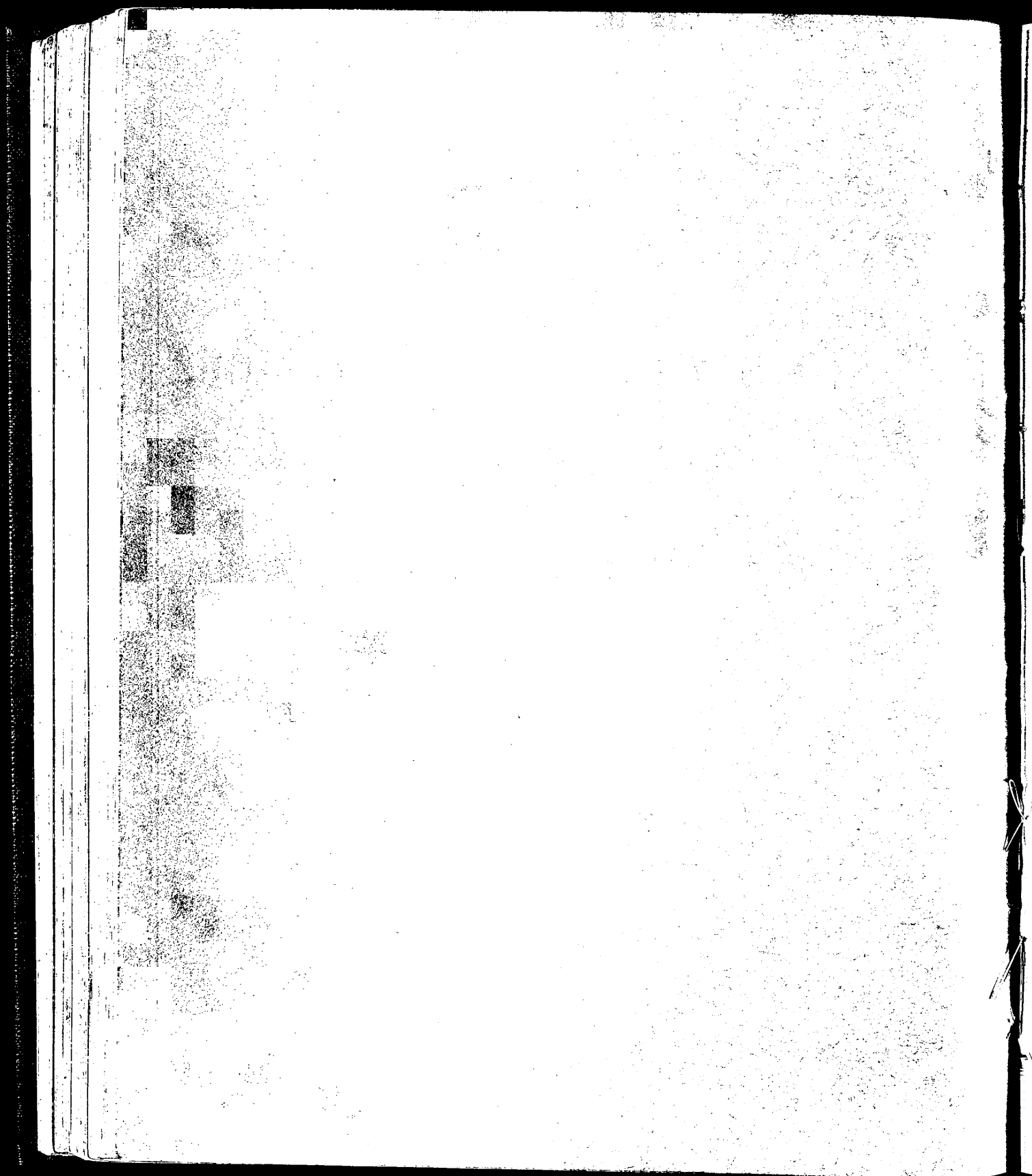

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1925.

THE GENERAL POSITION IN 1925.

1. The accounts of the hospitals of London for the year 1924 showed that the gradual improvement in their finances, taken as a whole, was being well maintained. In 1925, therefore, continued progress was made with improvements and extensions that had been delayed during the war and the subsequent financial crisis. The King's Fund was able to help the hospitals in both directions—on the one hand by means of increased grants to maintenance, and on the other by grants in aid of capital expenditure out of the ordinary distribution, and out of the special distribution of the Wells legacies, which the General Council had allocated to special purposes.

SUMMARY OF KING'S FUND RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

2. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year were £413,872 17s. 5d.

3. Of this, £50,000 was from the estate of the late Mrs. John Wells; £85,485 10s. from the estate of the late Lord MountStephen; £4,500 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis; £19,549 4s. 6d. from other legacies; £9,241 6s. 3d. from gifts to capital; and £245,096 16s. 8d. from general receipts. 4. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £245,000, an increase of £10,000 over 1924.

15. Towards the end of 1924 the King's Fund, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, had submitted a report to the Commission on the replies received from the hospitals in London to the Commission's questionnaire on the subject. The substance of the Fund's report was that the replies did not afford the material to enable the King's Fund to form an opinion as to the total number of additional beds required, but only as to the number the provision of which would come within the range of practicable possibilities, including the possibility of some increase being made in the resources of the voluntary system for this purpose.

16. The number of additional beds estimated by the King's Fund on this basis was about 2,100. This would increase the total, at 118 hospitals in London, from rather more than 13,000 to something over 15,000. When this increase had been accomplished, further extensions would have become urgent and fresh schemes would doubtless become practicable.

17. This estimate was adopted by the Commission, who expressed the view that the voluntary system could maintain these additional beds, but recommended that the Government should grant 50 per cent. of the capital cost up to £200 a bed and subject to certain conditions.

18. In the meantime the Hospitals have continued their efforts to provide additional accommodation themselves. The total number of beds, at 118 hospitals in London included in the King's Fund Statistical Report, increased during 1924 by 350. During 1925 other schemes were completed, and several new ones were put forward with the sanction and assistance of the Fund.

WELLS LEGACIES DISTRIBUTION.

19. A number of further grants were made during the year out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. These legacies, estimated together at about £200,000, had been left unconditionally to the Fund, and the Council in July, 1924, had decided to make them the subject of a special distribution in aid of schemes of extension and improvement and other special purposes, including the provision of accident beds.

20. The grants in 1925 amounted to £57,000, making, with £81,000 distributed in 1924 a total to December 31 of £138,000. The schemes assisted by these grants during 1925 were estimated to provide 396 additional beds, of which 40 were for accident cases; making, with the grants in 1924, a total of 697 beds, including 93 accident beds, over and above those available before the report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee in 1924.

EXTENSION OF KING'S FUND AREA.

21. The enlargement of the King's Fund area, from nine miles round Charing Cross to eleven miles round St. Paul's, brought in applications from eleven hospitals in outer London containing 301 beds. It has also brought the King's Fund into touch with schemes for the provision of hospital accommodation in areas which have only recently become populated.

REVENUE COMMITTEE PROPAGANDA.

22. The work of propaganda in aid of the hospitals and of the King's Fund has been actively continued by the special committee established for the purpose under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham. The programme of the Committee has included money-raising functions on behalf of the King's Fund and also purely propaganda work. It has, for example, organised lectures in schools and colleges by hospital experts, with very promising results.

HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS.

23. The Hospital Economy Committee had, by the end of the year, nearly finished the revision, in co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. A draft of the new edition had been prepared and observations invited from the Hospitals, the British Hospitals Association, and the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers, who appointed a special committee for the purpose. By the end of the year the replies had come in and were being considered.

PENSIONS FOR HOSPITAL OFFICERS AND NURSES.

