



REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

For the Year ending 31st December, 1910.

For the second time since the foundation of King Edward's Hospital Fund the General Council have to mourn the loss of a beloved Sovereign and Patron.

The following resolution passed by the Executive Committee on May 12th, 1910, expresses the profound sorrow of all connected with the Fund at the death of His late Majesty King Edward VII., its illustrious Founder:—

- "The Executive Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London on behalf of the General Council desire to record their profound sorrow at the great loss which all those associated with the Fund have sustained by the death of their beloved Sovereign King Edward VII.
- It was on his initiative that the Commemoration of the 60th year of the reign of Queen Victoria took the form of a scheme for the assistance of the Hospitals of London, and the Fund which he thus founded and which bears his name is therefore a lasting monument to his constant sympathy with the poor and suffering.
- To his active personal share in its administration during the years in which he was President, the Fund owed its rapid establishment in public confidence, and he gave repeated assurances of the interest with which he watched its continued progress under his illustrious successor.
- The Committee respectfully desire to tender their deepest sympathy to His Majesty King George V. and His Gracious Consort in the sad bereavement sustained by their Majesties, and to offer the humble assurance of their loyalty and devotion."

As a result of the death of His late Majesty the Fund has also been deprived of the incalculable advantage of the personal supervision and direction of its affairs exercised for nine years by His present Majesty when Prince of Wales and President of the Fund. The Council are glad to report that His Majesty has graciously been pleased to become Patron of the Fund, and to express his unabated interest in all that concerns its welfare.

In June last His Majesty intimated his intention to increase his annual subscription to the Fund from £500 to £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have also been graciously pleased to increase their subscriptions.

During the interval which under present circumstances must elapse before another Royal President can be appointed, the duties of that office are, in accordance with the provisions of the King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty on the recommendation of the Lord Chancellor, the Prime Minister, and the Governor of the Bank of England. Pursuant to this provision, His Majesty has appointed as Governors, His Serene Highness the Duke of Teck, Viscount Iveagh, and the Speaker of the House of Commons.

The total receipts for the year 1910 were £205,169 16s. 2d. This sum was made up as follows:—Donations, £17,767 12s. 2d.; Contributions to Capital, £32,596 12s. 3d. including a legacy of £32,153 19s. od., together with £147 10s. od. net profit on realisation of Securities; Annual Subscriptions, £26,728 16s. 9d.; Contribution of the League of Mercy, £18,000; from the Lewis Estate, £10,000; Legacies (other than Legacies to Capital), £22,941 9s. 8d.; Interest from Investments, £76,935 5s. 4d.; together with £200 from the Trustees of the Bawden Fund.

The amount distributed was £155,000, being an increase of £5,000 over the sum distributed in 1909. Of this the Hospitals received £150,000, while the remaining £5,000 was distributed amongst Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients.

The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria since the foundation of the Fund (after deducting grants to the extent of £5,659 16s. 7d. that have been allowed to lapse) is £1,288,916 8s. 5d.

Since the inauguration of the Fund the amount spent on administration has been £1 4s. 11d. per cent. of the total amount received.

Amongst the Legacies received during the year were payments of £32,153 19s. od. on account of the residue of the estate of the late Mrs. Hames, placed to capital in accordance with the wishes of the testator, £10,000 from the late Miss Elizabeth Chambers, £4,919 10s. 6d. from the late Mr. Richard Clarke, a further £3,200 on account of the Legacy of the late Miss E. S. Wolfe, and £2,000 from the late Miss Ellen Morrison. The Council desires to acknowledge specially the receipt of an annual subscription of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, and an anonymous donation of £10,000.

The amounts received in donations and subscriptions, excluding gifts to capital, show, as compared with 1909, an increase of £7,735 19s 5d.

The League of Mercy has this year contributed £18,000. During the eleven years of its existence the League has furnished in all £153,000 to the Fund. The Council desire to record their grateful appreciation of the labour of the voluntary workers who have contributed towards the collection of this large sum.

Every eligible Hospital and Consumption Sanatorium which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon by the Fund's Visitors, consisting as heretofore of one medical and one layman in each case.

The proposal by the Convalescent Homes Committee to secure beds at Consumption Sanatoria which could be placed at the disposal of Hospitals in London for the accommodation of suitable cases urgently requiring country treatment, has now taken practical shape. Grants have been made on this basis by means of which 18 beds have been secured at three Sanatoria. It is hoped that the scheme may be extended in future, and the Council have authorised the Convalesent Homes Committee, if necessary, to consider applications for grants on suitable terms towards the capital cost of providing beds for the purpose, where this can only be done by means of additions to the existing accommodation.

In January, 1910, the question of the possible advantages of co-operative purchase by Hospitals again came under the consideration of the Executive Committee, largely as the result of the establishment of a scheme of this kind in New York. A Sub-committee, consisting of Mr. John G. Griffiths, F.C.A., Chairman, the Hon. Sydney Holland, and the Hon. Arthur Stanley was appointed to consider the question. The report of this Sub-committee, which suggests the possibility of co-operation by groups of hospitals in different parts of London, has been circulated to the Hospitals with an offer of assistance from the Fund, if desired, in connection with any experiments in this direction.

The same Sub-committee also considered the question of forms of tender, and appended to their report a number of specimen forms.

