

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1935.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF THE YEAR.

- 1. In 1935 the King's Fund made two distributions: the ordinary distribution, which again was £300,000; and a special distribution of £120,000 in commemoration of the Silver Jubilee of His Majesty King George V. The total for the year, after including £5,000 special grants towards expenditure on the pension scheme, was thus £425,000.
- 2. The ordinary distribution, for the first time since it was increased from £275,000 to £300,000 in 1932, was not fully covered by the income, and there was a deficit for the year of £7,000.
- 3. Of the Silver Jubilee distribution, £11,000 was provided out of the sale of seats placed at the disposal of the King's Fund by H.M. Office of Works at two Jubilee processions, and the other £109,000 out of unexpended margins of income over distribution and expenses during previous years. The resulting total of £120,000 was devoted to helping the Hospitals to carry out building improvements and extensions which had fallen into arrear since the national crisis of 1931. A larger proportion of the ordinary distribution could therefore be allocated in grants to Hospitals with maintenance deficits.
- 4. Among the Hospitals themselves the financial results of 1935 resembled those of each previous year since 1931. There have been maintenance deficits, some of them serious. There have been a still larger number of surpluses. In spite of an increased number of beds, there was a small net aggregate surplus. But, even at many of the Hospitals with surpluses, there was not a sufficient margin for necessary expenditure on upkeep of buildings and on improvements and extensions, though large sums have been collected for some of these purposes and many new schemes have now been put in hand.

5. By its two distributions the King's Fund was thus able to give the Hospitals special assistance towards their two principal needs, more money for maintenance and more money for capital expenditure.

KING'S FUND RECEIPTS.

- 6. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1935, including general income, contributions earmarked for capital account, and receipts for special purposes, amounted to £335,528 15s. 2d.

while general legacies amounted to £59,741 6s. 9d, making, with £14,282 6s. 3d. from the sale of seats at the Silver Jubilee processions (mainly allocated to the Silver Jubilee Distribution, but partly to the Ordinary Distribution) a total of £320,508 4s. 11d. The total receipts earmarked for capital account were £916 os. 6d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher, Bt.; and receipts on account of income for various special purposes amounted to £14,104 9s. 9d.

- 8. The principal changes in income which resulted in the deficit of £6,928 were decreases of £17,500 in general legacies, which nevertheless still amounted, for the eighth successive year, to more than £58,000; of £5,000 in the contribution of the League of Mercy, which had been increased by special receipts during the last few years; and of £3,500 in the amount received during the year from the British Charities Association. On the other hand, the income included £3,282 out of the proceeds of the sale of Jubilee seats and a most generous and timely gift of £15,000 from an anonymous donor who has now given £78,500 in nine separate donations during the past thirteen years.
- 9. A permanent increase in the income is therefore required if the distribution is to be maintained at the total to which it was raised in 1932, especially as the yield from investments is now growing less because of the fall in the value of money, and will also be reduced

because part of the reserve has been used for the Silver Jubilee distribution. Moreover, the Fund has undertaken to add to its distribution a further £2,000 a year towards the cost of District Nursing work for Hospital out-patients.

THE ORDINARY AND SILVER JUBILEE DISTRIBUTIONS.

10. The analysis of the ordinary and Silver Jubilee distribution in the year 1935 as compared with the ordinary distribution in 1934 is as follows:—

- 12. The grants of £5,000 in aid of the Hospital expenditure under the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers cover the final three months of the initial period of seven years during which the King's Fund had promised assistance up to £20,000 a year. The total amount contributed by the King's Fund has been £123,967. The expenditure, which consists mostly of insurance premiums to provide for future pensions, has now become part of normal Hospital expenditure; and the increased maintenance grants rendered possible in 1935 by the Silver Jubilee distribution helped to compensate the Hospitals for the termination of the Fund's temporary grants of £20,000 a year. By December 31 the Federated scheme, which resulted from an inquiry held by the King's Fund under the chairmanship of the late Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, had been adopted by Hospitals representing 88 per cent. of the beds in London and 73 per cent. in Great Britain as a whole, and also by several institutions in the Dominions and abroad.
- 13. The Silver Jubilee distribution consisted, like the distribution of the Thank-offering Fund in 1929, of a considerable number of grants towards building schemes of the ordinary type, and a few large grants towards schemes of exceptional magnitude and importance, such as the complete rebuilding or reconstruction of a Hospital. The number of grants was 76, of which 46 were made towards schemes which included additional beds for in-patients. All the schemes to which substantial grants were made had, as usual, been examined by subcommittees of the Distribution Committee, who had visited the Hospitals for the purpose.
- 14. The reports by the Visitors, medical and lay, who inspect the Hospitals applying for grants, have again proved of great value. A revised form of report, with a note-book for use on the visits, containing a new list of points for consideration, has been prepared by a special sub-committee of the Distribution Committee.
- 15. The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals and Convalescent Homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,193,417. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £8,446,271 has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

- 16. His late Majesty King George V, Patron of the Fund for nearly 26 years and previously President for 9 years, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. His Majesty King Edward, as Prince of Wales and President for nearly 17 years, and Her Majesty Queen Mary, were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, the Duke of Kent, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.
- 17. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,548 7s. 8d. from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers and Company, Ltd., £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company, and £1,000 from "M. M." Other contributions included annual subscriptions of £625 from Lloyds Bank Ltd.; of £516 2s. 6d. from "W. C. W."; of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; and of £322 11s. 7d. from Mr. Philip Fleming; and donations of £1,000 from Mr. W. A. Posnett; of £525 from Viscount Wakefield; of £500 from the Goldsmiths' Company and "J. R. B."; and of £300 from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust and from "S. D. R. S. D." The Fund also received, besides the anonymous donation of £15,000 already mentioned, two of £1,000, two of £500 and one of £425.
- 18. The Fund received a second very generous gift of £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, who gave £10,000 in 1929 to add to the Fund's stock of radium loaned to Hospitals. Mr. Parr's present donation is being used to facilitate various schemes for increasing the usefulness of this radium.
- 19. The contribution of the League of Mercy was £15,000, and for this sum the Council is very grateful. The Council realise that this amount is collected mainly in small subscriptions, and they much appreciate the time and energy given by the members of the League. This brings the League's total contributions up to £559,000 since its foundation in 1899.
- 20. The sum of £1,500 was received from the British Charities Association for distribution among London Hospitals. The total amount contributed by the Association for this purpose since 1924 is now £101,500.
- 21. Legacies received during the year included the following: Mr. John Arnsby Atkin, £19,400 12s. 11d., further on account of residue (making a total of £24,400 12s. 11d. received to date); Mrs. Mary Young, £17,095 on account; Mrs. Paulina Bernhardina Schnaidt, £6,103 2s. od., on account of residue; Mr. Henry Eskell David, £5,000; Mr. David Levy, £3,420 7s. 4d., on account of residue; Mr. Leonard William Jennings, £2,000, on

account of residue; Commander Francis William Chaine, £1,572 16s. 1d., further on account of share of residue (making a total of £9,918 1s. 2d. received to date); Sir John Reeves Ellerman, Bt., £1,387 3s. od.; Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., £916 os. 6d., further on account of one-twelfth share of residue left to capital (making a total sum of £365,709 15s. 4d. received to date, in addition to a legacy of £25,000 for general purposes received in 1913); Mrs. Jessie Ashton, £512, further on account of share of residue (making a total of £35,833 15s. 11d. received to date); Mr. Percy Morris, £473 7s. 6d., further on account of residue (making a total of £23,380 5s. od. received to date); Mrs. Mary A. C. Laffan, £213 1s. 2d., further on account of share of residue (making a total of £1,113 1s. 2d. received to date), and Mr. Gustav Boringer, £150, further on account of residue (making a total of £6,150 received to date).

- 22. The Council are very grateful to the Trustees of the estate of the late Mr. Edward Clark for a further gift of £1,000 to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers (making a total of £7,000 received to date).
- 23. The Council desire to emphasise that the correct title of the Fund is "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London." This title should always be used in full in bequests intended for the Fund.
- 24. The Council are greatly indebted to H.M. Office of Works for having placed at the disposal of the Fund several thousands of seats at two of the Jubilee processions. The success of the arrangements was largely due to Sir Patrick Duff and the staff of the Department who helped in numerous ways, and to the British Charities Association which, under its Chairman Lord Luke and its Secretary Mr. Hugh Macrae, was responsible for the details, and for the sale of the seats at a profit of £14,282 6s. 3d.

EXPENSES.

