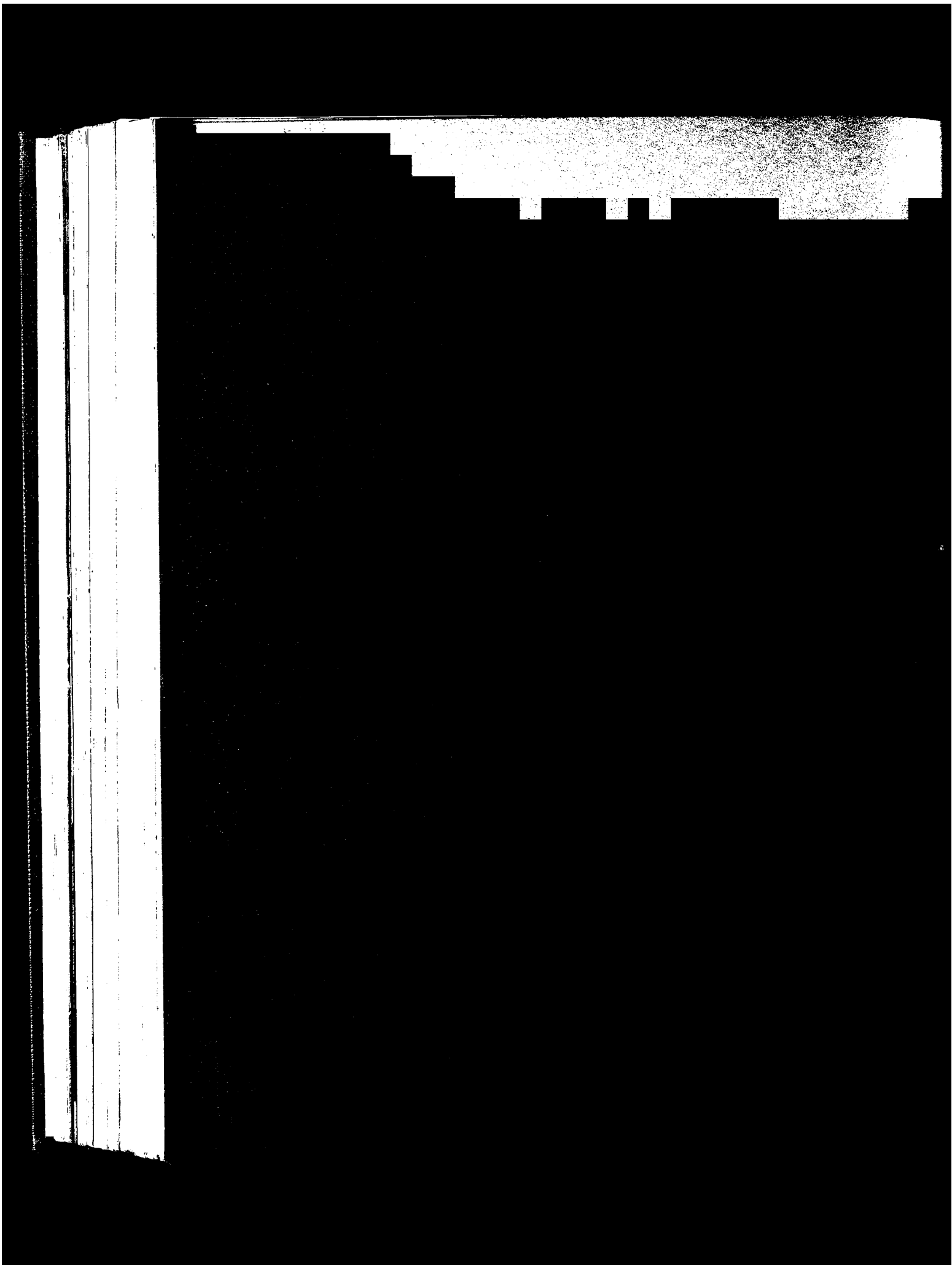

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1932.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

1. There were two outstanding events in the history of the King's Fund during 1932. The first was an increase in the ordinary distribution from £275,000 to £300,000, made out of current income for the year, with the object of helping the hospitals to surmount their present exceptional difficulties. The second was the holding of an inquiry by a Special Committee into the question of Out-patient Methods and their effect on the suitability of the patients treated and the time of waiting, followed by the appointment of an *ad hoc* committee to assist the hospitals to carry out the recommendations.

VOLUNTARY HOSPITAL FINANCE DURING 1932.

2. The financial crisis having compelled some of the regular supporters of the voluntary hospitals to reduce or discontinue their contributions, the hospitals have had to make special efforts to obtain additional subscriptions and to effect every possible economy in working, in order to avoid the closing of beds.

3. So successful have been these efforts that, although the final figures are not yet available, it is already known that for 1932 the London hospitals, taken as a whole, will again show for the year a small net aggregate balance on the right side. There was a very slight decrease in income, but this was more than offset by reductions in expenditure; and although some hospitals suffered from serious deficits, the total number of beds open was actually increased during the year.

4. The increase of £25,000 in the grants from the King's Fund contributed substantially to this successful result, especially as a large part of the increase was used to assist hospitals which, for one exceptional reason or another, were likely to have more than the average difficulty in holding their own during a period of severe financial crisis.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

5. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1932 were £325,504 os. 4d.

while general legacies amounted to £58,849 18s. 5d., making, with £372 1s. 3d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, a total income of £318,092 6s. 8d. The total receipts on capital account were £5,941 2s. 6d., while receipts on various special accounts amounted to £1,470 11s. 2d.

7. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £300,000, an increase of £25,000 over 1931, apart from the pensions grants, which amounted to £20,000, as against £19,313 in 1931.

9. The Council are again greatly indebted to the medical and lay Visitors who inspected the hospitals applying for grants. Their reports are of the greatest service, being always carefully considered in connection with the annual distribution.

10. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals and convalescent homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,097,167. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £7,382,021 8s. 5d. has been thus disbursed.

SPECIAL ITEMS AMONG THE RECEIPTS.

11. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.

12. The Fund also received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,600 from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company, and £1,000 from "M.M." The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £666 13s. 4d. from Mr. Robert Fleming and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £625 from Lloyds Bank Ltd.; of £533 6s. 8d. from Mr. J. J. Crosfield and from "W. C. W."; of £525 from the Westminster Bank, Ltd.; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt., and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; and donations of £1,000 from Mr. W. A. Posnett; of £500 from the Goldsmiths' Company, from "J.R.B.," from Lt.-Col. Geo. Waters, and from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust; of £314 7s. 6d., from the proceeds of the "Rugger" Ball; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D." The Fund also received two anonymous donations of £500 each, besides £2,000 from Mr. D. J. MacAndrew for capital purposes.

13. The contribution of the League of Mercy was increased from £17,000, the amount in each of the five preceding years, to £20,000. The Council wish to record their special gratitude to the workers of the League for this remarkably successful result in a time of exceptional difficulty. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1898 now amounts to £504,000.

14. The Fund also received £10,000 from the British Charities Association for distribution among London Hospitals. The total amount received from the Association for this purpose since 1925 is now £85,000. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in thus entrusting the King's Fund with the distribution of the part of their receipts allocated to the London area.

15. Legacies received during the year included the following:—Mrs. Jessie Ashton, £15,000 on account of share of residue; Mr. Gustav Boringer, £6,000 on account of residue;

Miss Marianna Sophia Hagen, £5,500 on account of residue; Captain Sir Charles Leopold Cust, Bt., R.N., £5,250 further on account of share of residue (making a total of £13,620 received to date); Mr. Hugh Brown, £5,000 on account of residue; Sir Thomas Paul Latham, Bt., £5,000; Commander Francis William Chaine, £3,741 17s. 1d. further on account of share of residue (making a total of £8,241 17s. 1d. received to date); Mr. John Wells, £2,500 further on account of residue (making a total of £135,930 15s. 4d. received to date); Mr. Henry Herbert Wills, £3,941 2s. 6d. further on account of share of residue left for endowment purposes (making a total of £15,801 2s. 6d. received to date); Mrs. Adelaide Florence Coxon, £1,060 19s. 4d. on account of residue; Mr. William Porter, £1,000 on account of share of residue; Miss Mary Esther Boake, £742 5s. 4d.; Mr. Montague George Jessett, £562 19s. 1d. further on account of residue (making a total of £14,837 19s. 1d. received to date); Mr. James Strachan, £525; Mr. Frank Mason, £500; Miss Flora Mary Stancomb, £500; the Reverend Henry Swann, £387 10s. 4d. further on account of residue (making a total of £63,527 18s. 8d. received to date); Mr. Samuel Lewis, £372 1s. 3d. further on account of residue (making a total of £524,869 2s. 4d. received to date); and Miss Hannah Elizabeth Gartside, £256 balance of legacy (making a total of £1,006 received to date).

16. The Council are also very grateful to the Trustees of the following estates for gifts made to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers: Mr. George Bertie Innes Hopkins, for a gift of £2,000; and Mr. Edward Clark, for a further gift of £1,000 (making a total of £5,000).

EXPENSES.

17. During the year expenses amounted to £14,608 5s. 11d., or about 10½d. per £ of the total received. This sum was rather larger than usual because it included the cost of the Out-patient Inquiry, and of the re-making up of radium for the use of hospitals, besides that of all the numerous other administrative activities normally carried on in addition to the collection and distribution of funds and the work incidental thereto.

PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

18. The grants promised by the King's Fund towards the expenditure of the hospitals during the first seven years of the pensions scheme reached the maximum of £20,000, as against £19,313 in 1931. The special reserve set aside to assist in providing the grants amounted at the end of 1931 to £51,000. The reserve is sufficient to cover the greater part of the liability during the remainder of the period, and only £3,000 had to be taken from the current income for the year. Out of the total distribution of £320,000, therefore, £303,000 was provided by current income and £17,000 from the pensions reserve.

19. By the end of the year the scheme had been adopted by 114 hospitals in London, representing more than 14,800 beds, or 81 per cent. of the whole, besides 258 hospitals with over 36,000 beds outside London; the grand total at December 31st being thus 372 hospitals,

with over 51,000 beds. This included 84 per cent. of the beds at hospitals all over the country with 200 beds or more, and 50 per cent. of the beds at smaller hospitals, or 64 per cent. of the beds in the voluntary hospitals of the whole country.

SPECIAL TRUST GIFTS.

20. In addition to the annual distribution, the King's Fund made grants to two hospitals in accordance with the conditions attached to the special trust gifts received in 1930 and 1931.

21. From the first of these gifts the annual income is payable, subject to certain conditions, to the reduction of the deficit on the recent extension scheme of the Miller Hospital. A full year's income, amounting to £939 18s. 2d., was received and paid over for the first time in 1932.

22. Out of the second trust gift the King's Fund was enabled to offer a special grant of £6,000 towards the extension of the out-patient department of the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital, conditional upon the hospital raising another £6,000 within a specified time, so that the work could be put in hand without delay. The hospital was successful in carrying out the condition. At the Council meeting of the Fund in December His Royal Highness expressed his appreciation of a gift which would thus not only increase the efficiency of the hospital, but also help to provide employment.

SIR JOHN YOUNG'S BEQUEST OF A CONVALESCENT HOME.

23. Another form of special gift was referred to in the Annual Report for 1929, where it was stated that an anonymous benefactor had notified his intention of bequeathing his house to the King's Fund for use as a convalescent home. This was the late Colonel Sir John Young, who died in July, 1932. Under the terms of his will his house and grounds, situated in Ealing, have passed to the King's Fund, together with the residue of the estate, the income of which is to be used for maintenance, and the use of the house has been offered to and accepted by the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, in which Sir John had long been interested. The home is to be called the "Dame Gertrude Young Memorial Convalescent Home," in permanent commemoration of the association of Sir John and his wife in Red Cross work and in civil and military hospitals.

24. The action of Sir John Young in selecting the King's Fund as the permanent trustee for these purposes is greatly appreciated by the Council.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

25. Following upon the acceptance by the King's Fund of the recommendation of the National Radium Commission, as recorded in the Annual Report of the Fund for 1931, the redistribution of the radium formerly contained in the 4-gramme bomb was completed in 1932. The 4 grammes were allocated to four hospitals, three of which were to use their shares

in the form of 1-gramme bombs, for methods of treatment and research agreed upon between the hospitals and the Commission. The total amount of radium purchased with the special gifts received for the purpose is 10 grammes, the whole of which is on loan amongst 24 hospitals. Three of these hospitals are co-operating directly with the National Radium Commission, under the arrangement just described. All the others are keeping records in a form drawn up by the Commission, so that the results at all the hospitals in London holding King's Fund radium may be co-ordinated with those at hospitals elsewhere holding radium from the Commission.

PATIENTS' WAKING HOURS.

26. Inquiries made in May showed that considerable results had followed from the issue a year earlier of the Report which recommended that, in the absence of exceptional circumstances, the hour of waking should not be earlier than 6 o'clock. The number of hospitals where this practice had been adopted had increased during the twelve months from 47 to 69, while 15 others had made changes in the desired direction.

HOSPITAL PROVISION FOR PERSONS OF MODERATE MEANS.

27. The annual list published by the Fund shows that the total number of pay beds provided by the voluntary hospitals in London at the end of 1932 was 1,667 at 105 hospitals, as against 1,577 at 104 hospitals in December, 1931, and 1,055 at 80 hospitals when the Report of the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund was published in 1928. The charges for these beds range from 2 guineas per week to 10 guineas or more, a large number being at 4, 5 or 6 guineas, exclusive of whatever may be payable for medical and surgical fees and extras.

28. The British Provident Association scheme, which enables members of the professional and middle classes to make provision towards the cost of treatment in a pay bed or at a nursing home, was launched by the Association in June, by means of a Mansion House meeting at which His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was present. Though the scheme has no organic connection with the King's Fund, its general principles were on lines approved by the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund and subsequently by the General Council. The unexpended balance of £5,000, referred to in the last Annual Report of the Fund as having been returned by the Hospital Saving Association, was paid over to the British Provident Association towards the preliminary expenses of the new scheme, this having been ascertained to be in accordance with the purposes of the original donors.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

29. The Propaganda Committee have continued their efforts to increase the volume of support for the Voluntary Hospitals, partly by organising functions designed to bring in a direct return in revenue to the King's Fund, but more especially by using every method they can devise to bring home to the public generally what the voluntary hospitals mean to them and the claim that they have on all who benefit either directly or indirectly by the work carried on within their walls.

30. Prominent amongst the new methods devised by the Committee has been the construction of a Miniature Hospital illustrating many of the latest developments in the design, appearance and work of a modern hospital. Thanks to the voluntary services of a large number of firms and individuals, the model has been erected without cost to the Fund. It is available for exhibition in aid of the Fund and of hospitals both in London and elsewhere. At the end of the year arrangements had been made for it to be shown for the first time at an exhibition at the Building Centre which was opened on January 6th, 1933, by the Prince of Wales.

THE OUT-PATIENT QUESTION.

31. The Special Committee appointed by His Royal Highness the President, under the Chairmanship of Lord Onslow, to inquire into Out-Patient Methods as affecting the suitability of the patients and the time of waiting, began its work early in the year, and its Report was published on January 3rd, 1933.

32. The general conclusions of the Committee were that part of the waiting was unavoidable with large populations, but that part was due to the treatment of excessive numbers of minor cases which could be dealt with by various other agencies described in the Report, and that part was sometimes due to remediable defects in procedure or in accommodation.

33. The Committee recommended, therefore, that the present movement towards the more consultative use of the out-patient departments, except for emergencies, should be encouraged, provided that a patient desiring to attend a hospital, and unable to pay a consultant's fee, should have access at least once without a doctor's letter; that various time-saving methods of procedure or improvements in accommodation, already adopted or suggested at some hospitals and described in the Report, should be studied by all hospitals with a view to action where appropriate; and that the King's Fund should consider to what extent it could help to carry out these recommendations by making more detailed information available or by other relevant methods.

34. At the December meeting the General Council decided to act on this last recommendation; His Royal Highness the President announced his intention of appointing a special committee for the purpose, under the Chairmanship of Sir John Rose Bradford, to be called the Out-patient Arrangements Committee; and the necessary powers were delegated by the Council. The new Committee will be concerned with the application in detail of the principles discussed in the Report, and its function will be to consider, in consultation with the hospitals, what steps it would be practicable and advisable for the King's Fund to take for assisting the hospitals in the study of the different methods of out-patient procedure indicated in the Report, and for promoting the development of out-patient organisation in the directions suggested by the Report. They will also have power to take such steps as the General Council or the Management Committee shall approve for these purposes.

PERSONAL.

35. The Council had to regret during the year the deaths of Sir Charles Stewart, one of the Fund's Visitors; of Lady Cooper, who was a Visitor from 1921 to 1929; and of Sir Bernard Mallet, who was a member of the Pay Beds Committee in 1927-8.

36. The Council further regret the resignation of Mr. Robert Fleming, who had been a member of the Council since 1913 and of the Finance Committee since 1906; and also of Mr. Walter G. Spencer, who had been a member of the Council since 1925 and of the Distribution Committee since 1924, and who acted as Chairman of the Sub-committee which reported on the question of Patients' Waking Hours.

37. The King's Fund continued to lend staff assistance to the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, the representative body set up under Section 13 of the Local Government Act, 1929, to be consulted in certain matters by the London County Council.

38. By special arrangement the King's Fund staff also assisted the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee with the preparation of a Survey of Medical and Surgical Services in the County of London, which that Committee had undertaken in co-operation with the London County Council. This very valuable Survey was published early in 1933 in two parts, the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee being responsible for the section dealing with the voluntary services, and the London County Council for the section dealing with the County services and those provided by the Metropolitan Borough Councils.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1933.

39. In order that the voluntary hospitals may continue to surmount the present financial crisis two things are necessary. The first is that the public should more and more recognise that each hospital needs a regular income to pay for the regular work which it does for the community. The second is that, in addition to this, there should be a generous recognition of the fact that some of the hospitals, particularly in poor neighbourhoods, are subjected to a specially severe strain, and that these comparatively weak spots need reinforcement.

40. The King's Fund, with its intimate knowledge of the circumstances of all the hospitals of London, can so distribute the contributions it receives as to help in both these ways, and can by this means, and by the supply of information through its statistical reports, provide facilities to private donors who, while not specially interested in any one individual hospital, wish to use their gifts to the best advantage of the voluntary hospital service as a whole.

