# KING EDWARD'S HOSPITAL FUND FOR LONDON.

## ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1942.

1. The Fund suffered a grievous loss on August 25, 1942, when His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, President of the Fund, lost his life on duty while on his way to Iceland. He had been President since 1936. A resolution of the General Council expressing its profound sorrow and the gracious reply from His Majesty The King were printed as an inset to the Report for 1941.

2. On October 9, 1942, it was announced that His Majesty The King had been pleased to appoint His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester President of the Fund, the appointment having been recommended by the Lord Chancellor, the Prime Minister and the Governor of the Bank of England, in accordance with the Fund's Act of Parliament.

3. His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, in presiding at the Council Meeting in December, referred to the deep interest in the Fund taken by the Royal Family, in the following terms:—

"The King attaches a very special importance to the claims which this Fund has upon the Royal Family. Looking back over the forty-five years of the Fund's history to the time when it was founded by King Edward VII, we can see how great is our debt to his foresight and initiative. The Metropolitan hospitals were then in danger of collapse—that danger was averted. But something positive was also achieved. My grandfather's strong personal interest in this Fund opened the way to something new in the hospital sphere, to an interchange and pooling of experience among hospital personnel, and to a new conception of the responsibilities of the hospital service as a whole. To-day there is a very general agreement that whatever arrangements are made for the future of the hospital service there are features of the voluntary system which are precious and which must be preserved. It is an achievement of which the Fund may well be proud, to have played a part in maintaining the Voluntary Hospitals and thereby enabled them to make their contribution to the new epoch which is dawning to-day."

### FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF THE YEAR.

4. The total sum distributed among hospitals and convalescent homes during the last ten years is £3,314,353. The total net amount thus disbursed since the foundation of the Fund has now reached £10,694,504.

### KING'S FUND RECEIPTS.

5. The general receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1942 came to £321,961. After allowing for expenses, the amount received exceeded the amount required for distribution and special services by £15,997, which was carried to general fund reserves. This balance was largely due to the decrease in the distribution and to largely increased receipts from legacies. The general income of the King's Fund for the year 1942 was made up as follows:

Receipts earmarked for capital account were £542. A total of £19,069 was also received for various special purposes. The total receipts, therefore, came to £341,572.

6. His Majesty King George VI, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to give an annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty The Queen and Her Majesty Queen Mary were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Gloucester, the late Duke of Kent, the Princess Royal and other members of the Royal Family.

A further gift of £5,000 was received by the Fund for its radium service from a generous donor.

#### GRANTS TO HOSPITALS.

7. The total of the ordinary distribution was limited to £280,000 in view of the heavy expenditure that would confront the hospitals after the war. The Distribution Committee set aside the sum of £5,000 for the purpose of assisting and encouraging groups of hospitals to join together in the establishment of Preliminary Training Schools for Nurses. The details of the distribution are as follows:—

8. The visiting of hospitals by Medical and Lay Visitors was resumed in the year under review, and the reports were of great assistance to the Distribution Committee when considering the claims of the various hospitals.

## BANK OF ENGLAND DISTRIBUTION AND OTHER SPECIAL TRUSTS.

9. The amount specially distributed on behalf of the Bank of England amounted to £2,235 10s. (See page 15.)

The following payments were made out of trust funds earmarked for special purposes, viz., £939 18s. 2d. to the Miller General Hospital, and £787 18s. 4d. to the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital under the Will of the late Sir John Young.

## DISTRIBUTION IN AID OF DISTRICT NURSING WORK FOR HOSPITAL OUT-PATIENTS.

10. The extension of the District Nursing distribution to the outer parts of the Metropolitan Police District took place as from January 1st and brought in twelve more District Nursing Associations. Although the total amount for the seventh distribution remained at £2,000, the amount paid to the Associations on behalf of hospitals represented an increase of 2s. 4d. per patient, in view of decreased numbers of patients.