25. Expenses during the year, covering all the widespread activities of the King's Fund, amounted to £15,936 7s. 5d.

SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION FOR THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

26. Early in the year the Bank of England asked the King's Fund to deal on their behalf with appeals which they might receive from London Hospitals and might forward to the Fund for the purpose. The Bank now make to the Fund an annual payment which is an increase over the amount which they had previously given for London Hospitals. This payment includes

their annual subscription towards the Fund's ordinary distribution and certain annual amounts to be continued by the Fund to four Hospitals, the balance to be allocated at the discretion of the Fund. In December the Council, acting in accordance with the previous practice of the Bank, made substantial donations to three of the building schemes for which appeals had been made to the Bank.

27. The Council greatly appreciate the confidence thus shown by the Bank of England in the King's Fund as a central distributing body, and they would be pleased to undertake the allocation of funds for other donors, either under similar schemes or as contributions to the ordinary distribution.

OTHER SPECIAL TRUSTS.

28. The following payments were made out of trust funds for special purposes outside the ordinary distribution, viz., £939 18s. 2d. to the Miller Hospital in reduction of the building debt, out of the special trust gift received in 1930; and £4,568 9s. 2d. to the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital towards the extension of the out-patient department, being the balance of the special trust gift received in 1931. The latter grant was conditional on the Hospital raising in new money the balance needed for the same object, and this condition was fulfilled. The Fund also paid £796 10s. 6d. to the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, under the will of the late Sir John Young, towards the maintenance of the Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home, bequeathed to the King's Fund and used and managed by the Hospital in accordance with the terms of the will.

DISTRIBUTION IN AID OF DISTRICT NURSING WORK FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS.

- 29. Preparations were made during the year for the special distribution of £2,000 for the assistance, through the hospitals, of District Nursing work in relief of out-patient departments. Records were kept from January 1st of the attendances by District Nurses on out-patients referred to them by Hospitals.
- 30. As the result of experience gained during the first half of the year, it was decided that the distribution should be deferred till early in 1936, and that it should cover the whole of 1935. Various ways of simplifying the procedure were also adopted, without any departure from the principles adopted by the Council, which were that the distribution should be made through the Hospitals, and that the assistance should be given in such a way as to encourage the reference of suitable minor cases from Hospital out-patient departments to District Nursing Associations. The distribution thus helps to carry out one of the recommendations of the Out-patient Committee of 1932.*
- 31. The Council greatly appreciate the help given by the Hospital almoners, the Central Council for District Nursing in London, and the various District Nursing Associations.

TIME-SAVING IN OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENTS.

- 32. In continuation of their work on other recommendations of the Out-patient Report, the Out-patient Arrangements Committee completed in February their memorandum on "Time-Saving Methods in Hospital Out-patient Dispensaries," where patients get their medicine before leaving. They thus placed at the disposal of the Hospitals all the available information on different methods, with suggestions, under such heads as peak loads or rush hours, complicated prescriptions, internal dispensary lay-out and administration, single or double hatches, queues, seating, counts of time taken, and various minor matters. It is hoped that further reduction in out-patient waiting will result from the study of this information by the Hospitals.
- 33. Meantime the Committee have decided to investigate the Registration stage of outpatient procedure, which occurs at or soon after the arrival of the patients.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

- 34. Several new developments are taking place in connection with the 10 grammes of radium which were purchased by the King's Fund out of the gift of Sir Otto Beit and subsequent receipts from the Thank-offering Fund and from Mr. Roger Parr, and which at the beginning of the year were on loan to 24 Hospitals.
- 35. These developments will be greatly assisted by the second gift of £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, to which reference has already been made.
- 36. The plans mentioned in the last Report, for visits to the Hospitals by physicists experienced in the best methods of safeguarding the radium and the hospital staffs, were duly carried out. Their reports were communicated privately to the Hospitals concerned.
- 37. Further action has also been taken to secure that all Hospitals holding King's Fund radium should keep follow-up records of patients in the forms prescribed by the National Radium Commission, so that, as far as possible, the whole of the experience of the use of radium at Hospitals may be made available for the systematic extension of medical knowledge.
- 38. Fresh steps have also been taken to obtain the best service from the Fund's radium. The records showed that at a few of the Hospitals there were not enough suitable patients for its maximum employment. The Fund decided that with part of the radium at these Hospitals a central radium pool should be created from which their normal needs could be supplied by temporary loans, and that the rest should be transferred to some Hospital where a larger stock of radium was needed for certain methods of treatment now under trial. The principle of a central radium pool under the control of the Fund can easily be extended if this is found to be desirable.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

- 39. The Propaganda Committee have continued to use every possible means of arousing and maintaining interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals, and a sense of the claim the Hospitals have on all who may benefit, directly or indirectly, by the services they render. Illustrated lectures to audiences of varying types, and the circulation of the King's Fund Film, "A Century of Hospital Progress," have helped to accomplish this object. Visits by parties of older school children to some of the leading Hospitals in London have also been arranged. The Miniature Hospital has been on view throughout the year, and has been included among subjects for educational visits recommended by the London County Council. Many thousands visited the King's Fund stand at the Ideal Home Exhibition, and literature was widely distributed. The several functions organised by the Committee, such as the Mock Trials and Specially Conducted Tours, have been the means of securing much valuable publicity for the Fund, as well as for the Hospitals.
- 40. The Council desire to record once more their indebtedness to the Press for help given in stimulating interest in the Hospitals and the King's Fund, and emphasising their claim to public support.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS (PAYING PATIENTS) BILL.

41. The Bill, promoted by the King's Fund with the co-operation of the British Hospitals Association, to give power to provide pay beds at Hospitals whose original trusts were settled before this need was foreseen, was introduced by Lord Luke in the House of Lords in February. The Bill as drafted gave the Charity Commissioners power to sanction pay bed schemes, provided that the accommodation that would otherwise be available for the sick poor in the original sense would not be diminished or restricted. Various amendments, mainly designed to give additional protection to funds and property held under existing trusts, were made on the motion of the Government, and the Bill passed the Lords in June. Owing to the early closing of the Autumn session it failed to pass the Commons, and it was re-introduced in the House of Lords in its amended form by Lord Luke in December.*

CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES.

42. In response to a request received from a body of Trustees, who kindly contributed £50 towards the cost of the investigation, the King's Fund inquired into the need for additional convalescent accommodation for children in London Hospitals. The results show that, among those recommended for convalescent treatment, there is a shortage of accommodation for all special types of case requiring skilled nursing or medical supervision, and also for boys between twelve and sixteen and for children under five. It also appears that more cases of other kinds would be recommended if ampler funds and accommodation were available.

43. The opinion of the King's Fund was also asked by the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, set up under Section 13 of the Local Government Act, 1929, for consultations with the London County Council, and by the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association, on a proposal to amalgamate the two Committees. The Fund welcomed the establishment of a single Committee of the kind suggested. The amalgamated Committee, known as the Voluntary Hospitals Committee, County of London, was formed in July; and the King's Fund is lending staff to the new Committee as it did to the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee.

PERSONAL.

- 44. At the Annual Meeting of the General Council on May 28th, 1935, to adopt the Report and Accounts for 1934, His present Majesty, then Prince of Wales, read a resolution of congratulation which, as President of the Fund, he had forwarded to His Majesty King George V on the occasion of his Silver Jubilee, and also a gracious reply which had been received. These are printed, as part of the proceedings at that meeting, in the Annual Report of the Fund for 1934.
- 45. In February His Royal Highness did the members of the Committees of the King's Fund (other than those serving on the Council), the Visitors, and the other principal officers, with their wives, the special honour of inviting them to an afternoon party at St. James's Palace. A very large number of guests deeply appreciated His Royal Highness's hospitality.
- 46. Early in the year the Council suffered a severe loss by the death of three members who were also Honorary Officers. Mr. J. H. Whitley was Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee. Sir John Rose Bradford had for many years been a member of the Distribution Committee and the Parliamentary Committee, had served on three Special Committees of Inquiry, and was Chairman of the Out-patient Arrangements Committee. Lord Somerleyton had been an Honorary Secretary ever since the foundation of the Fund by King Edward VII in 1897, and was Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee. He had been actively associated with the whole of the work of the Fund, and his death was a personal grief to all his colleagues and to every member of the staff. Resolutions passed at the time are printed in the Report for 1934 among the proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the Council.
- 47. The Council regret to record the deaths during the year of two other members, Cardinal Bourne and Lord Doverdale, and of two Visitors, Dr. James Collier and Dr. Theodore Thompson. They have further to express their regret at the resignations from the Council of Viscount Iveagh and Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson.

