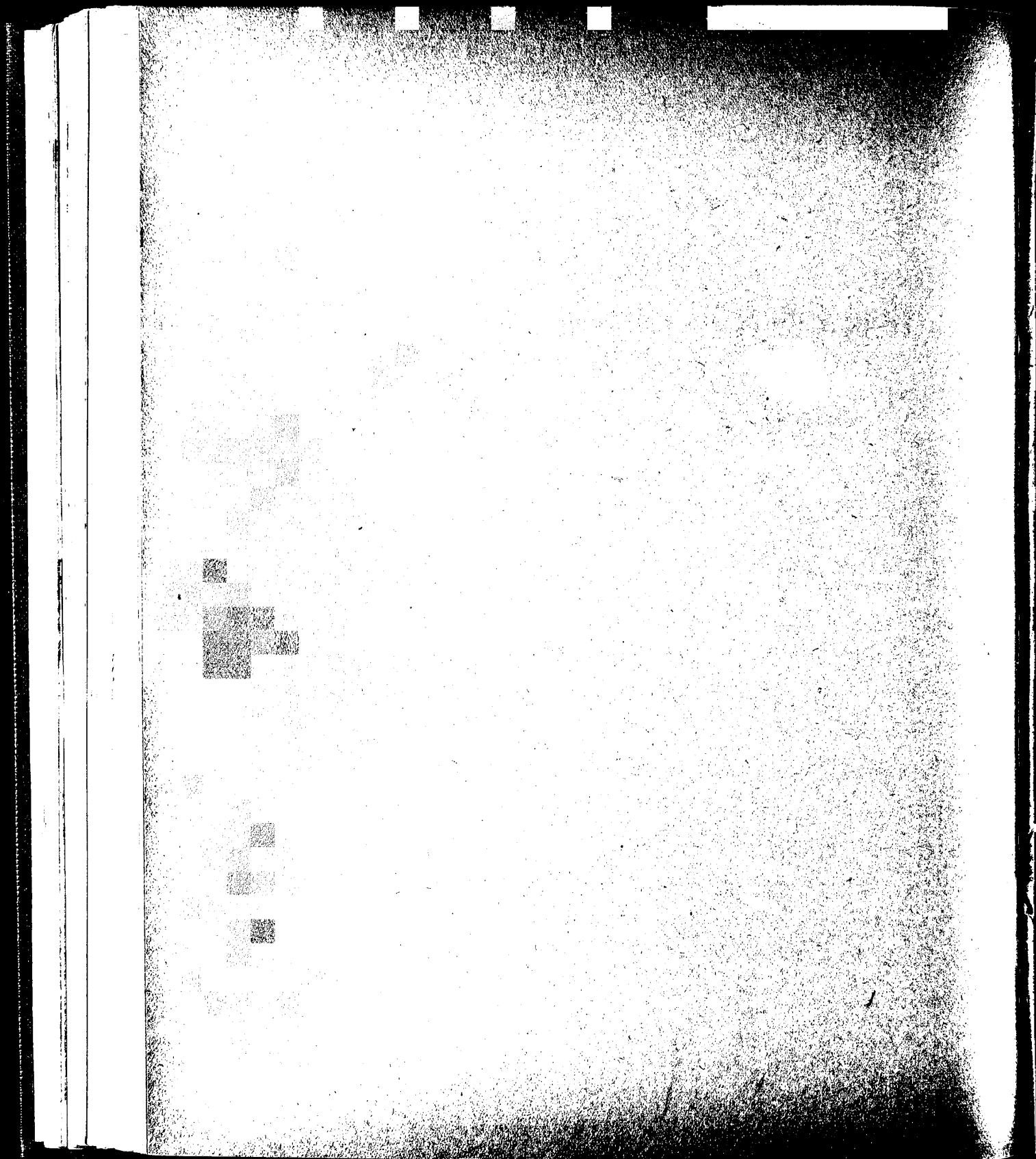

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1931.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

1. In spite of the financial crisis which developed in August the King's Fund was able in December to make another increase in the ordinary distribution, which was £250,000 in 1929, £266,000 in 1930, and £275,000 in 1931.

2. In making this increase, the King's Fund was greatly helped by another gift of £9,000 from the anonymous donor whose contributions during the past few years now amount to £63,500 ; by the fact that, for the fourth year in succession, general fund legacies amounted to more than £60,000 ; and by the receipt of £10,000 from the British Charities Association for distribution to hospitals in London.

3. The increased distribution was particularly encouraging, not only for the financial help which it afforded, but also as an additional sign of the strength of the voluntary hospitals, the aggregate income of which steadily increased from 1926 onwards, while the number and amount of the surpluses exceeded that of the deficits every year, including even 1931.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND DISTRIBUTION.

4. The total receipts of the King's Fund for the year 1931 were £345,743 11s. 9d.

5. This total included a gift of £10,000 from an anonymous donor, to be used for certain special purposes, with £9 17s. 3d. interest to December 31st ; £317 9s. 1d. Special Trust Gift (1930), interest to be applied to the reduction of capital charges on hospitals in the (Metropolitan) Boroughs of Deptford, Greenwich, Lewisham and Woolwich ; £6,480 2s. added to the fund for the purchase of radium ; a further sum of £783 16s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel

Lewis; £69,274 13s. 1d. general legacies; and £258,877 13s. 9d. general receipts. These general receipts were made up as follows:—

6. The amount of the ordinary distribution was £275,000, an increase of £9,000 over 1930, apart from the special pensions grants, which amounted to £19,313, as against £16,468 in 1930.

8. The Council have again to thank the Visitors, both medical and lay, for the time and labour they have devoted to inspecting and reporting on hospitals applying for grants. These

reports are before the appropriate Committee of the Fund when the annual distribution is being considered, and are found to be of the greatest assistance.

9. The total sum distributed amongst hospitals and convalescent homes during the last ten years, including all special distributions, is £3,247,491. Since the foundation of the Fund in 1897 a total net amount of £7,062,345 9s. has been distributed.

SPECIAL RECEIPTS.

10. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, was graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty Queen Mary and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales were again pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as were also Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Gloucester, Prince George, the Princess Royal, the Duke of Connaught, and other members of the Royal Family.

11. The Fund received annual subscriptions of £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £2,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd., £1,548 7s. 8d. from an anonymous contributor, £1,000 from Messrs. Baring Brothers & Company, Ltd., £1,000 from the late Sir Thomas P. Latham, Bt., £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company, and £1,000 from "M.M." The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £666 13s. 4d. from Mr. Robert Fleming; of £645 3s. 2d. from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons; of £625 from Lloyds Bank, Ltd.; of £600 from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt.; of £533 6s. 8d. from "W.C.W."; of £525 from the Westminster Bank, Ltd.; of £516 2s. 6d. from Mr. J. J. Crosfield; and of £500 from the Clothworkers' Company, and from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co.; and donations of £725 from Captain T. P. Hall; of £500 from "J.R.B.", from Lt.-Col. Geo. Waters, and from the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust; and of £300 from "S.D.R.S.D." The Fund also received anonymous donations of £9,000 and £500, besides the Special Trust gift of £10,000 referred to in paragraph 17.

12. The Council also record with gratitude the receipt in January, 1931, of a donation of £2,000 from His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad, through Sir Akbar Hydari, the leader of the Hyderabad Delegation at the Round Table Conference, being the sum placed by the Nizam at the disposal of the King for the Hospital Fund, as a token of his gratitude for the personal interest taken by His Majesty in the work of the Conference and in that of the Hyderabad Delegation.

13. The League of Mercy again contributed £17,000, the same amount as in each of the four preceding years. The Council wish again to record their warm appreciation of the work carried out by the League on their behalf, and their gratitude both to collectors for voluntary service so readily given, and to individual donors whose combined contributions have enabled this valuable addition to be made to the resources of the Fund. The total received by the Fund from the League since its foundation in 1898 now amounts to £484,000.

14. The Fund also received £10,000 from the British Charities Association for distribution amongst London hospitals. The total amount received from the Association for this purpose since 1924 is now £75,000. The Council greatly appreciate the action of the Association in thus entrusting the King's Fund with the distribution of that part of their receipts which they have allocated to the London area.

15. Legacies received during the year included £50,000 from the estate of the late Sir Otto Beit, Bt. (in addition to his gift of £6,000 for the purchase of Radium); £8,370 from the estate of the late Captain Sir Charles Leopold Cust, Bt., R.N., on account of share of residue; £1,500 from the estate of the late Commander Francis William Chaine, further on account of share of residue (making a total of £4,500 received to date); £1,465 14s. 6d. from the estate of the late Mr. Percy Morris, further on account of residue (making a total of £19,598 4s. 6d. received to date); £1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. William Maurice Seligmann; £919 9s. from the estate of the late Mrs. Jeannette Moses, further on account of residue (making a total of £2,520 13s. 7d. received to date); £783 16s. 7d. from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, further on account of residue (making a total of £524,497 1s. 1d. received to date); £600 from the estate of the late Mr. Montague George Jessett, further on account of residue (making a total of £14,275 received to date); £502 13s. 6d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Adelia Augusta Louisa Walker, further on account of share of residue (making a total of £25,097 6s. 1d. received to date); £513 6s. 2d. from the estate of the late Mr. Charles Ansell, further on account (making a total of £9,830 8s. 2d. received to date); £324 11s. 2d. from the estate of the late Mrs. Mary Louisa Fitze, further on account of share of residue (making a total of £1,942 9s. 7d. received to date); and £36 18s. 1d. from the estate of the late Reverend Henry Swann, further on account of residue (making a total of £63,140 8s. 4d. received to date.)

16. The Council are also very grateful to the Trustees of the following estates for gifts made to the Fund in the exercise of their discretionary powers; the late Mr. Thomas Stephen Whitaker, for a further gift of £500 (making a total of £19,500 received to date); and the late Mrs. Alice Welch, for a gift of £50.