The annual Statistical Report prepared by the Fund, which began with 16 Hospitals only, has been again enlarged. The report published in 1910 dealt with the expenditure of 99 hospitals, while similar particulars in respect of another group of 8 institutions were circulated privately. With the addition of this group to the published report, the series will deal with nearly every hospital in London which adopts the Revised Uniform System of Accounts, and the assistance which the issue of comparative figures renders towards the achievement of economy will be proportionately increased.

The appointment of the Special Committee to inquire into the method prevailing in the London Voluntary Hospitals with regard to the admission of Out-patients (foreshadowed by

His present Majesty when Prince of Wales and President of the Fund) was definitely announced by the Governors at the meeting of the Council in December. The Council consider that the Fund is fortunate in having obtained the assistance of three such eminent Commissioners as Lord Mersey, the Chairman of the Committee, Lord Northcote, and the Bishop of Stepney, in its efforts to secure a solution of the questions at issue.

The Distribution Committee have continued to make a careful examination of all schemes for the extension or reconstruction of hospitals, submitted in accordance with the request of the Council. The Fund thus uses its best endeavours to ensure that when capital expenditure of this kind is undertaken, due attention is paid to economy, efficiency, the prospect of funds for future maintenance, and the relation of each scheme to the general question of hospital accommodation in London.

The Council desire to place on record their sense of the loss the Fund has sustained by the death of Mr. Hugh C. Smith, who had served the Fund for many years in the various capacities of Trustee, Member of Council, Chairman of Executive Committee, and latterly, Member of Finance Committee. The Council also deeply regret the loss of one of their first members by the death of Sir John Aird.

The President of the Local Government Board, in pursuance of his powers under the Act has appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co. to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year.

The Council are obliged to the Press for the services they have rendered in the past, and continue to rely upon their kindly co-operation in obtaining for the Fund wider publicity and support.

Appendix to Report of the General Council.

A MEETING of the Governors and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria for the present year, was held on December 14th, at St. James' Palace, H.S.H. the DUKE OF TECK being in the chair.

Johnston), the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir Thomas Barlow, Bt.), the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Mr. Henry T. Butlin), the Rt. Hon. Sir Joseph Dimsdale, Bt., the Rt. Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, Bt. (Hon. Secretary), the Rt. Hon. Sir Edgar Speyer, Bt., Lieut.-Col. the Rt. Hon. Sir Arthur Bigge, Sir Trevor Lawrence, Bt., Sir W. S. Church, Bt., Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., Sir Henry Burdett, Sir Horace Marshall, Sir W. J. Collins, Sir Cooper Perry, Sir John Craggs, Mr. J. Danvers Power, Dr. Edwin Freshfield, Mr. Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary), Mr. John G. Griffiths, Mr. William Latham, K.C., Professor W. Osler, and Mr. Albert G. Sandeman.

The minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, HIS SERENE HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF TECK said: My Lords and Gentlemen,—This is the first distribution meeting of the Council since the sad event in May last, when the fund suffered such an irreparable loss by the death of the Founder and Patron whose name it bears. The resolution which was passed by the Executive Committee at the time, and which has been placed on record in the minutes which have just been read, expresses both the profound sorrow of the Members of this Council and the feelings of loyalty and gratitude with which they look back upon the work which His late Majesty did for the Fund and the Hospitals of London.

You have heard the gracious letter of acknowledgment, which is also on the minutes, from His present Majesty, who for many years when Prince of Wales presided not only over the meetings of this Council but over the work of the Fund in all its details, and who has since been graciously pleased to become its Patron.

I cannot proceed with the business of this meeting without adding a few words on behalf of myself and my colleagues, Lord Iveagh and the Speaker of the House of Commons. We have been appointed by His Majesty, on the recommendation of the Lord Chancellor, the Prime Minister and the Governor of the Bank of England, in accordance with the Act of Parliament, to the responsible position of Governors of the Fund, and we would express our profound sense of the loss the Fund has sustained, and our intention, so far as in us lies, to endeavour humbly to follow the high tradition which has been established by His late and His present Majesty, until the time comes for the appointment of a new Royal President.

I have now the honour to read to you, on behalf of the Governors, the following letter which has been addressed to us by Sir Arthur Bigge, by direction of His Majesty the King:—

"Buckingham Palace, 12ih December, 1910.

"Dear Sirs,—I am commanded by the King to ask you to convey to the Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, at the Distribution Meeting on Wednesday next, the expression of His Majesty's unabated interest in all that concerns the welfare of the Fund over which he presided for nine years.

"His Majesty, recognising that the prosperity of the Fund is in no small measure due to the manner in which the members of the Council and of the Committees and the Honorary Officials have applied themselves to the administration of the money which the generosity of the public has provided, wishes to express his appreciation of the services which they have rendered to the sick poor, and his earnest hope for the continued success of their efforts.—Yours very truly,

"To the Governors of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London."

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS then said: My Lords and Gentlemen,—I propose that a vote of humble thanks be tendered to His Majesty for his gracious letter and for the continued interest which he has taken in the working of the Fund.