- 48. Sir Leonard Cohen resigned the Chairmanship of the Hospital Economy Committee in December after fourteen years' service, but happily he will continue to serve as an Honorary Secretary and as a member of the Council and of the various Committees.
- 49. The Council are sorry to have lost the services of Mr. S. J. Walters, who has been compelled as the result of illness to retire after thirty years of excellent work as chief clerk.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

- 50. Additional income has now become necessary in order to maintain the distribution at the total of £300,000 to which it was raised in 1932, and to provide for the grants to assist the work of District Nurses in relief of Hospital out-patient departments.
- 51. The wishes of His late Majesty King George V were reported to the Council as recently as December last by His present Majesty, as Prince of Wales and President of the Fund, in the following terms:—
 - "The King, who watches closely the progress of King Edward's Hospital Fund, has recalled the magnificent way in which it was supported by King Edward's generation and his own, and has expressed the hope that the present generation will follow their example."
 - "I feel that we must take up this challenge."

At the end of the meeting, in what unhappily proved to be his last spoken words to the Council as their President, he added that he would like very much to emphasise his hope that more people would follow the example of the Bank of England and send large sums of money to the King's Fund, because nobody knew better how to distribute them, and this saved busy men a lot of time and trouble.

another lay member of the Distribution Committee, it is Sir Frederick Fry. For thirty-eight years, during eleven of which he was an Honorary Secretary, he has been untiring in the service of the King's Fund. And he has now been helping with the additional and novel work involved in the District Nursing distribution.

I will now ask Sir Edward Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Sir Edward Peacock (the Honorary Treasurer) said that the ordinary distribution was not as yet fully covered by the income for the year. General fund legacies, which during the past seven years had never fallen below £58,000, had not yet quite reached that figure. Annual subscriptions were well maintained. Donations showed a large increase, due mainly to the very generous gift of £15,000 from the anonymous donor. But as regards income from investments, there was the new difficulty owing to the progressive fall in the rate of interest, and there was the possibility of a further reduction when certain trustee securities reached their earliest redemption dates. They would have to make up, from other sources, for these unavoidable losses of income; and an additional £2,000 was also required for the District Nursing distribution. The inclusion in the Silver Jubilee distribution of £109,000 out of sums placed to reserve in past years meant a decrease in future income from investments; and this also would have to be made up from other sources.

"For all these reasons," Sir Edward Peacock concluded, "I hope and trust that there will be a generous response to the reference made by Your Royal Highness to the claims of this Central Fund on the support of the public."

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord Marshall, Honorary Treasurer of the League of Mercy, said that the difficulty of raising subscriptions was increasing in consequence of local hospital schemes, while this year the celebration of the King's Jubilee had affected the League's arrangements, and its special entertainments for securing funds had had to be deferred. But they were able to allocate to the King's Fund £15,000. This brought the total transferred to the King's Fund since the foundation of the League in 1899 to £559,034, while an additional sum of £174,927 had been allocated to Country Hospitals: a grand total of £733,961.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (See pages 30 to 33).

Sir Ernest Pooley (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (see pages 34 to 44.)

The recommendations were seconded by Mr. F. W. J. JACKSON, and carried unanimously.

Sir Cooper Perry then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved (see page 45).

Sir Leonard Cohen (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (see pages 46 to 48).

The recommendations were seconded by Sophy Lady Hall, and carried unanimously.

SILVER JUBILEE DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir Cooper Perry) presented the Report of the Committee on the Silver Jubilee Distribution to Hospitals and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved (see pages 49 to 51).

Sir Harold Wernher (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of Awards. (see pages 52 to 55).

The recommendations were seconded by Wing-Commander Sir Louis Greig, and carried unanimously.

Date of Posting Cheques.

On the motion of Viscount Wakefield, seconded by Mr. Warren Low, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Wednesday, December 18th.

DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore) presented a Report of the Committee recommending that the Distribution Committee be authorised to make a distribution of £2,000 early in 1936 in aid of the work of District Nursing Associations, in accordance with the principle of the previous decision of the Council, viz., that the assistance from the King's Fund should be given in such a way as would encourage the reference of suitable minor cases from hospital out-patient departments to District Nursing Associations.

The recommendations were seconded by Dr. H. Letheby Tidy and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1936.

His Royal Highness then said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I now come to the arrangements for 1936. There will be a few changes of personnel. I am sorry to learn that Lord Iveagh and Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson find themselves unable to continue their membership of the Council; and that Mr. Eardley Holland can no longer spare the time required for the arduous work of the Distribution Committee, on which he has served for eight years. We shall continue to have the benefit of his experience on the Council. I have already added Sir Alan Anderson to the Parliamentary Committee. Mr. Anson Dyer has joined the Propaganda Committee. I propose to appoint Mr. Oliver Chadwyck-Healey, who is on the Parliamentary Committee, a member of the Council. The new appointment to the Distribution Committee I will notify to the Council later on.

I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move the delegation resolutions.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of Donoughmore), seconded by the Rev. Owen S. Watkins, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1936.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The GOVERNOR OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Prince of Wales, spoke of the continuing inspiration and leadership of His Royal Highness and his devotion to the affairs of the King's Fund.

Mr. H. L. Eason, in seconding, said that the interest of the Prince in the voluntary hospitals of London was an inspiration to all those who had worked in them. He could assure His Royal Highness of the deep personal affection in which he was held by all the professional and nursing staffs in the hospitals and by the patients themselves. He hoped they would have the privilege for many years of serving under his Presidency in aid of the work of the voluntary hospitals.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 17, 1935.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES said:—My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen.—

I have first the honour to read a gracious message from His Majesty the King:— "Buckingham Palace.

"The King is indeed glad that the Council has been able to allot such a substantial sum in aid of building schemes at the Hospitals, besides maintaining the ordinary distribution.

"It is particularly gratifying to the King that it should have proved possible to mark the Silver Jubilee of His Majesty's Reign in a manner which will directly benefit so many Hospitals." 17th December, 1935."

The two distributions which the King's Fund is making to-day amount together to £425,000, and should be a great help to the hospitals in solving three financial problems. The first is the regular annual maintenance of a constantly increasing number of beds. The second is the raising of additional income for those hospitals which have maintenance deficits. The third is the provision of funds for bringing the buildings and equipment up-to-date, and for necessary improvements and extensions.

In the first place a substantial contribution is being made to the regular income of the hospitals. For, out of the ordinary distribution of £300,000, much the largest part goes in regular maintenance grants, repeated year by year, with only minor fluctuations according to temporary changes in the fortunes of the different hospitals.

Then the hospitals with deficits are being helped by additional grants in reduction of debt. A larger amount is being given in this way, as an indirect result of the Silver Jubilee Distribution.

Special Silver Jubilee Distribution.

But most of all the King's Fund is helping with the improvement of buildings and equipment and with extension schemes. It is towards these objects that we are making the special distribution in celebration of the Silver Jubilee year of His Majesty the King, who has been for 25 years Patron of this Fund, and was previously its President. The extra amount to be distributed is £120,000. The money comes partly from margins of income over expenditure in the past; and partly from the sale of seats allotted to the King's Fund by His Majesty's Office of Works at the two principal Jubilee processions. No fewer than 76 grants, ranging from £10,000 to £100, are made to different schemes of capital expenditure. This in itself shows how much the hospitals are doing in the way of improving their buildings and equipment. The grants cover, of course, only a small percentage of the cost of each scheme. For the rest the hospitals must rely on the generosity and sympathy of the public, already shown by the fact that during the last five difficult years £550,000 a year has been received by hospitals in London for these purposes, in addition to £1,300,000 a year in voluntary gifts to maintenance.

It is because we are making this special distribution in aid of schemes that we can allocate more of the ordinary distribution to maintenance, and particularly to the hospitals with exceptional deficits.

Increased Income Needed.

I turn now to our income. Ever since we increased the distribution to £300,000 to meet the crisis of 1931, it has been touch and go whether we could keep this up out of annual receipts. Hitherto we have just been able to do so. This year it is still doubtful. We should like to see our way to another £7,000 before December 31st.

That we have already come so near is largely due to an anonymous donation of £15,000: the ninth gift from the same donor during the last 13 years. We should all like to record our best thanks and appreciation to so good a friend.

We have special reason to be grateful for this gift, because we have to make up for an unavoidable decrease in some of our regular receipts. Income from investments, in particular, has necessarily suffered, and may suffer still more, from the fall in the rate of interest, due to prevailing rates of cheap money.

We certainly ought to maintain the distribution of £300,000, and even to increase it to keep pace with the growth of hospital work. At the very least, therefore, we must make up for the fall in the rate of interest by the help of new contributors.

The King's Challenge to our Generation.

The King, who watches closely the progress of King Edward's Hospital Fund, has recalled the magnificient way in which it was supported by King Edward's generation and his own, and has expressed the hope that the present generation will follow their example.

This set me looking at the figures.

