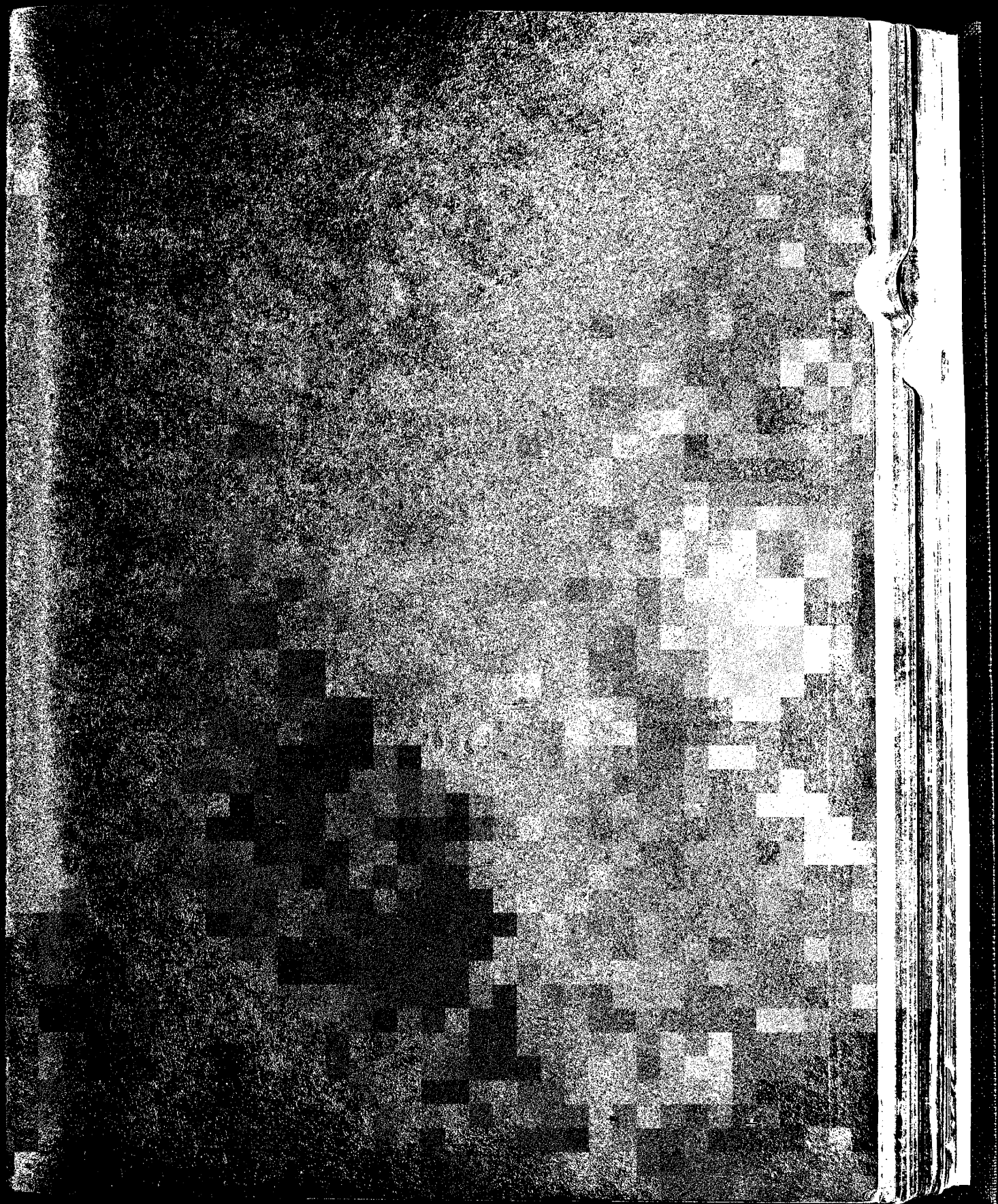

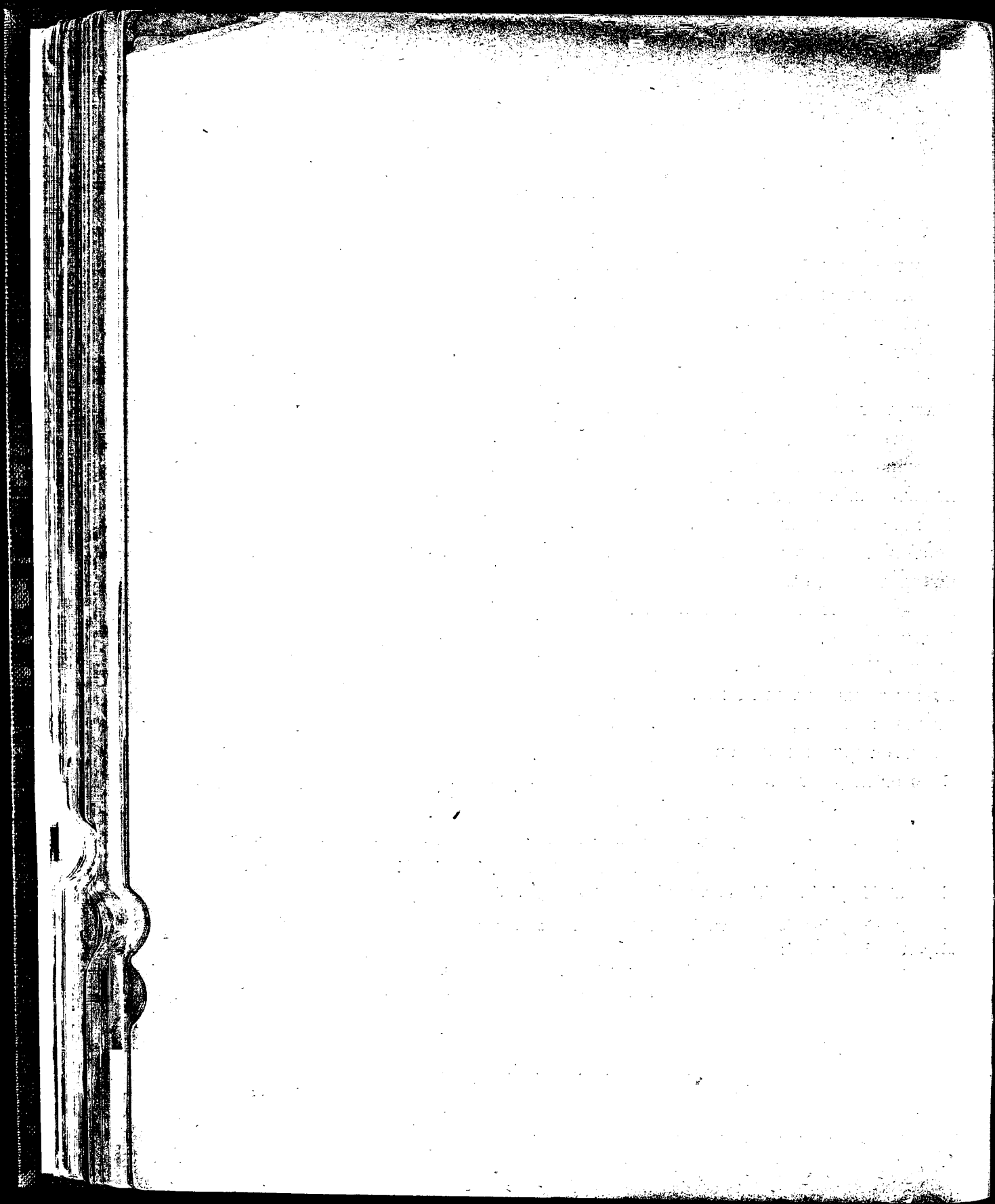

REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

For the Year ending 31st December, 1914.

The total receipts for the year 1914 were £529,885 14s. 3d., of which £315,093 10s. 11d. were contributions to Capital, and £214,792 3s. 4d. receipts on General Account.

The General Fund receipts were made up as follows :

In this year of war the amount distributed was £140,000, as against £157,500 in the previous year. Although the total distributed was less than in 1913, there was an increase in grants in aid of the ordinary maintenance of Hospitals, the reduction being wholly accounted for by a diminution in the claims on the Fund for building expenditure. This diminution was due to the postponement by the Hospitals at the outbreak of the war of all schemes not actually in hand or particularly urgent.

Of the sum of £140,000 distributed the Hospitals received £133,500, the remaining £6,500 being distributed amongst Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients.

The £133,500 allotted to the London Hospitals was directed to be applied as follows :—£108,550 to General Purposes and Maintenance ; £12,600 towards the liquidation of debts on maintenance account ; and £12,350 for additions and improvements to hospitals and their equipment. Of the £6,500 given to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes, £3,800 was allotted in consideration of the allocation of beds for patients to be sent from certain London Hospitals.

The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria during the last ten years (after deducting conditional grants to the extent of £7,500 that have been allowed to lapse), is £1,417,750. Since the foundation of the Fund a total amount of £1,930,416 8s. 5d. has been distributed—an average annual distribution of £107,245 7s. 2d.

During the year the amount spent on administration was £0 12s. 0d. per cent. of the total amount received, as compared with £1 12s. 5d. last year. The corresponding percentage for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £1 4s. 5d.

His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his Annual Subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and many other members of the Royal Family have also again honoured the Fund with their support.

The list of contributions includes annual subscriptions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £1,000 from Mr. William Waldorf Astor, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company; besides two anonymous donations of £1,000. The Fund has also received annual subscriptions of £500 from the City Corporation, from Lord Iveagh, from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; and donations of the same amount from the Clothworkers' Company, from "G. C.," and from "S.D.R.S.D."