24. In February, 1925, the King's Fund, at the request of the British Hospitals Association, the Hospital Officers' Association, and the College of Nursing, convened a conference on the question of Pensions.

25. Following the suggestions contained in the report of a King's Fund Committee of Enquiry published in 1919, both the College of Nursing and the Hospital Officers' Association had drafted schemes on the lines of the Federated Superannuation System for Universities, which include the principles of contributions by employers and employees, pensions secured by insurance policies, and freedom to migrate from one institution or branch of service to another without loss of pension rights in respect of past years.

26. As the result of discussion at meetings of the Conference and of a representative Committee, both under the Chairmanship of the late Lord Stuart of Wortley, the two schemes were combined into one, and a memorandum on the scheme as thus drafted was prepared. This was circulated in December to all the hospitals on the books of the British Hospitals Association for their consideration and for observations and expressions of opinion, with a view to a further meeting of the Conference early in 1926.

PERSONNEL.

27. At the Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council on December 15, the following resolution was passed :—

“ That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to record their deep sorrow at the death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and their sense of the great loss which all connected with hospitals, in common with the rest of the nation,

and so lovingly displayed there was to be seen and known to all a womanly kindness which adorned surely the highest of all possible places. The members of the Council of this Fund for helping the Hospitals of London would bear in mind how much they owed to the influence of Her late Majesty. Always her name was available for the purpose of either raising resources or enlisting new workers; but it was her special delight ever to be giving to the needy or visiting the sick, especially the wounded, and in any case helping the Hospitals. He could assure their Royal President, himself the most illustrious, save one, of Her late Majesty's descendants, that no formal minute, no ceremonial pronouncement ever conveyed a more sincere sympathy or more genuine sorrow, not to be outdone by the remarkably spontaneous and universal outburst of popular affection which marked the obsequies of Her late Majesty.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Hon. Secretary), in seconding, said that as the only other original member of the Fund present, he desired to associate himself with Lord Stuart's words. One of his first recollections was of public rejoicing in his own village when Queen Alexandra came over to England, and since then he had been filled with admiration for the good work which she continued throughout the whole of her life.

The Resolution was put from the Chair, the Council rising in their places, and carried unanimously.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) said: May it please your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to inform you that the Council has again to come to a decision as to two separate distributions. It has been decided that the total of the ordinary distribution should be increased from £235,000 to £245,000, while it is also proposed that the special grants which we are enabled to distribute as the outcome of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells should amount to £57,000, the two distributions together making a total of £302,000. I am glad to be able to say that the increased distribution of £245,000 will all be provided out of the income for the current year. It is true that the receipts from legacies are again considerably below the average; but, on the other hand, we have received some most timely donations, including £6,000 and £2,250 from donors who wish to be anonymous, in addition to £5,000 from Lady Strathcona, a particular friend to the Fund, whose name I am authorised to mention. The British Charities Association, which gave us £15,000 last year for distribution amongst Hospitals in London, is this year giving us

£20,000. We have also received a further amount of £85,485 ros. in connection with the estate of Lord MountStephen. Apart from considerable funds retained for certain annuities, of which the Hospital Fund will be entitled to an eventual reversion, the sum I have the pleasure of reporting as already actually received in this connection is no less than £666,889. A further £4,500 has also been received from the estate of Mr. Samuel Lewis. These sums have, like previous receipts from the same sources, been placed to Capital Account. From the Wells Legacies, which were estimated at £200,000, the amount received to date is £162,240. If this year's grants are added to last year's, the total allocated so far is £138,000. It will be noted from these figures that the greater part of the sum available has, therefore, been distributed.

LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, referred to some new factors which, to some extent, militated against the successful working of the League. In regard to contributions from patients, the League approved that policy, so far as they were voluntary thankofferings; but they associated themselves with Lord Cave's Committee in the hope that the policy would not work to the detriment of the indigent sick or prevent the admission of the very poor for whom the Hospitals were primarily intended. With regard to other collecting agencies, the League of Mercy, by its title and its constitution, could only appeal to disinterested personal services without promise of any prospective benefits, even if these were nothing more than immunity from almoners' investigations, and admission without payment to the wards. So far as it was possible to estimate from the amounts already received, the League would be in a position this year to hand over £15,000 to the King's Fund, which was £500 more than last year. That would make the total of the contributions by the League of Mercy to the King's Fund £383,034. Then, in addition to that, this year they were making grants of £9,845 to extra-metropolitan Hospitals, and in that they had to acknowledge the assistance of the British Charities Association, which gave £5,000 towards that distribution. That made a grand total of the amount distributed by the League of Mercy in its twenty-six years to Voluntary Hospitals of £457,084.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches) and moved the recommendations (*see* pages 26-28).

Professor WINIFRED CULLIS, in seconding the motion, said that she would like to add one or two words of appreciation of the very great amount of work which the late Canon Westlake had done for the King's Fund as a member of the Propaganda Committee. On the very day before his death, in the midst of all his duties as custodian of the Abbey, he had found time to speak to one of his friends with regard to some fresh work that he was hoping to do for the Fund next year. They had lost a very great friend.

Major WERNHER (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals, including Recovery and Convalescent Branches (*see* pages 29-37).

The motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) then presented the Report of the Committee on the distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals and moved the recommendations (*see* page 38).

6. Every eligible Hospital which applied for a grant out of the ordinary distribution was inspected and reported upon, as usual, by two of the Fund's Visitors, one medical and the other lay. The Council are much indebted to the Visitors for the reports, which are of the greatest assistance in the distribution.

7. The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals, Convalescent Homes, and Consumption Sanatoria during the last ten years, after including all special distributions, is £3,154,438. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £5,252,854 8s. 5d. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

8. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her late Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as also were their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, Prince Henry, Prince George, Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles, and other members of the Royal Family.

9. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company ; £1,050 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland) Limited, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Limited, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £625 from the Earl of Iveagh, from Mr. Robert Fleming, and from Lloyds Bank, Limited ; of £525 from the Westminster Bank, Limited ; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, from Sir

John R. Ellerman, Bt., from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., and from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; and donations of £5,000 from the Lady Strathcona; £1,000 from Lord Glendyne, and from "J.R.B."; £500 15s. 6d. from "S.D.R.S.D.," and £500 from Messrs. Wallace Brothers & Co., Limited; besides anonymous donations of £6,000, £2,250, and £500. The munificent gifts of Lady Strathcona and the anonymous donors greatly helped in increasing the annual distribution. The Fund also received during the year an anonymous gift to the Capital Fund of securities valued at £8,297 12s.

10. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was £15,000. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £383,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are very grateful to the League for this valuable assistance, collected in moderate and continuous amounts from those whom it would otherwise have been difficult to reach.

11. The Fund also received the sum of £20,000 from the British Charities Association for distribution amongst the Hospitals in the London area, an increase of £5,000 on the amount received the previous year. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in again entrusting to the King's Fund the distribution of that part of their receipts which they have allocated to the London area.

12. Legacies received during the year included £50,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. John Wells, on account of residue; £85,485 10s. from the estate of the late Lord Mount-Stephen, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £666,889 1s. 7d. received to date); £4,500 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total sum of £512,513 4s. 6d. received to date). Other legacies during the year included £5,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Meyer Elias Sassoon; £4,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Robert Meggitt; £3,469 19s. 2d. from the estate of the late Mr. George Hunt Heigham, on account of residue (making a total sum of £37,014 17s. 2d. received to date); £1,004 12s. 11d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Woolland; and £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Charles Robert Edward Bell. The Fund also received £1,000 from the estate of the late Colonel Edward Willoughby Adams, the legacy duty on which was generously met by the residuary legatees.

EXPENSES.

13. During the year the amount spent on administration was £10,420 14s. 7d., or £2 10s. 4d. per £100 of the total received, as compared with £10,614 16s. 11d., or £2 11s. 5d. per £100, in the previous year. This is about 6d. in every £ received.

