

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

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1928.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

- 1. The outstanding events in the history of the King's Fund for 1928 were summed up by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in his message to the Council meeting on December 14, when, after saying that although he was back in England he could not just at present undertake any public engagements, he continued:
 - "I congratulate King Edward's Hospital Fund on the achievements of a year which has seen the completion of the Wells Legacies distribution, the issue of the Pay Beds Report, the actual start of the contributory Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, the receipt of Sir Otto Beit's magnificent gift for the purchase of radium, and the attainment for the first time of an ordinary distribution of a quarter of a million. I approve the proposal to appoint a Special Committee to consider the position of the Voluntary Hospitals under the Local Government Bill, and I wish the King's Fund and the Hospitals all possible prosperity in the coming year."
- 2. This message sums up the story of one of the busiest years which the King's Fund has had since it began to develop the functions of a central administrative and co-ordinating body as well as those of a collecting and distributing fund. The message recalls also the fact that the year ended under the shadow of the King's illness. At the time of the Distribution meeting of the Council in December, 1928, from which His Royal Highness the President was thus unavoidably absent, the shadow was at its deepest. The Annual meeting held in June, 1929, for the adoption of this Report, sees that shadow in great measure removed. The following resolution was passed at that meeting:—
 - "The General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to express their heartfelt thankfulness for the continued progress towards recovery of His Majesty the King, their past President and present Patron, and their fervent hope for his early restoration to full strength and activity."

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

- 3. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1928 were £378,635 10s. 7d.
- 4. Of this, £40,852 18s. 10d. was from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells; £1,500 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £68,801 5s. 8d. from general legacies; £16,395 18s. 9d. from gifts to capital; £500 2s. 6d. for the purchase of Radium; and £250,585 4s. 10d. from general receipts. - 7. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. The Council are greatly indebted to the Visitors for the reports, which are an important part of the material that comes before the Distribution Committee.
- 8. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals, convalescent homes, and consumption sanatoria during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,450,890. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £6,109,306 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

- 9. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, the Duke of Connaught and other members of the Royal Family.
- 10. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £1,050 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from Sir Thomas P. Latham, Bt., and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Lloyds Bank, Limited, and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £525 from the Westminster Bank, Limited; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Mr. George Roberts, and from "W.C.W."; and donations of £1,258 6s. od. on behalf of the Milk Pool, per Sir William Price; of £1,000 from Lord Glendyne; of £1,000 from Captain T. P. Hall; of £1,000 from Viscount Rothermere; of £1,000 from Lt.-Col. Geo. Waters ("A gift in Memory of Sir Richard Temple"); and of £500 from Captain Sir Charles L. Cust, Bt., R.N., from Mrs. Edith S. de Marco, from "J.R.B.," and from "S.D.R.S.D."; £500 from "A Friend, for the purchase of Radium"; two anonymous donations of £10,000 each, and one of £1,500. The Fund also received a munificent gift of £10,000 from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, for capital purposes, in addition to his annual contribution of £500.
- II. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £17,000, the same as in the previous year. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation is now £432,000, apart from grants made by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League for this valuable assistance, collected in moderate and continuous amounts from a large number of individual contributors.
- 12. Legacies received during the year included £40,852 18s. 10d. from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells, being the balance of residue (making a total sum of £255,092 18s. 10d. received from the combined estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells);

£25,000 from the estate of the late Rev. Henry Swann on account of residue; £16,225 from the estate of the late Mrs. Adelia Augusta Louisa Walker, further on account of share of residue (making a total sum of £22,225 received to date); £10,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Charles Henry Cox, on account of residue; £9,200 from the estate of the late Col. Henry Doughty, on account of share of residue; £3,711 17s. 1d. from the estate of the late Miss Elizabeth Augusta Marshall, being share of residue, to be added to the "Marshall Fund" for capital purposes; £3,205 10s. 6d. from the estate of the late Mr. Thomas Clayden, on account of residue; £2,671 15s. 2d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £363,266 10s. 5d. received to date, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); £1,500 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £516,013 4s. 6d. received to date). The Fund also received during the year a further sum of £1,128 is. 7d. (making a total of £3,002 is. 8d.) by order of the Court in respect of the residue of the estate of the late Mr. William Andrew Guesdon. The Fund is also very grateful to the Trustees of the residuary estate of the late Miss Ann Ward for the gift of £1,000 in the exercise of their discretionary powers.

FAMILY FUNDS.

13. The very generous donation of £10,000 Conversion Stock made last year by Mr. H. W. Marshall to inaugurate a special fund which was to be entitled the "Marshall Fund," and to which, if so requested, any subsequent gifts or bequests that might be received from members of his family were to be added, has this year been augmented by the sum of £3,711 17s. 1d., being a bequest of a share of the residuary estate of Mr. Marshall's sister, the late Miss Elizabeth Augusta Marshall. Particulars of this Family Fund, and of any similar funds that donors may desire to create, will be found in the Annual Report of the King's Fund at the end of the permanent list of donors of £100 and upwards.

EXPENSES.

14. During the year expenses amounted to £14,091 3s. 1d., or about 9d. per £1 of the total received, as compared with £10,663 18s. 3d., or about $7\frac{3}{4}d$. per £1 in the previous year. About £2,250 of this was due to exceptional expenditure in 1928, including the Pay Beds Report and office extensions to deal with the greatly increased work.

WELLS LEGACIES.

- 15. The special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells was completed in May, 1928. The final list of grants, with an account of the whole distribution, was published in the Annual Report for 1927.
- 16. The total of the two legacies amounted to £255,092. Grants were made to 72 schemes at 63 different hospitals. These schemes included the extension of 40 existing hospitals; the complete rebuilding of 4 on a larger scale on new sites; 3 new hospitals; several

new or enlarged out-patient departments, nurses' homes, operating theatres and special departments; and the opening of 72 beds which had never been brought into regular use. The total number of additional beds provided by all the schemes exceeded 1,600, including 179 to be reserved for accident cases.

17. There are still, however, a large number of urgent schemes to which the King's Fund would have been glad to make special grants if money had been available for the purpose.

PAY BEDS IN THE LONDON VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.

- 18. The Report of the Pay Beds Committee was published in July. It contained full particulars of the accommodation provided in the London Voluntary Hospitals for the middle and professional classes and others prepared to pay more than ordinary hospital patients. This amounted in March, 1928, to 1,055 beds at 80 hospitals, and there were extension schemes that would sooner or later add another 900. The weekly charges, exclusive of any medical or surgical fees, usually ranged from four to six guineas, though there were a considerable number of beds at higher or lower rates. The Report also discussed the nature of the accommodation; the arrangements for medical attendance; the demand for additional pay beds of different kinds and at different rates of charge; and the methods of increasing the accommodation and of providing for cost of maintenance and building. The Committee concluded their Report by expressing the opinion that the existing pay beds had proved to be a very valuable addition to the Voluntary Hospital service of London; that a material extension of this provision was urgently required to meet the existing demand; and that the organisation of a mutual insurance scheme to assist persons of moderate means to meet the cost of maintenance and medical fees was strongly to be recommended.
- 19. In December the General Council expressed their concurrence in the general conclusions of the Report and their approval of the recommendations on the subject of an insurance scheme for the middle and professional classes, commending the whole of the Report to the consideration of the hospitals, the medical profession, the members of the classes more immediately concerned and the public at large.
- 20. The Report suggested the annual preparation of a list of pay beds in the hospitals making returns to the King's Fund, and it has been decided to compile such a list in pamphlet form, showing where hospital accommodation can be obtained at moderate charges.*

Pension Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

- 21. The Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers (Contributory) came into operation on January 1, 1928. By the end of the year the Scheme had been adopted by 97 hospitals in London and 65 outside London, representing a total of 21,826 beds.
- 22. The Scheme, under which contributions are paid both by the institutions and by the staffs and the pensions are secured by insurance policies, was first recommended by a special

Committee of the King's Fund under the Chairmanship of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall. The details of the scheme were settled at a series of conferences between the King's Fund, the British Hospitals Association, the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers, and the College of Nursing. Its success in operation has been largely due to Sir Edward Penton, the Chairman of the Central Council of the Scheme, who is also a member of the King's Fund Council.

- 23. The Scheme is open not only to hospitals, but also to other institutions associated with hospital work, and has been adopted by the King's Fund in relation to its own staff.
- 24. While the Scheme was under discussion, the King's Fund promised to make special grants for 7 years, up to a limited amount, towards the expenditure incurred by hospitals on the books of the Fund. The distribution for 1928 contains the first instalments of these grants. It was an understanding that, as far as possible, these special grants should be in addition to the ordinary distribution. For 1928 they were paid out of unexpected legacies received after the distribution for the year was settled. Provision towards a portion of the liability for future years has been made partly from the same source and partly by setting aside a sum of £12,000 out of the Wells legacies.

SIR OTTO BEIT'S GIFT OF RADIUM.

