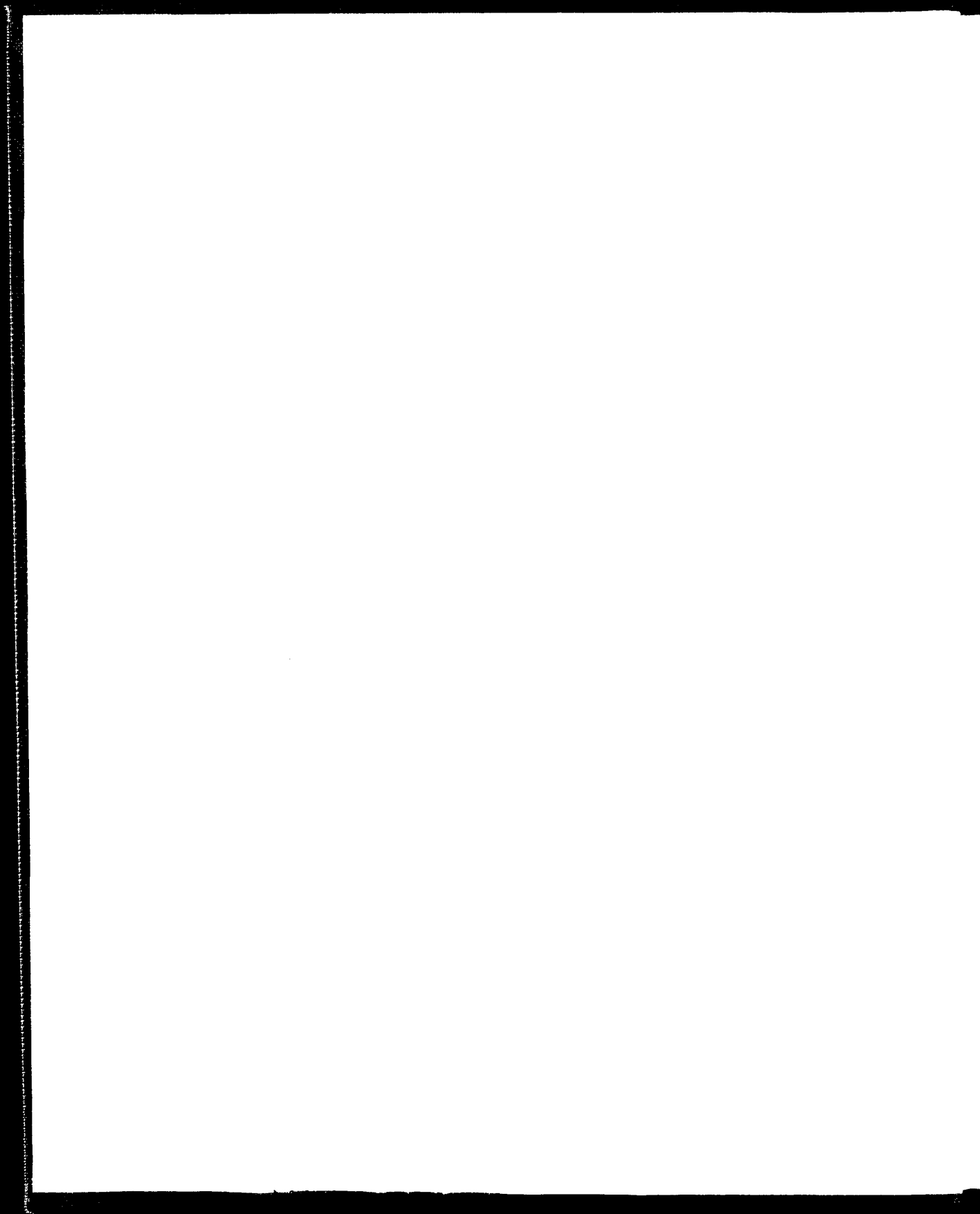
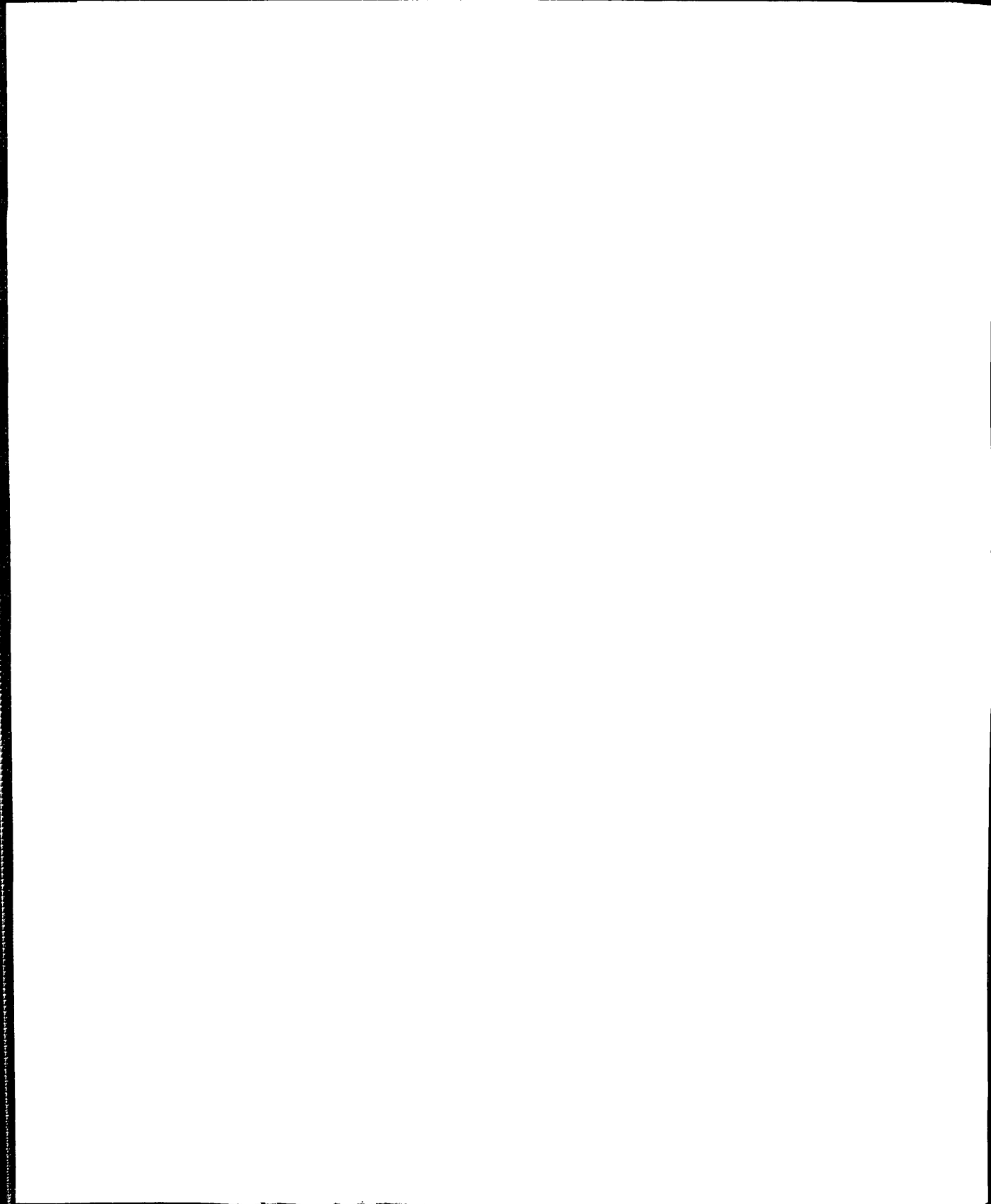