41. The Council are grateful to the Press for its continued assistance in keeping the claims of the hospitals before the notice of the public.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 15, 1932.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, of the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the year, was held at St. James's Palace, on Thursday, December 15, 1932, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour of reading a gracious message from His Majesty The King, Patron of the Fund :—

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

" His Majesty The King desires to congratulate the President and Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London on being able to raise their distribution to the London Hospitals to £300,000. His Majesty feels that such a result, in these difficult times, without trenching on reserve and out of their ordinary income for the year, is most satisfactory."

" December 15, 1932."

Increased Distribution of £300,000 out of Income.

There are two outstanding facts before us to-day. The first is the increase in the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000. The second is that we are making this distribution of £300,000 out of current income received during the year. It is very unusual for us to make an increase of £25,000 in one year; the average in the past has been about £8,000. But, in view of the exceptional difficulties of the hospitals during the present crisis, we thought it our duty to take exceptional measures to help them. We are able to do this because of the remarkable way in which our income is keeping up. Legacies, which for five years past have exceeded £60,000, are expected to come within about £1,000 of that figure: a striking answer to the argument that charitable legacies are things of the past. Donations are smaller because we have not received this year any of those very large single gifts to which we so often owe our power to increase the distribution. On the other hand the League of Mercy, as Lord Marshall foreshadowed in November, is increasing its contribution from £17,000 to £20,000: I think this is a result all of us connected with the League of Mercy may well be proud of. We are deeply grateful to the numerous workers for the League and to all those who have contributed, mostly in small sums, to this total. From the British Charities Association we again receive £10,000, being the share allocated to London hospitals from the efforts of the Association, which, under the chairmanship of Lord Luke, is so fertile in new schemes and so efficient in carrying them out. The result is that after allowing for expenses, which are less than 1s. in the £, the net income is expected to come out at almost exactly £303,000. On these figures, gratifying as they are, we should not in ordinary circumstances have made a jump of £25,000 in the distribution up to the total of £300,000. It is our usual policy to raise the distribution gradually, so as not to run any risk of having to fall back in the following year. We should have been particularly cautious about this when approaching a round figure like £300,000, which will be a landmark in the history of the King's Fund. The £100,000 mark was reached in 1905, and the £200,000 in 1918. On each occasion care was taken to have a good margin in hand. But we have deliberately decided that this is not a moment when we ought to be cautious in coming to the help of the hospitals in their exceptional difficulties, even though the margin between a net income of £303,000 and a distribution of £300,000 is so small.

The Exceptional Needs of the Hospitals.

That the difficulties of the hospitals are both very real and very exceptional surely needs no proving. There ought to be an end of any talk about a gradual drying-up of the stream of charity. No one yet knows what has happened in 1932. But voluntary hospital income, taken as a whole, went on growing year after year, right down to the end of 1931. This is because the British nation, taken as a whole, believes in maintaining the voluntary hospitals as an essential part of the medical service of the country; and in maintaining, in those hospitals, the qualities of freedom and elasticity which a nation can buy with voluntary contributions, and which are so well worth paying for. At the present moment the hospitals which supply these good things are finding it exceptionally difficult

to collect the voluntary contributions by which the public pays for them. But that is only because large numbers of the public cannot at the present moment afford to pay. The encouraging thing is that so many of those who can afford it are giving rather more, just because others have to give less. If that spirit continues in 1932 and 1933 as it did in 1931, the hospitals ought to come through the crisis. Some of them have been harder hit than others. Until 1932 is over, no one can say which have suffered most. But the Statistical Reports published every year by the King's Fund show what hospitals had serious deficits in their last published accounts. This is part of the information used by the Distribution Committee in preparing their list of grants, and it might well be of use to donors who wish to help in keeping the voluntary hospital ranks unbroken by reinforcing the weak points in the line.

Anonymous Gift to Expedite a Building Scheme.

I should like here to mention one special gift which, though it came through the King's Fund, is outside the distribution altogether. We were enabled through the generosity of an anonymous donor to offer to one hospital a grant of £6,000, which was half the amount required to enable it to begin a much needed extension of its Out-patient Department. The only condition was that it should raise the other half within a specified time. The public responded, the money was raised, and the work will be begun much sooner than would otherwise have been possible. See what this means. The hospital will be made more efficient; the out-patients will be treated more easily and with less waiting; and a substantial amount of employment will be given at a time when it is badly needed. I call this a fine example of wise spending. It is a thoroughly productive investment of the money, and, I suspect, a source of real pleasure to the unknown giver, to whom I here express my most sincere thanks.

Grants towards Pensions for Nurses and Officers.

The total of our own distribution is really £320,000, because of the grants towards expenditure on the pensions scheme. These have now reached the maximum of £20,000. This will more than use up the whole of the margin of income over and above the £300,000. The balance we shall have to take from the special pensions reserve built up during the past four or five years.

Forthcoming Report of Out-patient Committee.

The Report of the Out-patient Committee, of which Lord Onslow is Chairman, is now in my hands. We had hoped to be able to issue it before this meeting. But it was found that with our limited staff the final stages could not be got through without interfering with the work of distribution, and some of the subsidiary matter is still in proof. The Report will, however, be published before the Council meeting which is held early in January.

The subject of the inquiry was the methods in use at hospitals, and their effect on the suitability of the patients treated and on the time of waiting. The Report discusses the relation of the Out-patient Departments to other present-day agencies for providing medical treatment, and it also contains a general survey of the methods of procedure during the various stages in the passage of a patient through the Out-patient Department of a hospital. But these methods differ at different hospitals, and the Committee have accumulated a mass of information which they could not very well put into their Report. One of their recommendations is that the Council of the King's Fund should consider to what extent and in what ways it could usefully render this detailed information available, and assist in the carrying out of the other recommendations. The Management Committee

suggest that a small follow-up committee should be appointed to do this, in consultation with the hospitals and in co-operation with the Management and Distribution Committees. If this proposal is acceptable to the Council I propose to constitute the new committee at the beginning of January, when I appoint the members of the other standing committees for the year. You will have full particulars at your meeting early in the month, and you can then delegate the necessary powers to the new committee on the lines I have described. I will defer till then any formal expression of my thanks to Lord Onslow and his colleagues for their arduous and careful work. The follow-up committee would not need to begin its operations until everyone concerned had had a few weeks or months to study the original Report. It could then take up the different sections of the Report, part by part, in its own time, as might appear to be most useful and most convenient. Its object in doing this would be to help the hospitals to compare their different methods and to profit by each other's experience, especially by the numerous time-saving improvements which have recently been effected. For it is evident that the hospitals themselves have been giving a great deal of thought to the problem of reducing the time of waiting.

Bequest of a Convalescent Home.

A few years ago I mentioned an anonymous testator who had decided to leave his house to the King's Fund, to be used as a convalescent home by a hospital in which he was interested, and also some money for a partial endowment. This was the late Sir John Young who died in July last. He was a pioneer in what is now known as Red Cross work and had long been an active hospital worker. The convalescent home is to be a permanent memorial of his wife Dame Gertrude Young ; and it was in order to make sure of its permanence that he decided to make the King's Fund the actual owners. The arrangements for the use of the home are now being discussed with the hospital, so that the testator's wishes may be carried out as soon as possible after probate is granted.

A Miniature Hospital.

Our Propaganda Committee is, as usual, busy with new ways of making known the claims of the King's Fund and of the hospitals. For some time a sub-committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Saxe Wyndham, has been preparing a new form of exhibit—a miniature hospital about 4 feet high, elaborately fitted up so as to show what a modern hospital is like. I think that the Queen's Doll's House gave those responsible the idea of this miniature hospital, and Her Majesty has already been to see it and expressed her approval. It will be on view in Bond Street early in the New Year, and I hope to have the pleasure of opening the exhibition myself. Thanks to the generosity of a large number of helpers, this miniature hospital has not cost the King's Fund a single penny, and there is already the prospect of a substantial profit by its exhibition.

Personal.

We have to regret the deaths of Sir Charles Stewart, who had been a Visitor for two years, and of Sir Bernard Mallet, who was a member of the special Committee which inquired into the question of Pay Beds.

I have now only to thank Sir Cooper Perry and the Distribution Committee for all their work. This means not only the allocation of the grants, but also the consideration of extension schemes and a number of other questions which come up throughout the year. I should also like to say how much we are indebted to the Visitors, whose reports are such a help to the Committee.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to make his financial statement.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Mr. E. R. PEACOCK (the Hon. Treasurer) said :—

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—The latest estimate for the net income for the year, after allowing for expenses, is £303,000. This is a little less than was anticipated in November, but is still sufficient to enable the increased distribution of £300,000 to be met wholly out of income. The estimate had to be reduced because we now know that part of the legacies which were previously included will not be received till next year. Even so, the receipts from legacies are expected to amount to nearly £59,000. This compares with £69,000 in 1931, but the average for the last five years is still over £60,000. There is thus no sign of any general tendency towards a falling off in legacies. Annual subscriptions have decreased slightly. Some of our subscribers are sending us more because they know that others cannot send as much as formerly. Donations are less this year. They usually include at least one substantial gift of several thousand pounds, either from some old friend or from a new one. But we cannot expect windfalls every year. The very gratifying increase in the contribution of the League of Mercy from £17,000 to £20,000 will form the subject of a statement by Lord Marshall. We have again received £10,000 from the British Charities Association. Income from investments has increased. This is partly due to an increase in our capital, and partly to accumulations of income in the hands of executors, which are, of course, non-recurrent. The amount actually received on capital account in 1932 has been £4,372. During the past five years our capital account has increased by £272,000, and during this period the annual distribution has grown from £259,000 to £320,000. In addition to the £300,000 required for the ordinary distribution, we have to provide £20,000 for the special grants in aid of the expenditure of the hospitals on the federated pensions scheme for their nurses and officers. This will be provided partly by the surplus income over the £300,000 and partly by drawing from the special pensions reserve. Rather less will come out of income, and more from pensions reserve than we had anticipated because, as I have explained, some of the legacies expected have been postponed, but we hope that the balance will be restored next year. By increasing the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000 on an income of £303,000 we have taken a risk—the risk of a decreased income next year, but, as His Royal Highness has said, we are doing this deliberately, because it seems to us the best way of helping the hospitals in their present difficulties. We trust that our friends and supporters among the public will agree that it is a sound thing to do, and will ensure that, now the £300,000 mark has been reached, there shall be no going back.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord MARSHALL, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that as Treasurer of the League of Mercy it was his privilege to confirm that the grant from the League this year to the King's Fund would be £20,000, and added that the funds delivered this year were largely augmented by the very successful entertainment at which His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales had been present and in which he had taken a very deep personal interest. The total sum contributed to the Fund by the League of Mercy since its inauguration in 1899 now exceeded half a million pounds. In addition, the League had made grants to extra-Metropolitan hospitals making a total amount received by the League for the hospitals of our country of about £650,000.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (See pages 26 to 28.)