- 25. On November 27 the King's Fund was selected by Sir Otto Beit as the recipient of a very generous and timely gift of £50,000 for the purchase of Radium, which he desired to be allocated by way of loan to hospitals in such a manner as to secure that it should be used as efficiently as possible for the relief of suffering and the advancement of medical science.
- 26. The Management and Distribution Committees at once began to take the necessary steps for purchasing 4 grammes of Radium on the best available terms, for selecting the hospitals amongst which it should be allocated, and for drawing up the conditions to be observed by the hospitals in order to secure its safe custody and its efficient use for the purposes suggested by Sir Otto.
- 27. Here again, as in the case of the Wells legacies, the amount available as the result of Sir Otto's munificent gift, while adding greatly to the resources of the hospitals of London in the fight against disease, left many needs still unsatisfied.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS AND THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BILL.

28. In November a special Committee was appointed, under the Chairmanship of the Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, to consider what steps should be taken to secure that, during the consideration of the Local Government Bill by Parliament and afterwards, every endeavour should be made to maintain the Voluntary Hospitals as an essential part of the Hospital system after the transfer of the Poor Law Hospitals to the London County Council and the other County authorities within the King's Fund area. The object which the Fund has in view is

to see that, in the changes that result from this transfer, the Hospital service of the community does not lose those special features which, in this country, are contributed by the Voluntary Hospitals, and which depend on the maintenance at those Hospitals of voluntary management and voluntary finance.

- 29. The Special Committee immediately began the preparation of suggested amendments to the Bill, designed to secure co-operation between the voluntary hospitals and the county hospitals. This could be done either by the presence on the appropriate Committees of the County Councils of persons experienced in the work of Voluntary Hospitals, or by provision for continuous consultation between those responsible for the two kinds of hospital, or by both methods taken together. The discussions were still going on at the end of the year.
- 30. These questions affected not only London but the whole country. The special Committee included members closely associated with hospitals outside London, and at each stage of its proceedings it issued circulars inviting opinions not only from the hospitals on the books of the Fund, but also, by arrangement with the President of the British Hospitals Association, from all the hospitals in Great Britain.

REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

- 31. The Propaganda Committee, as will be seen by its special Report, is continually developing fresh methods of increasing public knowledge of the work of the hospitals and of the King's Fund, and in all the functions which it organises for the Fund this element of propaganda is regarded as of primary importance.
- 32. The Council were greatly indebted to the Lord Chancellor, Lord Hailsham, for kindly delivering a Broadcast appeal for the Fund as the Week's Good Cause on December 16.

HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS AND STATISTICS.

- 33. The work of bringing the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts up to date was completed by the Hospital Economy Committee by the issue of a booklet which describes and explains in non-technical language a system of "Accounts for Small Hospitals," based on the Revised Uniform System, but less detailed.
- 34. King Edward's Hospital Fund has thus provided a means by which any hospital, however large or however small, can compare its finances and cost of working with that of any other hospital, and general statistics relating to all the hospitals can be compiled on a uniform basis. Nor is there any need for these advantages to be limited to the Voluntary Hospitals.

HOSPITALS AND MOTOR ACCIDENTS.

35. The Fund has carefully considered various suggestions that have been made with a view to lightening the burden thrown on hospitals by motor accidents. As a result, it was thought that the most hopeful means of dealing with the matter lay in encouraging motorists to include in their insurance policies a "hospital clause," with a small additional premium.

Private conferences with insurance representatives were, however, unproductive, the unanimous view put forward by them being that the motoring public would not undertake a voluntary addition to the cost of insurance. This was how the matter stood at the end of the year.

THE KING'S FUND SPHERE OF OPERATIONS.

36. Early in the year the Management Committee received a deputation from the Hospitals situated within the Metropolitan Police District, which is the Fund's maximum legal area, but beyond the 11-mile radius from St. Paul's, which is the present working area. The Management Committee took the opinion of all the other standing Committees on the subject and finally decided with regret that, as the Fund had extended its radius as recently as 1925 so as to take in all the poorer districts up to the Eastern boundary of the Metropolitan Police District, they could not see their way at present to recommend the General Council to make any further extension in other directions. The Fund felt obliged to give a reply on somewhat similar lines to an application from the Central Council of District Nursing Associations in London.

PERSONNEL.

- 37. The Fund suffered exceptionally severe losses during 1928 by the deaths of members of great eminence in the hospital world. Viscount Cave was Chairman of the Committee of Enquiry which in 1921 devised the methods which enabled the Voluntary Hospitals to survive the financial crisis after the war; he had been a member of the General Council since 1922, and had been a very active friend of the hospitals in many ways. Viscount Hambleden had been a member of the Council since 1921. At the time of his death he was Chairman of the Pay Beds Committee, over which he had presided during the taking of the evidence and the preliminary meetings for the consideration of the Report. Sir William Church was a member of the Council from 1899 to 1926, and Chairman of the Distribution Committee from 1903 to 1918. Sir John Craggs had been a member of the Council for 28 years, and was an Honorary Secretary from 1897 to 1906.
- 38. On leaving for East Africa in September, His Royal Highness the President appointed a President's Powers Committee, consisting of the Lord Chancellor (Lord Hailsham), The Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, and the Governor of the Bank of England, to exercise his powers during his absence.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

39. It is particularly important at the present time that the financial position of the Voluntary Hospitals should be strengthened so that their influence on the new developments in the hospital service of the country should be as great as possible. The annual distribution by the King's Fund is an important factor in the financial stability of the hospitals of London. The Fund has exceptional facilities for making special distributions, like that of the Wells legacies, in aid of extensions or other special purposes. Its power, as a central co-ordinating body, to act in the interests of all the hospitals may be of the greatest value in the immediate future to all who desire the maintenance of the voluntary element in the hospital service.

- 40. The Thank-Offering Fund for the King's Recovery, inaugurated on April 24, 1929, by the munificent donation of £105,000 from "Audax," has met with a most promising reception and remains open at the date of this Report. It is hoped that the Fund may be enabled to take further steps to satisfy in the near future some of the needs to which reference has been made in previous paragraphs.
- 41. The Council are again greatly indebted to the Press for its assistance in making known the work of the King's Fund and of the hospitals.

St. James's Palace, June 11, 1929.

At the Annual Meeting of the President and General Council, held at St. James's Palace on June 11, 1929, the following resolution, passed by the Management Committee on May 14, was reported:—

"The Management Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Lord Revelstoke, Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee since 1915. He had been a Member of the Finance Committee since 1906, of the General Council since 1908, and of the Management Committee since its formation in 1922. During the whole period he watched over the financial interests of the Fund and the care of its investments with all the knowledge and skill for which he was distinguished. By his sudden death his colleagues in its administration have been deprived of his valued co-operation in their work, to which he rendered devoted service.

"The Management Committee desire also to tender to the members of his family their sincere condolences in their bereavement."

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 14, 1928.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes, for the present year, was held at St. James's Palace on Friday, December 14, 1928, the Lord High Chancellor, Lord Hailsham (Member of the President's Powers Committee) being in the Chair.

THE LORD CHANCELLOR'S SPEECH.

Lord HAILSHAM said :--

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—Before dealing with the business of this morning, I have first the honour of reading you a letter from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, your President, which will explain my presence here in the Chair to-day.

St. James's Palace, S.W. 1

December 12th, 1928.

" My dear Lord Chancellor,

Although I am back in England, I cannot just at present undertake any public engagements. I should be grateful, therefore, if you and Mr. Whitley and the Governor of the Bank of England would continue to act as President's Powers Committee until the end of the year, and I would ask you to tell the Council how sorry I am not to be able to take the Chair at the Distribution Meeting on December 14th.

I congratulate King Edward's Hospital Fund on the achievements of a year which has seen the completion of the Wells Legacies distribution, the issue of the Pay Beds Report, the actual start of the contributory Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, the receipt of Sir Otto Beit's magnificent gift for the purchase of radium, and the attainment for the first time of an ordinary distribution of a quarter of a million. I approve the proposal to appoint a Special Committee to consider the position of the Voluntary Hospitals under the Local Government Bill, and I wish the King's Fund and the Hospitals all possible prosperity in the coming year.

I am sure we must all be grateful to His Royal Highness for finding time in the midst of his present anxiety to write a letter which shows the interest with which he follows the doings of this Council. Before we proceed to our business, I am sure you would like to express by a formal resolution the sympathy which every one of us feels with our beloved Sovereign, Patron and Past-President of this Fund, and with all the Royal Family in this time of anxiety, and I therefore ask your permission to move from the Chair this resolution:—

The General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to express their profound sympathy with His Majesty the King, Patron and Past-President of the Fund, in his illness, and their heartfelt wishes for a speedy and complete recovery. They desire also to convey with their humble obedient duty to Her Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, and the other members of the Royal Family an expression of sympathy in their prolonged anxiety.

The resolution was seconded by the Right Hon. J. H. Whitley, and carried unanimously.

Lord HAILSHAM then continued: I now propose to follow the practice of your President, and begin to-day's proceedings by a short review of the past year and a brief introduction to the items on the Agenda. Fortunately for me the events of the past are nearly all referred to in the reports that come before you to-day. Your President, of course, if he were here, would speak from personal knowledge of the current work of the Fund.