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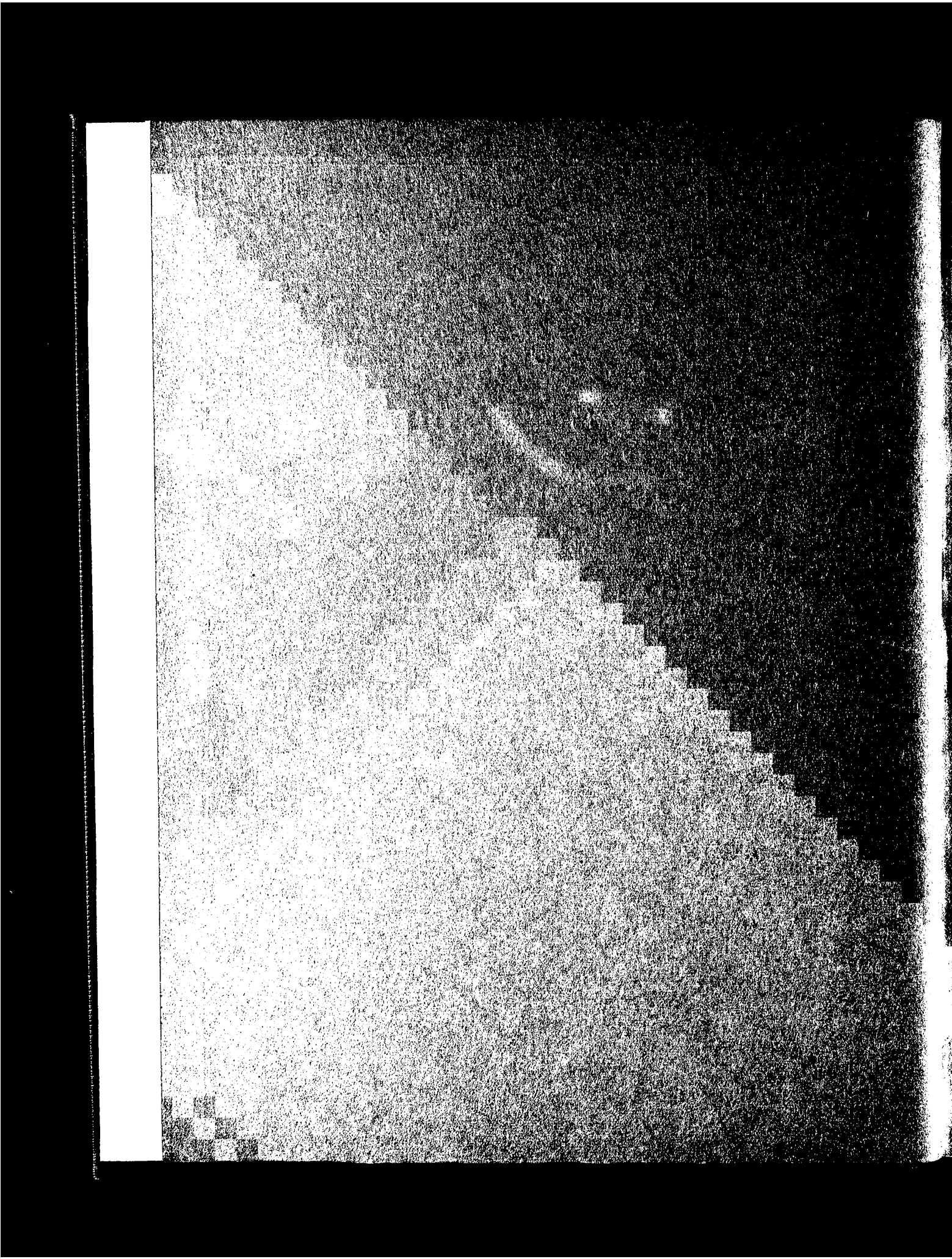

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1933.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

1. The annual distribution of the King's Fund was again £300,000, the increase from £275,000 which was made in 1932 having been maintained in 1933; and again the increased total was wholly provided out of current income for the year.

2. For the sixth successive year the income of the voluntary hospitals of London, taken as a whole, exceeded their expenditure. The complete figures are not yet known, but they will show that, in spite of the financial depression and the consequent exceptional difficulties of some of the hospitals, the aggregate surplus for the year was larger than in 1932, and there were more hospitals with surpluses for the year and fewer with deficits.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

3. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1933 were £499,340 12s. 2d.

4. The general receipts other than legacies were made up as follows:—

while general legacies amounted to £80,381 17s. 0d., making, with £135,924 9s. 9d. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen, and £51 14s. 11d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, a total of £461,565 18s. 6d. The total receipts on capital account

were £19,175 17s. 8d., while receipts for various special purposes amounted to £1,538 13s. 9d. on account of income, and £17,060 2s. 3d. for capital from the estate of the late Sir John Young.

5. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £300,000, as in 1932, apart from the pensions grants, which again amounted to £20,000, also as in 1932.

7. The Visitors' reports on the hospitals applying for grants were again used by the Distribution Committee at their autumn meetings. The Council are most grateful to the Visitors, both medical and lay, for their continued assistance.

8. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals and convalescent homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,066,417. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £7,701,271 8s. 5d. has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

9. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.

10. The Fund also received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,600 from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company, and £1,000 from "M.M." The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from Lloyds Bank Ltd.; of £533 6s. 8d. from Mr. J. J. Crosfield; of £525 from the late Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt.; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; and donations of £1,000 "In Memory of Miss Elinor I. Murray of Camberley by her grateful residuary legatee"; of £525 from Lord Wakefield; of £500 from "J.R.B."; of £400 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D." The Fund also received an anonymous donation of £500.

11. The League of Mercy contributed for the second time the sum of £20,000. The Council are indeed grateful to all who have made possible such a welcome contribution at a time when it is most important to maintain the level of the distribution. The League has now contributed since its foundation in 1899 the sum of £524,000.

12. The Fund also received £10,000 from the British Charities Association as in 1932 for distribution among London Hospitals. The total amount received from the Association for this purpose since 1924 is now £95,000. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in thus entrusting the King's Fund with the distribution of the part of their receipts allocated to the London area.

13. A generous gift of freehold property valued at £18,000 was also received, to be known as "The William and Francis Radford Endowment, from a member of the family." Such additions to the permanent capital are of the greatest value in helping to secure the maintenance of the annual distribution.

14. The invested funds were further increased during the year by the receipt of a reversion of £135,924 9s. 9d. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen on the death of Lady MountStephen, making a total of £804,687 14s. 3d. received to date. The total amount added to the capital account by the munificence of Lord MountStephen is now £1,308,187 14s. 3d.

15. EXPENSES.

16. Expenses during the year amounted to £17,519 19*s.* 7*d.* This included the cost of removal to new and larger offices, their adaptation and furnishing for the requirements of the Fund, and the additional rental and other outgoings for three-quarters of the year, besides the expenditure involved in the numerous activities undertaken by the Fund in the interests of the hospitals, several of which are described in this Report.

PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

17. The grants towards the expenditure of the hospitals on the pensions scheme again amounted to the maximum of £20,000 promised by the Fund. Of this amount, £12,000 was found from the special reserve set aside for the purpose in previous years, and £8,000 was taken from current income, which thus provided £308,000 out of a total distribution of £320,000.

18. By December 31st last the scheme had been adopted by 120 hospitals in the King's Fund area, representing about 17,000 beds in these hospitals and their branches, and also by a large number of hospitals in other parts of the country.

SPECIAL TRUST GIFTS.

19. In addition to the ordinary distribution and the pensions grants, the Fund made the following payments out of the two Special Trust Gifts received respectively in 1930 and 1931, viz.: £939 18*s.* 2*d.* paid to the Miller General Hospital in reduction of the building debt, and £6,000 paid to the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital towards the extension of

the out-patient department. The latter grant was conditional on the Hospital raising an equal sum in new money for the same object, and this condition was fulfilled.

SIR JOHN YOUNG'S BEQUEST OF A CONVALESCENT HOME.

20. The house at Ealing, bequeathed with its grounds to the King's Fund by the late Sir John Young, was opened in July by Her Royal Highness Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, as the "Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home." In accordance with the terms of the will, the Home is under the management of the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, with which the testator had been connected for many years, and it is used for recovery patients from this Hospital. The residue of the estate, after a payment of £1,000 towards capital expenditure on the building, is held by the King's Fund as a partial endowment for the maintenance of the Home, the income being paid to the Hospital for this purpose. This payment is outside the Fund's annual distribution, in which the work at the Home is taken into account in the grant to the Hospital as with other Recovery Homes.

21. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the late Sir John Young in thus enabling the King's Fund to assist in the establishment of another Recovery Home, since this is a method of hospital extension which is regarded by the Fund as possessing some particularly valuable features.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

22. The 10 grammes of radium held by the Fund remain on loan with 24 hospitals, all of which have agreed to keep records on the forms drawn up by the National Radium Commission.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

23. The Propaganda Committee have continued their various methods of bringing the work of the voluntary hospitals to the notice of the public, including illustrated lectures, and the adaptation of the Hospital Film for schools and other suitable audiences. The Miniature Hospital, their latest enterprise, was shown for the first time at an exhibition at the Building Centre, opened by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in January. It has since been exhibited at the Ideal Home Exhibition and in different parts of the country. When it is shown outside London the proceeds are divided between the King's Fund and local hospitals. The balance of receipts over expenditure to December 31st, after deducting the amounts thus allocated to local hospitals, was £336 15s. Another successful series of Mock Trials was held in May and June.

HOSPITALS AND MOTOR ACCIDENT CASES.

24. The introduction by Lord Danesfort of the Road Traffic (Compensation for Accidents) Bill, and its reference to a Select Committee of the House of Lords, gave an opportunity of again raising in Parliament the question of the expense caused to voluntary hospitals by the

treatment of motor accident cases. The British Hospitals Association gave evidence before the Select Committee on the extent to which the payments received under the Road Traffic Act, 1930, had failed for various reasons to produce the expected amount; and the King's Fund, through the Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee of the Fund, submitted an amendment, in the form of a new clause, designed to remedy defects thus disclosed. This new clause was recommended by the Select Committee and agreed to by the House of Lords.

25. At the end of the session a fresh opportunity occurred of securing immediate legislation by means of the Road and Rail Traffic Bill. The new clause was accordingly moved as an amendment to this Bill and was passed in both Houses. Its effect is that, when compensation is paid to an injured person under the compulsory insurance sections of the original Act, the amount which is also to be paid to a hospital treating him may now be as much as £50 for an in-patient or £5 for an out-patient, instead of only £25 for an in-patient. Certain minor defects in the original Act are also remedied; though payment to hospitals under the Act remains limited to cases where compensation is paid to the injured patient.