## EXPENSES.

11. Expenses during the year amounted to £17,073 15s. 4d., or just over 5 per cent. of the total receipts. This sum includes the cost of statistical and other ordinary services for hospitals, expenditure on the collection of funds and all the other activities of the Fund except the special services.

## ACTIVITIES OF THE KING'S FUND DURING THE YEAR.

12. The Co-ordination Committee of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London was concerned with some of the broad questions of policy arising out of the discussions on the future of hospital services, and arrangements were made for the representation of the Home Counties at meetings of this Committee. The Medical Sub-Committee drew up a statement which has since been used as the basis of suggestions put forward to the Ministry of Health jointly by the King's Fund and the British Hospitals Association on behalf of the hospitals. This statement concluded with the following paragraph:—

“In making these recommendations the Committee have had in mind the great benefit which the voluntary hospitals within the ambit of the King's Fund have derived from the existence of the Fund. The system of Visitors, inaugurated by the Fund as long ago as 1898, and the various other measures taken by the Fund, have assisted materially to raise the standard of the individual voluntary hospitals in London. The interchange of information and pooling of ideas thus made possible has largely broken down the isolation of the individual unit while leaving to it freedom and initiative. The Committee feel that this experience points the way to the wider application of the principles which they have embodied in their suggestions.”

13. The Fund continued its assistance to the Ministry of Health in connection with the Survey of the London Voluntary Hospitals. By the end of the year a great majority of the hospitals had returned answers to the questionnaire, and the work of tabulation and summarisation was well in hand.

14. Following discussions with the British Hospitals Association and the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust, steps were taken during the course of the year to transfer to the British Hospitals Association the primary responsibility for the Voluntary Hospitals Parliamentary Committee established by the King's Fund in 1928, and for the War Damage Act Consultative Committee set up in co-operation with the British Hospitals Association and the Nuffield Trust to deal with questions of principle arising out of the interpretation and provisions of the War Damage Act. The King's Fund will continue to be represented on both Committees.

15. Restrictions on paper and printing preclude the usual detailed account of the various departments of the Fund's work. The Nursing Recruitment Committee was able to record the acceptance by hospitals

of some 1,800 candidates, besides dealing with a large number of enquiries. The Nuffield Trust made a grant of £1,500 towards the cost of the Service in recognition of the benefits accruing to the hospitals in the provinces from the work of the Committee.\* The Emergency Bed Service continued to maintain its work despite the abnormal circumstances of war time, and 2,663 cases were dealt with in the course of the year. The Contributory Schemes Committee met regularly and concerned itself with a variety of questions of policy affecting contributory schemes.

16. The Council of the London Association for Hospital Services decided during 1942 not to proceed with a full-cover scheme, but to establish a grant-in-aid scheme as a temporary measure pending the introduction later of a more comprehensive scheme. A scheme, designated the "Hospital Service Plan," was adopted by the Association and came into force on January 1, 1943. The General Council of the Fund, at the meeting on December 15, 1942, approved the action of the Management Committee in guaranteeing the solvency of the Association and its ability to pay subscribers the prescribed rates of benefit for a period of three years as from January 1, 1943, the amount of such guarantee being limited to the sum of £25,000.

## PERSONAL.

17. Early in 1943 the Fund lost two of its oldest and most distinguished friends. Sir Frederick Fry had been intimately associated with the Fund almost since its foundation, and to the end of his life he took a keen and active interest in its activities. Lord Luke had been connected with the Fund from the year 1901, and as an Honorary Secretary since 1928 he had taken a full share in all the Fund's work, particularly in furthering the interests of voluntary hospitals in Parliament: he is greatly missed by his colleagues on the Council and Committees and by his fellow Honorary Secretaries.

## TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII. It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January, 1902.

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (see page 1). The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

On October 9, 1942, His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester was appointed President of the Fund in succession to his brother, His Royal Highness the late Duke of Kent.

## RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :—

- (a) Hospitals situated within the Metropolitan Police District.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within the District, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications below).

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose. The Visiting was suspended in 1940 and 1941, but has been resumed in 1942.