The principal business at a December Council is the annual distribution. But this year I cannot help referring first of all to the magnificent gift of £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit for the purchase of radium. We all know of the need for more radium for the hospitals, if they are to extend to their patients the benefits of the newest methods of treating the most terrible of diseases. We all know

the importance of pursuing as rapidly as possible the study of the best ways of using this potent remedy. We all know the enthusiasm of Sir Otto Beit for the work of healing and for the promotion of scientific research; the generosity with which he has so often given large sums for these purposes; and the skill and care which he exercises in so planning his gifts as to ensure that they will be used to the best advantage. To us here it is particularly gratifying that he should have selected the King's Fund as the administrator of this latest example of his munificence and public spirit. It opens, as His Royal Highness has already said in his telegram of thanks, a new field for the activities of the Fund as a central body for the Hospitals. You will be asked to delegate to the Management and Distribution Committees the necessary powers for the purchase of radium and its use in accordance with Sir Otto Beit's wishes. You will be pleased to hear that these Committees have not waited for your official sanction. Each of them has already held a special meeting so as to be ready to act promptly at such time—to use Sir Otto's own words—as may be judged expedient.

The annual distribution this year constitutes in itself a great landmark in the history of the Fund. For it is the first time that the ordinary annual distribution has reached the total of a quarter of a million. When King Edward, as Prince of Wales, founded the Fund in 1897, he aimed at £100,000 a year. The distribution is now two-and-a-half times this amount. Yet the fact remains that, what with the increase in the number of beds, the development of expensive treatments, and the changes in the value of money, the demands on the Fund have grown in even larger proportion. Of the income of the year, Lord Revelstoke will give you particulars. In order merely to maintain the £250,000, the Fund has to receive during the year at least £90,000. This year's success has been largely due to some special donations: notably two of £10,000 each from two anonymous donors, one of whom has now helped us with gifts of varying amounts for six years running. This does not, of course, include Mr. J. J. Crosfield's gift of f10,000 to capital. The Fund has also received an exceptional amount in legacies during the year. But the Fund has largely depended for its success on the steady support of our smaller contributors, including the amounts collected by the League of Mercy, of which you will hear in a few minutes. The information will come this year from Lord Marshall, the Honorary Treasurer of the League, for Sir William Collins, who has hitherto given you each December the welcome news of the progress of the League, has now resigned the Honorary Secretaryship after 30 years of arduous and successful work, for which everyone connected with the King's Fund and the Hospitals owes him a deep debt of gratitude. As to the way in which the £250,000 is to be distributed, Sir Cooper Perry will lay before you the recommendations of the Distribution Committee. Besides the £250,000 in ordinary grants to maintenance and building, the list contains the first instalments of the special grants promised in aid of the Contributory Pension Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers. This Scheme, which the Fund initiated, has now been adopted by 93 Hospitals in London and, I learn from Sir Edward Penton, its Chairman, by 58 Hospitals in other parts of the country, making 151 in all with a total of nearly 21,000 beds, which is practically one-third of all the voluntary hospital beds in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. If these special grants are included, and also the final grants made last May out of the Wells legacies, the grand total distributed during this year is no less than £200,000.

The report of the Pay Beds Committee also comes before the Council for the first time. Its publication in July was one of the principal items in the Fund's work for the year. The loss of Lord Hambleden, just when the discussion of the evidence had begun, was a heavy blow to the Fund in this, as in so many other spheres of hospital work. The report, for the final form of which Sir John Rose Bradford, as Acting-Chairman, so ably took over the responsibility, is important in three ways. It describes in detail the facilities which the hospitals of London already provide for the middle and professional classes—1,055 pay beds at various rates of charge—a thing hardly yet realised by some critics of the voluntary system. It emphasises the need for a large increase in pay beds to remove a

real hardship from those, often themselves regular supporters of the hospitals, who cannot afford nursing home fees when they are ill. And it strongly recommends the establishment of an insurance scheme to enable those of moderate means to place themselves in a position to pay the charges, if and when illness comes to them or to their families. Such an insurance scheme is already in operation on a limited scale in the British Provident Association, and only needs development. You will be invited to endorse the general conclusions of the Committee.

I have left to the last what is in many ways the biggest of all the problems with which the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals are faced at the present moment. The transfer to the County Councils of the infirmaries hitherto carried on under the poor law will produce great changes in the hospital service, and, we hope, great improvements. But it will be necessary to work out a scheme by which the Voluntary Hospitals shall continue to make their special contribution to that Hospital service, which depends on the fact that their management is voluntary and that their finance is voluntary. How much the public in this country value the Voluntary Hospitals is illustrated by the figures in the King's Fund Statistical Report, which show that their annual maintenance cost is over £3,000,000 in London alone, besides £1,000,000 received for endowment and building; and that rather more than 2½ millions of this came from voluntary gifts during the year. If the Voluntary Hospitals were not preserved, not only would huge additional sums have to come out of the rates, but the present spirit of the Voluntary Hospitals, which influences all other Hospitals in this country, would be lost and the whole system would become official. This is the last thing that any of us desire, and we must make it clear to the public that it is worth while continuing to subscribe to the Voluntary Hospitals in order to prevent it. The Voluntary Hospitals on their part are engaged in considering the principles of co-ordination between themselves and the new County hospital service, so as to preserve these essential features. In this discussion the King's Fund must necessarily take an active share. It is for this reason that we have appointed a Special Committee containing men who are prominent in the work of our leading hospitals in London, and some of whom are also in close touch with hospitals outside London, and that Committee, as you will have noticed from the letter I have read, has received the approval of His Royal Highness the President. We hope that this will provide a means of focussing the opinion of practical hospital people and bringing it effectively to bear, both during the discussions on the Local Government Bill, and during the subsequent preparation of schemes by the County Councils and other Local Authorities in the King's Fund area. Our one desire is to obtain the maximum of efficient service for the sick and suffering.

Before I close you will wish me to express your thanks to the Committees, and particularly to the Distribution Committee and the Management Committee whose reports make up our agenda to-day; to their Chairmen, Sir Cooper Perry and Lord Donoughmore; and to the Honorary Secretaries.

I will now ask Lord Revelstoke to make his statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Lord Revelstoke (the Hon. Treasurer) said:—

My Lord Chancellor, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—You, My Lord Chancellor, have already pointed out that the outstanding feature of this year's ordinary distribution is that for the first time we attain to a total of £250,000. Last year the estimates enabled the Management Committee to recommend a distribution of £245,000. The League of Mercy contributed an additional £2,000, thereby increasing the total to £247,000. It has been the considered practice of the Fund not to augment the amount of the annual distribution without having a reasonable prospect of being able to maintain it in the future at not less than the increased figure. This principle is of particular importance in the present instance, when the total reaches the large amount of a quarter of a million

pounds, one of those round figures which will inevitably be regarded as marking a definite stage in the upward progress of the Fund. When at the beginning of last month the Council met to determine the amount of the ordinary distribution, the estimates pointed to the conclusion that this important step would be justified, and the total distribution was therefore increased from £247,000 to £250,000.

Owing to the exceptionally large receipts from donations and legacies to which you, My Lord Chancellor, have been so good as to refer, the receipts for the year, according to the estimates then submitted, would have actually exceeded a quarter of a million. But it is obvious that dependence cannot be placed on the continuance from year to year of such receipts of so exceptional a nature, and, if the distribution is not to be subject to fluctuation, the amount derivable from legacies must be averaged. It was ascertained that, if the average amount received from legacies during the past five years were substituted for the total amount actually received from that source during the first ten months of the year 1928—the latter amount being the figure shown in the estimate—the total income on that basis, less expenses, would be approximately equal to the £250,000. The conditions necessary to justify the Council in increasing the distribution to £250,000 were accordingly fulfilled, but these conditions did not justify at present any increase beyond that amount. As illustrating the importance of averaging the legacies, I may say that the total received during the first ten months of this year amounted, at the date when the estimate was made, to over £37,000; and additional sums have since been received from this source. On the other hand, legacies for the whole of 1927 amounted only to £15,000.

You have also before you to-day the first instalment of the special grants in aid of the initial expenditure of the Hospitals on the Contributory Pension Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers. The Council will remember that a sum of money was reserved out of the Wells legacies to meet in part the liability in this connection, spread over seven years, as sanctioned by the Council. When the accounts for the whole year are submitted, it will be our duty to decide from what source this year's special grants shall be provided. These grants are outside the ordinary distribution, and have no bearing on the total of £250,000 to which I have already referred.