Sir LEONARD COHEN (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches.) (*See* pages 29 to 39.)

Sir GEORGE ROBERTS having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals, and moved the recommendation that the list of grants and remarks be approved. (*See* page 40.)

Sir HAROLD WERNHER (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals. (*See* pages 41 to 43.)

The motion, having been seconded by Mr. H. L. EASON, was then put and carried unanimously.

DATE OF POSTING CHEQUES.

On the motion of Mr. EARDLEY HOLLAND, seconded by Lady HUDSON, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Tuesday, December 20.

THE REPORT OF THE OUT-PATIENT COMMITTEE 1932.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of DONOUGHMORE) presented a Report on the subject of the forthcoming Report of the Out-patient Committee, and moved the recommendation that powers should be delegated to the new Out-patient Arrangements Committee (*see* page 11, par 34).

The recommendation, having been seconded by Lord EBBISHAM, was carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1933.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have now to introduce the business for 1933. Mr. Robert Fleming, who has been a member of the Finance Committee since its formation in 1907, and also for many years a member of the Council, now wishes to retire. I should like to thank him in my own name and yours for the most valuable service which he has rendered, and to express our personal regret at his retirement. I have also to express my best thanks to Mr. Spencer, who desires to retire from the Council, for his many years of service for the Fund. He was Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Patients' Waking Hours, whose report led to such useful results. I intend to re-appoint all the other members of the General Council. To the Finance Committee I intend to appoint Mr. E. R. Peacock, Chairman; Mr. Montagu Norman, Sir Harold Wernher, Mr. Philip Fleming, Mr. Lionel de Rothschild, and Mr. Beaumont Pease. The Distribution Committee will consist of Sir Cooper Perry, Chairman; Sir John Rose Bradford, Sir Frederick Fry, Sir Ernest Pooley, Mr. Warren Low, Dr. Morley Fletcher, Mr. Eardley Holland, and the Honorary Secretaries. The other standing committees will be unaltered, except that Dr. H. L. Tidy will be added to the Hospital Economy Committee. The members of the new "Out-patient Arrangements Committee" I will notify to the January meeting. I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move that the delegation resolutions be approved.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (the Earl of DONOUGHMORE), seconded by the Rt. Hon. J. H. WHITLEY, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various committees for 1933.

VOTE OF THANKS TO THE PRINCE OF WALES.

The Chairman of the London County Council (Mr. ANGUS SCOTT) said that it was the wish of everyone present to accord to His Royal Highness a hearty and loyal vote of thanks for his presence. The London County Council, over which he had the honour to preside, was deeply interested in the hospital life of London. By the Local Government Act of 1929 they had placed upon them the responsibility of no less than 70 London hospitals. In carrying out the duties assigned to them it was the policy of the County Council to work in the closest co-operation with the voluntary hospitals. Under Section 13 of the Act, the County Council was required to consult with a representative body of the voluntary hospitals on certain matters, but he wanted to make it clear they were anxious not to confine the discussions to the matters provided for in the Act, but to consult the voluntary hospitals on all matters which might have reaction on their services, and also to make arrangements for the fullest exchange of information. He felt that those arrangements would be of great advantage to the sick of London. He would also like to be allowed to refer to the proposal for a post-graduate medical school in connection with the County Council's Hammersmith Hospital, where he trusted that they would shortly have the beginning of what would prove to be the finest post-graduate medical school in Europe. All present that morning greatly appreciated the manner in which His Royal Highness had conducted the proceedings, and they tendered to him their very grateful thanks.

Viscount HAILSHAM, in seconding the resolution, said that all of them who had the honour to be members of the Council of the King's Fund were very busy persons, but the fact that His Royal Highness, who was the busiest of all, should find time amid his constant preoccupations and public services to preside in person was an example and an encouragement to every one of them to give of their best. His Royal Highness's known interest in the King's Fund was a very material factor in maintaining and stimulating public support to its work. He was only expressing the wish of every member when he assured His Royal Highness how deeply they appreciated his presence in the Chair.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, the President, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I thank the proposer and seconder for the very kind words they have used in putting this vote of thanks before you and for the kind way in which you have accepted it. These Council meetings are only twice a year, but my interest in hospital work is very great and I do go round and try and find out as much as I can about them. I think the way the public at the present time are supporting the hospitals, when as we know it is a very great pinch and strain for them, is a thing we as English men and women may be proud of. May I offer you my best wishes for Christmas and the New Year.

The proceedings then terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council, May 26th, 1933.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Friday, May 26, 1933, at 11.30, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, addressing the Council, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—First of all I have the honour to read the following message from His Majesty the King, our Patron:—

“BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

“The King is glad to hear that the whole of the increased distribution of £300,000 was covered by the income of the year. His Majesty is much gratified at the way in which the public are continuing to support the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals during this time of financial crisis.”

“25th May, 1933.”

I think that we have to record what is little short of a miracle: that, in spite of the financial crisis and the very serious times we are going through, the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals have had a successful year in 1932, as indeed they have had for some years past.

King's Fund Income and Distribution.

The King's Fund income has kept up during the last few years with remarkable steadiness. By the end of 1931 we had been able to increase the ordinary distribution gradually to £275,000, and also to keep a margin in hand as a reserve, partly for maintaining the distribution and partly to provide for the special grants in aid of the pensions scheme for nurses and hospital officers.

In 1932 our income again reached the same level; there was reason to fear that some at least of the hospitals would be suffering seriously from the crisis; and in these circumstances it was decided to make an immediate increase in the distribution from £275,000 to £300,000.

The accounts are before you to-day, and they show how close our estimating was. Besides the ordinary distribution of £300,000, we were pledged to increase the pensions grants to the promised maximum of £20,000. After drawing for 1932 its proper share of the pensions reserve fund, we were able to distribute the whole of the increase out of income for the year, with just £111 to spare.

A distribution of £300,000 is in itself a fresh landmark in the history and progress of the King's Fund, and I only hope that the public, who have made this distribution possible, will see to it that we shall never have to fall below the level thus attained.

Hospital Income and Expenditure.

Now take the hospitals themselves. They also did well in 1932, taking them as a whole. In fact, they did better than in 1931. Of course some individual hospitals found the added strain of the financial depression harder to bear than others, and great efforts have been, and are, required in order to keep their beds open. But in spite of some weak spots, the hospitals, taken as a whole, have again, for the sixth year in succession, come out with a margin on the right side. It is a narrow margin, but, strange to say, it is slightly wider than in 1931.

Now, I have called this successful result a miracle. But it is really due to sustained efforts on the part of the individual hospitals and to steady and continuous support on the part of the public.

By sustained efforts I do not mean merely, shall we say, stunts and S.O.S. appeals. Voluntary hospital finance has a far more solid basis than that. In the first place, the hospitals have saved money wherever they could. Their expenditure has been substantially reduced, although the total number of beds available has continued to increase. In the second place, they have set out to maintain their income by finding new supporters in the place of those who are unfortunately no longer able to subscribe as they could before. And, in the third place, they have more and more developed the soundest of all methods of attracting and retaining voluntary contributions. This consists in keeping before the public the value of their work in the relief of suffering and the war against disease, and the fact that, in doing this work they are performing a regular public service which requires in return a regular income from the members of the community.

King's Fund Assistance.

Now, in all these efforts the King's Fund does its best to assist the hospitals. Our Hospital Economy Committee have, as usual, provided comparative figures of cost which help to show where savings can safely be made. The Distribution Committee have used their additional £25,000, partly

to increase the general level of the grants, partly to give special assistance to hospitals which were already known to need immediate extra help; and partly to strengthen the position of those which were likely to have exceptional difficulties. The Revenue and Propaganda Committees have continued to encourage what I have called the soundest method of hospital publicity. The value of their help is shown by the fact that, when we issued a manifesto on these lines, 50,000 copies were purchased by hospitals and circulated by them in support of their own appeals.

The Miniature Hospital.