The Speaker of the House of Commons said: Your Serene Highness, My Lords and Gentlemen,—I rise to second the motion which you, Sir, have just made, and I am sure that it needs no further words from me to add to those which you have just spoken. We are all so thoroughly acquainted with the deep and abiding interest which His Majesty has always taken in this Fund, that we are thankful to him for his gracious expressions, and we sincerely hope that he will continue, as we are assured he will, to feel that interest in the future which he has so unmistakably shown in the past in the proceedings of this Council and of the Fund. I have much pleasure in seconding the Resolution.

The Resolution was carried unanimously.

SIR SAVILE CROSSLEY reported letters of regret from the following: The Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London (The Duke of Fife), The Bishop of London, the Bishop of Southwark, The Earl of Bessborough, Lord Rothschild, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, Lord Farquhar, The Master of Elibank, M.P., The Postmaster-General (the Rt. Hon. Herbert Samuel, M.P.), The President of the Local Government Board (The Rt. Hon. John Burns, M.P.), The Chairman of the County Council (Mr. W. Whitaker Thompson), The Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton, M.P., Sir Everard Hambro, and Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan, jun.

In the absence of LORD ROTHSCHILD (Honorary Treasurer), LORD REVELSTOKE reported that the amount received by the Fund to the 10th December, after payment of expenses, was £146,584 10s. od. The Fund had also received an interesting legacy during the year in the residue of the estate of Mr. Matyear, consisting of market garden property in Fulham, which was being put up for sale that very day.

SIR HENRY BURDETT stated that these were difficult times for an organisation like The League of Mercy—the members of which consisted of the most serious and thrifty members of the community. Further, they had had, in the golden period of the year, an interference with all the work of voluntary effort which was most unusual, almost unique, in the history of this country. He was therefore not in a

position that day to state precisely the sum that the League would be able to give. But, having gone carefully into the figures, he had every confidence that, when the time arrived for drawing the cheque, the Governors and Council of this Fund would have good reason to be satisfied with the amount.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir William Church) read the Report of that Committee, and Sir Savile Crossley (Honorary Secretary) presented the List of Awards.

The Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee (Mr. WILLIAM LATHAM, K.C.) read the Report of that Committee, and Mr. Frederick M. Fry (Honorary Secretary) presented the List of Awards.

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF TECK, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Awards, said: -My Lords and Gentlemen, -I think that the Reports which have just been read, and the statement which has been made by Lord Revelstoke, afford gratifying evidence of the continued progress of the Fund. The invested Capital is now very considerable, and we are much indebted to the eminent men of business on the Finance Committee, who look after these investments for us. But the income from investments provides less than half the amount distributed, and for the balance we rely upon the support of the charitable public, including the contributions collected by the League of Mercy. Among the amounts received during the year, I would mention, with special gratitude, the sum of £500 received from His Majesty, the Patron of the Fund, in augmentation, from £500 to £1,000, of the annual subscription he gave when President; and also the annual subscription of £100, with which H.R.H. the Prince of Wales has signified his interest in the Fund. The receipts also include an annual subscription of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, and an anonymous donation of £10,000. The amount distributed has again been increased. Last year we reached, for the first time, a total sum of £150,000. This year we give £150,000 to the Hospitals alone making, with £5,000 to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes, a total of £155,000. We have thus left behind our original goal of £150,000, and, in response to the necessarily increasing demands upon us, we have begun a fresh advance. The Report of the Distribution Committee shows the care taken by the Committee to allot the grants as far as possible in due relation to the circumstances and claims of the various Hospitals, as revealed by the accounts, the Visitors' reports, and the other evidence before the Committee. I would particularly draw attention to the grants for special purposes. In practically every case where such a grant is at all large, you will see that a scheme has been submitted by the Hospital and carefully examined by the Committee. This practice ensures that the Fund knows and approves of the manner in which the grant is going to be spent. The fact that so many special grants are recommended shows that the Hospitals generally are not in the habit of proposing unreasonable schemes for locking up money in bricks and mortar, and that the Fund does not discourage reasonable schemes of extension or improvement. You will have noticed that the Report calls special attention to the grants by which two Hospitals in the very poor districts in the far East of London are enabled to open their new buildings free of debt. You will also notice that questions have arisen during the past two years as to the exact method of applying the recommendations of Sir Edward Fry's Committee on the subject of Hospitals and Medical Schools. It is, and has always been, the intention of the Fund to carry out the recommendations of that Committee in the letter and in the spirit. And you will, I am sure, be glad to see that the Distribution Committee is giving such careful attention to this matter, and that their attitude is based upon the exact terms of the Report of Sir Edward Fry's Committee. The Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee shows that the scheme which they originated for placing beds at Consumption Sanatoria, by means of grants from the Fund, at the disposal of patients in London Hospitals who urgently need country treatment, has