The contribution of the League of Mercy this year was again £14,000, a result which reflects great credit on the efforts of the members of the League to secure recognition of the claims of the Hospitals at the present time. The total amount received from the League of Mercy since its foundation in 1899 now amounts to £216,000, apart from the sums distributed by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council desire to express their appreciation of this very substantial benefit derived from the efforts of a numerous band of voluntary workers.

Legacies received during the year include (in addition to the Lewis and Harman bequests) £9,027 12s. 3d., residue of the estate of the late Mr. John Harold Goodwin; £8,070 further on account of the residue of the estate of the late Mr. George Hunt Heigham; £2,323 14s. 6d., balance of residue of the estate of the late Mr. Edward Matyear; and £2,232 1s. 2d., a share in the residue of the estate of the late Mr. Peter Meech.

The amount announced in the last Annual Report as having been received in February, 1914, from the estate of the late Sir Julius Wernher was increased by further receipts during the year to £313,715 13s. 2d. This sum represents the first instalments of the very generous legacy of one-twelfth of the residue of his estate, left in augmentation of the capital account of the Fund. This bequest from a member of the Council of the Fund is one of the most important of the munificent gifts to capital which have done so much to enable the annual distribution to be increased to the level attained in recent years.

The sum required to be raised during the year, after taking into account income from investments, in order to maintain the distribution of £140,000, is nearly £60,000; while to reach again the distribution of the three previous years, more than £75,000 must be obtained in the year by means of annual subscriptions, donations and legacies.

The total amount received from annual subscriptions and donations during 1914 showed, as compared with 1913, a decrease of £750, while the receipts from legacies (other than the Lewis and Harman bequests) were £19,525 less than the previous year, or £6,223 less than the average of the five years 1909 to 1913.

The Nation will surely realise that the work done by the Hospitals, both in the treatment of the wounded and in the providing and training of doctors, nurses and administrators in the medical service of the Army and Navy, gives them a special claim on the generosity of the public. The Council trust, therefore, that notwithstanding the increased demands made by the war and by the special funds for purposes arising out of the war, the needs of the Hospitals and the importance of maintaining the annual distribution of the Fund, will continue to be recognised.