The Propaganda Committee are to be greatly congratulated on the idea and on the success of the miniature hospital, which I had the pleasure of inaugurating some three months ago. It is a wonderful technical model, and I think brings home to the public better than any publication, or better than any talking, what an efficient thing a modern hospital is, and why it costs so very much to build. I would like to take this opportunity of thanking all those who have collaborated towards this extremely useful form of publicity for the Fund, and particularly to Mr. Saxe Wyndham, who initiated the scheme and saw it through despite the early difficulties. I would also like to thank the Directors of the Building Centre where it was housed for some time and where I inaugurated it, and then Lord Rothermere for giving it a prominent place in the "Daily Mail" Ideal Home Exhibition in Olympia. It has had a great send-off, and we are already being asked to lend it in other parts of the country so as to benefit local hospitals. We should like to record our appreciation of all the work that Lady Hudson has done in this connection.

Other King's Fund Activities.

Our Parliamentary Committee are again busy. They are once more co-operating with the British Hospitals Association in taking every opportunity of pressing the just claims of the hospitals to a fair payment for work done in the treatment of motor accident cases, the cost of which now falls so largely on funds that are contributed by their supporters for quite other purposes.

The Annual Report mentions another useful piece of co-operation. Our staff assisted the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee in the very valuable Survey of Medical and Surgical Services in the County of London, which that Committee have recently issued jointly with the London County Council. This is, I think, the first time that there has been a complete survey of both parts of these services—those provided by the voluntary agencies and those provided by the public authorities.

The Out-Patient Question.

The Out-Patient Arrangements Committee, appointed to consider the detailed application of the principles discussed in the Report of Lord Onslow's Committee, have begun their work by taking up the recommendations on two points—Standard Forms of Doctors' Letters, and Hospital Time-Tables for Out-Patients. On the first of these, Lord Onslow's Committee reported that the doctors' organisations themselves were contemplating the preparation of standard forms. Their action is greatly to be welcomed, and a good deal of experience is being gained. The recommendations on the subject of hospital time-tables were designed to prevent the waiting that now occurs when patients come at the wrong time, or even on the wrong day. The problem here is the best form of general time-table, and the best method of distributing it to those who will find it useful. When the Committee come to the actual procedure inside the out-patient departments, they propose to begin with the study of time-saving methods at the dispensary stage. They do this because improvements at that stage, if found to be desirable, could often be carried out without causing consequential changes in the rest of the procedure. This seems to me a very reasonable method.

In the meantime the hospitals themselves are working on the Report. Some of them have already notified Sir John Rose Bradford's Committee of action they are taking, and their experience will be most useful. One of the large teaching hospitals, for example, has been making a complete record of the time taken at all the different stages of its out-patient procedure during three weeks. When this is finished it will add greatly to the information contained in Lord Onslow's Report on the subject of Counts of Hours.

The New Offices.

Now, I have only mentioned a few of the numerous activities of the King's Fund this morning. These activities are continually increasing, and it is not surprising that we have had to move into larger offices. I have personally visited the new office accommodation, which, besides being bigger, is a very great improvement on the old. It has a wonderful view and is a place where it is a delight to work. On that occasion I exercised my right as President to take the Chair at the Management Committee meeting instead of, as usual, seeing the Minutes and approving them, and I may tell you that everything was very satisfactory. As we have said before, we are very appreciative of the work that Mr. Maynard and Mr. Macrae are doing and have always done.

The Annual Report says that the expenses come to 10½d. in the £ of the amount received. I wonder if people quite realise that this covers much more than the cost of collecting and distributing the £320,000 amongst 180 hospitals and convalescent homes, and obtaining and studying all the information needed for that purpose. It includes also the cost of performing many of the functions of a central body acting for the voluntary hospitals of almost the whole of Greater London, which have between them a turnover of nearly £4,000,000 a year.

Personal.

I have now one or two personal matters to mention. The first is one that I mention with the greatest possible regret, and that is, the great loss that the Council has sustained in the death of Lady MountStephen. She was personally a very old friend of mine and of my family, and she shared the keen personal interest in the King's Fund and its welfare which led her late husband to bestow upon it such a magnificent endowment. We shall miss her presence here, and we shall miss her as an old friend.

Mrs. W. F. Christie has recently joined the Propaganda Committee; and I have appointed Mr. Saxe Wyndham, the Chairman of the Miniature Hospital Sub-Committee, to be a member of the Revenue Committee. I am sure we all wish Major Ian Hay Beith, the Chairman of the Mock Trials Sub-Committee, a speedy recovery from his recent operation.

I have now to thank all the members of the various Committees and the Honorary Officers for the splendid work which they do year after year. Mr. Peacock will be presenting the accounts in a minute, and we need hardly say to him how indebted we are for the way in which he discharges his duties as Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee. It is a source of great satisfaction and comfort to us to feel that we have as Treasurer such a very able man.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1932.

Mr. E. R. PEACOCK (the Hon. Treasurer) in moving the adoption of the Accounts, said:—

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I wish first to call attention to some improvements in the form of the Accounts. We have been asked to act as Trustee

by various donors wishing to benefit the hospitals in special ways, and so long as some discretion is given so that the Fund is not asked to act merely as a post-office we are glad to accept such trusts, but as a result our Accounts became rather complicated as it was necessary to include in the statement of Income and Expenditure, an increasing number of special items which made it difficult to bring out clearly the figures relating to the more regular work of the Fund. Our accountants, working in consultation with the auditors, have now simplified the Accounts. There is an Income and Expenditure Account dealing only with the general income, the expenses, the distribution, and the necessary transfers relating to the balances. Receipts for special purposes, including donations and legacies to capital, are dealt with in the Balance Sheet. One special item of £5,000 had to be included in the Income and Expenditure Account for this year, but it will not recur. It appears on both sides of the Account below the totals relating to the Fund's own money. I think you will agree that the simplification is a great improvement.

I now come to the results for the year. His Royal Highness has referred to the narrow margin by which the income covered the increase in the distribution. The total income available for general purposes was £317,000. The expenses amounted to £14,000, leaving £303,000 available for distribution. We had decided to increase the ordinary distribution from £275,000 to £300,000. We required a further £20,000 for the pensions grants, and we had a pensions reserve fund which would provide £17,000 a year for this purpose, for three years. The amount required was thus £320,000, while the sum available was £320,111. Among the receipts which helped to produce this highly satisfactory result, I should like to mention the increased contribution of £20,000 from the League of Mercy, the further £10,000 from the British Charities Association, and the fact that legacies, for the last five years, were in the neighbourhood of £60,000 to £70,000, the figure for 1932 being very nearly £59,000. Dividends and interest show an increase of £8,400 over the previous year, due partly to additions to the invested funds and partly to non-recurrent receipts. The capital fund has increased by £230,000 during the last four years, the additions in 1932 being £6,425.

His Royal Highness has referred to the death of Lady MountStephen, a member of the Council who always took the keenest personal interest in the welfare of the Fund. In addition to the very large sums which he contributed to capital the late Lord MountStephen left his residuary estate to the Fund and as a result our capital will be increased by about £150,000 now, and by a further sum when certain annuities cease.

The Revenue Committee point out in their Report that the amount received by the King's Fund in voluntary contributions has recently averaged £140,000 a year, and if we are to maintain the distribution at its present level we must aim at increasing this amount.

I now have the honour to move the adoption of the Accounts.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Wing-Commander Sir LOUIS GREIG, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1932.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE), in moving the adoption of the Annual Report for 1932 (*see* pages 5 to 12), assured His Royal Highness how very greatly all the members of the Committee and the staff appreciated his goodness in visiting the new offices and taking part in the actual everyday work. They were also greatly indebted to His Royal Highness for having presented the Fund with his portrait to hang in the principal room and also

a portrait of the first President, King Edward, then Prince of Wales. They already had a portrait presented by His Majesty King George when he was Prince of Wales and President.

SOPHY LADY HALL having seconded the resolution, the report was unanimously adopted.

REPORT OF REVENUE COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord LUKE) presented a Report of the Committee on the income of the King's Fund and the Hospitals and the work of the Propaganda Committee, and moved that it be published. (*See* pages 44 to 47).

Lord WAKEFIELD having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The Rt. Hon. J. H. WHITLEY moved a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness not only for his presence at the Council Meeting that day but for the continued interest and the wonderful energy with which he led the whole of the work of King Edward's Hospital Fund. It was to that leadership that the continued success and efficiency of the work was due.

The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir HULBERT WARING), in seconding the motion, assured His Royal Highness that all his efforts were very much appreciated by those who worked in connection with the hospitals.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS (INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £297,000, as against £272,000 last year. As the sum of £3,000 is allocated to convalescent homes not attached to particular hospitals, the total ordinary distribution amounts to £300,000 as against £275,000 in 1931. In addition, £20,000 is assigned to special Pensions grants, making £320,000 in all.

2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is again 147, as in 1931, an application having been received from the Institute of Medical Psychology, while the Ormond Maternity Home is no longer in the list.

3. The hospital accounts upon which this year's distribution is necessarily based are those of 1931. Although the increased financial stringency in that year produced great difficulties for some hospitals, the fear that it would be reflected in an increase in the number of deficits was not borne out. As the Statistical Review shows, 85 hospitals had surpluses on the year's working, and only 57 had deficits; and the net aggregate surplus for the year for all the hospitals amounted to £76,000. It is not possible to say as yet what the position will prove to have been in 1932.

4. In the meantime it is certain that many hospitals must have been facing exceptional difficulties owing to the continuance of the general depression. The Distribution Committee have, therefore, in allocating the additional £25,000 placed at their disposal this year, endeavoured to take into account the special factors bearing upon the present position, in addition to such facts as the increases in occupied beds which are always before them. They wish, moreover, to assure the Council that, had it not been possible to place this relatively large additional sum at their disposal, they would not this year have been able to feel that the distribution was being maintained at a level commensurate with the increased needs of the hospitals for building and maintenance.