26. The passing of this amendment, like that of the original clause in 1930, illustrates the value of co-operation between the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association in drawing attention to the just claims of the hospitals, and is evidence also of the general sympathy which is extended to these institutions by members of all parties in both Houses of Parliament.

THE OUT-PATIENT QUESTION.

27. In January, His Royal Highness the President appointed a Committee to be called the Out-patient Arrangements Committee, under the chairmanship of Sir John Rose Bradford, to follow up the Report of Lord Onslow's Committee on Out-patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting.

28. That Report, which was published on January 3rd, recommended that hospitals should be encouraged to develop the consultative side of their out-patient work and the reference, subject to certain safeguards, of non-urgent minor cases, after first attendance, to suitable agencies which provide general practitioner treatment; and that various time-saving methods of procedure or improvements in accommodation should be studied by hospitals with a view to action where appropriate.

29. The function of the new Committee was to consider, in consultation with the hospitals, what steps it would be practicable and advisable for the King's Fund to take for assisting the hospitals in the study of the different methods of out-patient procedure indicated in the Report, and for promoting the development of out-patient organisation in the directions suggested by the Report.

30. After leaving an interval for the general study of the Report, the Committee took up the recommendations on the subject of standard forms for use by doctors when sending

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patients to out-patient departments and by the visiting staffs of hospitals when replying, and on the subject of hospital time-tables to prevent the waiting that results if patients attend at the wrong time. In September the Fund published a memorandum containing specimens both of the model standard form drawn up by the British Medical Association and of a variant of it by the London Panel Committee, and a complete general out-patient time-table for the London hospitals; and they circulated the same material to all the doctors in the King's Fund area in a form convenient for reference.

31. The Out-patient Arrangements Committee also began the study of the sections of the Report dealing with the work of District Nurses in relieving out-patient departments of some of their minor cases, and with time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of out-patient procedure. They were still engaged on these inquiries at the end of the year.

PAY BEDS AT VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.

32. The annual booklet giving particulars of the Pay Beds at London Hospitals on the books of the King's Fund showed a total at December 31st, 1933, of 1,788 at 106 hospitals. There has thus been a steady increase in the numbers both of pay beds and of ordinary beds since 1928, when the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund recommended "that an extension of the pay bed system at the Voluntary Hospitals, with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds, would be of advantage to the patients of all classes, to the individual Hospitals, and to the Voluntary Hospital system as a whole."

33. As the need for this form of service by the hospitals on any large scale is comparatively recent, it is not always adequately covered by the wording of their original trust deeds, and some of them have had to seek extended powers, sometimes by private Acts of Parliament. During the year both the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association passed resolutions in favour of general legislation which would simplify the procedure. The question was still before the Parliamentary Committee of the Fund at the end of the year.

CIRCULARS TO HOSPITALS.

34. On several occasions during the year the King's Fund was approached by representatives of organisations and by other responsible correspondents who desired to communicate with some central body in touch with all the London Hospitals. The result was that, in addition to its ordinary work, the Fund made inquiries or issued circulars in connection with various matters of interest.

35. In January, for example, the King's Fund circulated to the hospitals a letter it had received from the Bentham Committee for Poor Litigants on the subject of fees for doctors' reports required in connection with claims by poor persons for compensation for accidents. The King's Fund added that it felt sure that the hospitals would be in sympathy with the

aims of the Bentham Committee and would seek means by which the information might be furnished at the minimum of cost.

36. At the end of January the King's Fund circulated to the hospitals a letter received from Sir Frederick Menzies, suggesting a scheme whereby the facilities at Roehampton for the supply and repair of artificial limbs could be rendered available for voluntary hospital patients. The hospitals which were able to take advantage of this offer were placed in direct communication with the authorities at Roehampton.

37. In February the Fund was informed that certain coroners had expressed the opinion that it was desirable that in all cases of operation in hospitals the written consent of the patient should be obtained. The Fund first ascertained by a general inquiry that a considerable number of hospitals made this their practice, and subsequently stated that the Fund had come to the conclusion that it would be in the interest of the hospitals, and of their medical staffs, that the written consent of the patient or a relative should be obtained in all cases except emergencies, as regards both minors and adults. The Fund also circulated a specimen form of consent based on those already in use.

38. In May, as the result of complaints reported to the King's Fund, the attention of the hospitals was drawn to the subject of facilities for the X-ray examination of accident cases during week-ends.

39. In July, following on representations by the British Boxing Board of Control, the King's Fund passed on to the hospitals some suggestions made by the Board in connection with proposals for boxing tournaments to be organised in aid of hospitals.

40. In the same circular the King's Fund drew the attention of the hospitals to information received from the Charity Organisation Society on the subject of house-to-house collections of waste in aid of hospitals, and to the risk that, unless special care was taken, the names of hospitals might be improperly used.

41. In October, Sir Frederick Menzies expressed a desire for some information about the health records of nurses in the service of voluntary hospitals, comparable with information which he already had from London County Council hospitals. The King's Fund asked the hospitals to supply him direct with the particulars for which he asked.

42. The King's Fund was also consulted during the year by the Law Society on the subject of Ambulance Cases and Solicitors' Touts. In some parts of the country schemes have been adopted whereby accident patients who have no solicitors are assisted by the hospitals to obtain reliable legal advice on the subject of compensation. The Law Society wished to know if similar schemes would be practicable at the London voluntary hospitals. After various interviews and reports, and a conference with representatives of some of the larger hospitals, the King's Fund came to the conclusion that the decision must rest with the

individual hospitals and suggested that the Law Society should communicate with them either direct or preferably through the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association.

NEW OFFICES.

43. In March the lease of the offices in Walbrook expired. The great increase in the work had long rendered the available accommodation inadequate, and the Fund therefore moved into larger and more convenient premises at 10, Old Jewry. The annual cost is greater, but not out of proportion to the advantages obtained.

44. On May 9th, the Prince of Wales visited the new offices. On his arrival His Royal Highness, as President of the Fund, took the chair at a meeting of the Management Committee and conducted the business through a long agenda which included the preparations for the Annual Meeting at St. James's Palace on May 26th. He then went round the new quarters, inspected the different departments and talked with various members of the staff.

45. His Royal Highness has also been graciously pleased to present his portrait to the Fund, together with a portrait of His Majesty King Edward VII, its Founder, when Prince of Wales. These are now in the Board Room with the portraits of Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary, when Prince and Princess of Wales, presented by His Majesty when he was President of the Fund.

PERSONAL.

46. The King's Fund suffered a serious loss through the death of the late Viscount Burnham. He had been actively connected with its administration since 1902; he was Chairman of the Educational Auxiliary of the Combined Appeal in 1922, and he had since then been Chairman of the Propaganda Committee.

47. The Council has also to regret the deaths of three other members, Lady MountStephen, Sir George Makins, who had been a member since 1918 and had also served on several Committees, and Mr. John W. Samuel, who was also on the Revenue and Propaganda Committees as well as being a Visitor; Mr. Robert Fleming, who had retired at the end of 1932; and three Visitors, Mr. Owen Lankester, who had served since 1901, Mr. C. R. Hoare, and Mrs. H. B. Irving. The Council also report with regret the resignation of Sir James Kingston Fowler, who had served since 1906, first as a Visitor and then as a member of the Convalescent Homes Committee, the Hospital Economy Committee and the Council.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1934.

48. The Prince of Wales, in referring at the Annual Meeting to the continued financial success of the voluntary hospitals taken as a whole, except for some individual hospitals which had found the added strain harder to bear than others, said that this successful result was

due to sustained efforts on the part of the hospitals and to steady and continuous support on the part of the public. His Royal Highness added :—

“ The hospitals have more and more developed the soundest of all methods of attracting and retaining voluntary contributions. This consists in keeping before the public the value of their work in the relief of suffering and the war against disease, and the fact that in doing this work they are performing a regular public service which requires in return a regular income from the members of the community.”

49. The Council are grateful to the Press for its continued assistance in keeping the claims of the hospitals before the notice of the public.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 12, 1933.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the year, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, December 12, 1933, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour of reading a gracious message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund :—

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

"The King is delighted to hear that King Edward's Hospital Fund proposes to make another distribution of £300,000. His Majesty is much impressed by the success of the efforts of the King's Fund and of the Hospitals generally to maintain their income during these difficult years.

December 12, 1933."

The Annual Distribution.

A year ago we increased the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000 in order to help the hospitals during this time of crisis. The whole of this came out of receipts for the year, with only £111 to spare; and we deliberately took the risk that our income might not keep up to that level every year. The crisis still continues, and the Council in November decided to maintain the distribution at £300,000. We do not yet know whether the available income for the year will reach this total. There are certain legacies which we were, and still are, expecting to receive before December 31st, but which have not come in as yet. This was all explained to the Council in November when the amount of the distribution was fixed. You then decided that, even if there was this uncertainty about the exact date at which these legacies would be received, the hospitals must be given the benefit of the doubt.