In addition to the donation of £10,000 from Mr. J. J. Crosfield, receipts on capital account have included a legacy of £3,709 from Miss E. A. Marshall, and further sums of £2,671 and £1,500 from the estates of Sir Julius Wernher and Mr. Samuel Lewis, these two sums being additional to the very large amounts already received from these sources. Miss Marshall's legacy, in accordance with the provisions of her will, is to be added to the "family fund" entitled the "Marshall Fund." This fund was established by her brother, our valued friend, Mr. H. W. Marshall, who inaugurated it by a gift of f10,000 3½ per cent. Conversion Stock last year, on the occasion of the luncheon at the Mansion House held to commemorate the thirtieth anniversary of the King's Fund. This is the first "family fund "to appear in our Annual Report, and it now amounts to £11,334, the whole of this sum being represented by permanent investments. While on the subject of the Capital Account, it is interesting I think to note that, had it not been for the interest on the late Lord Iveagh's bequest of £60,000 received in 1927, the estimates in November, which computed legacies on the basis of the five years' average, would not have reached the £250,000, but would barely have exceeded last year's total of £247,000. In conclusion, as the distribution continually increases, it will be appreciated that such additions to capital as Lord Iveagh's, with their consequent increase in the fixed annual income, are the foundation of the stability of the King's Fund. At the same time, it should be borne in mind that it is from annual subscriptions, from donations and from other voluntary gifts, that we have to erect a superstructure which is of increasing magnitude every year.

Lord Marshall, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, announced that this year it was proposed to allocate £17,000 to the King's Fund. This was the same amount as

the grant of last year, which was £2,000 higher than that of the year before. The grants this year to extra-metropolitan hospitals amounted to £8,210. From the inauguration of the League in 1899, it had transferred to the King's Fund from its collections for hospitals a total of £432,034, and had made grants to hospitals outside London totalling £108,907, making a grand total of £540,941.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendation that the grants be approved (see pages 30 to 32).

Colonel Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) (see pages 33 to 42).

Lt.-Col. C. B. Levita (Chairman of the County Council) having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals as follows, and moved the recommendation that the grants be approved (see page 43).

Mr. Leonard Cohen (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals (see pages 44 to 46).

The motion, having been seconded by Mr. Pett Ridge, was then put and carried unanimously. On the motion of Lady Hall, seconded by Mr. H. L. Eason, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Wednesday, December 19.

GIFT OF SIR OTTO BEIT FOR PURCHASE OF RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore) presented a Report of the Committee on the gift of Sir Otto Beit for the purchase of Radium to be loaned to hospitals in London, and moved recommendations delegating the necessary powers to the Management and Distribution Committees, together with a resolution that the best thanks of the General Council be tendered to Sir Otto Beit for his most generous gift of £50,000 for the purchase of radium, which would help to supply one of the most urgent needs of the hospitals of London at the present time (see pages 50 to 52).

The recommendations, having been seconded by Sir George Makins, were put and carried unanimously.

Scope of Operations of the King's Fund.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore) then presented a Report of the Committee stating that applications for inclusion in the scope of the operations of the King's Fund had been received from hospitals outside the 11-mile radius from St. Paul's, and from the Central Council for District Nursing Associations in London. To the first application the Management Committee, after consulting all the Committees of the Fund, had replied that, as the Fund had extended its radius as recently as 1925 so as to take in all the poorer districts up to the Eastern boundary of the Metropolitan Police District, they could not see their way at present to recommend the General Council to extend the radius in the other directions. To the second application they had replied that the demands on the resources of the Fund were so great that it had not yet been able to take in all the hospitals in the Metropolitan Police District; that if and when it felt able to extend its assistance to other institutions it would have to consider all the

classes enumerated in the Act and to decide upon their relative claims; and that in these circumstances they could not recommend an extension to include Nursing Associations at the present time. He moved that the action of the Committee be approved. The motion, having been seconded by Major-General Sir Cecil Lowther, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE PAY BEDS COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore) then presented a report of the Management Committee on the Report of the Pay Beds Committee, and moved the recommendations, which were seconded by the Rt. Hon. M. C. Norman (Governor of the Bank of England), and carried unanimously (see pages 47 to 49).

Position of the Voluntary Hospitals under the Local Government Bill.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore) also presented a Report of the Committee on the Position of the Voluntary Hospitals under the Local Government Bill (see pages 53 and 54), stating that the President's Powers Committee had appointed a special committee to consider the subject and recommending that the necessary powers be delegated by the Council.

The recommendations were seconded by Sir Walter Lawrence, Bart.

Colonel Levita said that, as Chairman of the London County Council, the head of the Public Health Services for London, he would like to express the pleasure of his colleagues at the appointment of this Committee. The County Council had felt that it was absolutely essential that there should be some collective body with whom they might negotiate and come to an understanding on the question of the readjusted Public Health Services of London. It would be the aim of the County Council to bring all the hospitals under its control up to a standard of which the Fund would approve, and therefore it was of the utmost importance that there should be co-operation between the work of the voluntary hospitals and of the municipal authorities. For the last twenty years it had been the effort of the London County Council to support and co-operate with the voluntary hospital system, as for instance in the treatment of school children, of tuberculosis and of venereal disease; and to-day the London County Council paid very large sums of money indeed to the voluntary hospitals for these services. He thought it important that the voluntary hospitals should treat themselves as an integral part of the Public Health Services of London as a whole.

Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary) having referred to the fact that the Special Committee included some Members from outside the King's Fund, the recommendations were put and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1929.

Lord HAILSHAM then said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have now an announcement to make about the appointments for the year 1929. As you know, under the Act of Incorporation the Councillors and Members of Committees are all appointed by the President and hold office only till the end of the year. As His Royal Highness is back in England, he will himself make the appointments as usual on January 1st. The President's Powers Committee have accordingly submitted to him the names which they had had under consideration in connection with a few vacancies that have occurred, and he has been pleased to signify his approval. The following will be added to the Council, Lord Reading and Mr. Warren Low. Sir Leonard Lyle finds, after two years, that he cannot any longer spare the great amount of time needed for the Distribution Committee. Mr. Ernest Pooley will be appointed in his place. Lord Marshall cannot continue on the Revenue Committee, also for want of time, and his place will be filled by Wing-Commander Louis Greig.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by Sir Frederick Fry, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1929.

The Lord Mayor (Sir Kynaston Studd), in proposing a hearty vote of thanks to Lord Hailsham for presiding, said that in addition the Council would wish to express their thanks for what he was going to do, as he had also, although his week-ends were so valuable to him, undertaken to come up to town on Sunday evening to broadcast an appeal on behalf of the Fund, as the "Week's Good Cause."

Professor Winifred Cullis seconded the motion, which was then put and carried unanimously. Lord Hailsham having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, June 11, 1929.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, June II, 1929, at II a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council, was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have here a message from His Majesty the King from Windsor Castle:—

"I am delighted with the progress of the King's Fund, and especially with the great stimulus to its work given by the munificent gifts of Sir Otto Beit for Radium and of 'Audax' to initiate the Thanksgiving Fund, and with the noble response which has been made to the Appeal.

"GEORGE R.I.

" June 11, 1929."

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When I was at Windsor only on Saturday I saw His Majesty; he was making very good progress, although he is naturally rather disappointed at being laid up again. But he is going on very well indeed, and showed great interest in the Fund, as he always did.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then continued:-

It is just ten years since my first Council Meeting as your President. Considered as a collecting and distributing agency, the King's Fund was a pretty big thing then, and it has continued to expand. The distribution in 1918 was £200,000, whereas in 1928 it reached for the first time a total of £250,000. But as a central administrative body for the Hospitals of London it was, comparatively speaking, nothing to what it is now. The agenda at my first meeting contained only two items, the Accounts and the Annual Report. To-day we have a great mass of important business as well. We have the allocation of Sir Otto Beit's splendid gift of £50,000 worth of radium; a report on the work of the Propaganda Committee; and the publication of a book on Accounts for Small Hospitals, which I see is being asked for, not only in this country, but also in South Africa, Egypt, Singapore and the

United States. We have also a report from the Special Committee on the relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act. And we finish with a statement by Lord Donoughmore on the present position of the Thankoffering Fund for the King's Recovery. The Annual Report itself shows that this is the normal position occupied by the King's Fund in the Hospital world to-day. The Report describes, for example, three big pieces of special work last year: the completion of the Wells' Legacies distribution, the start of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, and the Report of the Pav Beds Committee. With the Wells' Legacies distribution of £255,000 we helped to extend forty Hospitals, to rebuild four, to provide three new ones, to add 1,600 beds, and to carry out a number of other improvements. The Report of the Pay Beds Committee contained particulars of all the pay beds at the voluntary Hospitals of London. The middle classes often have the hardest time of any, when faced with the cost of a severe illness or operation. They do not always know that the Hospitals have more than 1,100 beds, at moderate rates, for just that sort of thing. The Committee also recommended an Insurance Scheme for meeting the cost of a pay bed and of surgical fees. Sir Alan Anderson, who was one of the Honorary Secretaries of the King's Fund when it helped to start the Hospital Saving Association to enable wage-earners to make provision for their Hospital payments, has been working for some time at a similar scheme for the middle classes, and I hope he will achieve a similar success. The Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers began in January 1928, and by the end of the year had been taken up by ninetyseven Hospitals in London and sixty-five outside London. The Scheme was drawn up in consultation with the National Associations representing the Hospitals, the Officers and the Nurses. The King's Fund, in addition to giving financial assistance, thus acted as a focussing point for voluntary Hospital activity, in a matter which affects not only London but the whole country. The same thing has happened in connection with the Local Government Act. Here again, through the special Committee of which Mr. Whitley is Chairman, the King's Fund helped to focus voluntary Hospital opinion, both in London and outside of it, and provided a means by which immediate action could be taken. The result has been that, in any development of Hospital service that may take place under the Act, the importance of the voluntary Hospital element in that service is now recognised by a clause in the Act itself. In the Committee's Memorandum on the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals, the King's Fund gives the reasons why the voluntary element must be maintained, if the maximum of efficient Hospital service is to be secured. It also suggests methods by which the voluntary Hospitals and the county authorities can co-operate to secure that maximum. This memorandum has been circulated all over the country by the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association.