5. The grants recommended in aid of maintenance amount to £261,710, as compared with £243,250 in 1931, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure being £35,290, as against £28,750 last year. The special grants towards expenditure on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers come to £20,000, as against £19,313 in 1931.

6. The grants towards schemes of capital expenditure include an exceptional grant of £3,500 to Princess Beatrice Hospital, formerly known as the Kensington, Fulham and Chelsea General Hospital. In the case of this hospital, the completion of the first stage of a scheme of transformation, from a small institution of 19 beds into a general hospital with rather more than 100 beds, coincided with the financial crisis of 1931, and the hospital found itself unable to meet its pressing capital liabilities. In these quite exceptional circumstances the Distribution Committee decided to offer the hospital a sum of £3,500 in reduction of the building debt, on condition that a scheme of financial rehabilitation was carried through. The hospital has succeeded in fulfilling the condition; the grant has been paid and 78 beds have been opened. The fact that a grant on so exceptional a scale has been made this year will, of course, be taken into account at future distributions.

7. The Pensions grants are limited to £20,000 a year, or to 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, whichever may be the smaller, for a period of 7 years; and the Distribution Committee also take into account, within the maximum of £20,000 and subject to certain conditions, expenditure in respect of supplementary pensions for back service and of pensions to retired officers. As was anticipated last year when £19,313 was called for, the point has been reached this year when grants on the scale hitherto followed would slightly have exceeded the maximum sum of £20,000.

8. The Committee desire once again to express their great sense of indebtedness to the Visitors, whose reports are always before them at the distribution meetings. Extracts from their reports are also placed before the Hospital Economy Committee, and enquiries have been made by direction of that Committee into various minor matters mentioned by the Visitors in connection with records and accounts. Extracts relating to subjects such as fire precautions, which might become urgent, are communicated to the hospitals as soon as the reports are received. On various other points the Distribution Committee recommend that extracts should be forwarded with the grants.

9. The Visitors were asked to report specially this year on the facilities available for the X-ray examination of accident cases. This was a question which had recently been brought to the Fund's notice. The Visitors were also furnished with copies of replies from the hospitals to a circular asking the result of the hospitals' consideration of the Report on Waking Hours, issued in May, 1931. As soon as the Distribution is finished, the comments of the Visitors on these two subjects will be considered by the Committee.

10. The Committee have, as usual, examined carefully all schemes of capital expenditure submitted to the Fund in accordance with the well-known request of the Council that schemes should be so submitted before definite action is taken. The Committee have sometimes found that after a scheme has been thus submitted, a hospital has incurred expenditure considerably

in excess of the estimates laid before the Distribution Committee and has subsequently been faced with serious financial difficulties. A special circular was issued in May last making it clear that the Distribution Committee could not, in making their recommendations for grants, take into account any expenditure substantially in excess of the estimates which had been submitted to them, and to which no objection had been taken by the Fund; and that the Fund's expression of opinion on the scheme could not be taken to cover any such additional expenditure. Increased expenditure of this kind may result from increases in the scheme, or from difficulties that could not be foreseen. In either event, the procedure here described leaves it open to the hospital to submit a revised estimate before the additional expenditure is incurred.

11. The Special Pay Beds Sub-committee of the Distribution Committee, to which reference was made in last year's report, have continued to examine such schemes as include the provision of pay beds.

12. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £500 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependants.

13. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule :—

Deptford and Greenwich Babies' Hospital, £350 to rebuilding and extension on new site.

Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, £900 to extension.

Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, £50 to enlargement of verandah.

Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.

National Hospital Queen Square, £250 to extension.

Poplar Hospital for Accidents, £500 to extension of out-patient department.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £250 out of £1,000 to additional beds and nurses' accommodation.

Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital, £250 to extension of out-patient department.

St. John's Hospital, Lewisham, £250 to new children's ward, to be the last £250 to open free of debt.

South Eastern Hospital for Children, £400 to new casualty department and pay beds.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed, and that, of the grants to the Deptford and Greenwich Babies' Hospital, £150 should be transferred to the scheme for new premises and £200 be held in reserve.

2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 56, as compared with 57 last year.
3. The Committee have continued to take into account the extent to which medical or nursing care or treatment is provided for the patients.
4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.
5. The lists of grants is appended.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1932.

1. The Revenue Committee keeps under review not only the revenue of the King's Fund, but the revenue of the Voluntary Hospitals of London. Each year of late, as the financial depression has deepened, apprehensions have been felt as to the extent to which it must be reflected in hospital income. Yet each year the hospitals have done far better than was anticipated, and the results for 1932, so far as they are available, have proved to be no exception.

2. The following figures for the years 1928 to 1931 are taken from the Statistical Review of the work and finance of the London Voluntary Hospitals published annually by the Hospital Economy Committee of the King's Fund:—

3. The figures for 1932 are not yet fully known.* But the net aggregate balance of income over expenditure will almost certainly be even higher than for 1931.

4. Although the fact must not be overlooked that some of the hospitals with deficits are in serious difficulties, the continued excess of total income over total expenditure is striking evidence of the capacity of the voluntary system to surmount the difficulties of the times.

5. The steady increase under the heading of Receipts from Patients—mainly due to the growth of the Hospital Saving Association—shows that patients themselves are increasingly determined to do their part.

6. But the figures of Subscriptions and Donations maintain a remarkably steady level, and it is significant in this connection that the King's Fund itself has been able during the past five years gradually to increase its ordinary annual distribution from £250,000 to £300,000 wholly out of the current income of each year, the amount received towards this from subscriptions, donations and legacies averaging about £140,000.

7. Wonderful results have thus been secured, but they cannot be expected to be repeated year after year unless the public continues to visualise the work that the Voluntary Hospitals are doing and its value to the community, and appreciates the part that the King's Fund plays in their support.

8. The Revenue Committee therefore attach a special value, in these times, to the activities in which the Propaganda Committee, under the inspiring leadership of Viscount Burnham, are engaged, and of which some particulars are given in the following report.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1932.

9. The Propaganda Committee have continued in 1932 their efforts to devise and carry out effective methods of bringing before the public in as striking a manner as possible the many activities of a modern voluntary hospital. No less than five sub-committees have been active during the year, exploring different schemes and organising functions.

10. In their last report the Committee referred to the proposal for a Miniature Hospital, with which they had previously been unable to proceed owing to lack of the necessary funds, and recorded the generous action of Messrs. Humphreys, Ltd., who had rendered the scheme practicable by undertaking to build the shell of the Model at their own expense. On January 1, 1932, a conference was held at Messrs. Humphreys' premises, Knightsbridge, at which Mr. Lionel Pearson, the Architect, was present, and a number of contributing firms were represented, and it was decided to proceed at once with the building of the Model. The work has been continued throughout the year, between thirty and forty firms co-operating in the provision of fixtures and equipment. The Committee have to record with special gratitude the interest graciously shown in their undertaking by Her Majesty the Queen, who not only presented coverlets for two of the miniature bedsteads, but herself paid a visit to the Model while under construction, and expressed her approval of the work. They have also to thank Their Royal Highnesses the Princess Royal and the Duchess of York for similar gifts. Through the generosity of Lord Riddell and the Directors of Country Life, Ltd., an illustrated brochure describing the Miniature Hospital and its contents was printed as a free gift to the Fund, and will be placed on sale wherever it is exhibited. At the end of the year arrangements were well forward for the Model to be shown at the building centre during a "Hospital Week" to be opened by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and later on at the Daily Mail Ideal Home Exhibition. Our thanks are due to Sir Henry Wellcome and Mr. L. W. G. Malcolm for allowing the Model to be housed at the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum while not on exhibition.

11. A highly successful series of Mock Trials was held at the London School of Economics in May and June, in which many eminent persons took part. The Committee are particularly

indebted to Sir William Beveridge, Director of the School, for his constant interest and hospitality, and to Lady Hudson and Mr. Edward Knoblock for special services rendered in connection with this project. The takings amounted to £608, which exceeded all previous efforts, with the exception of 1925, when a debate between Mr. Bernard Shaw and Mr. Hilaire Belloc, at the Savoy Theatre, was included.

12. The Committee have had under consideration the desirability of securing that the relations between the Hospitals and the Newspaper Press should be such as to produce the greatest advantages to both and to the public. A circular letter was addressed to hospitals on the books of the Fund, inviting them to nominate an officer who should be specially authorised to communicate information to the Press; and a printed list was subsequently prepared and sent to the Press Agencies and leading Daily Papers to be displayed in their news-rooms. The Committee understand that this information has been of real assistance to the Press, and they hope it may also help to remove the inconvenience sometimes caused to hospitals by inquiries being addressed to persons not authorised to deal with them.

13. During the year the film, "A Hundred Years of Progress," was reconstructed under the new title of "A Century of Hospital Progress," with a running commentary in place of the old captions and an introductory speech by Lord Burnham.

The film also now contains some new pictures of the Prince of Wales while visiting one of the London hospitals; and the Committee are deeply grateful to His Royal Highness for so graciously permitting these pictures to be taken.