The Annual Statistical Report prepared by the Fund on the expenditure of 106 London Hospitals again shows a general increase in cost of working. Though this is attributable partly at least to the rise in prices and the development of new and more expensive treatments, the Council have in the remarks accompanying their grants continued to draw attention to any instances of high or increasing cost which appear to require further explanation. The Council believe that by preparing comparative figures, and by thus encouraging economy of management, the Fund is assisting the Hospitals not only in their ordinary work, but in reducing as far as possible the losses unavoidably caused by high prices and other difficulties during the war.

The Revised Uniform System of Accounts has during the year been reissued in a new edition. Since its original preparation in 1906 by this Fund, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds and in consultation with a Committee of Hospital Secretaries, the rules of the system have been supplemented by several memoranda embodying new regulations arising out of the application of the system to the circumstances of different institutions. In the new edition all the various detailed regulations are collected together in a codified form, with a short summary of the general principles underlying them. It is believed that this arrangement will greatly facilitate the use of the system, which has become the recognised standard of hospital account keeping.

The Council view with great satisfaction the successful amalgamation of the Hospital for Diseases of the Throat, Golden Square, and the London Throat Hospital, Great Portland Street. The Fund has allocated to this scheme, out of the amounts promised or set aside in aid of a general amalgamation of the Throat Hospitals of London, a capital grant of £10,000 and a maintenance grant of £900 a year for five years, subject to the approval of the proposed building scheme and to the usual annual inspection by the Fund's Visitors.

During the year the Executive Committee, as the result of representations made to the Fund some time ago by the Hospital Officers' Association, undertook an enquiry into the question of pensions for hospital officers. The following were appointed members of a sub-committee for the purpose: Mr. W. J. H. Whittall (chairman), Sir William Collins and Mr. Hopkinson. This enquiry was not completed when the Council for 1914 laid down its duties.

Each eligible Hospital and Consumption Sanatorium which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical man and one layman in each case.

The Convalescent Homes Committee have again secured by means of grants from the Fund the reservation of 44 beds at five Consumption Sanatoria, and have placed them at the

disposal of London Hospitals for the accommodation of patients urgently needing country treatment.

The Distribution Committee have carefully considered all schemes for the extension or reconstruction of hospitals which have been submitted in accordance with the request of the Council, though the number thus submitted has been less than usual owing to the war. The Fund has thus used its best endeavours to assist the hospital authorities in ensuring that when capital expenditure is undertaken adequate consideration is given to economy, efficiency, and prospect of funds for future maintenance; and has particularly considered the relation of each scheme to the general question of hospital accommodation in London.

The Council regret to record the deaths of Sir R. Lucas-Tooth, a member of the Council, and a generous donor to the Fund; of Mr. S. H. Benson, who had been a member of the Organising Committee of the Coronation Gift to King Edward VII., and successively of the Visiting, Executive and Convalescent Homes Committees; and also of Mr. Reginald Lucas, who had been a Visitor for many years. To the lamented death in 1914 of Lord Strathcona, one of the greatest benefactors of the Fund and a member of the Council, full reference was made in the last Annual Report.

The Council much regrets that Mr. William Latham, K.C., has been compelled through ill-health to resign the Chairmanship of the Convalescent Homes Committee, an office which he had held since 1898, and in which he is succeeded by Dr. Edwin Freshfield. They also regret the retirement of Mr. A. G. Sandeman, who had been a member of the Council since the foundation of the Fund.

The President of the Local Government Board, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co. to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year.

The Council are under great obligations to the Press for the valuable services they have rendered in the past, and continue to rely upon their kindly co-operation in obtaining for the Fund wider publicity and support.

ST. JAMES'S PALACE: *April* 19, 1915.

At the Annual Meeting of the Governors and General Council, held at St. James's Palace on April 19, 1915, the following resolution was unanimously passed:—

That the Governors and General Council desire to place on record their profound regret at the death of Lord Rothschild, Hon. Treasurer of the Fund since its foundation. They recall with gratitude the great services rendered by him as Treasurer and as an active member of the Council during the whole period of its existence, as Trustee and member of the Executive Committee down to the incorporation of the Fund by Act of Parliament in 1907, and subsequently as Chairman of the Finance Committee. They are deeply indebted to Lord Rothschild for the skill and care which he devoted to the ever-growing responsibilities of his office, and they deplore the loss of a colleague whose name, whose ability, and whose interest in the work of charity were a constant source of strength to the Council and to the Fund.

Appendix to Report of the General Council.

The Meeting of the Governors and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes, and Consumption Sanatoria, was held at St. James's Palace, on Wednesday, December 16, 1914, at 11.30 A.M., the Speaker of the House of Commons being in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, letters of regret were reported from the following : The Lord Lieutenant of the County of London (The Marquess of Crewe) ; The Duke of Norfolk ; The Bishop of London ; Cardinal Bourne ; The Rev. W. L. Watkinson, D.D. ; The Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.) ; The Earl of Bessborough ; Lord Rothschild ; The Hon. Arthur Stanley, M.P. ; The President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (The Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor) ; The Governor of the Bank of England (Lord Cunliffe) ; The Rt. Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, Bt. (Hon. Secretary) ; The Rt. Hon. Thomas Burt, M.P. ; The Rt. Hon. Sir Edgar Speyer, Bt. ; Professor Sir William Osler, Bt. ; Sir Owen Philipps, Sir William H. Bennett, Mr. Robert Fleming ; Mr. William Latham, K.C. ; Mr. Albert G. Sandeman.