I need hardly say that a distribution of £300,000 a year is a very substantial factor in the finances of the hospitals of London, and the way in which it is distributed is important. It serves partly as a steadying factor in hospital finance, and partly as an equalising factor. The greater part of it is used in making annual grants which, though they are not fixed in amount, are in fact kept fairly constant, so that hospitals may be able to estimate more or less closely what they are likely to get. In this way the distribution acts as a steadying factor.

As between one hospital and another these annual grants differ, partly because of differences between their size and their work, but also because of differences in their financial and other circumstances, such as, for example, the neighbourhood in which they are situated, the amount of their capital, and their facilities for raising money. In this way the distribution is to some extent an equalising factor between the different hospitals, due regard being had to the efforts each hospital is making for itself. But, in addition to this, the actual amount of each grant may vary from year to year because of temporary fluctuations in the fortunes of each hospital. A hospital which has had a particularly bad year may need an increased grant; and the Distribution Committee could not make temporary increases of that kind if they did not also make temporary decreases when a hospital has had an exceptionally good year. In this way also the distribution acts as an equalising factor.

In times of financial crisis like the present, these steadying and equalising functions can be carried still further. For the financial stringency affects some hospitals much more than others, especially those which normally suffer from difficult circumstances and have but little margin for bad times, and those which have been obliged to undertake urgent capital expenditure on a large scale in comparison with their means. In such cases, the King's Fund can come to the rescue by making exceptional grants, usually on conditions designed to encourage and reward the efforts of the hospitals themselves. Here lies one of the great advantages of the increase in the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000, made last year and maintained this year. It has enabled us to make these special grants, not only without reducing the grants to other hospitals, but simultaneously with a general increase.

The Finances of the Hospitals.

The remarkable thing is that, in spite of the financial crisis, the really hard cases so far have been so few. Down to the end of 1932, at all events, the hospitals had an aggregate surplus for each

successive year of the crisis ; there have each year been more surpluses than deficits ; and, where a hospital has been in serious danger, this has always been due to something exceptional in the circumstances. That an annual expenditure of over three million pounds, in London alone, should continue to be met year after year in these hard times, reflects the greatest possible credit both on the hospitals for the efforts they have made to meet the crisis, and on the public, including the patients themselves, who have responded so nobly. I think it is one of the most encouraging signs in the progress of our hospital administration that patients' payments in 1932, including £340,000 from the Hospital Saving Association, came to £1,139,000. Voluntary gifts, including legacies, came to £1,699,000, practically £1,700,000. If capital receipts are added, the total of voluntary gifts last year to hospitals in London was £2,173,000.

I have said that the King's Fund takes into account the efforts made by the hospitals themselves. There are two ways in which hospitals may maintain or improve their financial position. One is by economy in expenditure, and the other by putting their claims more effectively before the public. For information about the first, the Distribution Committee are indebted to our Hospital Economy Committee. On the second they receive reports from our Revenue Committee. The hospitals have been active in both directions. I have spoken of their success in keeping up their income. It is noteworthy also that in 1932 the total of their expenditure was reduced, although the number of their beds had increased.

King's Fund Receipts.

In maintaining the distribution at the high figure of £300,000, we have been greatly helped by the annual contribution of the League of Mercy, which Lord Marshall has told us is likely again to reach a total of £20,000. This does great credit to the voluntary workers of the League, of which I have the privilege of also being President, who have collected this large sum in spite of present day difficulties. We have also to thank the British Charities Association for another donation of £10,000, the amount allocated for London hospitals out of the proceeds of the recent activities of that Association.

One of the things that encourage the Fund to keep the distribution up to £300,000 is that our capital has been increased by two substantial gifts. One consists of freehold property valued at £18,000, to be known as "The William and Francis Radford Endowment, from a member of the family." The other is a reversion of £136,000 which came to the Fund on the lamented death of our great supporter and friend of the Fund, Lady MountStephen. This raises the total benefactions received from the late Lord MountStephen to £1,308,000, of which £503,000 was given during his lifetime. Lady MountStephen herself most generously left her tiara to be sold on behalf of the King's Fund, and it will be up for sale at Christie's on December 15th.

Hospitals and Motor Accidents.

Besides the annual distribution there are many other ways in which the King's Fund, as a kind of central body, tries to help the hospitals. We have, for example, a Parliamentary Committee which does the most useful work and, in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association, watches the interests of the Voluntary Hospitals in connection with any Bills which may affect them, and is ready to take prompt action when occasion arises. They have just been very successful in promoting much-needed legislation to give the hospitals more adequate payment towards the cost of treating motor accident cases. It was on their initiative that the hospital clause was introduced into the original Road Traffic Act in 1930 ; and they have now secured the adoption of an amendment to the new Road and Rail Traffic Act, designed to remove unforeseen difficulties and give the hospitals rather more than they were getting, though not, indeed, anything like full recoupment for their present

burden. The amendments were really essential, and the King's Fund has done great service to the hospitals by the part it has played in securing their acceptance by the Government. We are specially indebted for this to Mr. Whitley and Lord Macmillan, Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee; and to the three members of the Management Committee who also took so active a part, Lord Donoughmore, Lord Somerleyton, and especially Lord Luke. We are also grateful to all those who supported the amendment in Parliament. I include amongst these the various Members of the House of Commons whose names did not appear, but who were prepared to speak, and whose influence doubtless had great effect. On this occasion, as in 1930, the co-operation of the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association proved very effective. But what really won the day was the general recognition of the justice of the hospital claim to fair reimbursement for the services they render to persons injured on the road.

The Miniature Hospital.

In another way we are co-operating with hospitals outside London. Our Miniature Hospital has for several months been on exhibition at various cities and towns in different parts of the country, in aid of local hospitals jointly with the King's Fund. It has just been in the North of England: it will soon be going to Scotland; and applications for its loan are continually being received. We are more and more sensible of our debt to all those who freely gave so much time and trouble to its construction and equipment.

Out-patient Committee.

The Out-patient Arrangements Committee issued in September a Memorandum on Standard Forms for Doctors' Letters and Hospital Replies, and on Hospital Out-Patient Time-tables; and they circulated the forms and tables to every doctor in the London area. This is the first item in the programme for reducing the time of waiting at out-patient departments along the lines recommended by Lord Onslow's Committee.

Personal.

The King's Fund suffered a great loss by the death of Lord Burnham. He had been one of the most active members since 1909, and had done unique service of late years, first as Chairman of the Educational Auxiliary of the Combined Appeal, and afterwards as Chairman for 10 years of the Propaganda Committee. We have also to regret the deaths of Mr. Samuel and of Sir George Makins; of Mr. Robert Fleming, who retired from the Council only a year ago; and of two Visitors, Mr. C. R. Hoare and Mrs. H. B. Irving. Mr. D. A. Thomson and Mr. Walter Bell have been added to the Propaganda Committee.

I have now again to express my thanks and yours to the members of the various Committees, and particularly to Sir Cooper Perry and the Distribution Committee, whose recommendations are our principal business to-day; the Visitors, of the value of whose reports we have annual evidence; and the Honorary Secretaries, who form the essential link between all the different activities of the Fund.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Mr. E. R. PEACOCK (the Hon. Treasurer) said that since the estimates were presented in November there had been a slight delay in the assessment of duties on certain legacies. If their expectations were fully realised legacies would bring in considerably more than the five-year average from that source, which was itself well over £60,000. In that event they would have enough to cover the distribution of £300,000, to which had to be added £20,000 for pension grants, part of which they

could draw from a special reserve created for the purpose in earlier years. Annual subscriptions and donations showed a slight decrease, and while they had had some very welcome gifts from new donors they had not had any of those large unexpected donations which had so often been of invaluable service in the distribution. One legacy of peculiar interest was the diamond and pearl tiara which Lady MountStephen bequeathed to the King's Fund, with specific directions that it should be sold and the proceeds applied to the purposes of the Fund, which meant for the benefit of the hospitals. The increase of £154,000 in their capital would materially strengthen the position of the Fund for the future.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord MARSHALL, Hon. Treasurer of the League of Mercy, said that, thanks largely to a special entertainment the great success of which was due to the interest taken in it by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, Grand President of the League, they were able to allot, for the second consecutive year, the sum of £20,000 to the King's Fund. The sums distributed by the League of Mercy were now: through King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, £524,034; to Extra-Metropolitan Hospitals, £161,726; making a grand total of £685,760.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (*See pages 26 to 28.*)

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the List of Awards. (*See pages 29 to 39.*)

The recommendations were seconded by Sir WILLIAM COLLINS and carried unanimously.

Sir COOPER PERRY then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (*See page 40.*)

Sir HAROLD WERNHER (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes. (*See pages 41 to 43.*)

The motion was seconded by Mr. F. W. J. JACKSON, and carried unanimously.

DATE OF POSTING CHEQUES.