Any simple comparison of the receipts would be somewhat misleading because, even at the present time, money still sometimes comes to us under wills made during the time of my Predecessors, or under their influence. But one thing is clear. During the nine years of King George's Presidency the ordinary distribution increased from £50,000 to £150,000, an average increase of £11,000 a year; while during the subsequent 25 years, for 16 of which I have been President, it rose by 1932 to £300,000, an average increase of about £7,000 a year.

I feel that we must take up this challenge, and it seems to me that it ought to be possible, in the improving circumstances of the times, to raise the annual sum required, without competing at all with contributions to individual hospitals. It should be possible, that is, to convince enough people of the facilities which a central fund like this offers, to those who are not specially interested in any one particular hospital, and are not in a position to judge for themselves between their respective claims.

The confidence which donors already have in the King's Fund is shown by the large amounts which have been entrusted to it at various times for special distribution. The Distribution Committee give a list of these in their report on the Jubilee Distribution.

Bank of England Distribution.

The latest is the Bank of England. The Bank have increased the total which they give annually for hospitals, and have asked the King's Fund to allocate this larger sum on their behalf. This we have gladly undertaken to do, and I know I am voicing the feeling of the whole Council when I say how much we appreciate their action. A list of the grants is given in the Distribution Committee's ordinary report. We should be very pleased to do the same for other donors.

District Nursing Distribution.

Another new piece of work which we have undertaken is the special distribution, to help to pay for the services which District Nursing Associations render in relief of out-patient departments by attending cases in their homes. It is proposed that the first grants on this basis should be made early in the New Year. This is another reason why we need more money just now. We can only spare f_2 ,000 for the purpose, but we should like to increase the amount, as soon as this can be done without diminishing the amount otherwise available for hospitals. This new kind of distribution is designed to serve two purposes: to contribute towards the solution of the out-patient problem, and to help the excellent work of District Nurses.

King's Fund Radium.

There has also been a new development in the radium work. Last June Mr. Roger Parr, who gave us £10,000 in 1929 to add to the stock of radium which the King's Fund lends to hospitals, made a second gift of £10,000 to facilitate various schemes for increasing its usefulness. Our very best thanks go to this good friend also. The schemes include the formation of a radium pool, and the provision of new apparatus for certain work which is being carried out in co-operation with the National Radium Commission.

Hospital Extensions.

One of the claims of the King's Fund to public support is that it does more than collect and distribute money. It exercises many of the functions of a central body for the hospitals of London.

The series of memoranda on Time-saving Methods in Out-patient Departments are one example. The Report of the Distribution Committee refers to two more: their inquiry into patients' waking hours; and their regular procedure for the detailed examination of building schemes. Yet another example is the paragraph in their report which draws attention to the rate at which the hospitals are providing additional beds. Nearly 1,000 have been opened since 1931, and more than 2,000 are proposed, besides pay beds and future extensions. These figures suggest two things. One is the remarkable vitality of the voluntary hospital service, which goes on growing at this rate, at a time when so many people suffer from an apparently incurable delusion that it is dead. The other is that, if the voluntary hospital service is to continue to live and grow on this scale in present-day conditions, the individual hospitals must realise that they are parts of one service, where each must have regard to the collective interests of the whole. The King's Fund, as a central body, calls their attention to the total liability involved in all these extensions.

Pay Beds

I am glad to see that, besides all these additional beds for ordinary patients, the hospitals are adding a number of pay beds, for patients who can afford to pay suitable charges, and who need modern treatments which often can hardly be obtained except at a hospital. Beds for this purpose are a comparatively recent development, and there is still a real shortage. Most pay beds are for patients of moderate means, at charges which cover their cost. They therefore cause no expense to the general funds of the hospital. In fact, there is often a surplus, especially where a few beds for the well-to-do are included. The usefulness of the hospital to the whole community is increased, and the patients and their friends often become grateful contributors. The hospital is thus helped in its primary work for the patients in its ordinary wards, who are treated free or contribute voluntarily according to their means.

Co-operation in the Hospital Service.

That the hospitals themselves realise the need for a common policy is shown by their own action in creating a new representative central Committee, by the amalgamation of the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee and the London Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association. The former was set up, with the assistance of the King's Fund, to consult with the London County Council on matters which concern both the voluntary hospitals and the county hospitals. The latter was the lay representative body for everything else. The King's Fund has welcomed the establishment of the new Committee, and is continuing to lend staff assistance, as it has done in the past.

The King's Fund, as a central body, is also co-operating with the British Hospitals Association in promoting the Voluntary Hospitals (Paying Patients) Bill, which has had to be introduced into the House of Lords again, because of the curtailment of the last session of the late Parliament.

Another great co-operative effort on the part of the hospitals helped and indeed largely stimulated by the King's Fund, has been the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers. The first seven years, during which the King's Fund promised special grants, have now expired. The grants came to £124,000, and the scheme is now firmly established. It has been adopted by 88 per cent. of the hospitals in London, or 73 per cent. of those in Great Britain as a whole, reckoned in beds; as well as by institutions in several other parts of the world. I am pleased to hear that other important developments have been taking place.

Personal.

I have now only to thank Sir Cooper Perry, and the Distribution Committee, for the extra work of the two distributions; and also the Honorary Secretaries, Lord Luke, Sir Leonard Cohen, Sir Harold Wernher, and the one I have recently appointed, Sir Ernest Pooley. If I may specially mention

The PRINCE OF WALES, in acknowledging the vote, said that he would like very much to emphasise his hope that more people would follow the example of the Bank of England and send large sums of money to the King's Fund, because nobody knew better how to distribute them, and this saved busy men a lot of time and trouble. It had been a great privilege to be President during the Jubilee year, and he was so pleased that morning that he had been able to record the great increase in the distribution during the nine years in which His Majesty The King was his Predecessor.

The proceedings then terminated.

At the formal meeting of the General Council on January 14th, 1936, the following message from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, was read:—

" My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

"I have signed the Order appointing the members of the Council, members of Committees, and officers of King Edward's Hospital Fund for the year 1936.

"I am sorry to have to inform the Council that Sir Leonard Cohen has felt obliged, after his recent illness, to ask to be relieved of the Chairmanship of the Hospital Economy Committee. To the work of that Committee, which is very useful but largely technical, he has devoted a great amount of his time and his ability for the last 14 years. Happily he will continue to act as an Honorary Secretary, and therefore as an ex officio member of most of the Committees, including the Management and Distribution Committees, and of course as a member of the Council. I have appointed Mr. F. W. J. Jackson Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee, and, as such, a member of the Management Committee.

" I have appointed the other members of the Council, members of Committees, and officers for 1936 in accordance with the announcement I made at the Council Meeting in December.

THE DUKE'S SPEECH.

THE DUKE OF YORK, addressing the Council, said :--

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have received a gracious message from His Majesty the King, which I propose to read:—

"BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

"Although I have laid down the office of President, which I had held for sixteen years, I shall continue to take a close interest in all that concerns the King's Fund and the Hospitals. I have become very familiar with its organization and its numerous activities, and I would take this opportunity of thanking the Council and all the other members of the Fund with whom I have had the pleasure of working for so long as President.

"I am glad to learn of the progress made with several items to which I referred when presiding, for the last time, at the Council Meeting in December; notably the completion of the first distribution in aid of District Nursing work for hospital out-patients, the passing of the Voluntary Hospitals (Paying Patients) Act, and the recent developments in connection with the Radium belonging to the Fund.

"I am happy that my brother, who has always shown keen interest in our national welfare and deep sympathy with those who suffer, should succeed me as your President, and I know that he will receive the same loyal support that you gave me throughout my term of office.

"EDWARD, R.I.

'' 25th June, 1936.''

It is only six weeks since the King appointed me to the post of President of King Edward's Hospital Fund. I cannot therefore address you yet, as he used to do, from personal experience of its affairs. But I know it well from the outside. I know it partly because it is so closely connected with my family, and partly also because of the reputation it has gained. And there are at least two things which I am therefore able to say.

I feel that, in appointing me President, His Majesty has both conferred on me a privilege and laid on me a responsibility.

It is a privilege because of the names of those who have held the office before me, and because of what they did for the King's Fund. King Edward VII founded it when he was Prince of Wales, and he was President for its first four years. He appealed personally for subscriptions. He collected round him a body of advisers. With their help he administered the Fund, and laid down the lines on which it has made such progress ever since. King George, as Prince of Wales, followed in his steps. The nine years of his Presidency saw a great increase both in the annual distribution and in other work for the hospitals. His present Majesty became President in 1919, and for 16 years took a full and active interest in its developments since the War. For during this period many new problems have arisen. And again and again the hospitals have needed just the kinds of help, financial and administrative, which a central body like the King's Fund is able to give.