HOSPITAL EXTENSIONS.

14. In August, 1925, the Voluntary Hospitals Commission issued a Report containing the result of their enquiry into the extent of the additional voluntary hospital accommodation required in England and Wales, and the best means of providing and maintaining it.

28. The Council deeply regret the loss by death of Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake, who had been a member of the Council and of the Hospital Economy Committee, and a Medical Visitor for the Fund, and of Canon Westlake, who had been one of the most active members of the Propaganda Committee, and had himself devised and carried out several functions on its behalf. The Council also regret the resignation of Mr. Fred Hall, M.P., who had been a member for five years.

29. At the Meeting on December 15 the Council learned with regret of the decision of the late Lord Stuart of Wortley to resign, through failing health, the Chairmanship of the Management Committee. At the Annual Meeting on May 14, 1926, the sad news of his death on April 24 was reported, and the following resolution was passed:—

"That the General Council desire to record their deep regret at the death of Lord Stuart of Wortley. He was an original member of the Council at its foundation in 1897, when he was one of the Honorary Secretaries. He was a member of the Executive Committee from 1898 to 1921, and Chairman both of the Executive Committee and of the King's Fund Policy Committee in that year of crisis in voluntary hospital finance. In the reorganisation of the King's Fund Committees which followed, he became Chairman of the Management Committee and held that office till the end of 1925. During all this period and particularly during the last six years the King's Fund was very deeply indebted to Lord Stuart for the amount of time and energy which he devoted to its administration, and the way in which he placed his skill and experience at its disposal. The Council desire also to express on behalf of all connected with the Fund their sincere sympathy with Lord Stuart's family in their bereavement."

30. His Royal Highness the President has appointed the Earl of Donoughmore as Chairman of the Management Committee.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1926.

31. The King's Fund has assisted the hospitals to tide over their most urgent difficulties. But further gifts on a large scale are imperative, to overtake the deficiency in beds due to the war, and the additions necessitated by an increasing population. The scheme of pensions for hospital officers and nurses, if adopted, will involve immediate additional expenditure, the benefit of which will accrue later on.

32. In the realisation of this aim the Council look to the Newspaper Press for a continuance of the effective support which has been so steadily rendered in past years and for which the Council desire to express their indebtedness.

Distribution Meeting of President and General Council, December 15, 1925.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held on Tuesday, December 15, 1925, at 11.30 a.m., His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) read the Minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed and signed.

DEATH OF H.M. QUEEN ALEXANDRA.

Lord STUART OF WORTLEY (Chairman of the Management Committee) moved the following resolution :—

"That the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London desire to record their deep sorrow at the death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and their sense of the great loss which all connected with hospitals, in common with the rest of the nation, have suffered thereby.

"The Council desire respectfully to tender to His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, and the Royal Family, their heartfelt sympathy in the sad bereavement which has befallen them, and to offer the humble assurance of their loyalty and devotion."

Lord STUART said that in no company of loyal subjects of the British Crown for the last sixty years had the name of Her late Majesty been mentioned without evoking the chivalrous sentiments of admiration and thankfulness. The first glamour of Queen Alexandra's appearance on British soil grew deeper and firmer as it was realised that behind all the queenly qualities so graciously bestowed

Major-General Sir CECIL LOWTHER (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals (*see* pages 39-41).

The motion, having been seconded by Lord MILD MAY, was then put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of Viscount ULLSWATER, seconded by Mr. GEORGE ROBERTS, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 18.

WELLS LEGACIES DISTRIBUTION.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) then presented the Report of the Committee on the special distribution to Hospitals out of the Wells Legacies to date, in aid of extensions and improvements, and moved the recommendations (*see* pages 42 and 43).

Mr. LEONARD L. COHEN (Honorary Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospitals out of the Wells Legacies to date (*see* pages 44 and 45).

Sir WALTER LAWRENCE, Bt., having seconded, the motion was put and carried.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—

First let me read a gracious message sent by His Majesty the King, our Patron, which is as follows :—

Buckingham Palace,

December 15, 1925.

The King is glad to hear that the Fund has been able to increase its distribution from £235,000 to £245,000, and that with the extended area of its operations it now makes grants to no fewer than 133 Hospitals.

His Majesty is grateful to Lord Stuart of Wortley for all he has done as Chairman of the Management Committee, and, indeed, ever since the foundation of the Fund, of which he was one of the original Honorary Secretaries.

STAMFORDHAM.

I will also convey to His Majesty the Resolution that the Council has passed on the death of Queen Alexandra, and the very kind words in which it was proposed by Lord Stuart of Wortley.

The distribution this year covers a wider field than ever before, for the King's Fund area is now 380 square miles instead of 255, while the number of Hospitals helped has gone up from 118 to 133. The amount of the ordinary distribution has increased from £235,000 to £245,000, apart from the grants out of the Wells legacies, of which we distributed £81,000 last year, and are giving £57,000 this year. The combined total is, therefore, £302,000. The ordinary distribution of £245,000 comes from various sources. About two-thirds of it is secured by income from investments under the care of Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee. But about £82,000 has to be raised in the year. Our annual subscriptions have always been smaller than we think they should be, but this year they show a welcome increase, largely in the form of seven-year agreements, many of them so worded that the subscriber gives the King's Fund the benefit of any income tax saved by the agreement. The League of Mercy provides, as usual, a large sum, made up of innumerable small ones, for which the Council is very grateful indeed. Donations again include some of those unexpected gifts without which we could not maintain our distribution. This year we had two anonymous donations, one of

£6,000 and one of £2,250; and Lady Strathcona, whose father during his lifetime was one of our most generous benefactors, gave us £5,000. For the second year in succession the British Charities Association has entrusted the Fund with the distribution of a large sum. Last year the proportion allocated by the Association to London was £15,000. This year their receipts were greater, owing mainly to a competition organised with the co-operation of the *Daily Mail*, and the amount granted to the King's Fund for the Hospitals of London is £20,000. To all those who have so generously helped us by their gifts, and to the various Associations who have, by their work, strongly supported us, on your behalf and my own, I tender, as your President, our sincere thanks. But, if our income is thus increased, the demands on our funds are also growing. There are fifteen more hospitals on the list, including eleven brought in by the enlargement of our area, and the expenditure of the Hospitals is being continually increased by the discoveries of medical science, and by the provision of additional beds. This is what people sometimes forget. It is true that, while the Hospitals had a large annual deficit five years ago, they now have an annual surplus. This is, of course, if they are all taken together. There are still a large number of deficits each year, though not so many as there were. But I hope no one will think that, because the Hospitals have thus, by a great effort, improved their position, this is any reason for ceasing to subscribe. That would be quite wrong. If you're rowing in a boat race, you don't stop rowing just because your boat has got a fraction of a length in front, especially if, a little way back, your boat was behind, and if you know the other boat will be putting on a spurt almost directly. That's how it is in the race between Hospital income and Hospital expenditure. Five years ago income was some way behind; now it is a bit in front. But every new extension that is opened, every new discovery in Hospital treatment, means a fresh spurt on the part of expenditure. I do not say that this is an exact metaphor, but it will help to show what I mean. Perhaps some of the experts in literature or art, associated with our Propaganda Committee, might work out an illustration that would make really clear the effect of the growing expenditure, and the danger of any falling off in income. Taking extensions alone, the King's Fund, by devoting the Wells Legacies largely to this purpose, has been helping to provide 697 additional beds, which will all have to be maintained. And that is only part of the need. The Management Committee went into the whole question of extensions last year at the request of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission. Their conclusion roughly was that, whatever might be the total number of beds required, the immediate need was to expedite the schemes for the provision of the next 2,000 beds, after which it would be time enough to face the more distant future. The Commission, in their recent report, accepted this estimate for London, and added another 8,000 for the rest of England and Wales. Their report is a sort of brief guide to the subject of Hospital extensions, and shows once more the value of Lord Cave's recommendation that there should be a central body capable of surveying the voluntary Hospital problem for the country as a whole. The distribution of the Wells Legacies is again being largely used for this immediate object of expediting the provision of more beds. Sometimes the grant is conditional on the scheme being begun by a certain date. But in every case our idea is that the grant should act as a stimulus, to enable the Hospital to get the money for the scheme more rapidly than it would otherwise have done. But of course we have had to confine ourselves to the most urgent of the schemes, for we have only been able to set aside these two legacies for this purpose, and we have already distributed nearly three-quarters of the total. The Distribution Committee have also kept in mind the provision of more accident beds. Another forty will be added with the aid of this year's grants, making, with fifty-three last year and twenty provided without assistance from the Fund, a total of 113 since the report of our Ambulance Cases Committee. During the year the King's Fund has been taking part in a series of conferences on the subject of Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses.