On the motion of the Very Rev. J. H. HERTZ, D.D. (The Chief Rabbi), seconded by Lady AMPHILL, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Tuesday, December 19.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1934.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—We now come to the arrangements for next year. I am sorry to learn that Sir James Kingston Fowler is unable through ill-health to continue on the Council. I propose to re-appoint all the other members of the Council and Committees. I am appointing Lord Wakefield as an additional member of the Revenue Committee. I propose to enlarge the Voluntary Hospitals (Parliamentary) Committee, and it will now consist of the following: Mr. J. H. Whitley, Chairman, Lord Macmillan, Vice-Chairman, Lord Dawson, Lord Moynihan, Sir Arthur Stanley, Sir Herbert Cohen, Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Edward Penton, Sir Cooper Perry, Mr. Warren Low, and others, with the Honorary Secretaries.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of DONOUGHMORE), seconded by Sir ERNEST POOLEY, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1934.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The BISHOP OF SOUTHWARK, in moving a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales for presiding, said that it was an enormous encouragement to know the personal interest His Royal Highness took in the work of the Council. It was especially encouraging to those who worked on the Committees, and also to those for whom they were working, in the hospitals up and down London.

Sir EDWARD PENTON, in seconding, referred to the deep debt of gratitude that the hospitals felt towards the King's Fund, not only for the distribution but also for the advice it had given them during the past. It was, and had been, a great rallying point in times of difficulty; and it could not have been that rallying point if His Royal Highness had not been its President.

The PRINCE OF WALES having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, June 5th, 1934.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace, on Tuesday, June 5th, 1934, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, addressing the Council, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour of reading a gracious message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund:—

Message from the King.

“BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

“The King has learned with satisfaction that, so far as is at present known, the hospitals fared even better in 1933 than in 1932. His Majesty is, as always, most interested to hear of the various activities of the King's Fund, and fully appreciates the success of its efforts on behalf of the hospitals.”

“5th June, 1934.”

I have gratifying news for you this morning. In the long fight with the results of the depression, voluntary hospital finance has once more achieved success. The King's Fund has again maintained its distribution at £300,000 entirely out of annual income. The hospitals, taken as a whole, for the seventh successive year, have come out with a balance on the right side. In some ways, indeed, the results for 1933 have been better than ever. I will take the King's Fund first and come to the hospitals later.

King's Fund Finance in 1933.

Our income available for distribution, after deducting expenses, came to £308,000. Out of this we used £300,000 for the ordinary distribution. The other £8,000 went in pension scheme grants, together with £12,000 from the special pensions reserve. The total of the two distributions was thus £320,000.

The net income of £308,000 was itself an increase of £5,000 over 1932. Legacies, which for six years past have never been below £58,000, and have averaged £68,000, last year came to £80,000. There were some decreases in annual subscriptions and in income from investments. But, on the other hand, our capital account has been increased by the two large sums which I mentioned at our last meeting—the reversion of £136,000 under the will of Lord MountStephen, and the gift of freehold property valued at £18,000, to be called the William and Francis Radford Endowment.

We are very grateful to all the donors whose gifts, ranging from such amounts as these down to quite small sums, have combined to produce so satisfactory a result.

The Administrative Activities of the King's Fund.

I have mentioned expenses, and I should like to remind everyone that these cover a great deal of administrative work in addition to the cost of collecting and distributing £300,000 a year. The distribution itself requires a whole twelve months' examination of the affairs of the hospitals by the Distribution Committee, the Hospital Economy Committee, the Revenue Committee, and the Visitors. We study their accounts, their administration, their cost of working, their extension schemes, and anything else that may affect their relative claims for grants. But, even so, this is very far from being the whole of our work. For, besides all this, the King's Fund has gradually come to exercise some of the functions of a kind of central body for the voluntary hospitals of London, using its influence while carefully respecting their individuality and their freedom. The Annual Report which is before us to-day describes a number of these activities. They include the gifts of money which are subject to special trusts, the convalescent home left by the late Sir John Young for use by a hospital, the King's Fund radium, and the work of the Management Committee, the Parliamentary Committee, the Out-patient Arrangements Committee and the Propaganda Committee. The Hospital Economy Committee, though they are making no report this year, are constantly having to decide how new developments in hospital work should be dealt with in the uniform system of accounts. Moreover, there were no less than eight separate subjects taken up by the King's Fund last year, as the result of communications from responsible correspondents who wished to approach the hospitals through a central agency. We also provide staff assistance to the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, the representative body which consults with the London County Council about the provision of hospital accommodation in the County. All this takes time and costs a certain amount of money. But it is well worth doing.

The Propaganda Committee.

The Annual Report of the Propaganda Committee for 1933 is before you to-day, and they are being equally active in 1934. They are at present conducting a fresh series of Mock Trials; they recently had a stand at the Ideal Home Exhibition; the miniature hospital is touring in the North of England; and they have other schemes in preparation.

The Parliamentary Committee.

The Parliamentary Committee are busy on two important questions. The Road Traffic Bill has provided another opportunity of attacking the problem of payment for the treatment of motor accident cases. Our Committee, as you will have seen in the newspapers, have been attending conferences on this subject in company with the British Hospitals Association and the British Medical Association. For, as things are at present, it is not only hospitals that suffer heavy loss through motor accidents, but also private doctors. Our Parliamentary Committee have also been co-operating with the British Hospitals Association on the question of private Bills promoted by individual hospitals which cannot otherwise provide pay beds for patients of moderate means, and the advantages to be derived from a general Bill to deal with them all. I should like to express our sympathy with Mr. Whitley, the Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee, in his recent illness, and to say how glad we are to see him here this morning. We are indeed fortunate in having two such men as Mr. Whitley and Lord Macmillan, the Vice-Chairman, always ready to put their ability and their experience, through the King's Fund, at the service of the voluntary hospitals.

The Out-patient Committee.

The Out-patient Arrangements Committee are issuing a second edition of their hospital out-patient time-table, designed to ensure that patients need not wait through coming at the wrong hour. They have also presented a report, which is before you to-day, on the ways in which the District Nursing Service can be used to relieve out-patient departments. They have been greatly impressed, as everyone must be, by the splendid and devoted work done by the District Nurses in the patients' own homes. It was a good idea on the part of a member of the Committee, Dame Rachel Crowdy, to spend a few days going round with the nurses and seeing their work at first hand. That kind of thing adds life to a report. The Committee are at present studying time-saving methods at the dispensary stage of out-patient procedure, when patients get their medicine. Here again, the members of the Committee are visiting hospitals and watching for themselves how things are done.

The Continued Financial Success of the Voluntary Hospitals.

Now for my second piece of news: the continued remarkable financial success of the voluntary hospitals in these present difficult times. The exact figures for 1933 cannot as yet be given, but this at least is clear. Not only was there an aggregate balance of income over expenditure for the seventh year in succession, but the 1933 balance was the largest of the seven. There were fewer hospitals with deficits for the year and more with surpluses than at any time since the War. There was a considerable increase in income, which is now about £4,000,000 a year in London alone. This increase was partly due to exceptionally large receipts from legacies; but other voluntary income is keeping very steady. Out of the £4,000,000, about £1,800,000 in all came from voluntary sources, made up of sums large and small. These figures do not include gifts to building or endowment. We do not yet know how much these were. In 1932, they came to an additional £474,000, making the total of voluntary gifts in London well over £2,000,000.

There are three striking things about voluntary hospital finance. One is this steadiness of voluntary income. The second is the increase in patients' payments, either direct or through contributory schemes like the Hospital Saving Association, which in 1932 paid the London hospitals £340,000, made up of its members' weekly threepences. The third is the way in which the hospitals succeed in raising large amounts for building schemes, and the generous gifts which they receive for this purpose. We have read of several of these recently—£45,000 given by one donor, £65,000 by another partly on a pound for pound basis; a third hospital successful in collecting over £100,000 in five months; and so on. There are individual hospitals in difficulties, and various extensions and

improvements are deferred till better times. But of what department of life, unfortunately, cannot the same be said? The broad fact is that, during the past few years, between £2,000,000 and £3,000,000 a year, in London alone, has come from that stream of voluntary gifts which we are so often told is drying up. It is a kind of drying-up which would, I think, excite the envy of the Metropolitan Water Board.

Value of the Voluntary Element in the Hospital Service.

These huge receipts from voluntary sources have a two-fold value. In this country the hospital service in each district has the advantage of being partly voluntary and partly centralised under the county authorities; and machinery for mutual consultation is provided by the Local Government Act. In the two, working together and influencing each other, we have a unique opportunity of combining large-scale efficiency with the qualities which come from individual freedom and initiative, and which are specially important in medical work. The receipts from voluntary sources, therefore, amounting in London alone to between £2,000,000 and £3,000,000 a year, are not only a great financial asset in the hospital service. They are also the basis, when combined with the voluntary personal work of the lay committees and the visiting medical staffs, of the special contribution which the voluntary element makes to the hospital service, and the value of which cannot be measured in money.

Personal.