In the absence of Lord Rothschild (the Honorary Treasurer), LORD REVELSTOKE said that the amount received to the 12th inst. was : on Capital Account £370,856 10s. 11d. ; and on General Account, after payment of expenses, £133,706 13s. 3d. The receipts on Capital Account were made up chiefly of the first instalments of the legacy of Sir Julius Wernher, which was left to Capital, together with £30,863 further from the Lewis estate, and the Harman bequest of ground rents, valued at £25,000, which brought in £1,382 a year. From the Wernher estate the Fund had received so far a sum of £313,715. With regard to the receipts on General Account, it was too early to say anything about the effects of the war, except that up to the present there had been considerably less reduction in annual subscriptions, donations, and income from investments, than the Executive Committee, as a matter of prudence, had allowed for at the time when the amount for distribution was fixed. There was, however, a slight reduction ; and special efforts would, no doubt, have to be made next year if the inevitable loss of support from those who were seriously affected by the war was to be made up.

SIR HENRY BURDETT, in making his annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that in the peculiar and special circumstances of the present year it was remarkable and satisfactory to be able to state that the reports of the Presidents, Lady Presidents, and their workers of the League of Mercy, showed that the total sum raised in 1914 exceeded the amount received in 1913. It was too early to fix the actual sum which it would be possible to hand over to the Treasurer of the King's Fund ; but it was a very real pleasure to be able to make so satisfactory a report to the Council in a year like the present.

SIR WILLIAM CHURCH (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the Report of that Committee, and Mr. JOHN G. GRIFFITHS (Hon. Secretary) presented the List of Awards.

In the absence of Mr. William Latham, K.C. (the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee), Dr. EDWIN FRESHFIELD presented the Report of that Committee, and Mr. FREDERICK M. FRY (Hon. Secretary) presented the List of Awards.

THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Awards said:—My Lords and Gentlemen,—As the Duke of Teck, whose whole time is taken up with his military duties, is unable to be present, I rise on behalf of the Governors to move the adoption of the Reports. His Majesty has been graciously pleased to write a letter, through Lord Stamfordham, which I think at this point I ought to read:—

“Buckingham Palace,

“Dear Sir,—I am commanded by the King to ask you to convey to the Council the expression of his continued interest in the Fund.

“His Majesty appreciates the reasons which have led the Council to fix the distribution for this abnormal year, under conditions wholly unprecedented, at £140,000.

“The supporters of the Fund will note with satisfaction the fact that the Hospitals have for the time being wisely limited their capital liabilities, and that that the Council has, therefore, been enabled to increase the total grants made for maintenance purposes.

“While the general public is giving ample evidence of ready sacrifice for National objects, the King trusts that the pressing needs of the Voluntary Hospitals during the present crisis will not be lost sight of, and that the fund may receive such support as to be able to increase its annual distribution next year.

“His Majesty has observed with lively interest the fact that the Professional Staffs of the London Hospitals have been largely called upon to assist, at the seat of the War as well as at home, in treating the sick and wounded. Many contingents from the Nursing Staffs are working abroad in their professional capacities, while Hospitals in London have in no small measure assisted in dealing with the wounded brought to England.

“The King learnt with regret during the year now drawing to its close that the Fund had received the resignation, through ill health, of Mr. Latham, who for many years had been Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

“His Majesty desires to record his grateful testimony to the valuable services rendered by all who have assisted in dealing with the work of the Fund, and especially recognises the ready manner in which Mr. Fry kindly undertook to carry on the duties of Sir Savile Crossley during the absence of the latter at the seat of War.

“Yours very faithfully,

The point which I wish first to emphasise is the fact that we are increasing the maintenance grants to the Hospitals. As the Council are well aware, the question of the amount to be distributed required special consideration this year, in view of the probable effect of the war both on the Hospitals and on the Fund. The evidence available at the time the amount was settled pointed to the conclusion that in both cases the effect would probably be more marked later on than it would this year. If, therefore, we had made a special effort to maintain the distribution at £157,500 (the figure since 1911) there would have been some risk of a reduction next year, just when the needs of the Hospitals might be expected to be increasing. Moreover, the demands on the Fund for grants in aid of capital expenditure are less this year than usual, owing to the postponement of several schemes of building or improvements. A distribution of the same amount as last year would, therefore, have meant large additional grants to maintenance, and it is not yet possible to know with accuracy which Hospitals will be affected most seriously by the war, and will therefore most need exceptional assistance. There can be no doubt that a great effort will be necessary if the work of the Hospitals is to be maintained during the time of stress that is already upon them. Happily there is in the nation a universal desire to be of use and to help the country in its emergency. To large numbers of people the giving of money to public objects is one of the readiest methods of helping. The various great war relief funds form one outlet for this feeling; but another and