The King's Fund Committee has now formed a Joint Committee with representatives of the hospitals in London to discuss the particular methods applicable to London, with a view to holding preliminary consultations with the London County Council. Similar action will be required all over the country. Here again, the British Hospitals Association and Mr. Whitley's Committee have been keeping in touch; so that, if any questions come up that need common action on the part of all the voluntary hospitals of the country, the King's Fund will be ready to help in any way which is thought desirable. We are very grateful indeed to Mr. Whitley for undertaking this important piece of work.

In dealing with Sir Otto Beit's splendid gift of £50,000 for the purchase of radium, for loan to hospitals in London selected by the King's Fund, the two functions of a distributing body and an administrative body are combined. Radium is so expensive, that even such a large sum as £50,000 has not enabled the Distribution Committee to satisfy all the needs. Loans have been made to

twenty hospitals, on the principle that there ought to be a few hospitals with a sufficient supply to act as radium centres, and that a rather larger number of hospitals should have enough to provide effective treatment. A great many details have also had to be settled, including the particular forms in which the radium has to be put up, and the conditions and regulations that are necessary, in dealing with a substance so valuable if properly handled, and so dangerous if the necessary precautions are not taken. The Distribution Committee have been fortunate in securing the services of Professor Russ, as a technical expert, to help them in this part of their work. To Sir Otto Beit himself, I should like to express once more our most grateful thanks, in your name and on my own account, and, may I add, in the name of the hospitals and of the countless sufferers who will benefit.

Before our business ends this morning, we shall have a statement from Lord Donoughmore on the present position of the Thank-offering Fund. As President of the King's Fund, I have watched its progress from week to week with the deepest interest. I took an early opportunity of expressing in person to "Audax" my appreciation of the magnificent gift with which he inaugurated the appeal on behalf of the King's Fund. The generosity of the British people is wonderful. The Lord Mayor's Fund for the Miners (a cause in which I was very specially interested) had hardly been closed, when the money wanted for the Radium side of the Thank-offering Fund was found, in the course of a single week, leaving the field free for a continuance of the gift to the King's Fund. As the Wells' legacies distribution has shown, the King's Fund, with its knowledge of all the special needs of the hospitals of London, can make very good use of any sum that may become available for similar purposes as the result of the Appeal.

I have now some personal matters to mention. Uppermost in our minds at this Meeting is the great loss we have suffered in the sudden death of Lord Revelstoke, our Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee. Only those behind the scenes can realise how much his skill and care in the management of its finances has meant to the King's Fund during the last twenty-two years. His interest in the Fund, and his confidence in its future, have again been shown by his munificent legacy of f100,000 to be added to capital. His loss leaves a gap which is not easily filled. But I have been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. E. R. Peacock. We thus retain the connection with the firm of Barings, who have for many years, through the kind offices of Lord Revelstoke, supplied us with the assistance of an expert staff in all our financial business. The death of Lord Hambleden was a severe loss to the King's Fund and to the whole hospital world. He had the great gift of combining loyalty to his own hospital with untiring devotion to the cause of hospitals generally, in connection with the King's Fund, the British Hospitals Association and the Hospital Saving Association, and in many other ways. At the time of his death he was Chairman of the Pay Beds Committee, and had actually begun the preparation of its report. Lord Finlay had been a member of the Council since 1921. Sir George Frampton, Sir Nestor Tirard, and Mr. Acton Davis had been visitors for many years. Besides Mr. Peacock, we welcome Lord Dawson of Penn as a new member of the Council. In February last I appointed Sir George Lawson Johnston as an additional Honorary Secretary. The extra work in connection with the Thank-offering Fund has kept him very busy indeed. Mr. H. Saxe Wyndham has been appointed to the Propaganda Committee.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to move the adoption of the Accounts for 1928. I only want to say one thing about them myself: and that is how greatly we are indebted to the three donors who each gave us £10,000: Mr. J. J. Crosfield and the two anonymous contributors. One of these last is a very good friend, whose donations in successive years now amount to a total of no less than £44,500.

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ACCOUNTS FOR 1928.

Mr. E. R. Peacock (the Honorary Treasurer) in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1928, said:—

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen-

Before referring to the accounts I should like to express my appreciation of the confidence which Your Royal Highness has shown by appointing me to serve as Treasurer of King Edward's Hospital Fund. In carrying out my duties I shall endeavour to maintain the standards established by your late Treasurer, to whom the welfare of the Fund was a matter of constant care. In his statement at the December Meeting, the late Lord Revelstoke explained the circumstances in which the Council had decided in November to increase the ordinary distribution to £250,000. The estimated income for the year, less expenses, was just enough to justify a distribution of that amount, if receipts from General Fund legacies were taken into account at about £19,000, the average for the previous five years. The accounts that are now before us show that the actual receipts from legacies for the year amounted to nearly £69,000. Of this, £31,000 came in after the total of the distribution was fixed in November. As the legacies in 1927 were only £15,000, it is clear that the legacies of 1928 must be regarded as exceptional, and dealt with accordingly. In the accounts as passed by the Management Committee these exceptional receipts have been allocated as follows. As I have already indicated, part has been applied to raising the ordinary distribution to £250,000. A sum of £9,452 has been used to provide the first year's instalments of the special grants promised by the King's Fund towards the expenditure of Hospitals on the new Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, including a contribution to the initial expenses of the Central Council of the Scheme. These grants are limited to 25 per cent. of the expenditure or £20,000 a year, whichever is the smaller, during the next seven years. A further amount of £20,000 has been carried to a suspense account to provide for the maximum liability for this purpose next year. The balance is carried forward and will be available for future use. These figures refer only to general fund legacies. They do not include the balance of the Wells' legacies, which are made the subject of a special distribution. Nor do they include legacies to capital, such as the bequest of Miss Elizabeth Marshall, which has been added, in accordance with the directions in her Will, to the Family Fund known as the Marshall Fund, established by her brother, Mr. H. W. Marshall, in 1927. Since the end of the year Mr. Marshall has himself made a further addition to this Family Fund by a very generous gift of £13,000 Japanese 4 per cent. Bonds. The Balance Sheet shows that the market values of the investments on December 31 last exceeded the book values by 4 per cent. For this successful result the Council is indebted to the able conduct of its affairs by my predecessor, the late Lord Revelstoke, and the Finance Committee over which he presided for fourteen years: a period which included all the difficulties arising out of the War. Lord Revelstoke gave a further evidence of his interest in maintaining the stability of the Fund by his munificent bequest of £100,000 to be applied to the augmentation of its capital. I now have the honour to move the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the Governor of the Bank of England (The Rt. Hon. M. C. NORMAN), was then put and carried unanimously.

Annual Report for 1928.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of Donoughmore) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1928 (see pages 5 to 13), and Lord Kylsant having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted.

ALLOCATION OF SIR OTTO BEIT'S GIFT OF RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented a Report of the Committee on the allocation to Hospitals of Radium purchased with the gift of Sir Otto Beit, including the list of Hospitals selected and the amounts of Radium loaned to each, and moved that the allocation be approved (see note on page 52).

The recommendation was seconded by the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir John Rose Bradford) and carried unanimously.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Sir George Lawson Johnston) presented the Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-committee, and moved the recommendation that it be published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for the year 1928 (see pages 55 to 57). The motion, having been seconded by Lord Ebbisham, was then put and carried.

ACCOUNTS FOR SMALL HOSPITALS.

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The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (Mr. Leonard Cohen) presented a report on the issue of the book on Accounts for Small Hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the report be published (see page 58).

Lady Ampthill having seconded the recommendation, the motion was put and carried.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS AND THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT.

The Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee, in presenting an interim report of the Committee (see note on page 54), said:

It is interesting to note that the first stage of the work of the Committee met with complete success, and it is registered in the Local Government Act in Section 13. That Section, in the first place, gives full recognition to the position of the voluntary Hospitals, not only in London but all over the country, in the future national service of Hospitals. But it represents more than recognition. It implies a call to the voluntary Hospitals throughout the country to take their place and their part in the great work of the service for the sick and suffering. The second stage is the bringing into existence of bodies all over the country representative of the voluntary Hospitals, which can take up the duties which are indicated in Section 13 of the Act. With regard to London, I am glad to say that very substantial progress has already been made. Under the Chairmanship of Sir Cooper Perry, a representative preliminary committee has been appointed and is doing active work, ready when called upon to meet and consult with the London County Council with regard to the arrangements for London. As to the work in the provinces, your Committee thought it right to act throughout through the medium of the British Hospitals Association, and particularly in concert with Sir Arthur Stanley, President of that Association. I should like to take the opportunity of impressing upon all those who are interested in the voluntary Hospital movement in the country the urgent necessity of taking action without delay. I understand that in some ten out of the twenty areas represented by the Regional Committees of the British Hospitals Association action has already been taken; but with regard to the balance, I am without information. I would like to suggest that where no action hitherto has been taken the chairman of the largest Hospital in each of the new Local Government areas should feel a personal responsibility in this matter. The suggestion made by your

Committee is that, in every area corresponding with the counties and county boroughs under the Act, there should be a council representative of all the voluntary Hospitals, large and small, within that area; and that that council should be the body to select the representative committee or subcommittee which will carry on negotiations with the county authorities. It seems to us that it would be desirable that, where there is any delay in action, the chairman of the largest Hospital in each of those areas should take it upon himself to convene the first representative meeting, so that action could be taken. If that could be done in the present month, or at least before August, it would have the great advantage that there would be over the whole country representative bodies ready for work. I must point out that there is a danger that the valuable intentions of Section 13 of the Act might be lost in the absence of such action. The county authorities are called upon to consult with the representatives of the voluntary Hospitals. But if in any area there has been a failure to set up any committee or council for that purpose, the county authority may feel itself justified in saying: "there is no such body with whom we can consult." Therefore I take the opportunity of impressing upon the representatives of voluntary Hospitals all over the country that there should be no delay in taking the necessary action. Your Royal Highness, I beg to move that the action taken by the Special Committee be approved.

The recommendation, having been seconded by Mr. George Roberts, was carried unanimously.

On the motion of Sir Edward Penton, seconded by Lord Mildmay, a resolution as to the custody of the keys of the Seal of the Fund was approved.

THANK-OFFERING FUND FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.

The Treasurer of the Thank-offering Fund (The Earl of Donoughmore) said he was happy to be able to announce the latest figure, £406,104. This did not include the £100,000 which had been given by His Majesty's Government in order to assist the radium part of the appeal, on a pound for pound basis. It could therefore be summed up by saying that, as the result of the appeal and the help of the Government, over half a million had been made available for the care of the sick. The amount required for radium was obtained in a week, but the needs of the Hospitals remained. The stream of generosity was still flowing. Satisfactory as this report was, much more satisfactory was the news of His Majesty's recovery. He asked His Royal Highness's permission to move the following resolution:—

That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to express their heartfelt thankfulness for the continued progress towards recovery of His Majesty the King, their past President and present Patron, and their fervent hope for his early restoration to full strength and activity.

The Chief Rabbi (The Very Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.) seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The Bishop of London, in moving a cordial vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for presiding, said it afforded him the greatest pleasure to see the Prince here in person in his usual health and spirits, especially as His Royal Highness had brought such excellent news of His Majesty.

The resolution was seconded by Sir William Collins, who said that, as one who had been associated with the King's Fund and the League of Mercy for thirty years, he would like to testify to the infinite advantage which had been brought to the Fund and the League by the association of the Royal Family with those bodies.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said:-

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen: I thank you once again for the Vote of Thanks that has been passed at the end of the meeting. I know His Majesty the King will very much appreciate the kind words used by Lord Donoughmore, and the way in which you received his resolution. His Royal Highness added that he proposed to invite the present Lord Revelstoke to serve on the Council.

The proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- 1. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £248,000, as against £245,000 last year.
- 2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 141, the same number as in 1927—Ormond Maternity Home having dropped out of the list, and an application having been received from Wembley Hospital, opened in June last.
- 3. The Committee are pleased to see, from the King's Fund Statistical Report, that the steady progress of the hospitals was resumed in 1927 after a slight interruption in 1926, the first since 1922. Each of the main sources of revenue—voluntary gifts, receipts on account of services rendered, income from investments and legacies—showed an increase. The combined result, for all the participating hospitals taken together, was a small excess of income over expenditure, although there were still 56 hospitals with deficits for the year, some of them serious.
- 4. These results are all the more gratifying because there was an increase of expenditure, due largely to the growth of hospital work. About 420 additional beds were opened in 1927, while it is expected that a further 550 will have been opened by the end of 1928. These additions have had to be taken into account by the King's Fund, and it was fortunate that an increased total amount available for distribution has enabled the Committee to recommend increased maintenance grants.
- 5. The increase in the grants recommended in aid of maintenance in 1928 is £5,325, the total out of the ordinary distribution being £216,775, as compared with £211,450 last year. The grants towards schemes of capital expenditure amount to £31,225, out of the ordinary distribution, as against £33,550 last year.
- 6. At the Annual Meeting in May last the Council approved a final list of grants, amounting to £30,750, out of the special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells. The details, together with the final report of the Distribution Committee, were published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for 1927. The Wells legacies amounted in all to £255,000. The whole of this has been allocated by the Council during the last four years to extensions, improvements and other special purposes.

- 7. The Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers came into operation on January 1, 1928. The King's Fund had promised special grants in aid, for seven years, up to 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the scheme, or £20,000 a year, whichever should be the smaller. The Fund also promised to take into account, within this limit and subject to certain conditions, expenditure on, or in providing for, supplementary pensions for back service of existing officers, and also expenditure on pensions to retired officers. The Distribution Committee were to consider on what bases, within the limits mentioned, these three headings, respectively, should be taken into account.
- 8. By the beginning of October, 89 hospitals had joined the scheme, and the present distribution includes special grants to these hospitals for about three-fourths of the first of the seven years. Taking into account all the three headings of expenditure mentioned, and also a grant of £1,000 towards the initial expenses of the Central Council of the Scheme, which would otherwise have had to be met by contributions from the hospitals, the total comes to £9,452. The aggregate amount of expenditure by the hospitals will be larger when all those that have already joined have been in the scheme for a full twelve months, and when more hospitals, and more nurses and officers at individual hospitals, have joined. It must not be assumed, therefore, that the King's Fund will be able to continue the grants in respect of each of the separate headings of expenditure at the same percentage as this year.
- 9. The total of the present distribution, taking into account ordinary maintenance grants, grants towards capital expenditure, and special pensions grants, is thus £257,452. If the final distribution out of the Wells legacies in May last is added, the grand total distributed to hospitals in 1928 is £288,202, besides £2,000 to convalescent homes. Of this £288,202, £226,227 represents grants to maintenance, and £61,975 grants to schemes of capital expenditure.
- 10. As stated by the Committee in their report last May, the schemes aided by the Wells grants will have provided, amongst other additions and improvements, 1,600 additional beds, of which 179 are to be reserved for accident cases. In answer to enquiries the Committee have explained that it is not intended that this number of beds should stand empty if and when they are not occupied by accident cases. The conditions attached by the Fund to the Wells grants will be satisfied if it is understood that no accident case requiring in-patient treatment will be turned away for want of a bed unless there are already the specified number of accident cases in the hospital. This means that, if at any time the hospital is full and yet there are not this number of accident cases, the hospital will have plans ready for moving a convalescent case, or putting up an extra bed or otherwise making room, in the event of an accident case being brought and requiring admission.
- II. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule:—

City of London Maternity Hospital, £500 to new nurses' accommodation. French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £4,000 to new nurses' home.

Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, £750 to extension of in-patient department.

Ilford Emergency Hospital, £1,000 to extension.

Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, £500 to extension of out-patient department.

Kensington, Fulham and Chelsea General Hospital, £2,500 to rebuilding and extension.

London Lock Hospital (Male), £1,500 to extension of out-patient department.

Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.

Nelson Hospital, £250 to provision of maternity block.

Oueen's Hospital for Children, £200 to additional nurses' accommodation.

Royal Northern Hospital, £500 to additional heating apparatus.

St. Peter's Hospital, £250 to extension.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed, and are recommending the Council accordingly.

- 12. The Distribution Committee again wish to thank the Revenue Committee and Hospital Economy Committee for having supplied them with reports and recommendations which have served as a basis for private remarks which the Distribution Committee suggest should be attached to the grants.
- 13. The late date at which the Annual Reports of some of the hospitals are received has caused considerable delay in the preparation of the Statistical Report and of material for the use of the Distribution Committee. The Fund asks that draft accounts may be submitted by March 31 so as to make sure that their form is in accordance with the Revised Uniform System. It asks that Annual Reports as finally printed may be received not later than April 30. In several cases where the reports have been late, the Distribution Committee are recommending the Council to draw attention to the fact in a private remark attached to the grant. The Committee trust that all Hospitals will realise the importance of this question, since delay on the part of a very few institutions may postpone until late in the year the preparation of statistics which are of great value to the individual hospitals and to the voluntary hospital system as a whole.
- 14. In many instances the Distribution Committee have followed their usual practice of recommending that extracts from the Visitors' Reports should be forwarded for the observations of the committee of management of the hospital concerned. They desire to express their thanks to the Visitors for all the trouble and care expended on the inspection of the hospitals and the preparation of the reports, which are of great assistance to the Committee at the Distribution.
 - 15. The list of grants is appended.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO CONVALESCENT HOMES NOT ATTACHED TO PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

- I. The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £2,000, being the same amount as last year.
- 2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 49, as compared with 45 last year.
- 3. In dealing with the applications the Committee have given special attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON THE REPORT OF PAY BEDS COMMITTEE.