I have now only a few personal matters to mention. We have to regret the loss by death of a member of the Council, the late Lord Revelstoke; and of two of our Visitors, Dr. Owen Lankester, who had served since 1901, and Mr. W. Emuss Taylor. Since our last meeting here I have added the following to the Parliamentary Committee: Dr. A. B. Howitt, M.P., Mr. Oliver Chadwyck-Healey and Mr. Samuel Storey, M.P. I have also appointed the following additional members on the Out-patient Arrangements Committee: Dr. Morley Fletcher and Colonel W. Parkes.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to all the members of the Committee, and particularly, at this meeting, to the Finance Committee and their Chairman, Mr. Peacock, our Treasurer, for the care of our invested funds. I should also mention the Management Committee and their Chairman, Lord Donoughmore, who are themselves responsible for a large part of the heavy programme of work described in the Annual Report which they have prepared for our consideration to-day. Then there are the Honorary Secretaries, Lord Somerleyton, Lord Luke, Sir Leonard Cohen and Sir Harold Wernher. Sir Leonard Cohen, as Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee, also gives a great deal of time to work which, though very important, is often of mainly technical interest. Lord Luke is now Chairman of the Propaganda Committee as well as of its parent, the Revenue Committee, and is a specially active member of the Parliamentary Committee.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to present the accounts, and in so doing take this opportunity of congratulating him sincerely on the honour conferred on him by His Majesty the King. I would also like to congratulate Lord Wakefield on having been made a viscount, and Sir Alan Anderson, whose services have earned him the honour of a G.B.E.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1933.

Mr. E. R. PEACOCK (the Hon. Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Accounts (*see* pages 50 to 55), said that the amount available for distribution and current expenses was some £8,000 greater than in 1932. This enabled them to maintain the ordinary distribution at £300,000, to provide £5,000 more than in 1932 towards pension grants, and to meet the cost of removal to new and larger offices, which were not out of proportion to the continual increase in the work. There was an increase of £21,000 in legacies, and they greatly appreciated the service rendered to the hospitals by executors and solicitors by their having made interim distributions as early as possible. Against the increase in legacies there were decreases of £2,000 in subscriptions and £11,000 in income from investments,

due partly to non-recurring items and partly to the lower return on American securities and on income money placed on deposit pending distribution. The balance-sheet now had a separate schedule for the gifts for special purposes, the increase in the number of which was a welcome mark of the confidence felt by donors in the Fund. The additions to our capital from the gift of freehold property and from the estate of Lord MountStephen were of very great value. It was no light task in these days to provide £320,000 a year, so that they would be very grateful for additional donations, whether for investment or to help with the annual distribution.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Major-General Sir CECIL LOWTHER, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1933.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) moved the adoption of the Annual Report for 1933 (*see* pages 5 to 14). The Governor of the Bank of England (The Right Hon. M. C. NORMAN) having seconded the resolution, the report was unanimously adopted.

REPORT OF REVENUE AND PROPAGANDA COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord LUKE) presented a report of the Committee on the income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moved that it be published (*see* pages 44 to 47). He drew attention to the series of Mock Trials now being held at the London School of Economics.

Sir WALTER LAWRENCE, Bt., having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

DISTRICT NURSES AND THEIR WORK IN RELIEF OF HOSPITALS.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) then presented a report of the Committee on an application from the Central Council for District Nursing in London, together with a report by the Out-patient Arrangements Committee on the work done by district nurses in relief of out-patient departments, and moved the recommendation that the question be referred back to the Management Committee for their consideration and for further report to the General Council; and that, in the meantime, the report be published.

The recommendation was seconded by Lord DOVERDALE.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS said that, as Chairman of the Central Council for District Nursing, he thanked Sir John Rose Bradford and his Out-patient Committee for their high encomium on the work of the District Nursing Service, which had been endorsed by His Royal Highness. Now that previous applications had been confirmed by the finding of Lord Onslow's Committee and Sir John Rose Bradford's Committee, it was the hope of the Council that some grant might perhaps be received.

The motion was then put and carried.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

Lord EBBISHAM moved a very sincere vote of thanks to His Royal Highness not only for presiding but also for the immense amount of time and energy given by him to the work of the King's Fund during the year, which was of the utmost value to the Fund, and was especially appreciated by the Council in view of the enormous amount of work done by His Royal Highness in all parts of the Kingdom.

Lord MILDMAY, in seconding the motion, said that His Royal Highness set them a splendid example. He enjoyed splendid health himself, and on that very account he showed all the more concern for and sympathy with suffering humanity. The whole nation was deeply grateful to him.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. The amount of the ordinary distribution is again £300,000, making, with £20,000 assigned to special Pension grants, a total of £320,000. Out of the £300,000 for ordinary distribution £3,000 is allocated to convalescent homes not attached to particular hospitals. The distribution of the balance amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches forms the subject of this report.

2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is again 147.

3. The grants recommended in aid of maintenance amount to £263,830, as compared with £261,710 in 1932, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure being £33,170, as against £35,290 last year. The sum of £20,000 distributed in special grants towards expenditure on the Federated Superannuation for Nurses and Hospital Officers is the same as last year, and is the maximum amount promised by the King's Fund for this purpose.

4. The accounts of the hospitals for 1932 showed that, although some were in serious difficulties owing to the financial crisis, the hospitals with surpluses for the year still outnumbered those with deficits, the figures being 85 and 60, respectively, as against 87 and 58 in 1931; while the net aggregate surplus for the year was £101,000 as against £76,000 for 1931. The results for 1933 will not be known for some time. In these circumstances, the Committee have paid special attention to the claims of hospitals which are likely to have exceptional difficulty in coping with financial depression, and those whose liabilities have been increased by the opening of additional beds or as the result of urgent capital expenditure.

5. The Committee have, as usual, examined all schemes of capital expenditure submitted to the Fund in accordance with the standing request of the General Council. As a result of the financial stringency the number of schemes during the last two years has been much reduced. The total capital expenditure on buildings and equipment in 1932, for instance,

was £577,000, as compared with £766,000 in 1931 and £1,111,000 in 1930. It is satisfactory, however, to note that, in addition to £1,699,000 in voluntary gifts to maintenance, the hospitals in London raised no less than £335,000 in 1932 in gifts for extensions and improvements.

6. The number of hospitals with branches has been increased this year to 25 by the opening of the "Dame Gertrude Young Convalescent Home." This was bequeathed to the King's Fund by the late Sir John Young and is now used, in accordance with his wishes, by the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital as a Recovery Home.

7. These hospital branches are of three general types, though the distinction between the first two is not always a rigid one. The three types are:—

(i) Convalescent Homes: these provide after-care for patients whose hospital treatment is finished, and who, if not sent to the branch, would have gone home; such a branch thus supplements the work of the hospital;

(ii) Recovery Homes: these provide the later stages of the hospital treatment of patients who have received treatment in the parent hospital during the earlier, more acute, and incidentally more expensive, stages of their illness, and who, if not sent to the branch, would have remained in the hospital for the less acute and less expensive stages; such a branch thus extends the work of the hospital by increasing the total number of beds for hospital cases;

(iii) Branch Hospitals: these provide the whole of the hospital treatment required by the patients, who go to them direct and do not normally pass through the beds of the parent hospital at all; such a branch is thus virtually a second hospital.

In all these cases the King's Fund makes its grant to the parent hospital only, but, in deciding the amount of the grant, takes into account the work done at the branch, and the degree in which that work approximates to strictly hospital work on the one hand or to strictly convalescent work on the other, with the consequent effects on the cost of the parent hospital.

8. It is a source of gratification to the Distribution Committee that the bequest of Sir John Young has enabled the King's Fund to assist yet another hospital to extend its work by means of a Recovery Home.

9. The Committee are, as always, greatly indebted to the Visitors who inspected the hospitals and whose reports are in the hands of the Committee when they are considering the applications for grants. The Committee are recommending that various extracts from the Visitors' reports should be forwarded with the grants for the observations of the Committees of the Hospitals concerned.

10. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £400 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependants.

11. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule :—

Bolingbroke Hospital, £1,000 to rebuilding of old block.

Hospital for Epilepsy, £900 to extension.

Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.

National Hospital, Queen Square, £250 to extension.

Poplar Hospital for Accidents, £500 to extension of out-patient department.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £250 out of £1,000 to additional beds and nurses' accommodation.

St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, £250 to new children's ward, to be the last £250 to open free of debt ; and £150 to provision of new lift.

South Eastern Hospital for Children, £400 to new casualty department and pay beds.

West London Hospital, £1,000 to extension.

The Committee consider that the grants of £500 to Mount Vernon Hospital, and of £250 to St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, should lapse; that the grant of £250 to Queen's Hospital should be renewed and transferred to the scheme for out-patient extension; and that the other grants should be renewed.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1933.

1. The Revenue Committee beg to present the following Report :—
2. The total Income of the Fund for the year 1933 amounted to £461,565 18s. 6d. Omitting further receipts from the estates of those munificent benefactors the late Lord MountStephen and the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, the General Income still amounted to £325,589 against £317,720 in the previous year.
3. The figures of the income of the Voluntary Hospitals of London for 1933 are not yet finally tabulated, but it is already clear that, taken as a whole, they will show a very substantial net aggregate balance of income over expenditure for the year.
4. The number of hospitals with surpluses has increased, and the figures of surpluses and deficits for the past three years stand as follows :—

In 1932 the net aggregate surplus amounted to £101,000 against £76,000 in the previous year, and the figure for 1933 will be still larger.
5. The total ordinary income of the London hospitals rose in 1932 to the highest figure recorded—£3,464,000, an increase of £102,000 over 1931. Legacies fell by £105,000, but this is necessarily a fluctuating figure which on the average shows no sign of falling off, and there was a large increase in 1933.
6. The above figures, mainly taken from the Statistical Review of the Work and Finance of the London Voluntary Hospitals, published annually by the Hospital Economy Committee of the Fund, show how successfully the voluntary hospital system has faced the financial stress of the times. Particular hospitals have had, and have, serious difficulties to face, but the voluntary hospitals of London generally are emerging triumphantly from the ordeal.
7. The reason is plain : the finances of the hospitals rest on a very broad foundation : all classes of the community are joining in their support. Just as the income of the King's Fund is built up from legacies large and small, and from subscriptions and donations varying from shillings to thousands of pounds, so the hospitals draw their income from all sections of

the public. In 1932 the increase in ordinary income was made up as follows : Subscriptions and donations increased by £18,000 : Central Funds by £18,000 : Income from Investments by £11,000 : Receipts for Services by £55,000.