scarcely less important channel is the support of the voluntary hospitals. For surely their work in combating disease and maintaining the health of the people—to say nothing of their direct assistance to the Naval and Military Authorities in the treatment of sick and wounded sailors and soldiers—is in itself one of the most essential forms of national service. The very welcome announcement made by Sir Henry Burdett of the large sums collected for the Fund this year by the League of Mercy is evidence that where this is recognised an immediate response is forthcoming. If the needs of the hospitals are once realised, it must also be recognised that the financial assistance of the Fund is one of the great factors in their support. The Fund has exceptional facilities for ascertaining at which hospitals the greatest need of assistance exists, and allocates its grants accordingly, provided, of course, that due regard is paid to economy and efficiency. If, however, the Fund is to make full use of its opportunities, it is essential, not only that the amount of the distribution should be maintained, but that it should be increased as the difficulties of the hospitals increase. And for this we depend on the support of the charitable public. In consequence of the great national emergency, the ordinary activities of the Fund have naturally fallen somewhat into the background. But there are a few points which I should like to mention. The question of pensions for hospital officers has been more than once brought to the notice of the Fund as a matter that called for consideration, particularly in the case of the smaller hospitals. Early in the year the Executive Committee appointed a sub-committee to enquire into the subject. This sub-committee, under the expert chairmanship of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, had, at the end of the summer, contemplated the preparation of a preliminary report which might help to ventilate the subject and perhaps lead to a general agreement. Owing to the outbreak of the war the actual preparation of this preliminary report has been delayed; but it is still under consideration. The Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has now reached what may prove to be a final form (in so far as finality is possible in such matters) by the publication of a new edition, embodying all the decisions on points of difficulty that have arisen since the original issue. The application of the system to the circumstances of each institution has meant a good deal of work on the part of the hospital officials and also of their auditors, to whom I think a special word of thanks is due. Quite apart from the labour involved, it is no light thing for a professional expert who has himself perhaps introduced a perfectly sound system adapted to the needs of a particular institution to be asked to abandon it in favour of a different system coming from outside. But this was a sacrifice which the three Funds were compelled to ask for the sake of the degree of uniformity necessary to a fair distribution, and we are grateful to the hospital auditors for the willingness and public spirit with which they complied. One important event of the year, which certainly does not fall into the background, is the receipt of four instalments of the munificent legacy from the late Sir Julius Wernher, given expressly in augmentation of the endowment of the Fund. We have received so far a sum of £313,000 on account of this bequest. On behalf of the Governors and of this Council I should like to express our thanks to Lady Wernher and the other Executors of the will for the constant consideration and care for the interests of the Fund which they have shown in the administration of the Estate. To come to matters personal to the Fund, we very much regret that ill-health has deprived us of the services of Mr. William Latham, who had for sixteen years served the Fund with equal skill and tact as Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee. In all that period he missed only one meeting of the Committee. We hope he will still feel able to retain his membership of the Council. The Convalescent Homes Committee has also lost by death the services of Mr. Benson, who had previously been a member of the Organising Committee of the Coronation Gift in 1902, and of the Executive Committee, and a Visitor. We have also lost a very useful Visitor by the death of Mr. Reginald Lucas. To the lamented death of Lord Strathcona, one of our greatest benefactors as well as an active member of the Council, reference was made at the annual meeting in April last. Besides the Duke of Teck, several members of the Council, members of Committees and Visitors of the Fund both medical and lay, are engaged on special duties connected with the war, many of them being at the seat of war. During their absence Mr. Fry came forward with his usual readiness to the assistance of Mr. Griffiths, who continues to give to the work of the Fund a great deal of time which he can only with difficulty spare from other numerous and responsible engagements.

I should also like to refer to one point which Lord Revelstoke did not mention in his statement just now, namely, the very valuable services which Messrs. Barings have, with their usual courtesy and generosity, rendered during the crisis in connection with the funds awaiting distribution. I have now only to express the thanks of the Governors to the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees for their Reports, and to the Visitors, whose work helps us to keep in personal touch with the hospitals every year. I now formally move the adoption of the Reports.

Lord IVEAGH seconded the motion.

Sir HENRY BURDETT, in supporting the motion, referred to the great services rendered by Mr. Griffiths in connection with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. The amount of time and work involved was far greater than anyone not intimately associated with matters of that kind could realise, and the warmest thanks of the Council were due to Mr. Griffiths.

The adoption of the Reports was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Lord STAMFORDHAM, seconded by Sir JOHN TWEEDY, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on December 21st, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds in Consumption Sanatoria during 1915, which should be posted on January 1st.

Sir WILLIAM CHURCH (Chairman of the Distribution Committee) moved the adoption of a Report of the Committee upon a communication from the Westminster Hospital with reference to their proposals for removal. The motion was seconded by Sir COOPER PERRY, and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1915.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS then said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have now to announce the intentions of the Governors with regard to the appointment of Members of the Council, Members of Committees, and Honorary Officers, for the year 1915, and I will ask the Honorary Secretaries to read the list. [The list having been read by Mr. JOHN G. GRIFFITHS (Hon. Secretary), THE SPEAKER continued] The only other business is the consideration of the resolutions delegating powers to the various Committees. You will notice that a new resolution has been added giving to the Distribution Committee, for the coming year, the special power for which they ask in respect of the grants promised or set aside for the amalgamation of the Throat Hospitals. You are asked to consider these resolutions now so that if they are approved here to-day the meeting of the new Council called specially in January to pass them need only be of a formal character.

On the motion of Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, seconded by THE PRESIDENT OF THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS (Sir Thomas Barlow, Bt.), a resolution was approved delegating powers to the Finance Committee, Distribution Committee, and Convalescent Homes Committee.

On the motion of Lord FARQUHAR, seconded by the Rt. Hon. C. STUART-WORTLEY, the following Resolution was approved :—That the Distribution Committee be authorised to draw upon the capital and maintenance grants promised or set aside for the amalgamation of the Throat Hospitals in such proportions as they may consider appropriate either for capital or for maintenance purposes in the event of any further amalgamation scheme being brought to a satisfactory conclusion before the next distribution.

On the motion of Sir T. VEZEY STRONG, seconded by Sir JOHN CRAGGS, a Resolution was approved delegating powers to the Executive Committee.

Mr. WALTER MORRISON, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Speaker of the House of Commons for presiding, said that his experience of Speakers went back to the time of Mr. Speaker Denison. He ventured to say that there had never been a House of Commons which involved in its Speaker more toil, more tact and more good sense, than the present. The Speaker, by his conduct in the Chair, had earned the respect—one might say the affection—of all the numerous parties of which the present House of Commons was made up.

The Resolution was seconded by the PRESIDENT OF THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF SURGEONS (Sir W. Watson Cheyne, Bt.), and carried unanimously.

THE SPEAKER, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said that the critical position of public affairs had, in a most marked manner, brought together all parties, all sections and all fractions of the House of Commons. He thought that one of the most remarkable results of the war had been the unanimity with which the whole nation had rallied to the support of the Government.

The proceedings then terminated.

The Annual Meeting of the Governors and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and the Report of the General Council for the year 1914, was held at St. James's Palace on Monday, 19th April, 1915, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, M.P., Speaker of the House of Commons, being in the chair.

Stuart-Wortley, K.C., M.P.; The Right Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, Bt. (Hon. Secretary); The Right Hon. Sir Vezey Strong; Sir William S. Church, Bt.; Sir Henry Burdett; Sir Owen Philipps; Sir William J. Collins; Sir Horace Marshall; Sir John Craggs; Sir John Tweedy; Dr. Edwin Freshfield; Mr. John G. Griffiths (Hon. Secretary); and Mr. Walter Morrison.