SPECIAL TRUST GIFT OF £10,000.

17. In December the Fund received an anonymous gift of £10,000 subject to special trusts which were to be exercised by the Fund in its discretion, and which were to be communicated in due course to the hospital or hospitals concerned. The method of making the best use of this gift in accordance with these trusts was still under consideration at the end of the year. It is a source of much gratification to the Council that the King's Fund should again have been selected by an anonymous donor as the body to carry out special trusts involving a discretionary power.

EXPENSES.

18. During the year expenses amounted to £13,215 10s. 8s., or about 9d. per £ of the total received.

KING'S FUND RADIUM.

19. As recorded in the Report for 1930, it was one of the last acts of the late Sir Otto Beit to promise to provide the balance of the amount required for the purchase of the additional 6 grammes of radium which, with the 4 grammes bought with his original gift, made up the total of 10 grammes now held by the King's Fund. In fulfilment of this very generous promise an additional sum of £6,000 was received from the executors early in 1931. This was only one of the numerous wise and munificent acts for which Sir Otto was distinguished; his gifts to the King's Fund alone, during his lifetime or by will, amounted to a total of £107,875, of which £56,000 was for the purchase of radium.

20. The distribution of the whole of the 10 grammes to the Hospitals was completed in 1931, and reports on the radium work done in 1930 were received from the Hospitals. One of these reports gave a very discouraging account of the working of the 4-gramme bomb which had been originally lent to the Westminster Hospital by the National Radium Commission. The ownership of this had been transferred to the King's Fund in exchange for an equal quantity of radium to be used by the Commission outside London, but the arrangement between the hospital and the Commission for the use of the bomb still remained in force. As the result of this report received from the hospital, the King's Fund communicated with the Commission and was informed by the Commission that, in their opinion, the use of the bomb should be discontinued and the radium used in the form of one-gramme units at separate hospitals. The Distribution Committee, before taking final action, laid before the Commission at an interview various arguments which had been brought to the notice of the Fund in favour of the continued use of larger units, and received from the Commission a reply upon which the recommendation of the Commission was accepted, being, as it was, the considered opinion of the body set up by Royal Charter for dealing with such questions. At the end of the year the actual arrangements for carrying out the decision were still being discussed with the Commission and the hospitals concerned.

PENSIONS FOR NURSES AND HOSPITAL OFFICERS.

21. The grants from the King's Fund towards the expenditure of the hospitals under the pensions scheme amounted to £19,313, as against £16,468 in 1930. The special reserve set aside to assist in providing the grants, during the remainder of the seven years for which they were promised, amounted at the end of 1930 to £60,000. From this reserve £9,000 was taken to make up the grants for 1931, the other £10,313 being provided out of current income for the year.

22. By the end of the year the scheme had been adopted by 109 hospitals in London, representing more than 14,600 beds, or 82 per cent. of the whole, besides 223 hospitals with over 32,000 beds outside London; the grand total at December 31st being thus 332 hospitals,

with over 46,000 beds. This included 80 per cent. of the beds at hospitals all over the country with 200 beds or more, and 46 per cent. of the beds at smaller hospitals, or 60 per cent. of the beds in the voluntary hospitals of the whole country.

PATIENTS' WAKING HOURS.

23. The Report on Patients' Waking Hours, foreshadowed in 1930, was prepared by a Sub-Committee of the Distribution Committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Spencer, and was issued in May. At 47 hospitals the hour of awakening was already 6 a.m. or later, and the Sub-Committee recommended that, in the absence of exceptional circumstances, the hour should not be earlier than 6 o'clock. A similar conclusion had meanwhile been adopted by the London County Council. The Ministry of Health subsequently issued a circular commending the Report to the consideration of local authorities throughout the country.

HOSPITAL PROVISION FOR PERSONS OF MODERATE MEANS.

24. The number of pay beds provided by the voluntary hospitals in London continues to increase. The annual list published by the Fund shows that the total number of such beds at the end of 1931 was 1,577 at 104 hospitals, as against 1,425 at 99 hospitals in December 1930, and 1,055 at 80 hospitals when the Report of the Pay Beds Committee of the Fund was published in 1928. The charges for these beds ranged from 2 guineas per week to 10 guineas or more, a large number being at 4, 5 or 6 guineas, exclusive of whatever might be payable for medical and surgical fees and extras.

25. The insurance scheme for members of the professional and middle classes, submitted to the King's Fund by the British Provident Association, again came before the Council in December. The Hospital Saving Association, whose members make provision towards the cost of ordinary hospital services by contributions of 3*d.* a week, informed the Fund that the number of contributors had increased so rapidly that the administrative expenses could now be met out of income, and that, out of the £25,000 earmarked for the purpose by donors to the Combined Appeal in 1922, a sum of £5,000 was being returned to the King's Fund with the suggestion that it might be used for similar purposes elsewhere. The Council accordingly authorised the Management Committee to pay this £5,000 to the British Provident Association for the preliminary expenses of the new scheme, if satisfied that this would be in accordance with the purposes of the original donors.

26. The scheme provides alternative scales of premiums for making provision against weekly charges for a pay bed in a hospital or for a bed in a nursing home, and, if desired, against medical or surgical fees as well; and also provides for contributions towards the capital cost of a pay bed, in return for which the subscriber has a prior claim to the use of such bed when approved for admission according to the rules of the hospital.

KING'S FUND PROPAGANDA.

27. The Propaganda Committee, though necessarily handicapped to some extent by the prevailing depression, have continued their activities with unabated vigour, devoting their attention mainly to methods of direct propaganda for the Fund and the Voluntary Hospitals.

28. Arising out of the Conference of Hospital Secretaries mentioned in last year's report, discussions with the Press have been in progress which it is hoped will lead to results which will be of benefit to the hospitals generally.

29. The King's Fund film has been furnished with a running commentary in place of sub-titles, and a spoken introduction by Lord Burnham; and now includes a visit by his Royal Highness The Prince of Wales to one of the hospitals on the books of the Fund.

30. As the attention of the King's Fund has often been drawn to unfounded statements that voluntary gifts have been gradually drying up during recent years, a pamphlet on the London Voluntary Hospitals has been issued, showing that down to the end of 1930 Voluntary Hospital income had steadily increased; that voluntary gifts, in London alone, came to over £2,900,000; and, therefore, that the difficulties with which the hospitals were faced were due to exceptional causes, and were not typical of the recent tendency of Voluntary Hospital finance. The pamphlet is illustrated by coloured graphs taken from the Statistical Review annually published by the King's Fund.

31. In November a statement was published on the National Crisis and the Voluntary Hospitals, signed by the Lord Chancellor and other members of the King's Fund Council appointed by His Royal Highness the President as holders of official positions of national importance. The statement emphasised that the voluntary hospitals were carrying on a great public service, the cost of which had to be paid for; that by providing so much of the cost by voluntary gifts the public and the patients secured the presence in the hospital service of many special features essential to the treatment of the sick and the advancement of medical science; and that, in present circumstances, voluntary provision of the cost was also the method of least hardship. The signatories urged that the appeals of the hospitals should be considered sympathetically from these points of view, and that regular support should be given either direct to individual hospitals or through the King's Fund.*

THE OUT-PATIENT QUESTION.

32. At the December Meeting of the Council His Royal Highness the President announced his intention to appoint a Special Committee of Inquiry into the Out-Patient Question, under the Chairmanship of the Earl of Onslow. The scope of the Inquiry, as defined in the terms of reference adopted by the Council, covers the methods in use in the London Voluntary Hospitals, and their effects upon the suitability of the patients treated and the length of time during which patients wait before or after treatment. The membership of the Committee had not been settled by the end of the year to which this Report refers.

* The Statement appears on pages 51 and 52. Copies were offered to hospitals for their own use at a nominal price, and 50,000 copies were purchased.

PERSONAL.

33. The Fund suffered a great loss through the death of Lord Stamfordham. The following resolution was passed by the Management Committee on April 14th :—

“ The Management Committee, on behalf of the General Council and all the members of the Fund, desire to place on record their profound sorrow at the death of Lord Stamfordham. His connection with the work of the Fund began in 1901, when His present Majesty, then Prince of Wales, became its President, and from the time of the passing of the Act of Incorporation in 1907 he had been a member of the Council. As the result of the direct personal supervision exercised over the Fund by its Royal President, Lord Stamfordham, as his private secretary, was, during the years 1901 to 1910, brought into close and almost daily touch with the details of its work ; and from 1910, when the King, on his accession, became its Patron and declared his unabated interest in all that concerned its welfare, Lord Stamfordham continued his association with the Fund in his double capacity as a member of the Council and as the channel of official communication with His Majesty. Throughout the whole of this period of 30 years the Fund had the benefit of his vast experience and his unfailing wisdom, tact and charm in dealing with men and affairs, and his presence and assistance will be very greatly missed.”

34. The following resolution was passed by the Committee after the death of the late Viscount Knutsford :—

“ The Management Committee, on behalf of the General Council and all connected with the Fund, desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Viscount Knutsford, who was a member of the special Committee of the Fund which dealt with the position of Voluntary Hospitals under the Local Government Bill and other Parliamentary measures, and was for several years a member of the Executive Committee and the Council. His work as Chairman of the London Hospital, his constant personal support and assistance in recent years to such combined activities as the British Hospitals Association, the Hospital Saving Association, and the British Charities Association, and his great power of enlisting public sympathy and help in the service of the sick poor, make his death a severe loss to the whole Voluntary Hospital movement.”

35. The Council had also to regret during the year the deaths of the late Lady Plender, Captain Sir Charles Cust and Mr. Hugh Morrison, three of the Fund's Visitors, and also of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, formerly a member of the Council and of the Executive Committee, and Chairman of the Sub-Committee whose Report led to the establishment of the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, and Sir William Bennett, a member of the Council and formerly Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

36. During the absence from England of the Prince of Wales in the early part of the year, the powers of President were exercised by a Committee, appointed by His Royal Highness for the purpose, consisting of the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker of the House of Commons, and the Governor of the Bank of England.