The revised film was shown to the trade at the Prince Edward Theatre on March 20, at the suggestion of the Cinematograph Exhibitors' Association, and, as a result, nearly 100 bookings were subsequently obtained. The Committee also arranged a private view at Messrs. Gaumont's theatre in Wardour Street, which took place on October 12, hospital representatives and others likely to be interested being invited to attend. A letter was received from the Hospital Saving Association which testified to the value of the film as a means of helping to increase their membership.

14. The illustrated lectures to schools, clubs, and other suitable audiences have been continued, and the Committee would like again to express their thanks to the several speakers, to whom it has meant a real sacrifice of time and leisure. Four lectures were given at the Imperial Institute, the last of which, on "Modern Surgery," by Mr. Cecil Rowntree, received wide publicity, and has since been printed in pamphlet form.

15. The Committee gratefully accepted an offer from Mr. W. W. Wakefield, the Rugby international, who in 1927 took part in the promotion of a seven-a-side competition in aid of the Fund, to give to the King's Fund part of the proceeds of a Rugby Union Ball. This took place at the Dorchester Hotel on March 19, and a cheque for £314 7s. 6d. was subsequently handed to the Fund.

16. An interesting series of illustrated lectures on Historic London was given in January and February in aid of the Fund, Mr. Lawrence Tanner describing new discoveries at

Westminster Abbey, and Dr. Mortimer Wheeler recent excavations at St. Albans, Colchester and London ; while the Rev. Canon Alexander spoke on the history and preservation of St. Paul's Cathedral.

17. The Committee are again indebted to Mr. Walter Bell for conducting two parties round the Tower of London during August, and to Col. Burges, V.C., for receiving the visitors and giving an introductory talk. They heard with great regret the announcement of Col. Burges's approaching retirement from the post of Resident Governor, and would like to record their appreciation of his courtesy in arranging these visits, which for several years have proved an especially popular fixture.

18. On November 17, by kind invitation of Lord and Lady Luke, Mr. Walter de la Mare gave a delightful reading from his own poems, at 29, Portman Square. There was a crowded audience, and a silver collection in aid of the Fund realised £23. Lord Luke took the opportunity to speak about the work of the Fund. The Committee are specially indebted to the Poetry Society and to the English Association for sending out cards of invitation to their members.

19. Mr. Macbeth-Raeburn's mezzotint of George Stubbs's famous picture, "Lord and Lady Melbourne and Family," which was referred to in last year's report, was exhibited, by special command of His Majesty the King, at the Summer Exhibition of the Royal Academy, with the words engraved on the plate : "This picture is published in aid of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London." The etching can be seen at Messrs. Henry Graves & Co.'s galleries in Sloane Street, where copies are on sale.

20. Opportunity has been taken to distribute literature relating to the activities of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals at the various functions organised by the Committee throughout the year.

21. The Propaganda Committee wish again to record their thanks to the Press for publicity given to their various undertakings, and to all who have co-operated with them in their continued efforts to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

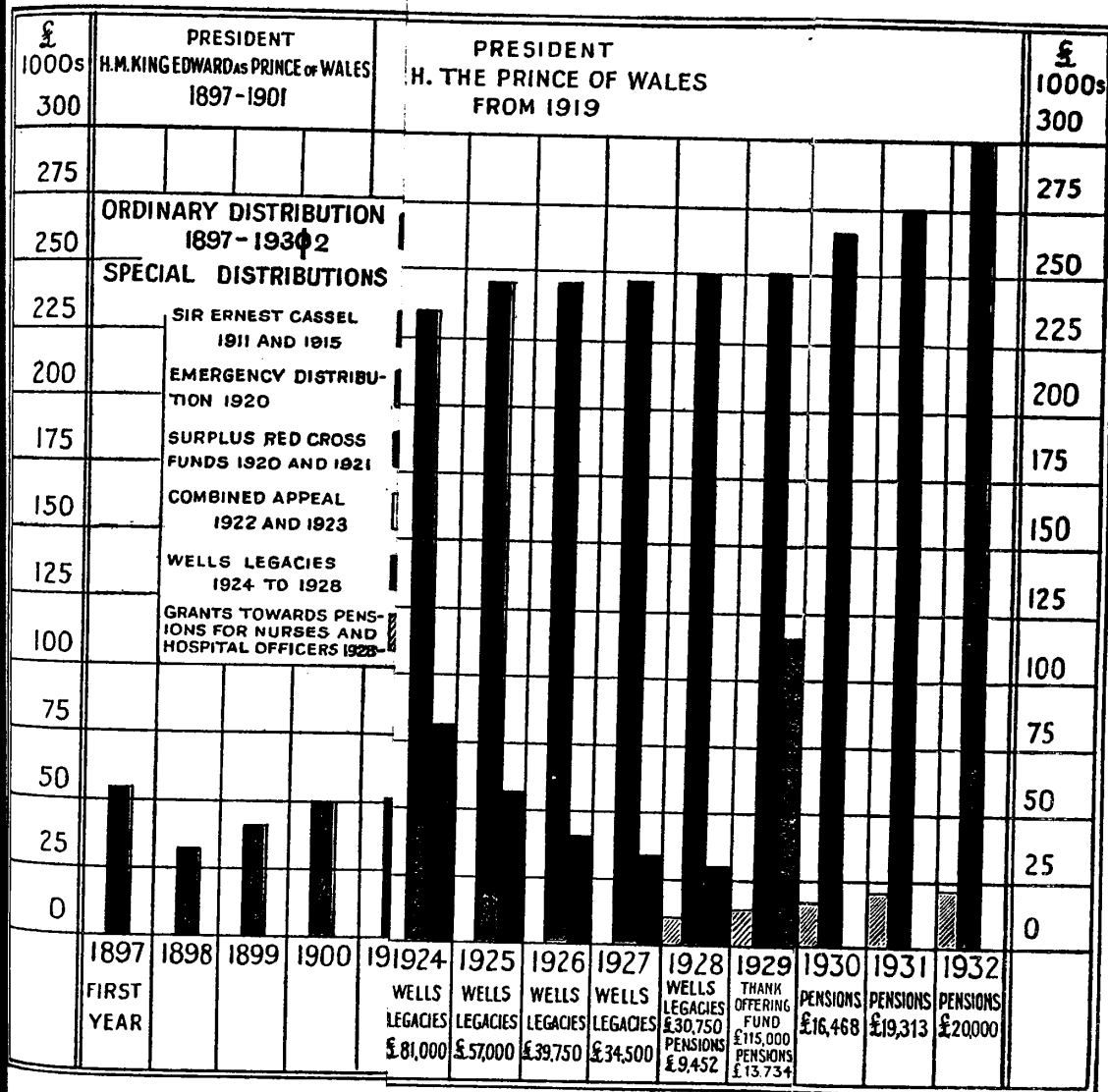

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-five years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £7,380,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1932 being £300,000, besides £20,000 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 16s. 4d. per cent. of the receipts, which is less than 4½d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £484,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-four years, the contribution in 1932 being £20,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

A Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, is prescribed, thus facilitating comparison between the financial positions of the various hospitals. The system also outlines and advocates (without prescribing) the use of such aids to economical working as Quantity Statistics, Budgeting and Costing. Economy is further encouraged by the Fund through its annual publication "The Statistical Summary", which gives particulars of the income and expenditure of each hospital and shows also the volume of work done and the unit cost of working at each. The issue of these Annual Reports has assisted the hospitals to effect considerable saving. (See list of publications below.)

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, the Out-patient Question, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours. An Inquiry has recently been held into Out-Patient Methods as affecting suitability of patients and time of waiting (see pp. 11 and 84).

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1932, being 1,667 at 105 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and £37,000 received through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