The Minutes of the last Meeting having been read and confirmed, letters of regret were reported from the following: H.H. The Duke of Teck; The Lord Lieutenant of the County of London (The Marquess of Crewe); The Bishop of London; Cardinal Bourne; The Rev. W. L. Watkinson, D.D.; The Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.); The Earl of Bessborough; Lord Mersey; Lord Murray of Elibank; The Hon. Algernon H. Mills; The Postmaster-General (The Rt. Hon. Charles E. Hobhouse, M.P.); The President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (The Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor); The Governor of the Bank of England (Lord Cunliffe); The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir W. Watson Cheyne, Bt.); The Rt. Hon. Thomas Burt, M.P.; Professor Sir William Osler, Bt.; Sir William H. Bennett; Mr. Frederick M. Fry; Mr. Robert Fleming; Mr. William Latham, K.C.; and Mr. Algernon E. Sydney.

Sir SAVILE CROSSLEY (Hon. Secretary) read the following letter from His Majesty the King—through Lord Stamfordham:—

“Windsor Castle,

“12th April, 1915.

“Dear Sirs,—I am commanded by the King to convey to the Governors and General Council an expression of His Majesty's deep sense of the great loss which the Fund has sustained in the death of Lord Rothschild, its Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee.

“It was at the request of His late Majesty King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales and President of the Fund, at the inaugural meeting of the first General Council, that Lord Rothschild undertook the duties of Treasurer. His wise counsel and judgment have been of inestimable value to the Fund and thereby have exercised a powerful and beneficial influence upon the Hospitals of London.

“His Majesty, as Patron of the Fund, cordially approves the action of the Governors in appointing as Lord Rothschild's successor Lord Revelstoke, who has for many years been an active member of the Finance Committee.

“The King gratefully appreciates the services given by the Governors of the Fund, H.H. the Duke of Teck, Viscount Iveagh, and the Speaker of the House of Commons, in carrying out the duties of President during their five years term of office, which expires in June next. Having ascertained that the Lord Chancellor, the Prime Minister, and the Governor of the Bank of

England, pursuant to the Act of Incorporation of the Fund, are prepared to recommend their re-appointment, His Majesty has commanded me to inform you of his intention, until the appointment of a President, to reappoint them to the office, the duties of which they have so efficiently discharged.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS then said : My Lords and Gentlemen,—I now have to move the following resolution :—

That the Governors and General Council desire to place on record their profound regret at the death of Lord Rothschild, Honorary Treasurer of the Fund since its foundation. They recall with gratitude the great services rendered by him as Treasurer and as an active member of the Council during the whole period of its existence, as Trustee and member of the Executive Committee down to the incorporation of the Fund by Act of Parliament in 1907, and subsequently as Chairman of the Finance Committee. They are deeply indebted to Lord Rothschild for the skill and care which he devoted to the ever-growing responsibilities of his office, and they deplore the loss of a colleague whose name, whose ability, and whose interest in the work of charity were a constant source of strength to the Council and to the Fund.

I think I need hardly add anything to the terms of the resolution itself, except to say, on my own behalf and on that of my fellow Governors, and I am sure I can also say it on behalf of all the members of the several Committees of the Fund, how much we shall miss the assistance and support of Lord Rothschild, and how conscious we are of the great advantage the Fund derived from having him for its Treasurer during all the years in which its present financial position was being gradually built up. The Council will doubtless desire that in forwarding this resolution I should add an expression of condolence with the family of Lord Rothschild in their bereavement.

The resolution, having been seconded by LORD IVEAGH, was carried unanimously.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS then said : My Lords and Gentlemen,—On the death of Lord Rothschild it became the duty of the Governors, under the terms of the Fund's Act of Incorporation, to appoint a successor in the offices of Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee. Lord Revelstoke was one of the original members of the Finance Committee, and has for several years devoted the closest and most watchful attention to the care of the Fund's investments which is the particular duty of that Committee. We are glad to say that he has consented to undertake, in addition to these responsibilities, the further duties of Honorary Treasurer and Chairman of the Committee. They could not be in better hands, and, as you have heard, His Majesty the Patron of the Fund has been graciously pleased to express approval of the appointment. We have also, with His Majesty's approval, made the following appointments : The Hon. Algernon H. Mills, who is already on the Finance Committee, to be a Member of the Council ; and the Hon. Nathaniel Charles Rothschild to be a Member of the Finance Committee. I will now ask Lord Revelstoke to present the Accounts of the Fund for the year 1914.

LORD REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st December, 1914, said : Mr. Speaker, My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have the honour to submit the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended the 31st December, 1914. On reference to the statement of Receipts and Expenditure, which has already been circulated, it will be noticed that the additions to the Capital Account are largely in excess of those shewn in normal years. This increase is principally accounted for by the receipt for Capital Account of £313,000, being the amount received on account of the one-twelfth share of residue in connection with the legacy of the late Sir Julius Wernher. The Balance Sheet itself is clear, and would not seem to call for any particular comment ; but it is satisfactory to be able to report that, in spite of the financial disturbance occasioned by the war, the receipt of income derived from investments continues to be quite satisfactory.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS then formally moved the adoption of the Accounts, and the resolution, having been seconded by the Chairman of the London County Council (Mr. CYRIL JACKSON), was carried unanimously.