37. The King's Fund has continued to lend staff assistance to the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee, the representative body set up under Section 13 of the Local Government Act for consultations with the London County Council.

SPECIAL NEEDS, 1932.

38. At the Council meeting in December, His Royal Highness the President summed up the position in these words :—

" We meet in difficult times, and in especially difficult times for the voluntary hospitals. Their work is indispensable. It must be paid for. It has so far been paid for by the aid of voluntary contributions which have gone on steadily increasing, till in 1930 they reached the remarkable total of £2,900,000 a year in London alone, or £9,000,000 a year for the whole country. Never was it more necessary than it is at the present moment that these contributions should not fall off. Those who have been accustomed to subscribe should go on if they possibly can. Those who have not subscribed in the past should come forward to take the place of those who cannot continue to give as much as they did before."

39. Down to the end of 1931 contributions to maintenance, taking the hospitals of London as a whole, had not fallen off. It is more than ever important that, during the continuance of the present depression, those who are able to do so should help to maintain, by direct gifts or through the King's Fund, the voluntary income of the hospitals, on which the special character of their work so largely depends.

40. The Council greatly appreciate the assistance of the Press in keeping before the public the claims of the hospitals.

Distribution Meeting of the President and General Council, December 11, 1931.

A MEETING of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes for the present year, was held at York House, St. James's Palace, on Friday morning, December 11, 1931, at 11.30, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour of reading a message from His Majesty the King, our Patron :—

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

"The King desires to congratulate the Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London on being able to make a further increase in the distribution this year. His Majesty regards it as most important that the income of the King's Fund and the voluntary hospitals should be maintained at this time of crisis.

December 11, 1931."

The Present Crisis.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS continued :—We meet in difficult times, and in especially difficult times for the voluntary hospitals. Their work is indispensable. It must be paid for. It has so far been paid for by the aid of voluntary contributions which have gone on steadily increasing, till in 1930 they reached the remarkable total of £2,900,000 a year in London alone, or £9,000,000 a year for the whole country. Never was it more necessary than it is at the present moment that these contributions should not fall off. Those who have been accustomed to subscribe should go on if they possibly can. Those who have not subscribed in the past should come forward to take the place of those who cannot continue to give as much as they did before.

Increase in the Distribution.

In these circumstances it is particularly encouraging that the King's Fund is able to make another substantial increase in its distribution. Last year the ordinary grants were £266,000. This year they are £275,000. The grants in aid of the Pensions Scheme are a little over £19,000, of which £9,000 is to be taken from the special fund accumulated for the purpose. The total distribution is thus just over £294,000, of which £285,000 comes from the current income of the year. In achieving this result we have been greatly helped by four items in our receipts. Two of these I mentioned at our last Meeting. These were the gift of £2,000 from His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad through Sir Akbar Hydari, the leader of the Hyderabad Delegation at the first Round Table Conference; and £10,000 entrusted to the King's Fund by the British Charities Association for distribution amongst the London hospitals. The third is a further donation of £9,000 from the anonymous friend whose gifts during the past few years now amount to no less than £63,000. The fourth is the legacy of £50,000 from the late Sir Otto Beit, who was such a munificent supporter of the cause of healing and the advancement of medical science, and had already given the King's Fund £56,000 for the purchase of radium. It is a remarkable fact that the amount received by the King's Fund in legacies during each of the past four years has been about £65,000. We do not distribute the whole of the legacies, because this might mean that we should be unable to maintain the distribution at the same figure in the following year. But such large receipts from this source in four successive years have enabled us to make considerable increases in the distribution, without any departure from the paths of prudence.

The Distribution Committee explain in their Report the way in which they have used the additional amount available. During 1930 the hospitals as a whole had done better than had been expected. The King's Fund Statistical Review showed more deficits than in the previous year, but these were still outnumbered by the surpluses. No one can tell, until the accounts for 1931 come in, which hospitals have been most affected by the present crisis. So the Distribution Committee have used the extra money to strengthen the finances of the hospitals which had suffered most in 1930, or which had already incurred exceptional liabilities.

Patients' Waking Hours.

I am glad to see that the Report on the subject of patients' waking hours, which we discussed last time, and which was published in May, is bearing fruit. In present circumstances, it is not easy for hospitals to make changes that may involve additional staff. But already in July the Visitors found that some hospitals had been able to defer the hour to 6 o'clock, in accordance with the suggestions circulated by the King's Fund. The Ministry of Health, moreover, have commended these suggestions to all the County Councils and County Borough Councils throughout the country. We are greatly indebted to the Visitors and to the Distribution Committee for a very useful piece of work in this direction.

Hospital Saving Association and British Provident Association.

Besides the Reports of the Distribution Committee, you have before you to-day two Reports by the Management Committee which refer to the future. One of these deals with the British Provident Association scheme, which has already had the approval of the Council, for assisting members of the middle and professional classes to make provision for the cost, when admitted to a pay bed at a voluntary hospital. The Report gives striking figures of the success of the Hospital Saving Association, which performs a somewhat similar service for the ordinary hospital patients. It has nearly 1,000,000 members and pays about £388,000 a year towards their cost when in hospital. But with all such schemes there is always a difficult time at the beginning, when the contributions from members are small compared with the expenses. The donors who earmarked their gifts to tide the Hospital Saving Association over this preliminary period have been fully justified by the results. So successful, indeed, has been the Association, that it now finds itself able to repay £5,000 out of the £25,000 it received. The proposal before you to-day is that, if the original donors agree, this £5,000 should be used, in the same way, to help to launch the British Provident Association.

Out-Patient Inquiry.

The other Report of the Management Committee deals with the Out-patient question. Suggestions are constantly being made for remedying overcrowding, hours of waiting and other defects of the Out-patient Departments. Experiments of various kinds have been tried, and are being tried, by hospitals. People with ideas on the subject have been publishing them, and have been making representations to the King's Fund. An inquiry into the question was held 20 years ago. Many changes have taken place since then, and the Management Committee think the time has come when another special Committee should be appointed. Under the Act of Incorporation I have the power to constitute the Committee and appoint the members. It would be for you to define its powers, and a draft resolution for that purpose is before you. I have been fortunate enough to secure the consent of Lord Onslow to act as Chairman. His work as Chairman of the Voluntary Hospitals Commission is only one of his many qualifications for the post. Until the Committee is complete it seems better not to mention any of the other members. There may be six more, or possibly seven. The lists from which I hope to make the selection contain a number of names, both medical and lay; some are already members of the King's Fund, some are not; some have hospital experience, others have organising experience elsewhere; some are men, and some are women. No one will be appointed as representative of any particular interest. The sole object will be to find, if possible, an impartial solution of the problem that can be accepted and put into operation by all the hospitals. The draft terms of reference are pretty wide, so as to cover various questions that have been raised about the functions of Out-patient Departments. But, as it may take time for the hospitals to agree about

these questions, there are supplementary resolutions asking the Committee to consider the possibility of effecting some reduction of waiting hours by administrative changes which would not involve these larger problems. I hope you will all agree that this is a business-like way of approaching the subject.

Personal.

The King's Fund shares in the universal sorrow at the death of Lord Knutsford. He had been a member of the Council, of the Executive Committee, and of the Parliamentary Committee. His great work for the London Hospital was, of course, his outstanding achievement. But he had an additional claim to the regard and affection of the members of a Central Fund like this, and that was the active part he took in all the recent co-operative movements for the benefit of the hospitals taken as a whole, such as the British Hospitals Association, the Hospital Saving Association, and the British Charities Association. It is not only one hospital, but all the hospitals and all interested in hospitals, who feel that they have lost one of their best friends. We were grieved to hear of the death of Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, who was a member of the Council till this year. It is to his expert work as Chairman of the Committee on Pensions that we are indebted for the origin of the Federated Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

It now only remains for me to express my thanks and yours, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, to the Distribution Committee and their Chairman, Sir Cooper Perry, for all the work which they have done throughout the year, culminating in the list of grants which is before us to-day. It is no small task, you may imagine, to draw up recommendations for the distribution of £294,000 amongst 200 institutions. To collect and analyse the necessary information is a matter of months. To study that information and prepare the list of grants takes several weeks. But the knowledge and judgment needed for the work are the fruit of experience extending over years.

I will now ask Mr. Montagu Norman, in the unavoidable absence of our Treasurer, Mr. Peacock, to make a financial statement.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The Rt. Hon. MONTAGU NORMAN (Governor of the Bank of England), after expressing his regret at the absence of Mr. Peacock, said :—

It is indeed gratifying that the King's Fund is again in a position to increase its distribution as the result of the continuous growth in the income of the Fund. When the estimates were before the Council in November, it was anticipated that the receipts for 1931 on general account would be about £7,000 more than in 1930, and this expectation shows every prospect of being realised. This is mainly due to three large contributions which have been mentioned by His Royal Highness, namely, £10,000 from the British Charities Association, £9,000 from the anonymous donor who has helped us so generously during the past few years, and £2,000 from His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad. Legacies, for the fourth year in succession, have amounted to between £60,000 and £70,000, the most important this year being the munificent bequest of £50,000 from Sir Otto Beit, to whom the King's Fund was already indebted for £56,000 for the purchase of radium. The Council thus felt fully justified in making an increase in the ordinary distribution from £266,000 to £275,000. Besides this additional £9,000 of ordinary grants, there is an increase of £2,845 in the grants in aid of expenditure on the Pensions Scheme. Last year these came to £16,468. This year the total is £19,313. These grants, which began in 1928, were promised for the first seven years of the Scheme, the maximum in any one year being £20,000. During the past few years we have been able, out of the receipts

from legacies, to accumulate a special reserve fund against this liability. We propose to draw £9,000 from this reserve fund, and to pay the other £10,313 out of current income. We shall still have a special reserve of £51,000, and this will considerably reduce the amount that will have to be taken out of income during the rest of the period. On these estimates the result of the year's working will be that we distribute £294,313 as against £282,468 last year: that £285,313 will be drawn from current income and £9,000 from the special pensions reserve; and that about £25,000 will be carried forward to general reserve. The total addition to the capital fund and the general reserve fund, during the last four years, will then be almost exactly £260,000.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY.

