Race and Health: an information sources guide highlighted the fragmented and under-funded provision of race and health information. Obviously, the closure of SHARE will make this situation much worse. The following is a brief update on remaining information providers and key organisations, with a reminder that all these providers have limited resources and staff available to deal with individual enquirers.

Key national health & race information providers

The Centre is the UK academic national centre of excellence for research and teaching in the field of race and ethnic relations. It produces a wide range of publications, and has a resources centre. Thanks to funding from the Economic & Social Research Council some of its collections are available on line. The Ethnic Health File of the Clinical Sciences Library, University of Leicester is included in the main database. The Resources Centre is also open to bone fide researchers, during office hours in university terms.

The CRE is the national body responsible for enforcement of the Race Relations Act 1976 and promotion of harmonious community relations. It covers all aspects of race relations and racial discrimination. It publishes reports and the results of its formal investigations. Its library collection is open to the public by appointment.

The library services subject coverage includes the NHS; health services; social services; public health; medicine; and nursing. Black and minority ethnic issues are covered in all these areas. Its users are Department of Health-staff. It. is only available to researchers by appointment as a library of last resort; The important bibliographic database, DH-Data, is available on-line through some libraries, for a fee.

This is the largest health promotion and health education collection in the UK. It incorporates a library, an audiovisual and teaching material centre and an information service. It has a substantial collection within these areas on black and minority ethnic issues. It is open by appointment only to professionals and academics. This is a resource for all those involved in the development and management of health and social care services. It includes a substantial collection on health and race in these areas. It is a free reference library. They also offer a quick reference enquiry service; reference lists from the database; a photocopying service; loans to other libraries of King's Fund and WHO-EURO publications and some duplicated material; literature searches of relevant commercial databases. A charge is made for some of these services, and there is restricted access for full-time students 🖟 🕢

LARRIE is a service that provides upto-date information regarding current race equality policy and practice in local government. The LARRIE database contains over 10,000 abstracts of committee reports on all aspects of developing and implementing a race equality policy including employment, service delivery and corporate arrangements. A quarterly bulletin containing additions to the database is produced. Enquiry service and bulletin is free to local authorities, other organisations are charged. They also produce reports.



NISW aims to raise standards and promote good practice in social work and social care. They carry out research, policy and practice, development and dissemination of information. They have an extensive information service. They also produce the Caredata CD, a social and community care database. NISW is also a good source of information on children's issues.

The Refugee Council works with refugees, particularly those who have recently arrived in this country. They are primarily London based. They focus on issues of welfare rights, education and housing, and they are also taking an interest in health. Through their refugee advisers support unit they have produced a bulletin on concern over access to health services for refugees, and basic information about the refugee situation for care providers and health practitioners. They are also producing a bulletin on HIV/AIDS. They have a leaflet, Advice on Health, which explains NHS services available for refugees, and they are producing a leaflet on pregnancy. There is also a useful library, classified by population group, and a computerised catalogue. The Health Access Adviser works on raising awareness and policy making with reference to refugee health and access to services.

It aims to influence the development of national health policy and ensure that relevant health issues are integrated into national and local health care priorities. The Trust at present is fund raising for the development work it intends to carry out. It is particularly interested in supporting the black voluntary sector in lobbying for better health services.

The Confederation of Indian Organisations (UK) is an umbrella body for Asian voluntary organisations. The main aim of the organisation is to raise awareness of the issues that affect the Asian community; this is achieved through research, consultation and representation, campaigns and conferences. In addition CIO assists in setting up new groups; provides resources, information and advice to existing members; and helps to develop and form links between existing members. CIO has produced several publications and provides information on areas such as disability, heart disease, mental health and employment training. Individuals in the community are offered basic advice on problems associated with immigration and nationality, as well as on welfare entitlements. CIO also houses the Greater London Translation Unit, which provides translation and interpreting services in over 30 languages. CIO have also produced a number of publications on mental health and the Asian voluntary sector.

This black-led mental health project is being developed by West Lambeth Community Care (NHS) Trust in partnership with local black groups. Ultimately the service will be sensitive to the needs of the black community, recognise the effects of social deprivation, racism and discrimination and will deliver a holistic service, offering a range of therapeutic, arts based and other support interventions, working collaboratively with existing black community groups and the statutory bodies. It will provide a bed crisis care unit; assessment service; family respite unit; an information point; and community services. They ran a partnerships and progress conference in March 1996 for Black mental health workers and organisations. They are compiling directories of independent Black mental health organisations, and black mental health workers. Malcolm Phillips, the director is also a contact for the Association of Black Therapists which publishes the Journal of Black Therapy. They were the main organisers of an International Conference for the National African and Caribbean Mental Health Network in June 1997. The Network has been named Safoa, and represents about 80 black mental health organisations in

The Medical Research Unit's Medical Sociology Unit undertake a number of research projects in ethnicity, religion and health in Clydeside. These include studies on Irish health; health in the population of South Asian origin in early middle life (Williams and Hunt with Bhopal); dietary change among South Asians and Italians in Glasgow (Bush with Williams, Lean, Anderson and Bradby); a decade of dietary change in Glaswegian South Asian migrant women (Anderson); diet, health beliefs and social support among women of South Asian origin (Bradby); health in young people aged 14-15 of South Asian and other origin in Glasgow. Descriptions of progress are available in the unit's annual reports.

Established in 1987, the REU (Race Equality Unit) promotes better social care for Britain's black communities. This is carried out through conferences, training, consultancy and project work. They are involved in ethnic monitoring, user involvement, child protection, and social work. They have conducted a study of Black groups who work with or have an interest in children and families to ascertain their views.

Its role is to build an infrastructure for the Black voluntary sector and help individuals, groups and communities in a changing environment. It does this by providing information, training, consultancy, supporting development of networks and local development agencies and a framework for policy issues affecting black groups. They publish Sia News. Sia has a lot of information on funding for black voluntary groups. They have been conducting a survey of the black voluntary sector and creating a national database.

Waqar Ahmad is head of a substantial research programme on race, health and social care. He was involved in a research project focusing on race and community health development, based in Bradford. Also a study of birth outcome amongst Pakistani and White women in Bradford in 1993. He edited two volumes, Race and Health in Contemporary Britain and The Politics of Race and Health. He is also involved in a study of the implications of the new community care policy for black elders, focusing on Bradford. They have set up

an eighteen month project on improving health care for Asian deaf children. It will be conducted alongside a national overview of initiatives on ethnicity and deafness. Other work includes a two year study of service support to parents of children with sickle cell disorders or thalassaemia; a review of literature and guidelines for purchasers on mental health, . cardiovascular disease and haemoglobinopathies; and, jointly with Nuffield Community Care Studies Unit, University of Leicester, a twenty seven month study of the service needs of Asian carers.

Their work includes coronary heart disease and diabetes in Chinese and South Asian populations in Newcastle.

The Trust arose out of successive conferences held by the National Black Caucus which identified the need for an organisation to provide research, administrative and technical support to Black organisations and networks. They have set up a Black Information Link, BLINK, which is an electronic information system, available on Internet. They have undertaken work on the Asylum and Immigration Appeals Bill; and on the Single European Market. They have set up Black Community Awards to promote Black community development in areas including health. They have also established a Black elders project, and produced two briefing papers on the black elders. They have produced a National Black Elders Charter, and a national directory of Black Elders organisation and projects.