Sir SAVILE CROSSLEY (Hon. Secretary) presented the draft Report of the Council for the year 1914.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS, in moving the adoption of the Report, said: My Lords and Gentlemen,—It is not the practice of the Presiding Governor when moving the adoption of the Annual Report at this meeting to make a long speech, but only to refer to any special point that arises out of the Accounts or the Report. With regard to the Accounts, a few minor alterations in the form of the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure and of the Balance Sheet have been introduced for the purpose of making the transactions of the twelve months rather more clear to the general reader. I should like to take this opportunity of thanking our Auditors, Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., for the very valuable services they have rendered to the Fund in connection with the accounts since its foundation. The Council will also agree with me that we are very fortunate, in these times especially, in having our invested funds in the safe keeping of so competent a Finance Committee as that over which Lord Rothschild presided for so many years, and over which Lord Revelstoke will now preside. One of the most gratifying incidents of the past year was the completion of the amalgamation of two of the Throat Hospitals, the Hospital for Diseases of the Throat, Golden Square, and the London Throat Hospital, in Great Portland Street. The amalgamation of small Hospitals, where there seems to be no special reason for continuing their separate existence, involving duplicate establishments, has long been favoured by this Fund; and this is particularly the case where new building schemes are contemplated. In the present instance the expiration of the lease of the London Throat Hospital coincided with the acquisition of space for the extension of the Golden Square Hospital. This amalgamation has, therefore, every form of advantage. The patients and the medical staff will benefit by the improvements which are more easily introduced in a larger Hospital; economy of management will be facilitated by the concentration of the work in a single establishment; and there will be only one building scheme instead of two. The Chairmen, Committees of Management, and Medical Staffs of the Hospitals concerned are to be congratulated on their action; and a share in the credit may, I think, fairly be claimed by this Fund for the assistance and encouragement it has given both in the consideration of the amalgamation proposals by the Distribution Committee and in the substantial grants made in aid of the scheme. In so doing the Fund has only been continuing the policy which had proved successful in the past, in the case of the Orthopædic Hospitals and of the Hampstead and North-West London Hospitals; a policy which has, since the end of the year, again been justified in the amalgamation, under the auspices of the Charity Commissioners, and with the support of the Fund, of the British Lying-in Hospital with the Home for Mothers and Babies in Woolwich.

I now have the honour to move the adoption of the Report.

The PRESIDENT OF THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS (Dr. FREDERICK TAYLOR) seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

On the motion of the SPEAKER, seconded by Sir OWEN PHILIPPS, a Resolution was approved authorising the Hon. Algernon H. Mills to sign on the Fund's Banking Accounts.

LORD IVEAGH then moved the following Resolution, which was seconded by LORD FARQUHAR, and carried:—

That the keys of the lock under which the Corporate Seal is kept be held as follows: One of the three keys comprising one triplicate set shall be held respectively by the Earl of Bessborough, the Hon. Algernon H. Mills, and Mr. John G. Griffiths; and one of the three keys comprising the other triplicate set shall be held respectively by Lord Revelstoke, the Rt. Hon. Sir Savile Crossley, and Mr. Frederick M. Fry.

The Rt. Hon. C. STUART-WORTLEY, K.C., M.P., proposed a vote of thanks to the Speaker of the House of Commons for presiding. The resolution was seconded by the Hon. ARTHUR STANLEY, M.P., and carried unanimously, and the SPEAKER having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks the proceedings terminated.

Report of the Distribution Committee.

(1) The Governors and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst the London Hospitals at £133,500, as compared with £151,000 distributed in 1913.

(2) The Distribution Committee have, nevertheless, been able to recommend an increase in the total grants to maintenance. This course, which the Committee think will prove to be the most effective way of helping the Hospitals in their present circumstances, has been rendered possible by the fact that, in view of the war, the Hospitals have, with the approval of the Fund, deferred all schemes of building or improvement that were not already in hand or particularly urgent; with the result that the demands on the Fund for contributions in aid of capital expenditure have been considerably reduced. The total of grants to buildings and improvements, which last year was £35,650, is this year £12,350; while the total of the grants recommended to maintenance, including grants in reduction of maintenance debts, amounts to £121,150, as against £115,350 last year.

(3) Although there has been an increase in the total amount recommended for maintenance grants, and a decrease in the total for capital grants, the individual awards vary, as compared with last year, in accordance with the particular circumstances of each separate Hospital, including the financial position of each Institution as disclosed by its Income and Expenditure Account and Balance Sheet for 1913, the last completed year. Moreover, in the case of all applications, whether for maintenance grants or for grants in reduction of debt or in aid of building schemes, the Committee have felt obliged this year to pay special attention to the question of relative urgency.

It must not be assumed, therefore, that a reduction in the grant of any particular Institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

(4) Although the Fund has applied for and obtained from the Hospitals information on their financial position up to as late a date as possible for the current year before the Committee considered the applications made to it, the examination of the relative needs of the various Institutions has been necessarily based for the most part on the last completed and audited

accounts—namely, those for the year 1913. But the effect of the first few months of the war on the statistics and finances of the Hospitals, as well as the probable effect of their action in placing beds at the disposal of the Naval and Military Authorities during the present emergency, has not been overlooked. The result of these new conditions will be reflected in the accounts for 1914, and will thus form part of the material submitted to the Fund in connection with next year's applications.

(5) The number of Hospitals applying for grants is 104, as against 106 last year. This reduction is due to the successful completion of two schemes of amalgamation.

(6) The amalgamation of the Hospital for Diseases of the Throat, Golden Square, and the London Throat Hospital, Great Portland Street, was reported to the General Council at the Annual Meeting in April last, when a capital grant of £10,000, with a maintenance grant of £900 a year for five years, subject to the usual annual inspection, was approved. Out of the moneys set aside or promised towards a general scheme of amalgamation of the Throat, Nose, and Ear Hospitals, there still remain unallocated a capital sum of £10,500, and maintenance grants not exceeding £1,100 a year. The Distribution Committee recommend that power be given to them to draw upon the balance of the capital and maintenance grants so promised or set aside, in such proportions as they may consider appropriate, in the event of any further amalgamation scheme being brought to a satisfactory conclusion at a time when a meeting of the Governors and General Council is not pending.