Lord MARSHALL, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said that, in spite of the difficult conditions prevailing during the year, the Council of the League proposed to allocate to the King's Fund the sum of £17,000 from its collections. This was the same amount as had been transferred to the Fund during each of the past four years. The League of Mercy, since its inauguration in 1899, had contributed a total of £484,034 to the King's Fund. In addition it had made grants of £141,399 to Extra-Metropolitan Hospitals, making a grand total of £625,433.

GRANTS TO HOSPITALS AND CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Hospitals (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches), and moved the recommendations. (*See pages 26 to 29.*)

Sir LEONARD COHEN (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Hospital (including Recovery and Convalescent Branches). (*See pages 30 to 40.*)

Mr. V. WARREN LOW having seconded, the motion was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) then presented the Report of the Committee on the Distribution to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular Hospitals, and moved the recommendations. (*See page 41.*)

Sir HAROLD WERNHER (Hon. Secretary) presented the Schedule containing the list of awards to Convalescent Homes not attached to particular hospitals. (*See pages 42 to 44.*)

The motion, having been seconded by Lady HALL, was then put and carried unanimously.

DATE OF POSTING CHEQUES.

On the motion of Lord DAWSON OF PENN, seconded by the Rev. Principal ALFRED E. GARVIE, D.D., it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 18.

OUT-PATIENT QUESTION: PROPOSED COMMITTEE OF ENQUIRY.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of DONOUGHMORE) presented a Report on the Out-patient Question, and moved the recommendation thereon.

The recommendation, having been seconded by Mr. J. BEAUMONT PEASE, was carried unanimously.

PRELIMINARY EXPENSES OF THE HOSPITAL SAVING ASSOCIATION AND OF THE BRITISH PROVIDENT ASSOCIATION (PAY BED INSURANCE SCHEME).

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of DONOUGHMORE) presented a Report on the Preliminary Expenses of the Hospital Saving Association and of the British Provident

Association, and moved the recommendation that the General Council should authorise the Management Committee to carry out the proposal that the £5,000 remaining of the original gift of £25,000, and now to be repaid by the Hospital Saving Association, should be applied for the purpose of launching the British Provident Association, provided that the Management Committee were satisfied that this would be in accordance with the purposes specified by the original donors and would have the consent of so many at least of them as contributed £5,000 to the original gift.

The recommendation was seconded by Sir FREDERICK FRY.

In reply to a question by Sir William Collins, Lord DONOUGHMORE said that there would be no organic connection between the King's Fund and the British Provident Association. In that respect the position was exactly the same as before. The King's Fund was very friendly with the new body, but was not concerned in its management.

The motion was then put, and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1932.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said:—My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—We now come to the business for 1932. Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson, who has served as a Visitor and on the Hospital Economy Committee, finds herself unable to continue on that Committee, though she will remain on the Council. Except for this case, I propose to re-appoint all the members of the Council and Committees and the Officers. I propose to make a few additional appointments, but these will be announced at the formal Council meeting in January. I will now ask Lord Donoughmore to move the delegation resolutions for your approval.

On the motion of the Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of DONOUGHMORE), seconded by Dr. GILBERT ORME, resolutions were approved delegating powers to the various Committees for 1932.

VOTE OF THANKS TO THE PRINCE OF WALES.

Viscount BURNHAM moved that their best thanks be given to His Royal Highness, their President, for so courteously presiding over the meeting, and not only for that, but also for welcoming them to his house. They all marvelled at the extent of His Royal Highness's activities, as they saw them recorded day by day in the newspaper press, but it was very fortunate for the King's Fund that they had the honour of his name and services, considering that he, as everyone knew, not only within this country, but within the whole British Empire, wielded the wand of the magician in all those causes of human-kindness to which he was devoted.

Sir WALTER LAWRENCE, Bt., having seconded, the motion was carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, and the proceedings then terminated.

Meeting of President and General Council, June 7th, 1932.

THE Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday morning, June 7, 1932, at 11.30, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the Chair.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to address the Council was received with acclamation, said :—

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have first of all to read a message from His Majesty the King, our Patron :—

“ BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

“ The King feels that the fact that the finances of the Hospitals have been so well maintained, despite the stringency of 1931, is very significant of the widespread public interest in their welfare. His Majesty earnestly trusts that this support will not fail during the present year.

"His Majesty considers it a notable achievement on the part of the King's Fund that it should have been able at this time not only to increase the amount distributed to the Hospitals, but to add substantially to reserve."

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS continued :—At this meeting I am usually able to give you two pieces of financial news. One is the result of last year's working for the King's Fund itself. The other is the result for the hospitals of London taken as a whole.

King's Fund Accounts.

The accounts of the King's Fund for 1931 are before you to-day, and contain some remarkable figures. We estimated for an increase of £7,000 in our net income. But the actual increase was £12,000; the total being £315,000. We used part of this to increase the ordinary distribution from £266,000 to £275,000; part went in grants towards expenditure on the Pensions Scheme; and part we kept in reserve against future needs. The total amount distributed in 1931 was £294,313, as compared with £282,468 in 1930. I should like personally to express my thanks to all the subscribers and donors who contributed towards this result; and particularly to His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad for his donation of £2,000; my personal thanks to the anonymous friend who gave us another £9,000, the eighth large gift from the same source; and my thanks and those of the Council to the League of Mercy for its contribution of £17,000, and to the British Charities Association, who entrusted us with £10,000 for distribution. It is also very gratifying that, thanks largely to the generous bequest of the late Sir Otto Beit, legacies should again, for the fourth year in succession, have exceeded £67,000. It is clear that the King's Fund commends itself to testators who recognise the claims of the Hospitals, but are not specially interested in any particular one. In addition to the income available for general purposes, we have also received, since our last meeting, another anonymous donation of £10,000, subject to special trusts which leave the King's Fund a certain amount of discretion. We are very grateful to the donor, both for the gift itself and for the confidence thus reposed in the Council and in the Distribution Committee.

Finance of the Hospitals.

I now come to the finance of the Hospitals, and here also I want to mention a remarkable thing. Year after year people have said: "The Hospitals have done well in the past, but this year is going to be a particularly difficult one." Year after year it has been perfectly true. Yet year after year, so far, the Hospitals have made the necessary efforts; the public have responded; and, though some Hospitals have had serious deficits, the aggregate income has kept ahead of the expenditure. It seemed impossible that this should happen again in 1931. But it did. In 1931 the Hospitals again had an aggregate surplus. The figures are not yet quite complete, but, so far, they show that approximately 82 Hospitals had surpluses on the year's working, as against 57 with deficits. Some of these deficits were fairly heavy, and form a serious problem for the individual Hospitals concerned. But, even so, the total of the surpluses exceeded the total of the deficits by about £65,000. In 1931 the Voluntary Hospital Service, taken as a whole, once more balanced its budget. We all know what a difficult task the balancing of a budget was in 1931. And just as the success of our nation in that great effort was a magnificent proof of the soundness of our national life, so also is the success of the Voluntary Hospitals in 1931 a proof of their soundness, and of the hold which they have on the support of the people of this country. This is one of the hopeful signs. The present difficulties of the Hospitals are not due to any gradual decline in the Voluntary System. On the contrary, the income of the London Hospitals steadily increased from 3¼ millions in 1927 to 3¾ millions in 1931. The Voluntary Hospitals are suffering, like everything else, from the world crisis. There are some Hospitals which,

for one exceptional reason or another, have exceptional difficulties even in ordinary times. It is not surprising therefore, that some are now suffering from serious deficits. But the Hospitals as a whole began 1932, as they began 1931, in a strong financial position. Here is another hopeful sign, I think. When we say that the financial position of the Voluntary Hospitals in 1931 was strong, we mean that the public were supporting them regularly, and showed every sign of wishing to continue to support them. But in the present crisis numbers of people who normally contribute are genuinely unable to do so, and could not do so even in 1931. Where, then, did the increased income come from? It seems evident that many of those who can still afford to contribute are feeling that it is their duty to give more, just because so many other people are obliged to give less. That, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I think is a wonderful spirit, and is the right way in which to view the claims of the Voluntary Hospitals during the present crisis, especially the claims of the Hospitals with deficits. The fact that a period of severe stress finds out the weak points in the line is not a reason for panic, still less for a general retreat. What it does call for is an intensive effort to reinforce the weak spots, while still keeping up supplies to the rest.

Re-allocation of Radium.

We have before us to-day a report from the Distribution Committee dealing with the re-allocation of the radium hitherto contained in the 4-gramme bomb at the Westminster Hospital. Although this radium now belongs to the King's Fund as the result of an exchange, the bomb was originally lent to the Westminster Hospital by the National Radium Commission, for a scheme of work arranged between the Hospital and the Commission. When, therefore, the Commission became convinced that, in present circumstances, the use of the bomb should be discontinued, the Distribution Committee accepted their recommendation, after having first discussed with them certain alternatives that had been suggested. I am sure you will approve of their action, and you will all have seen that the Conference suggested by Lord Dawson and Lord Moynihan has since reported, and has agreed that the decision of the Commission was justified. When the re-allocation is completed the King's Fund will have 10 grammes of radium out on loan amongst 24 London Hospitals.

Patients' Waking Hours.