8. Of the increase in receipts from services £49,000 came from patients, who provided no less than £1,139,000, including about £340,000 derived from the threepences paid weekly to the Hospital Saving Association by its contributors.

9. To maintain and increase the interest of the community in the work of the voluntary hospitals and of the King's Fund, publicity is essential. The Revenue Committee therefore cordially pay tribute to the unflagging energy and ingenuity of the Propaganda Committee and of its Sub-Committees, and have much pleasure in submitting the following record of their activities.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1933.

10. The Propaganda Committee have to record with deepest regret the death of Lord Burnham, which occurred very suddenly on July 20. He had taken the Chair regularly until shortly before his death, and up to the last had shown the keenest interest in the various activities of the Committee. His wide influence and the universal regard in which he was held were the means of securing the support and co-operation of many eminent persons, who were glad of an opportunity to do some service to one whom they held in such high esteem. Though the Committee will no longer have the benefit of his guidance and wise counsel, his memory will be an inspiration in the work which lies before them.

11. The Committee welcomed with great satisfaction Lord Luke's decision to accept the chairmanship, and as he is Chairman of the Revenue Committee no more fitting solution could well have been found.

12. The death of Mr. J. W. Samuel occurred only a few days after that of Lord Burnham. Mr. Samuel was one of the original members of the Committee, and was later appointed to be a member of the Council. He will always be remembered as the Chairman of the London Schools Hospital Fund Committee, who were instrumental in raising over £50,000 for the London Voluntary Hospitals in connection with the Combined Appeal in 1922-3. He was Chairman of two of the Sub-Committees of the Propaganda Committee at the time of his death.

13. Sir George Fowler and Mr. A. E. Johnson have been compelled to resign from the Committee owing to pressure of work. Sir George Fowler remains a member of the Sub-Committee responsible for organising the Mock Trials, and Mr. Johnson has kindly expressed his willingness to help the Committee at any time with his advice should co-operation in the sphere of Art be under consideration.

14. The following new members have joined the Committee during the year : Mrs. W. F. Christie, Mr. Walter G. Bell, and Mr. D. A. Thomson. Mrs. Christie has had considerable

experience of hospital affairs ; Mr. Bell's association with the Press should be of great assistance to the Committee ; while Mr. Thomson has already rendered valuable service in connection with the building of the Miniature Hospital.

15. H.R.H. The Prince of Wales graciously attended at the Building Centre, New Bond Street, on January 6, and declared the Miniature Hospital open by pressing a button which caused the lift to ascend with nurse and patient from the ground floor to the ward. The Fund is greatly indebted to the Directors of the Centre for arranging that the Model should make its first appearance in such advantageous surroundings. It was subsequently exhibited at the Ideal Home Exhibition in April, where it attracted large crowds, and the Fund has to thank the proprietors of the *Daily Mail* for granting free space and defraying the cost of the stand and other expenses. It was decided to appoint a custodian who should be permanently at the disposal of the Fund to take charge of the Model while on tour, and a special trailer has also been constructed for its conveyance from place to place. The Model has since been exhibited at Portsmouth, Brighton, Birmingham, Leeds, Sheffield, Liverpool, and other centres, the proceeds being divided between the King's Fund and the local hospitals. About 120,000 persons visited the Model during the year.

16. Being advised that the demand for " silent " films, either standard size or 16-millimetre, for use in educational institutions, was likely to increase, the Committee decided to have a 16-mm. copy of the Hospital film printed, and this has already been supplied to a number of applicants in London and elsewhere. A description of the film appeared in the autumn number of *Sight and Sound*, the organ of the British Institute of Adult Education, which is circulated widely among educational institutions.

17. On March 3, by kind permission of the Master and Wardens of the Drapers' Company, Mr. V. J. P. de Blocq van Kuffeler, Director of Zuider Zee Works, who happened to be in London for a few days, gave on behalf of the Fund a most interesting lecture in Drapers' Hall on the Reclamation of the Zuider Zee, illustrating it with a number of lantern-slides showing the work in progress. The Chair was taken by the Netherlands Minister, Jonkheer R. de Marees van Swinderen, G.C.V.O., who delivered an eloquent speech in support of the King's Fund.

18. The Literary Sub-Committee were again successful in organising a series of Mock Trials, which were held at the London School of Economics in May and June, and proved, as usual, a great attraction. A special feature this year was a " trial " of Economists organised by Sir William Beveridge, to whom the Committee were already indebted for his hospitality in placing the theatre at their disposal for so many years, and entertaining the Organising Committee and speakers to tea on each occasion. The event was generally considered to be the most brilliant yet arranged. These entertainments in aid of the King's Fund are undoubtedly coming to be regarded as an important feature in the London " season."

19. The Propaganda Committee have continued with increasing success the illustrated lectures to schools, clubs, etc., on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals. The number of lectures

given was 54, being the highest yet reached. Many letters of appreciation have been received from heads of schools, and one headmistress sent copies of compositions written by her pupils, which showed keen interest in the subject of the lecture and a remarkably intelligent reproduction of the story told to them. Parties of scholars have also been conducted over some of the principal London hospitals, and have much appreciated the opportunity of seeing for themselves what the work of a modern hospital is like.

20. The Committee were able to arrange another series of visits to places of interest in London during July, parties being conducted over the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, the India Office, and Somerset House; while in August three large parties were taken over the Tower of London by Mr. Walter Bell, and were received by the Resident Governor, Lt.-Col. W. F. O. Faviell, D.S.O. To these the best thanks of the Fund are due, and also to Sir William Foster, C.I.E., Mr. W. L. Rind, O.B.E., Mr. Lawrence E. Tanner, M.V.O., F.S.A., and Mr. Thomas Wilson, Clerk of the Works to the Houses of Parliament.

21. The Committee are more than ever convinced of the importance of obtaining for the hospitals the right kind of publicity. If adequate support is to be assured there must be genuine enthusiasm for the work which they do, and this cannot exist without knowledge. There is much that goes on in the hospitals which has a real news interest, as well as redounding to their credit. It is satisfactory to know that the printed list, supplied to the Press, of persons to whom inquiries should be addressed has been greatly appreciated. This should help to promote friendly co-operation, and should be of advantage both to the Press and to the hospitals concerned.

22. The Propaganda Committee desire to record their indebtedness to all who have helped in their various activities by serving as co-opted members on sub-committees, lecturing on behalf of the Fund, and in various other ways supporting their efforts to make the work of the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals of London more widely understood and appreciated.

THE OUT-PATIENT QUESTION.

APPOINTMENT OF OUT-PATIENT ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE
TO HELP TO CARRY OUT THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE OUT-PATIENT COMMITTEE 1932.

MESSAGE FROM H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES
READ AT A MEETING OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL ON JANUARY 10, 1933.

To the Members of the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London.

MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

The Report of Lord Onslow's Committee on the Out-patient Question is now in your hands. Besides containing the Committee's own conclusions and recommendations, it is a storehouse of information about the procedure at the hospitals and also about the alternative and supplementary agencies for the treatment of patients suffering from minor ailments.

This should be a great help to the hospitals. The question to be decided is how far the present time of waiting is unavoidable, how far it can be shortened by changes in procedure, and how far it is possible, without causing hardship, to reduce overcrowding by arranging for some of the less serious cases to be treated by general practitioners elsewhere. It should be much easier for the hospitals to decide this now that they have all this information before them, collected together in a handy form.

The Report will also enable the public to realise how difficult a problem it is, and how many experiments the hospitals themselves have been making to reduce the hours of waiting. The accumulated experience is now rendered available for study.

But the Report is more than a mere academic discussion of the question. It is meant to lead to action. Its actual recommendations are carefully worded so as to respect the freedom of the individual hospitals, which is an essential feature of the voluntary system. But the Committee present a strong *prima facie* case for believing that part of the waiting-time can be reduced, and they want the hospitals to study that case in detail with a view to taking action wherever it is practicable.

To ensure that this is done the Report ends with the definite recommendation that the King's Fund should consider to what extent it can help to carry out the recommendations by making available the detailed information accumulated during the Inquiry, and by such other methods as may be relevant. I reported this to the Council on December 15, and I am glad to say that the Council unanimously agreed that it should be acted on at once.

I have appointed a small Committee for this purpose and the Council have decided to give it the power not only to consider, in consultation with the hospitals, what steps can be taken, but also, in co-operation with the Management and Distribution Committees, to take the necessary steps. This will ensure that the Report is not pigeon-holed, but is used as a practical guide to action, wherever action is found to be possible and desirable.