The conference was representative of the whole country, the other parties being the British Hospitals Association, the Hospital Officers' Association, and the College of Nursing. The King's Fund acted as convener at the request of all three, and Lord Stuart of Wortley, Chairman of the Management Committee, presided. The conference prepared a memorandum describing a draft scheme of pensions, and this has just been issued by the King's Fund for the consideration of all the Hospitals. Six years ago a King's Fund Committee of Inquiry reported that the absence of any general pension scheme was causing hardship to the officers and nurses, and loss of efficiency to the Hospitals. In the case of nurses, the Memorandum states that many suitable women are at present deterred from entering the profession owing to the impossibility of making provision for old age. It is therefore a very proper subject for the King's Fund to take up. Another important piece of work this year is the revision of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, which has been occupying the Hospital Economy Committee for many months, and is now nearly finished. The Propaganda Committee are at present organising a programme of lectures in schools on the work of the Voluntary Hospitals and their place in the national life. A number of Hospital experts are taking part, and the lectures are arousing a great deal of interest. So, taking all these things together, the year 1925 has been a busy one. I now come to 1926. There will be a few changes in personnel. Lord Stuart of Wortley has, during the last six years, been Chairman successively of the Executive Committee, of the King's Fund Policy Committee during the Hospital crisis, and of the Management Committee which afterwards took over their functions. He now finds that the detailed work is more than he can continue to undertake. He has been closely connected with the Fund ever since its foundation, when, like Lord Somerleyton, he was one of the first Honorary Secretaries; and we owe a great deal to his experience and skill in dealing with men and affairs. I am pleased to say that he will remain a Member of the Council, and that he hopes to be able to finish the splendid work of the Pensions Conference, over which he has so ably presided at its numerous meetings this year. As his successor I am fortunate in being able to appoint Lord Donoughmore, who is well known to all as Lord Chairman of Committees of the House of Lords, and, to this Council particularly, as a member of the successive President's Powers Committees which have acted for me during my absences from England. Mr. Frederick Hall, M.P., is unable to attend the meetings of the Council, and I am appointing Mr. J. H. Thomas, M.P., to fill the vacancy. I propose also to add Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson and Mr. F. W. J. Jackson. I propose to make a slight change in the constitution of the Distribution Committee. The four medical members have to do more in the way of interviews, visits to Hospitals, and so on, than the four lay members, because the latter are helped by the Honorary Secretaries, three of whom are not members. Mr. Eccles, one of the laymen, is retiring from the Committee after many years of good service. I propose to appoint Dr. Morley Fletcher as an additional medical member, and the Honorary Secretaries as additional lay members. In Dr. Morley Fletcher's place on the Hospital Economy Committee I propose to appoint Mr. H. L. Eason. The Propaganda Committee has lost, by sudden death, two of its most active members, Mr. Hadrill and, quite recently, Canon Westlake, who had himself devised and personally carried out two or three most valuable pieces of work for the Fund. Miss C. M. A. Coombs and Mr. Arthur Powell, K.C., have resigned, and Mr. Allen Gill and Miss E. Williams have joined the Committee. It now only remains for me to express my thanks and yours to the Committees, and particularly, at this meeting, to the Distribution Committee and their Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry, and the Visitors. I have also to thank the President's Powers Committee, Lord Donoughmore, Lord Cave, and the Governor of the Bank of England, Mr. Norman, for their services during my absence overseas. And of course there is no danger of our forgetting the splendid work of the Honorary Secretaries. The King's Fund resembles the

Hospitals themselves in this, that it depends on the devoted service of a large number of voluntary workers ; and it is to this that it owes, in a great measure, its high place in the confidence of the British public.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1926.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (Lord STUART OF WORTLEY), seconded by the Viscount HAMBLETON, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1926.

VOTE OF THANKS.

The Chairman of the County Council (Captain O. E. WARBURG), in moving a hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for his presence in the Chair, said that the London County Council, over which he had the privilege to preside, had very responsible duties with regard to the health of the vast population of London, and they viewed with the greatest possible gratitude the wonderful work done in this connection by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London under the Presidency of His Royal Highness and his Royal predecessors. He was sure every member of the General Council was thankful that they had the advantages of His Royal Highness' great energy and public spirit in helping forward this great cause which they all desired to serve.

The Rev. Dr. W. T. A. BARBER having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Anderson, Sir Frederick Green, Sir Basil Mayhew, Sir Edward Penton, Sir John Craggs, Professor Winifred Cullis, Mr. Walter G. DEATH OF LORD STUART OF WORTLEY.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES moved the following resolution:—

“That the General Council desire to record their deep regret at the death of Lord Stuart of Wortley. He was an original member of the Council at its foundation in 1897, when he was one of the Honorary Secretaries. He was a member of the Executive Committee from 1898 to 1921, and Chairman both of the Executive Committee and of the King's Fund Policy Committee

in that year of crisis in voluntary hospital finance. In the reorganisation of the King's Fund Committees which followed, he became Chairman of the Management Committee and held that office till the end of 1925. During all this period and particularly during the last six years the King's Fund was very deeply indebted to Lord Stuart for the amount of time and energy which he devoted to its administration, and the way in which he placed his skill and experience at its disposal.

"The Council desire also to express on behalf of all connected with the Fund their sincere sympathy with Lord Stuart's family in their bereavement."

The resolution was put from the Chair, the Council rising in their places, and carried unanimously.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1925.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1925, said:—May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to present the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and Balance Sheet to December 31, 1925. In November last, when the estimates for the year were submitted, the Council decided that they would be justified in increasing the ordinary distribution from £235,000 to £245,000. The actual income received exceeded the amount estimated, with the result that, after including general legacies amounting to £19,549, a balance of £9,225 was added to the reserves. This is a useful margin, in view of the uncertainty attaching to the receipts from legacies, and in view of the anxiety of the Council to avoid any necessity of reducing the distribution below the figure to which they have succeeded in raising it. In addition to the ordinary distribution of £245,000, there were grants amounting to £57,000 made from the proceeds of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells. These grants have been allocated by the Council to special purposes, mainly to extensions and improvements. The total amount distributed in this connection to the close of 1925 was £138,000. A further £21,000 has been distributed during the present year. Assuming that the Wells legacies realise the amount of the original estimates, the balances still to be allocated should amount to about £41,000. The position of the Fund as regards the capital remains satisfactory. The value of the investments on December 31 last was within 4 per cent. of the book values. These values are those of July 1908, or those ruling at the dates of subsequent purchase or receipt. During the year 1925, a further sum of £85,485 was received from the bequest of Lord MountStephen and £4,500 from the Lewis estate, with a consequent addition of £89,000 to the capital funds. The importance which we attach to the continuance of this policy of increasing our capital funds at every convenient opportunity is patent when it is borne in mind that the income from investments last year, though large in itself, covered only about two-thirds of the distribution of £245,000, still leaving some £90,000 to be raised during the year from other and less permanent sources. I now have the honour to move the adoption of the Accounts.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by the Governor of the Bank of England (The Rt. Hon. MONTAGU NORMAN), was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1925 (see pages 5 to 10).