It is now twelve months since the Distribution Committee published their report on Patients' Waking Hours, and suggested that, where there was no special reason to the contrary, the hour should not be earlier than six. The Committee have now been inquiring into the results. It is satisfactory to learn that, out of 66 Hospitals where patients used to be awakened before six, we already know of 37 which have found it possible to change the hour, 22 of them to six o'clock. The replies will all be handed to this year's Visitors for any comment they may wish to make.

Provision for Patients of Moderate Means.

We have again issued our annual list of the pay beds provided in the London Voluntary Hospitals for persons of moderate means. The number has now increased to 1,577 beds at 104 Hospitals. This is a great service to a section of the community who are as hard hit as any other by the present financial crisis. For large numbers of people, however, there still remains the problem how to meet the cost of an illness or operation, even when a pay bed is available at a moderate weekly charge. That is why we welcome the launching of the scheme drawn up by the British Provident Association, whose meeting I shall have the privilege of attending and presiding over to-morrow, whereby those who join the Association can make provision in advance by means of annual premiums, towards the cost of a pay bed if and when the time comes. The British Provident Association is, of course, quite distinct from the King's Fund; but we have always regarded the Association as the natural

complement to such movements as the Hospital Saving Association, which enable wage-earners to provide, by means of weekly contributions, their fair share of the cost when receiving treatment in the ordinary beds. Clearly the soundest way of meeting the cost of illness is by applying the principle of provision in advance. Everyone who can afford to do so should co-operate, while in health, to provide against an expense which may otherwise be a crushing burden on those upon whom it happens to fall. Those who join will do two things: they will, when the time comes, be better able to pay for accommodation appropriate to their normal standard of living; and they will not themselves be obliged to occupy ordinary beds which were intended for those who cannot be expected to provide their full cost. At the Lord Mayor's meeting at the Mansion House to-morrow afternoon, at which, as I have said, I hope myself to be present, the new Chairman of the Association, Lord Lloyd, will explain just how it will enable its members to secure these benefits. I personally asked Lord Lloyd if he would take over the Chairmanship. We know what a great many activities he is interested in, and we are very pleased that the Association will have such a very able man at its head.

The Out-Patient Inquiry.

The Out-patient Committee, under the Chairmanship of Lord Onslow, are actively engaged on their Inquiry. The question is so complex, as well as so important, that no one would be surprised if it was still some time before the Committee were in a position to present a report. As was pointed out when the Committee was constituted, the Hospitals themselves have lately been giving increased attention to the subject. Quite a number of them have been studying their own methods, and trying experiments with a view to reducing the time of waiting, and are thus in a position to give very useful evidence on the question of what is practicable and what is not.

Propaganda Work.

The present exceptional difficulties of the Hospitals make the propaganda work of the King's Fund even more important than usual. We particularly want the public to realise two facts. The first is that the present difficulties *are* exceptional, and that there has been no gradual decline in voluntary hospital finance. A steady increase in income from $3\frac{1}{4}$ millions to $3\frac{3}{4}$ millions in five years is progress, not decline. The second is that the Hospitals have a just claim to a regular income from voluntary sources, since they provide a regular public service, some of the most valuable features of which are the result of voluntary support. The Propaganda Committee, under the Chairmanship of Lord Burnham, and with the assistance of a number of distinguished people in different departments of life, also continues to keep the name of the King's Fund prominently before the public in various original and ingenious ways. This is a very important side to the activities of the Fund. I am, and I am sure we all are, most grateful to all those who have put in so much time on this work.

We have no reports from the Hospital Economy Committee this time. This does not mean that the department has not been busy. Besides the ordinary work of the Fund and the questions connected with radium, they have been helping the London Voluntary Hospitals Committee with the Survey of the Hospital Service of London, which that Committee is preparing in co-operation with the London County Council and the Metropolitan Borough Councils.

Personal.

The Council have to regret the loss by death of Sir William Bennett, who had been a member of the Council and the Revenue Committee for many years, and was at one time Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

I have now only to express my thanks and yours to the Treasurer and the Members of the Finance Committee for their care of our investments, which is no small task in these times. We are also greatly indebted to the Honorary Secretaries and to the members of the other Committees, who carry on the day-to-day work of the Fund.

I will now ask Mr. Peacock to present the Accounts.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1931.

Mr. E. R. PEACOCK (the Hon. Treasurer), in moving the adoption of the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1931, said: May it please Your Royal Highness, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen:—Your Royal Highness has already referred to the remarkable result of the year's working and to the most important of the contributions which helped to produce it. In November we estimated for a net income, after paying all expenses, of £310,000, as against £303,000 in 1930. The actual total came to within £70 of £315,000. Subscriptions and donations were £3,392 less than in the previous year, but this small decrease was more than balanced by an increase of £1,626 in legacies and of £3,265 in income from investments. Last year's grant of £10,000 from the British Charities Association was an additional item. Legacies came to £69,000. This included one large sum of £50,000 under the will of the late Sir Otto Beit. But there was nothing exceptional in the total, since the corresponding figures for the previous three years 1928 to 1930 were £69,000, £68,000 and £67,000. Nevertheless, it was considered prudent not to distribute the whole of the legacies, but to retain part as a reserve for the future, which, as we all fully realise, is subject at present to more than the usual uncertainties, from the point of view both of our own income and of the needs of the hospitals. The ordinary distribution was increased from £266,000 to £275,000. In addition to this, money had to be found for the grants in aid of the expenditure of the Hospitals on the Pensions Scheme. These showed an increase from £16,468 to £19,313, due to the larger number of hospitals that had adopted the scheme, and of individual members of the nursing and administrative staffs who had joined. As, however, the promise made by the Fund was limited to a total of £20,000 in any year, for the first seven years of the scheme, the amount of the grants from the Fund has now practically reached its maximum and the liability will only continue for about another three years. Against this limited liability a reserve of £60,000 had been built up out of legacies received during the past few years. It was considered safe, therefore, to take £9,000 from this reserve. The amount required to be taken from current income for this purpose was thus reduced from £16,468 in 1930 to £10,313 in 1931, and will be still further reduced in future years. It is indeed gratifying that during the past three years the net annual income of the Fund, after paying expenses, has increased from £305,000 to £315,000, and the annual distribution from £259,000 to £294,000; while during the same period the capital and general reserve funds have been increased by £224,000. We are concerned to-day only with the accounts for 1931. But there is one item of receipts for 1932 which I should like to mention, and which has given us all the greatest pleasure and gratification. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, our President, has honoured the Fund by increasing his annual subscription from £100 to £200.

I now have the honour to move the adoption of the accounts.

The motion for the adoption of the Accounts, having been seconded by Mr. F. W. J. JACKSON, was then put and carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1931.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of DONOUGHMORE) moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the General Council for the year 1931. (See pages 5 to 13.)

Lady AMPHILL having seconded the resolution, the report was unanimously adopted.

RE-ALLOCATION OF RADIUM.

The Chairman of the Distribution Committee (Sir COOPER PERRY) presented a Report of the Committee on the re-allocation of Radium to Hospitals since December, 1930, and moved the recommendation that the action taken by the Committee, in the exercise of the powers delegated to them by the General Council, be approved. (*See pages 45 to 47.*)

The motion, having been seconded by Mr. HENRY L. HOPKINSON, was then put and carried.

COST OF MAKING RADIUM AVAILABLE FOR USE AT HOSPITALS.

The Chairman of the Management Committee (The Earl of DONOUGHMORE) then presented a Report recommending that power be delegated to the Committee to meet the cost of making Radium available for use at Hospitals.

The motion was seconded by Sir JOHN ROSE BRADFORD and carried unanimously.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1931.

The Chairman of the Revenue Committee (Lord LUKE) presented a Report of the Committee on the work of the Propaganda Sub-Committee, and moved the recommendation that it be published in the Annual Report of the King's Fund for the year 1931. (*See pages 48 to 51.*) Lord Luke referred to the "Mock Trials" now being held on Tuesdays. In answer to a question by His Royal Highness, he explained that that afternoon Mr. John Drinkwater would accuse five leading actresses of "Undue Domesticity."

Sir CUTHBERT WALLACE having seconded, the resolution was unanimously carried.

VOTE OF THANKS TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

The BISHOP OF LONDON said that it was to him a great honour to move a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness, and he did so after 31 years of attendance, during which either His Royal Highness or his predecessors had presided. He must say how tremendously great their admiration had been of the ability with which he did it and the way in which he spurred up their interest. They ought also to thank him this year for doubling his subscription in these very difficult times.

The Chairman of the London County Council (Mr. ANGUS N. SCOTT), in seconding the motion, said that it was a matter of pride to them all that, amid the many claims made upon His Royal Highness, he should find time to take a real and active interest in the work of the Fund, and he would like, on behalf of the people of London, to thank him most sincerely for the interest which he took.

The vote was then put and carried with acclamation.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS then said:—I thank you once again for the way you have received this vote of thanks, and I am grateful for the kind terms in which it was proposed and seconded. There is just one other thing I would like to mention. I feel that we should like to congratulate Mr. Maynard on the honour that has recently been conferred on him by His Majesty. We know how well that honour is deserved, and I should again like to express to him our appreciation for all the splendid work he has done for so long for our Fund.

The proceedings then terminated.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO HOSPITALS

(INCLUDING RECOVERY AND CONVALESCENT BRANCHES OF HOSPITALS).

1. The amount placed at the disposal of the Distribution Committee for allocation amongst hospitals and their recovery and convalescent branches at the present distribution is £272,000, as against £263,000 last year.

2. The number of hospitals applying for grants is 147, as against 141 in 1930, applications having been received from Bexley Cottage Hospital, Brookfield Orthopædic Hospital, Jewish Home of Rest, Ormond Maternity Home, Putney Hospital and Wilson Cottage Hospital.