now taken practical shape. A beginning can, if the Council approve, be made on January 1st next with eighteen beds in three different Sanatoria. It is proposed that most of these beds should be allotted to the two Consumption Hospitals which have no country branches of their own, and the remainder to two of the largest general Hospitals. It was not possible to secure any more beds without making capital grants. But the Committee propose, if you adopt their Report, to consider applications for capital grants another year. If the scheme on its present small scale is successful, it might be thus enlarged. The Committee would, of course, take due precautions to ensure that any arrangement made should be fair to London, while the Sanatoria would doubtless see that it was fair to the localities for which they were originally founded. The work of the Executive Committee is not the less important and responsible because it does not form the subject of a detailed report at this meeting. It has included this year a consideration of the question of Hospital contracts. It has often been suggested that it would be an advantage for the Hospitals of London to enter into joint contracts, and thus secure the advantages of purchasing on a larger scale than they now do as separate buyers. Some correspondents have considered the advantages so obvious, and the difficulties so insignificant, that they have severely criticised the Hospitals for not having adopted the principle long ago. It so happens that last year a scheme was actually started in New York, and the Executive Committee thought that this would be a good opportunity to appoint a sub-committee to inquire into the subject, and ascertain whether the Fund could usefully take any action in the matter-This was done, with the approval of H.R.H. the President, and the report of the sub-committee, of which Mr. John G. Griffiths acted as Chairman, has recently been issued. I hope that the careful statement which it contains, of the possible advantages and difficulties of co-operative purchase by groups of independent voluntary Hospitals, may be of assistance to the Hospitals which are now trying this experiment, or which may be thinking of doing so; and that it may satisfy the public that the possibilities of economy in this direction have not been overlooked. The sub-committee has also prepared a schedule of specimen forms of tender for Hospital contracts, and it is hoped that this also will prove to be of assistance to many of the Hospitals in securing economical buying. The particulars as to prices and cost of working, collected and circulated by means of the Statistical Report published annually by the Fund, have been of great use in connection with this inquiry. I am glad to see that these Statistical Reports, which have in the past produced such excellent results in the direction of economy, have again been enlarged, and now deal with the accounts of nearly one hundred Hospitals. Before moving the adoption of the Reports, I would express on behalf of my fellow Governors and myself our thanks to the members of the various Committees and to the Honorary Officers, including the Visitors who have inspected the Hospitals and the Consumption Sanatoria on behalf of the Fund. I may say that during the short time that we have occupied our present position we have been impressed by the number of committee meetings whose minutes come before us, and by the variety of the business dealt with. They form a striking illustration of the way in which, under the supervision and encouragement of its two illustrious Presidents, the Fund has grown not only in financial magnitude but also, still more remarkably, in the number and importance of its administrative functions. I feel sure that the Council and Committees will assist the Governors in the common effort to ensure that the Fund shall continue to receive, and to merit, the confidence of the King and of the

I now beg to move the adoption of the Reports.

The CHIEF RABBI (the Rev. Dr. Adler), in seconding the adoption of the Reports, said that he was sure that all members of the Council were impressed by the very valuable analysis with which His Serene Highness had favoured them. The value of this Fund consisted, not merely in the financial help which

it gave to the various struggling Hospitals, but also in the most excellent advice which the Fund gave as to the way in which the Hospitals might be enabled to combine economy with efficiency, and the valuable hints in regard to remedying evils and introducing still further improvement. It was a source of gratification to him to know that the efficiency of the various Consumption Sanatoria would be increased, and that next year it was intended to entertain applications for capital grants to these indispensably necessary institutions.

After discussion, the adoption of the Reports was put and carried.

On the motion of Sir Trevor Lawrence, seconded by Sir John Craggs, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Tuesday, December 20th, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds in Consumption Sanatoria during 1911, which should be posted on January 3rd.

The Executive Committee having reported that it had been the custom at the Distributing Committees that a member should absent himself from the Committee during any discussion of the affairs of an Institution with which he was in any way identified, the Council, on the motion of Mr. John G. Griffiths, seconded by Lord Sandhurst, passed a resolution embodying this custom in a rule.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1911.

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF TECK then said: My Lords and Gentlemen, -It was the practice of the President to announce at this meeting his intentions with regard to the appointment of the General Council and Committees for the coming year. I will therefore state briefly the proposals of the Governors. Before doing so I must allude to the great loss the Fund has sustained during the year in the death of Mr. Hugh C. Smith, who had served for so many years as a Trustee, Member of the Council, Chairman of the Executive Committee, and latterly Member of Finance Committee. We have also lost by death the very valuable services of Mr. John Langton as one of the Visitors of the Fund. With regard to the General Council, we propose to re-appoint the whole of the members as at present, and the same with the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee. On the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, we propose to re-appoint the present members, except that Mr. Partington, who to his great regret has been prevented by ill-health from taking a full share in the very arduous work of the Distribution Committee, will join the Convalescent Homes Committee, as also will Sir William Bennett, and that Mr. Leonard Cohen will be appointed to the Distribution Committee. The Visitors are appointed later on in the year. Last March His Majesty the King, then President of the Fund, expressed the hope that the proposed Committee of Inquiry into the Out-patient question would be appointed before the close of this year, and would begin its work early in 1911. I have great pleasure in stating that we have been fortunate enough to secure the services of three eminent Commissioners-Lord Mersey (who will be Chairman of the Committee), Lord Northcote, and the Bishop of Stepney. You will remember that the President also indicated that the function of the proposed Committee would be to inquire into the method prevailing in the London Voluntary Hospitals with regard to the admission of Out-patients. The Executive Committee have recommended that this function should be expressed in the following terms of reference, which only await your confirmation :-

"To consider and report generally as to the circumstances and conditions under which Patients are admitted to the Casualty and Out-patient Departments of the London Voluntary Hospitals, and

especially as to what precautions are taken to prevent the admission of persons who are unsuitable, and as to whether adequate provision is made for the admission of such persons as are suitable; and to make such recommendations as may seem to them desirable."