- 1. The Report of the Pay Beds Committee was circulated to members of the General Council and to the Hospitals in July 1928, and was published for the consideration of all concerned.
- 2. The Report states that there were then 1,055 pay beds for the middle and professional classes at eighty Voluntary Hospitals in London. It contains a full list of these, with the weekly charges and a summary of various other particulars. The charges, it appears, are usually round about four, five or six guineas a week, exclusive of certain extras and of surgical fees, though, at either end of the scale, there are a few beds for the well-to-do and some for those in straitened circumstances.
- 3. The Report also discusses the nature of the accommodation, the arrangements for medical attendance, the demand for additional pay beds and the methods of increasing the accommodation and of providing for cost of maintenance and building, estimates of which are given.
- 4. The Pay Beds Committee concluded their Report by expressing the following opinions, viz. :—
 - "We consider that the existing provision of 1,055 pay beds has proved to be a very valuable addition to the Voluntary Hospital service of London; that a material extension of this provision is urgently required to meet the existing demand; and that the organisation of a mutual insurance scheme to assist persons of moderate means to meet the cost of maintenance and medical fees is strongly to be recommended" (par. 174, xvii).
 - "We believe that an extension of the pay bed system at the Voluntary Hospitals, with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds, would be of advantage to the patients of all classes, to the individual Hospitals, and to the Voluntary Hospital system as a whole" (par. 174, xviii).
- 5. The Management Committee agree with these opinions and attach so much importance to the suggestion of an insurance scheme for the middle and professional classes that they

reproduce here the conclusions with which the Pay Beds Committee end their detailed study of this part of their subject viz.:—

- "That it is desirable that as many prospective pay bed patients as possible should be enabled to place themselves in a position in which they can pay the full cost of maintenance in a pay ward and a medical fee as well" (par. 172, viii).
- "That, to secure this, an effective mutual insurance scheme should be organised for assisting prospective pay bed patients to make provision in advance, as has been done for ordinary Hospital patients by contributory schemes like the Hospital Saving Association, and for middle class patients, on a small scale as yet, by schemes such as those of the British Provident Association and the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital" (par. 172, ix).
- "That it is desirable that, so far as London is concerned, an insurance scheme of this kind should, like the Hospital Saving Association, be organised by a central body working in co-operation with the individual Hospitals with pay beds" (par. 172, x).
- "That full consideration should be given to the suggestion that a scheme of subscription to the capital cost of providing pay bed accommodation might be associated with an insurance scheme covering maintenance charges" (par. 172, xi).
- "That the provision of a large capital sum for the building and equipment of pay beds for the use of those who cannot afford more than the cost of maintenance would be a form of assistance to the Voluntary Hospitals which might be commended to possible donors" (par. 172, xii).
- 6. After discussing the place which might be occupied in any comprehensive scheme by the separate pay hospital and the private nursing home, the Report bases its recommendation of an increase in pay beds and of an insurance scheme for the middle classes, in association with the Voluntary Hospitals, on the argument that—
 - "The present-day definition of the functions of the Voluntary Hospital system includes provision not only for the sick poor in the original sense of the term, but also, on suitable terms of payment, for all those who, while not coming within the definition of the necessitous poor, are unable to obtain without some such assistance the medical treatment they need" (par. 168).
- 7. The King's Fund has already accepted in practice the principle of pay beds, and the principle of insurance. For the King's Fund has often made grants to Voluntary Hospital

extension schemes which have included pay beds for this purpose as well as additional beds for ordinary Hospital patients.

- 8. It will be remembered, moreover, that the King's Fund took an active part in the foundation of the Hospital Saving Association, by means of which some 475,000 wage earners are already providing in advance, by a kind of voluntary insurance, enough to enable them to contribute substantially to the cost of their maintenance when in hospital.
- 9. The Management Committee, for the reasons quoted above, and for others set out at length in the Report, consider that, while the assistance of the Hospitals in providing treatment for ordinary Hospital patients is the primary function of the King's Fund, the Fund would be promoting the welfare of the Hospitals by encouraging (so far as this is within its power under its Act of Incorporation) the provision of a reasonable number of pay beds for persons of moderate means, and the establishment of an insurance scheme whereby as many as possible of such persons may place themselves in a position to pay for their cost.
- 10. The Management Committee accordingly recommend that the General Council should—
 - (i) express its concurrence in the general conclusions of the Report of the Pay Beds Committee, as quoted in paragraph 4 above;
 - (ii) express its general approval of the conclusions of the Pay Beds Committee on the subject of an insurance scheme for the middle and professional classes, quoted in paragraph 5 above;
 - (iii) commend the whole of the Report to the consideration of the Hospitals, the medical profession, and the members of the classes concerned;
 - (iv) express its thanks to the members of the Pay Beds Committee, Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Bernard Mallet, Mr. Warren Low, and Professor Winifred Cullis.

REPORT ON THE GIFT OF SIR OTTO BEIT FOR PURCHASE OF RADIUM.

1. The following letter from Sir Otto Beit to the Honorary Secretaries was received on November 28:—

49 Belgrave Square, S.W. 1. 27th November, 1928.

SIRS,

Recent personal observation has so greatly impressed me with the value of Radium as a remedial agent, and realising that the Hospitals of London, speaking generally, are not adequately supplied with this means of treatment, I have considered for some time how this deficiency could best be modified, and I have decided to offer a sum of approximately, but not less than, £50,000 (Fifty thousand pounds) as a gift to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to be used for the purchase of this substance, at such time and in such quantities as may be judged expedient. My wish is that the Distribution Committee of the Fund assisted, if necessary, by members of the medical profession co-opted ad hoc, shall decide upon the proportions and the manner in which my gift shall be applied by way of the loan of Radium to Hospitals selected by them within the area of the Fund's operations. In their selection of Hospitals I desire the Committee to have regard to competence of the staffing and equipment of their respective radiation departments, to an undertaking by the Hospitals to ensure the safe custody of the Radium loaned to them, and to insurance to its full value, with an approved Company. Finally, as for a number of years I have aimed at encouraging research in science and medicine, and the publication of the results so attained, for the common benefit—not unsuccessfully, I hope—I should like the Committee to endeavour to secure that the Hospitals thus to be provided on loan with Radium should be preferably those in which the cure of disease or the alleviation of suffering is associated with a keen interest in the furtherance of knowledge " for the relief of man's estate."

2. The following reply was sent by the Honorary Secretaries:-

 - "Delighted to learn of your magnificent gift of £50,000 to the King's Fund for purchase of radium, thus opening a new field of usefulness to the Fund and of substantial benefit to hospital patients.

- 4. All these have been published.
- 5. The Management Committee recommend that the General Council should pass the following resolutions:—
 - (a) that the best thanks of the General Council be tendered to Sir Otto Beit for his most generous gift of £50,000 for the purchase of radium, which will help to supply one of the most urgent needs of the hospitals of London at the present time. The Council have the greatest pleasure in passing the formal resolution required to empower the Distribution Committee to administer the gift in accordance with the wishes expressed by Sir Otto Beit,

(b) that, until the General Council shall otherwise direct, the Management Committee shall have the powers of the General Council with respect to the following matter, that is to say:—

the utilisation of the gift of Sir Otto Beit so far as regards the purchase of radium, at such times and in such quantities as the Management Committee may judge expedient, and the arrangements as to the custody of any part of it while not on loan to a hospital;

And such powers are hereby delegated to them.

(c) that, until the General Council shall otherwise direct, the Distribution Committee shall have the powers of the General Council with respect to the following matter, that is to say:—

the administration of the gift of Sir Otto Beit, so far as regards the application of radium purchased with the gift by way of loan to hospitals, in accordance with the conditions set out in his letter of November 27, 1928;

And such powers are hereby delegated to them.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON THE POSITION OF THE VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS UNDER THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BILL.