3. The King's Fund Statistical Review of the finances of the hospitals in 1930 showed that during that year the effect of the prevailing depression upon the finances of the voluntary hospitals had not been as great as had been feared. There was an increase in the number of hospitals with deficits on the year's working and, had it not been for a single donation of £100,000 to one hospital, there would have been, for the first time since 1926, a net aggregate deficit. The total increase in income was, however, no less than £157,000, with the result that, in spite of an increase of £131,000 in expenditure, the surpluses still exceeded the deficits, both in number and in amount.

4. Although the King's Fund makes its distribution grants in respect of 1931, the accounts from which these figures are taken are the latest available, namely, those for 1930, and it is impossible to tell at present which hospitals have been most affected by the difficulties of the current year. In dealing with the extra amount at their disposal, the Committee have therefore first taken into account the known facts as to the additional hospitals applying for grants this year, the increases in occupied beds resulting from extensions opened since 1929, and the larger number of deficits in 1930. They have then used the balance to strengthen as far as

possible the position of hospitals which had already incurred liabilities through past maintenance deficits or through urgent schemes of capital expenditure recently completed or now in hand.

5. The grants recommended in aid of maintenance amount to £243,250, as compared with £232,100 in 1930, the grants towards schemes of capital expenditure being £28,750, as against £30,900 last year. The special grants towards expenditure on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers come to £19,313, as against £16,468 in 1930. The total of the present distribution is thus £291,313.

6. The Pensions grants are limited to £20,000 a year or to 25 per cent. of the expenditure of the hospitals on the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, whichever may be the smaller, for a period of 7 years; and the Distribution Committee also take into account, within the maximum of £20,000 and subject to certain conditions, expenditure in respect of supplementary pensions for back service and pensions to retired officers. The increase in the grants this year is due to the fact that by October, 1931, 7 more hospitals had adopted the Scheme, making 104 in all, and that more nurses and officers had joined. As a very small further increase would bring the total above the maximum of £20,000, it is hardly likely that the grants during the remaining three years of the period can be on quite the same percentage scale, for each of the separate headings, as during the first four years.

7. The Committee are again greatly indebted to the Visitors who inspected the hospitals. As usual, they are recommending that extracts from the Reports should, in suitable cases, be sent to the hospitals with the grants, for the observations of the Committees of Management. In some instances extracts were forwarded at once without waiting for the distribution. Most of these related to fire precautions, in connection with which it is the settled practice of the King's Fund not to take any responsibility itself, but to enquire whether the Committee of the Hospital, after considering the Visitors' observations, are satisfied that the precautions are adequate.

8. The information collected by the Visitors in 1930 on the subject of Patients' Waking Hours was considered early in the year by a sub-committee, and a Report on the subject was published in May. It was found that at 47 per cent. of the hospitals the hour was already 6 a.m. or later; and the Report recommended that, unless there were exceptional reasons to the contrary, patients should not be awakened earlier than 6 o'clock. The Sub-committee also referred to the results of enquiries made about the same time by the British Hospitals Association and the London County Council, both pointing to a similar conclusion. The Report attracted a good deal of attention and was commended in a Ministry of Health circular to the notice of all the County Councils and County Borough Councils throughout the country.

This year's Visitors found that already in July some of the hospitals had changed the hour. The Distribution Committee propose to obtain a complete return on the subject next year.

9. The Committee have, as usual, examined carefully all schemes of capital expenditure submitted to the Fund, in accordance with the well-known request of the Council that schemes should be so submitted before definite action is taken. Every such scheme is reported on by a sub-committee consisting of two members of the Distribution Committee, one medical and one lay, usually after a visit to the hospital. Hospitals are invited in the Fund's annual calendar to give a month's notice when a scheme is about to be submitted, so that a sub-committee may be appointed in advance and the procedure thus expedited.

10. In 1928 the Pay Beds Committee of the King's Fund expressed the opinion "that an extension of the pay bed system at the Voluntary Hospitals, with due safeguards for the maintenance and extension of the ordinary beds, would be of advantage to the patients of all classes, to the individual hospitals, and to the Voluntary Hospital system as a whole." An ever-increasing number of hospitals are making provision in this way for the needs of the middle and professional classes. The King's Fund wishes to keep itself informed of the development of the movement, and in July the Distribution Committee issued a circular asking that every hospital with a scheme for the provision of pay beds, on whatever scale, should furnish the King's Fund with particulars.

11. Last December the Committee called attention to the late date at which the annual reports of certain hospitals were received and the way in which this affected the work of the Fund and of its Visitors. They are pleased to see that this year there are very few such cases.

12. The Committee have again to thank the Royal Naval Benevolent Trust for a contribution of £500 to the King's Fund, on behalf of the Petty Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of H.M. Navy, in appreciation of the work which the London hospitals, as a whole, do for naval men and their dependants.

13. The following grants made in previous years have not been applied for, and come up for consideration under the two-years' rule :—

City of London Maternity Hospital, £500 to new nurses' accommodation.

Deptford and Greenwich Babies' Hospital, £350 to rebuilding and extension on new site.

Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, £900 to extension of in-patient department.

Infants' Hospital, £1,250 to extension.

Invalid and Crippled Children's Society's Hospital, £50 to enlargement of verandah.

London Fever Hospital, £500 to new isolation block.
 Mothers' Hospital of the Salvation Army, £1,000 to extension.
 Mount Vernon Hospital, £500 to extension.
 National Hospital (Queen Square), £250 to extension.
 Prince of Wales's Hospital, £250 to new out-patient department.
 Queen's Hospital for Children, £250 out of £1,000 to additional beds and nurses' accommodation.
 Royal Hospital (Richmond), £50 to additional nurses' accommodation.
 Royal Northern Hospital, £500 to additional heating apparatus.
 St. Thomas's Hospital, £1,000 to first stages of new out-patient department.
 Samaritan Free Hospital for Women, £500 to extension.
 South Eastern Hospital for Children (Sydenham), £400 to new casualty department and pay beds.

In ordinary circumstances many of these grants would doubtless have been claimed, and the Committee would have recommended that the others should be renewed. But in present conditions of finance they do not consider it desirable that capital grants should be reserved except for urgent schemes that are likely to be carried out in the near future. After examining each case from this point of view, they have come to the conclusion :

- (a) That the grants to the London Fever Hospital, the Mothers' Hospital, and the Royal Northern Hospital, and £300 of the grant to the City of London Maternity Hospital should lapse ;
- (b) That the grant to the Royal Hospital (Richmond) and £200 of the grant to the City of London Maternity Hospital should be transferred to other schemes at the same hospitals ;
- (c) That the other grants should be renewed.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION TO CONVALESCENT HOMES NOT ATTACHED TO PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

1. The President and General Council again fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes not attached to any particular Hospital in London at £3,000, being the same as last year, but an increase of £1,000 over the amount of the annual distribution in previous years.

2. The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 57, being the same as last year.

3. The Committee have again taken into account the extent to which medical or nursing care or treatment is provided for the patients. Further inquiries based on a revised questionnaire on the subject have been addressed to the Homes applying for grants, and the replies have been specially considered by a joint sub-committee of the Distribution Committee and the Hospital Economy Committee.

4. In dealing with the applications the Committee have also given attention to the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance-sheets of the various institutions to December 31 last. As the circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE.

REPORT ON RE-ALLOCATION OF RADIUM.

1. The position as last reported to the Council, at the Distribution Meeting in December, 1930, was that the 10 grammes of Radium acquired by the Fund had been allocated among 24 hospitals, and that 9 grammes had been delivered. In the course of 1931 the last gramme was delivered and the 10 grammes were in use.

2. In the course of the year the authorities of St. Mark's Hospital, who had received a loan of 100 mgms. found that the number of their cases suitable for treatment with Radium had decreased. Having therefore sufficient for their needs, they returned the amount allocated by the Fund. Pending re-allocation by the Distribution Committee this radium has been in temporary use at other hospitals.

3. In June the Westminster Hospital submitted a report by its Radium Staff which described the results obtained by the use of the 4-gramme bomb as being so discouraging as not to justify the Hospital in financing the undertaking further. This bomb had been acquired by the Fund, in the circumstances reported to the Council last year, in exchange for an equal quantity of radium to be used by the National Radium Commission outside London. It was part of the arrangement with the Commission that the Hospital should continue the scheme of radium therapy agreed between the Hospital and the Commission. The King's Fund accordingly, having first had an interview with representatives of the Hospital, asked the Commission for its observations upon the Hospital's Report of the results of the use of the bomb. The Commission replied stating that they were unanimous that the use of the bomb in its present form should be discontinued, and they recommended to the Fund that the Radium

in the bomb should be divided into four units of 1 gramme each, to be used for the development of surface therapy in malignant diseases, and that these units should be allocated to separate hospitals.

4. While these recommendations were under consideration, representations were made to the Fund on the subject of the use of bombs of larger size than 1 gramme, and the Distribution Committee proposed to the Commission a conference between representatives of the two bodies to discuss the problem.

5. At the conference the Fund's representatives stated that the information received by the Fund suggested the question whether a 3-gramme bomb could not be used successfully in certain forms and for certain sites of the body, and they asked, therefore, whether the Commission had any information to the contrary or whether they would recommend a loan of a 3-gramme bomb to some suitable hospital for further experiment. The Commission's representatives stated in reply the view taken by the Commission of the available evidence, and the reasons which had led them to their conclusion that, in present circumstances, three or four bombs of 1-gramme capacity would be the best method of using the radium, though this would not prevent the concentration of these units to form a larger bomb in the future if, as a result of experience, it was found to be desirable.

6. Following on the meeting the Commission, after careful consideration of the points raised by the King's Fund, confirmed by letter their recommendation that the use of the bomb in its present form should be discontinued and that units of 1 gramme each should be loaned for use in surface therapy to selected hospitals.