In the Royal Family our sympathy with hospital patients, and our interest in hospital work, has long been very real and personal. As Patrons or Presidents of many individual hospitals, we see a good deal of both at first hand. But King Edward VII added something new. The Presidency of the King's Fund is a symbol, and also a practical expression, of our interest in each and all of the hospitals receiving grants. And to be appointed by the King to the office of President, in succession to the three previous Presidents, is, as I say, a great privilege.

Exceptional Powers of President.

But if the Presidency is a privilege, it is also a responsibility, because of the exceptional powers and duties of the President. Under its Act of Incorporation the King's Fund consists of two parts: the President and the General Council. The President appoints the Council, the Committees and the Officers. All Minutes, except those dealing with money, need his approval. In most matters the Council cannot do anything without him. He, in his turn, could not act without the Council; and the President has always been able to secure the co-operation of experts and representative people ready to help the hospitals by serving the King's Fund. Parliament thus ensured, for the future, the dual constitution which had already worked so well under the first two Presidents.

That it is still working well is proved, I think, by the Annual Report for 1935 and the other Reports which are before us to-day. The details are new to me. But here are some of the items.

The Work of the King's Fund.

I will take administrative subjects first, and come to finance later on. The annual distribution itself means work throughout the year. The accounts of nearly 150 hospitals are gone through. The hospitals themselves are inspected. My first act as President was to appoint this year's Visitors for the purpose. All building schemes are examined. A pension scheme for nurses and hospital officers has been started, and has been helped by special grants for its first seven years. At the request of the Bank of England, the King's Fund now allocates on its behalf its contributions to hospital appeals.

A report has been published on time-saving methods in hospital out-patient dispensaries. For the first time, a distribution has been made towards the cost of district nursing work for hospital out-patients. This also will help to reduce out-patient waiting. A Bill has been promoted in Parliament to remove obstacles to the provision of pay beds. Various methods have been adopted to make the King's Fund radium more useful to the hospitals to which it is lent. I see a reference to a second very generous gift of £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr for this side of our work. There are reports on the financial progress of the hospitals during 1935, and on the work of our Propaganda Committee in aid of the hospitals and of the King's Fund itself.

These are only examples of the way in which the administrative work of the King's Fund as a central body has grown up under its first three Presidents.

Need for Additional Income.

I come now to the financial side of the King's Fund, as a collecting and distributing body. During the Presidency of King Edward VII the annual distribution rose to £50,000. Under King George, as Prince of Wales, it grew to £150,000. Last December, just before the present King ceased to be President, the ordinary distribution was £300,000; and there was also a special Jubilee distribution of £120,000, and pension grants of £5,000; a total of £425,000.

But here I find myself, as your new President, faced with a real difficulty. I understand that the ordinary distribution was increased to £300,000 in 1932 to help the hospitals in the national crisis. The whole of the increased amount has hitherto been provided out of current revenue. But this last year the income fell short of the outgoings by £7,000, after including a wonderful anonymous donation of £15,000. And I am told that changes in the yield of investments will cause a further decrease. A fresh effort is therefore needed in order to continue the progress which the King's Fund has made under its three previous Presidents.

This can be done if we enlist new supporters from the numerous London institutions and businesses which are now enjoying more prosperous times.

His present Majesty made it very clear in December, when he presided for the last time, that he was prepared to make this effort, and that King George wished it made. This is what he said:—

"We certainly ought to maintain the distribution of £300,000, and even to increase it to keep pace with the growth of Hospital work. At the very least, therefore, we must make up for the fall in the rate of interest by the help of new contributors.

"The King, who watches closely the progress of King Edward's Hospital Fund, has recalled the magnificent way in which it was supported by King Edward's generation and his own, and has expressed the hope that the present generation will follow their example.

"I feel that we must take up this challenge."

Gift from King George.

These words, spoken as recently as December, 1935, gave fresh evidence of the interest King George never ceased to take in the King's Fund, of which he was President for nine years and Patron for twenty-five. Yet there is still later evidence which I am happy to disclose to you. King George was an annual subscriber of £1,000, and one of his very last acts was to honour the King's Fund with a capital gift of £20,000, of which the income will form part of the annual distribution. Every year the accounts of the Fund will thus contain a record of His late Majesty's constant interest in its welfare, and every year his gift will bring benefit to the hospitals of London.

All who help to increase our annual income, and so to maintain our annual distribution, will therefore be helping to fulfil the wishes so recently expressed by King George and by His present Majesty.

They will also be helping me personally to carry out my own desire that my term of office as President shall, like those of my predecessors, be a period of continuous progress.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1935.

SIR EDWARD PEACOCK (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Accounts (see pages 66 to 71), expressed, on behalf of the whole Council, their appreciation of the signal honour they had received from the King, who had been graciously pleased to become its Patron and to appoint His Royal Highness as his successor in the Presidency.

In presenting the Accounts for 1935 he referred to the deficit of about £7,000, which he wished to put in its proper perspective. The distribution had been increased to £300,000 to help the hospitals in the crisis of 1932, and the remarkable thing was that so large an amount had been provided out of current income for so long. The total receipts for the year, including receipts for capital account and for special purposes, came to no less than £335,000. The grants to hospitals, including £8,464 from special funds entrusted to the Council by private donors, including the Bank of England, made a grand total of a little over £433,000. A deficit of £7,000 on the ordinary distribution in one year out of nine was not very large when compared with these figures.

As regards the future, the increased distribution of £300,000 was still needed by the hospitals. The income of the King's Fund last year included some exceptional receipts. There would be a further reduction in income from investments, partly because of the use of reserves for the Silver Jubilee Distribution and partly because of the fall in the value of money.

A considerable increase in subscriptions and donations would therefore be needed to make up these losses, to enable the King's Fund to maintain its distribution at its present figure, and to provide for the grants in aid of district nursing work for hospital out-patients.

He therefore, in the name of the Council, warmly supported His Royal Highness' appeal for a generous response to what His Majesty had referred to last December as King George's challenge to the present generation. Already there had been some increased receipts. Of these he would specially mention two, because of the source from which they came. His Royal Highness had referred to the fact that King George was an annual subscriber of £1,000. King Edward had now increased his own subscription from £200 to £1,000 and at the same time the King's Fund would receive an annual income of about £650 from King George's capital gift.

Thus those who issued the challenge had also set an example.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the Hon. John Mulholland, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1935.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (THE EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) in moving the adoption of the Annual Report for 1935 (see pages 5 to 15), referred specially to the receipt of over £14,000 from the sale of seats to view the Jubilee procession, for which he would like to thank H.M. Office of Works and Sir Patrick Duff and the staff of the Department. It was a very helpful windfall. The passing of the Voluntary Hospitals (Paying Patients) Bill, thanks largely to the efforts of Lord

Luke in the House of Lords and Mr. Samuel Storey in the House of Commons, and the help of Lord Macmillan as Chairman of the Parliamentary Committee, and the co-operation of the British Hospitals Association, was a benefit to hospitals generally which the separate institutions could hardly have secured for themselves.

MR. PHILIP FLEMING having seconded the resolution, the Report was unanimously adopted.

DISTRICT NURSING DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY), presented a Report on the District Nursing Distribution of £2,000 in respect of work done for hospital out-patients in 1935 and moved the recommendations. He said that a very much larger sum than £2,000 could be usefully employed to help the nursing of out-patients, though such sum should not, of course, be taken from the total available for hospitals. Much gratitude was being expressed by hard-pressed honorary secretaries of District Nursing Associations for their grants.

SIR WILLIAM COLLINS, as Chairman of the Central Council of District Nursing in London, expressed the thanks of that body and also of the District Associations for this first distribution of £2,000 from the King's Fund, not only as an addition to their funds but also as a recognition of the valuable ancillary work the District Nursing Service did for the hospitals.

The recommendations were seconded by Mr. OLIVER N. CHADWYCK-HEALEY and carried unanimously.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (SIR COOPER PERRY), then presented a Report on King's Fund Radium, and moved the recommendation that the Report be published (see pages 56 to 59). He referred especially to the way in which the King's Fund was working in close association with the National Radium Commission, and to the steps that were being taken to bring the radium into more continuous use and to safeguard the radium and the health of those in contact, close or distant, with it.

MR. J. BEAUMONT PEASE having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

REPORT OF REVENUE AND PROPAGANDA COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (LORD LUKE), in presenting a Report of the Committee on the Income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moving that it be published (see pages 60 to 64) said that he was able to give the first news of the financial fortunes of the hospitals during the preceding year. The figures were not yet complete, but taking the London hospitals as a whole, there was a substantial increase in the ordinary income over 1934, the net aggregate balance of income over expenditure was also greater, and for the first time the income and expenditure both exceeded £4,000,000. The number of hospitals with surpluses for the year again exceeded those with deficits. The deficits were often at different hospitals in different years, and it was only in very few cases that they occurred continuously at the same hospital, and then they were often due to exceptional circumstances. The King's Fund did all it could to help those hospitals.