The Hon. Sir ARTHUR STANLEY having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was put and carried unanimously.

PROPAGANDA.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Sir GEORGE LAWSON JOHNSTON) presented the Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee (*see* pages 46 to 48), and moved the recommendation that it be published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for the year 1925.

The VISCOUNT BURNHAM, in seconding, said as Chairman of the Propaganda Committee that, though the net income derived from its various activities was not large, he believed that the indirect results were prodigious. The Propaganda Committee had initiated new and various methods of reaching the public mind. He drew attention specially to the lectures given by various distinguished people in the secondary schools of the country which would instruct the rising generation as to what the system of voluntary hospitals meant, and read the following extracts from a letter written by the Secretary of Whitelands College to Mr. Jay, to whom great credit was due: "I certainly feel that interest in Hospitals generally has been stimulated by this lecture, and that a new outlook has been given to those students who hitherto knew little or nothing of such institutions. I feel that teachers have it in their power to influence the children in their schools." He had been handed that morning a letter enclosing a cheque for the King's Fund in grateful appreciation of the splendid work of the British Broadcasting Company during the crisis, and he would like to acknowledge the obligation of the Propaganda Committee to the British Broadcasting Company for the manner in which they had aided the Committee in their work.

HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS.

The Chairman of the Hospital Economy Committee (Mr. LEONARD L. COHEN), in presenting a Report of the Committee on the New Edition of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (*see* page 48), said that the revision of the Revised System had now been completed. The new volume, which was the Fourth Edition, had been issued by the authority of the King's Fund, the Hospital Sunday Fund, and the Hospital Saturday Fund, and had been prepared after consultation with the British Hospitals Association and the Hospital Officers' Association. It had also been circulated to all the hospitals on the books of the Fund, and their views had been invited before the final draft was completed. The present revision was necessary in order to bring the hospital accounts into line with modern requirements. There had been added to the new volume certain new material comprised in three sections of the Appendix, dealing with the internal control of expenditure by means of Quantity Statistics, Periodical Budgets, and Departmental Costing. As there appeared to be some misapprehension (for which he could not find any justification), he would like to repeat that these sections formed no part of the rules with which the various hospitals applying for grants to the Fund had to comply. They were, however, recommended to hospitals as ensuring a greater measure of control, a matter which he was sure engaged the earnest attention of all hospital authorities.

PENSIONS FOR HOSPITAL OFFICERS AND NURSES.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE) presented the following Report of the Committee on the question of Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, and moved the recommendations, viz. :—

1. The draft scheme of Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, details of which were circulated to the General Council in December last, has now reached a stage at which the Management Committee desire to elicit an expression of opinion from the Council.

Origin of the Scheme.

2. The question of a general scheme of pensions has been under discussion for at least twenty years. In 1914 the King's Fund, at the request of the Hospital Officers' Association and with the concurrence of the hospitals, appointed a Committee of Enquiry under the Chairmanship of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, F.I.A. The Report of this Committee was presented in 1919 and published by the King's Fund for the consideration of the parties concerned. By the end of 1924 first the College of Nursing and then the Hospital Officers' Association had prepared schemes on the lines suggested in the Report, and had (after correspondence with the King's Fund) submitted them to the British Hospitals Association. The result was that all three parties concurred in asking the King's Fund to convene a Conference to discuss the question.

3. The Conference, which was presided over by the late Lord Stuart of Wortley, expressed sympathy with the principle of a pension scheme for the administrative and nursing staffs, prepared a memorandum in which the two schemes were combined, with a few modifications, to form one draft scheme, and, without itself pronouncing any judgment, circulated the memorandum to the hospitals of the whole country for their consideration and for expressions of opinion and suggestions.

Reasons for the Scheme.

4. The scheme is designed to remove various difficulties which arise from the absence of any general system, *e.g.*, the inadequacy and uncertainty of the present provision for old age, the derangement in the finances which at most hospitals follows the grant of a pension, and the resulting tendency to postpone unduly the age of retirement; the loss of all pension rights on migration to another hospital, with the consequent restriction on the choice of officers and on the openings for promotion; and the effect which the absence of pension prospects has in deterring suitable entrants to hospital service, especially in the case of nurses, whose working life is comparatively short. These difficulties not only cause hardships to individuals, but militate against the full efficiency of the voluntary hospitals.

Its Principal Features.

5. The scheme, as drafted, includes the salaried staff of the hospitals, administrative, clerical and dispensing, all female professional nurses whether in hospitals or in other branches of nursing service, and probationer nurses after their first year of training. In its general outlines it follows the Federated Superannuation System for Universities. Complete provision would be made in advance by contributions from employers and employees; policies would be taken out with insurance companies to secure superannuation benefits in various alternative forms; and the policies would follow the officer or nurse on migration or, within certain limits, on leaving the service altogether.

The Present Position.

6. The Draft Scheme Memorandum was sent to 144 hospitals in London, containing 14,748 beds. Replies have been received from ninety-three, containing 11,300 beds. Of these, fifty-two hospitals, containing 8,263 beds, expressed general approval with or without reservations on points of details, and usually subject to the scheme proving financially practicable. Another nine hospitals were giving it sympathetic consideration; four expressed sympathy with a scheme; nine raised points of detail without expressing any general view; and four reserved their opinion. Only fifteen, containing 581 beds, sent definitely negative replies.

7. Several of the hospitals asked the King's Fund to convene a conference of hospitals in London that were in sympathy with the Scheme to discuss details. This the Management Committee have agreed to do, and the conference will be held on May 19.

8. The principal questions that will come before this conference will be whether, or on what conditions, probationer nurses after their first year should be included in the scheme; the closely allied question how long a probationer or nurse should remain in the profession in order to obtain the benefit of the hospital contributions; and the question to what extent and in what way the King's Fund could offer financial assistance.

9. On the question of probationer nurses, it is pointed out, on the one hand, that their inclusion adds to the expenditure of the hospitals, and that this would be largely for the benefit of probationers who will not remain in hospital service, and many of whom may not remain in nursing service at all, or may not be able to secure the maintenance of their policies while in private nursing. On the other hand, it is urged that some provision for a pension is necessary if suitable candidates are not to be deterred by their friends and advisers from entering the nursing profession; that, if they do not begin to make provision while in training, the difficulty of doing so later on is greatly increased; that much of the nursing work of the hospitals is done by probationers; and that the hospital contribution for those who do not remain in the profession for the specified number of years will come back to the hospital.

Attitude of the King's Fund.

10. The Management Committee consider that, for the reasons given above, the establishment of a general scheme of pensions of the kind proposed is in the best interests of the hospitals as well as of the officers and nurses. They welcome the initiative taken, on the lines suggested by the report of the King's Fund Committee of Enquiry, by the College of Nursing, and by the Hospital Officers' Association, and the response to that initiative by the British Hospitals Association and the individual hospitals. They consider that the King's Fund would be promoting the efficiency of the hospital service by offering financial assistance so far as it reasonably can.