- 1. Under the Local Government Bill the Poor Law Infirmaries and other rate-supported institutions for the sick will be transferred to the County Councils. It will be the concern of all those who value the Voluntary Hospital system to see that, in the changes that result from this transfer, the Hospital service of the community does not lose those special features which, in this country, are contributed by the Voluntary Hospitals, and which depend on the maintenance at those Hospitals of voluntary management and voluntary finance.
- 2. If this is to be secured, the place of the Voluntary Hospitals in relation to the new organisation of the rate-supported hospitals must be safeguarded. The question of the best method of doing this will have to be considered by the King's Fund, both while the Bill is before Parliament and, subsequently, during the preparation of schemes by the London County Council, and by the Councils of the Counties and County Boroughs, any part of whose areas lies within eleven miles of St. Paul's, or even within the Metropolitan Police District. The Management Committee considered it desirable that for this purpose a Special Committee of the King's Fund should be appointed.
- 3. The President's Powers Committee, having considered this proposal, have constituted a Special Committee to be called the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee, and have appointed the following to be members thereof:—

4. It will be necessary for the Council to delegate powers to the Special Committee, and the Management Committee accordingly recommend that the Council should pass the following resolutions, viz.:—

That, until the General Council shall otherwise direct, the Voluntary Hospitals (Local Government Bill) Committee shall have the powers of the General Council with respect to the following matters, that is to say:—

- (a) to consider what steps should be taken to secure that during the consideration of the Local Government Bill by Parliament every endeavour should be made to maintain the existence of the Voluntary Hospitals as an essential part of the Hospital system after the transfer of the Poor Law Infirmaries;
- (b) to consider what subsequent steps should be taken with the same object in relation to schemes which will come into operation after the passing of the Bill;
- (c) to make inquiries and collect information for the assistance of the Committee in the exercise of the foregoing powers;
- (d) to confer with other parties concerned;
- (e) to report from time to time to the General Council and, between the meetings of the General Council, to the Management Committee; and, with the concurrence of either body, to publish statements.

And such powers are hereby delegated to them.

A memorandum on the "Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Bill" was published in March 1929 (Memorandum, K.F. 14/29: see page 99).

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

In presenting the following Report, the Revenue Committee would point out that the work of the Propaganda Committee, in aid of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals generally, is of increasing importance at the present moment. The future, not only of the Voluntary Hospitals, but also of the rate-supported hospitals that will now come under the County authorities depends largely on the extent to which the public recognise the value of the voluntary element in the hospital service of this country, and the influence for good which it exercises on all other branches of that service.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1928.

- I. The Propaganda Committee have become more and more convinced, as their work continues, of the necessity of spreading as widely as possible information regarding the wonderful achievements of medical science which are taking place in our voluntary hospitals to-day. They feel sure that if the public realised more fully what is actually being accomplished in the hospitals, the volume of support would be substantially increased.
- 2. In their efforts in this direction the Committee are glad to record the assistance they have received from the Press, the British Broadcasting Corporation, the Film Industry, the various speakers, both medical and lay, who have given illustrated lectures on the work of the hospitals, and the many other agencies who have helped to give publicity to their various revenue producing undertakings.
- 3. It has been the aim of the Committee to make the work of the hospitals equally known and appreciated by all classes of the community.
 - 4. The principal activities of the Committee in 1928 were :-
 - (a) Wireless Talk by the Lord Chancellor, Lord Hailsham, in connection with "The Week's Good Cause" series, by arrangement with the British Broadcasting Corporation;
 - (b) Organisation of King's Fund Car in the Lord Mayor's Show to illustrate the development of medical science and treatment in the Voluntary Hospitals;
 - (c) Series of Popular Talks by distinguished travellers and scientists on "Exploration, Science and Invention";

- (d) Series of "Biographical Duets," at the London School of Economics, being a variation from the "Lectures and Counter-Lectures" held in previous years. Many persons eminent in the fields of literature and drama took part in this programme;
- (e) Specially conducted visits to "Representative Factories which make possible some of the Amenities of Modern Life";
- (f) Similar visits to the Tower of London, under the guidance of Mr. Walter Bell, F.S.A., F.R.A.S.;
- (g) Drawing Room Meetings at 29, Portman Square, by kind invitation of Lady Lawson Johnston, at which reminiscent talks were given by Sir Oliver Lodge and Lady Frances Balfour;
- (h) Display of Hospitals Film in a number of cinema theatres in co-operation with the Hospital Saving Association; also at the Imperial Institute and the Schoolboys' Own Exhibition;
- (j) Illustrated lectures to some 30-40 schools, training colleges, etc., on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals;
- (k) Collection of material for set of lantern slides on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals at the request of the London County Council, for inclusion in their catalogue for the use of schools;
- (m) Issue of new leaflet, entitled, "Our Voluntary Hospitals: Their Value to the Nation," as useful propaganda in view of impending legislation, 37 Hospitals having made use of over 22,000 copies;
- (n) Exhibit of graphs, illustrating the work of the London Voluntary Hospitals and of the King's Fund, at the International Welfare Fortnight held in Paris.
- 5. The receipts which have resulted during the year from the Committee's various activities, including £717 5s. 1d. from the Week's Good Cause appeal, have amounted to £1,435. The expenses, including the cost of the car in the Lord Mayor's Show, came to £292 8s. 10d., the net receipts being thus £1,142 17s. 2d. This by no means represents the full value even of this side of the Committee's work. All the functions are used as opportunities for propaganda. For example, the programmes alone, of which many thousands are issued, all contain brief statements about the value of the voluntary hospitals and the work of the King's Fund.
- 6. Through the activities of the Propaganda Committee, the interest of the British Broadcasting Corporation in the King's Fund has steadily increased, and has shown itself in many ways, apart from the facilities given for the special appeal in connection with "The Week's Good Cause."
- 7. The Hospital Saving Association report that excellent results are being obtained by the showing of the Hospitals Film in conjunction with their general propaganda work, both in its educational effect and in the stimulus which it gives to the extension of the contributory

principles for which the Association stands. This is particularly gratifying in view of the part taken by the King's Fund in connection with the founding of the Association.

- 8. In the absence of Lord Burnham in India, Sir George Lawson Johnston has taken his place as Acting Chairman, and the Committee are greatly indebted to him for the help he has given them in this capacity.
- 9. The Committee arranged three Conferences of Hospital Secretaries in March, June and October, to discuss how the Propaganda Committee could be of further use to the hospitals. Various suggestions were made at these conferences, and a resolution passed, "That a meeting of hospital secretaries and workers be held occasionally for the purpose of discussing with the King's Fund's representatives how the Propaganda Committee can best help the hospitals by propaganda work."
- ro. Information was collected regarding hospital accommodation for the professional and middle classes in other countries, and supplied to the Pay Beds Committee, who incorporated it in their Report as Appendix IX.
- II. At the request of the Committee, and with their assistance, the Charity Organisation Society convened a meeting at Denison House on February 13 to discuss relations between the Voluntary Hospitals and the Public Authorities, in view of the changes which might be expected to follow from the transfer of the Poor Law hospitals to the County Authorities. The Chair was taken by Lord Dawson of Penn. The meeting was attended by representatives of the London County Council, Boards of Guardians, and the Voluntary Hospitals. The desirability of friendly co-operation was emphasised in the discussion which took place, the Chairman laying stress on the importance of the King's Fund as a co-ordinating agency.
- 12. Various new schemes were also considered by the Committee during the year, and it is hoped that some of these may come to fruition in 1929.

HOSPITAL ECONOMY COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON PUBLICATION OF ACCOUNTS FOR SMALL HOSPITALS, 1928.

- I. A revised edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts was issued by the Hospital Economy Committee in 1926. It was always intended to follow this up by the issue of a less detailed publication for the use of small Hospitals administered by Honorary Officials without clerical assistance.
 - 2. This was issued in December last under the title "Accounts for Small Hospitals."
- 3. When the time came to draw up this simpler work, a consideration of the circumstances of those whom it was desired to help led to the conclusion that the object to be served would be best attained, not by merely stripping the Revised Uniform System of some of its details, but by preparing a system of accounts for small hospitals which, while following the principles of the Revised Uniform System, would be within the powers of those inexperienced in accounting.
- 4. With this end in view the booklet explains the functions of an Income and Expenditure Account and of a Balance Sheet, and shows why a cash statement is an unsuitable form of account; this is done in such a simple way that the reader is led almost insensibly to an understanding of proper Hospital Accounts, and at the same time has acquired a knowledge of the outlines of the Revised Uniform System which will render the transition to the full system a very easy matter if the hospital subsequently becomes large enough to make this desirable.
- 5. The book, which has involved much skilled work on the part of Mr. Hugh Macrae, C.A., head of the Economy Department of the King's Fund, has been very favourably received and reviewed, and enquiries for it have come from places as far distant as South Africa, Egypt, Singapore, and the United States.

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



King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council. (Page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within II miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund), or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to King Edward's Hospital Fund (G.P.O. Box 465A), 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-two years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £6,109,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922–3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption, Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1928 being £250,000, besides £30,750, in aid of hospital extensions and improvements, out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, and £9,452 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged f_{I} IIs. 2d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over $3\frac{3}{4}d$. in every f_{I} received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £432,000 to the Fund during the last thirty years, the contribution in 1928 being £17,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of Annual Statistics showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following pages). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, the Out-patient Question, the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Quantity Statistics, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act.

The Fund has been entrusted by Sir Otto Beit with £50,000 worth of Radium for loan to Hospitals.

A pamphlet has been published containing a list of 1,154 pay beds at 88 London Hospitals. From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and

economically employed.