I trust that this inquiry will do much to settle this very important and much-discussed question. I have now to ask you to consider the delegation resolutions which have been circulated, and which lie on the table. If they are approved, they will only need to be confirmed at the formal meeting which must be held for the purpose in the New Year.

On the motion of Sir Thomas Barlow, seconded by Sir John Craggs, a resolution was passed, delegating powers to the Finance, Distribution, and Convalescent Homes Committees.

On the motion of Lord Iveagh, seconded by Sir Joseph Dimsdale, a resolution was passed, delegating powers to the Out-patient Inquiry Committee.

On the motion of Mr. J. Danvers Power, seconded by Mr. Albert G. Sandeman, a resolution was passed, delegating powers to the Executive Committee.

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS then moved the following resolution, which was seconded by The Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. Reginald E. Johnston), and carried:—"That the keys of the lock under which the Corporate Seal is kept be held as follows:—One of the three keys comprising one triplicate set shall be held respectively by the Earl of Bessborough, the Lord Rothschild, and Mr. Frederick M. Fry, and one of the three keys comprising the other triplicate set shall be held respectively by the Lord Revelstoke, the Rt. Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, Bt., and Mr. John G. Griffiths."

The LORD MAYOR (Sir T. Vezey Strong) proposed a vote of thanks to His Serene Highness for presiding. The resolution was seconded by Professor OSLER, and carried unanimously.

THE DUKE OF TECK, in acknowledging the resolution, said,—I feel it a great honour to have been appointed one of the Governors of the Fund, and I trust that I shall be able worthily to fulfil the duties of that office.

The proceedings then terminated.

The Annual Meeting of the Governors and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the accounts and the report of the General Council for the year 1910, was held at St. James's Palace, on March 28, 1911, His Serene Highness the DUKE OF TECK being in the chair.

Those present were:—The Viscount Iveagh, and the Speaker of the House of Commons (the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, M.P.), the Bishop of London, the Rev. T. Bowman Stephenson, D.D., the Chief Rabbi (the Rev. Dr. Adler), the Earl of Bessborough, Lord Rothschild, Lord Revelstoke, the President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor), the President of the

Royal College of Surgeons (Mr. Henry T. Butlin), the Rt. Hon. C. Stuart-Wortley, K.C., M.P., the Rt. Hon. Sir Ernest Cassel, the Rt. Hon. Sir Joseph Dimsdale, Bt., the Rt. Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, Bt. (Hon. Secretary), Lieut.-Col. the Rt. Hon. Sir Arthur Bigge, Sir W. S. Church, Bt., Sir Henry Burdett, Sir Horace Marshall, Sir W. J. Collins, Sir Cooper Perry, Sir John Craggs, Mr. J. Danvers Power, the Rev. Canon Barnett, Dr. Edwin Freshfield, Mr. Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary), Mr. William Latham, K.C., and Mr. Albert G. Sandeman.

The Minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, letters of regret were reported from the following: The Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London (the Duke of Fife), the Duke of Norfolk, the Bishop of Southwark, the Rt. Hon. the Master of Elibank, M.P., the Postmaster General (the Rt. Hon. Herbert Samuel, M.P.), the President of the Local Government Board (the Rt. Hon. John Burns M.P.), the Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. Reginald E. Johnston), the Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton, M.P., the Rt. Hon. Thomas Burt, M.P., the Rt. Hon. Sir Edgar Speyer, Bt., Sir Trevor Lawrence, Bt., Sir Julius Wernher, Bt., and Mr. John G. Griffiths.

Lord Rothschild (the Honorary Treasurer) in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st December, 1910, said it would be noticed that they had distributed last year no less a sum than £155,000. He ought to state that they became possessed of the reversion of an estate, and one of the annuitants enjoying the income during her lifetime died after a long illness, the expenses of which could hardly have been met without assistance from the Fund. The Council were advised that the Fund could not be drawn upon for this, but one subscriber was good enough to authorise a portion of his subscription to be devoted to the purpose, and that was done. In connection with the Balance Sheet it should be stated that the income derived from non-trust funds was £17,000 in excess of what it would have been if the money had been invested in trust funds. In dealing with these large sums, the total expenditure was only £3,000, or $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. upon the revenue.

The DUKE OF TECK formally moved the adoption of the Accounts.

The resolution having been seconded by the Lord Mayor (Sir T. VEZEY STRONG), was then put and carried unanimously.

Sir Savile Crossley (Hon. Secretary) presented the Draft Report of the Council for the year 1910.

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF TECK, in moving the adoption of the Report, said:—My Lords and Gentlemen,—It was the custom of His present Majesty, when Prince of Wales and President of the Fund, to review the events of the year, not at this Annual Meeting, but at the Distribution Meeting in the previous December. I propose to follow this practice, and as at the last meeting I mentioned all the principal points dealt with in the Annual Report which has just been read, I will now only make a brief allusion to one subject—the Special Committee on the Out-patient question. That Committee, under the able chairmanship of Lord Mersey, has been sitting regularly since January, and has made considerable progress with the receipt of evidence. I am sure we are much indebted, not only to the three Commissioners who are devoting so much time and trouble to this important work, but also to the numerous witnesses, both hospital representatives and others interested in the question, who are giving the Committee the benefit of their special knowledge and experience. I now beg to move the adoption of the Report.