(7) The Committee are glad to report that the proposed amalgamation between University College Hospital and the National Dental Hospital has been brought into effect during the year. The latter Hospital is now the Dental Department of the former. In recommending the amount of the grant to University College Hospital the Distribution Committee have taken into account the work done both while the National Dental Hospital existed as a separate institution and since it has become a Branch of University College Hospital.

(8) The only grant made for a capital purpose in 1912 which remains unapplied, and which therefore comes up for reconsideration under the two years rule, is one of £500 to the provision of a new operating theatre at the West London Hospital. The Committee are informed that the scheme to which the grant was made has been abandoned in favour of a larger scheme of improvements, which is still under consideration. They recommend, therefore, that the grant made in 1912 to the smaller scheme should lapse, and that the fresh proposals, when received in their final form, should be considered as a new scheme.

(9) In dealing with the applications of the various Hospitals, the Committee have as usual taken into consideration not only relative need but also efficiency and economy as revealed by the evidence before them, including the Visitors' Reports and the statistics of work done and cost of working. Where the figures in the Fund's Statistical Report indicate an excess of cost, above the average of comparable Hospitals, greater than appears to the Committee to be justified by any special features in the work or circumstances of the institution, the Committee recommend that the attention of the authorities of the hospital should be called to the fact. In some cases they recommend that the committee of the hospital should set on foot a

systematic inquiry into the question with a view to effecting economies. The Distribution Committee recognise that at the present moment there are exceptional factors tending unavoidably to raise the cost of hospital maintenance, but for this very reason it appears to them most important that every care should be taken to strengthen the control over expenditure wherever the cost of working in normal times affords evidence that this is needed.

(10) The Visitors' Reports have again proved of the utmost value, and the Committee are greatly indebted to the medical men and laymen who undertake this work. The annual inspection makes greater demands on the time of the Visitors now than it did when the area of operations of the Fund was smaller and when there were therefore fewer suburban hospitals on the list. The Committee have continued the practice of supplementing their awards by recommending that extracts from the Visitors' Reports should be communicated privately to the hospitals concerned, a course which has proved very beneficial in the past.

(11) The Committee welcome the publication of the new Edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, incorporating the decisions of the three Funds upon all the questions which have arisen out of the application of the system to the accounts of the various Hospitals. The Distribution Committee much appreciate the co-operation of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund and the Hospital Saturday Fund and of the Committee of Hospital Secretaries in the work of revision, the result of which has been greatly to lighten during the last few years the labour of comparing the accounts and statistics of the institutions applying for grants. They are also grateful to the Hospital Officials and Auditors for the time and trouble spent in applying the system, and for many valuable suggestions towards the completion of the work.

The details of the awards to the various Hospitals are appended.

Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

(1) The Governors and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria at £6,500.

(2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 48 from Convalescent Homes and 10 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 46 and 10 respectively last year.

(3) In view of the present emergency and the increased difficulty in providing for ordinary maintenance which those responsible for the management of charitable institutions have reason to anticipate, the Committee have not felt themselves justified in recommending any capital grants to new schemes, or in taking advantage of various offers which would have enabled them to secure a larger number of beds at Consumption Sanatoria for the use of patients from London Hospitals. In dealing with all applications, whether from Sanatoria or from Convalescent Homes, they have thought it more necessary this year than ever to take into consideration the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31st, 1913. In the case of Consumption Sanatoria they have also taken note of the proportion of the total work of each institution which is covered by receipts under the National Insurance Act.

It must not be assumed, therefore, that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

(4) In dealing with applications from Convalescent Homes the Committee have adhered to their original policy of giving special consideration to the Convalescent Homes closely connected with London Hospitals.

(5) The accommodation secured this year at Consumption Sanatoria for the use of patients from London Hospitals consists, as last year, of 44 beds at five Sanatoria. These are situated as follows :—

- 2 beds for children at the Children's Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 10 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
- 10 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 10 beds at the Sanatorium of the National Association for the Establishment and Maintenance of Sanatoria for Workers, Benenden, Kent.
- 12 beds at the Northampton Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.

(6) In allocating these beds to Hospitals in London the Committee have followed the same principle as that adopted last year, viz.: that preference should be given to the two Consumption Hospitals which have at present no country branches, and that the rest of the beds should be divided among the largest of the general hospitals which apply to the Fund.

They accordingly recommend the following allocation :

- 18 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 9 beds to the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 6 beds to the London Hospital.
- 6 beds to Guy's Hospital.
- 5 beds to the Middlesex Hospital.

(7) All the Sanatoria applying for grants have been inspected on behalf of the Fund, and the Committee desire to express their indebtedness to the visitors who undertook this work, which in many cases has necessitated long journeys from London.

(8) The grants recommended to the various institutions are appended.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by his late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London, and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was re-named "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

The powers of the President have been exercised since 1910 by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The names of the Governors are given on page 2 of this Report.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the four Standing Committees and the Officers as set out on page 2. No individual serves on more than one Committee.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.
- (c) Consumption Sanatoria which take patients from London, or which are prepared to place beds at the disposal of the Fund for the use of patients from London Hospitals.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes, or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts.

Every eligible Hospital and Sanatorium applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose.

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendations of the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

No less a sum than £1,930,416 has been distributed by the Fund to London Hospitals, and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1914 being £140,000.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £216,000 to the Fund during the last fifteen years.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the Hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of Hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report comparing the cost of working at different Hospitals. The issue of these Reports was followed by savings estimated at £47,000 a year.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

SPECIAL NEEDS—1915.

It is very important for the hospitals at the present crisis that the Fund should be enabled to make as large a distribution as possible to meet the increased and increasing expenditure. Many hospitals have lately done a great work for the country in taking in sick and wounded soldiers in addition to their ordinary work for the civilian population, and this at a time when it is feared that subscriptions and donations will be considerably diminished and expenses increased.

PUBLICATIONS OF THE FUND.

The Fund also from time to time collects, and places at the disposal of the Hospitals and the Public, information on points of interest, and appoints special Committees to enquire into and report upon questions of difficulty affecting Hospitals.