11. The Management Committee accordingly recommend—

- (a) That, in making annual grants to maintenance to hospitals on its list at the ordinary distribution, the King's Fund should take into account (subject to such conditions as may be approved by the Management Committee) the amount spent by a hospital on an approved contributory pensions scheme, including amounts spent in respect of existing officers and retired officers;
- (b) That it be referred to the Management Committee to consider the question by what method the funds required to carry out the above recommendation could be provided without affecting the grants that would otherwise have been made, and to take action thereon;
- (c) that it be referred to the Distribution Committee to consider the question by what method and on what basis the above expenditure should be specially taken into account without affecting the grants that would otherwise have been made; and, after consulting the Management Committee, to take action thereon in preparing their recommendations to the General Council.

As the hospitals will doubtless desire to know on what scale assistance from the King's Fund may be anticipated, the Management Committee further recommend—

- (d) that the assistance offered by the King's Fund should be on the following scale, viz. a maximum sum for seven years of £20,000 a year, or 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the approved Scheme, whichever is the smaller; this amount to be provided as far as possible by means of contributions obtained by a special appeal in selected quarters and to be increased if sufficient funds are realised by such appeal.

The Management Committee further recommend—

- (e) that this Report be circulated to the hospitals which have received invitations to the Conference on May 19, and be published;

The recommendations, having been seconded by Lord DOVERDALE, were put one by one and carried unanimously.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who, on rising to address the Council, was received with acclamation, said:—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—This annual meeting of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London is held under somewhat happier conditions than seemed possible some few days ago. I sincerely trust that the hopes of peace which are now in all our minds will be realised.

I have now the honour to read the following gracious message from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund:—

“Buckingham Palace, S.W. 1.,

“May 14, 1926.

“It is a great satisfaction to the King to know that the distribution of £245,000 in 1925 was covered by the income for that year, and His Majesty congratulates King Edward's Hospital Fund upon this successful achievement, which he trusts will be repeated in 1926.

“His Majesty deeply regrets the loss sustained by the death of Lord Stuart of Wortley, one of the original Honorary Secretaries of the Fund, who, since its foundation twenty-nine years ago, had served it so well and faithfully.

“STAMFORDHAM.”

—At our December meeting we had the reports of the Distribution Committee, dealing with grants which amounted in all to £302,000. At this meeting we have, besides the accounts for the year, reports from the Revenue, Hospital Economy, and Management Committees, all on special points arising out of the many-sided work of the Fund. We are glad to hear from Lord Revelstoke, our Treasurer, that the record distribution of £245,000 was met out of the year's income; and that there was enough margin to give us a good prospect of being able to maintain that total undiminished in future years, if we continue to receive a fair average amount from legacies, and if our receipts from subscriptions and donations are kept up. The steady increase in the distribution in recent

years has been, to a great extent, due to special donations. Last year the British Charities Association entrusted us with £20,000 for distribution to hospitals in London. This was £5,000 more than in 1924. We received £5,000 from Lady Strathcona; another £6,000 from the anonymous donor to whom I have had the pleasure of referring in previous years; and £2,250 from someone else, also anonymous. A good deal depends on whether we continue to receive similar generous gifts. I am pleased to say that already the anonymous donor who gave the £6,000 last year has sent us a further £7,000, which will be a great help towards this year's distribution. The Revenue Committee present another interesting report of the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee. They seem to be very ingenious in devising original ways of making known the work of the King's Fund and of the hospitals. The Hospital Economy Committee have carried through a much-needed piece of work, in the revision of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts. This brings up to date the work begun by the late Sir Henry Burdett, and subsequently developed by the late Mr. John G. Griffiths. I am glad to see that the new revised form, like the old, is adopted jointly by the King's Fund, the Sunday Fund and the Saturday Fund, acting in co-operation. The Committee have followed the good custom of not making any new rules without first consulting the hospitals which would have to adopt them in order to qualify for grants, and the hospital officers who would have to carry them out. Then there are new sections, dealing with internal financial control, which are only put forward as suggestions and not as rules at all. The Report of the Management Committee on the subject of Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses is also the result of discussions with the various parties concerned. There have been conferences between the King's Fund and the associations representing the hospitals, the officers and the nurses; and circulars have been issued inviting the comments of the individual hospitals. The report states the problem and proposes a solution on the lines of the scheme that is already in force at the Universities of this country. The problem is constantly coming up in an acute form, involving not only the interests of the individuals concerned but also the efficiency of the hospitals. Senior officers often have to be kept on when they are really too old. Efficiency suffers. Capable subordinates find that promotion inside the hospital is blocked. Efficiency suffers. They cannot go to higher posts in other hospitals because they would take with them pension liabilities for all their past service but no pension rights. Efficiency suffers. Then take the nurses. Not only the efficiency but the very work of the hospitals depends on their being able to continue to get the right type of woman to enter the nursing profession. But the nurse's working life is short: and though the young nurse may be ready to consider the work first and the pay afterwards, we are told by the College of Nursing that her friends and guardians bring up the objection that she will not be able to make any adequate provision for old age. And they say that this makes it difficult to get enough recruits of the kind the hospitals most need. I am sure no one wants to take advantage of the keenness and enthusiasm which the nurses bring to their work when they are young, and then to leave them without any provision when they are old. But that by itself might not be enough to justify the King's Fund in actively associating itself with the scheme, were it not for its effect on hospital efficiency in the ways I have mentioned. As it is, the scheme has been unanimously approved at the meetings of all the Committees of the Fund before which it has been brought. If it succeeds in its objects, it will remove a real hardship to individuals engaged in hospital work, especially nurses: it will increase the efficiency of the hospitals; and it will help to stabilise their finances by providing for the liability in regular annual instalments, instead of leaving it to be faced all at once when it becomes due. And, in providing these instalments, the officers and nurses will be doing

their share by regular contributions deducted from their salaries. If, as the replies from the hospitals show, there is a widespread agreement that these advantages are worth the additional expenditure involved, and if the King's Fund endorses this view and is prepared to offer financial assistance, is it too much to hope that it will commend itself also to the supporters of the hospitals and of the Fund? There are some who like to hear of some definite way in which they can help the hospitals to solve some particular problem. There may be some to whom this scheme makes a two-fold appeal: it will enable the hospitals to provide in a business-like way for an essential part of their expenditure; and it will remove a heavy burden of apprehension from the members of the nursing profession, to whose skill and devotion every member of the community owes so great a debt. The death of Lord Stuart of Wortley is a severe loss to the King's Fund. He was one of the original members. It was only in December last that I spoke of his impending resignation from the Chairmanship of the Management Committee, and we had hoped that we might long have the benefit of his assistance at Council Meetings. He had taken a very special interest in the pensions question; and had presided over the series of conferences last year at which all the particulars of the Scheme were drafted. In this connection and many other ways he will be greatly missed.

Just one word in conclusion. The hospitals, like everyone else, will have suffered financially through recent events, and I trust that there will be a general determination to see that the loss shall be only temporary.

VOTE OF THANKS.

Lord MILDMAY, in moving a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for presiding, said they were all deeply grateful to His Royal Highness not only for his presence in the Chair that day but also for his continuous and careful interest in the work of the Council, in the administration of the Fund, and in the working of the various Committees. This was no superficial interest, but a very real, and always had been a very real and helpful interest, and such interest was happily traditional in his family. His words of appreciation of the Pensions Scheme would encourage hospital workers throughout the country.

The President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir JOHN BLAND-SUTTON, Bt.), in seconding the vote, assured His Royal Highness that his presence there that day and always at all times amongst them at King Edward's Hospital Fund was a powerful stimulus for good.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES having acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £243,000, as against £233,000 last year.

2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 133, as against 118 in 1924. Eleven hospitals have been brought in by the extension of the Fund's area from 9 miles round Charing Cross to 11 miles round St. Paul's, viz., Hanwell, Barnet, Enfield, Buckhurst Hill, Woodford, Ilford, Bromley (2), Carshalton, Kingston and Twickenham; and four new applications have been received from within the old area, viz., from the Gordon Hospital for Fistula, King Edward VII's Hospital for Officers, the London Jewish Hospital, and the Weir Hospital. This has considerably added to the demands on the funds available for distribution.