The EARL OF BESSBOROUGH seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Sir WILLIAM CHURCH moved the adoption of the Report of the Distribution Committee upon the question of the suspended grant to St. George's Hospital as follows, viz. :—

At the meeting of the Governors and General Council on December 14, 1910, the Rep ort of the Distribution Committee was adopted, recommending that a grant of £2,000 should be made to St. George's Hospital, but that the grant should be retained until the Fund was satisfied that the relations between Hospital and Medical School were in accordance with the principles intimated by the Fund n May, 1909, and that the general account of the Hospital in respect of 1909, as well as 1910, was clear from any payment on account of medical education (see page 20, Report of Distribution Committee, paragraph 10).

The Distribution Committee have been in communication with the Authorities of the Hospital, and a Sub-Committee of their members has visited the Hospital and inspected the Clinical Laboratories, Museum, and School Buildings, and they now desire to lay before the Governors and General Council the following report:—

The payments by the Hospital in 1909 in respect of the specific work in question consist of the following items:—Salaries, £1,075; Cash payment, £550; Rent remitted, £250, Total £1,875. The Committee decided at the outset to make enquiries as to the cost of similar work at other Hospitals, for it is evident that if the cost to the Hospital of the laboratories is largely in excess proportionately of the cost at other comparable Hospitals, the difference requires investigation.

The Committee therefore endeavoured to obtain information enabling them to compare the cost of work done in the interests of the patients in the Clinical Laboratories at St. George's with that done at similar institutions. In reply to their enquiries they received confidential returns from nineteen Institutions in London and the provinces, including 11 London Hospitals with Medical Schools.

The returns, however, in reference to six institutions were in such a form as to be of no use for the purpose of investigation. From the figures supplied by the remaining institutions and St. George's Hospital it appeared that the cost of laboratory investigations, etc., at St. George's Hospital worked out at about two and a half times the average, if St. George's was included, or slightly over two and three quarter times, if St. George's was excluded.

Differences of cost in this connection may be due either to differences in the relative amount of the total expenditure on the laboratory work or to differences in the method of its apportionment as between Hospital and Medical School. At St. George's the sum paid by the Hospital appears from the returns submitted to represent about four-fifths of the total cost, while the School pays about one-fifth.

Before discussing these figures it appears necessary to place before the Council certain changes which have taken place at St. George's Hospital and its Medical School since Sir Edward Fry's Committee reported.

Up to the year 1906 the laboratories attached to the Hospital were used by the School for the purposes of teaching the earlier subjects of professional study (Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Anatomy, Physiology and Pharmacology) as well as for any purely hospital work necessary in the interests of the patients.

In 1906 the Medical School decided to abolish the teaching of the preliminary and intermediate subjects of the medical curriculum at the Hospital, and entered into an arrangement with the London University that these subjects should be taught to their students in the laboratories of the University of London.

The changes which have taken place in the medical and surgical treatment of patients during recent years necessitate a much larger amount of laboratory investigation than was formerly the case, and the Governing body of St. George's Hospital decided to retain the Laboratories for purely clinical purposes, in which the work necessary for the treatment of the patients in or attending the Hospital could be carried out, and in which the students at their school could be instructed in the most modern methods of carrying out such investigations.

As a result of an interview with a deputation from the Hospital, the Committee informed St. George's on November 16, 1910, that in their view the method of apportioning the expenses of these laboratories upon which the figures then submitted were based, was faulty, and that the remission of rent to the School should not have been left out of the calculation. The Committee further considered that the payment was excessive, that the apportionment between the Hospital and the Medical School should be revised, and that no payments over and above specific payment for definite work done in respect of the treatment of patients, calculated on the revised method, should be made out of the general fund. On November 30, the Hospital submitted a fresh arrangement of the figures based upon a different method of apportionment and including a payment for rent.

The Distribution Committee have not undertaken a minute examination of this revised basis of apportionment, nor do they desire to call in question the bona-fides of those responsible for it, though the position may be maintained that the larger part of the expenses of the Pathological Museum should not be borne by the Hospital, that a reasonable rent should be charged for the use by Students of the Hospital laboratories and the School buildings, and, finally, that the department of clinical investigation may have been planned and staffed upon its present basis, not only for the benefit of patients, but as an attraction to Students to join the Hospital.

Instead of entering upon these highly contentious topics, the Distribution Committee prefer to base their report upon the broad ground of comparative cost, and as there is no reason to suppose that the work done at St. George's differs markedly in quality or quantity from that done at other London Hospitals of equal repute, they have come to the conclusion that the Fund ought to mark its disapproval of an expenditure so far in excess of the average, whether such excess arises from extravagance, from a contribution to the Medical School, or from the Clinical laboratories being designed not only for Hospital requirements, but also for purposes of research.

In making this recommendation, however, the Committee desire to state that in their opinion the certificate given to the Fund by the Treasurer of St. George's Hospital, to the effect that no payments have been made to or on account of the Medical School for the purposes of medical education, was given in absolute good faith. In a matter of such complexity, the Committee are not surprised to find that different conclusions as to the proper apportionment of this expenditure should have been reached by different persons, whose bona-fides is equally unquestioned. Their own conclusion, arrived at after a very careful

consideration of all the aspects of the problem, is that a larger fraction of the expenditure on the Clinical laboratories and the School buildings should have been borne by the School, and that the School should repay to the Hospital in respect of the year 1909 (and if necessary 1910), the difference between the sum of £1,000 and the charge borne by the Hospital in respect of specific work done for the Hospital patients, which amounted in 1909 to £1,875.