7. The recommendation of the Commission was then accepted in principle by the Distribution Committee and 3 grammes out of the 4 were allocated by the Fund for the purpose. The hospitals originally selected to receive these three grammes were the Cancer (Free), the Middlesex and St. Bartholomew's. The last-named hospital having subsequently withdrawn its acceptance, University College Hospital was substituted. It was arranged that the Fund should ask these hospitals to co-operate with the Commission in regard to the work to be done with these 1-gramme units.

8. Plans of the apparatus to make these 1-gramme units available for use and the scheme of work to be undertaken with them have been approved by the Commission and by the Distribution Committee.

9. The allocation of these three 1-gramme units left 1 gramme of the bomb available for loan, together with the 100 mgms. returned by St. Mark's. After careful consideration of all applications for radium that had been received by the Fund, the Distribution Committee allocated 1 gramme to Westminster Hospital and 100 mgms. to Guy's Hospital.

10. The total allocations of the King's Fund Radium amount therefore to 10 grammes amongst 24 hospitals, as follows :—

REVENUE COMMITTEE.

WORK OF THE PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE IN 1931.

1. The Propaganda Committee have had to face a year of exceptional difficulty, due to the prevailing economic depression, but they have continued to keep the claims of the Voluntary Hospitals constantly before the public. The fact that even in 1931, although several hospitals had serious deficits, the returns for all the hospitals taken together show an aggregate surplus of receipts over expenditure, is most encouraging to all who are working to maintain the voluntary system.

2. The Committee would like to record their appreciation of the valuable and unselfish services rendered by Lord Burnham, their Chairman, who, notwithstanding his many public activities, has always been ready to assist personally in every way possible the furtherance of their various schemes.

3. Reference was made in last year's report to the coming into operation of the Local Government Act, 1929, and to the desire of the Committee to assist in promoting an atmosphere favourable to successful co-operation between the Voluntary Hospitals and the London County Council. It was in pursuance of this aim that a *Conversazione* was held at the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum on March 26th, with the kind co-operation of Dr. (now Sir Henry) Wellcome, who generously acted as host. Speeches were delivered during the evening by Lord Burnham (who presided) and Lord Macmillan, and, from the standpoint of the L.C.C., by Sir George Hume and Sir Francis Morris. The speakers all emphasised the desirability of establishing friendly relations between the two branches of the Hospital Service of London.

4. A further Conference of Hospital Representatives was convened by the Publicity Sub-Committee on March 9th, to discuss how the Propaganda Committee could be of further use to the Voluntary Hospitals generally. As a result of negotiations with the principal Press Agencies, a scheme was agreed upon which it is hoped will lead to the printing, from time to time, of interesting items of news concerning the Voluntary Hospitals and their work.

5. Further contributions were received from Messrs. Raphael Tuck, bringing the total proceeds of the sale of "The King's Message to the Nation" up to £1,375; and from Messrs. Kodak, Ltd., making the total receipts from the Exhibitions of Royal Snapshots organised by them £275 to date.

6. A highly successful series of "Indictments" or Mock Trials was held at the London School of Economics in May and June, organised by an influential sub-committee with Sir Nigel Playfair as chairman. These entertainments have now acquired a wide reputation, and numerous letters are received every year asking whether another programme is being arranged. While the takings in 1931 amounted to £414, the value of the publicity obtained by the Fund can scarcely be overestimated.

7. Advantage was taken of an offer of free space generously made by the organisers of the "Daily Mail" Schoolboys' Exhibition, in January, to arrange a King's Fund exhibit. Nine of the teaching hospitals co-operated by lending material and providing demonstrators. Assistance was also rendered by the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum and the National Council for Maternity and Child Welfare. Demonstrations were given daily of bacteria under the microscope, diagnosis and treatment by X-rays, and artificial sunlight. The stand proved to be one of the most popular in the Exhibition.

8. Considerable progress was made during the year with the revision of the film depicting hospital life in modern times as compared with a century ago. New pictures were introduced illustrating the return of the patient to his home on being discharged, cured, from hospital; and various other additions and improvements were incorporated. H.R.H. the Prince of Wales having graciously given his consent, special pictures were taken on the occasion of his visit to the Royal Northern Hospital in November. This has added greatly to the interest of the film. The Committee received a letter from the Cinematograph Exhibitors' Association expressing their willingness to sponsor the re-issue of the film when revised and provided with a running commentary in place of sub-titles.

9. The Sub-Committee charged with the organisation of lectures on the work of the voluntary hospitals further extended their activities. The number of lectures arranged was 53, as compared with 50 in 1930 and 43 in 1929. In addition to schools in the area of the King's Fund, lectures were given at Wellington, Winchester, and Marlborough. Arrangements were also made for co-operation with such organisations as the Boy Scouts' Association (Rovers), the National Council of Girls' Clubs, and Women's Fellowships. The Committee are deeply indebted to the lecturers for giving their services without asking for any return. As a result of negotiations with Messrs. Newton & Co., a King's Fund set of slides was added to their catalogue under the title, "The Non-Stop Fight against Disease," a portion of the proceeds of lettings to be given to the Fund.

10. The Committee have to record with deep regret the death of Mr. J. B. Barnett, Medical Superintendent of the Royal National Orthopædic Hospital (Country Branch), who was one of their most popular lecturers, and who also rendered valuable service as a member of the Sub-Committee responsible for the revision of the film.

11. Specially Conducted Visits to places of interest were organised during July, August, and September, these including the Air Port of London, Somerset House, the Tower of London, and Tilbury Docks with lunch on board S.S. *Orontes*. For arranging these tours the thanks of the Committee are specially due to the Air Ministry; the Deputy Registrar-General, Mr. W. L. Rind; Col. Dan Burges, V.C.; Mr. Walter Bell; the Port of London Authority; and the Orient Steam Navigation Co.

12. In November and December an interesting series of illustrated lectures, under the title, "Tales of Travel and Adventure," was given at the Portland Hall on behalf of the Fund. The speakers were Mr. Yusuf Ali, Lieut-Commander L. C. Bernacchi, Sir Malcolm Campbell, Major A. J. Evans, Mrs. Patrick Ness, and Col. The Master of Sempill.

13. Reference was made in last year's report to the proposed construction of a small-scale model to represent an up-to-date hospital, which it was hoped might prove another valuable method of propaganda. Messrs. Adams, Holden & Pearson had generously undertaken to prepare the plans, and the only difficulty was that of the method in which money could be found for the actual building of the model. This difficulty has been completely removed by the generosity of Messrs. Humphreys, Ltd., of Knightsbridge, who on being informed of the Committee's plan offered to carry out the work at their own expense. Many well-known firms have also kindly undertaken to supply miniature fittings, of which there are a very large number, and the work is now proceeding. It is hoped that the model will be completed by the end of 1932.

14. The Committee adopted an interesting suggestion that George Stubbs's famous picture, "Lord and Lady Melbourne and Family," should be reproduced in mezzotint and copies sold for the benefit of the Fund. Lady Desborough, as owner of the picture, kindly gave her consent, and the plate was engraved by Mr. Macbeth-Raeburn, A.R.A. Messrs. Henry Graves & Co., Ltd., undertook the publication of a limited edition, royalties to be given to the King's Fund after the sale of an agreed number of copies to recoup the publishers for their expenses.

15. The Committee arranged for the circulation of the "Pay Beds" pamphlet to retail chemists, through the Pharmaceutical Society, as a means of bringing to the notice of members of the professional and middle classes the increasing facilities being provided for their benefit in the form of pay wards in the London Voluntary Hospitals.

16. The Committee wish to record their sense of gratitude to all who have given their assistance in connexion with the several functions organised during the year. Their thanks are specially due to the Metropolitan and Underground Railways for displaying posters in their stations free of charge, and to the shipping companies, hotel proprietors, business houses, and other agencies, whose co-operation in securing publicity for these various undertakings has been of the greatest value.

17. The Committee have continued to distribute King's Fund literature as opportunity arises, and to emphasise the peculiar advantages to be gained by maintaining the voluntary element as an integral part of the Hospital Service of London.

THE NATIONAL CRISIS AND THE VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS

STATEMENT PUBLISHED BY THE KING'S FUND IN NOVEMBER, 1931.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, speaking at Colchester on October 22, said :

"In these difficult days everyone has got to make drastic economies, but I hope that, unless absolutely essential, no one will discontinue an annual subscription to a hospital or charitable institution. Leave this cut till the very last."

By saying this His Royal Highness has done yet another striking service to those typically British institutions, the voluntary hospitals.

The voluntary hospitals are not beggars asking something for nothing. They carry on a great public service, the cost of which, like that of every other service, has to be met. The cost in London alone is about £3,600,000 a year, besides £1,000,000 spent on building. This cost is met by a co-operative effort in which everybody has a part to play. The patients themselves give £1,000,000 a year; voluntary contributions from the general public, in subscriptions, donations and legacies, have steadily increased till in 1930 they reached the huge sum of £2,900,000.

By thus voluntarily providing so much of the cost, the public and the patients gain far more than a merely efficient service. To quote the Prince again, this time from his speech at the Distribution Meeting of the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund :

"You can secure efficiency in many different ways. But there are certain special characteristics with which the voluntary system permeates the whole hospital service of this country; and these characteristics have their origin in the close touch between the workers in the hospital, voluntary and paid, and that particular form of sympathy and public spirit which finds expression in voluntary giving."

These characteristics—freedom, elasticity, individuality, initiative, flexibility, responsiveness—are essential contributions to the treatment of the sick and the advancement of medical science; and they have always been, in this country, the natural outcome of voluntary work, medical and lay, and of voluntary finance.

Moreover, voluntary provision of the cost is at the present moment the method of least hardship. Even those who prefer state or municipal hospitals must agree that provision by rates or taxes would mean, at this crisis, either compulsory sacrifices by great numbers who could ill afford them, or the cutting down of some other valuable services. Voluntary gifts are by their very nature contributions by those who can afford them, or who are willing voluntarily to make the sacrifice involved.