3. Taken as a whole, the hospitals continued to maintain in 1924 the improved financial position which had been gradually reached since the crisis in 1920. For the second year in succession there was an aggregate excess of income over expenditure. It is true that, owing to a small decrease in legacies, the excess was less than in 1923. But it was less unevenly distributed, the proportion of hospitals with deficits having fallen from 48 per cent. to 46 per cent. At the same time additions are continually being made to the number of beds available, so that a larger income is still required not only to meet the remaining deficits, but to cover the growing work.

4. In these circumstances the Distribution Committee found it necessary to make a considerable increase in the amount allocated to maintenance grants, the total being £214,075, as against £197,275 in 1924. As this increase exceeds the increase in the total amount available, the difference has been made up by a decrease in the grants in aid of schemes of capital expenditure, which amount to £28,925, as against £35,725 in 1924. The hospitals which have urgent schemes of extension or improvement have not, however, suffered by this change, since large sums, amounting in all to £57,000, have been allocated to such schemes out of the special distribution of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, which forms the subject of a separate report.

5. The whole question of the extension of hospitals has been brought to the front by the issue, in August last, of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission's report on voluntary hospital accommodation in England and Wales.

The King's Fund, as Voluntary Hospitals Committee for London, had assisted in the collection of information as to the need for beds by means of the Commission's questionnaire to hospitals. A good many of the hospitals limited their replies to the number of beds that would be provided by their existing extension schemes, and, for this and other reasons, the King's Fund was not able to attempt any complete estimate. It ultimately reported that 2,088 additional beds, over and above the existing 13,000, represented such portion of the requirements estimated by the hospitals as came within the limits of practicable possibilities, including the possibility of some increase being made in the resources of the voluntary system for this purpose.

On a somewhat similar basis the Commission, in their report, suggest the addition of about 2,000 beds in London and about 8,000 in the provinces, making 10,000 for all England and Wales. The Commission recommend Government assistance, subject to various conditions. This assistance would cover considerably less than half the capital cost of providing the additional beds, if equipment, accommodation for nurses, etc., are taken into account.

The hospitals of London would thus have to raise at least half the capital cost, and the whole of the maintenance cost. At present they are, by their own efforts and by the help of the King's Fund ordinary distribution and Wells legacies distribution, endeavouring to raise the total needed, both for capital and for maintenance, for some of the most urgent of the schemes.

6. The Distribution Committee have again paid special attention to the subject of bed accommodation for accidents. The provision of beds for ambulance cases has been made a condition of many of the Wells grants. The total number of additional accident beds either already opened since the Report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee, or about to be provided by extension schemes passed by the Fund, now amounts to 113.

7. In this connexion, the Distribution Committee have also taken up the question whether the appointment of resident medical officers has become necessary at various hospitals that have recently been enlarged, or are situated in districts in which road accidents are exceptionally liable to occur. The Committee asked the Visitors to report specially on the arrangements at such hospitals, and they suggest that, in several cases, the remarks of the Visitors should be forwarded to the Hospital Committees with a request that they should consider the question, and let the Fund have their observations.

8. The following grants made in previous years have not yet been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule :—

East Ham Hospital, £500 to rebuilding.
French Hospital, £100 to improvements.

General Lying-in Hospital, £4,000 to rebuilding.

Queen Charlotte's Maternity Hospital, £2,600, balance of grant of £3,100 to operating theatre and other improvements.

Royal National Orthopædic Hospital, £1,000 to extension of out-patient department.

St. Bartholomew's Hospital, £1,000 to new operating theatres.

The Committee consider that all these grants should be renewed, and are recommending the Council accordingly.

9. The Distribution Committee are again indebted to the Revenue Committee and Hospital Economy Committee for most useful reports and recommendations based on the analyses of income and of cost of working in the Fund's Statistical Report. Private remarks based on these recommendations have been attached to the grants.

10. The work of the Visitors was increased both in amount and in value by the enlargement of the Fund's area. There were more hospitals to visit ; they were often a long way from the centre of London and from each other, and they were almost unknown to the Fund. The Visitors' reports provided the Distribution Committee, for these new hospitals as for the others, with first-hand information about their condition and their work. In many cases the longer distances made motor transport necessary, but the cost of this to the Fund was reduced by the kindness of Visitors who provided their own cars. Extracts from the reports are often attached privately to the grants, with a request for the observations of the Hospital Committee.

11. The list of grants is appended.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON THE SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OUT OF THE LEGACIES OF THE LATE MR. AND MRS. WELLS, JANUARY 1 TO DECEMBER 31, 1925.

1. In 1924 the President and General Council decided that the King's Fund, having recently invested more than £1,100,000 from the bequests of Lord MountStephen and Sir Thomas Sutherland, should make the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells, estimated at about £200,000, the subject of an extraordinary distribution to meet special needs of the hospitals, and particularly the need for extensions and improvements and increased provision for accident cases.

2. The following methods of applying the Wells legacies, in whole or in part, were approved by the Council :—

- (a) assistance in the provision of additional hospital accommodation, including accommodation for accident cases, by grants towards capital expenditure on schemes of extension, or towards the reduction of deficits on schemes that have been completed, or towards the opening of beds in extensions that have already been provided but are not yet available for the patients for whom they were intended ;
- (b) assistance towards schemes of improvement as distinct from schemes of extension ;
- (c) increased grants to maintenance, including the maintenance of additional beds.

3. The Council also approved the suggestion that it might sometimes be desirable to attach definite conditions to the grants, *e.g.*, a condition that additional beds should be opened, or that beds should be reserved for accident cases, or that a scheme should be put in hand at once, or that the balance required, or a specified part thereof, should be raised.

4. The General Council gave the Distribution Committee power to act in cases where, for reasons of urgency, it should be found desirable to take immediate action.

5. The Distribution Committee have accordingly considered the applications for grants that have come before them at their monthly meetings, and have from time to time made grants in aid of schemes which appeared to them to be of such a nature, and to have reached such a stage, that an immediate offer of assistance from the Wells legacies would have the greatest effect in promoting the objects of the special distribution. They are now recommending a further list of grants as the result of their examination of all the schemes which came before them at the ordinary distribution.

6. The schemes to which grants have been made or recommended for the year 1925 will increase the number of beds available for patients by 396, of which 40 will be reserved for accident cases. If to these are added the accident beds provided by the schemes to which Wells grants were made in 1924, and those provided by hospitals without special assistance from the King's Fund, the total number of additional accident beds, provided and to be provided, since the report of the Ambulance Cases Disposal Committee, is 113.

7. As there are various schemes which are not yet ripe for consideration in this connexion the Committee suggest that the special powers given to them for this purpose should be continued.

8. The list of grants made or recommended for 1925 is appended and amounts to £57,000. This, with £81,000 distributed last year, covers £138,000 out of the total of the legacies, which is estimated at about £200,000.

BELGRAVE HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN.—£2,000 towards erection of new wing to be used temporarily for nurses' accommodation so as to enable the hospital to open 12 beds, thus increasing the number available from 62 to 74; to be the last £2,000 required in order to secure a conditional donation of £10,000.

BOLINGBROKE HOSPITAL.—£2,500 towards extension from 60 beds to 92, to be the last £2,500 to enable the extension to be opened free of debt, on the understanding that the balance is raised by the hospital and that, when the extension is opened, 10 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

BRENTFORD COTTAGE HOSPITAL.—£1,000 towards the building of the new hospital, increasing the number of beds from 7 to 16; on condition that the contract is signed by January 1, 1926.

INVALID AND CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S SOCIETY'S HOSPITAL.—£500 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 28 to 40, as a grant to start the appeal for the scheme.