Sir Ernest Cassel seconded the adoption of the Report.

In reply to a question by Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, Sir WILLIAM CHURCH pointed out that the adoption of this Report did not involve any departure from the rule passed by the Council in accordance with the recommendation of Sir Edward Fry's Committee, viz., that no grant should be made to any Hospital which made payments to or on account of its Medical School out of general funds subscribed for the relief of the sick poor.

The motion having been supported by Sir Henry Burdett, was put and carried unanimously.

The BISHOP OF LONDON, in moving a vote of thanks to the Duke of Teck for presiding, said there was no one in whom the Council had more confidence, and no one who took greater interest in Hospital work.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. C. Stuart-Wortley, and carried unanimously.

HIS SERENE HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF TECK having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Report of the Distribution Committee.

- (1) The Governors and General Council having this year placed the sum of £150,000 in the hands of the Committee with a view to distribution amongst the London Hospitals, as against £147,000 in 1909, the Committee beg to report as follows:—
 - (2) The number of Hospitals applying for grants is 106, as against 104 last year.
- (3) With regard to the Throat, Nose, and Ear Hospitals, the Committee recommend that the policy of setting aside grants towards amalgamation in place of separate awards to any of the four Institutions concerned should still be continued, and they have voted £2,000 this year to this purpose. No general scheme of amalgamation has been submitted by the Hospitals during the year for the consideration of the Fund, and the Committee would have recommended that the grant of £3,000 made in 1908 should lapse in accordance with the condition attaching to grants which remain for two years unapplied, had they not been informed that the possibility of a practicable arrangement between certain of the Hospitals was under consideration. They accordingly recommend that the grant of £3,000 made in 1908 should be renewed for this year. The total sum held in reserve, in respect of annual grants, towards a general scheme of amalgamation now amounts to £7,500 in addition to the capital grant, amounting under certain conditions to at least £10,000, promised by the Fund.
- (4) The following grants made in 1908 for special purposes and retained in accordance with the practice of the Fund still remain unapplied:—

General Lying-in Hospital, £100 to surgical equipment.

London Lock Hospital, £1,500, being the balance of a grant to the rebuilding of the Outpatient Department in Dean Street.

Miller General Hospital, £989, being the balance of a grant to extension.

West End Hospital for Diseases of the Nervous System, £1,000, granted to rebuilding, subject to the scheme being submitted and approved.

Wimbledon Cottage Hospital, £50 to improvements.

The Committee recommend that the unpaid grants of the General Lying-in Hospital, the London Lock Hospital, the Miller General Hospital, and the Wimbledon Cottage Hospital should be renewed. In the case of the West End Hospital the Committee are informed that the proposal before the Fund in 1908 for the rebuilding of the Hospital on the site acquired for the purpose in Bulstrode Street has been abandoned, and that the site is for sale. No alternative scheme has yet been submitted, and the Committee recommend that the grant should therefore lapse.

- (5) The Committee have again had before them several schemes for improvements or extension submitted by Hospitals in accordance with the resolution of the General Council to that effect. To some of these the Committee have raised no objection, while in other cases they have been able to make suggestions which have been welcomed by the Hospital authorities. It will be seen from the list of awards that in many cases grants in aid of schemes passed by the Committee have been recommended.
- (6) The Committee have as usual taken care that the needs of the poorer districts in the outlying parts of London should receive their due share of consideration, and that allowance should be made, where necessary, for the difficulty of maintaining adequate hospital accommodation in these parts. In addition to maintenance grants on the scale determined by the circumstances of the various Hospitals, the Committee have recommended capital grants in several cases where schemes of improvement have been sanctioned. Amongst these are final grants of £1,000 to the rebuilding of St. Mary's Hospital for Women and Children, Plaistow, and £5,000 to the extension of the West Ham Hospital, which will enable both these schemes to be completed, and the much-needed accommodation rendered available at the earliest possible moment, free of debt.
- (7) While regretting the failure of the negotiations for the substitution of a single scheme for the rebuilding proposals of the Hospitals at North Wimbledon and South Wimbledon, the Committee recommend that a building grant should be made to each institution of the amount indicated in the list of awards.
- (8) The sum of £5,000 voted towards the removal of King's College Hospital to South London increases the total amount contributed by the Fund to this object to £37,000.
- (9) The Committee are glad to learn that a scheme has been prepared by the Convalescent Homes Committee for rendering a certain number of beds in Consumption Sanatoria in the country available for patients direct from London Hospitals, more especially from Consumption Hospitals which have no country branches of their own. The Distribution Committee have always viewed with special satisfaction the facilities possessed by Consumption Hospitals which have country branches for the transfer of suitable cases to surroundings more favourable to recovery; and they welcome any practicable method by which more of such accommodation can be rendered available without charging the funds of a Hospital with the necessity of providing for a large capital expenditure.
- (10) In the case of St. George's Hospital, the Committee have had under their special consideration the appearance, in the general accounts of the Hospital for 1909, of certain payments to the School which were stated to be for work done for the Hospital and which were formerly paid out of a discretionary fund. The enquiries made by the Committee as to the legitimacy of this change confirmed the statement in the Annual Report of the Hospital that the payments in question were made on account of definite work done, chiefly pathological and