We suggest to everyone that the appeals of the hospitals, to which hitherto, if we take the country as a whole, the response has been the magnificent sum of over £9,000,000 a year, should be considered sympathetically from these points of view. Choose the hospital which most arouses your sympathy and interest, and give to that, whether in London or in the country. If you want to give to hospitals in London but cannot decide between them, you can consult the list of grants made by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London to 146 hospitals each year in December; or you can send the money to the King's Fund to be distributed. But, however valuable its knowledge and influence, no Central Fund can take, or would wish to take, the place of direct gifts to each individual hospital to furnish the regular income required to pay for its daily work for the benefit of the community it serves.

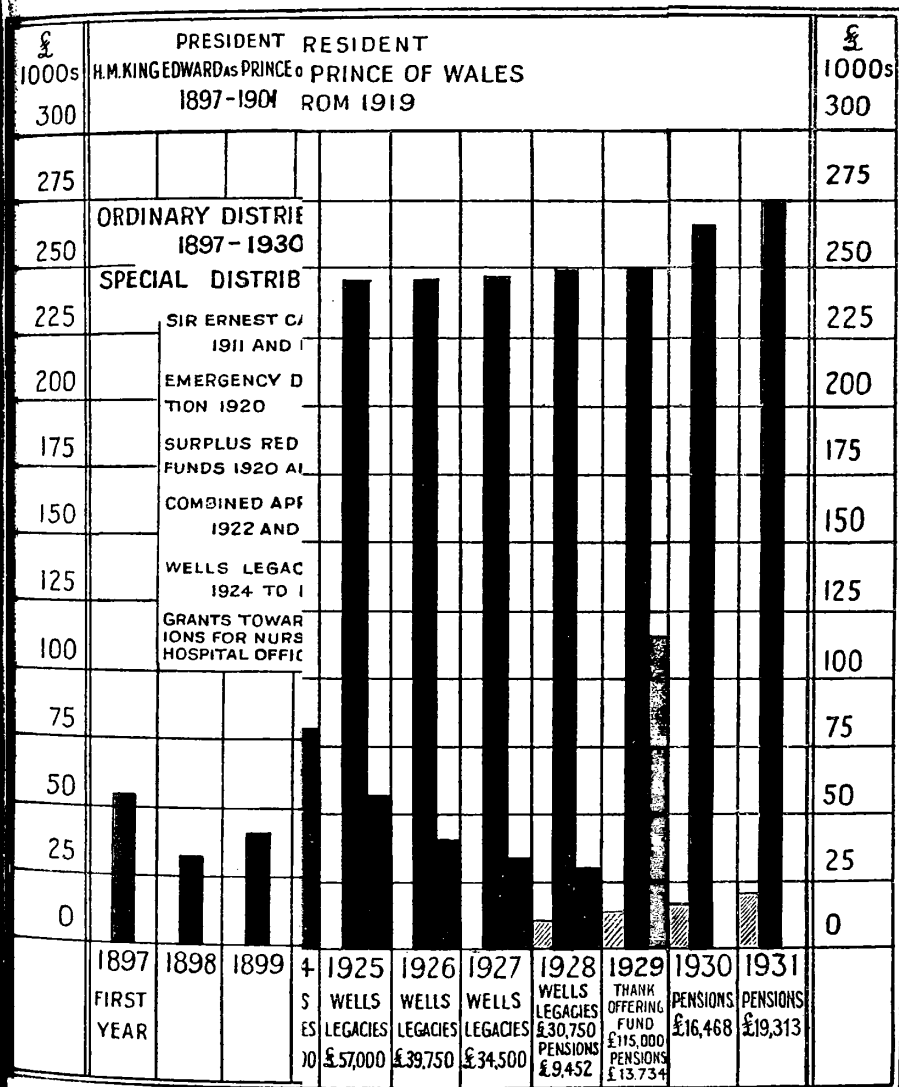

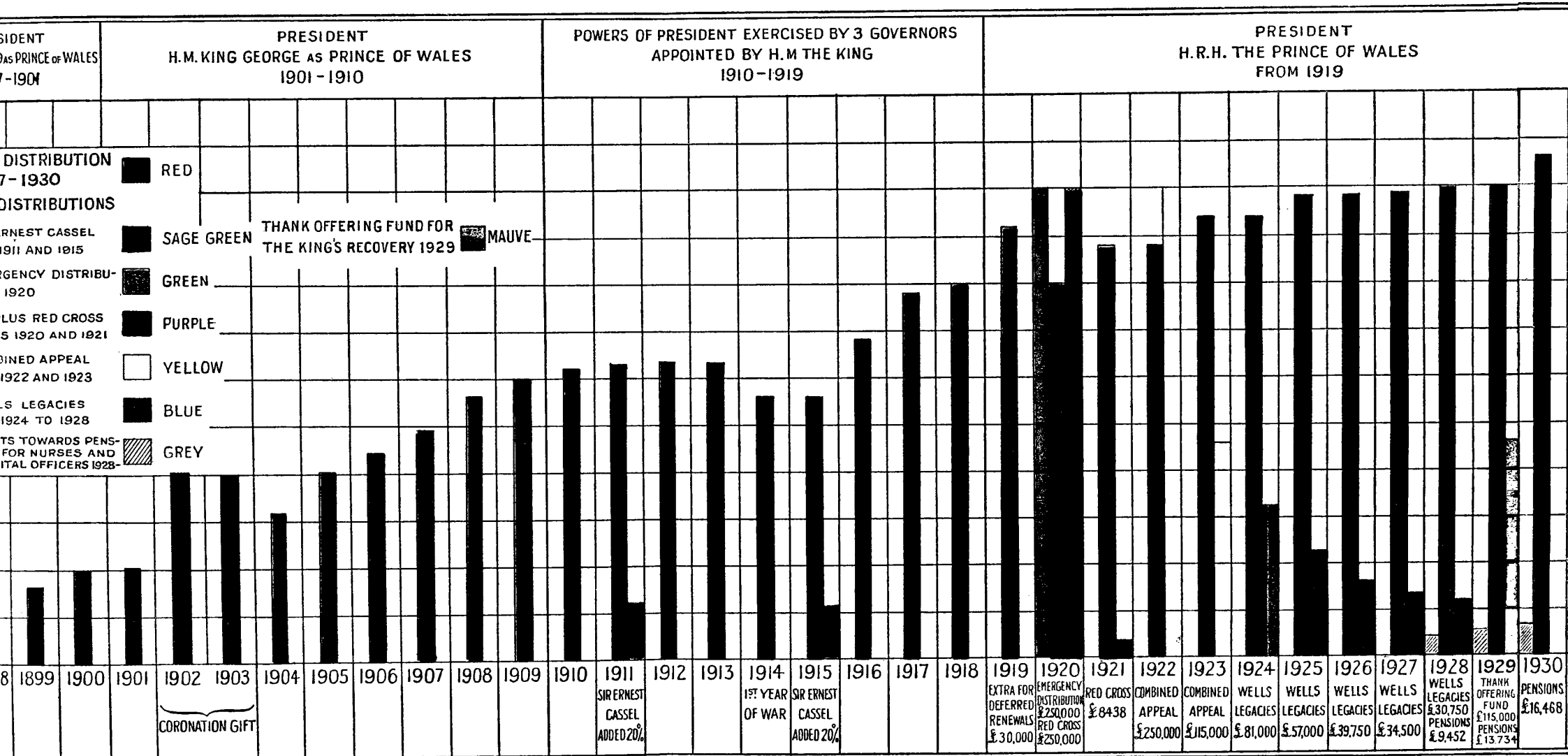

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

It was renamed "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council (page 1.)

His late Majesty King Edward VII was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June, 1910, to April, 1919, the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons (now Viscount Ullswater), the late Marquess of Cambridge, and the late Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 2 and 3.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated within 11 miles from St. Paul's.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions (except in areas where new populations have grown up since the date of the foundation of the Fund) or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see list of publications on the following page). A New Edition was issued in January 1926.

Every eligible Hospital applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 3).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendation of the Distribution Committee, by the General Council in December.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the thirty-five years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £7,060,000 (including £395,000 proceeds of the Hospitals of London Combined Appeal 1922-3) to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients; the amount distributed in 1931 being £275,000, besides £19,313 in respect of the Pensions Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 14s. 9d. per cent. of the receipts, which is just over 4d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £484,000 to the Fund during the last thirty-three years, the contribution in 1931 being £17,000.

The Fund has, through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims ; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension, or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals ; and due economy is encouraged by the publication by the King's Fund of Annual Statistics showing the cost of working at different Hospitals (see list of publications on the following pages). The issue of these Reports has assisted the Hospitals to effect considerable savings. The Hospitals are encouraged to supplement the use of figures of cost by the use of statistics of quantities consumed.

The Fund has also a propaganda department, the object of which is to spread knowledge and to stimulate interest in the work of the Voluntary Hospitals of London.

Special inquiries are held from time to time, and reports published, upon questions affecting Hospitals, *e.g.*, Fire Precautions, Expenses of Charity Entertainments, Co-operative Contracts, the Out-patient Question, the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts, Pensions for Hospital Officers and Nurses, Hospitals and Recovery Branches, Quantity Statistics, Ambulance Cases Disposal, Pay Beds for the middle and professional classes, the Relations between Voluntary Hospitals and Municipal Hospitals under the Local Government Act, Unoccupied Beds, Patients' Waking Hours.

A pamphlet is published annually containing a list of pay beds at London Hospitals, the number at December 31, 1931, being 1,577 at 104 hospitals.

As the result of gifts which included £56,000 from Sir Otto Beit, £10,000 from Mr. Roger Parr, and £37,000 received through the Thank-Offering Fund, the King's Fund owns a stock of Radium which is lent by the Fund to certain Hospitals in London.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals, but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.