JEWISH MATERNITY HOME.—£1,000 towards extension from 13 beds to 39, to be the last £1,000 required to render the extension free of debt.

KENSINGTON DISPENSARY AND CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL.—£500 to first stage of rebuilding as PRINCESS LOUISE KENSINGTON HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN, on condition that beds are provided as well as an out-patient department.

KING EDWARD MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, EALING.—£2,000 toward extension from 62 beds to 102; being £1,000 to start the appeal for the scheme, and £1,000 to be the last £1,000 required to render the extension free of debt, without depleting the hospital's free capital, on the understanding that the work is put in hand by March 31, 1926.

LONDON JEWISH HOSPITAL.—£2,500 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 51 to 84, and including separate nurses' home and extension of out-patient department; £1,250 of the grant to be payable when the nurses' home and out-patient department are begun, and £1,250 when the whole scheme is finished.

LONDON LOCK HOSPITAL.—£1,000 towards the building of the extension of the out-patient department at the Dean Street Hospital.

METROPOLITAN HOSPITAL.—£5,000 towards new nurses' home and accident ward of 9 beds ; to be payable as soon as a further £5,000 has been raised by the hospital from other sources ; on the understanding that the nurses' home will be put in hand by January 1, 1926, and that, when the ward is opened, 9 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL.—£10,000 in July, 1925, as a first grant to the reconstruction scheme ; and £10,000 in December, 1925, as a second grant.

ROYAL FREE HOSPITAL.—£1,000 towards new children's ward providing 18 additional cots, on the understanding that, as a result of the consequent re-arrangement of hospital beds, 9 beds will be provided for accident cases.

ROYAL HOSPITAL, RICHMOND.—£1,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 66 to 82 ; to be the last £1,000 required to enable the extension to be opened free of debt ; on the understanding that the balance is raised by the hospital without drawing on investments now held for other purposes, and that, when the extension is opened, 4 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

ROYAL NATIONAL ORTHOPÆDIC HOSPITAL.—£5,000 towards extension of out-patient department at Great Portland Street ; to be the last £5,000 required to enable the extension to be opened free of debt, on condition that the work is put in hand by January 1, 1926 ; and £3,000 towards extension of country branch at Stanmore from 100 beds to 252, to be the last £3,000 required to complete the first £40,000 for the scheme ; subject to the conditions of the grant of £5,000 to the out-patient department extension being fulfilled first.

ROYAL WATERLOO HOSPITAL FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN.—£3,000 towards final stage of extension scheme, including new nurses' accommodation, to be the last £3,000 required to enable the extension to be opened free of debt.

WILLESDEN GENERAL HOSPITAL.—£3,000 towards extension, increasing the number of beds from 78 to 100 ; to be the last £3,000 required to open the whole building free of debt ; on the understanding that the balance is raised by the hospital without drawing on general fund cash or investments, and on condition that the new ward block is put in hand by the middle of October 1925, and that, when the ward block is opened, 8 beds will be reserved for accident cases.

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1925.

1. The Propaganda Committee, appointed in 1923, under the chairmanship of Lord Burnham, as a sub-committee of the Revenue Committee, continues actively to carry out its twofold object, viz. to promote schemes for raising money for the King's Fund in the fields of Education, Art, Science, Literature, and Law, and to organise general propaganda of the work of the King's Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

2. The principal activities during 1925 were :—

- (a) Series of Popular Science Lectures by eminent scientists in twelve colleges and technical institutes in and around London, January, February, and March;
- (b) Third series of Lectures and Counter-Lectures on literary and topical subjects at the London School of Economics, April, May, and June;
- (c) Special visits to Westminster Abbey, conducted by the late Mr. Westlake, on July 7, 21, and 28;
- (d) Humour Exhibition, held at Spring Gardens Gallery, from November 2 to 21;
- (e) Two special matinées of Mr. Walter de la Mare's play "Crossings" on November 19 and 20, kindly organised by the British Charities Association on behalf of the Committee;
- (f) Issue of pamphlet "Why a Modern Hospital Costs so Much," which has been widely distributed amongst those attending the functions and amongst others likely to be interested;
- (g) Reassembling of Hospitals Film, shown at Wembley in 1924, and its display during the latter part of the year in the Mac Fisheries Cinema Theatre, Blackfriars;
- (h) Lectures by a panel of experts on the Work of the Hospitals to some thirty schools and training colleges in London and the surrounding districts.

4. It will be seen that a large part of the work of the Committee is propaganda pure and simple, designed to spread knowledge of the work of the Hospitals and of the King's Fund. For example, there can be no doubt that the Educational Lectures are developing in the rising generation a keener interest in the actual work of the Hospitals, and a greater sense of responsibility for their maintenance and support. Letters from heads of schools and colleges in which lectures have been delivered testify to the great value which they attach to this method of propaganda.

5. The Committee have kept the same object in the foreground even at the functions which aim at a direct monetary return. The amount of publicity gained through the Press

in connection with these activities has been remarkable, and, as a result, the name of the King's Fund has now become familiar in many quarters where until recently its work was little known.

6. In all their activities it has been the aim of the Committee to supplement and help, but not to compete with, the efforts of the Hospitals themselves; and the co-operation of many Hospital representatives has been of the greatest assistance to them in their work.

HOSPITAL ECONOMY COMMITTEE.

REVISED UNIFORM SYSTEM OF HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS.

1. The Hospital Economy Committee have completed the revision of the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, and it has been issued to the Hospitals with the authority of the King's Fund, the Hospital Sunday Fund and the Hospital Saturday Fund, and will apply to the accounts for 1926 (*see page 88*).

2. The original Uniform System was revised in 1906 with the assistance of the late Mr. John G. Griffiths, F.C.A., and a Committee of Hospital Secretaries. It was brought up to date in 1914, and supplementary memoranda were subsequently issued from time to time dealing with new questions as they arose.

3. During the intervening period there has been a great increase in the accounting knowledge of Hospital Officers, and it has been generally recognised that the time has come for a further advance.

4. The new edition has been prepared after consultation with the British Hospitals Association, the Incorporated Association of Hospital Officers, and the Hospitals on the books of the Fund, by a Sub-Committee under the Chairmanship of Sir Basil Mayhew, F.C.A., from material drafted by Mr. Hugh Macrae, C.A., Departmental Secretary to the Committee.

5. The main features of the System have been retained with some important amendments in detail, and sections have been added dealing with the Internal Control of Expenditure by means of Quantity Statistics, Periodical Budgets and Analyses of Departmental Expenditure. It is, however, clearly stated that these new sections are not part of the rules with which Hospitals applying for grants are required to comply.

6. In its new form, therefore, the Revised Uniform System will continue to prescribe a minimum standard of uniformity in the published accounts, and will at the same time suggest lines along which the Hospitals can gradually develop still further the useful control of the financial side of their work.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London,

7 WALBROOK, E.C. 4.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council. (Page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 to 3.

Since July 1921 the Fund, by the invitation of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission, has acted as the Voluntary Hospitals Committee for the London area under the scheme recommended by Lord Cave's Committee for the reorganisation of Voluntary Hospital finance.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes

or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January and applies to the Accounts of the year 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries or the Secretary, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-seven years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £5,250,000, including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3, to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1925 being £245,000, besides £57,000, in aid of hospital extensions, out of the legacies of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wells.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 7s. 0d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over 3d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £383,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-seven years, the contribution in 1925 being £15,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following page). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to

effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are being encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

Special enquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions; Expenses of Charity Entertainments; Co-operative Contracts; the Out-patient Question; the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; Policy to be recommended for the Preservation of the Voluntary System of Hospital Management and Control; Hospital Accommodation for Ambulance Cases; Quantity Statistics; Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