bacteriological examinations, in connection with the actual treatment of patients. That is, the payments were for the kind of work which is described in Appendix III. of the Report of Sir Edward Fry's Committee as work which would have to be paid for in any case, and which would have to be taken into account in assessing the payments and receipts on either side.* Such work, moreover, differs entirely from the general benefits, described in paragraphs 13 to 22 of the Report as being conferred by Medical Schools on Hospitals, and as being fairly set off against the benefits conferred by the Hospitals on the Schools. The opinion of the Fund, that, on the principles laid down by Sir Edward Fry's Committee, specific payments for such definite work done in respect of the treatment of patients, whether made to the School or to any other agency, could be charged to the general funds of the Hospital, while no other payments to the School could be so charged, was notified to St. George's, in reply to a question from the Hospital, by the Executive Committee in May, 1909. But on looking into the method by which the amount fairly chargeable to the Hospital on account of this work had been arrived at, the Distribution Committee came to the conclusion that the apportionment of the expenses of the laboratories as between the treatment of patients and medical education required investigation, and they have invited the Hospital to submit further details in order that the Committee may satisfy themselves that the payment made to the School bears a proper proportion to such definite work done for the Hospital.

In the meantime they recommend that the grant to the Hospital this year should be retained until the Fund is satisfied that the financial relations between Hospital and School are in accordance with the principles intimated by the Fund in May, 1909, and that the general account of the Hospital in respect of 1909, as well as 1910, is clear from any payment on account of medical education.

(II) The Reports of the Visitors have again proved of the greatest value to the Committee, and many of their observations have been brought to the notice of the Hospital authorities. The Committee have also continued the practice of drawing the attention of the Hospitals concerned to cases where the excess of cost above the average, as disclosed by the Fund's Statistical Report, seems to call either for specific justification or for greater attention to economy.

The details of the awards to the various Hospitals are appended.

* The following is an extract from this Appendix, which is referred to by Sir Edward Fry's Committee (Report on the Financial Relations between Hospitals and Medical Schools, par. 9) as "the Third Appendix, which we adopt as part of our Report":—

[&]quot;It must be remembered that, apart from these [i.e., the general services rendered by the Schools to the Hospitals], which are separately dealt with in the Report (par. 21), the schools, in most cases, undertake many specific laboratory examinations solely for the purpose of helping the physicians and surgeons to form correct diagnoses in the exclusive interests of the patients, and that these would have to be paid for by the hospitals in any case. Where such examinations are made in a laboratory entirely maintained by a school, it is obvious that, in any exact assessment of the payments and receipts on either side, they would have to be taken into account."

Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

- (1) The Governors and General Council have this year placed the sum of £5,000 in the hands of the Committee with a view to distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria. The amount distributed in 1909 was £4,000, which included £1,000 brought forward from 1908.
- (2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 45 from Convalescent Homes and 8 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 37 and 4 respectively last year.
- (3) The Committee have again received new applications from several Convalescent Homes, to most of which grants are recommended in consideration of the number of London patients admitted during the past year. At the same time the Committee have adhered to their original policy of giving special consideration to the Convalescent Homes closely connected with London Hospitals.
- (4) The increase in the number of Consumption Sanatoria applying for grants is very gratifying. An examination of the applications, however, revealed the fact that, as in previous years, the most urgent need, so far as London patients were concerned, was not for maintenance grants to supplement the income of existing institutions which have secured public confidence, but rather for an increase in the accommodation available without delay for Hospital cases requiring immediate Sanatorium treatment in the country. The Committee are glad, therefore, to report that they have been able to make arrangements in the case of three Sanatoria, for beds to be placed at the disposal of London Hospitals during the year 1911 in return for grants made by the Fund. The total number of beds thus secured amounts to eighteen, situated as follows:
 - 2 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Norfolk.
 - 6 beds at the Northampton Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.
 - 10 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
- (5) In recommending the allocation of these country beds to Hospitals in London the Committee have taken the view that preference should be given (in order of relative size) to the

two Consumption Hospitals which have no country branches, and that the rest of the beds should be divided between the two largest of the general hospitals which apply to the Fund.

They accordingly recommend the following allocation:

- 8 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 4 beds to the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest,
- 3 beds to the London Hospital.
- 3 beds to Guy's Hospital.

The Committee are of opinion that this allocation will afford at the same time the greatest benefit to the consumptive poor and the best method of testing the working of the scheme under varied conditions.

- (6) Should the scheme in its practical working be as successful as there is every reason to expect, the Committee trust not only that further offers of beds on the same terms will be forthcoming, but that the Council will authorise them to consider, subject to proper safeguards, applications for capital grants to provide additional accommodation at existing Sanatoria, to be placed at the disposal of London Hospitals. This might well prove to be an economical method of supplementing the very valuable, but necessarily limited, accommodation which can be provided by means of country branches attached to London Hospitals.
- (7) The Committee are greatly indebted to the Visitors who undertook the task of inspecting the Sanatoria applying for grants, and who thus furnished the Committee with invaluable evidence as to the suitability of the Institutions in which beds have been secured.

The grants recommended to the various Institutions are appended.