An important development in hospital finance generally was the continued growth of the Hospital Saving Association, whose contribution to the hospitals in 1934 amounted to no less than £400,000. The total of voluntary gifts, including gifts for investment and for building, amounted in 1934, in London alone, to no less than £2,600,000.

SOPHY LADY HALL having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

LORD DAWSON OF PENN, in moving a vote of thanks to the Duke of York for presiding, said that His Royal Highness, since the commencement of his public career, had shown a constant interest in all that appertained to the welfare of the nation and especially in all that concerned hospitals. This involved sympathy towards those who were down on their luck in the time of need, and also an intimate knowledge of all that hospital work stood for, in direct benefit to patients, in the training of future doctors and nurses, and in the furtherance of new knowledge on which the welfare of the nation increasingly depended. His Royal Highness was not only their President, to whom they gave their loyal support, but as one of the nation's workers he received the tributes of their hearts, their admiration and their devotion.

LORD MILDMAY OF FLETE, in seconding the motion, said that they deplored with the whole nation the catastrophe which had compelled a change in the Presidency, but they welcomed most warmly the assumption by the Duke of York of the duties which His Majesty discharged so efficiently and so faithfully, for they well knew the extent to which His Royal Highness in his every action of life had been influenced by the very highest sense of duty.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said it was a very great honour to him to take over the Presidency, and he hoped to be able to discharge the duties to the best of his ability and for the benefit of the Fund. On behalf of all the members there to-day, he would congratulate Lord Dawson and Mr. Beaumont Pease on their recent honours.

The proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

- I. The amount of the ordinary Distribution is again £300,000. The special pension grants come this year to £5,000. The special Silver Jubilee Distribution of £120,000 is also being made in aid of schemes of capital expenditure. The total amount to be distributed is thus £425,000.
- 2. The Silver Jubilee Distribution of £120,000 is described in a separate report, as also is the usual distribution of £3,000 to convalescent homes not attached to particular hospitals. The distribution of the other £302,000 among hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches forms the subject of this report.
- 3. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 145 as against 146 in 1934, the Medical Mission of the Good Shepherd having closed.
- 4. As the Silver Jubilee Distribution is in aid of schemes of capital expenditure notified to the Distribution Committee before May 28, the Committee have felt justified in allocating a smaller proportion than usual of the ordinary distribution in grants for these objects, and a larger proportion in grants to maintenance. The grants recommended in aid of maintenance amount to £272,850 as compared with £254,375 in 1934 and £263,830 in 1933, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure being £24,150 as against £42,625 last year and £33,170 the year before. The unusually large amount available for maintenance this year has been mainly allocated to the reduction of debt resulting from past deficits at hospitals which have had exceptional difficulty in coping with financial depression.
- 5. The pension grants of £5,000 cover the final three months of the initial period of seven years for which special grants up to a maximum of £20,000 a year were promised. There is thus a reduction of £15,000 this year in the amount received by the hospitals for this purpose, and there will be a further reduction of £5,000 in 1936. The expenditure of the hospitals on the scheme will now be regarded as having become part of their normal outgoings, which are taken into account by the Fund in making the ordinary grants.

Although the special grants of £20,000 have thus come to an end, the ordinary grants have increased during the seven years by £25,000. Nevertheless the decrease in pension grants, which differs in amount at different hospitals, has been one of the factors taken into account in allocating the extra sum available this year for maintenance grants.

- 6. When considering the allocation of capital grants, the Committee are greatly assisted by the knowledge derived from their detailed examination of the various schemes of extension or improvement submitted to the Fund throughout the year. All such schemes are referred to sub-committees who visit the hospitals and discuss the reasons for the schemes, and also the plans, the estimated cost of building, equipment and subsequent maintenance, and the resources from which it is anticipated that these costs will be met. The financial depression caused a decrease in the number of schemes submitted. In 1932 they fell to a minimum, and in the last two years the increase has been considerable.
- 7. In this connection the Distribution Committee have been impressed with the scale on which the voluntary hospitals of London have provided, or are proposing to provide, additional ordinary beds, that is, beds for patients who are treated free or who make voluntary payments according to their means, as distinct from pay beds or part pay beds available for patients who pay charges for special accommodation. In spite of the financial difficulties of the past few years, the beds have already been increased since 1931 by 995. The extension schemes which have recently been notified to the Distribution Committee will add another 2,178.

This does not include beds in schemes which are described as future, or beds which would be provided if certain hospitals were to complete the original plans for the full utilisation of their sites.

The public response to these efforts on the part of the hospitals is shown by the fact that the additional beds already provided have been maintained; that the voluntary gifts to maintenance, even during the difficult period of the last five years, averaged £1,330,000 a year apart from legacies; and that receipts for extensions and improvements of all kinds averaged £550,000 a year.

At the same time the Distribution Committee suggest that individual hospitals, when preparing schemes which they propose to submit to the Fund with a view to the issue of an appeal, or when considering how far schemes already submitted can be carried out in the near future, should take into account these aggregate figures of additional beds, and the total capital and maintenance expenditure which the voluntary hospitals of London as a whole are thus undertaking. This liability is in addition to the necessary expenditure on keeping their existing buildings and equipment up to date and carrying out essential improvements.

8. The following grants made in previous years in aid of schemes have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two years' rule:—

Gordon Hospital, £1,000 to extension,

Hospital for Epilepsy, £900 to extension,

London Hospital, £750 to massage department,

National Hospital Queen Square, £250 to extension,

Princess Elizabeth Hospital for Children, £1,000 to new nurses' home.

Queen's Hospital for Children, a balance of £250 out of the grant of 1928, and unapplied grants of £500 and £250 to extension of out-patient department.

St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, £150 to theatre unit.

The Committee are recommending that the grant of £1,000 to the Princess Elizabeth Hospital should be renewed and, together with the grant of £1,000 in 1934 to the same purpose, be transferred to the scheme for removal and rebuilding at Banstead Wood; and that the other grants should be renewed.

- 9. The Visitors' reports on their inspections of the hospitals applying for grants have as usual been of the greatest assistance. Early in the year a joint sub-committee of the Distribution Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee revised the report form. Each Visitor is now provided with a private note book containing a list of points of interest, prepared specially for the guidance of those who are new to the work. This list is somewhat longer than before. The section dealing with out-patient departments, for example, has been enlarged as one result of the work of the Out-patient Committee of 1932 and the present Out-patient Arrangements Committee. The value of the new form has been proved by an increase this year in the number of extracts which the Committee are recommending the Council to forward privately, with the grants, for the observations of the Committees of the hospitals concerned.
- 10. On the question of patients' waking hours, the Visitors, as was foreshadowed last year, were asked to report specially on the reasons given by the comparatively small number of hospitals where the hour still continued to be earlier than 6 o'clock. The Visitors' comments on these will be studied by the Distribution Committee early in 1936.
- II. A new subject which has engaged the attention of the Committee during the year has been the preparation for the special distribution of £2,000, decided on by the General Council in December last, in aid of the work of District Nursing Associations in relief of congestion at hospital out-patient departments. As the Council decided in November that the first distribution for this purpose should cover the whole of 1935, it will take place early in 1936, and will be dealt with in next year's report.
- 12. As was announced by His Royal Highness the President at the Annual Meeting in May, the Bank of England have asked the King's Fund to deal on their behalf with appeals they may

receive from London hospitals and may forward to the Fund for consideration. With this object the Bank have paid to the Fund a sum which includes their usual annual subscription to the Fund and also such annual subscriptions as have hitherto been made by them direct to certain London hospitals. In allocating the balance the Distribution Committee have followed the previous practice of the Bank, which has usually been to make a few fairly substantial donations each year, generally to specific objects such as building schemes, rather than to ordinary maintenance. The donations recommended this year make, with the annual subscriptions, a total of £2,160 10s., allocated as follows:—

This total, with the Bank's annual subscription to the King's Fund, represents an increase on the average amount hitherto given direct by the Bank for the benefit of London hospitals. The grants do not form part of the ordinary distribution of the King's Fund. They will be described in the reports of the hospitals as from the Bank of England, per King Edward's Hospital Fund.

13. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £300 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependants.

- 4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution implies dissatisfaction.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON SILVER JUBILEE DISTRIBUTION TO SCHEMES NOTIFIED BEFORE MAY 28TH, 1935.

