," held in the Great Hall of Westminster School in February and March;
 - (b) Fourth series of public debates, or "Lectures and Counter-Lectures," on literary and topical subjects, at the London School of Economics, during April, May, and June. The programme was seriously affected by the General Strike, but the net proceeds nevertheless amounted to over £500;
 - (c) Special Farewell Performance in July by Miss Ruth Draper, assisted by Miss Helen May, at the Garrick Theatre;
 - (d) Specially conducted visits to Westminster Abbey and the Tower of London, in July and August, under the guidance of Mr. Lawrence Tanner and Mr. Walter Bell;
 - (e) Series of "Popular Talks" on Travel, Science, and Invention, in October and November, at the Royal Institute of British Architects and the Regent Street Polytechnic;
 - (f) Wireless talk on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals by Mr. E. W. Morris, House governor of the London Hospital, by arrangement with Sir George Newman, subsequently printed for the benefit of the Hospital Sunday Fund, and distributed to parochial clergy for use on "Hospital Sunday";
 - (g) Presentation of Hospital Film, "A Hundred Years of Progress," which had been re-edited and re-assembled with the assistance of Messrs. Pathé Frères, at Messrs. Gaumont's trade-show at the New Gallery Kinema on November 16, when H.R.H. The Prince of Wales was present, and there was a large attendance of exhibitors. As a result, more than 100 cinema managers in and around London expressed their willingness to screen the film during 1927;
 - (h) Continuation of lectures throughout the year to schools and colleges by doctors and others associated with hospital work, followed in some cases by visits to hospitals;
 - (j) Reprint of pamphlet, "Why a Modern Hospital Costs So Much," with amended statistics on back-page, designed to show the amount which has to be raised annually by voluntary subscriptions to meet the necessary expenditure;
 - (k) Special article by Mr. Pett Ridge in December number of the "Overseas Journal";
 - (m) Preparation of new colour-design for cover of King's Fund propaganda literature, from drawing kindly supplied by Mr. Alfred Taylor;

(n) Issue of new pamphlet, comprising the Prince of Wales's speech at the meeting of the President and General Council on December 14, and "Times" leading

article, "Ever Increasing," with new design on cover;
(o) Presentation of report to Revenue Committee on the need for further accommodation for paying patients, and the greater support for the Voluntary Hospitals likely to be forthcoming if such accommodation were

The Committee have continued to make it their principal aim to bring before the public the claims of the voluntary hospitals by showing what a modern hospital is capable of doing in the prevention and cure of disease.

The Film in particular has been a new experiment. It was very well received by the large gathering of exhibitors who saw it in November, and the Committee are satisfied that its production has been fully justified.

6. The various money-raising schemes organized by the Committee have resulted in the objects and work of the King's Fund becoming known to an ever-widening circle. Every year an increasing number of persons are asking to be notified of fixtures which the Committee may have arranged, and their names and addresses are being registered.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C. 4.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council. (Page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 to 3.

Since July 1921 the Fund, by the invitation of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, has acted as the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund), or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes

or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £5,500,000, including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3, to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1926 being £245,000, besides £39,750, in aid of hospital extensions and improvements, out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 8s. 5d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over $3\frac{1}{2}d$. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £398,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-eight years, the contribution in 1926 being £15,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following page). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are being encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control; Hospital Accommodation for Ambulance Cases; Quantity Statistics; Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses; Beds for Paying Patients.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