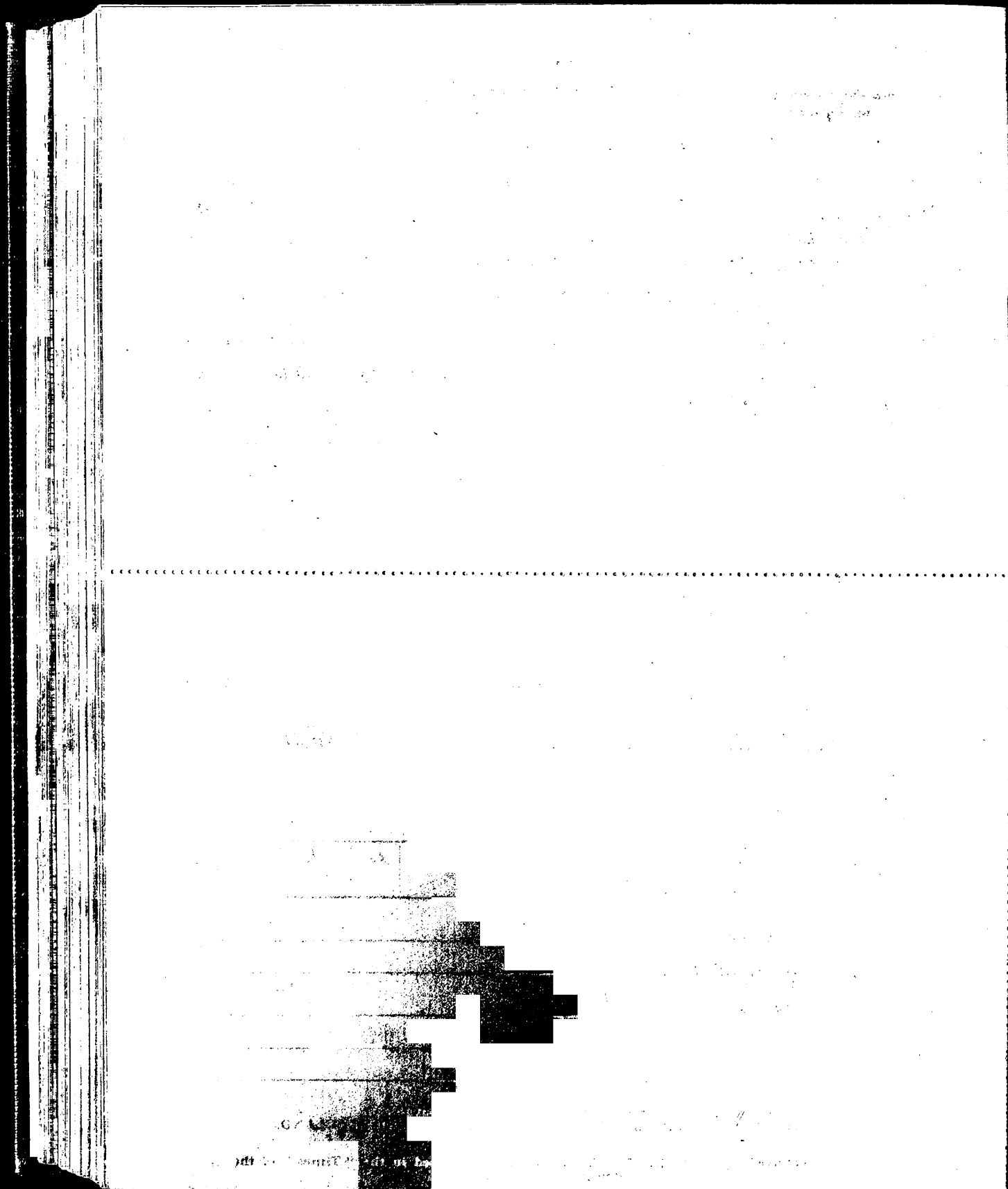

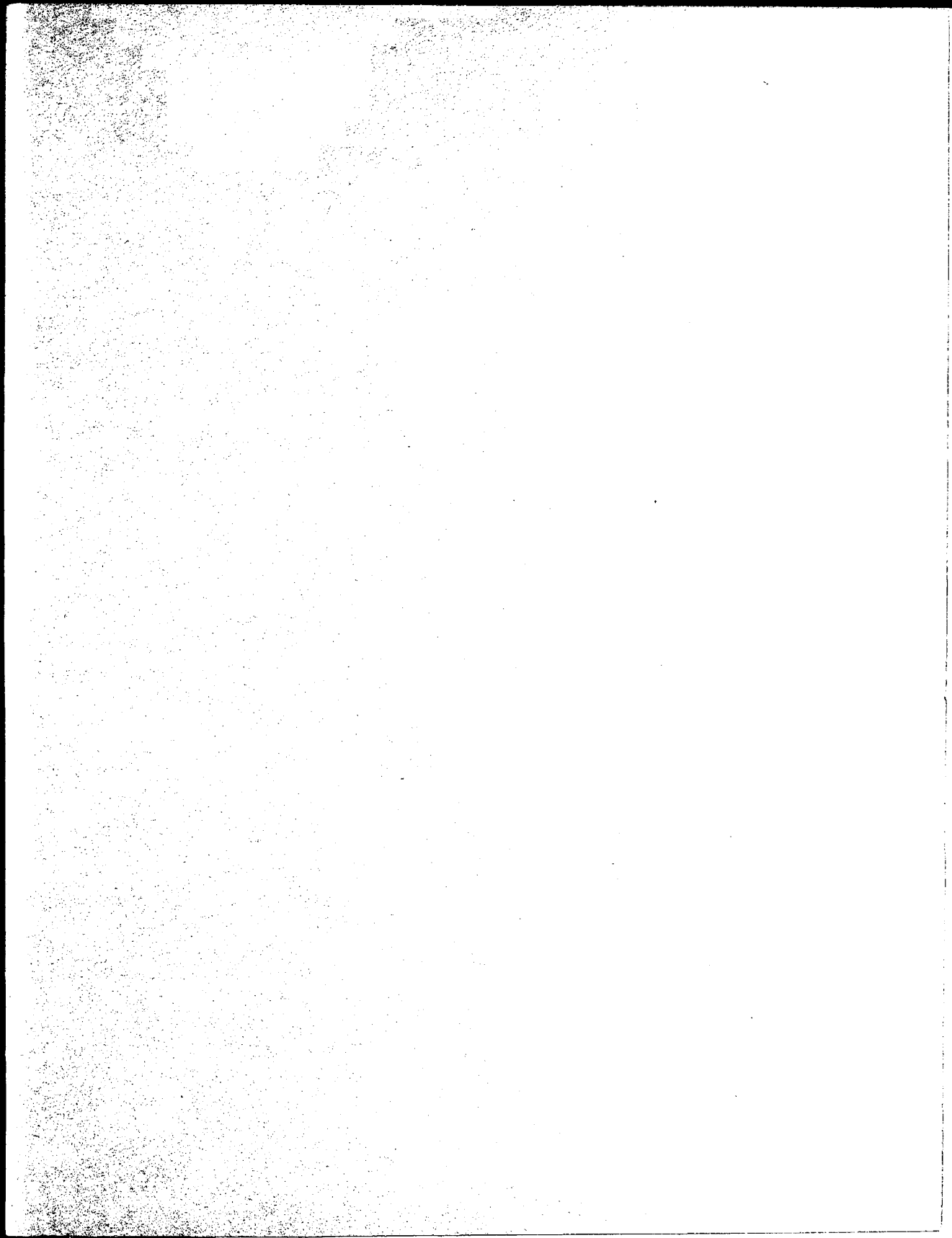

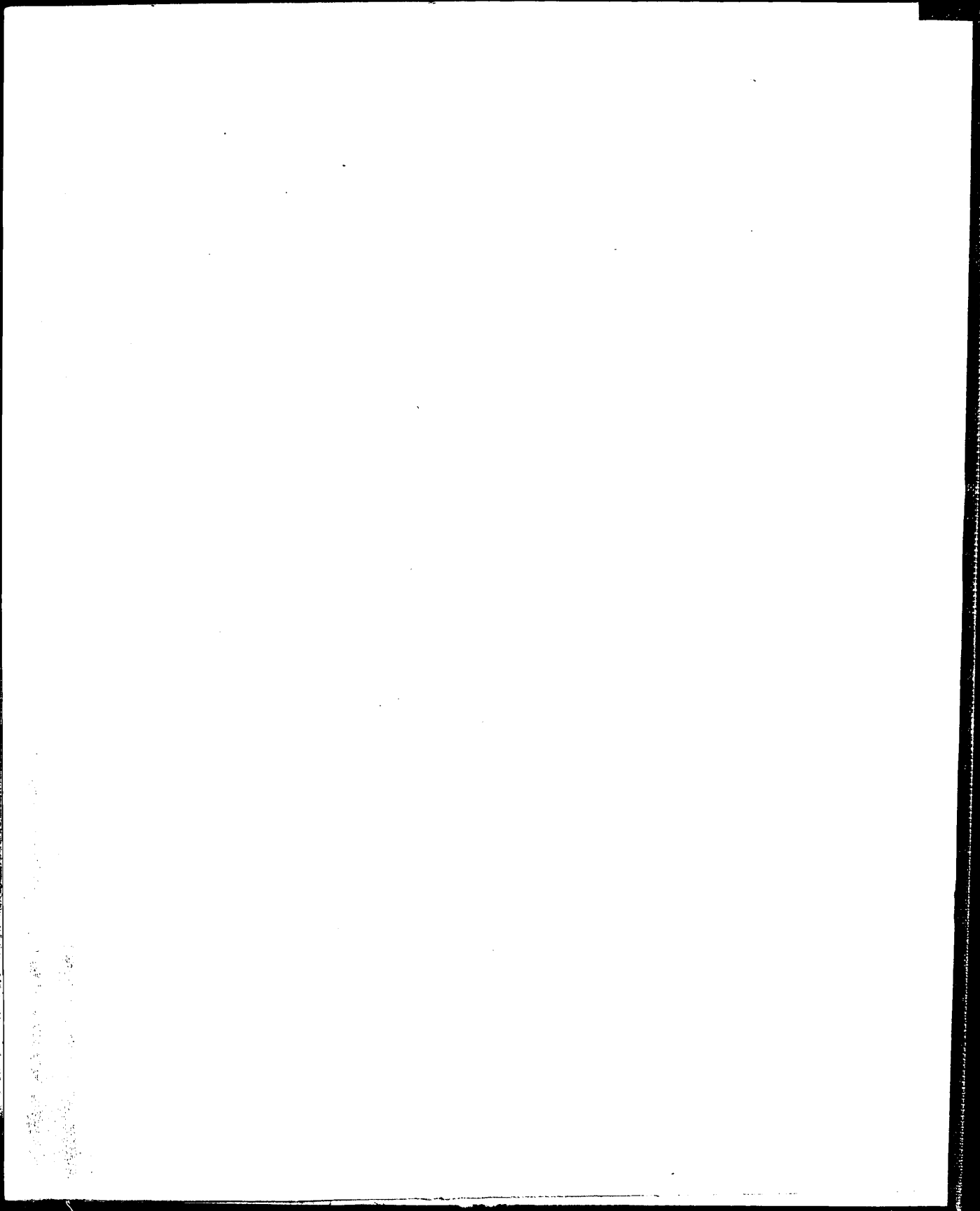