- I. King Edward's Hospital Fund is celebrating the year of the Silver Jubilee of His Majesty the King, who has been for 25 years its Patron and was previously for 9 years its President, by making a special distribution of £120,000 among the hospitals of London, in aid of schemes of capital expenditure on extension and improvements. This makes, with the ordinary distribution of £300,000 and the pension grants of £5,000, a grand total distributed during the year of £425,000.
- 2. This is the fourth special distribution made by the King's Fund in aid of schemes of capital expenditure. The others were: £258,438 in 1920-21 from surplus Red Cross funds entrusted to the King's Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem; £243,000 between 1924 and 1928 out of the legacies of the late Mr. & Mrs. Wells, allocated by the Council to the purpose; and £115,000 in 1929 from the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery. There have also been special sums distributed for other purposes; viz.: the Combined Appeal distribution of £365,000 to maintenance in 1922-3; the emergency distribution of £250,000 in 1920 to maintenance; the supplementary grants of £31,500 and £28,000 added to the ordinary distributions in 1911 and 1915 by the gifts of Sir Ernest Cassel; and the Coronation Gift Fund of £119,000 in 1902, the proceeds of which were partly distributed and partly invested.
- 3. The money for the Silver Jubilee Distribution has been derived from two sources. During the 10 years between 1920, when the emergency distribution was made out of reserves, and the financial crisis of 1931, the King's Fund had had each year a margin between the receipts for the year and the amount which it was considered prudent to distribute; and these accumulated sums, with a few lapsed grants, had reached a total of £109,000. At the Silver Jubilee the sale of the seats placed at the disposal of the King's Fund by H.M. Office of Works realised £14,300, out of which £11,000 was allocated for this purpose. These two together provided the total of £120,000.
- 4. The grants out of the Silver Jubilee Distribution have been directed towards meeting one of the most urgent needs of the present moment. Since the financial crisis of 1931, the

hospitals, with few exceptions, have by great efforts succeeded in raising sufficient funds to maintain their beds. But they have not been able to do as much as usual to bring their buildings and equipment up to date, and numerous urgent schemes of extension and improvement have had to be deferred. One result has been that, with the improvement of affairs, an exceptionally large number of such schemes have been submitted to the King's Fund; many of these are at present the subject of special appeals to the public, and on several of them work has been begun. It is to the assistance of such schemes, and of others which have been completed but not yet fully paid for, that the Silver Jubilee Distribution is being devoted.

- 5. As, however, the sum available is small compared with the need, the distribution has been limited by the Council to schemes which had been notified to the Distribution Committee by May 28, the date of the Annual Meeting when the proposal to make the special distribution was adopted.
- 6. The Silver Jubilee Distribution being devoted wholly to schemes of capital expenditure, the Distribution Committee, when dealing with the ordinary distribution, has thought it right to allocate a smaller proportion than usual to schemes, other than those notified after May 28. They have thus been able to recommend larger maintenance grants to hospitals which are suffering from deficits or from other exceptional difficulties.
- 7. The £120,000 available for the Silver Jubilee Distribution is from three to four times the total of the grants usually made to schemes. In allocating this increased amount the Committee have adopted the same principle as with the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery in 1929. They recommend that grants should be made, on a higher scale than usual, to a considerable number of hospitals, and that the opportunity should be taken of giving very substantial assistance to a few specially large and important schemes. The list of grants may be sub-divided according to amount as follows:—

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON KING'S FUND RADIUM.

- I. Since the last general Report on the Fund's Radium made in May, 1932, which dealt with the splitting of the 4-Gramme Bomb into I-Gramme Units, the principal matters that have engaged the attention of the Committee have been:—
 - A. Radium National Follow-up Cards which record the medical history of patients after treatment by radium.
 - B. The extent to which the Hospitals holding the Fund's radium use the radium available to them, i.e., the "Percentage of Use", and in this connection the establishment by the Fund of a Radium Pool.
 - C. Inspection by Physicists, on behalf of the Fund, of the radium organisation at the Hospitals holding the Fund's radium.
 - D. Change in the apparatus for the 1-Gramme Units.

A. RADIUM NATIONAL FOLLOW-UP CARDS.

2. In 1933, following on a request from the National Radium Commission, the Fund asked the Hospitals holding the Fund's radium to collaborate in the preparation of the national statistics which were being prepared by the Commission, by completing the follow-up cards issued by the Commission and by forwarding the cards annually so that the information on them might be collated by the Commission with the information from the Commission's own Centres.

- 3. All the Hospitals agreed to collaborate in this work, and between 10,000 and 11,000 cards of cases treated in the five years 1930–1934 have so far been sent to the Commission.
- 4. The Fund learned from the Commission that the cards of a few Hospitals were deficient in the data they recorded. As this deficiency indicated that no adequate follow-up of the cases treated with radium was being made, the Fund wrote to the Hospitals concerned, stressing the importance of an efficient follow-up system in the treatment of malignant disease. Subsequent to the Fund's letter three Hospitals have reported that they have reorganised their follow-up system and hope to obtain the maximum results.
 - B. PERCENTAGE OF USE OF RADIUM, AND KING'S FUND RADIUM POOL.
- 5. In 1934 the Committee came to the conclusion that the use made of radium by seven Hospitals was insufficient to justify a continuance of the Fund's loan to each of them for their exclusive use, and the Committee accordingly decided to withdraw the Fund's radium from these Hospitals and, with part of the radium so withdrawn, to establish a Radium Pool for their common use.
- 6. The Pool was established in September, 1935, at the Middlesex Hospital, which has agreed to operate the Pool on behalf of the Fund.
- 7. The Hospitals from which the Fund's radium was withdrawn and which participate in the Pool are the Central London Throat, Nose & Ear; Golden Square Throat, Nose & Ear; Prince of Wales's; Queen Mary's; Royal Northern; St. George's; West London.
- 8. The amount of radium withdrawn from these Hospitals was 985 mgms.; and 459 mgms. of this were allocated to the Pool as being a sufficient quantity to meet the normal requirements of the participating Hospitals.
- 9. The establishment of the Radium Pool was in the nature of an experiment; and the experience already gained, short though it is, has encouraged the Committee to hope that a fuller use of the Fund's radium will thereby be obtained.
- 10. After careful consideration of the circumstances and work of several centres it was decided that the balance, approximately 500 mgms., of the radium withdrawn from the seven Hospitals should be allocated to the Middlesex Hospital. The Hospital has arranged to make use of it in forming a 2-Gramme Unit in place of the present 1-Gramme Unit.

C. Inspection of the Radium Organisation at the Hospitals.

- 12. In 1934 the Sub-Committee decided that it was desirable that Physicists with special experience in the organisation of a radium department should visit the Hospitals holding the Fund's radium, to investigate the precautions observed for the protection of the health of the personnel and for the safe keeping of the radium.
- 13. Through the good offices of Professor Russ, who advises the Fund on technical matters connected with radium, the services of the following Physicists were obtained for the visits:—Dr. Clark of the Middlesex Hospital; Professor Hopwood of St. Bartholomew's Hospital; Dr. Mayneord of the Cancer Hospital; Mr. Rees of University College Hospital.
- 14. Very useful Reports on their visits were received from the Physicists, and it was satisfactory to learn that, on the whole, adequate precautions were being taken at the Hospitals holding the Fund's radium. Each of the Hospitals was supplied with a copy of the visiting Physicist's Report on it, so that the Hospital authorities might have the benefit of any observations made by him that would tend to add still further to the safeguarding of the personnel and the radium.

D. CHANGE IN THE APPARATUS FOR THE I-GRAMME UNITS.

- 15. In 1932, when the Fund established 1-Gramme Units at the Cancer, Middlesex and University College Hospitals, the Fund supplied apparatus for the use of the Units.
- 16. After three years' experience of working with these Units, the Hospitals have come to the conclusion that better clinical work could be carried out by a different type of apparatus, and the Fund is supplying new apparatus to these Hospitals. At Middlesex Hospital, as already described, the 1-Gramme Unit is being increased to a 2-Gramme Unit.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1935.

- 1. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1935 amounted to £335,528 15s. 2d., including general legacies amounting to £59,741 6s. 9d., and various sums for special purposes. In 1934 general legacies totalled £77,236. Owing largely to the decrease under this heading the general income of the Fund fell short of the 1934 total by £8,654, and did not fully provide for the ordinary distribution of £300,000.
- 2. The figures of the income of the Voluntary Hospitals of London for 1935 are not yet completely tabulated, but it is clear that, although several of the Hospitals had serious deficits, they will, taken as a whole, show a net aggregate balance of income over expenditure larger than in the previous year. Their ordinary income shows a substantial increase. For the first time in their history, the total income and the total expenditure both exceed £4,000,000. It appears that legacies received during the year reached the highest figure recorded since they were separately tabulated by the Fund in 1921. It is satisfactory to note that this very important source of Hospital revenue shows no sign of being affected by the changing economic conditions of the times. Figures naturally fluctuate from year to year, but over a long period of years they maintain their level.
- 3. The Committee have had before them the figures of Hospital revenue in 1934 prepared by the Hospital Economy Committee of the Fund, and published in the Statistical Review of the Work and Finance of the London Voluntary Hospitals. The Committee study the revenue position of Hospitals individually, devoting special attention to the position of those Hospitals whose ordinary income (i.e., excluding legacies) in the year under review has amounted to less than 80% of their total general fund expenditure. The figures for 1934 placed eight Hospitals in this category, as compared with thirteen in 1933. Of these Hospitals six showed a total income (i.e., after including legacies) substantially in excess of 80% of their expenditure, and this year the Committee did not think it necessary to recommend to the Distribution Committee any private remarks on revenue points to accompany the grants of the Fund.