This Committee will be called the Out-patient Arrangements Committee, and I have appointed the following to be its members : Sir John Rose Bradford, Chairman, Dame Rachel Crowdy, Sir Ernest Morris, Sir Isidore Salmon, Mr. Eric Pearce Gould, Lt.-Col. A. P. Irwin, and Mr. R. H. P. Orde.* These have all done actual hospital work : some are experienced organisers in other departments of life : four of them were members of the original Out-patient Committee.

I take this opportunity of expressing my personal thanks to Lord Onslow and the members of his Committee for the great amount of care and attention they have given to this difficult subject, and for the way in which they have dealt with it. I trust that their work will prove fruitful for the benefit of the hospitals and of their patients.

In conclusion I offer you my very best wishes for the prosperity during 1933 both of the King's Fund and of the hospitals.

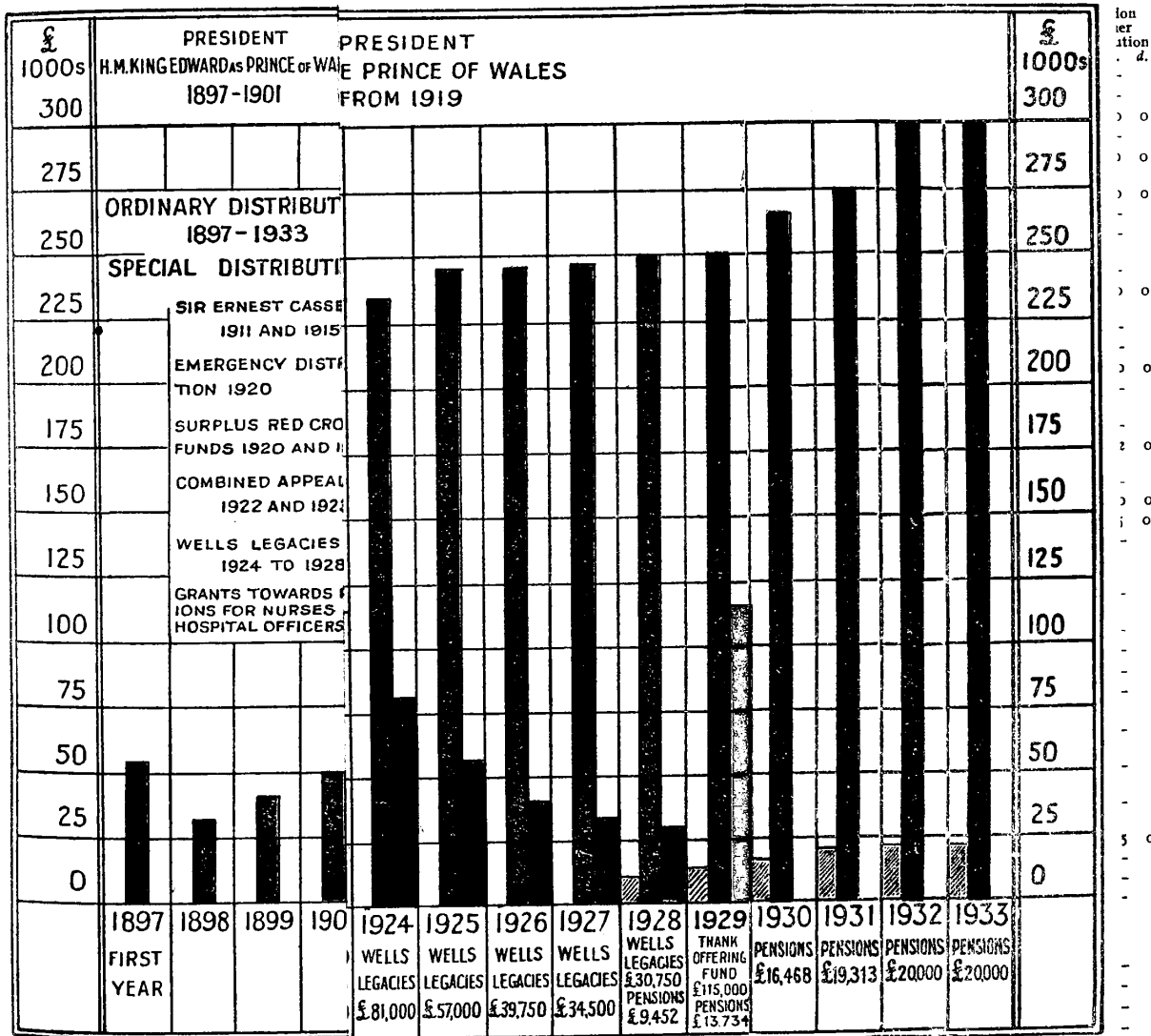

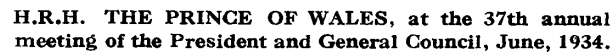

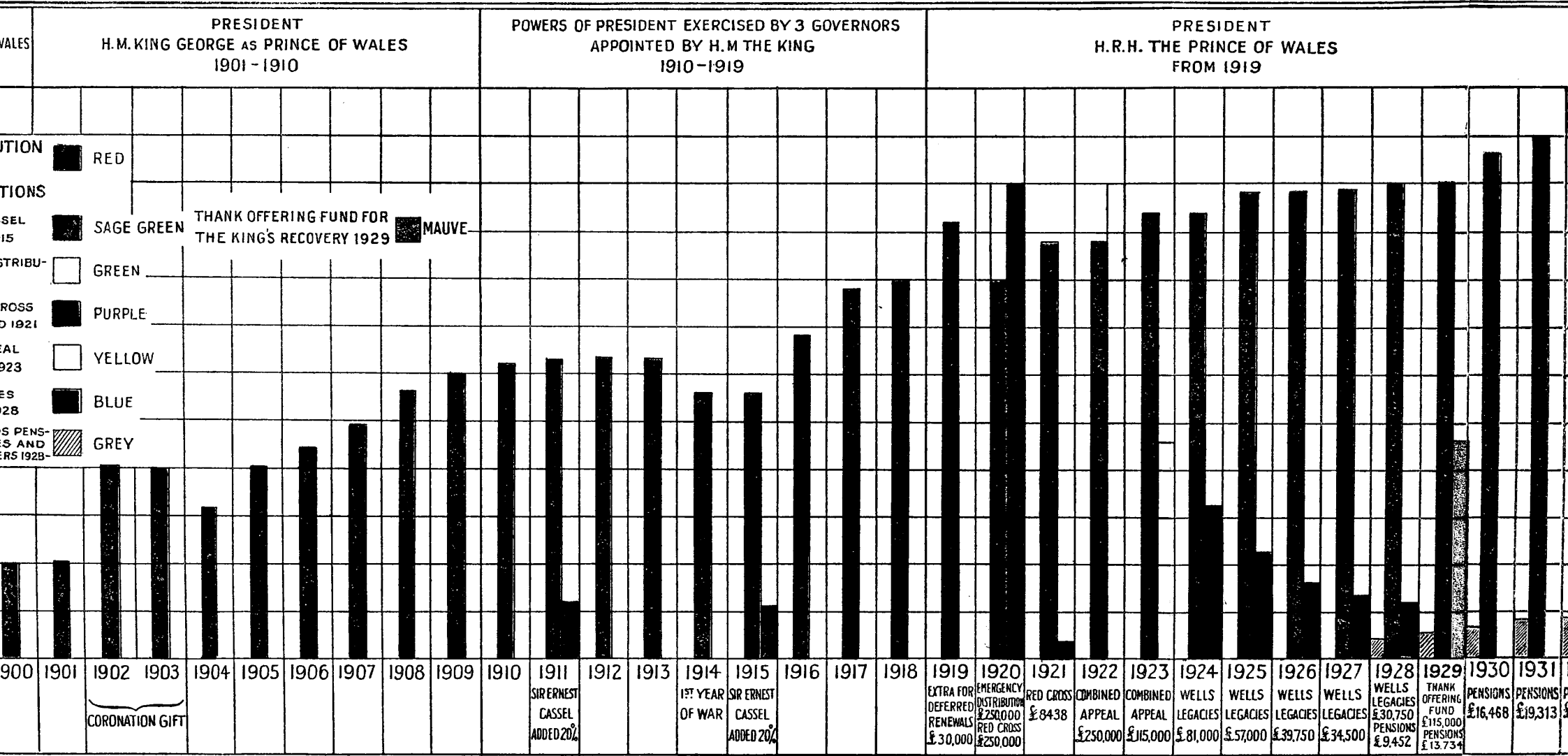

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

10 OLD JEWRY, E.C. 2.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following pages).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-seven years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £7,701,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1933 being £300,000, besides £20,000 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 17s. 6d. per cent. of the receipts, or rather less than 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £524,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-five years, the contribution in 1933 being £20,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

A Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, is prescribed, thus facilitating comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary", which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these Annual Reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications below.)

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours. An Inquiry has recently been held into Out-Patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting (see pp. 10, 48 and 88).

By means of a standing parliamentary committee the Fund assists to secure the interests of the voluntary hospitals during the consideration by Parliament of any bills affecting the hospital system.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1933, being 1,788 at 106 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and £37,000 received in 1929 through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