4. The number of Hospitals with surpluses for the year 1934 was 91, against the record figure of 97 in 1933. The figures of surpluses and deficits over five years have been as follows:—

The fortunes of the individual Hospital vary: over the five years very few had an unbroken series of deficits; several had an unbroken series of surpluses, and a large majority had more often a surplus than a deficit.

- 5. The general conclusion of the Statistical Review is that, while the deficits at particular Hospitals form a serious problem for those Hospitals, they are not typical of the general tendency of Hospital finance, but are due to more or less exceptional circumstances. In the majority of Hospitals the difficulty lay, not in a failure to meet the maintenance expenditure out of current income, but in the need of further funds to carry out necessary improvements in building and equipment.
- 6. A falling-off in 1934 of £124,000 in legacies brought the total income of the 145 Hospitals below the high-water mark of £4,000,000 reached in the previous year. The total was £3,980,000 against £4,006,000 in 1933. But total ordinary income was up by £101,000 and reached the highest recorded figure—£3,594,000. Receipts from Patients increased by £81,000. Since 1930 there has been an increase of £216,000 under this heading. A very important factor in this increase is the steady growth in the distributions of the Hospital Saving Association, which provided fully £400,000 in 1934. During the five years income from Investments has increased by £25,000. Voluntary gifts show very little variation if allowance is made for an unusually large donation of £100,000 in 1930.
- 7. These figures give some indication of the broad foundations on which the finances of the Voluntary Hospitals are based. They need, and receive, support from all classes of the community. The Propaganda Committee have once more found many means of keeping before the public the work and claims of the London Hospitals, as well as of the Fund, and the Revenue Committee has much pleasure in submitting the following report of their activities.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1935.

8. The Propaganda Committee have again to thank the proprietors of the "Daily Mail" for free space at the Ideal Home Exhibition for a King's Fund stand. The Miniature Hospital was exhibited, as well as specimens of apparatus and equipment illustrating some of the

recent developments in Hospital methods of diagnosis and treatment. Large numbers visited the stand, and literature relating to the work of the King's Fund and the Hospital Saving Association was distributed.

- 9. A King's Fund Calendar for the use of solicitors was prepared in an attractive form, and circulated to over 5,000 solicitors in the London area with a covering letter from Lord Macmillan, which was quoted in the "Law Society's Gazette" and the "Law Times."
- To. The Committee accepted an offer from the Directors of British Industries House to hire the Miniature Hospital for a special Jubilee Exhibition there in May and June. Subsequently it was agreed that the Model should remain on the premises until further notice, and arrangements were made for school parties to visit it and for short explanatory addresses to be given. We are indebted to the Education Officer of the London County Council for circularising secondary and central schools within the County of London, drawing attention to the Miniature Hospital as a suitable object for an educational visit.
- at the London School of Economics, were continued in the form of another series of Mock Trials. We were again successful in securing the co-operation of persons eminent in such varying spheres as Art, Literature, The Classics, Flying, The Cinema, and The Ballet. Our thanks are specially due to Mr. John Hassall for his design of a humorous poster advertising the series, and also to "The Times" for a short leader on the subject of our programme. Financially this year's series suffered to some extent, like all entertainments, from the counterattraction of the Silver Jubilee celebrations, but much valuable publicity was gained for the Fund. We have again to thank the Governing Body of the London School of Economics for their hospitality, and particularly Sir William Beveridge, the Director, who served on the Organising Committee and took an active part in the programme.
- 12. Returns received from the Empire & G.P.O. Film Libraries show that the bookings of the film, "A Century of Hospital Progress," amounted to 81 during the year, with an estimated aggregate audience of 17,187. Applications for the loan of 35mm. copies in circulation through G-B Instructional, Ltd., were also received from schools, clubs, groups of the Hospital Saving Association, etc. On the recommendation of the Sub-Committee, it was decided to re-edit the film by incorporating pictures from a film produced by the Southendon-Sea Film Fellowship for their local Hospital. We have to thank this amateur association for allowing us to use these sequences.

- 13. The Committee were glad to welcome back Dr. L. W. G. Malcolm on his appointment as Organiser of Museum Activities under the London County Council. Miss M. Horsley, Head Mistress of Woodford School, East Croydon, and a member of the Independent Schools Association, has taken the place of Miss Blofeld, while Mr. Anson Dyer, whose expert advice as a member of the Film Sub-Committee had been of great service, and Mr. S. R. C. Plimsoll, Secretary-Superintendent of the Middlesex Hospital, also joined the Committee during the year.
- 14. The Educational Sub-Committee suffered a serious loss in the resignation of Dr. Lazarus-Barlow, who had been their Chairman since the Sub-Committee was constituted in 1924, and whose services contributed in large measure to the success of the lecture scheme. The lectures were continued during the year to schools and other audiences, including Townswomen's Guilds, Women's Fellowships, Parents' Clubs, and Literary Societies. In several of the schools essays on the subject of the lecture were written by pupils. All the writers showed an intelligent appreciation of what they had heard. Particulars of the scheme were printed in the L.C.C. Gazette and the Educational Supplement of "The Times." In addition to the lectures, parties from schools were shown over several of the leading Hospitals.
- 15. During the summer months a series of specially conducted tours in aid of the King's Fund was arranged. The places of interest included the Houses of Parliament, Hampton Court, Lloyd's, the Zoological Gardens at Whipsnade, and the Tower of London. We desire to record our warm appreciation of the services rendered by those who kindly acted as guides. These tours have proved extremely popular.
- 16. It was decided to offer a prize for the most appropriate design for a poster illustrating the activities of the King's Fund on behalf of the Voluntary Hospitals. The competition was open to students of the L.C.C. Central School of Arts and Crafts; the Royal Academy School; the Royal College of Art, South Kensington; and the Slade School. Mr. John Hassall, the Hon. Ian Lawson Johnston, Mr. P. H. Jowett (President of the Royal College of Art), and Professor Randolph Schwabe (Slade Professor of Fine Art, University College) kindly acted as judges, and the prize was awarded to Mr. Jonathan Foss of the Central School of Arts and Crafts. The design consists of a pen-portrait of His Majesty King Edward VII; above are the words: "Support King Edward's Hospital Fund for London", and below: "Friend and Helper of the London Voluntary Hospitals." The poster is now being used at exhibitions and other functions.
- 17. The Committee have considered, from time to time, the best method of presenting to the public the claims of the Voluntary Hospitals, and have lost no opportunity of distributing

suitable literature in connexion with their various functions. The Voluntary Hospitals have a great story to tell. It has been our object to tell this story to people of all ages and of every class, and thus bring home to an ever-widening public what the Hospitals do for them and what the King's Fund does for the Hospitals. In this we hope that we may have met with some measure of success.







TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January, 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1).

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His late Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1910 to 1936.

His present Majesty King Edward VIII was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1919 to 1936, and is now Patron.

On May 15, 1936, His Royal Highness the Duke of York was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from:

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

Special grants are made to hospitals towards the cost of District Nursing work in relief of their out-patient departments. But the Fund does not make grants direct to District Nursing Associations.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on page 102).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-nine years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £8,446,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922–3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1935 being £300,000, besides the Silver Jubilee distribution of £120,000, in aid of hospital extensions and improvements, and £5,000 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £559,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-seven years, the contribution in 1935 being £15,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the

various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

The regulation prescribing the observance of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, facilitates comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary," which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these annual reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications on page 102).

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, e.g., Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours, Out-patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting. An Out-patient Arrangements Committee has been appointed to assist in carrying out the recommendations in the last mentioned Report (see page 103).

By means of a standing Parliamentary Committee the Fund assists to secure the interests of the voluntary hospitals during the consideration by Parliament of any bills affecting the hospital system.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1935, being 1,997 at 107 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit in 1929–30, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr in 1929, £10,000 in 1935 and another £10,000 in 1936, and £37,000 received in 1929 through the Thank-offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.






